

Update: Light added at Hobart-Alcock junction

The brothers added that they want to get out in the community before they hold weekend gatherings.

"One of the visions we have is to help change the economy of this town," Ryan said. "As we bring beauty to the physical locations, hopefully it will increase property values and make people proud to live in this

C.J. said they have to act on what their vision of their church is. "I want to be the church that I want to see," Frazier said. "If I want to see the church do more outreach, I've got to do more outreach. Ryan said their church will hopefully stand out be-

cause it's different.

AUSTIN (AP) - Gov. Rick Perry says he's considering a run for the White House, but the longestserving Texas governor hasn't yet capitalized on Newt 300 rounds of gunfire with Gingrich's campaign implosion with a quick move suspected drug runners into the GOP presidential field.

TX gasoline prices slip 5 cents

IRVING (AP) - Retail gasoline prices in Texas have fallen for a fourth straight week, dropping 5 cents to average \$3.58 a gallon.

AAA Texas on Thursday reported the average price per gallon nationally is also down 5 cents, reaching \$3.73 this week.

The association says the declines are due to a recent drop in crude oil prices and a decline in U.S. retail gasoline demand.

The cheapest price at the pump in Texas is \$3.50 a gallon in Beaumont. Amarillo has the state's most expensive gasoline, averaging \$3.65 a gallon.

US rig count up by 1 to 1,855

HOUSTON (AP) - The number of rigs actively exploring for oil and natural gas in the U.S. rose by one this week to 1,855.

Houston-based drilling product provider Baker Hughes Inc. reported Friday that 969 rigs were exploring for oil and 879 for natural gas. Seven were listed as miscellaneous. A year ago, the rig count stood at

Of the major oil- and gas-producing states, New Mexico gained seven rigs, Louisiana rose by six, Wyoming by four and Pennsylvania by three. Texas dropped 10 rigs, while Oklahoma decreased by four. North Dakota and Colorado each decreased by two. California and Alaska each dropped one. Arkansas and West Virginia remained unchanged.

Exxon's TX refinery reports leak

HOUSTON (AP) - Exxon Mobil Corp. has told Texas environmental regulators there was an eightweek-long, 108,000-pound propylene release at the company's refinery complex near Houston.

Irving, Texas-based Exxon reported to regulators a tubing leak was discovered on June 2 in the chemical plant portion of the sprawling complex in Baytown. The leak was isolated within a half-hour, but Exxon says the leak may have started on April 12.

Propylene is a component of ground-level ozone. According to the report, Exxon isn't permitted to release any propylene at the olefins plant.

Exxon says it won't comment beyond the report it made to the Texas Commission on Environmental



AUSTIN (AP) - A Latino civil rights group on Friday combined its lawsuit to stop Republicandrafted redistricting plans with one by Hispanic lawmakers.

The League of United Latin American Citizens join their suit with one originally filed by the American Mexican Legislative Caucus. The federal lawsuit alleges that proposed congressional and legislative redistrictcitizens in Texas.

The league, better known as LULAC, has brought hundreds of lawsuits over the last 40 years, most of them successful. LULAC testified against the new redistricting plan before the Legislature and submitted an alternative map. LULAC argues the Republican plan splits Hispanic communities so that conservative Anglos would be more likely to win seats in Congress, or packs Hispanics into other districts so that they can't influence other districts.

"The Texas Legislature has never, ever, successfully drawn a legislative redistricting plan since the Voting Rights Act came into Texas in 1975." said Luis Roberto Jr., LULAC's national general counsel, who filed the suit. "Texas is one of the

vote along racial lines." The Republican lawmakers who drafted the new maps insist they are fair and legal but said they expected numerous lawsuits to challenge them.

At least six other suits have already been filed, but LULAC's history of winning makes theirs particularly significant.

The Legislature redraws congressional maps every ten years based on new census data. Because of the state's rapid growth Texas is adding four new congressional seats. More than 87 percent of the state's growth has been from minorities, leading civil rights activists to demand more representation for those groups.

