City to spray residential areas for mosquitoes

The City of Pampa will start spraying residential areas for mosquitoes on Monday and continue through early Tuesday morning, according to Public Service Superintendent Ed Turner.

Crews will be using the chemi-

cal product Mosquito Mist 1, dispersed through an ultra low volume sprayer. Razor Pro Herbicide will also be used to kill grass and weeds on the streets.

Turner said that this year's mosquito spray was delayed somewhat because of weather conditions, but the time has come for the procedure because the

insects are starting to reappear.

"We start spraying for mosquitoes usually in May, when it starts raining and everything," Turner said. "Since it's been such a dry year, we haven't had to yet, but they are starting to come out now due to the little bit of rain that we have gotten.

"We're going to spray at least

one time just to get them knocked back. Then, we'll do it again as necessary after that, but we will cover the whole time the first time."

Turner said it usually takes three four-hour shifts to cover the whole city

PD's sexting program on Saturday

The Pampa Police Department would like to remind Pampa residents that it is hosting a free sexting awareness program at 1 p.m. on Saturday at the M.K. Brown Heritage Room.

The program, entitled "The Dangers of Sexting," will feature Dallas' Robin Garrison, who has previously worked as the Urban Programs Agent for the Texas AgriLife Extension Service in Randall County.

"I spoke with a lady over at Amarillo ISD," said Pampa PD Crime Prevention Officer Stormy McCullar, "and she highly recommended (Garrison). He's really tasteful about how he puts it out there. He's blunt about it, but he does it in a very appropriate, informative way."

With more and more technology available to teens every day, it's becoming increasingly important for adults to be aware of the dangers that accompany mobile devices, McCullar said.

"Technology is good, but it also can be very dangerous, especially if it gets into the hands of our kids and gets used in negative ways," McCullar said. "Sexting SEXTING cont. on page 2

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Applause, but no tears at shuttle's end

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) -Atlantis and four astronauts returned from the International Space Station in triumph Thursday, bringing an end to NASA's 30-year shuttle journey with one last, rousing touchdown that drew cheers and tears.

Thousands gathered near the landing strip and packed Kennedy Space Center, and countless others watched from afar, as NASA's longest-running spaceflight program came to a close.

"After serving the world for over 30 years, the space shuttle's earned its place in history. And it's come to a final stop," commander Christopher Ferguson radioed after a ghostlike Atlantis glided through the twilight.

"Job well done, America," replied Mission Control.

With the space shuttles retiring to museums, it will be another three to five years at best before Americans are launched again from U.S. soil, as private companies gear up to seize the Earth-toorbit-and-back baton from NASA.

The long-term future for American space exploration is just as hazy, a huge concern for many at NASA and all those losing their jobs because of the shuttle's end. Asteroids and Mars are the destinations of choice, yet NASA has yet to settle

on a rocket design to get astronauts there. Thursday, though, belonged to Atlantis and its crew: Ferguson, co-pilot Douglas Hurley, Rex Walheim and Sandra Magnus, who completed a successful space station resupply mission.

Atlantis touched down at 5:57 a.m., with "wheels stop" less than a minute

"The space shuttle has changed the way we view the world and it's changed the way we view our universe," Ferguson radioed from Atlantis. "There's a lot of emotion today, but one thing's indisputable. America's not going to stop exploring.

"Thank you Columbia, Challenger, Discovery, Endeavour, and our ship Atlantis, thank you for protecting us and bringing this program to such a fitting end."

For the landing, there wasn't nearly the hoopla that surrounded Atlantis' launch on July 8 - when an estimated 1 million packed the Cape Canaveral area - because of the hour and lack of spectacle. The darkness robbed virtually all views of the approaching shuttle, and made it more of a NASA family affair.

Atlantis was greeted with cheers, whistles and shouts from the record 2,000 who had gathered near the runway - astronauts' families and friends, as well as shuttle managers and NASA brass. Soon, the sun was up and provided a splendid view. Within an hour, Ferguson and his crew were out on the runway and swarmed by well-wishers.

"The things that we've done have set us up for exploration of the future," said NASA Administrator Charles Bolden Jr., a former shuttle commander. "But I don't want to talk about that right now. just want to salute this crew, welcome them home."

