

City budget passes on first reading

Yesterday, City Commissioners approved their budget and tax rate for the 2011-2012 fiscal year upon an initial reading. A second reading will take place on September 20 at 4 p.m. during a special meeting, when commissioners will make the final vote on these financial matters.

As it stands, next year's tax rate will remain at \$.621027 per \$100 valuation of property

"The citizens should approve this and think this is really a good thing. because these days and times, we really are in a very serious condition nationwide," said Commissioner Robert Dixon, who said that the city should be proud "any time that we can come up and not have to raise taxes to meet our obligations."

In other financial business, commissioners approved the Pampa Economic Development Corporation's budget for the upcoming fiscal year.

The city then revisited and made changes to its Drought Contingency Plan, in accordance with Texas Commission for Environmental Quality requirements

Director of Public Works Donny Hooper explained the mandated changes as an effect of the city using additional water sources not listed in the previous plan.

"This plan was originally written before the Roberts County Well Field went online, so our source of water that was triggered in drought stages was Lake Meredith," he said. "Now that the Roberts County Well Field is online and that water is combined with Lake Meredith water that comes to member cities, it's added another water source that needs to be listed as a triggering mechanism for us to go into stage two or three.

Pampa's current Drought Contingency plan only lists Lake Meredith as a water source for Pampa. CITY cont. on page 3



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

real, authentic music experiences," Dean said. "Just me and the guitar."

The close setting, Dean said, offers both performer and audience a chance to really connect with each other.

"Your body language plays into your performance," Dean said. "People can see your eyes. They can see your face. They feel like they're in your living room. There's not a big overwhelming band to cover up what the artist is singing about. You can hear the lyrics. You can hear the work that's been put in to writing these songs, and you can get a really deeper and richer experience. That's really what try to convey.

"(People) really get to hear you sing, and there's more improvisation that takes place because I don't have a band that I'm throwing a curveball or anything," he continued. "I get to feel for who the audience is, and I have an extensive catalog of songs to choose from. (Playing solo) helps me determine what people need to hear and need to feel in their hearts in real time... When people come to my concerts, they get to know me and I feel like I get to know them as well.

It's a connection that Dean is looking to forge on the back of his blue collar background, something that looks to play well with the Pampa audience.

"I do think I'm very much blue collar, very much working class," Dean said. "It's what I sing about. People like that, too, I think need a little bit of inspiration in their lives to say how they're living is good and positive. It's a noble life. You may not be raking in the millions, or whatever, but if you're working hard, raising a good family and you're doing your part in the community, then you're part of that blue collar class and you should have some music that's just for you."

That ethic is reflected both in his lyrics and in the way he now produces his music, Dean said. Currently, instead of working with a record label like most musicians, he's working with Naturipe, a farmer-owned partnership of berry growers. His latest EP, "Earning our Place on Earth"

Naturipe's backing. They're a produce company with a message to get ouin the fact that there are 700 family farms that sell underthe Naturipe brand," Dean said. "They want to pay tribute to the fact that, in a lot of ways, they're locally grown produce. I help them get their message out, and in return, they fund my music projects.

"In this case, I tailor some of my content around the family farm. For example, one of my songs is called 'The. Seed.' It's one of the best songs I've ever heard, and it's ¿, song that needed to be heard. They empowered me to continue to make new music, and I in turn help them tell the consumer about their company and what they stand for ance that they're a charitable company as well."

Dean said that Thursday's show will be more than just a concert, but a display of 'the art of the one-man solc, troubadour presentation,' with a dash of showmanshir sprinkled in between the crooning and plucking.

Craftsmanship of playing well and singing well is something I try to showcase. If I could sing 'Let Them Be Little' and get a dad to take one day off from work and stress to his kid's baseball game, if that song would do something like that, then I feel like I've done my part. Perry: Romney sounds liberal

BOSTON (AP) - A day after they clashed at a GOP presidential debate, Texas Gov. Rick Perry told conservatives in rival Mitt Romney's home state that their former governor sounds like a liberal.