300 rounds exchanged during Texas border shootout

SAN ANTONIO (AP) U.S. law enforcement officials exchanged about during a pre-dawn shootout across the Rio Grande, but only about six came from the suspects, authorities said Friday.

The Texas Department of Public Safety, whose Rangers were involved in overwhelming response was standard given the United States' zero tolerance policy when guns are pointed at its authorities. Department officials previously said the Americans were under "heavy fire," but they've since backed away from that.

The incident began about 6:30 a.m. Thursday, when U.S. Border Patrol agents spotted a Dodge Durango near the lightly populated border town of Abram, Texas, said Steve McCraw, director of the Department of Public Safety Director. He joined officials from Border Patrol and Texas Fish and Wildlife for a news conference Friday in Weslaco, roughly 250 miles south of San Antonio and just north of the river separat-

ing Mexico and the U.S. Agents who gave chase found the truck abandoned on the banks of the Rio Grande, and a group of people on the Mexican shore unloading bundles of marijuana from rubber rafts, according to the Department of Public

Border Patrol agents say Mexican smugglers often use small, high-quality rafts to float drugs into U.S. territory, where they load them onto waiting vehicles to be taken farther north. Of late, however,

smugglers wait with the rafts in American territory in case the vehicles are spotted and have to flee back to the river. There, they quickly put the drugs back onto the rafts and head back to Mexico to keep U.S. authorities from

seizing the load. That's what happened Thursday, the Department of Public Safety said, except U.S. authorities arrived in time to see a group of people who had already made it back to the Mexican side removing packets of marijuana from rafts.

The group threw rocks and shot "at least six'

rounds at American agents, who responded by flooding the area with gunfire, the Department of Public Safety said. A U.S. Border Patrol boat was the first to arrive on the scene, followed by boats from Texas Parks and Wildlife and one belonging to the Texas Rangers, it said.

Authorities said they are still looking into how many Americans fired shots and what agencies they were from.

Three suspects on the Mexican side of the river were believed injured or killed, although authorities in that country were still working to confirm that. Two U.S. game wardens were treated for cuts and abrasions after being struck with rocks.

A video shot from a Department of Public Safety helicopter shows a blue raft with bundles of marijuana packed in plastic and burlap. Smoke is seen pouring from a small structure nearby, although what caused the fire is

U.S. authorities seized the Durango but found no drugs in it. They contacted authorities in Mexico, who seized about 400 pounds

of marijuana on that side of the river and destroyed a raft left behind. No arrests were made.

The shootout happened near a part of the Rio Grande where Border Patrol agents seized about 1,200 pounds of marijuana on Wednesday.

In that incident, Border Patrol agents chased a black Chevy Silvadrado across U.S. territory as its driver sped back to the Rio Grande. There, about 20 people were waiting with rafts that likely had been 'used to move the drugs onto American soil moments earlier. The plan was to move the drugs back into Mexico, but the driver only had time to steer the truck partially into the river.

He and at least two passengers, as well as those on the bank, escaped into Mexico.

Since January 2010, the Department of Public Safety has tracked at least a dozen incidents of shots being fired from Mexico into Texas, with U.S. agents shooting back in some cases. No U.S. authorities have been reported hurt.

Residents near Texas nuke dump get health survey

LUBBOCK (AP) Residents living near a low-level radioactive waste burial ground in West Texas will be asked to complete a health survey The rig count peaked at 4,530 in 1981, the height as part of a study commissioned by state officials.

State environmental and health officials have hired the University of North Texas to assess about 24,000 people who live within a 35-mile radius of Waste Control Specialists LLC's nuclear dump site in Andrews County near the New Mexico border.

University spokeswoman Leslie Wimmer said letters encouraging residents in Texas and in New Mexico to participate will go out in the next few days.

