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

Houston breaks weather record

HOUSTON (AP) - It's hotter than ever in Houston this year.

At least that's as of Monday, when the city broke a 31-year-old record for triple digit heat.

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The National Weather Service says the city has had 33 days at or above 100 degrees this year. That is one more than in in record-setting 1980.

The intense heat combined with a lack of rain has most of Texas battling one of the most severe droughts on record. In Houston, it has been so hot, the high temperature has

hit at least 100 degrees every day since Aug. 1 Several other cities in Texas have also broken heat records this year, as the state sweats under a high pressure bubble that has kept the heat trapped and the rain out.

Okla. town also record-breaker

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) - From the lowest temperature ever recorded in Oklahoma to the country's highest monthly average temperature ever, Oklahoma has experienced extreme swings in 2011 and on Monday the southwest Oklahoma town of Grandfield broke another state record, with 87 days at 100 degrees or more.

The Oklahoma Mesonet shows Grandfield reached 100 degrees for the 87th day just after noon Monday, breaking the 86-day record set in Hollis in 1956.

The National Weather Service forecast calls for temperatures in Grandfield to hit 100 or higher through the remainder of the week.

"Unfortunately, there's not any lasting relief in sight, in terms of the weather pattern," said Patrick Burke, a weather service meteorologist in Norman.

"I think right now everyone is just looking forward

New Braunfels considers ban

NEW BRAUNFELS, (AP) - Tubers on two Central Texas rivers could have to float along without containers of their favorite beverages.

The New Braunfels City Council on Monday night is scheduled to consider an anti-littering ordinance that would ban aluminum cans and plastic bottles on the Comal River and the Guadalupe River.

Mayor Gale Pospisil says tons of cans and bottles are removed from the rivers each week

State and federal laws require New Braunfels, located 25 miles northeast of San Antonio, to protect the rivers. Both provide drinking water and habitat for endangered

Under the plan, which won preliminary approval earlier this month, tubers carrying or possessing food or beverages in a disposable container would face misdemeanor citations. Fines would range up to \$500.

Texas students back to school

AUSTIN (AP) - Summer vacation is over for millions of children in Texas.

Classes have resumed Monday at public schools as districts deal with tighter budgets.

The 2011 Texas Legislature, facing a \$27 billion budget **Seliger** shortfall, cut \$4 billion over the next two years in funding for school districts.

The Houston Independent School District, the state's largest with about 204,000 students, saved money by eliminating 400 positions out of a teaching staff of about 13,000.

The Texas Education Agency says the state has more than 1,200 districts, with about 4.8 million students enrolled last school year.

Black bears wander in N.M.

SANTA FE, N.M. (AP) - The state Department of Game and Fish says drought, fire and hunger has driven a lot of bears from their natural habitat into neighborhoods

around Santa Fe looking for something to eat. Department spokesman Dan Williams tells the Santa Fe New Mexican some died because they had lost their

Williams says wardens will consider killing a bear if it returns three times to an area populated with people, depending on the circumstances.

The state reports 158 bears have been euthanized in New Mexico since April.

Game and Fish biologists estimate there are between 5,300 and 7,000 black bears in the state.

Dallas 'deck park' ready for trees

DALLAS (AP) - Crews are planning to start work soon on a 5-acre public park in downtown Dallas that will tower above the traffic.

The Dallas Morning News reported Sunday that most of the structural beams above Woodall Rodgers Freeway are installed for the deck area to be known as The Park. Crews are putting lighting, fireproofing and ventilation in the highway tunnel.

Willis Winters with the Dallas Parks and Recreation Department expects park construction to begin no later than September. The park should be done in about a year.

Kristin Gray, with the foundation co-developing the \$110 million private and public effort, says a lot of people don't understand that the work is about building a park.

The funding includes \$57 million in city, state and federal money.

July 4 'reset' for Dec. 31

WICHITA FALLS (AP) - The Fourth of July celebration in one bone-day North Texas city will happen nearly six months late.

Wichita Falls authorities on Monday blamed the extreme dry weather and high fire danger for rescheduling the "4th In The Falls" event to Dec. 31.