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Nine hundred miles away, flight director Tony Ceccacci, who presided over Atlantis' safe return, choked up while signing off from shuttle Mission Control in Houston.

"The work done in this room, in this building, will never again be duplicated," he told his team of flight controllers.

At those words, dozens of past and present flight controllers quickly streamed into the room, embracing one another and snapping pictures while keeping their tears, if not their emotions, in check

But on the landing strip in Florida, flight director Mike Leinbach said the tears flowed. He himself was awash with emotion as he took in "the beauty of the vehicle," snapped pictures and posed for pictures at workers' requests, some of whom face lavoffs.

"I saw grown men and grown women crying today — tears of joy to be sure," Leinbach told reporters. "Human emotions came out on the runway today, and you couldn't suppress them.'

Sexting

is particularly bad. We've had incidents where kids have sent pictures of themselves through the Internet. The one thing that I really want to stress is when it's sent, it's done. You cannot ever take that back."

Sexting has been a hot topic in Texas of late, including at the recently closed legislation session. Senate Bill 407, which was passed during the session, now gives Texas judges the option beginning in September of charging teens with a Class C through A misdemeanor for sexting. Prior to the bill's

passing, teens were subject to the same felony charge as adults who were trafficking child pornography.

The legislative focus on the phenomenon reflects a trend that has seen sexting rise in popularity nationwide. According to recent research at the University of Rhode Island, over half of all college students have received sexually suggestive images over text messaging, and close to 80 percent have received suggestive messages.

"It's causing real hardships on families (around the U.S.)," McCullar said.

"There are kids who have committed suicide over it. It's growing really



Drought expanding in Texas

LUBBOCK (AP) - More than three-fourths of Texas is in the worst stage of drought as lack of rainfall and sizzling temperatures bake the state in its worst dry spell in decades.

The U.S. Drought Monitor map released Thursday showed 75.5 percent of the state in exceptional drought, a 50 percent increase in just seven weeks.

Texas is coming off it driest nine-month period ever and had its hottest June on record.

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The map's driest category means there are exceptional and widespread crop and pasture losses, and shortages of water in reservoirs, streams, and wells.

Cities across Texas are seeing triple-digit heat. On Tuesday, Lubbock broke a 77-year-old record with the 30th day this year of temperatures reaching at least 100 degrees.

Bag big gator, get arrested

AUSTIN (AP) — A monster 880-pound alligator that was a Dallas lawyer's prize catch last month is now evidence in an investigation that has resulted in four arrest warrants.

Texas Parks and Wildlife spokesman Mike Cox said Wednesday that 42-year-old Levi McCathern and his three fishing and hunting guides were charged with taking wildlife on private property without the landowner's permission.

A man who owns land on the Trinity River in Leon County told state game wardens that a large alligator had been killed on his property without his consent on June 11 and a second, smaller 'gator was taken the day before.

Game wardens seized a 13-foot-1-inch alligator and a near 9-foot alligator.

Violators of the Class A misdemeanor face a maximum \$4,000 fine and/or one year in jail.

Condemned killer loses appeal

HOUSTON (AP) — A Waco college student sent to death row for fatally shooting and robbing a fellow student nine years ago outside Bryan has lost an appeal at the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, moving him a step closer to execution.

Marcus Druery was condemned for killing 20-yearold Skyyler Browne on Halloween 2002. The now 31-year-old Druery and Browne both attended Texas State Technical College in Waco.

They were among a group partying in Bryan and wound up at property belonging to Druery's family in rural Brazos County. Testimony at Druery's 2003 trial showed Browne was shot three times by Druery, who burned the victim's body and dumped it in a stock

Druery's attorneys argued unsuccessfully in his appeal that his trial lawyers were deficient and jury instructions were faulty.

Polygamist set for trial in Texas

SAN ANGELO (AP) - Polygamist leader Warren assault charges after a final pretrial hearing in West Texas ended with no further

The ecclesiastical head of the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints has appeared in a San Angelo court with seven attorneys since December. Most asked for additional time to prepare, and prosecutors said Jeffs was changing lawyers as a stall tactic.

