to help the Smith family offset the cost of the burial arrangements.



Mexico shocked by casino attack

MONTERREY, Mexico (AP) — Mexican President Felipe Calderon declared three days of mourning Friday for the 52 victims of a casino fire set by presumed drug traffickers, branding the attackers "true terrorists" and ordering authorities to offer a \$2.4 million reward for their capture.

- Calderon also once again lashed out at the United States, saying it is not doing enough to reduce the country's high demand for illicit drugs or to stop the illegal trafficking of U.S. weapons into Mexico.

Armed assailants burst into the casino Thursday afternoon, swearing and shouting for customers and employees to get out.

But many of the terrified victims fled farther inside the building, where they died trapped amid the flames and thick smoke that soon billowed out of the building.

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- Calderon described the incident as the worst attack on innocent civilians in recent memory.

"We are not confronting common criminals," he said in a televised nationwide address. "We are facing true terrorists who have gone beyond all limits."

The federal Attorney General's Office announced the reward money, equal to the amount the government has offered for information leading to the capture of the nation's top drug lords.

Perry asks Fed to pay for illegals

AUSTIN (AP) — Texas Gov. Rick Perry has asked the U.S. Department of Homeland Security to reimburse the state \$350 million to cover costs of imprisoning illegal immigrants.

In a letter to Homeland Security Secretary Janet Napolitano, the top-tier Republican presidential candidate blamed the federal government for not securing the border with Mexico, allowing illegal immigrants to cross over and use taxpayer-funded resources. He said resources for county jails are being depleted as a result.

Perry included in the letter the formula he used to determine the costs and included a memo from state Comptroller Susan Combs supporting his calculations.

The letter was dated Aug. 10, three days before Perry formally announced his campaign for president. Perry is combatting criticism from conservatives that he has been too lenient on illegal immigrants.

Vioxx award overturned

TRENTON, N.J. (AP) — Merck & Co. said Friday that the Texas Supreme Court has overturned a huge jury award to the family of a Texas man who died after briefly taking Vioxx, the painkiller the drugmaker later pulled from the market.

A jury in Rio Grande City, Texas, in April 2006 awarded \$32 million to the family of 71-year-old Leonel Garza. He had had heart disease for 23 years and died in 2001 after less than a month on Vioxx.

The award — originally \$25 million in punitive damages, plus \$7 million in compensatory damages — was reduced in December 2006 to about \$7.75 million under the state's damage caps. A Texas appeals court later overturned the verdict due to jury misconduct and ordered a new trial. Merck, the world's second-largest drugmaker by revenue, stopped selling Vioxx in September 2004, amid evidence it doubled risk of heart attack and stroke. A deluge of lawsuits soon followed, mostly on behalf of Vioxx users who had suffered or died from heart attacks or strokes. Roughly 50,000 of those cases were ended under a \$4.85 billion settlement Merck reached with plaintiffs' lawyers on Nov. 9, 2007.

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Federal officials investigating reports of small amounts of oil popping up on the Gulf of Mexico surface near where a BP well blew out last year said Friday they found no oil leaking from seafloor wells.

This week the Coast Guard and BP sent deepsea robots down to the disaster site and no leaks were found at the well or at two other wells drilled during the months-long work to get the out-ofcontrol well capped. They said no sheens were seen on the surface either.

"We saturated that area by both air and sea," said Coast Guard Chief Petty Officer John Edwards. "With no known origin, this sheen ranks up there among the thousands of other quote-unquote mystery sheens that happen every day in the Gulf."

Apparently there was a leak somewhere — perhaps from a natural seep on the seafloor or some other source, even drilling equipment that sank to the seafloor after the

future a priority.

Deepwater Horizon rig exploded on April 20, 2010, killing 11 workers and sparking the largest offshore oil spill in U.S. history. The BP well spewed about 200 million gallons of oil last year. Ed Overton, a Louisiana

State University chemist leading efforts to analyze the BP spill, said samples from sheens found earlier in the week near the site of the disaster matched the fingerprint of the crude that spewed from BP's well.

"It is essentially identical," Overton told The Associated Press when reached by telephone Friday. "It means that it is oil that came from that general area."

He said the amount of oil found was very small and that the sheen — reported by the Press-Register newspaper in Mobile, Ala., this week.— may have amounted to as little as a gallon of oil. "This is a leak of a real small

amount of oil," he said. "We're not looking at a repeat of last summer."

