Radio KDRL hits Pampa airwaves

Pampa's radio listeners have a new frequency where they can get their music fix.

Thursday marked the maiden broadcast of KDRL, the newest station in the KGRO/KOMX family. KDRL, which will be broadcasting on 103.3 FM at 50,000 watts, will primarily carry a mix of the classic hits of the 60s, 70s and 80s.

"We're glad to have that format," said Darrell Sehorn, general manager of Pampa Broadcasters. Inc. "It really adds to the overall mix of the three stations... I grew up in that era, so a lot of those songs, to just sit back and hear them all, it really brought back a lot

of memories." In contrast to the other two stations within the company's umbrella, Sehorn said that KDRL will stick chiefly to broadcasting music.

"Our other two operations are heavily involved in news, network news, public affairs. This is different.

Food security an issue in Gray Co.

When we think of security, we might picture a beefed-up alarm system or a herd of hungry junkyard dogs ready to pounce on any threat.

Food security, however, might leave most of us scratching our heads, wondering if there is an artichoke out there in need of mace or a Taser.

Food security, as it turns out, is a fancy term for the way the United States Department of Agriculture measures people's access to food. "Food-insecure" individuals have limited access to enough healthy foods to sustain an active and healthy lifestyle. Rural counties tend to have higher rates of food insecurity, and Gray County is no exception.

According to a recent study from Feeding America, Gray County's Food Insecurity Rate is 18.9 percent, or 4,120 individuals.

But the area's children seem to be especially vulnerable to hunger. Thirty percent of children in Gray County experienced food insecurity in 2009, or an estimated 1,620 kids.

Schools can play an important role in preventing child hunger, as they offer meal programs for FOOD cont. on page 3

Thursday fire hits Pampa home

A structural fire took place Thursday evening at

404 S. Hughes. Pampa Fire Department dispatched six units and nine personnel to the scene at 7:13 p.m, and the fire was under control in about 40 minutes.

Fire Chief Kim Powell said that the fire started in a garage on the property before spreading to the house and a nearby trailer. There were no injuries, and the home appeared to be unoccupied at the time of the fire.



Storm cuts production in half

NEW ORLEANS (AP) - Tropical Storm Lee has cut off just under half of the normal oil production from the Gulf of Mexico's U.S. waters.

hat's the word from the federal Bureau of Ocean Energy Management, Regulation and Enforcement.

The agency said Friday that 169 of the 617 manned production platforms in the Gulf have been evacuated, along with 16 of the 62 drilling rigs now operating in

The evacuations have resulted in the shut-off of 47.6 percent of the Gulf's daily normal oil production and 33 percent of the normal daily natural gas production. That translates to about 666,000 barrels of oil and 1.7 billion cubic feet of gas.

Police Chiefs Association hacked

HOUSTON (AP) - The head of a law enforcement group whose website was apparently taken over by hackers says the association has taken the site down to evaluate its security.

The group known as Anonymous appeared to take over the website address of the Texas Police Chiefs Association on Thursday, replacing its home page with one listing law enforcement officials whose personal or work email accounts Anonymous said had been

James McLaughlin, the association's executive director, said Friday the group took its website offline Thursday night. He says some of those listed were association members and others weren't. He says their website is password protected for members, but then only lists names and contact information.

FBI spokeswoman Shauna Dunlap says it is aware of the incident but doesn't confirm or deny investigations.

Fire-related charges for Texan

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) -A Texas man has been charged with setting and leaving a fire unattended in Eddy County.

The U.S. attorney's office says 29-year-old Rodrigo Ulloa-Esquivel of El Paso was indicted on criminal offenses arising out of a wildfire that burned through the Last Chance Canyon of the Lincoln National Forest in late April and early May.

Forest Service agents arrested Ulloa-Esquivel in El Paso without incident Wednesday. Ulloa-Esquivel made his initial appearance on a three-count indictment in the federal courthouse in Las Cruces Friday morning.

