
The 4-H Club has raised over \$1000 to date, but remember, Borden County's goal is \$1200. so keep up the good work.

CropReportsFrom Farmers Needed

In early July, over 23,000 Texas farmers will receive an average and production questionnaire from Charles E. Caudill, Agricultural Statisticain for the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Austin Texas.

Information from this survey will be used to determine harvested acreage and production of early harvested crops for the State of Texas and for each county. There are 256 counties in Texas, and reports are needed from many farmers so that each county will be well represented. Accurate estimates are of great importance to farmers in planning production and marketings and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture.

The Texas Legislature has provided a program of estimates for each county. Texas covers such a wide area that State totals alone do not provide adequate information on Texas' --most basic industry--agriculture. This is a cooperative effort of USDA's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

SheepShearing ''NotLikeItUsedToBe''

Sheep shearing that is! Last year at Christmas time as we sat around the fireplace at the Reeder home and told our children stories about what life was like when we were little boys and girls, Larry and Borden had some interesting tales to relate about shearing time at Dennis's sheep ranch.

Living in "coyote country"

Living in "coyote country" my children had never seen a sheep shearing so to Borden county we came to get in ona sheep round-up.

As soon as we arrived, we headed out to Peggy and John Dennis's , but as we neared the ranch , the mexican Shearing crews were pulling out. My children's faces just fell, but I told them not to give up yet. John said, 'they had just completed his but they would be shearing at Frank Beaver's later that day.

About five we drove over to

About five we drove over to Frank's pens to get in on the action. It had been a long time since I had been to a sheep shearing and they had changed their way of doing things considerably! I assured the children that they could probably help run a dope bucket because that had always been my job

as a little girl but alas! No dope buckets! When I was a kid, screwworms were so bad, each place the shearers nicked the sheep, we had to smear some black medicine on it which we called "dope" (my, how times have changed!) This was applied with a small mop that someone had made by wrapping a rag around a stick. Of course, these mops were also handy for hitting your brother with when he tripped you on the shearing boards and a couple of old ewes ran over you, n a couple of old

It was with wide eyed amaze-ment that my children watched the shearers drag the sheep to the shearing boards and roll those fleeces off. The fleeces were then thrown into an automatic wool sacker. The wool sacks used to be hung on frames and someone threw the fleece up to you and you stomped it down with your feet. I remember well the day that we were helping the Dennis's work and they lost Debbie. Everyone stopped their job to help find Deb. Come to find out, she was in the wool sack all the time.


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LEGAL NOTICE

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
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
