The newly adopted tax rate will be 52.96 cents per \$100 of taxable value, up from 48.71 cents.



pump," Evans said.

A full time position with a fire department comes with full time responsibility.

"I think, in all honesty, that we're held to a higher standard in this town," Evans said. "People look at us differently. We're professionals, we're to dress professionally, we're to act professionally, and I try to be that person, that they can call on me anytime day or night, even when I'm

As equipment operator, Evans maintains the trucks and gear around the station.

"Every morning, we check every truck. We make sure all of the equipment is gassed up, it's there, it's on a truck, it's functional, so when we do get a call, we're ready to respond. We try to keep our response time to less than three minutes anywhere in town," he said.

Functionality and preparedness are key, especially when safety is the watchword.

"As equipment operator, my job is not just to get (the firefighters) to the scene safely, through the scene safely, but get them home to their families safely," said Evans.

During a fire, he is busy preparing everything that the captain and crew will need to safely put out the flames.

"My job as equipment operator is setting the truck up, getting ready to get water to them. And then once I get the water established for them, I've got to get the fireplug hooked up to the hose, get any tools I need off there, whether it be pipes, hose, axes, spare bottles of air. Whatever tool they need, I need to have it there ready for them," Evans said.

"I don't like to leave my engine in case something does happen, because I do have guys inside. I'm monitoring what's going on inside, and I have radio traffic to take care of," he added.

Firefighting may be intense at times, but Evans is happy with his

"It's always been something that I like to do. It's kind of a thrill to go out and fight a fire. It's adrenaline," he said. "And to me, it's being able to give back to the community. It's a really rewarding job. You see people,

like a heart attack patient, and you get them to the hospital, and you see them weeks or maybe months later somewhere, and they give you a hug. So, the rewards are there. It's a very rewarding job. I've made a lot of .. friends, met a lot of people through the things we do. I mean, lifelong

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In his spare time, Evans loves being outdoors, fishing and hunting. He also works rebuilding trailers and other mechanic work.

"I can go down to the shop, build things out of metal," he said. "I just like creating things. I learned welding from my granddad. He always bestowed in me to learn, because if you get an education, it's the only thing they can't take away from

In fact, Evans has been able to take several classes through his work.

"I really don't consider myself a hero. I consider myself lucky to have a job that I love to come to every day," he said. "A lot of people call us heroes, and we're really not. We'rejust doing our job that we're paid to do and that we enjoy doing."



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3 mo. forecast: Warm and dry

WASHINGTON (AP) - The outlook for the next three months is bad news for drought-plagued Texas and its neighbors.

Texas is the center of a region of expected abovenormal temperatures that are expected to extend into Hispanics' voting strength New Mexico, Oklahoma, Kansas and Colorado, and could reach all the way to the western Great Lakes states, according to the October through December forecast released Thursday by the federal Climate Prediction

The outlook also calls for drier than normal conditions in that region, a weather pattern that likely will extend all across the Gulf Coast states to Georgia and South

Lung cancer rates decrease

ATLANTA (AP) - The West is leading a national decline in the rate of new lung cancer cases, with states like California and Texas accounting for much of the improvement -particularly in women.

Health officials credit lower smoking rates in Western states. Lung cancer has been declining in men for years, but the decline in women is much more recent. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reported Thursday that lung cancer rates among women decreased 2 percent from 2006 to 2008, but dropped 4 percent out

There were not declines in female lung cancer rates in every state, however. Only six states saw significant drops - California, Nevada, Oregon, Washington, Texas and Florida. That was enough to pull down the national

\$11M for lead paint safety

FORT WORTH (AP) - More than \$11 million has been earmarked for some Texas communities to help protect children from lead-based paint poisoning.

The Department of Housing and Urban Development on Thursday announced the funding for Austin, San Antonio, Houston and Harris County.

The grants are part of \$93 million in HUD funds available nationwide. HUD says the money will help clean lead and other health hazards in privately owned lowincome housing units, plus help with safety training.

