## Roberts Co. wreck takes life of Pampa man

Yesterday morning at around 7:24 a.m., a collision three miles west of Miami in Roberts County resulted in a fatality involving a Pampa man, as well as the hospitalization of another driver.

According to Trooper David Stambaugh of the Texas Department of Public Safety, the accident occurred when a 2001 Lincoln Navigator, driven by Juan Santos Ortega of Pampa, crossed the center stripes while traveling west-bound on Highway 60.

The Lincoln hit a 2001 Peterbilt semi rig, driven by William Elbert Wade III, head on.

The semi, which was towing an empty oilfield cargo tanker, became fully engulfed in flames.

Ortega, 33, was pronounced dead on the scene. Wade, 64, was taken by Miami EMS to Lifestar, then was transported to the University Medical Center in Lubbock, where he is undergoing treatment in the Timothy J. Harnar Burn Unit.

The accident is still under investigation.

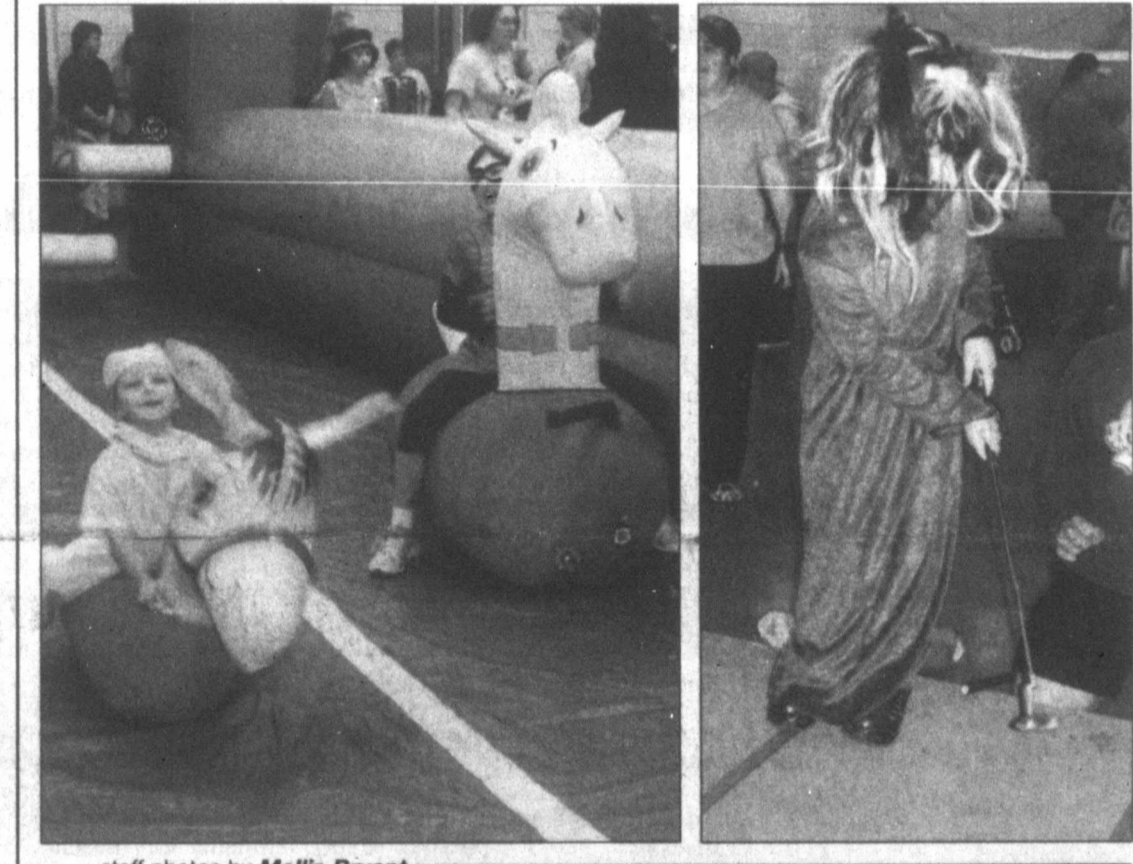

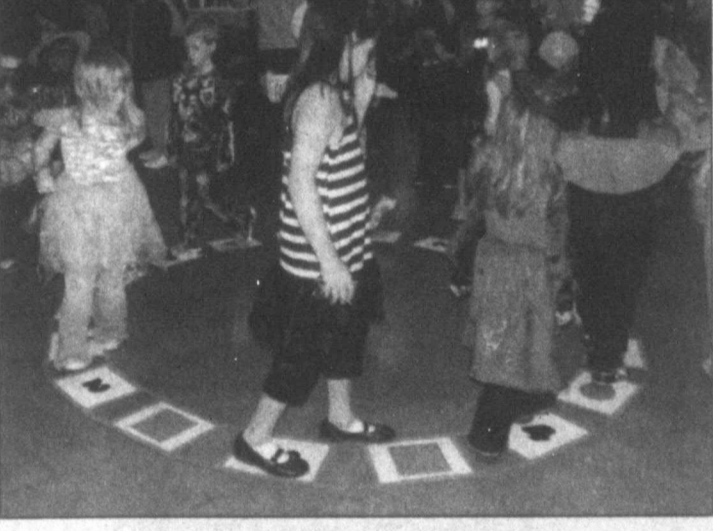

## CoC seeks promotion participants

With Halloween out of the way, the Pampa Chamber of Commerce is looking ahead to Christmas and making plans for a pair of its holiday promotions.

Chamber of Commerce Executive Director Joe Weaver said that entry forms for "Country Christmas: Shop Pampa and Win" and the Christmas parade are now available at the Chamber office, 200 N. Ballard.

## Texas red tide kills 4.2M fish

**AUSTIN (AP)** - The algae bloom known as red tide has killed 1.2 million more fish along the Texas coast in less than two weeks.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department reported Monday that about 4.2 million fish have died since the red tide outbreak began in September. The agency on Oct. 20 estimated 3 million fish had been killed.

State health officials last week banned, until further notice, commercial and recreational harvesting of oysters, clams and mussels due to red tide. Tuesday would have been opening day for public harvest of oysters through April.