Because the sheen was so small, he said it might be coming from a leak that would be hard to find, perhaps from a "fissure in source rock or from somewhere else."

Overton said it was possible the oil could be from the mile-long pipe called a riser that extended between the Deepwater Horizon and the well when the blowout occurred. The riser, along with the Deepwater Horizon, sank to the bottom of the Gulf. He said oil may have been trapped in the riser and is only now dribbling out. He said the small sheens documented this week resembled leaks in the past found escaping from sunken damaged vessels.

But he added that the oil might have come from a natural seep from the same oil reservoir the BP well was tapping into. There are natural seeps in the

BP said it had not sent remotely operated vehicles to look for leaks along the riser, which it said belonged to Transocean Ltd., the drilling company that owned the Deepwater Horizon.

Brian Kennedy, a Transocean spokesman, said the company had not conducted a survey of the riser. He called it implausible for oil to be leaking from that structure.

Federal officials said they did not look at the riser during the recent deep-sea probes of BP's wells.





Ten years for church volunteer

FORT WORTH (AP) — A 27-year-old North Texas man who did volunteer work with children at a church has been sentenced to 10 years in federal prison on a child pornography charge.

Prosecutors say Derek M. Ripley of Fort Worth was sentenced Friday on one count of distributing child pornography. He also was ordered to be under supervised release for life. He pleaded guilty in May.

Authorities say Ripley admitted to using the Internet to distribute three images of boys engaged in sexually explicit conduct. He worked with youth at Trinity Chapel Church in Benbrook, a Fort Worth suburb.

Police think death accidental

IRVING (AP) — Police say the death of a 2-year-old boy who was left in the back of his family's vehicle in a Dallas suburb appears to be a "tragic accident."

Investigators say the boy had inadvertently been left in a sport utility vehicle in Irving on Thursday after his family unloaded belongings from the vehicle in the driveway.

The family had just moved to Texas from California.

Police say the boy's mother had thought all nine of ber children were inside their home when she closed the gehicle.

Later in the evening, the mother called police after she couldn't find her son. Officers found the boy in the back of the SUV.

The boy was pronounced dead at the scene. An autopsy is pending, but police believe his death is heat-related.

Gun store sues over ATF rule

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A San Antonio gun shop is suing over a federal requirement that weapons dealers in four border states must report multiple sales of semiautomatic rifles.

The new requirement, ordered last month by the U.S. Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives, follows a 2009 law enforcement operation in Arizona known as "Fast and Furious" that's been criticized for letting high-powered weapons flow into Mexico.

The San Antonio Express-News reports the store, 10-Ring Precision Inc., claims the new requirement goes beyond ATF's authority.

An ATF spokesman says the bureau has the authority and will defend its ability to collect the sales information from gun dealers in New Mexico, Texas, Arizona and California.

cling center - which is actually a nice drive.

But the stuff you recycle is stuff that won't take up space in the landfill. And the less junk out there, the fewer cells in the landfill we'll build down the line, and the less money we'll spend on solid waste as a com-The city already has found several innovative ways to give material that

free. The city collects metal to sell ; later. And the new recycling building, which should be open in a few months, is decked out with a cardboard baler. Bales of cardboard will be sold, sent away, and kept out of a the landfill.

If you're feeling really ambitious, in you can do other things to shrink 2 your trash pile.

Building a compost is easier than you'd think, and it will give you nutrient rich soil in return. You can use mulch or even newspaper to get. it started.

Or you could avoid plastic at the grocery store. Those bags take eons" to break down, but paper bags can be recycled or worked into a compost. You can also bring in reusable bags.

It might sound like hippie nonsense at first, but being thoughtful about our waste as a community will help us save money in the long run. The fewer cells built in the landfill, the more money can go into other projects, and that sounds like a deal to me.





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'Conan the Barbarian' the SPLIT-SCREEN 'Fright Night' an example latest bad Nispel rehash

Marcus Nispel, director of "Conan the Barbarian," had previously stated that this remake of the 1982 Arnold Schwarzenegger action-adventure was his dream project.

Apparently his dreams aren't very good.

"Conan" is the latest do-over for Nispel, he of the similarly cruddy rehashes of "Friday the 13th," "Frankenstein," and "The Texas Chainsaw Massacre." A director of TV commercials and music videos before graduating to the big screen, Nispel's grasp of directing movies has been pedestrian at best, and "Conan" offers little evidence that he's learning anything.