Austin's share will be \$2.5 million, while San Antonio and Houston will each receive \$3 million. Harris County Public Health Services has been awarded \$2.7 million.

Texas gas prices slip 4 cents

HOUSTON (AP) - Retail gasoline prices have slipped 4 cents this week across Texas.

AAA Texas on Thursday reported that the average price at the gas pump is \$3.44 per gallon.

The association's weekly survey also found that the nationwide price of gasoline has declined 3 cents, to settle at \$3.62 per gallon.

AAA Texas says the most expensive gasoline in the state was in Amarillo, at \$3.53 per gallon. Fort Worth had the last expensive gasoline, at \$3.39. Spokeswoman Sarah Schimmer says the highest average price for gasoline this year in Texas happened May 13, at \$3.89 per gallon.

Toddler's hands glued to wall

DALLAS (AP) - A Texas toddler has been released from the hospital a week after her mother allegedly glued her hands to a wall.

The 2-year-old was in a coma for two days after the Sept. 7 incident.

Dallas police say her mother was mad about the youngster's potty training problems. The child was also kicked repeatedly in the stomach. Elizabeth Escalona remains jailed on a charge of felony injury to a child.

At a court hearing Wednesday, a Dallas County judge ordered that the toddler and her three siblings would stay in foster care. Some of the 22-year-old mother's friends told WFAA-TV that she snapped under the pressure.

Bridgestone agrees to \$28M fine

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Justice Department says Bridgestone Corp. has agreed to pay a \$28 million criminal fine for its roles in bid-rigging conspiracies and corrupt payments to Latin American officials that impacted prices for hundreds of millions of dollars' worth of marine hose and related products sold around the world.

The government says Bridgestone agreed to plead guilty to a two-count charge filed in federal court in Houston that alleges the company conspired to violate the Sherman Act and the Foreign Corrupt Practices Act.

The court papers say that from 1999 to 2007, Tokyoheadquartered Bridgestone conspired to fix prices and allocate market shares of marine hose in the United States and overseas. Marine hose is used to transfer oil between tankers and storage facilities.

NOV clears hurdle for Ameron

NEW YORK (AP) - National Oilwell Varco Inc. has cleared a regulatory hurdle toward its proposed acquisition of Ameron International Corp.

The Houston energy company said Thursday that the Justice Department waived the typical waiting period for buying Ameron's outstanding shares.

Ameron's shareholders still must approve the deal, however. A special meeting for Ameron shareholders is scheduled for Oct. 5.

National Oilwell Varco announced the \$772 million buyout proposal in July. Pasadena, Calif.-based Ameron produces fiberglass-composite pipe and specialty materials for the chemical, industrial, energy, transportation and other markets, and National Oilwell said it's interested in Ameron for its seawater handling systems.

The company is offering \$85 per share for Ameron stock. That's a premium of 28 percent from Ameron's share value immediately preceding the announcement.

Ameron shares added 38 cents to \$84.88 in morning trading Thursday while National Oilwell shares gained 73 cents, or 1.1 percent, to \$65.55.

The deal is expected to close in the fourth quarter and to add to National Oilwell's earnings next year. The boards of directors for both companies already have approved the acquisition.

Federal trial over Texas voting map approaches end

SAN ANTONIO (AP) - Minority groups made a final push Thursday to have new redistricting maps tossed out, arguing in court that the new election lines violate federal law by diminishing and failing to recognize a surge in their population over the past decade in Texas.

Plaintiffs, during closing arguments before a panel of three federal judges, said the new. Republicandrawn voting districts in Texas should be redrawn because the maps pack Hispanics into white districts, illegally diluting their voting power. The groups also want more districts in which Latinos have enough voting strength to select their candidates of choice.

"Latinos will vote for candidates who appeal to their values and con-

cerns," said Nina Perales, an attorney for the Mexican American Legal Defense and Education Fund. "Latinos deserve the opportunity to elect a candidate of their choosing and to have candidates of all parties compete for their vote."