And without naming him directly, Perry said Romney has changed his position on Social Security

"Other candidates in this race have used words like

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'fraud' and compared it to a criminal enterprise," Perry said, referencing language Romney used in his book to discuss issues involving Social Security. "Under the media spotlight, they change their tune and they start sounding like liberals."

Perry made the comments at a dinner hosted by a Massachusetts conservative think tank, roughly a mile from Romney's campaign headquarters.

He did not clarify how Romney sounds like a liberal, nor did he take questions from voters or reporters.

Deputy shoots, kills teen

HOUSTON (AP) — A sheriff's deputy shot and killed a teenager with a knife at a home northeast of Houston Tuesday.

The Harris County Sheriff's Office says deputy Bryan Angelle responded to a home in the Crosby area after a neighbor called 911 to report a physical confrontation between 17-year-old Jose Luis Polanco and his mother.

Spokeswoman Christina Garza told the Houston Chronicle (http://bit.ly/oYDP9U) that Angelle was talking to Polanco, but at some point the boy moved at him with a knife. Angelle, fearing for his life, fired at least twice and Polanco died at the scene.

The Harris County Sheriff's Office and District Attorney's Office will investigate the case.

Nevada governor endorses Perry

CARSON CITY, Nev. (AP) - Nevada Gov. Brian Sandoval is endorsing his friend, Texas Gov. Rick Perry, in the 2012 presidential race.

Sandoval is a Republican. He released a statement Tuesday endorsing the GOP front-runner.

Sandoval said Perry understands the role of government and the U.S. economy. He also said Perry has the strongest record of job creation, fiscal discipline and executive branch leadership among the field of candi-

Perry became Texas governor in 2000 when George W. Bush became president. He is serving his third term. Perry declared his candidacy a month ago.

GOP defends redistricting map

SAN ANTONIO (AP) - Republican state Rep. Burt Solomons says a newly drawn redistricting map disputed by Democrats reflects the result of a Texas Legislature dominated by GOP seats.

Solomons testified Tuesday in a federal lawsuit over the map passed this summer. Democrats and minority groups are asking a three-judge panel to throw out the newly drawn voting districts that Gov. Rick Perry signed

Solomons chaired the House Redistricting Committee. He testified there were no prejudices drawn into the map and that his committee leaned heavily on lawmakers from both parties to submit proposed maps from their areas.

Democrats rested their case Monday with the testimony of U.S. Rep. Sheila Jackson Lee. Closing arguments are expected later this week.

Lawmakers slam pollution rule

AUSTIN (AP) — Texas lawmakers have slammed the EPA over a new pollution rule they say will cause electricity shortages and cost hundreds of jobs. But it appears they are ignoring the agency's attempts to work closely with energy providers to prevent problems.

The lawmakers reiterated at a committee meeting Tuesday accusations made by Gov. Rick Perry, a leading GOP presidential candidate. Perry says EPA regulations cost industry millions of dollars in a weak economy and could force them to cut jobs.

Texas' largest energy provider, Luminant, announced Monday it would shut down generators and lay off 500 jobs to comply with a new set of rules that go into effect in January. The rules are aimed at cutting smog and acidrain causing emissions in Texas and 26 other states.

Pet monkeys free after wildfires

PLANTERSVILLE (AP) - A pet monkey reported on the loose during wildfires north of Houston has bitten a game warden.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department spokesman Mike Cox said Tuesday the animal that bit Karin Apple, who suffered a puncture wound on her thumb, is one of several rhesus monkeys being sought.

Wildfires last week in Grimes, Waller and Montgomery counties forced evacuations. Cox says game officials aren't sure if the owner released the monkeys or whether the animals somehow got loose.

Cox told The Associated Press that Apple on Sunday spotted a monkey in a tree near Plantersville and attempted to lure the animal into a cage, but she was attacked. Apple was treated and released from a hospital.

Any captured monkeys will be turned over to state animal health officials.

