 The country of Kenya has over 1.9 million orphans and an unemployment rate of 40 percent. Some of them had their week made brighter when a team of 10 from First United Methodist Church visited Mattaw Children's Village from May 31 to June 11. The team put on a Vacation Bible School and performed some labor which included building a fence, moving bricks, sand and concrete. David Gerhardt, FUMC youth pastor said the orphanage provided hope for the children. "Inside Mattaw, the children are taught their identity as beloved children of God who are formed in His image," Gerhardt said. They are secularly and religiously educated. They develop social skills and character. At Mattaw it's not about saving kids from the street and poverty. It's about saving them from hopelessness.

Kirsten Kuhn said it was a great experience getting to "love on the children." "It was great to show them love they haven't seen," Kuhn said. "It just broke your heart." Ryan Smith said the trip was life changing. "That's what I want to do with the rest of my life," Smith said. "I want to be a missionary." Smith said attending a church service there had a big impact. "I saw how they worshipped," Smith said. "It was very passionate." Stephanie Kelly said she wasn't certain about the team's impact until their VBS closing ceremony. "I looked out and saw tears running down one of the older girl's face," Kelly said. "Then it was contagious. We were all hugging and crying; it was bittersweet. My fear in going was that I would worry about their surroundings and think that the U.S. would be a better home for them. But I left

knowing they were in a clean, safe home full of love." Kuhn said she was touched by how the children warmed up at the end. "Victor, one of the oldest kids was really reserved when we first got there," Kuhn said. "He didn't really want to get to know you. On one the last days, he came up to Cager and Ryan and told them his life story." Before going to the village, the team got to experience Nairobi and went on a safari at Nakuru National Park. Jack McCavit said he believes their one week trip made a difference. "We were only in Mattaw Village for a week, but I really believe that we made a difference in the lives of the kids and the house parents," McCavit said. "We shared our faith and we gave them a break in their routine for that one week. They know that there are people around the world who care about them."

**Phone book drive under way**

 The city's fourth annual phone book recycling program is going swimmingly according to Melodie Dosch, board administrator of Clean Pampa. As new phone books have come in, Clean Pampa is making use of old Yellowbooks that otherwise would have become waste, taking up room at the land fill. The recycling drive has two drop off locations, and the site at the Coronado Shopping Center, located at the Hobart and Somerville intersection, was filled to capacity on Friday afternoon. "I'm really glad it's going so well," Dosch said. Dosch said that businesses within the community, such as Frank's Hardware, have helped in the past to transport the phone books from drop off locations to Amarillo Recycling, making this a project that has gained steam with help from the whole community. After Pampa citizens drop off their phone books at Coronado, the Pampa Mall, Lovett Library, or Fiesta Foods, they'll be transported to Amarillo Recycling, where they will be transformed into mulch, pet bedding, compost, packaging material, green fiber insulation, and even park benches.

**Tri-State Emergency Care Symposium to be held in Pampa**

Dr. James H. "Red" Duke, Jr., a professor of surgery from UT Medical School at Houston, and State EMS Director Maxie Bishop, RN, LP, will be among the guest speakers at the Tri-State Emergency Care Symposium this month. Clarendon College is hosting the four-day event in Pampa. "We hope to help the whole Panhandle broaden people's knowledge and awareness when it comes to emergency care," said Christy Brooks, the workforce development coordinator at the college. Dr. James Hall of Pampa will speak about hypothermia protocol and cardiac events, and he is looking forward to the presentation of new standards and technology. "Education is the bottom line," said Hall.

"Medicine always changes, so if you don't continue education, you get left behind." The symposium will kick-off Tuesday, July 26, with a golf tournament at Hidden Hills Golf Course and will continue through Friday, July 29, with sessions, vendors, and exhibits at the M.K. Brown Memorial Auditorium. The symposium will address current issues and trends in emergency healthcare with general sessions exploring issues pertinent to all levels of emergency care. Breakout sessions during the event will address individual skills levels from first responders through care and transport of critically ill or injured patients. Topics to be covered include transport ventilators, crash airway training, SIM Man scenario training, and therapeutic hypothermia. Gang

violence will also be addressed, and in particular the wounds faced by first responders after shootings. First responders, EMTs, paramedics, firefighters, nurses, and trauma, ER and healthcare professionals will benefit from attending. There is a charge for the event and continuing education hours will be offered. ## Today in History

Today is Saturday, July 9, the 190th day of 2011. There are 175 days left in the year.