The original Independence Day celebration, complete with fireworks, was pushed back until Labor Day weekend due to extreme dry conditions.

But a statement from the city says Wichita Falls leaders rescheduled the event again, abandoning the Sept. 3 plans, after reviewing long-range weather forecasts, fireworks restrictions and considering public safety con-

More debt; are you in a 'sinkhole' state?

U.S. debt has been downgraded, and a budget deal is left to a "supercommittee." The world holds its breath to see if Greece, Italy, Spain or Portugal will default and destroy the Euro. China is letting its currency rise, making exports more expensive. Americans have lost confidence in the economy amidst bankruptcies and foreclosures.

What else could there be to worry about in the world of money and finance? Well, there's one more catastrophe waiting to happen.

The disaster revolves around the overwhelming, and mostly hidden, financial woes of many states.

Since states don't have the option of "printing money" - an option that gives some breathing room to the United States and the European community - state budgets are coming to grips with huge shortfalls. This, despite the fact that 49 of the 50 states have balanced budget amendments.

According to a new report just released at TruthinAccounting.org, the states have used accounting trickery to conceal a total of \$1 trillion of outstanding bills. The report identifies five "Sinkhole" states and five "Sunshine" states. Truth in Accounting is a national, non-profit advocacy group dedicated to "promoting honest, accurate and transparent accounting."

Truth in accounting

This new report charges: "State officials permit themselves the use of antiquated accounting principles - and almost no rules with regard to budgets. The institute's study found balanced state budgets are largely a myth. This fantasy accounting, along with the political math necessary to claim state budgets have been 'balanced,' is why states with balanced budget requirements are accumulating very large debts and deferred liabilities.

Sheila Weinberg, founder and CEO of the institute, says, "State officials say their budgets are balanced but do not include employee pension and health care obligations in their calcula-

Eventually, these obligations will fall on taxpayers. So instead of comparing states by overall debt, or just comparing the amount of unfunded The Savage on money

pension liability, this report compares states by the "taxpayer burden."

On that basis, the report identifies Connecticut, New Jersey, Illinois, Hawaii, and Kentucky as top debtors each with more than \$23,000 in debt per taxpayer. On the positive side, Wyoming, North Dakota, Nebraska, Utah and South Dakota are considered "sunshine states" - because they have either a surplus or minimal taxpayer burden.

Among the worst

The report explains that Illinois, for instance, has \$55 billion worth of assets (defined as both financial assets and also state parks, for example), but less than \$19.6 billion is available to pay \$130.2 billion of bills as they come due. Each taxpayer's financial burden is \$26,800.

How do they get away with it? In addition to not including pension obligations tied to current compensation in the annual budget, the report condemns Illinois because, according to the report: "Illinois habitually delays issuing its year-end financial report until after the next fiscal year's budget process has been completed. That prevents citizens and public officials from having important information, leading to less-than-optimal public policy decisions.

How will those gaps be filled? States have already tried raising income taxes, sales taxes, corporate taxes, property taxes, lotteries and, more recently, even legalizing gambling. But one way or another, it will come out of the pockets of workers and employers.

Accounting legerdemain

States are getting away with this financial legerdemain, despite their balanced budget amendments. Here's how the report explains it:

"To put an end to budget shenanigans, the institute has developed a budgeting system called 'Full Accrual Calculations and Techniques.' FACTbased budgeting would require governors and legislatures to recognize

expenses when incurred, regardless of when they are paid. We believe that if FACT-based budgeting had been used by state governments over the past 50 years, the states would not be in the financially highrisk conditions they are now in.

Or to put it in non-accounting language we can all understand: A debt is a debt. Whether it is required to be paid now or in the future, you still owe the money. And you must acknowl-

To do otherwise is to think that your \$5,000 Visa bill is not your debt, because your current required payment is only \$37. It all depends on what you count!