Amarilloan guilty of fraud

AMARILLO (AP) — A Texas businessman has been sentenced to 15 years in prison in a nearly \$7 million securities fraud case targeting senior citizens

A judge in Amarillo on Monday sentenced 77-year-old John Langford, who ran an insurance company and a property management firm, in addition to selling securi-

Prosecutor Randall Sims says Langford was using new investment funds to pay off previous clients.

Langford in July pleaded guilty in the fraud investigation. He was sentenced to seven 15-year prison terms for fraudulent sale of securities, four 10-year terms for acting as a dealer or agent without registering and four more 10-year terms for selling unregistered securities. The prison terms will be served concurrently.

Q: The pewter dish in this photo belonged to my mother. It is 5 inches in diameter and 1 3/4 inches deep. Marked on the bottom are the letters "web" and the number

I would never part with it, but would like to know what was it used for, who made it and if it has any value.

A: You have a porringer. Porringers were used in Colonial times to serve porridge. Those made by Paul Revere are very famous and desirable. Web Silver Co., located in Philadelphia, Pa., made yours. They were founded around 1950 and are still in business. Web made both pewter and sterling objects. The number "1176" is a design number.

Your porringer was made in the mid 20th century and would probably be worth \$25 to \$50.


Q: I have enclosed a photo of the mark that is on the bottom of my Irish Belleek cream pitcher. The pitcher stands almost 4 inches tall and is decorated with an embossed pattern of grapes, vines and a man's face. It is in perfect

What can you tell me about the vintage and value of my pitcher?

A: Irish Belleek has been made in County Fermanagh, Ireland, since 1857. The company was founded by David McBurney and Robert Armstrong. Mask is the name of the pattern and many identify it as the face of the god of wine, Bacchus. There is a matching open sugar bowl and teapot. Belleek has used 14 marks. Over the years, the marks have appeared in a variety of colors including black, green, blue and gold. Your mark is the 5th green mark and was used from 1955 to 1965. Seashells, seahorses, dolphins, shamrocks and Celtic designs have been some of the most popular motifs

Your circa 1955 pitcher would probably be worth \$65 to \$75.

Q: Around 30 years ago, I bought a J & P Coats wood spool cabinet. It has 6 drawers all with black mushroom wood pulls. The drawers are marked from top to bottom: "J & P Coats, Spool Cotton, Assorted Colors, White, Black and Best Six Cord." Each drawer is 2 inches deep and the overall

In 1321, Italian poet Dante Alighieri died in Ravenna; he was believed to have been 56.

In 1861, the first naval engagement of the Civil War took place as the USS Colorado attacked and sank the Confederate private schooner Judah off Pensacola, Fla.

In 1901, President William McKinley died in Buffalo, N.Y., of gunshot wounds inflicted by an assassin. Vice President Theodore Roosevelt succeeded him

In 1927, modern dance pioneer Isadora Duncan died in Nice, France, when her scarf became entangled in a wheel of the sports car she was riding in.

In 1941, Vermont passed a resolution enabling its servicemen to receive wartime bonuses by declaring the U.S. to be in a state of armed conflict, giving rise to headlines that Vermont had "declared war on Germany.

In 1982, Princess Grace of Monaco, formerly actress Grace Kelly, died at age 52 of injuries from a car crash the day before; Lebanon's presidentelect, Bashir Gemayel, was killed by a bomb.

In 1991, the government of South Africa, the African National Congress and the Inkatha Freedom Party signed a national peace pact.



Jobs plan splits leaders of strapped states

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo. (AP) - President Barack Obama's latest jobs plan calls for \$130 billion in aid to state and local governments, providing either a welcome infusion of cash for those struggling with budget gaps, government layoffs and crumbling roads or merely a temporary patch for budget holes that are likely to remain long after the federal money runs out.

The perspective of governors and state lawmakers varies but often follows political affiliation, with Democrats generally praising Obama's plan and Republicans remaining skeptical.

"It's a no-brainer: Congress should pass the bill. Now," said California Gov. Jerry Brown, a Democrat, whose state would receive some \$13 billion for construction projects and teaching and public safety jobs at a time when it has the nation's second highest unemployment rate.