### Today's Highlight in History:

On July 9, 1951, President Harry S. Truman asked Congress to formally end the state of war between the United States and Germany. (An official end to the state of war was declared in Oct. 1951.)

### On this date:

In 1540, England's King Henry VIII had his 6-month-old marriage to his fourth wife, Anne of Cleves, annulled.

In 1776, the Declaration of Independence was read aloud to Gen. George Washington's troops in New York.

In 1816, Argentina declared independence from Spain.

In 1850, the 12th president of the United States, Zachary Taylor, died after serving only 16 months of his term. (He was succeeded by Millard Fillmore.)

In 1896, William Jennings Bryan delivered his famous "cross of gold" speech at the Democratic national convention in Chicago.

In 1918, 101 people were killed in a train collision in Nashville, Tenn. The Distinguished Service Cross was established by an Act of Congress.

In 1947, the engagement of Britain's Princess Elizabeth to Lt. Philip Mountbatten was announced.

In 1974, former U.S. Chief Justice Earl Warren died in Washington, D.C., at age 83.

In 1982, a Pan Am Boeing 727 crashed in Kenner, La., killing all 145 people aboard and eight people on the ground.

**Ten years ago:** A divided court in Chile ruled that Gen. Augusto Pinochet could not be tried on human rights charges because of his deteriorating health and mental condition, a ruling that effectively brought the 85-year-old former dictator's legal troubles to an end.

**Five years ago:** A Russian Airbus A310 crashed in the Siberian city of Irkutsk, killing 124 of 203 people on board.

**One year ago:** The largest U.S.-Russia spy swap since the Cold War took place on a remote stretch of Vienna airport tarmac as planes from New York and Moscow arrived within minutes of each other with 10 Russian sleeper agents and four prisoners accused by Russia of spying for the West.

## The true cost of war is grossly underestimated

Anyone paying attention to the costs of U.S. military action in Iraq and Afghanistan must have known that the president badly underestimated those numbers on June 22, when he told the nation that we have spent "a trillion dollars" waging war over the past decade. For well over two years, we have known that the total monetary cost of those wars will eventually amount to well over \$2 trillion, and might well rise higher, according to Nobel economist Joseph Stiglitz and his associate Linda Bilmes.

What we didn't know until now is that the expense in constant dollars -- leaving aside the horrific price paid by the dead, wounded, displaced and ruined in every country -- will likely reach well over \$4.4 trillion.

That is the conclusion of a study released by the Eisenhower Research Project, a group of scholars, diplomats and other experts based at Brown University's Watson Institute for International Studies. The Eisenhower study doesn't scant the human damage, which its authors say has been underestimated as badly as the fiscal costs. According to them, "an extremely conservative estimate of the toll in direct war dead and wounded is about 225,000 dead and about 365,000 physically wounded in these wars so far" -- including those in Pakistan, which is embroiled in war just as lethally as Afghanistan.

The American military dead in all three countries now total more than 6,000, a figure that does not include

another 2,300 in U.S. military contractors; the American wounded, military and civilian, are well over 100,000, which doesn't include the psychological destruction wreaked on those who served and their families. The most obvious indicator is the exceptionally high suicide rate among the million or more returned veterans.

The Eisenhower study's authors concede that they cannot readily estimate the full value of the economic and social damage we have sustained as a nation -- in lost years of work and wrecked families, as well as huge interest costs on the money borrowed to finance these interventions. Nor can they fully account for the growth and investment forfeited because such a great proportion of the nation's resources was squandered on war rather than pressing needs in infrastructure, energy, education and health.

For less than 5 percent of what we have spent on war -- to consider one example among many -- we could have completed an American high-speed rail system and repaired most of our crumbling infrastructure, too.

Even if the current war could somehow be concluded instantly, however, the moral and fiscal obligations incurred so far will continue for decades. Beyond the mandatory disability payments, medical and psychiatric care, and additional benefits

to which our veterans are entitled, we will face the prospect of increasing military budgets to restore the equipment and readiness of the battered Army and National Guard.

And those costs in turn will subtract from the scant dollars left for domestic programs -- as President Eisenhower himself observed when he said, "Every gun that is made, every warship launched, every rocket fired, signifies

in the final sense a theft from those who hunger and are not fed, those who are cold and are not clothed."