The survey, authorized in legislation in 2003, will provide a baseline health assessment before radioactive material is buried at the site later this year. Neither the questions nor the results will be made public, Wimmer said.

"The health survey is

an appropriate safety precaution to take," Waste Control spokesman Chuck McDonald said Friday. "I think it's another example of the prudent approach the state has taken throughout this process."

Lawmakers agreed this year to let 36 other states to dispose of their low-level radioactive waste at the site. Previously, only the federal government, Texas and Vermont were authorized to dispose of radioactive waste there.

No radioactive was is currently at the site. The waste that will be buried there includes workers' clothing, glass, metal and other materials now stored at nuclear power plants, hospitals, universities and

research labs. Environmentalists concerned about the possible contamination of groundwater sources that

of the Ogallala Aquifer would be devastating both economically and environmentally

The survey, which residents can do over the phone or online, is a good start, said Tom "Smitty" Smith of the environmental group Public Citizen.

"The devil's in the details and the quality of the survey will be determined in its usefulness over time, both in terms of what's considered in the baseline but also in how the residents are tracked because most of us move several times in our lifetime," he said. E-mails show Palin eyeing VP slot in '08

JUNEAU, Alaska (AP) — Much of the country was taken by surprise when Sarah Palin became the Republican vice presidential candidate in August 2008, but newly released emails show the little-known Alaska governor was angling for the slot months before Sen. John McCain asked her to join him on the GOP ticket.

Earlier that summer. Palin and her staff began pushing to find a larger audience for the governor, nudging the McCain campaign to notice her.

Palin and her staff talked excitedly on June 19 about plans to repeal Alaska's fuel tax. Ivy Frye, a longtime Palin aide and friend, said she would send details to McCain staffers when they

"They're going to love it!" Frye wrote. "More vp talk is never a bad thing, whether you're considering vp or not. I still say President Palin sounds better tho ...

The glimpse into Palin's first 21 months as Alaska governor, from the time she took office to her ascension to GOP vice presidential candidate, came in more than 24,000 pages of emails released Friday by the state. Citizens and news organizations, including The Associated Press, first requested the emails during the 2008 White House race as they vetted a nominee whose political experience included less than one term as governor and a term as mayor of Wasilla, Alaska.

The emails showed that supporters across the country began suggesting to Palin that she would be a good vice presidential candidate as early as April. That attention increased after she appeared on conservative commentator Glenn Beck's Fox News show in early June.

"We have heard your name, along with our own Governor, mentioned as a possible vice-presidential candidate," wrote a person who identified himself as Ron Peters of Shreveport, La. I think you could do a lot for the Republican Party and would be an outstanding choice. Is this within the realm of possibility?"

Letters congratulating her on the birth of her son Trig poured in at the same time, even as Palin dealt with rumors that Bristol Palin, not the governor, was the baby's mother.

"Even at Trig's doc apt this morning his doc said that's out there (hopefully NOT in their medical community-world, but it's out there)," Palin wrote on April 22. "Bristol called again this afternoon asking if there's anything we can do to stop this, as she received two girlfriend-type calls today asking if it were

In June, Palin and her team were making final preparations on a letter about the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge. She told one aide to make sure the letter was sent to newspapers across the country. Then she added in a follow-up email: "Pls also send to McCain and Obama's camps. Thanks.

Also in June, spokeswoman Meghan Stapleton sent Palin a draft of an op-ed piece carrying the governor's name that would be pitched to national publications "beginning with the New York Times." Palin responded the following day, writing: "Pls. print."

Many reporters were already paying attention. A deputy press secretary told Palin in early June that she was fielding interview requests "on everything from polar bears to the VP buzz" from national media outlets, including The Wall Street Journal.