The conclusion of Thursday's proceedings will allow jury selection to begin Monday. Jeffs faces two counts of sexual assault of a child and will also be tried for bigamy

The charges stem from a 2008 police raid on a church ranch amid suspicions of girls forced into polygamist

DC supporters lobby for Perry

EXETER, N.H. (AP) — Fans of Texas Gov. Rick Perry in Washington are quietly lobbying a group of influential political operatives to support a Perry run for the Republican presidential nomination.

The supporters launched a website, TimeForPerry. com, this week but initially shared news of the launch only with a group of uncommitted fundraisers and campaign operatives in Washington and New Hampshire.

The site, which follows similar draft efforts in places like California and Iowa, features a video of the Texas governor speaking to a cheering crowd and an original

BAYTOWN (AP) — Three teens have been accused of setting fire to a Houston-area church.

Chambers County Sheriff Joe LaRive (luh-REEV') says the arson suspects were arrested Wednesday in

connection with the fire early Monday at Living Hope Church in Baytown. Cpl. John Smith says 19-year-old Brian Alexander Marines of Baytown was jailed Thursday on a charge of

arson to a place of worship, with bond set at \$750,000. Smith had no details on an attorney for Marines, nor any information on the two juvenile co-defendants.

No church damage estimate was immediately available. Living Hope Church last week was targeted with

graffiti. Investigators have not said whether they believe the vandalism and the fire are related.

Pastor Kevin Kleinhenz says his church will share space at New Journey Church during the repairs.

CASA GRANDE, Ariz. (AP) - Arizona launched a fundraising website Wednesday to build fencing along the U.S.-Mexico border, a newly authorized project that supporters said is needed to close gaps exploited by smugglers and illegal immigrants.

"Arizona once again has to do the job the federal government isn't," said state Sen. Steve Smith, a firstterm Republican who sponsored the legislation authorizing the fence proj-

Smith, Arizona Senate President Russell Pearce, state Attorney Tom Horne, Maricopa General County Sheriff Joe Arpaio and other supporters gathered Wednesday evening in a restaurant in Smith's legislative district to kick off the fundraising campaign.

The public will back the effort, Pearce predicted."I know where America stands," Pearce said. "We have a nation at risk. And why are we going to build a fence? Because you'll never get it built by the federal government.

The website, buildtheborderfence, com, received 884 online donations totaling \$39,085 within its first 17 hours, said Arizona Senate spokesman Mike Philipsen.

Initial online donations ranged from the minimum of \$5 to "dozens in the \$250 to \$500 range," Philipsen said. Contributions also can be mailed.

Smith said during a Tuesday interview that his initial goal is to raise \$50 million. "It's not my end goal," he said. "If

we can raise \$50 million, we're off to a fabulous start."

Smith said he was optimistic about the fundraising potential because people have donated nearly \$3.8 million to a fund to defend the state's 2010 immigration enforcement law known as SB1010.

That effort raised money for "an intangible service - you're paying for a lawyer," Smith said. "This, you can taste and smell what you're getting you're paying for a secure border.

What the money will actually buy has yet to be determined. A border security advisory committee consisting of legislators, state agency directors and county sheriffs will make recommendations to the Legislature on how and where to spend the

Fencing currently covers about 650 miles of the U.S.-Mexico border, or about one-third of the 2,000-mile boundary. It ranges in quality from simple barbed wire or vehicle barriers to carefully engineered, 18- to 30-foot high fences near cities.

Smugglers often circumvent the barriers by cutting or driving through them, climbing over them, or digging often-elaborate tunnels under them.

Wednesday's website launch was keyed to the date most new laws passed during the state Legislature's 2011 regular session go into effect.

While Arizona lawmakers rejected several immigration enforcement measures this year that were opposed by business groups, the border fence measure didn't get as much attention.

Democratic lawmakers say that the fence project is a misguided and piecemeal approach to border and immigration issues that should be tackled more comprehensively. More recently, the Sierra Club said strengthened border barriers can damage the environment by causing flooding and blocking wildlife.

An immigrant-rights activist, Jaime Farrant of the Border Action Network, said the fence project could end up costing the state money il donations fall short and supporters press ahead anyway.

"We're just concerned this is playing politics with the border instead of trying to address border security seriously," Farrant said.

Smith and other Republicans argue that the federal government hasn't done enough to secure the border from crossings by illegal immigrants, drug smugglers and terrorists.