Making the move

This report is certain to be picked at by doubters. For example, the burden of public aid in states like Wyoming and North and South Dakota is certainly lower than in states with major metropolitan areas like Illinois and New Jersey. Where do you want to

Ironically, many of the states with the largest debt burden already have relatively high tax structures, meaning it will be even more difficult to fill the gap. But they will try. And eventually, you could find the most productive people moving out of high-tax states to those with lower rates.

Most famously, economist Arthur Laffer (of the Laffer curve, which explained why higher tax rates eventually bring in lower revenues) actually moved his family and business from high-tax California to no-state-tax Tennessee! That's actual proof that higher taxes do have consequences for those individuals and businesses flexible enough to move.

This report pulls back the covers on state debt burdens. Hiding state budget deficits will only make the problem worse. We're going to pay - one way or another, and one day or another. And that's The Savage Truth.

ways to secure their children in their car seats.

"Child safety seats are 71 percent effective in preventing fatalities and 67 percent effective in preventing serious injuries, but only if they're used properly,' Coleman said.

Coleman, who holds a certificate for child safety seat inspection, said that every parent who attends the checkup will leave with the knowledge and the right equipment they need to keep their kids safe on the road. "What we do is we look

at the existing car seat," Coleman said. "We look at a current list of car seats that have been recalled and make sure that the car seat has not been recalled. If it has been recalled, we replace it. If the car seat is damaged, we replace it. If we have a parent that comes in and they bought a booster seat for their two- or threeyear-old who still needs to be in a five-point harness or a better booster seat, then we'll make sure that they leave with a properly fitting car seat and that they understand how to use them. We just want to make sure everybody has the right seat for their child. The safer we can keep our kids, the

Today in History

Today is Tuesday, Aug. 23, the 235th day of 2011. There are 130 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Aug. 23, 1775, Britain's King George III proclaimed the American colonies to be in a state of "open and avowed rebellion."

On this date:

In 1305, Scottish rebel leader Sir William Wallace was executed by the English for treason. In 1754, France's King Louis XVI was born at Versailles.

In 1914, Japan declared war against Germany in World War I.

In 1926, silent film star Rudolph Valentino died in New York at age 31.

In 1927, amid protests, Italian-born anarchists Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti were executed in Boston for the murders of two men during a 1920 robbery.

In 1939, Nazi Germany and the Soviet Union agreed to a non-aggression treaty, the Molotov-Ribbentrop Pact, in Moscow.

In 1960, Broadway librettist Oscar Hammerstein II, 65, died in Doylestown, Pa.

In 1973, a bank robbery-turned-hostage-taking began in Stockholm, Sweden; the four hostages ended up empathizing with their captors, a psychological condition now referred to as "Stockholm Syndrome."

In 1989, in a case that inflamed racial tensions in New York, Yusuf Hawkins, a 16-year-old black youth, was shot dead after he and his friends were confronted by a group of white youths in the Bensonhurst section of Brooklyn.


Ten years ago: Rep. Gary Condit, D-Calif., interviewed by Connie Chung on ABC, denied any involvement in the disappearance of Washington intern Chandra Levy. (Ingmar Guandique, an illegal immigrant from El Salvador, was convicted in Nov. 2010 of murdering Levy, and was sentenced to 60 years in prison.)

Five years ago: A previously unknown militant group released the first video of two Fox News journalists who'd been kidnapped in Gaza. (Reporter Steve Centanni and cameraman Olaf Wiig were later freed.)

One year ago: A dismissed policeman armed with an automatic rifle seized a bus in the Philippine capital with 25 people on board, mostly Hong Kong tourists; the gunman released nine of the hostages and demanded his job back to free the rest. Perry says no to "Obamacare," but what's his plan?

WASHINGTON (AP) - With the highest percentage of uninsured residents, Texas would be one of the biggest beneficiaries of President Barack Obama's health care overhaul.

But Gov. Rick Perry blocked moves to lay the groundwork for expanded coverage. And among the alternatives he's supported is an untested regional solution that could put states in charge of Medicare, an approach potentially as controversial as Obama's.

With Perry running for the Republican presidential nomination, health care in Texas and his own ideas as governor will get fly-speck scrutiny on the national stage.