Three years later, Palin is among the top tier of potential 2012 presidential candidates in polls of Republican voters. Her recent bus tour of the Northeast fueled speculation about her national ambitions. She has said she has not yet decided whether she

Within minutes of the emails' release on Friday, Palin tweeted a link to the website for "The Undefeated," a documentary about her time as governor and her arrival on the national political

Her supporters, meanwhile, encouraged everyone to read the messages. "The emails detail a Governor hard at work," said Tim Crawford, the treasurer of her political action committee, Sarah PAC, in a prepared statement.

The nearly three-year delay in releasing the material has been attributed largely to the sheer volume. The emails were packed into six boxes, weighing 250 pounds in all, stacked in a small office in a complex of buildings near the state capitol in Juneau.

The emails were sent and received by Palin's personal and state email accounts, and the ones being released were deemed state business-related. Palin and top aides were known to communicate using private email accounts.

Lawyers went through every page to redact sensitive government information, and 2,275 pages were withheld for reasons including attorney-client, work product or executive privilege an additional 140 pages were deemed to be "non-records," or unrelated to state business.

Palin's attorneys did not ask to withhold any emails for privacy concerns, said Linda Perez, who was in charge of coordinating the release. As news organizations began vetting her record in 2008,

Palin was accused of essentially turning over questions about her gubernatorial record to McCain's campaign managers, part of an ambitious GOP strategy to limit any embarrassing disclosures and carefully shape her image for voters.

Former House Speaker Newt Gingrich offered advice to a McCain-Palin campaign manager on how to blunt the impact of a September 2008 Washington Post report that she accepted \$17,000 in per diem payments for time she spent at her Wasilla

Gingrich said the conaign should elaborate on its initial defense that Palin did arge the state for money she could have collected to spend on ner kids.

Palin also dealt with death threats. On Sept. 17, 2008, she forwarded a profanity-laced, threatening email from a man claiming to be a Juneau resident from her government account to two aides.

The release of the emails generated widespread interest online. Many news organizations, including The New York Times, the Los Angeles Times and msnbc.com, began scanning and posting the emails on their websites throughout the day. The New York Times asked readers to join reporters in reviewing the documents. Tidbits of the emails were featured on blogs and

Hospital not in danger of closing

To the Editor:

In last Friday's edition of The Pampa News, there was an article on what transpired at the "Save the Hospital" Town Hall Meeting at the Junior High Thursday evening. As a non-participant, I can only respond to what I have read in the news and heard from the participants of the meeting. As the CEO of Pampa Regional Medical Center, my duty during the sale process is ensure we remain focused on the delivery of care to our patients, help retain the focus on appropriate due diligence processes and to answer any and all inquiries without prejudice to any interested party.

Since last Fridays article appeared, the hospital staff and the medical staff have been inundated with questions about the potential closure of the hospital or the impact of an acquisition by one of Amarillo's health care providers. First and foremost, the hospital is not in danger

of closing. Secondly, any potential buyer has the right to represent their own plans or proposals and not have others opine or speculate about what will or won't happen under their ownership.

The future of the health care industry includes elements of uncertainty given the related factors of health care reform. The future of healthcare in Pampa will undoubtedly involve elements of risk accompanied by the inevitable difficult or tough choices; however, we can eliminate one element from the risk assessments and tough choices, fear.

In a previous letter to the editor, I attempted to allay any fears that the hospital is in danger of closing. Unfortunately, I must have missed that mark given the rumors floating throughout the community. Again I will state, PRMC is not in danger of closing and year-to-date has performed better than the preceding year. Our intention is to maintain the current course of action by increasing the volumes while practicing good, strong financial management. No matter who owns PRMC, vol-

umes will remain a significant focus. Each party that is currently interested in PRMC will undoubtedly examine the risks and opportunities associated with ownership and have to answer the same question: "is the investment of millions of dollars worth the risk or does the risk outweigh the financial incentives of ownership?"

If any individual, group or business in Pampa or the surrounding area is interested in PRMC's current performance, please contact my office and I will share the performance data with you or your group/ business. Call or email your concerns and I will respond to your inquiry. If we can deal with facts, I think everyone will be more knowledgeable and less fearful.