The new law authorizes use of inmate labor to help build the fence, which would go on private or government land. The federal government will be asked to allow construction of fencing on its easements along the border, but Smith said he also has specific state-owned and private land in mind.

The fundraising website's initial home page shows a location on the border where fencing currently consists of a series of vertical posts to bar vehicle crossings. In the foreground, ranch-style barbed-wire fencing intended to restrain livestock has a

The site also includes a state official's declaration that donations may qualify as state and federal income tax deductions. But it says donors should consult their tax advisers about that.

Smith said he expects the site's content will be updated as soon as Thursday. The advisory committee will get regular updates on how much money is raised, and a running tally may be added to the site, he said.

"We're going to be extraordinarily open and transparent to the penny of what we have," Smith said.

Couple's goal: visit all 722 Whataburgers

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) -A Rockport couple share a passion that drove them to 225 Whataburger locations and will lead them to 497

It all started in San Angelo in 1963. That's when Karl and Carol Hoepfner took their first bite. They were hooked on Whataburger for life.

This year, they earned the title of Whataburger's biggest fans in an essay contest.

And with title in hand they have been proving it with a 10-state journey to visit all 722 Whataburger loca-

They made their 225th stop Wednesday at the Whataburger by

Whataguy, the restaurant mascot, hugged both of them. Management handed the couple an orange and white cake, which read, "Welcome Karl and Carol." Karl shook the hands of every employee and handed the staff a sheet of paper to write a message for his scrapbook.

When they returned the decorated paper, he added it, as has become his tradition, to the book along with his receipt, showing what they ate and a folded table number - 13, the unit number of their home.

To top it off, the couple threw the first pitch at the Hooks game at Whataburger Field.

Throughout their military careers, they dined around the world. But their favorite little place is Whataburger

store No. 201 in Rockport, where they have eaten at least 7,000 times.

"We've been all over the world and never tasted a better burger," said Karl, 75.

The first Whataburger opened in Corpus Christi.

In 2010, Whataburger celebrated its 60th anniversary and on that day, Aug. 3, the Hoepfners were at No. 201 in Rockport.

"We were first in line to get a free Whataburger," he said. "The assistant manager told me about the contest. and I wrote 700 words why we were the biggest fans.

The contest awarded the Hoepfners \$10,000 in prizes including Whataburger for life. They immediately returned \$7,000, asking instead for 1,000 \$7 gift cards, which they have given to needy individuals, local police officers and firefighters and the charity organization Rockport-Fulton

Good Samaritans. Dennis Carnes, board member for the Good Samaritans, said the organization, which helps feed the needy, is indebted to the couple.

"It makes our clients feel thrilled," he said.

The couple's journey to every Whataburger, began on a somber note. Carol, 73, was diagnosed with a rare form of blood cancer in her eyes, which eventually sent her to Houston for 23 days of radiation earlier this

All of the appointments were late in

the day, and Karl wanted to do something other than spend the rest of the time in their apartment.

"We won this contest and thought we might as well visit a few Whataburgers," he said.

A few turned into 1,500 miles and 90 locations around the Houston area. Then it snowballed into the 10-state journey, which the Hoepfners treat like vacations.

The couple plan to make the last of their just less than 500 remaining stops a special one.

During their trip through the Rio Grande Valley, they missed one Whataburger location in Palmview not far from Mission. Karl felt so embarrassed by his mistake that he wrote a letter to the store apologizing.

What they don't know, yet, is that Karl plans to make that restaurant their 722 stop. There are 36,864 ways to make a

Whataburger and not even Karl and Carol have tried them all. They have their favorites

Karl likes a plain Whataburger with grilled onions and jalape os and "toast my buns."

Carol prefers a Justaburger with grilled onions. She likes her buns toasted as well.

"It's a balanced meal," he said. You got your salad, bread and meat'

"A Whataburger is a very good burger if it takes six napkins; seven is just outstanding," he said.

Today's Highlight in History: On July 22, 1861, the U.S. House of Representatives passed a resolution declaring the Civil War was being waged to preserve the Union rather than to end slavery, a stance that would shift as the conflict continued. (The Senate passed a similar resolution three days later.)