Experts say red tide, often present in the fall, is worse this year because of the Texas drought and recent excessive heat. The algae thrive in warm, salty water.

## 200 cases of pertussis in NM

**ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP)** - Whooping cough is spreading across the state. Whooping cough is a highly contagious bacterial respiratory infection putting infants most at risk. The New Mexico Department of Health says cases of whooping cough or pertussis are up, especially in Bernalillo County.

State Department of Health epidemiologist Dr. Chad Smelser says there are 188 confirmed, probable and suspected pertussis cases in the state and 130 of those have been reported in Bernalillo County.

Smelser tells KRQE-TV the department started seeing an increase in cases last year, but before that cases had been down for the last several years.

Also, a jump in cases can be attributed to whooping cough turning up in a large population centers like Albuquerque.

## Texas family sues over death

**DALLAS (AP)** - A negligence lawsuit filed by the family of an 89-year-old North Texas woman says she died after eating cantaloupe allegedly tainted with listeria.

The lawsuit filed in Dallas against Jensen Farms of Holly, Colo., says Marie Jones died Sept. 23 at a hospital.

The Food and Drug Administration says Jensen Farms voluntarily recalled its whole cantaloupes Sept. 14. Federal health officials say 28 deaths have been linked to the listeria outbreak in a dozen states.

The lawsuit filed last week on behalf of the Dallas County woman's children, Russell Jones and Terri Blackmon, also names Frontera Produce Ltd. of Edinburg. A Frontera spokesman declined comment on the lawsuit.

## Official: Drought next year, too

**AUSTIN (AP)** - Texas state senators are hearing sobering news on how a record-breaking drought will continue - and the costly measures needed to keep up with future water demand.

State climatologist John Nielsen-Gammon testified Tuesday that the drought that began in October 2010 should last at least another year.