The movie is about a group of kids who witness a train crash, out of which, something emerges, while making a movie with their Super 8 camera. And that's all the plot information you'll get out of me, because really that's all you need to know. This is the kind of movie that you should know as little about as possible going in to. To say more would be to ruin the experience. Instead I recommend you remove all your preconceived notions and expectations and just go in and enjoy the ride.

A big part of any movie is finding the right actors to fill the parts, in this case it's likely hard where most of the acting is being done by kids between the ages of 12 and 14. Yet, Abrams has managed to assemble a group of youngsters who have no problem of convincing you that what you see on screen is real. Most of that responsibility falls on two actors, Joel Courtney (Joe Lamb), for whom "Super 8" is the first professional acting role, and Elle Fanning (Alice Dainard), the much more talented sister of Dakota. These two by far steal the show and create characters that live on after the credit role. Elle, especially brings a quality to the film, that I doubt any other actor her age could have done, she manages to make Alice both a child with maturity beyond her years and someone who longs to stay a child just a bit longer.

While Abrams fills his movie with wonderful characters, he also proves that he truly is a master of the technical art of movie making. His shots are beautiful, the editing is masterful, and the special effects are top notch (especially based on the relatively small budget for a sci-fi flick of this caliber). Like Cloverfield before it, "Super 8" does an amazing job of showing you the thing from the crash, while also not fully revealing it, until he is ready.

"Super 8" is a roller coaster ride of a film that manages to both thrill and has a fully realized emotional core. "Super 8" is my favorite film of the summer thus far and ranks with "True Grit" as one of my favorites of the year.

Joplin survivors catch infection

JOPLIN, Mo. (AP) — In the aftermath of the Joplin tornado, some people injured in the storm developed a rare and sometimes fatal fungal infection so aggressive that it turned their tissue black and caused mold to grow inside their wounds.

Scientists say the unusually aggressive infection occurs when dirt or vegetation becomes embedded under the skin. In some cases, injuries that had been stitched up had to be reopened to clean out the contamination.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said Friday that it was conducting tests to help investigate the infections, which are so uncommon that even the nation's largest hospitals might see only one or two cases a year.

"To my knowledge, a cluster like this has not been reported before," said Dr. Benjamin Park, head of the CDC team that investigates fungal diseases. "This is a very rare fungus. And for people who do get the disease, it can be extremely severe.'

Three tornado survivors who were hospitalized with the infection have died, but authorities said it was unclear what role the fungus played in their deaths because they suffered from a host of other serious ailments.

These people had multiple traumas, pneumonia, all kinds of problems," said Dr. Uwe Schmidt, an infectious disease specialist at Freeman Health System in Joplin. "It's difficult to say how much the fungal infections contributed to their demise.

The infection develops in two ways: when the fungal spores are inhaled or when a tree branch or other object carrying the fungus pierces the flesh.

Most people who get sick by inhaling the spores already have weakened immune systems or diabetes. But healthy people can become sick if the fungus penetrates their skin. The fungus blocks off blood vessels to the infected area, causing tissue to turn red and begin oozing. Eventually it becomes black.

If diagnosed in time, the infection can be treated with intravenous medications and surgical removal of affected tissue. But it's considered exceptionally dangerous, with some researchers reporting fatality rates of 30 percent for people infected through wounds and 50 percent for susceptible people who breathe it in

Small numbers of cases have been reported after some disasters, but Park said it's the particular circumstance of the wound - not the disaster itself that creates the risk.

The Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services has received reports of eight suspected deep-skin fungal infections among survivors of the May 22 twister, which was the nation's deadliest single tornado in more than six decades. All of the patients had suffered multiple injuries.

Also Friday, Joplin officials raised the death toll from the twister to 151, a figure that includes the recent deaths of the three people who had the fungus.