It is sobering to revisit the question of what war has cost us in this generation at a moment when the debate over the nation's finances is so furious and yet so often frivolous.

But it is ever more important to remember how we arrived at this dead end, especially as we listen to the braying Republican leaders who refuse to consider any tax increase. Our fiscal woe is the legacy of their policy, waging war at enormous expense, while sharply reducing taxes on the rich. What we live with now is what "conservatism" has wrought.

Yeah, I just threw up in my mouth a little, too.

"Zookeeper" is terrible. Hollywood seems intent on driving the "talking animals" genre into the ground, and "Zookeeper" is the latest to drive the sledge. The plot is predictable, the premise is stale and the script flings bad punchlines like an angry chimp flings, well, you know.

The talking zoo animals are actually quite charming, mind you, but they're pretty much just shoehorned in, and they don't feature in as much of the movie as the trailer would have you believe.

"Zookeeper" is the story of Griffin Keyes (James), the caretaker of the animals at the Franklin Park Zoo. All the animals love him, so they're shocked to find out that Griffin — your stock "kind-hearted fellow who has no luck with women" — is considering leaving his job at the zoo for a career that would give him a little more cachet with the ladies. To keep him around, they decide to break their code of silence and reveal to him that they can speak English (of course) to teach him the ways of courtship that Mother Nature taught them.

For the most part, the scenes where Griffin interacts with his wild wards are actually quite fun. The movie does a really good job of blending the real, animatronic and CGI animals together to create an enjoyable illusion, and the voice cast, which includes Nick Nolte, Jon Favreau, Sylvester Stallone, Cher, Maya Rudolph, Don Rickles and (of course) Adam Sandler, is quite inspired.

The animals, though, are in less than half of the movie, with the rest of the script concerned with Griffin bumbling around trying to get the girl who's clearly terrible for anyone (Leslie Bibb) instead of the one who's clearly perfect for him (Rosario Dawson). It's this very large chunk of the movie that's

almost unwatchable, with James, who can be very likable when he's got good material to work with, just coming off as clueless and annoying. Throw in terrible joke after terrible joke and you're just left wishing he'd give up on the girls and hang out with the animals full-time.

To compound the negative, Tweet, the veteran acting giraffe who used to star in the Toys 'R Us commercials, collapsed and died after filming.

It's a definite shame, because if anything, it's the movie itself that should've been put out of its misery before it hit the box office.

## Bad Teacher not so bad

In the past six years the new vogue in American comedy has been the "Hard R Comedy" filled with sexual content, foul language, and usually some alcohol or drug use. The best of them have mostly come from the camp of Judd Apatow, mostly because his movies manage to mix the filthy humor

with a lot of heart. "The 40-Year Old Virgin" was secretly about waiting for true love before sex, "Knocked Up" was about taking responsibility and had a pro-life slant, and "Super Bad" was about the love between best friends. When done right these movies can be both hilarious and touching.

"Bad Teacher," the newest in the Hard R comedies stars Cameron Diaz as the worst teacher (and possibly one of the worst all around humans) to ever fill the movie screen. Diaz's Elizabeth Halsey has one

thing on her mind, finding a sugar daddy to finance her expensive lifestyle. When he fiance dumps her after realizing her true intentions, Elizabeth sets her sights on Scott Delacorte, the rich new substitute teacher played hilariously by Justin Timberlake. But in order to impress him, Elizabeth decides she must get a boob job, and in order to raise the money she does whatever it takes, no matter what horrible thing she has to do to get it. Standing in her way is Lucy Punch's crazy, annoying teacher, Amy Squirrel, who will stop at nothing to expose Elizabeth for the horrible person she truly is.

While Diaz does a good job making you hate her, before slowly come to like and root for her, it's really the supporting cast who make the movie worth while. Timberlake and Punch are great as the objects of Elizabeth's obsession and her foil, respectively, with each giving hilarious performances and going to some wacky extremes. Thomas Lennon (Reno 911) is wonderful as the state exam worker Elizabeth seduces in order to ensure her students do well on the test. John Michael Higgins, The Office's Phyllis Smith, and Apatow alum Dave Gruber Allen (Freaks and Greeks) round out the cast of hilarious and weird school employees.

But it's Jason Segel's gym teacher Russell Gettis that truly steals the show. He is both hilarious and the heart of the film. Russell is the catalyst for change that finally inspires Elizabeth to actually change. And although her transformation isn't huge, it's Russell that really makes us care what happens to her. The main problem with the movie is that Segel's character should have been a bit more prominent than he was.