Many Republican lawmakers and governors are less enthusiastic about accepting the federal money, especially if it locks in costs they will have to account for once the aid runs

"If we're given the flexibility to spend it as we see fit and not as they see fit, I could see some benefit," particularly for long-delayed infrastructure projects, said Missouri House Budget Committee Chairman Ryan Silvey, a Republican. "I'm not a big fan of using one-time money for ongoing expenses. I think that's what the state should be getting away from, not getting deeper into."

Obama's plan has to clear a politically divided Congress, which could scuttle it entirely or enact bits and pieces of it. As envisioned by Obama, state and local governments would receive \$50 billion for transportation projects, \$35 billion for school, police and fire department payrolls, \$30 billion to modernize public schools and community colleges, and \$15 billion to refurbish vacant and foreclosed homes or businesses.

It would mark the second, sizable infusion of federal cash to states in less than three years, coming just as they are burning through the last of the billions of dollars they received under the 2009 stimulus act.

In many cases, states used the original stimulus money to fill in for declining tax revenue and lessen or delay spending cuts for public schools, health care programs and other services. But those budget holes remain in many states as high unemployment persists and government tax revenue remains lackluster.

With another round of money, "the federal government may be able to play a critical role in helping states close their budget gaps," said David Adkins, executive director of the Council of State Governments.

But he said the prospects for receiving the money appear "very, very slim" given the focus on reducing government spending among Republicans in Congress. He said state government leaders are more interested in long-term stable federal funding for transportation projects and education programs.

In New Mexico, Democratic state Sen. John Arthur Smith said provisions of the Obama proposal, such as infrastructure financing for highways and aid to schools, should provide a short-term economic boost for the state. But he worries that it could create a future financial squeeze it state government needs to replace the federal money when the program

He said state spending had to be cut this year to help close a \$200 million budget gap created when federal stimulus money ran out.

"I'm one of those who would rather confront the enemy at hand right now," Smith said. "I don't think we're elected to push the issue down the road."

State budget officials have only estimates of how much they would receive under the Obama proposal. which was announced Thursday to a joint session of Congress. They are waiting to learn exactly how those dollars would be disbursed and what strings, if any, would be attached.

Some Republican governors already have established a precedent of rejecting portions of the federal stimulus money.

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How Texas Medicaid wasted vast sums lethally

Both as governor of Texas and as the leading Republican presidential candidate, Rick Perry has established himself as a harsh critic of federal programs -- and, in particular, as a 'state's rights" advocate who accuses Washington of gross ineptitude and waste in providing services such as health care for the poor and elderly.

In his 2010 book "Fed Up" and in his campaign speeches, Perry has often asserted that the states, simply left to do the job without federal interference, could perform far better. The theme is highly popular, like Perry himself, in tea party circles.

"It is through states that the American people get the job done every day," he wrote in his book, "often in spite of a deeply flawed bureaucratic federal government." Late last year, when he proposed that Texas drop out of Medicaid altogether, he said: "We know how to deliver healthcare to more people in a less expensive way than what the federal government does. I need more states to stand up and say we don't want your strings attached. We don't want you down here telling us how to run our business.'

If only Texas could operate wholly independently of federal rules, he insisted, "you will see more people in the state of Texas who will have more coverage and frankly we'll save money at the end of the day, as will the federal government."

Although Perry was forced to abandon that scheme when a state report showed that leaving Medicaid would cost Texas billions (and leave even more Texans uninsured), he still claims that the federal government should stop trying to make sure that more Americans have health care, and that programs run solely by the states would be more efficient.

But lately the facts about Perry's own record as governor have begun to emerge


-- and they don't support his argument. Over the past several weeks, a Dallas TV station has exposed the "golden teeth" Medicaid scandal in Texas, now under investigation by the inspector general of the Department of Health and Human Services. The Perry appointees who run Medicaid have allowed hundreds of millions of dollars to be misspent on orthodontic braces for children who don't need them -- with huge profits for private dental clinics owned by Wall Street hedge funds.