Authorities say the Last Chance Fire burned for several days and was declared controlled on May 9. The fire consumed more than 53,000 acres and caused damage to four structures in the Sitting Bull Falls Recreation area. Attempts were being made to determine if Ulloa-

Accused arsonist set for plea

MIDLAND (AP) - A man prosecutors say torched a predominantly black church in West Texas is scheduled to enter a plea in federal court in Midland on Friday

A statement from the U.S. attorney's office in Midland says Steven Cantrell is a member of the white supremacist Aryan Brotherhood of Texas. He's charged with destroying religious real property in the fire at the Faith in Christ Church in Crane, Texas. The town of about 3,000 residents is about 30 miles south of Odessa.

The Dec. 28 fire burned most of a church complex of four connected buildings. No injuries were reported.

been a long time coming, Sehorn said.

"The license was granted earlier in the year," said Darrell Sehorn. "Then, we went through a period of silence while we were getting everything finished and ready to go. At that point, it was discretionary that when we were ready, we could hit the button and go.

income children. Debbie Middleton, Food Services Director for the Pampa Independent School District, reports that 52 percent of PISD students were enrolled in the National School Breakfast and Lunch Program last year. Depending on their families' income, kids can receive two meals during weekdays, either for free or for a reduced price of \$.30 for breakfast or \$.40 for lunch. The school district also offers qualified students a snack program through Wilson and Lamar

"Parents have to fill out an application every year," said Middleton. "Approval is based on income and the number of people in the household." She added that the school district cannot take into account the bills or child support that a family

elementary schools.

Middleton encouraged parents to take advantage of the programs available.

"With a struggling economy, we encourage any parents, even if they don't think they're qualified, to apply to see if they can get on the reduced meal program," she said. "It will greatly help parents with their budgets.

While school programs help with breakfast, lunch and the occasional snack, for some families, that may leave a meal gap instead of dinner. Community resources like Good Samaritan Christian Services play an important role in filling in this gap. The organization reports that they provided 379 families with food during the month of July, and Joy Bivins, Volunteer Executive Director at Good Samaritan's, said that they see an average of 400 to 500 families a month.

"People move here with nothing, try to get a job and can't find one," said Bivins. 'So many are single parent families." Good Samaritan's steps in, providing not only food, but clothes, shoes and assistance with prescriptions and utilities in some cases.

"We buy most of our food from the High Plains Food





A dispirited and pessimistic constituency

Late-night comedians use an old trick to bond with tonight's audience by poking fun at the alleged dimwittedness or surliness of last night's audience.

It's a favorite motif of David Letterman, who once used the Federal Reserve's pegging of the federal funds rate at just above zero to quip, "I haven't seen interest this low since last night's audience.

But it's a good bet that Letterman or Jay Leno or Jimmy Kimmel or Conan O'Brien has never faced a crowd as despairing and distrustful as the Sept. 8 national audience, to which President Barack Obama will speak on the U.S. job crisis; Americans, famous for their indomitable self-confidence, are now racked by self-doubt.

Bill McInturff, the Republican half of the respected Hart-and-McInturff polling duo -- they conduct the Wall Street Journal-NBC News survey -offers an alarming, nonpartisan analysis of today's public mood.

Based on public polls and survevs and focus groups he did for his own firm, Public Opinion Strategies, McInturff concludes that the (mis) handling of the debt ceiling ranks with the Iranian hostage crisis, Hurricane Katrina and the Lehman Brothers collapse and subsequent recessions as a pivotal event "profoundly and sharply reshaping views of the economy and federal government."

He goes on: "It has led to a scary erosion in confidence in both, at a time when this steep drop in confidence can be least afforded.

On the debt ceiling, it was not just the end product the parties eventually slapped together that soured people's attitudes but "the manner in which this issue was debated and resolved." As

McInturff writes, public "views about this process are clear, and are overwhelmingly negative."

Granted, Americans have never been uncritical fans of their country's political system, but how about this for a dramatic drop in satis-

faction? In 2009 and again this year, The Washington Post asked, "How satisfied are you with the way this country's political system is working -- very satisfied, mostly satisfied, mostly dissatisfied, or very dissatis-

Two years ago, 38 percent reported they were satisfied, while 61 percent answered "dissatisfied" (with 31 percent reporting "very dissatisfied"). The most recent results: just 21 percent satisfied and 78 percent dissatisfied (while 45 percent are very dissatisfied).