But surely - I hear you say - surely, there's some redeeming quality that a twentysomething male moviegoer can hang on to in a testosterone-fueled movie about a giant dude with a sword starring the guy from "Hellboy" and Rachel Nichols. There has to be something.

That's just it, though. I'm the exact target demographic for this movie, and it was so terribly unsatisfying.

I mean, sure, Nispel delivers on the requisite gore and violence demanded by a barbarian film, but it's just so incoherent that it's not even interesting. Nispel, a graduate of the Michael Bay school of action sequence direction, insists on using the shakiest camera known to man, resulting in unintelligible fight scenes that would make a Tasmanian devil seasick. He's also got this nasty habit of shooting said fight scenes from the neck down, so you don't even see the character's faces as the camera bobs about them like it's sitting on a mechanical bull.

The plot? There's barely one to speak of. The movie spent seven years in development hell and only has three credited writers, a peculiarly small group by current standards. It's apparent throughout, as the unoriginal conceit of Conan (newcomer Jason Momoa of "Game of Thrones") and his quest for revenge against the warlord (Stephen Lang of "Avatar") who killed his father gives way to an even more unoriginal script, including a rehashed gag from "Con Air." Try and spot it; it'll give you something to do while you're watching the movie.

I could fill half a page with more com-

plaints. Momoa, while certainly built, has the charisma of an ironing board. They gave Lang's evil warlord gray pigtails for some reason. Rose McGowan's lack of eyebrows throughout the whole movie is crazy distracting.

Ron Perlman, the aforementioned guy from "Hellboy" who plays Conan's dad, is under so much fake facial hair that he looks like some weird hybrid of Bigfoot and George Clinton.

Instead, I've spent the entire time I've been writing this trying to think of something good to say, but when your remake can't even touch the script quality of the Schwarzenegger original, it's hard to come up with a compliment. Uh... I guess Rachel Nichols was there. She's really pretty. So, there you go. Good job, Marcus Nispel, I guess.

"Fright Night" does a wonder-ful job of mixing in the comedy, mostly from Charley's best friend "Evil" Ed ("Superbad's" Christopher Mintz-Plasse), with some great action sequences and very suspenseful scenes. The cast does a terrific job with standout performances by Tennant and Farrell especially. Tennant clearly had a great time, and takes what could have been a one-note performance and creates a fully developed character. Farrell does the exact opposite creating one of the better horror movie villains in recent memory. His Jerry is a perfect balance of creepy and jerky that makes you love him, even as you cheer for his death.

> The movie leave out some of the junk that bogs down the original and does a great job of making Charley a modern teen, one who's just as concerned with keeping his single mom safe from the skeevey guy next door, as he is with protecting his new cool image from being ruined by a nerd video that threatens to hit the internet. Despite surge from Perry, Romney sticks to strategy

EXETER, N.H. (AP) — Despite a new rival's surge, Mitt Romney is campaigning as though he's still the GOP presidential front-runner, focusing his criticisms on President Barack Obama, taking few risks and keeping most proposals vague enough to leave ample maneuvering room.

That may change soon, however, as events shift the contest to a higher gear. September will bring several GOP debates that will include Texas Gov. Rick Perry for the first time, as well as renewed attention to the question of how to create desperately needed jobs.

The former Massachusetts governor may be pushed out of his comfort zone even sooner if Perry's fast rise seems real and lasting.

For months, Romney has largely floated above the sparring. He let Michele Bachmann knock fellow Minnesotan Tim Pawlenty out of the race in Iowa, for instance, and refused to be drawn into tit-for-tat exchanges over policy details. Perry, the sudden favorite among Republicans according to a Gallup poll, may force Romney to turn his focus away from Obama and sharpen his differences with fellow Republicans.

This week, however, Romney stuck to an easygoing, business-as-usual air as he campaigned in New Hampshire, which will hold the first primary in about five months. He took a cautious stand on climate change, downplayed GOP differences on jobs policies, and shrugged off suggestions that Perry may have overtaken him.

"If you're running for president, your focus should be on the person who is president and his failures, and how you're going to make America better," Romney told reporters in Claremont.

About the only thing he changed this week, he said with a laugh, was his shirt.

He cut short a question about the Gallup poll. There are many polls, Romney said, although he conceded, "Rick is a very effective candidate."

Romney still enjoys a big lead in fundraising and organization over Perry and the others. For now, he seems eager to blunt rather than highlight his differences with them, a classic front-runner's strategy.