He said Texas had its hottest summer ever and tied with Oklahoma for the hottest in U.S. history. Rising temperatures means increased evaporation in reservoirs, further depleting already decimated water stocks.

Through September, Texas averaged only 8.5 inches of rain, nearly 13 inches less than normal, the driest in state annals.

Carolyn Brittin of the Texas Water Development Board urged implementing a plan to bolster future water stocks but said estimated costs have increased from \$31 billion in 2007 to \$53 billion today.

## Texas students gain in math

**AUSTIN (AP)** - Fourth and eighth-graders in Texas are doing better in math, but gains in reading proficiency remain elusive.

That's according to results released Tuesday on the Nation's Report Card. Results show Texas students lagging behind the national average on reading scores. For eighth graders, the average score was three points below the national average.

Texas students exceeded their national peers in math - by seven points in eighth grade. Math scores have been improving steadily over the past two decades.

Reading performance gaps between white students and black and Hispanic students in Texas were unchanged in comparisons to 1992 and 1998. In math, however, those gaps have narrowed.

The results are based on the National Assessment on Educational Progress, administered by the U.S. Department of Education's National Center for Education Statistics.

## North TX getting new state park

**AUSTIN (AP)** - A more than \$7.1 million land sale has been completed for a planned state park in North Texas.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department on Tuesday announced it has closed on the purchase of more than 3,300 acres of Cross Timbers region land from several owners.

The sale, which closed last week, involves property that straddles the Palo Pinto County and Stephens County line near Strawn, about 70 miles southwest of Fort Worth. Officials say an agreement is in the works to use Tucker Lake in the planned state park.

No projected opening date has been announced. Funds for the purchase came from the 2008 sale of the former Eagle Mountain Lake State Park.

## Huntsman: End 'monopoly'

**DURHAM, N.H. (AP)** - Republican presidential candidate Jon Huntsman says federal officials must investigate what he calls a monopoly of the oil industry.

The former Utah governor won't blame specific companies but compares the situation to media company domination in the 1970s that required government intervention. He wants the Federal Trade Commission and Senate Judiciary Committee to launch a speedy review of the oil industry.

# Vintage stove stokes up collectors



**Q:** The kitchen stove seen in this photo was made by O'Keefe and Merrit around 1942. It has an oven light, clock with a timer, broiler, center griddle and a cover. Everything works and is in great condition. I used it every day and loved it, but we have to move, and it won't fit in my new little kitchen.

Could you please give me an idea how much it is worth?

**A:** O'Keefe and Merrit was located in Los Angeles. Their stoves were state of the art for the period, and those in good working condition or completely restored are sought after today. Based on your information, your stove is O'Keefe and Merrit's 1940s series 600.

Similar ranges are selling around \$700 to \$1000. When fully restored by a professional, their stoves range from \$2500 and up.

**A.E. Hull Pottery** was in business from 1905 to 1986.

**Q:** The enclosed mark is on the bottom of a pottery basket that I have. The basket stands about 14 inches tall, and it is decorated with blue flowers and green leaves against a shiny cream-colored glaze. It is trimmed in gold and is in mint condition.

What can you tell me about my basket?

**Q:** A. E. Hull Pottery Co. made

your basket. They were in business in Crooksville, Ohio, from 1905 to 1986. Their art pottery lines were sold to florists and gift shops. The pattern is "New Magnolia Gloss," and not to be confused with their "Magnolia" pattern, which has a matte finish. It was in production from 1947 to 1948. The raised and hand painted designs were finished in either blue or pink, and they included 24 different pieces. Hull also made another high gloss pattern in the 1940s by the name of "Rosella."

Both the basket and ever in the "New Magnolia Gloss" pattern are very popular with collectors. Your basket would probably fetch around \$200 to \$225 in an antiques shop.

**Q:** I have a small metal toy truck

that belonged to my grandfather when he was a child in the 1930s. It measures about 4 inches long and is a red pick-up with rubber tires. Some of the red has worn away, but, otherwise, it in great condition. Marked on the bottom are the words "Tootsie Toys — Made in U.S.A."

