A French documentary filmmaker was in town Monday working on a film about Woody Guthrie to be released next year on French television.

Bernard Dautant and his crew ere at Pampa's Woody Guthrie Folk Music Center to record a performance from local Guthrieenthusiasts and to get the feel of the place where the legendary folk singer first picked up the

Rick Scott, board member of the center, performed "No More Trains," a song dedicated to the

folk hero. A group of musicians, comprised of Scott, Mike Sinks, and Jerry Lister, also performed several Woody Guthrie songs, including "This Land Is Your Land" and "Bound for Glory," another train song.

Dautant is producing the documentary called "So Where Has Woody Gone?" with support from Lyon TV

The filmmaker has traced Woody Guthrie's footsteps across the United States to discover his influences and the people who remain inspired by him.

"I want to show that he is still living today, and to get information on places that were important for Woody Guthrie," said Dautant. He said that the film will also reflect on universal themes about life that come across in Guthrie's music.

Dautant has been a Guthrie fan since he was 17, but he was also influenced by France's

Shavley Morriss was inspired to run for Miss Rodeo Queen after seeing the pageant while growing up.

"When I was little and we went to the rodeo, my favorite part was seeing the queen," said Morriss. "I wanted to be the person that all the little ones looked up to."

Huffhines also was influenced by watching the competition as a young cowgirl.

"When I was growing up and going to the rodeo, I saw the pretty girls who became queen," she said. "I thought, someday, I want to be Rodeo Queen.'

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

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

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LUBBOCK (AP) - Former Texas Tech coach Mike Leach is offering up details of what he says was happening behind the scenes around the time he was fired.

Leach is releasing a book titled "Swing Your Sword." In excerpts made available Tuesday, Leach said emails 'suggest" there was never a university investigation into allegations he mistreated a player with a concussion but rather "an effort to sell me down the river."

The university fired Leach in December 2009 amid claims that he mistreated the player, Adam James. He sued the school but an appeals court allowed his trial to go forward for only non-monetary damages.

Leach claims a public relations firm hired by Craig James, the player's father and an ESPN analyst, was used by the university to "smear" his name.

Boy injured in shark attack

FORT WORTH (AP) - A 12-year-old boy is recovering from a shark attack off the Texas Gulf coast.

The boy had surgery on his foot in a Houston hospital and will need more surgery, but he's OK.

Family friend Mark Constein says his family was at Matagorda Island late last week when the boy was attacked by a bull shark in less than 4 feet of water.

The boy's father Cecil Vossler says Constein, of Fort Worth, fought off the shark. They say the beach was too remote for cars and they

had to rush the boy by boat to a nearby town, where a helicopter took him to a hospital.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department says shark attacks are rare, but most likely occur in the early morning and late afternoon.

Harris Co. Sheriff to use monitor

HOUSTON (AP) - The Harris County sheriff has agreed to hire a monitor for the department's internal affairs division in order to end a federal inquiry into deputies' alleged religious and racial discrimination.

Harris County Commissioners Court was expected to approve the agreement Tuesday.

The U.S. Justice Department investigation began with the discovery in 2008 of emails from sheriff's commanders disparaging religious, racial and ethnic groups. The inquiry also included the treatment of members of a Sikh family detained after calling deputies to investigate the burglary of their home. Both incidents happened before Sheriff Adrian Garcia took office.

The agreement, which requires the department to develop diversity training, calls for a report after an eight-month review.

Assistant County Attorney John Odam tells the Houston Chronicle the agreement is not an admission of wrongdoing.

NM border town cuts police dept.

DEMING, N.M. (AP) - A New Mexico border town has abolished its police department in the wake of a gun smuggling case that involves the former mayor and police chief.

The village of Columbus will now rely on the Luna County Sheriff's Office for law enforcement. Sheriff Raymond Cobos tells the Deming Headlight that his deputies have always patrolled the area anyway and he'll shift resources to cover the village.

The village Board of Trustees voted to abolish the

department on July 7 The next day, jailed former trustee Blas Guitierrez

submitted his letter of resignation.

He is one of 12 people who were arrested in March for their alleged roles in a gun smuggling ring. Former Mayor Eddie Espinoza and former police chief Angelo Vega are among those charged.

Homicide ruled in lake death

AUSTIN (AP) - Investigators say homicide led to the death of a woman whose body was found floating in an Austin-area lake

A Monday statement from the Travis County Sheriff's Office says the body of 22-year-old Veronica Navarro of Spicewood was found Wednesday in Lake Travis, wrapped in a tent and weighted. Sheriff's spokesman Roger Wade says a search of her home found evidence pointing to a suspect who was later found trying to enter

The 27-year-old man has been held on a warrant accusing him of felony evidence tampering. He was booked into the Pembina County Sheriff's Office in North Dakota with bond set at \$100,000.

Wade says Navarro's body was found wrapped in a tent and weighted in Lake Travis.

Facebook leads to reprimands

DALLAS (AP) - Constantly checking Facebook at

work may get you in trouble.

Two dozen Dallas City Hall workers received reprimands or counseling after a recent probe showed they spent too much time on the social networking site.

Officials are working on new employee guidelines for social media use. Dallas City Manager Mary Suhm says said employees aren't allowed to do personal business when they're being paid by taxpayers.

Cesar Baptista, an assistant director in the water department, had Facebook open for 68 hours during a three-month period. But Baptista said he often opened his Facebook page in the morning and didn't close it while he did other things. He says he no longer opens the site at work

The Dallas Morning News reports that the inquiry started with a TV station's request.