His state is a study in contrasts, boasting world-renowned facilities like the MD Anderson Cancer Center in Houston, along with 6.8 million uninsured residents, or 26 percent of the population

the population.

As a national candidate, Perry has made total repeal of "Obamacare" central to his fledgling campaign. Less clear is what he would put in its place. But if the Supreme Court ultimately upholds all or parts of the law, Perry has signaled he would help carry out key provisions to avoid

defaulting to the federal bureaucracy.

Texas has already received various grants under Obama's law for planning, insurance regulation and consumer education. The state employee benefits system says it expects to draw \$60 million in federal subsidies this year to help cover its early retirees, cashing in on a provision of the law.

But when Republican state Rep. John Zerwas tried to move legislation to set up an insurance purchasing pool required by the national overhaul, he ran into a veto threat from Perry.

The purchasing pools - called exchanges - are one of the key features of Obama's law. Close to 4 million Texans stand to gain coverage under the law, nearly half of them through exchanges.

hrough exchanges.
Run by the states, exchanges would

let consumers buy coverage from a choice of private plans. Most individuals and families participating would be eligible for federal tax credits to lower their premiums.

Exchanges are supposed to open in 2014. If a state doesn't act in advance, the law authorizes the federal government to set up and run its exchange. And since the Texas legislature meets only every other year,

this past session was seen as perhaps the state's only opportunity.

But Zerwas said Perry told him he was concerned that moving ahead with the exchange legislation would undermine a multistate lawsuit against the federal overhaul that

Texas is part of, not to mention creating other political problems. The lawsuit challenges the constitutionality of the law's requirement that Americans obtain health insurance - the so-called individual mandate - an issue on which lower courts have

split.

"Unfortunately, whether we like it or not, health insurance exchanges have become synonymous with Obamacare," said Zerwas. An anesthesiologist from the Houston suburbs, Zerwas said he believes it's worth taking the flak to guarantee that Texas will retain control of its insurance market. The governor disagreed.

"The position (Perry) was taking veers into some political considerations," said Zerwas. "He felt it would not ring well with some of the constituents and grassroots out there, and frankly, he was concerned it could potentially weaken the arguments in the lawsuit."

In the end, Zerwas said Perry reassured him that as governor he could put the exchange legislation into place through an executive order, should that become necessary. A spokeswoman for the federal Health and Human Services department agreed that would be possible.

A spokeswoman for the governor, Lucy Nashed, said Perry believes there are too many unknowns about the federal law to move ahead. "It's premature to be setting up anything that has to do with the federal health care bill because so much of it is still up to the courts with regard to its constitutionality," she said.

That still leaves Texas with the nation's lowest rate of insurance coverage, even when compared to other states that have high immigrant populations. Experts say one of the key problems is a relatively low level of employer-sponsored private coverage.

Nashed said Perry has advocated a range of health care fixes, including national caps on malpractice lawsuits, conversion to electronic medical records and efforts to keep patients healthy and out of hospitals. He also signed legislation this year that would clear the way for Texas to explore a health care overhaul in conjunction with other states.

What sounds like an innocuous experiment in federalism could turn out to be more difficult than Obama's overhaul.

The idea behind so-called state compacts is for the federal government to turn over Medicare and Medicaid funds to a group of states to use as they deem best for their citizens' needs. The biggest re-engineering since the giant health care programs were created in the 1960s would have to overcome AARP's disapproval.

"We oppose interstate health care compacts because they could result in the loss of guaranteed benefits, similar to turning Medicare and Medicaid into block grant programs," said David Certner, legislative policy director for the seniors lobby, which sees "especially grave concerns for Medicare."

Industry consultant Bob Laszewski says even if Congress were to approve of the idea, it's unlikely that groups of states could agree on how it would actually work.

"How could any one state control its costs?" asked Laszewski. It's like the Euro zone, he added, referring to Europe's troubled economies. "It's not states' rights anymore. These states would have to cede a lot of authority to a new entity."

"He's a great player," Jameson said. "He's going to have a good season. He's number one in singles, so he should do well."




> Alanna Stephens Senior., Softball


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
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