The new congressional map was drawn with the goal of protecting and possibly expanding Texas Republicans' 23-9 majority in Washington.

The Texas attorney general's office said the map wasn't drawn with prejudice and preserves the voting power of minorities. During the nine-day trial, Republicans testified that alternatives offered by minority groups were drawn in a way that violated Texas law by splitting counties.

In closing arguments, Perales argued that traditional blocs of Hispanic

voters were intentionally weakened in Nueces, Cameron and Hidalgo counties and in El Paso County. In each case, she said there was enough Hispanic population to create new Hispanie opportunity districts.

"All the preconditions for creating additional Latino opportunity districts are there, but the state did not create a single additional district in either the state House or the congressional plan," she said.

Texas received four new seats in the U.S. House following the last census population count. That was more than any other state and came in the wake of a population boom overwhelmingly driven by Hispanics.


Plaintiffs argued that the surge in Hispanic growth warranted those residents getting more representation in new districts, yet

the Republican plan splits Hispanic and black communities so conservative white residents would be more likely to win seats in Congress.

The court isn't expected to issue a ruling for several weeks.

Under the Voting Rights Act, new Texas maps must be cleared by the U.S. Department of Justice to ensure the changes do not diminish minority representation. That case is pending in Washington.





DALLAS (AP) - The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency has added an inactive South Texas refinery to its national priorities list of Superfund cleanup sites.

The EPA said Thursday that the Falcon Refinery in San. Patricio County has led to the contamination of nearby wetlands, the Redfish Bay fishery and potential habitat for threatened or endangered species.

The agency said the refinery produced naphtha, jet fuel, kerosene, diesel and fuel oil when it was operational.

The EPA also said an inactive used oil processor in Pasadena has been pro-

posed for the list. The US Oil Recovery site operated on two separate parcels of land in the Houston sub-

The Superfund is the federal program that investigates and cleans up the country's most complex, uncontrolled or hazardous waste sites.

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



Perry Tales: Rick is not who he says he is

Presidential wannabe Rick Perry is flitting all around the country -hither, thither and yon -- spreading little "Perry Tales" about himself and the many wonders he has worked as governor of Texas.

His top Perry Tale is a creationist story about what he has modestly branded "The Texas Miracle." While the rest of the country is mired in joblessness, says the miracle worker, his state has added 1.2 million jobs during his 10-year tenure.

I've built "a job-creating machine," the governor gushed during one of his recent flits across Iowa, and a Perry PR aide smugly added, "The governor's job creation record speaks for itself.

Actually, it doesn't. Far from having the best unemployment rate in the nation, the Lone Star State ranks a middling 26th, behind New York, Massachusetts and other states whose "liberal" governments he routinely mocks.

Even more damning, Perry's Texas is not creating nearly enough jobs to keep up with its fast-growing population. Those 1.2 million new positions are 629,000 short of the jobs needed just to bring the state's employment level back up to where it was in 2007. Some miracle.

Worse, probe even a millimeter into the million-jobs number that he is sprinkling around like fairy dust, and you'll learn that Perry's jobs are mostly "jobettes" that can't sustain a family. They come with very low pay, no health care or pension, and no employment security, labor rights or upward mobility -- many are only part-time and/or temporary positions.

Here's a particularly revealing stat that the Perry pixies don't want us to

see: On his watch as governor, Texas added more minimum wage jobs than all the other 49 states combined. More than half a million Texans now work for \$7.25 an hour or less. He can brag that he's brought Texans down into a tie with Mississippi for the highest percentage of work-

ers reduced to poverty pay. Spreading even more fairy dust, Perry claims that his Texas Miracle is the result of him keeping the government out of the private sector's way. But

peek behind that ideological curtain, and you'll find this startling fact: During Perry's decade, the greatest job growth by far has come from the public sector, which has more than doubled the number of new jobs created by the private sector.