Does it have any value?

**A:** Tootsie Toy die cast metal trucks and cars are collectible. They have been in business since 1901.

Your toy truck would sell for \$5 to \$10.

# Filing period for Texas candidates may shorten

**SAN ANTONIO (AP)** - A three-judge panel is unlikely to approve temporary maps for Texas' revamped political districts before candidates are scheduled to start filing for next year's primary elections, the federal judges said Monday.

Consequently, the opening of the filing period may be delayed and shortened for candidates in all state and congressional races by about two weeks, they said.

The view was made

clear during a federal court hearing in San Antonio. The judges said they were unlikely to approve interim congressional maps by Nov. 12, when filing for office is scheduled to begin statewide, the San Antonio Express-News reported.

State elections director Ann McGeehan told the judges that state and county election administrators needed time to prepare for the primaries. U.S. District Judge Orlando Garcia asked if it would be better

to shorten the filing period for congressional and state House and state Senate races only, or for all races statewide.

"I think it's preferable to just move everybody," she said.

Lawyers and representatives of Texas' Republican and Democratic parties appealed to the judges to announce what the filing period would be. The judges said they might do so by the end of this week.

The hearing involved a combination of several

lawsuits filed by minority and Democratic groups.

A final resolution is stalled while the U.S. Department of Justice challenges maps proposed by the state in a case pending before a separate three-judge panel in Washington, D.C. The Justice Department has said it found sufficient evidence that congressional and Texas House district boundaries proposed by the state were "adopted with discriminatory purpose."

# Feds sue mortgage broker, alleging lending fraud

**NEW YORK (AP)** - The federal government sued one of the nation's largest privately held mortgage brokers on Tuesday, saying its decade-long fraudulent lending practices cost the government hundreds of millions of dollars and forced thousands of American homeowners to lose their homes.

The lawsuit in U.S. District Court in Manhattan sought unspecified damages and civil penalties and named as defendants Houston-based Allied Home Mortgage Corp., founder Jim Hodge and Jeanne Stell, the company's executive vice president and director of compliance.

Joe James, a company spokesman, said he was aware of the lawsuit but had not yet seen it. He declined immediate comment.

At a news conference, U.S. Attorney Preet Bharara said Allied had carried out its fraud through its authority to originate mortgage loans insured by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, or HUD.

"The losers here were American taxpayers and the thousands of families who faced foreclosure because they were could

not ultimately fulfill their obligations on mortgages that were doomed to fail," he said.

The prosecutor said the investigation continues and "if and when we have sufficient evidence for a criminal case, we'll bring it."

Helen Kanovsky, HUD's general counsel, said the agency had stopped insuring loans for Allied and was seeking to prevent Hodge from participating in any government programs again after seeing the destruction that the fraud had caused in communities across the country.

"Mortgage fraud has very real human victims," she said.

According to the lawsuit, nearly 32 percent of the 112,324 home loans originated by Allied between Jan. 1, 2001, and the end of 2010 have defaulted, resulting in more than \$534 million in insurance claims paid by HUD.

The lawsuit said the default rate climbed to "a staggering 55 percent" in 2006 and 2007, at the height of the housing boom, when the government paid \$170 million to settle Allied's failed loans. It said an additional 2,509 loans are now in default and HUD could face \$363

million more in claims.

The government said Allied made substantial profits through the loans while it violated rules meant to protect HUD's insurance fund and deceived the agency by originating loans for years out of hundreds of "shadow" branches that were not approved by HUD.

The deceitful practice was continued under Hodge's direction even after several senior managers voiced concerns, the lawsuit said.

"Allied operated with impunity for many years due to a culture of corruption created by Hodge, who eliminated the position of chief financial officer and other senior management positions, intimidated employees by spontaneous terminations and aggressive email monitoring, and silenced former employees by actual and threatened

Today is Wednesday, Nov. 2, the 306th day of 2011. There are 59 days left in the year.