Nor is that the only aspect of Perry's record that belies his boasting. One of the most embarrassing episodes during his first two terms as governor involved a plan to let private firms run Medicaid, replacing state employees. The privatization plan was an "innovation" that was supposed to save money. What it accomplished instead was to earn enormous sums for contractors like Deloitte Touche and Accenture (along with their Texas lobbyists), while costing taxpayers still more hundreds of millions of dollars -- and all without achieving its most basic objectives.

Four years after the plan was



\$1 million a month. Unfortunately this fiasco wasted more than money and time, as paperwork vanished and patients suffered. As the Statesman reported, it may well have cost a 14-year-old boy named Devante Johnson his life. Left without health insurance for several months because of the Texas Medicaid enrollment bureaucracy, the: Houston boy could not get treatment in time to save him from the kidney cancer that eventually killed him in March 2007.

spent using the old system, at roughly

While it isn't clear yet whether his administration's Medicaid operations were corrupt or incompetent or both, none of this has fazed Perry at all. He went on to reappoint the Texas health and human services commissioner who oversaw the entire mess - and then to run for president himself, as the populist who will "reform" Social Security, Medicare and, of course, Medicaid.

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Drug dealer to die for murders

HUNTSVILLE (AP) - Former drifter and drug dealer Steven Michael Woods was headed to the Texas death chamber Tuesday evening for a double killing more than a decade ago north of Dallas.

Woods, 31, acknowledged he was present in May 2001 when Ronald Whitehead, 21, and Bethena Brosz, 19, were fatally shot and had their throats slashed near a golf course in Denton County but insisted the murders were committed by another man, Marcus Rhodes.

Woods was tried first for the slayings, was convicted and sentenced to die. Rhodes then pleaded guilty and accepted a life prison term, avoiding a possible death sentence.

About eight hours before Woods was scheduled to be taken to the Texas death chamber, the U.S. Supreme Court rejected an appeal from his attorneys, clearing the way for the 10th execution in the state this year. Another lethal injection is scheduled for Thursday and two more were set for next week.

Woods had argued before the high court his legal help early in the appeals process was deficient and kept him from raising a claim of jury bias from his trial. The justices, without comment, turned him down.

In an interview last week outside death row, Woods told The Associated Press he was terrified of execution, was optimistic it wouldn't happen but was "fairly realistic as well.'

"I've seen a lot of my friends walk to

the gurney," he said.

Brosz and Whitehead, were found by golfers May 2, 2001, along a golf course road near The Colony, a North Dallas suburb midway between Dallas and Denton. Whitehead was shot six times in the head. Brosz was shot twice in the head and once in the knee. Both had their throats cut. Brosz was alive when she was found but died the following day

Witnesses testified at Woods' 2002 trial that he lured Whitehead to the isolated road on the pretense of a drug deal and killed him because he knew about another killing involving Woods two months earlier in California. Prosecutors said Brosz merely was at the wrong place at the wrong time and was killed because she was a witness to Whitehead's death.

Woods also blamed Rhodes for the California slaying.

"I was completely naïve at the time of the legal proceedings," Woods said last week. "Besides, I didn't do anything.

Woods said he and Rhodes, described by prosecutors as one of his drug customers, were high on LSD the night of the slavings. Asked if he could have committed the murders and not remember, Woods said although he was "under the influence, you know what you're doing."

He said as he was lighting a cigarette for Whitehead, Rhodes shot the man in the head, then shot Brosz. Witnesses at his trial said Woods told of planning to kill Whitehead and later bragged about the killings.