Schmidt said his hospital treated five Joplin tornado victims for the infection, which is formally known as zygomycosis (zy'-goh-my-KOH'-sihs). In 30 years of medical practice, he said, he had seen only two cases. Both involved patients with untreated diabetes.

U.S. agent named in suit over teen death

EL PASO (AP) — The family of a 15-year-old Mexican boy fatally shot by a U.S. Border Patrol agent is now naming the officer as part of its lawsuit against the federal government, a family lawyer said Friday.

Bob Hilliard told the The Associated Press that the agent is Jesus Mesa Jr., whose last name has also been spelled Meza.

"This allows us to identify the shooter, we hope we can get his history," Hilliard said in a phone interview.

The Corpus Christi, Texas-based lawyer says he is trying to establish such facts as whether the agent had been previously reprimanded for using his weapon or if he had a history of violent outbursts.

An attorney for the agent, Randolph Ortega, has denied wrongdoing. Ortega did not immediately return a message Friday to The Associated Press. The U.S. Border Patrol has not replied several emails requesting information on the agent who allegedly shot the boy.

Sergio Adrian Hernandez Guereca of Ciudad Juarez, Mexico, was killed in June 2010. U.S. investigators have said the agent was trying to arrest illegal immigrants who crossed into the U.S. when he came under attack from rock throwers.

Hilliard says the teen was unarmed and did not threat-

Local media have reported that the family is demanding \$25 million in compensation. Hilliard said they put a \$10 million dollar request when they initially filed the suit but could ask the jury for more.

Hilliard also said that in an eye witness video, additional Border Patrol agents are seen arriving at the scene of the shooting. They left along with Mesa, without checking if the boy needed medical assistance.

"No matter what, if you think you have a right to shoot him, you should go and see if they need first aid," Hilliard said.

Federal arrest records obtained by The Associated Press shortly after the June 7, 2010, shooting showed the boy had been arrested at least four times since 2008 and twice in the same week in February 2009 on suspicion of smuggling illegal immigrants across the U.S.-Mexico border. However, he was never charged with a crime.

Alaska officials release Palin's e-mails

JUNEAU, Alaska (AP) — Alaska officials on Friday released thousands of pages of Sarah Palin's emails, giving a glimpse of her time as governor, her struggles in dealing with gossip about her family and her rise to national prominence as the GOP vice presidential nomi-

Reporters and photographers crowded into a small office to pick up the six boxes of emails --24,199pages and weighing 250 pounds. Some carried the boxes down the stairs and others, wheeling them on dollies, scrambled to be the first ones to reach elevators.

Within minutes of the release, Palin tweeted a link to the website for "The Undefeated," a documentary about her time as governor and her entrance onto the national political stage.

Her supporters, meanwhile, encouraged everyone to read the messages.

The thousands upon thousands of emails released today show a very engaged Governor Sarah Palin being the CEO of her state," said Tim Crawford, the treasurer of her political action committee, Sarah PAC. "The emails detail a Governor hard at work.'

Palin has been placing in the top tier of potential presidential candidates in polls of Republican voters. Her recent bus tour of the Northeast fueled speculation about her national ambitions. However, she has said she has not yet decided whether she will enter the 2012 race.

Many news organizations, including The New York Times, the Los Angeles Times and msnbc. com, began scanning and posting the emails on their websites. The New York Times asked readers to join reporters in reviewing the documents

The emails released Friday were first requested during the 2008 White House race by citizens and news organizations, including The Associated Press, as they vetted a nominee whose political experience included less than one term as governor and a term as mayor of Wasilla, Alaska.

The nearly three-year

delay has been attributed largely to the sheer volume of the release. Lawyers went through every page to redact sensitive government information. Another reason was the nearly 500 open records requests during Palin's time in office, and state records officers being told to deal with smaller, easier ones first.

The emails cover the period from the time she took office in December 2006 to her ascension to vice presidential nominee in September 2008.