### Today's Highlight in History:

On Nov. 2, 1861, during the Civil War, President Abraham Lincoln relieved Maj. Gen. John C. Fremont of his command of the Army's Department of the West based in St. Louis, following Fremont's unauthorized efforts to emancipate slaves in Missouri.

### On this date:

In 1783, Gen. George Washington issued his Farewell Orders to the Armies of the United States near Princeton, N.J.

In 1795, the 11th president of the United States, James Knox Polk, was born in Mecklenburg County, N.C.

In 1889, North Dakota and South Dakota became the 39th and 40th states.

In 1936, the British Broadcasting Corp. inaugurated "high-definition" television service from Alexandra Palace in London.

In 1947, Howard Hughes piloted his huge wooden flying boat, the Hughes H-4 Hercules (derisively dubbed the "Spruce Goose" by detractors), on its only flight, which lasted about a minute over Long Beach Harbor in California.

In 1948, President Harry S. Truman surprised the experts by winning a narrow upset over Republican challenger Thomas E. Dewey.

In 1961, author, humorist and cartoonist James Thurber died in New York at age 66.

In 1979, black militant JoAnne Chesimard escaped from a New Jersey prison, where she'd been serving a life sentence for the 1973 slaying of a New Jersey state trooper, Werner Foerster. (Chesimard, who took the name Assata Shakur, is believed to be living in Cuba.)