One out of six employed Texans are now teachers, police officers, highway engineers, military personnel or other government workers -and many of these jobs were created with the federal money that Perrythe-candidate now loudly denounces. Indeed, he's running around ranting about President Obama's stimulus program, but he gladly accepted the third highest amount of stimulus funds taken by the 50 states. There's his miracle.

Interestingly, even his tea-partyish hatred -- nay, loathing! -- of big government's intrusion into the lives of ordinary citizens turns out to be just another Perry Tale. In fact, there would be no Rick Perry without the steady "intrusion" of government into his life.

Local taxpavers in Haskell County put him through their public school system -- for free. He and his family were dry-land cotton farmers, and federal taxpayers helped support them with thousands of dollars in crop subsidies -- Perry personally took \$80,000 in farm payments.

State and federal taxpayers financed his college education at Texas A&M, even giving him the extracurricular opportunity to be a cheerleader. Upon graduation, he spent four years on

the federal payroll as an Air Force transport pilot who never did any combat duty.

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Perry literally puts the "hype" in hypocrisy. Forget his tall tales and political B.S. -- look at what he actu-





Select and replace kitchen cabinet fronts

Dear Pat: I would love to remodel my ugly and outdated kitchen, but right now it is just not in my budget. How can I make my kitchen seem like it was remodeled without dipping into too much of my savings? -Shawna L.

Dear Shawna: There are so many ways to make a kitchen trendy and up-to-date without having it completely remodeled. Even a coat of paint can change the look and feel of any room. If you were thinking more along the lines of new hinges, hardware or doors for your cabinets, these can also give a remodeled look at minimal expenditure.

Choose replacement doors that go with the new look you are trying to create. Make a few days to visit home shows in your area and write down styles and colors you think will fit your decor. Kitchen showroom shops are excellent resources, but even just visiting home center stores can give you some ideas. Flip through magazines for kitchen designs you find attractive.

Once you have decided on the replacement cabinet parts, you are ready to install them. They are easy to install with the only tricky part being getting the new doors to hang straight. This is the most time-consuming part of the job, and installing doors on an 8-foot section should take about six hours.

If you are planning to use your old hinges on the new doors and the doors are about the same sizes, leave the hinges attached to the face frame. But if you decide to use new hinges, take the old doors and hinges off of the frame.

A good idea to help keep the doors straight is to use masking tape along the top of the old door frame. Use the tape as a guide for the new door. Even if it is not the same size as the old one, it is still nice to have a point of reference. The new doors should be centered side-to-side over the cabinet opening and overhang the top and bottom by 2 to 5 inches.

If you are up for it, an even better way to assure the doors will be straight is to build a jig to hold the doors at the correct height. After you think the doors will be straight, mark the location of the hinges on the new doors with a pencil, or you

can use a nail to mark the holes to be drilled.

Drill some pilot holes in the replacement doors, making sure you do not to drill through the other side of the door. Next anchor the hinges in place to the door using a hand screwdriver to tighten the

To fasten the door to the cabinet, place the door on the frame and hold the hinges against the frame. Mark and drill pilot holes once again, only this time into the cabinet

frame. Make sure you are making new holes and not using the old ones, which won't secure the door as well. Finally secure the hinges with the appropriate screws.

Once you have the doors installed, add the decorative handles, knobs or other hardware that will compliment your kitchen. Attach those using the manufacturer instructions.

Tools and materials required: tape measure, screwdriver, power drill, drill bits, safety goggles, replacement doors, hinges, screws.


e do a good job This is Earnhardt's fourth appearance in the Chase which began in 2004. He finished fifth that year and also in

similar position as Pampa. "Every team has lost people from last


year," Reagan said.

"It's going to be really tight," Alexander said. "If our sophomores can get their scores lower we might be able to do bet-


Segura said he is not sure how district will play out but expects his team to be competitive.

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

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
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