In the months before she was named the nominee, Palin's emails showed a. governor dealing with complaints, rumors and gossip about her family. In several, she asked about the identity of someone who alleged that she had not buckled her son, Trig, properly into his car seat.


In another, she lament-

ed about gossip about her family and marriage. Palin and her daughter, Bristol, appeared to be traveling in a car, and Bristol emailed a Palin staffer in July: "Mom and I were just praying about the hurt and anger that comes with her job. Thank you for your faith in God.

"We share it and we love you!" Bristol wrote, from her mother's personal email account

After she was selected the GOP vice presidential nominee, news organizations began vetting her record.

Palin resigned partway through her first term, in early July 2009. Requests also have been made for Palin's final 10 months in office. State officials haven't begun reviewing those records. Leighow, now spokeswoman for Gov. Sean Parnell, said she doubted the release of those emails would come soon.



Mays SG Terry's NBA trophy tattoo was quite a premonition

DALLAS (AP) — Jason Terry put his faith in these Dallas Mavericks in ink. On the inside of his right biceps.

With one more win, he'll get to keep his tattoo of the NBA's championship trophy - plus have the real thing.

Terry had his title hopes injected into his arm in October, during a get-together at teammate DeShawn Stevenson's house. At the start of the playoffs, Terry vowed to have it removed if the Mavericks didn't win it all

Thanks largely to him regaining his shooting touch in that inked-up arm, Terry and the Mavs flew to Miami on Friday closer to a title than ever before in franchise history. It could belong to them as soon as Sunday night.

"We put ourselves in the situation we wanted, to go back there with this opportunity," center Tyson Chandler said. "But we can't get too ahead of ourselves. We can't get caught up in all the hoopla."

In their previous 30 seasons, the closest the Mavericks came to being champs was in 2006, when they held a 2-0 series lead over the Heat and a big, late lead in Game 3.

Dallas ended up blowing it in six games. The Mavs had to watch the Heat celebrate on their own home floor. So the chance to close it out in Game 6, in Miami, is a delicious bit of payback to Terry and Dirk Nowitzki, the only hold-

"Game 6," Terry said, savoring the notion. "We must go out, play aggressively and take advantage of our oppor-

The Mavs have done that all postsea-

Every time they've gotten three wins a series, the fourth has followed right away. They are 3-0 in knockout chances. Only one was on the road, but it was in one of the NBA's most hostile arenas, in Portland. Dallas already has tamed the Miami crowd, handing the Heat their first home loss of the postseason in Game 2.

"It's going to be hard to go in there in Miami and win, but we know we are capable of doing it," forward Shawn know what's at stake here. It's going to be exciting."

The Mays are keeping their excitement level under wraps.

They've been in anti-celebration mode since Game 2 of the second round, when Nowitzki was upset about how giddy guys got over a second straight victory in Los Angeles. He's remained stoic regardless of the circumstances, even walking out of the Western Conference title celebration before it was over.

On Thursday night, following the most significant win in franchise history, with fans going bonkers, all Nowitzki did was wearily raise his arms.

"I really can't enjoy it much," he said, still sniffling a bit because of a sinus infection that gripped him in Game 4, but now is as much of a nuisance as the splint on his left middle finger, which isn't much.

"In the playoffs, for some reason, you're always on the edge," he said. "You don't sleep much. You think basketball 24-7.

Marion said. "It's going to be crazy. We I can enjoy it hopefully next week when we're on vacation.'

The Mavs have needed fourth-quarter rallies in each of their three wins. But they keep getting smaller, from 12 to nine to four. In the last game, Dallas also had the luxury of playing from ahead most of

the night, a first in this series. The best sign for the Mavericks was

how many guys were scoring. Terry, Jason Kidd and J.J. Barea all had their most productive games of the series, pacing an offense that blistered the Heat's vaunted defense. Dallas was especially good on 3s, making 13 of 19.