The movie works well and although its nowhere near as good as the films of Judd Apatow, it does succeed somewhat in combining dark humor and heart. Overall Bad Teacher is a movie that will make you laugh and let you escape the heat, although its not likely one you need to see more than once.

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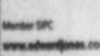

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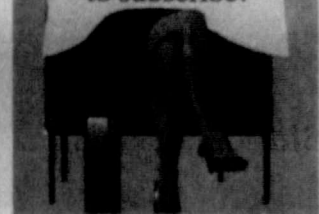
## Savoir named to Dean's List

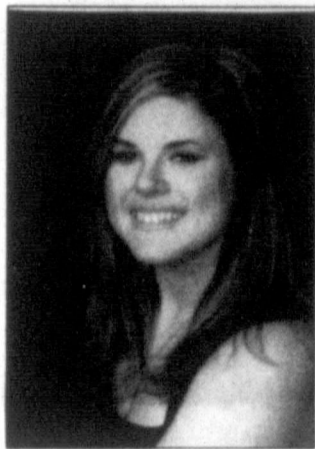

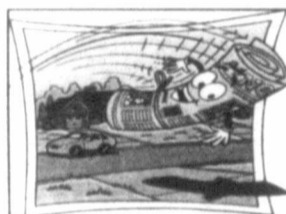

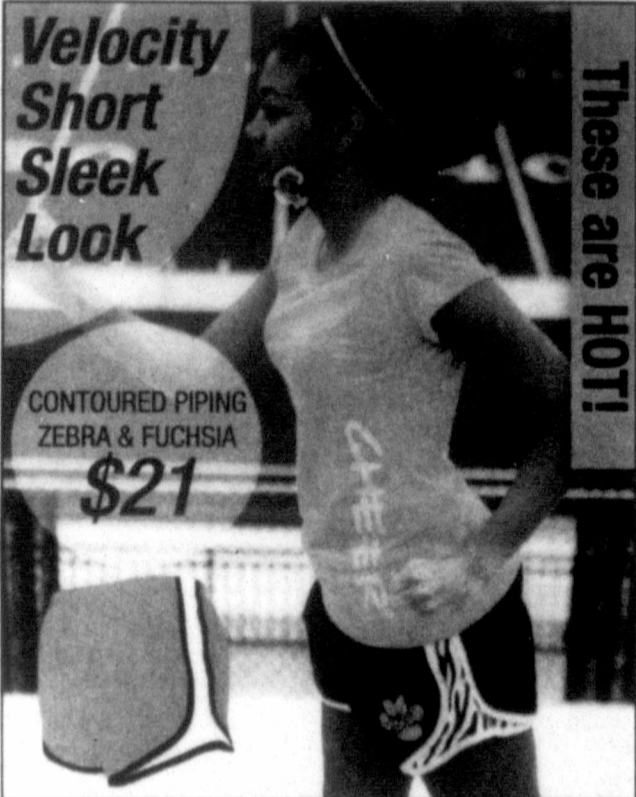

Hagerman said it was a difficult transition from high school to college but learned a lot in his first season.

"I had to go to all the practices," Hagerman said. "The varsity starters went against the freshmen. Their were only three defensive ends and we all had to rotate and we didn't

get much rest. It got us in good condition and prepared us mentally for the college level."

Besides football, Hagerman played basketball and threw shot put. The redshirt freshman said he misses basketball.

"I miss Coach Embry and Coach Miller," Hagerman said. "They treated me with respect. In football I have 30 coaches that know my name. The defensive coaches don't like the offensive players as much as the defensive players and vice versa."

Hagerman said he is currently competing for the left tackle position on the offensive line.

"We don't have a left tackle," Hagerman said. "It's no guarantee that I will get to play. I'm competing

with four people."

Hagerman said he is looking forward to being on the sideline in uniform next fall.

"I was only on the sidelines once last year during homecoming," Hagerman said. "It was the most intense game I've been around. We won we would win the conference straight up and if we lost they would win. It was back and forth and ACU won with a field goal."

2010 Pampa graduate Reid Bradley signed to West Texas A&M last winter. Hagerman said he is looking forward to being reunited with his former teammate.

"I'm looking forward to seeing how much he has grown in a season," Hagerman said. "I hope he has what it takes."