"In France, we have the same societal problems, the same problems with migrants, and the same fear of people coming from another place," said Dautant. "This is similar to the 30's in the United States when the

Q: The pictured maple rocking chair was handed down to my husband from his parents. According to family history, it belonged to his great-great-grandparents.

When do you think it was made? And what's its value?

A: Based on the finials, two front stretchers, the wood and overall design lines, your rocking chair was made in the mid-1800s.

Your rocking chair has survived three centuries. It would be valued at \$300 to \$500.

This Beswick Ware figurine was made in Staffordshire,

Q: The enclosed mark is on the bottom of my earthenware figurine. In 1976, my dad was given a little ceramic dog figurine by some people in his office. The white dog has fallen asleep with his head on his blue and yellow drum. In one paw, there's a brown drumstick.

Also included with the mark, it says: "Made in England - 812." It was always kept in my mother's china cabinet and has no chips or cracks.


What can you tell me about my figurine?

A: Beswick Ware has been made in Staffordshire, England, since the 1890s. Even though they produce utilitarian ware and decorative objects, they are also well known for many animal figurines.

As a rule, since 1933, each piece has been given a model number. This figurine was in production from the 1940s to the 1960s.

The value of your dog figurine would probably be \$100 to \$125.

Q: I need some information on a Boy Scout soft-cover handbook. On the cover at the top, there are the words: "Handbook for Boys." At the bottom, it says: "Boy Scouts of America — 50 cents." The front

cover is decorated with the image of three Boy Scouts, which was originally painted by Norman Rockwell.

Today's Highlight in History:

On July 13, 1923, a sign consisting of 50-foottall letters spelling out "HOLLYWOODLAND" was dedicated in the Hollywood Hills to promote a subdivision (the last four letters were removed in 1949; the sign itself was replaced in 1978).

On this date:

In 1787, Congress enacted an ordinance governing the Northwest Territory.

In 1793, French revolutionary writer Jean-Paul Marat was stabbed to death in his bath by Charlotte Corday, who was executed four days later.

In 1863, deadly rioting against the Civil War military draft erupted in New York City. (The insurrection was put down three days later.) In 1886, Father Edward Joseph Flanagan, the

founder of Boys Town, was born in County Roscommon, Ireland. In 1939, Frank Sinatra made his first commercial recording, "From the Bottom of My Heart" and "Melancholy Mood," with Harry James and his

Orchestra in New York for the Brunswick label. In 1960, John F. Kennedy won the Democratic presidential nomination on the first ballot at his party's convention in Los Angeles.

In 1965, President Lyndon B. Johnson appointed Thurgood Marshall to be U.S. Solicitor General.

In 1972, George McGovern claimed the Democratic presidential nomination at the party's convention in Miami Beach.

In 1985, "Live Aid," an international rock concert in London, Philadelphia, Moscow and Sydney, took place to raise money for Africa's starving people.


Ten years ago: Beijing was awarded the 2008 Summer Olympics.

The wizardry of engaging young readers

As "Harry Potter and the Deathly Hallows — Part 2," is set to hit theaters Friday, consider J.K. Rowling's

Nasty boy Draco Malfoy's first name is downright draconian; any last name that starts with Mal does not bode well. His aunt Bellatrix (female warrior) is also Lestrange. The sibilant-rich and spiteful Severus Snape possesses a name that needs no explanation. Dolores Umbridge? The senior undersecretary of the Ministry of Magic takes constant umbrage at any and all who challenge her authority.

Even if young readers did not realize it, Rowling infused her characters with context and linguistic markers. Rowling was a French and classics major at Exeter University. Hence the Latin derivatives, old-school Briticisms and French panache.

Of course, it is the story of an ordinary 11-year-old boy who discovers he is a wizard that reels in readers Harry is not just any wizard; he is "the boy who lived" after a fatal battle between his parents and a dark

At the Hogwarts School of Witchcraft and Wizardry, Harry befriends Ron and Hermione. For the

Harry, Ron and Hermione discover and develop their own talents. They must learn how to harness magic without being corrupted by it. And they must destroy the dark Lord Voldemort (French for "flight from death") before he annihilates them.

Adults can appreciate that, without lecturing, Rowling makes a strong case for kindness - without which knowledge is hollow. Harry's

father, James, used magic for fratboy pranks, but mother Lily's love gave her the strength to protect her son from Voldemort.

While waiting for a delayed train in King's Cross Station in 1990, Rowling conceived the idea for the books. A divorced single mother on welfare, she began to write. She was rejected. She didn't give up. She found an agent -- and more rejections. In 1997. Bloomsbury bought "Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone" with an advance of 1,500 British Pounds.

In 2004, Forbes dubbed Rowling the first billion-dollar author. (I like to think that's the power of Latin. I

know it is the power of creativity.)

on which she transformed the everyday world. While the movies convey the author's bounty of imagination, the books convey the long slog and pangs of doubt that plague the highstakes quest.

Now that the last Harry Potter movie follows the last Harry Potter book, tomorrow's children will not know the excitement that greeted the release of


a new Harry Potter book or movie. But it is a tiny miracle that so many children in a generation weaned on TV, the Internet and video games one day decided to pick up a book and engage in the solitary pursuit of reading.

Mechelay helped the Harvesters to the regional finals last season but didn't think it had an effect on the turnout.


"I was working with the small kids,

Mechelay said. "I don't think it had an impact on them."


Miller said the team's playoff run may have boosted the attendance at camp.