'We're happy with our performance," Kidd said, "but there's always room to get better.'

Like on defense.

While Dallas made 56.5 percent of its shots, Miami made 52.9 and scored 103 points, its best this postseason. Easy buckets fueled a fourth-quarter rally that put the Heat ahead and made the Mavericks need yet another late rally.

State climatologist: Drought third-worst in Texas history

COLLEGE STATION - Is this the worst Texas drought ever?

The answer is no, but it certainly is one of the worst, according to Dr. John Nielsen-Gammon, Texas A&M University professor and Texas state climatologist.

"Based on Palmer Drought Severity Index values, this is the third-worst drought Texas has ever seen in the month of May," Nielsen-Gammon writes in his blog, the Climate Abyss. "Records go back to 1895. May also marks the end of the driest eightmonth period on record."

The worst droughts remain those in 1918 and 1956, according Nielsen-Gammon.

Nielson-Gammon's blog is hosted by the Houston Chronicle and can be found athttp://blog.chron.com/climateabyss/.

According to the U.S. Drought Monitor, nearly 50 percent of the state remained in what is termed an "exceptional" drought, which means a once in 50-year occurrence. More than 90 percent was experiencing either a severe or exceptional drought. Only parts of north central and northeast Texas were not at least abnormally dry as of May 31.

It may not be the worst drought ever, but lifelong farmers throughout the state are telling Texas AgriLife Extension Service agents this is the driest they've ever experienced.

"Weather continued to be hot and dry," said Mark Brown, AgriLife Extension agent for Lubbock County. "Blowing dust from gusting winds occurred on several days. Irrigation continues where feasible. May ended with 0.26 inches of moisture recorded, making this year the driest fivemonth period on record for Lubbock."

And while a few weeks ago, rains may have greened things up in East Texas, the region remains in a drought, according to AgriLife Extension agent reports.


We are in bad need of rain," said Clint Perkins, AgriLife Extension agent for Wood County, about 100 miles east of Dallas. "Hay production is starting with drastically decreased yields. I have reports that the first cutting is one-quarter to half

"Corn, milo and cotton are under severe drought-like conditions and stressing," said Pasquale Swaner, AgriLife Extension agent for Falls County, near Temple. "Stocker cattle producers have shipped cattle to feedlots. Pasture conditions are severe with little hay production across the county.

ers were reported, with accumulations ranging from 0.1 inch to 1.5 inches. However, the region overall continued to experience hot, dry and windy weather.



Soil-moisture levels were mostly very short. The danger of wildfire remained high. Farmers with irrigation were applying lots of water to all summer crops. Rangeland and pasture conditions were very poor in most counties. Ranchers continue to cull herds due to the drought. Supplemental feeding was heavy by those ranchers trying to hang on

ROLLING PLAINS: The region was dry, highs above 100 degrees. Cotton producers were planting on irrigated fields, but

even applying enough water to plant has proven to be a challenge. In the areas that received rain, producers were fighting blowing sand and soil erosion. In some cases they were performing a light tillage operation called 'scratching" to loosen up caked soil and allow cotton plants to break the surface. Some cotton farmers had to replant. Only limited dryland cotton acreage was planted. Stock-tanks water evaporated because of wind and high temperatures. Cattle were suffering. Producers were bringing in hay and further culling their herds.

SOUTH PLAINS: region remained hot, dry windy, with most counties under burn bans. Most farmers were finishing up planting to meet



insurance deadlines. Some irrigated cotton emerged but was being blasted from sand driven by high winds. Newly emerged cotton was also threatened by thrips and early spider mites. Pasture and rangeland were still dry, and producers continued supplementing cattle. Stock-water ponds were dry, and ranchers had to make daily inspections to save cattle trapped, bogged

windy and with Ponds throughout Texas, like this one in the Panhandle, continued to evaporate because of high temperatures and winds. Livestock producers depend upon such ponds as water sources for cattle.