While Republicans in Congress consistently receive lower grades than the Democratic president, it is a rule of U.S. politics that when things are good, it is the president who gets the credit, and when things are bad, it is the president who takes the political

Coincidentally, Peter Hart released a poll this week done for CitiBank that contained equally dismal news on consumers' pessimism. Today, three years after the financial collapse, nearly three out of four Americans believe that the economy has not yet hit rock bottom. Since last January, when 63 percent of people believed that business conditions were good, that number has plummeted from 51 percent in April to just 41 percent today.

McInturff notes that since 1952, on only four other occasions -- 1974 (Nixon resigned, home sales were down 40 percent, inflation rose to 13.9 percent); 1979 (sixty-two hostages were taken in Iran, the oil crisis created filling-station lines, the prime rate was at 15.75 percent); 1990 (GNP dropped after a record eight years of growth, housing values took a nosedive after the savings-and-loan scandal, Iraq invaded Kuwait); and 2008 (no reminders needed) -- has the consumer confidence number measured by the Michigan Consumer Sentiment Index fallen below 65 percent.

You don't need to be a historian to remember that in each of the presidential elections immediately following those last four low-consumer-confidence years, party control of the White House changed.

Consumer confidence fell nearly 16 points from an already low number in July to 55.7 percent in August. To put this in some historical context, over the last half-century, the average consumer index for re-elected incumbent presidents has been 95.9 percent, while the average consumer confidence score of defeated incumbents has been 78.4 percent -- which is itself a long climb from the current 55.7 percent.

Facing a dispirited and pessimistic constituency, President Obama might take some comfort in the words of John F. Kennedy in the midst of the Cuban Missile Crisis: "This is the week I earn my salary."



Today's Highlight in History:

On Sept. 4, 1951, President Harry S. Truman addressed the nation from the Japanese peace treaty conference in San Francisco in the first live, coast-to-coast television broadcast.

On this date:

In 1781, Los Angeles was founded by Spanish settlers under the leadership of Governor Felipe de Neve.

In 1886, a group of Apache Indians led by Geronimo (also known as Goyathlay, "One Who Yawns") surrendered to Gen. Nelson Miles at Skeleton Canyon in **Arizona**

In 1888, George Eastman received a patent for his roll-film box camera, and registered his trademark - "Kodak."

In 1893, English author Beatrix Potter first told the story of Peter Rabbit in the form of a "picture letter" to Noel Moore, the son of Potter's former governess. In 1917, the American Expeditionary Forces in France suffered their first fatali-

ties during World War I when a German plane attacked a British-run base hospital. In 1948, Queen Wilhelmina of the Netherlands abdicated after nearly six decades of rule for health reasons.

In 1957, Arkansas Gov. Orval Faubus used Arkansas National Guardsmen to prevent nine black students from entering all-white Central High School in Little Rock. Ford Motor Co. began selling its ill-fated Edsel.

In 1969, the Food and Drug Administration issued a report calling birth control pills "safe," despite a slight risk of fatal blood-clotting disorders linked to the pills. In 1971, an Alaska Airlines jet crashed near Juneau, killing all 111 people on board.

In 1984, Canada's Progressive Conservatives, led by Brian Mulroney, won a landslide victory in general elections over the Liberal Party of Prime Minister John N. Turner and the New Democrats headed by Ed Broadbent.

Ten years ago: President George W. Bush opened the door to a future cut in the capital gains tax, but said he first wanted to see the effects of the previous spring's income tax cut. Texas Republican Phil Gramm announced he would leave the U.S. Senate at the end of his third term, following fellow conservatives Jesse Helms and Strom Thurmond into retirement.

Five years ago: "Crocodile Hunter" Steve Irwin, 44, died after a stingray's barb pierced his chest. Two U.S. warplanes accidentally strafed allied forces in southern Afghanistan, killing one Canadian soldier. A gunman opened fire on tourists in Amman, Jordan, killing a British man (Nabeel Ahmed Issa al-Jaourah was later convicted and sentenced to death). The Airbus A380, the world's largest passenger jet, took off from Toulouse, France, with a full load of passengers for

One year ago: Protesters hurled shoes and eggs at Tony Blair in Dublin, Ireland, as he held the first public signing of his memoir as British prime minister amid high security. Pulitzer Prize-winning cartoonist Paul Conrad, 86, died in Rancho

In 1774, the first Continental Congress assembled in Philadelphia.