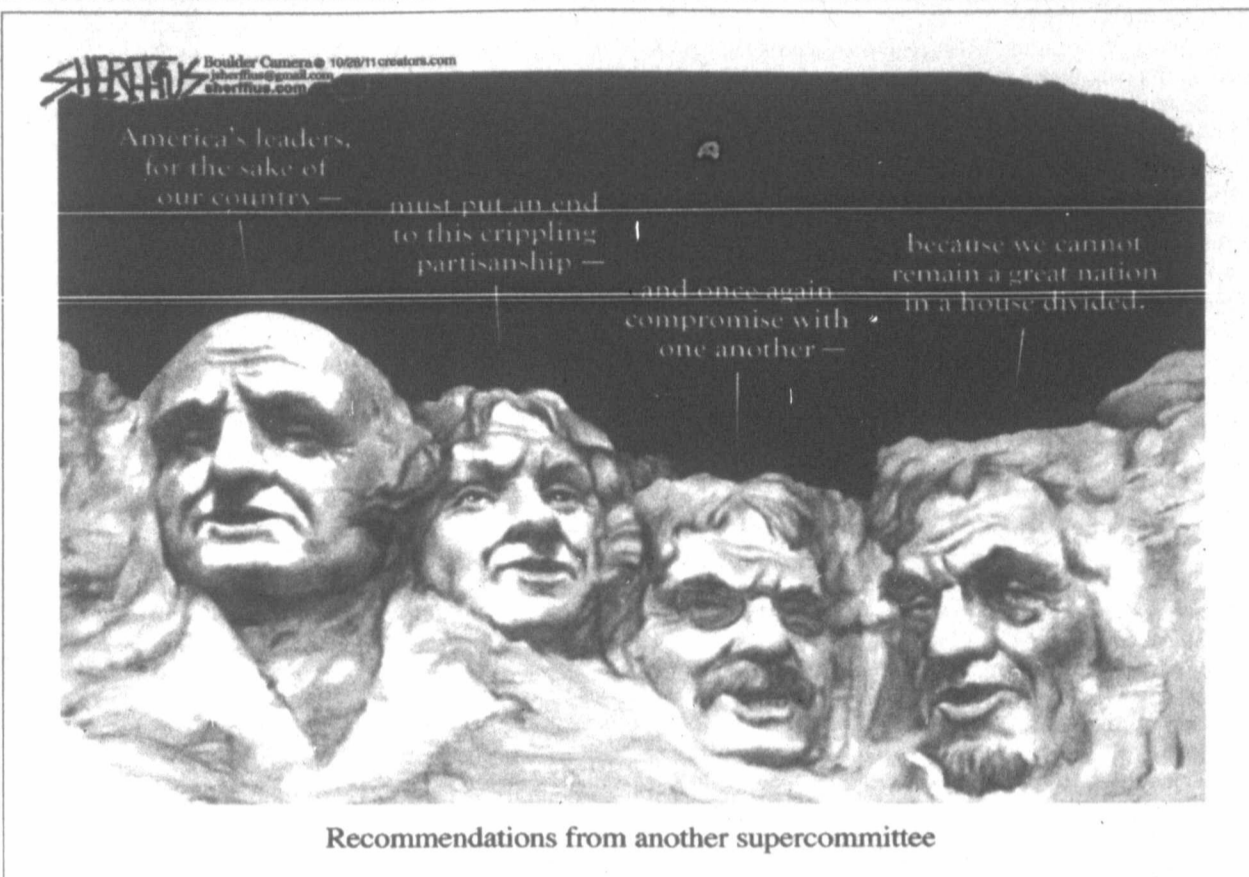

**Five years ago:** The Rev. Ted Haggard resigned as president of the National Association of Evangelicals after a man said they'd had sexual trysts together (Haggard later confessed he was guilty of sexual immorality).

**One year ago:** Republicans won control of the House of Representatives, picking up 63 seats in midterm elections, while Democrats retained a majority in the Senate; Republican governors outnumbered Democrats after gaining six states.

## In Cincy, an incumbent President in trouble

**CINCINNATI --** In Ohio, which has voted for the winning White House nominee in the last 12 consecutive presidential elections, there has been no major county that has been more reliably Republican than Hamilton, with its county seat of Cincinnati.

In carrying Ohio in 2008, Barack Obama became the first Democratic presidential nominee since Lyndon Johnson in 1964 (and only the third in 96 years) to carry Hamilton County. For President Obama, any realistic route to re-election goes through Ohio, where a strong showing in Hamilton County, next November, could significantly improve the Democrat's prospects.

So with just a year to go until Election Day 2012, it made good sense to sit and listen on a Monday night for two and a half hours to 12 Cincinnati-area voters speak openly about their county in the first of a series of focus groups pollster Peter D. Hart will conduct throughout the campaign for the Annenberg Public Policy Center of the University of Pennsylvania.

The group's anxieties about the economy were personal. Half of them had immediate family members who had lost their jobs. They are worried about their own and their children's futures. When Hart asked what is "the one thing you thought you would never say about America that you are starting to think now?" Brandon Fox, a 25-year-old safety officer and political independent, dramatized the pervasive apprehension in the room: "I want to live someplace else. I never thought I'd hear myself say that."

When asked for their assessment of President Obama in a word or phrase, George Palmer, 59, who is a development director and voted for Obama in 2008, echoed the disappointment expressed almost unanimously: "I am disappointed in his leadership ... he (the president) doesn't take charge often enough or well enough."

Because I have long believed that American voters, when a president disapproves them in office, immediately seek in their next president the very qualities that were missing in the president who has let them down, I paid close attention when Peter Hart inquired: "The one thing I would like to be able to say about the next president is ..." A majority of the panelists chose "strong leader," followed closely by "tough negotiator." Trailing were "strong foreign policy," "fights for working class" and "business, private-sector experience." Cincinnati did not see Obama as either a strong leader or a tough negotiator.

But Hart's most provocative question was asking the 12 to think about

the various types in any fifth-grade class — such as the teacher's pet, the all-American kid, the nerd, the loner, the know-it-all, the bully, the rich/privileged kid, the kid everyone respects, the star athlete — and to match them up with the leading Republican 2012 candidates and Mr. Obama.

Eight identified businessmen Herman Cain as the "hard worker," and he was also named as "the all-American kid" and "the kid everyone respects." The biggest loser in this round was Texas Gov. Rick Perry, whom eight called the class "bully" and just one saw as the "star athlete." Former Massachusetts Gov. Mitt Romney could not be pleased by five seeing him as the "rich and privileged kid," even though the group, based upon his debate performances, had earlier judged Romney the toughest.