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Survivor fails to halt Stroman execution

HUNTSVILLE (AP) — The lone survivor of a shooting spree that convicted killer Mark Stroman said was revenge for the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks asked the courts to spare the Texas death row inmate's life. The request delayed the execution, but couldn't stop it.

Stroman, 41, went to the death chamber Wednesday night in Huntsville about three hours later than scheduled. He was sentenced to death for the fatal 2001 shooting of Dallas-area convenience store clerk Vasudev Patel during a robbery attempt.

From inside the death chamber, Stroman looked at five friends watching through a window and told them he loved them. He said hate in the world needed to end and asked for God's grace shortly before the fatal drugs began flowing into his arms at the Texas Department of Criminal Justice Huntsville Unit.

"Even though I lay on this gurney, seconds away from my death, I am at total peace," he said. He called himself "still a proud American, Texas loud, Texas proud."

"God bless America. God bless everyone," he added, then turned his head to the warden and said: "Let's do this damn thing.'

Feeling the drugs beginning to take effect, he said, he began a countdown. "One, two," he said, slightly gasping. "There it goes."

He was pronounced dead at 8:53 p.m., less than an hour after his final court appeal was rejected.

The execution's brief delay was caused by appeals from Rais Bhuiyan, a Bangladesh native who said his Muslim religion allowed him to forgive Stroman. Bhuiyan, who was blinded in one eye in the shooting, insisted that state officials had prevented him from meeting with Stroman and engaging in a remediation program to learn more about his shooting spree, which also killed another man.

"Killing him is not the solution," Bhuiyan said. "He's learning from his mistake. If he's given a chance, he's able to reach out to others and spread that message to others."

The U.S. Supreme Court twice turned down appeals Wednesday, but the punishment wasn't carried out until the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals, acting on a second petition from Bhuiyan, barred a state district judge in Austin from stopping it.

"He needed to have his day in court," Lydia Brandt, a lawyer for Stroman, said of the efforts from Bhuiyan's lawvers.

Stroman had said his 2001 Dallas-area shooting ramwhich killed Patel and Waqar Hasan — targeted people from the Middle East, though all three victims were from South Asia. It was the death of Patel, who was from India, that put Stroman on death row.

None of Patel's relatives attended the execution. Instead, they selected a police officer to represent them.

Stroman's execution was the eighth this year in Texas. At least eight other inmates in the nation's busiest death penalty state have execution dates in the coming weeks.

Stroman's lawyer, in a separate unsuccessful appeal to the Supreme Court, pointed to Bhuiyan's "significant surprise" and argued that attorneys during Stroman's trial and in earlier stages of his appeals were deficient for not illustrating "the path that led him to this violent frenzy.

Repair problems with carpeting

Dear Pat: I just finished remodeling my living room, and I am already over budget. I realize we have crushes and stains on the carpet in several spots. How can I repair this damage so I won't need new carpeting now? - Randi P.

Dear Randi: The deteriorated spots on carpeting are not always readily apparent until you move furniture, as when you are remodeling. Entire areas can be slightly stained and discolored, but it is not noticeable until moving furniture exposes a clean, stain-free area.

Many of the damaged and stained spot may have occurred during your remodeling project. A stepladder left in the same location for a week or more can crush the carpet fibers and leave a lasting indentation. If you don't overlay drop cloths enough or clean them off regularly as you are working, the fine dust can make its way through to the carpet. Paint drips can also permeate drop cloths.

The type of carpeting you have will make a difference in how it resists indentations and stains. Nylon carpeting is very resilient, and crushed spot will tend to spring back on their own over time. Polyester carpeting retains its bright colors better, but the fibers do not have as good a memory as nylon, so indentations may not spring back on their own.

Since you mostly likely have your furniture in different locations now after the remodeling, you will notice quite a few old crushed spots and newer ones from ladders, tools, etc. Vacuum those crushed spots thoroughly, and give then a week or so to recover on their own.

If, after the week, they are still too noticeable, use a flat-blade screwdriver and fluff up the nap. Don't dig too deeply, or you may pull some of the pile loose from the carpet backing. Just fluff it enough so the fibers appear to be separated.

Preheat a regular steam iron on a high steam setting. Hold the iron about one-quarter to one-half inch above the fluffed spot. Press the steam button to saturate the area with steam. This should help to straighten out the fibers and make the crushed spot less apparent.