In 1793, the Reign of Terror began during the French Revolution as the National Convention instituted harsh measures to repress counter-revolutionary activities. In 1836, Sam Houston was elected president of the Republic of Texas.

In 1914, the First Battle of the Marne, resulting in a French-British victory over

Germany, began during World War I.

In 1939, four days after war had broken out in Europe, President Franklin D. Roosevelt issued a proclamation declaring U.S. neutrality in the conflict.

In 1945, Japanese-American Iva Toguri D'Aquino, suspected of being wartime broadcaster "Tokyo Rose," was arrested in Yokohama. (D'Aquino was later convicted of treason and served six years in prison; she was pardoned in 1977 by President Gerald R. Ford.)

In 1961, President John F. Kennedy signed legislation making aircraft hijackings a federal crime.

In 1975, President Gerald R. Ford escaped an attempt on his life by Lynette "Squeaky" Fromme, a disciple of Charles Manson, in Sacramento, Calif.

In 1986, four hijackers who had seized a Pan Am jumbo jet on the ground in Karachi, Pakistan, opened fire when the lights inside the plane failed; a total of 22 people were killed in the hijacking.

In 1991, the 35th annual Naval Aviation Symposium held by the Tailhook Association opened in Las Vegas. (The gathering was marred by reports that dozens of people, most of them women, had been sexually assaulted or otherwise harassed during the meeting.)

Ten years ago: Mexican President Vicente Fox arrived at the White House as the first state visitor of the Bush presidency. Peru's attorney general filed homicide charges against Alberto Fujimori, linking the ex-president to two massacres by paramilitary death squads in the early 1990s. (Fujimori was later convicted of crimes against humanity and sentenced to 25 years in prison.) Sports commentator Heywood Hale Broun died in Kingston, N.Y., at age 83.

Five years ago: A cook was charged with shooting and dismembering the owner of a Maine bed-and-breakfast and three other people in a Labor Day weekend rampage (Christian Nielsen was later sentenced to life in prison). Felipe Calderon was declared Mexico's president-elect after two months of uncertainty over a disputed election. Boeing executive Alan Mulally was named president and CEO of Ford Motor Co., succeeding Bill Ford, the great-grandson of founder Henry Ford.

One year ago: A Los Angeles police officer shot and killed Manuel Jaminez, a Guatemalan immigrant, in a case that sparked angry protests. (A civilian oversight panel later said the officer was justified in using deadly force against Jaminez, who witnessses said was drunk and threatening passersby with a knife.) Jefferson Thomas, one of nine black students to integrate a Little Rock high school in America's first major battle over school segregation, died in Columbus, Ohio, at age 67.

'30 Minutes or Less' no all-time great, but still brings the laughter

"30 Minutes or Less" is an actionfrom comedy the same team that brought us Zombieland a couple of years back, specifically director Ruben Fleischer and star Jesse Eisenberg.

This time out Eisenberg stars as Nick, a slacker who still delivers pizza

and gets high while all his other friends have actually grown up. When Nick delivers a pizza to Dwayne (Danny McBride of "Pineapple Express") and Travis (Nick Swardson of, well, any recent Adam Sandler film) he gets more than he bargained for — specifically, he gets knocked out and wakes up with a bomb strapped to his chest.

Dwayne and Travis tell Nick that if he wants to live he has to rob and bank and bring them \$100,000, with which they plan to use to hire an assassin (Michael Pena, "The Lincoln Lawyer") to kill

Dwayne's dad (Fred Ward, "Tremors"). Nick employs his best friend Chet (Aziz Ansari, "Parks and Recreation") to help him rob the bank, and the duo embark on a hilarious adventure.

If the plot of "30 Minutes or Less" seems familiar, its because it happened a few years back in real life. A pizza delivery man robbed a bank wearing a bomb vest and claimed that two men kidnapped him and strapped the bomb to him. In that situation the bomb went off killing the pizza delivery man. (Before you feel to sorry for him, know that the FBI later identified him as a co-conspirator.) Apparently, the screenwriters, Michael Diliberti and Matthew Sullivan heard the story and thought it would make a great comedy.