But unnerve to Democrats is the fact that President Obama was picked twice as "the loner," the "know-it-all" and the "hard worker," and with one pick for "teacher's pet," "nerd," "the all-American kid" and the "trusted friend." After three years in the White House, the president has forged no strong identity.

A focus group is obviously not a scientific sample. But if you listen closely, you can hear how people actually feel. And with a year to go, the news from Cincinnati for Barack Obama is not reassuring.

## Perry's so-called flat tax isn't anywhere near flat

Does Rick Perry want to undermine traditional marriage? This question leaps out from his new 20 percent flat-tax plan, which would eliminate all tax advantages for married couples where one spouse is the primary breadwinner.

For more than 60 years, the federal income tax has treated the family as an economic unit. A husband and wife have the benefit of pooling their income in a joint tax return, which affords larger deductions and lower rates.

Perry would replace the pooling of husband-wife income with a system in which each individual, regardless of marital status, would owe federal taxes on his or her separate income. Perry's plan offers "generous standard deductions of \$12,500 for individuals and their dependents" — which ignores the fact that children are dependents of both their parents, even if one earns all or most of the family income.

If an income tax were truly "flat," filing status wouldn't matter because a wife is taxed at the same rate as her husband. But Perry's so-called flat tax isn't anywhere near flat, so it matters greatly that he offers the same standard allowances to alternative lifestyles as for married couples. His plan would allow, for example, two unrelated adults living with two children to avoid income tax on their first \$50,000 of income.

Perry's spokesman told the Wall Street Journal, "We were very careful to construct this in a way that protects the middle class." No. Giving that size deduction to unmarried parents, defined as "individuals and their dependents," means rewarding bad behavior and is, by definition, outside the middle class. Regardless of income, you can't be middle class without respecting middle-class values, the most important of which is

marriage.

The anti-family bias of Perry's tax plan is found to a lesser degree in several other tax reform plans. But Perry has been on probation with pro-family voters since July when he told an elite group of big-money donors in Aspen that he was "fine" with gay marriage in New York because "that's their business."

New York's same-sex marriage is, indeed, Texas's business, too, since two same-sex couples have already moved to Texas and are demanding that Texas courts recognize their marriage. This shows why the definition of marriage is a national and not a states-right issue.

The joint income tax return for husbands and wives was landmark legislation. The Republican Congress passed it in 1948 over President Truman's veto.

As originally designed, the joint return recognized a husband and wife as two equal partners, even if the husband earned all the family's income. Each tax bracket, deduction and exemption was equal to twice that of a single person.

Subsequent tax reform bills, especially the one signed by Richard Nixon in 1969, which also introduced the hated Alternative Minimum Tax, reduced the value of a joint return to only about 1.6 persons, while increasing the tax benefit of an unmarried "head of household" to about 1.4 persons. Simple arithmetic shows that a single parent with an unmarried live-in "partner" gets more favorable tax treatment than respectable married couples struggling to support their

own children.

And by the way, the postwar "baby boom" happened during the 20-year period when married couples were fairly valued in the federal income tax. That's not coincidence; incentives, matter, and America's marriage rate and birth rate plummeted after the value of the joint return was reduced.

Although the Perry plan's most striking feature is its anti-marriage bias, his proposal for corporate income is equally pernicious. Perry would shift businesses to a "territorial" tax system, which means that corporations would be taxed only on the profits they earn inside the United States.

We should do exactly the opposite. We should reduce or eliminate taxes on businesses that employ Americans producing goods and services inside our own country, while increasing taxes on the profits that corporations earn by outsourcing or manufacturing overseas.

Above all, we should eliminate the foreign tax credit, a self-destructive provision that allows corporations to pay China, Venezuela or Saudi Arabia the money they would otherwise owe the U.S. government. Let's also cut out the deductions that U.S. corporations take for hiring foreigners to do work that Americans can do.

Those who support a territorial business tax argue that it will encourage multinational corporations to bring home the profits they earn overseas, but that's unlikely so long as it remains more profitable for them to invest in cheap-labor countries. Of Republican presidential candidates, only Herman Cain and Rick Santorum understand that what corporations need is lower taxes on their operations inside the United States rather than on the profits they earn in other countries.

litigation against them," the lawsuit said. "As a result, Allied was able to conceal its dysfunctional operations and maintain its profitable position in the mortgage industry."