At a packed forum in Keene on Wednesday, Romney noted that he and all the other contenders have vowed to reject a deficit-reduction package if it contains even \$1 in new tax revenues for every \$10 in spending cuts. Obama called that pledge irresponsible pandering.

"We all have said taxes are off the table," Romney said. He later told reporters they should not be surprised if his job proposals hardly differ from his rivals', because Republicans share many values on that issue.

Romney repeatedly called for a balanced federal budget, but like many other politicians he offered few details on how to achieve it. He embraced House Republicans" demands for unspecified cuts in discretionary domestic spending.

When a man in Keene asked what sacrifices Americans should make, Romney offered a largely pain-free roster.

Americans should "work hard" and create new businesses, he said, but they need not "give more money to government." Young people should study harder and "demand more from teachers," he said, and learn that esteem comes from "living with integrity and getting married before they have kids."

The sacrifice I look for is for Americans to reach for excellence and greatness," Romney said to applause.

Asked what he would do as president if he had a GOP-controlled Congress, Romney immediately veered to unrelated praise of right-to-work states, which ban mandatory union participation.

He took a non-committal stand on climate change at a forum in Lebanon, N.H. Humans probably contribute to global warming, he said, but "I don't know by how much." He noted he's not a scientist and said he didn't want to spend trillions of dollars on carbon-reduction programs for "something we don't know the answer to."

Some voters asked Romney about health care, reminding him of his successful push for mandatory health insurance coverage in Massachusetts. At every stop he said he would overturn "Obamacare," a sure-fire applause line. But he skated over similarities between the president's health delivery overhaul and his own push in Massachusetts several years ago.

Romney said the state law was needed because some people took advantage of a system that let them get free treatment in emergency rooms without buying insurance. That's also an argument Obama made for requiring health coverage nationwide.

The Massachusetts law isn't perfect, Romney said, and voters can overturn it by referendum if they like.

The Obama-backed law, he said, reaches far more deeply into health affairs for all Americans, and would reduce Medicare spending.

Many New Hampshire voters seemed satisfied with his proposals and answers.

"I thought he did a fantastic job," said Greg Ford, 35, an orthopedic surgery resident who attended the Lebanon forum. Romney offers practical solutions to health and financial issues, Ford said, adding, "I'm a 100 percent supporter of eliminating Obamacare." Th

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Bill Tingle, 64, said he voted for Obama in 2008 but is looking favorably at Romney. He likes Romney's overall approach to jobs and the budget, but wishes there had been more talk about foreign affairs, said Tingle, who travels widely for a manufacturing company.

The crowds were almost always friendly, although Romney grew testy when a woman in Lebanon pressed him to acknowledge that many Americans depend on government programs Republicans want to cut. In four events in two days, the only question he got about his plans to greatly expand his Southern California house came from a reporter. Romney, a multimillionaire, said he wants room for his 16 grandchildren.

The press corps turned to other matters.



Romney often asked voters to trust him to make good decisions as president, with details to come as events unfold.

"I'll find the right approach" to ending sanctuary cittes if legally possible, he said. Sanctuary cities take a hands-off approach to pursuing illegal immigrants, and Romney said he opposed them as governor.

On Thursday in Exeter, Romney said he would look "at the widest array of options" to shore up the longterm fiscal health of Medicare and Social Security. At other stops he said the retirement age for eligibility possibly could be raised over time.





Harvesters blank Hawks, win first opener since '08

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The Pampa Harvesters' seniors made several goals in the spring and one of those was to win the opening game. Despite the scorching heat, mission was accomplished as Pampa defeated Iowa Park 20-0 Friday at Hawk Field.

The Harvesters won their opener for the first time since 2008. The defense notched its first shutout since 2007. Head coach Heath Parker said it was a big deal.

"It wasn't a fluke shutout," Parker said. "The offense left our defense in bad situations three or four times and they delivered every time."

It didn't take long for the Harvesters to make a big play, as they recovered a fumble on the kickoff getting the ball at the Hawks' 39. The drive ended just as quickly as it began as senior quarterback Reid Miller threw three incompletions. The special teams stepped up as they pinned Iowa Park at its own one.

Pampa's defense held the Hawks to four-yards, forcing them to punt in their own endzone. Senior Trace Carter returned the ball to the Iowa Park's 23. Still, the Harvesters weren't able to take advantage. Senior Colten Adams missed a 42-yard field goal as Pampa failed to convert a first down. The defenses dominated the first quarter as neither team scored. It took the Harvesters three possessions to convert their first down.