For the most part they succeed. Everything with Jesse Eisenberg and Aziz Ansari works great. They are a wonderful duo and come across as lifelong friends. It helps that Ansari is one of the funniest comedians of our time and steals almost every scene he is in. Their adventure trying to rob the bank, get away with it, and not blow up are the backbone of the movie, and each scene with them is great.

Unfortunately, most of the scenes with McBride and Swardson fall flat. It's strange because McBride and Swardson are each hilarious and entertaining in their own right, but something between them doesn't feel right. While some of their interactions are humorous, none of it reaches the levels of enjoyment that come from the rest of the film. Their scene seem to drag on and in the end drag the film down a bit.

While Fleischer and Eisenberg's last collaboration, Zombieland, was one of the best movies of 2009, "30 Minutes" ends up just being an entertaining way to spend an hour and a half. It's not a movie you want to see repeatedly, but one you'll be glad you saw it once as it is quite funny.



NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING ON GRAY COUNTY APPRAISAL DISTRICT PROPOSED BUDGET

The following notice publication is required by House Bill 432, passed by the 71st Legislature in 1939, effective September 1, 1989.

The Gray County Appraisal District held a public hearing on the proposed budget for the 2012 fiscal year, on August 31, 2011.

The public hearing was recessed on August 31, 2011 @ 10:30 A.M. until 8:30 A.M. on September 8, 2011, at which time the Board will reconvene.

The following is a summary of the Appraisal District budget in the manner and form prescribed by Section 6.062 of the Texas Property Tax Code:

The total amount of the proposed budget is \$ 699,151.

The total decrease over the current year's budget is - \$15,550.

The number of employees compensated under the current budget is 10 (full-time employees).


The number of employees compensated under the proposed budget will be 9 (full-time employees).

The change in the proposed budget is due to cost savings in normal operation expenses.

The Appraisal District is supported solely by payments from the local taxing units served by the Appraisal District.

If approved by the Appraisal District Board of Directors at a public hearing, this proposed budget will take effect automatically unless disapproved by the governing bodies of the county, school districts, cities and towns and Water District served by the Appraisal District.

A copy of the proposed budget is available for public inspection in the office of each of these governing bodies.



The first Labor Day in the United States was observed on September 5, 1882, by the Central Labor Union of New York. The origins of Labor Day can be traced back to Canada when, in December 1872 a parade was staged in support of the Toronto Typographical Union's strike for a 58-hour work-week. Ten years later, American Peter J. McGuire, co-founder of the American Federation of Labor, was asked to speak at a labour festival in Toronto, Canada on July 22, 1882. Returning to the United States, McGuire and the Knights of Labor organized a similar parade based on the Canadian event on September 5, 1882 in New York City, USA. It became a federal holiday in 1894, when, following the deaths of a number of workers at the hands of the U.S. military and U.S. Marshals during the Pullman Strike, President Grover Cleveland put reconciliation with the labor movement as a top political priority. Fearing further conflict, legislation making Labor Day a national holiday was rushed through Congress unanimously and signed into law a mere six days after the end of the strike. The September date originally chosen by the CLU of New York and observed by many of the nation's trade unions for the past several years was selected rather than the more widespread International Workers' Day because Cleveland was concerned that observance of the latter would stir up negative emotions linked to the Haymarket Affair, which it had been observed to commemorate. All U.S. states, the District of Columbia, and the territories have made it a statutory holiday.







PAMPA Harvesters

Three first quarter turnovers too much for Pampa

Starting with their scrimmage against Palo Duro, the Pampa Harvesters have faced strong defenses with several returning players. The No. 24 Lubbock Estacado Matadors lived up to the hype. Three first quarter turnovers put Pampa in an early hole that it couldn't escape in a 28-3 loss Friday at Lowery Field.

Head coach Heath Parker said the defense let Estacado's speed get away from them.

"They scored on the first play of the game" Parker said. "Then we get a good drive going and they get an interception and take it back for another score."

The Matadors struck immediately as Shaquille Bogus threw an 80-yard touchdown pass to Ti Russell. The kick failed, but Estacado took a 6-0 lead with 11:45 left in the first. The Harvesters first possession ended quickly, too, but not in a positive way. Junior Ryan Smith fumbled and gave Estacado the ball at Pampa's 39.

