HOUSTON (AP) - Texas inmates who are set to b executed will no longer get their choice of last meals, a tate senator became miffed over an expansive reques from a man condemned for a notorious dragging death. Lawrence Russell Brewer, who was executed Wednesday for the hate crime slaying of James Byrd Jr. more than a decade ago, asked for two chicken fried

pound of barbecue, three fajitas, a meat lover's pizza, a pint of ice cream and a slab of peanut butter fudige with
crushed peanuts. Prison officials said Brewer didn't eat crushed pe