Pampa got on the board in the second quarter as it went on a five-play, 63-yard drive. The key play occurred when Miller completed a 50-yard pass to senior Latigo Collins to set up the Harvesters at the Hawks 3. Sophomore Freddy Jackson scored his first career varsity touchdown on a three-yard run. Pampa went for two but failed keeping its lead at 6-0.

Parker said he was pleased with how Jackson and sophomore Damon Flores played.

"This was their first national anthem, first kickoff, first game, and they played well," Parker said.

The defense came up big on the next possession as senior Joseph Vizcaino intercepted a third down pass, returning the ball to the Iowa Park 48. The Harvesters made the Hawks pay going on a 10-play 52 yard drive. Miller completed a 14-yard third down pass. Sophomore Damon Flores converted another third down on the ground. Miller finished the drive with a 13-yard pass to Collins with 46 seconds left. Adams converted the point after and Pampa led 13-0, which it took to the half.

The third quarter started like the first as both teams went three-and-out on their first, possessions. The Harvesters responded on their next possession. Jackson gained on first down with an 11-yard run. Miller converted another pass to Collins that put Pampa at Iowa Park's 46. The Hawks looked like they turned momentum as they picked off a Reid Miller pass, but were called for pass interference. Miller took advantage as he ran for a 27-yard touchdown, increasing Pampa's lead to 20-0 after the extra point. On the next possession, Iowa Park turned it over on downs. The Harvesters were unable to add to their lead as Jackson fumbled for the second time. The Hawks thought they scored on a 25-yard pass, but it was called back for holding. Iowa Park turned it over on downs.

In the fourth quarter, Pampa's defense didn't yield a first down. On the last drive of the game, it forced the Hawks to turn it over on downs and allow Miller to run out the clock.

Pampa's defense forced three turnovers and sacked the Hawks five times.

Texas A&M, Big 12 Conference need to come to compromise

Texas A&M has determined its path, now the remaining Big 12 teams have to decide how long that road will be and how expensive -- for the Big 12 and the Aggies.

The Aggies want to be playing in the Southeastern Conference next season and not pay the Big 12 a huge exit fee for leaving. On the flip side, the Big 12 wants A&M to kiss and make up, but if the Aggies are hellbent on leaving, the league wants to get every maroon cent possible, making life miserable for Aggies in the process.

Oh, this will get ugly. You can count on that. And it will get personal

But there needs to be a balanced solution where each side at least believes it made the best of the situation, and the sooner A&M and the remaining Big 12 members admit that saving the status quo isn't an option, the sooner a solution will be reached. Many Aggies are giddy about joining the nation's best conference, but for this to work, those left behind also have to feel good

about the future.

Some say A&M's exit will be the demise of the Big 12, though that's probably a bit late since the same was said last year when Nebraska and Colorado bolted. Yet the Big 12 Lite recovered to get a 13-year television deal with Fox that is worth more than a \$1 billion with the potential to get more money when its other contracts are up -- at least until this happened. A&M appears headed out, but Oklahoma and Texas remain leaving two good building blocks.

TV money is the key to how this unfolds. If the Big 12's television partners are willing to pay big bucks without A&M in the mix, all will be well and A&M's exit fee will be secondary. If each remaining Big 12 team is going to get at least \$15 million per year for the next 10-15 years, why haggle over \$5-10 million more from the Aggies that would be split nine ways?

Aggies think they should pay the same \$9.225 million exit fee that Nebraska paid, but that's also not fair.

A&M is leaving a 10-team conference, not a 12-team one. The Aggies helped save the league last summer, getting an assurance of \$20 million per year, and now they want out. Yeah, they want to get away from Texas and the Longhorn Network, but there are other schools to consider. The Aggies are leaving Texas Tech and Baylor behind. That doesn't mean A&M should pay \$30 million, either. Maybe A&M can agree to play Tech, Baylor and Oklahoma State in home-and-home series in the next 10-15 years as part of the exit agreement.

A&M said "it would be supportive of the Big 12's efforts to seek a new member of the conference." Nice offer, but you get the feeling the Big 12 will decline. Hopefully, the Aggies and the Big 12 will reach common ground, so this can be settled before A&M's football team opens the season Sept. 4. If not, at some point the Aggies could be the first team to start an athletic contest as a member of one conference and end it having been accepted by another.