HOW-TO

Carpet burns, usually from a cigarette or in front of a fireplace, can be repaired if the burn is not too deep. The damage often looks worse than it actually is because the fibers melt together and clump. Using scissors, trim off the tips of the burned spots. Trim the area around the burn so it feathers up to the natural carpet height.

If the adhesive tape has come loose and a seam has split open, you will have to sew it back together. Pull the carpet halves together, and drive thin nails, about 6 inches back from the seam on each side, through

the carpet to the subfloor to hold it in place. Use a curved upholstery needle and fishing line to sew the halves together, Remove the nails when the repair is complete.

The best method to remove a stain depends on what the staining substance is. First, always blot up the excess with paper towels. When you clean a spill, clean from the outer edges to the center of the spot. Read the packaging for carpet cleaners for one specifically formulated for that stain. A good two-part cleaner for many common new and old stains is Prochem (www.prochem.com).

NFL LOCKOUT

NFL owners expect to vote on tentative deal at meetings

Some discord emerged as NFL owners pored over a tentative deal to end the league's labor dispute before an expected vote Thursday.

"I don't see why we wouldn't" vote on the proposed settlement, Indianapolis Colts owner Jim Irsay said during a lunch break after more than three hours of discussions. "Like anything else, the morning gets a little ruined by not getting all the things you hoped to get when you hear the whole thing. I'm hopeful that eventually we can get a

The league has said it hopes to have an agreement ready for ratification on Thursday. At least 24 of 32 owners

would need to OK the deal.

Players had been expected to vote
Wednesday on a full proposal, but they
didn't.

"We continue to talk. There are some issues that are outstanding left to resolve," NFL Players Association head DeMaurice Smith said shortly after 2:30

Even after all acceptable terms are established, a deal would lead to a collective bargaining agreement only if NFL Players Association team reps recommend re-establishing the group as a union, which must be approved by a majority vote of the 1,900 players.

In March, when talks broke down and the old CBA expired, the NFLPA said it was dissolving itself as a union and instead becoming a trade association, a move that allowed Tom Brady and other players to sue the league under antitrust law. Only a union can sign off on a CBA.

"I certainly remember comments from some of the owners about how we might not even be like a real union. Well, guess what? The decision to decertify was important, because at the time we were a real union," Smith said during a brief appearance outside NFLPA headquarters in Washington. "And the decision for our players, as men, to come back as a union is going to be an equally serious and very sober one that they have to make."

The owners, who locked out players March 12, met berind closed doors at a hotel conference room near Atlanta's airport, occasionally stepping within sight — but not earshot — of reporters to speak 1-on-1 with NFL Commissioner

Roger Goodell. He chatted first with Jerry Jones of the Cowboys, then with Arthur Blank of the Falcons.

"I'm optimistic that we'll get approval," Blank said Thursday morning on his way into the session. "My understanding is that the owners will have the opportunity to ratify the agreement today, even if the players do not approve it today."

All 32 teams were represented.

All 32 teams were represented, although not each one by an owner. The Patriots, for example, sent team president Jonathan Kraft. His father, Patriots owner Robert Kraft, missed the meeting because his wife, Myra, died Wednesday from cancer.

Remaining issues left to settle were believed to include how to set aside three pending court cases: The players' antitrust lawsuit against the NFL in federal court in Minnesota; the TV networks case, in which players accused owners of setting up \$4 billion in "lockout insurance," money that the league would receive even if there were no games played in 2011; and a collusion case, in which players said owners conspired to restrict salaries last offseason.

Ten players — including quarterbacks Brady, Peyton Manning and Drew Brees, Chargers receiver Vincent Jackson and Patriots guard Logan Mankins — filed their antitrust suit March 11. That was the day the country's most popular sports league was thrown into limbo, and the owners locked out players hours later.

Also under discussion are how workman's compensation claims will be resolved and the players' demand that the NFL turn over \$320 million in unpaid benefits from the 2010 season. Because there was no salary cap that season, the old CBA said NFL teams were not required to pay those benefits.


If the four-month lockout — the NFL's first work stoppage since 1987 — is going to end in time to keep the preseason completely intact, the players and owners almost certainly must ratify the deal this week.