Pampa's defense stepped up and kept it a one-score game as it forced a three and out. The Harvesters looked like they evened the score as senior Trace Carter took a screen pass 87 yards for a touchdown, but it was called back for holding. Senior quarter-

back Reid Miller was able to keep the offense moving as he completed his next two passes to senior Latigo Collins, putting Pampa at the Estacado 28. The drive ended as Jalen Moore picked off a screen-pass and returned it 70 yards for a touchdown.

Parker said his team knew they would have a tough time in the red zone against Estacado's defense.

"We knew we weren't going to get big chunks of yards," Parker said. "We knew we had to manage our first downs and get three or four yards. We weren't able to convert."

On their second possession, Pampa started moving the ball well, but again, it ended with a turnover. On second down and 16, Miller threw his second interception in the endzone. Estacado led 12-0 after the first.

The Matadors responded with a 10-play drive that ended with Robert Lee scoring on a 10-yard run. Lee converted the two-point conversion giving Estacado a 20-0 lead with 11:23 left in the half.

Neither team scored the rest of the half. Estacado had a chance at the end of the half to increase its lead but Taylor Woods intercepted Bogus' pass in the end zone as time expired.

In the second half, Estacado quickly grabbed the momentum. Pampa went three-and-out on its first possession. The Matadors went on a 13-play, 75-yard drive that took about seven minutes. Bogus capped off the drive with an eight-yard run expanding Estacado's lead to 26-0 with 3:55 left in the third.

The Harvesters (1-1) got on the board with 1:26 left in the game as senior Colten Adams kicked a 21-yard field goal.

Pampa opens its home season next week against the Randall Raiders (2-0). Parker said his team knows it will be a challenge.

"Some people think Randall is the best team in the country," Parker said. "We certainly are looking forward to playing at home and hope we can beat Randall."





Boren: multiple leagues interested in OU

NORMAN, Okla. (AP) — University of Oklahoma president David Boren says multiple conferences have shown interest in the Sooners recently and he expects to decide whether to leave the Big 12 or not within the next three weeks.

Boren said Friday that Oklahoma is seeking stability in its conference relationship with "partners that are both outstanding athletically and academically as well because a conference that's strong

is not only stable but it's one in which there are multiple relationships, along with sports, between the university members."

He said he tried to prevent Texas A&M from leaving the Big 12 and was disappointed the Aggies announced this week they would seek to join another conference—most likely the SEC—by next July.

"Of course, we have some great partners in the existing Big 12.

We have interest from other conferences and other universities, so it's really a tribute to the strength of our program at the University of Oklahoma that there is so much interest in us," Boren said.

"So, we have to carefully evaluate the various comments that are being made to us and the various possibilities that are being shown to us before we decide what's best for the university to do."

Again, I have no problem with Randy's or his family's beliefs; I just don't want them impressed on my children's young minds. What can we do? -- A MIND OF MY OWN

DEAR MIND OF YOUR OWN: You can part friends and agree to disagree. If Randy wants an "ideal Christian family" in which he raises his children "on his terms and with his religious beliefs," there will be no compromise. And if you are adamant that your children choose their own beliefs when they're old enough to understand, you -- and they -- will be better off if the father you choose for them has similar beliefs.

DEAR ABBY: My friend and roommate "Kristina" is a great person with a big heart. However, one of her "quirks" is starting to bother me, and I'm not sure how to deal



Last year, troopers arrested 718 people for DWI during the Labor Day holiday. Troopers also wrote 12,065 speeding citations; 2,056 seat belt/child restraint tickets; and 1,943 no insurance citations.

During the Labor Day holiday, DPS also is a participant in Operation CARE - Combined Accident Reduction Effort - a nationwide effort by police agencies to reduce fatalities during holidays.

coins always bring big premiums according to the ICCA. Silver dollars are also very sought after nowadays.

Other types of items the ICCA will be purchasing during this event include U.S. currency, gold bullion, investment gold, silver bars, silver rounds, proof sets, etc. Even foreign coins are sought after and will be purchased.

Also at this event anyone can sell their gold jewelry, dental gold or anything made of gold on the spot. Gold is currently trading at Record Highs. Bring anything you think might be gold and the collectors will examine, test and price it for free. 