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rejected \$810 million in federal funding for a highspeed rail line between Madison and Milwaukee, and Ohio Gov. John Kasich turned down \$400 million for a rail project to connect Cincinnati, Cleveland and Columbus. Florida Gov. Gov. Rick Scott canceled a \$2 billion federal grant for a high-speed train between Orlando and Tampa, citing concern that state government would be locked into years of operating subsi-

A state-by-state breakdown of the president's plan shows that Florida could receive more than \$7.5 billion for schools, roads and other projects. That money would come into a state with a 10.7 percent unemployment rate and one of the nation's highest home foreclosure rates. But Scott spokesman Brian Burgess left open the possibility that the Florida governor could reject money under Obama's latest plan, especially if it added to the federal debt.

Republican Texas Gov. Rick Perry, who is running for president, dismissed Obama's proposal as wasteful spending and argued that budget cuts were the only way to help the economy.

"President Obama's call for nearly a half-trillion dollars in more government stimulus when America has more than \$14 trillion in debt is guided by his mistaken belief that we can spend our way to prosperity," Perry said.

Perry has a history of rejecting federal money that would require changes in state law. Last year he declined to accept \$550 million in additional unemployment funds because it would have required Texas to adopt a more generous program.

While it is not clear whether the Obama proposal would require Texas to rewrite its unemployment laws, it would extend the benefits of nearly 124,000 people in the state.

Kansas Gov. Sam Brownback, a Republican who as a U.S. senator voted against Obama's 2009 stimulus legislation, did not say whether Kansas would accept federal money under Obama's latest proposal. But he said the use of one-time revenue in the earlier stimulus program created budget problems for the state when the funding expired.

Other governors, particularly Democrats, welcomed the potential for more federal aid.

"We need all the help we can get," said Vermont Gov. Peter Shumlin, a Democrat whose state remains devastated by flooding from the remnants of Hurricane Irene.

"I think the hopes that we had for our recovery have been stalled for all kinds of reasons that are beyond Vermont's control," Shumlin told The Associated Press. "But it seems to me that the president's package for job growth and infrastructure investment is the right thing to help us avoid a double-dip recession."

Maryland Gov. Martin O'Malley, chairman of the Democratic Governors Association, said the president's proposal includes some job-creation ideas that have been supported previously by Democrats and Republicans.

"I think it's pretty much a nonpartisan idea that a modern economy requires modern investments in order to create jobs," O'Malley said. "There are



things that we know will get people back to work - rebuilding our infrastructure, rebuilding our schools, our bridges our tunnels. Ralph Martire, executive

director of the Chicagobased Center for Tax and Budget Accountability, said Obama's plan to provide \$4.5 billion for Illinois transit, construction projects and for teaching, police and firefighting jobs could help the state's economy, based on historical evidence.

"Spending money in the local economy creates a positive economic multiplier," he said.

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
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

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

Jesus, Jesus, Jesus, there is something about that



Do you know who Vinko Bogataj is? You may not know the name, but you probably have seen him on television. He was competing as a Yugoslavian entrant in Oberstdorf, West Germany, on March 21, 1970. A light snow was falling and he was ready for his third jump. Halfway down he realized the ramp was too fast. He tried to stop his jump, lost his balance and soared out of control off the end of the jump, turning, flipping and tumbling out of control. He crashed through the retaining fence, landed on his head amid a stunned group of spectators. Despite this amazing spectacular crash, he only suffered a mild concussion.

In his career Bogataj's best finish was 57th in 1969. He would have gone through life as an obscure athlete had it not been for a film crew from ABC's Wide World of Sports that ran footage for the next 30 years of Vinko Bogataj's spectacular crash with the words, "...and the agony of defeat." We all hurt when we saw it. He was asked to attend the 20th

Anniversary for Wide World of Sports in 1981. He was stunned when Muhammad Ali asked him for his autograph. Sometimes our best opportunities come from our most spectacular defeats in the past.

Failure is an experience we have all felt. So don't give up. Bogataj became a ski instructor and coached the 1991 World Champion ski jumper Franci Petek. Are you going to get up and get back in the game?

The Lady Harvesters (19-8) host Lubbock High Tuesday for their final non-district game.



"It's nice to be on the winning side," Corse said. "Especially beating Borger. Pampa visits Perryton 9 a.m. Saturday




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


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