Allied operated 600 or more branches at once but only maintained two quality control employees in its corporate office, requiring branch managers to assume financial responsibility for their branches, the lawsuit said.

"Allied thus operated its branches like franchises, collecting revenue while the branches were profitable, then closing them without notice when they were not, leaving the branch managers liable for the branch's financial obligations," the lawsuit said.

The government said Allied failed to implement its internal quality control plan, "effectively allowing its shadow branches to operate independently of any scrutiny whatsoever," the lawsuit said. "Allied utterly failed to conduct audits of its branches or review its early payment defaults as it was required to do by HUD."

The lawsuit accused Stell of instructing branch managers how to answer questions from HUD auditors and said she acknowledged in an email that she instructed someone else to sign certifications that its branches met federal requirements because she knew they were false.

Bharara said Allied was playing a "lending industry equivalent of heads-I-win, tails-you-lose."

issue with the bank's policy of paying employees millions of dollars in salaries and bonus. For instance, Brian T. Moynihan, CEO at Bank of America received \$10 million in salary, restricted stock and other benefits during 2010.

"(Bank of America received) billions, and not one cent went towards helping people with their troubled mortgages," said Brito, who believes the salaries paid out to CEO's like Moynihan results in higher costs of goods and services.

Brito got his first taste of protesting in 1969 in Tucson, when he fought to get new textbooks for disadvantaged children who, up until then, had been receiving only used books.

"I was sprayed with water hoses and bitten by dogs in 1969, but we won," he said. "The kids did get new books. We changed things."

Brito also was active during the Vietnam War and the Iraq War, protesting with Cindy Sheehan, the mother of a soldier killed in Iraq, at George W. Bush's ranch in Crawford.

"It was beautiful. We had a great big tent. There were about 2,000 people there," he said.

Right now, though, he wants to spread the word about Bank of America in Pampa.

"(Protesting) is something we need to do. What's going to be left for (my grandchildren)?" Brito asked.

laugh," Robbins said. "We will have a special guest speaker that will give an inspirational message."

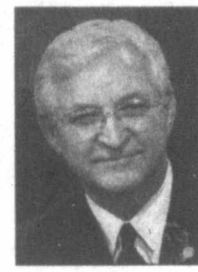
Robbins said sign-ups are open to anyone, not just church members. Women can sign up by calling the church at 806-665-3255 or signing up at the table after church service.

## Former British PM Blair speaks in Tulsa

TULSA, Okla. (AP) — Former British Prime Minister Tony Blair said Tuesday the war on terror will be a "generation-long struggle" and held out hope that peace between Israel and Palestine could someday ease tension across the world.

Speaking on the campus of Oral Roberts University, a campus founded by a television evangelist, Blair said the free world's enemies held an ideology that perverted a religion. The solution, he said, could be reached by holding a "common set of values" that includes free markets, democracy and diversity.

"We actually become defeatist in our position."

We begin to think that with all of this power shifting, maybe there is a fundamental problem," Blair said. "The answer is not to lose faith in who we are and what we believe in, but actually to regain it and apply those values and way of life to the changed world around us."

Blair also called the global financial meltdown a major challenge for the world today — but said the Occupy Wall Street movement isn't about who to blame for economic problems, but rather is about preventing another economic collapse and keeping markets open.

"Frankly, these movements don't offer an answer. The problem was we

didn't spot (the collapse)," said Blair, whose appearance at ORU was sponsored by Oklahoma State University's Spears School of Business.

Blair served as prime minister of Great Britain and Northern Ireland from 1997 to 2007, and was leader of Britain's Labour Party from 1994-2007.

"I don't think there ever has been a tougher time to be a leader," said Blair, who was making his first trip to Oklahoma. "The toughest thing about being prime minister was trying to find the right answer, to find the right path."

He has served as Mideast envoy for international mediators hoping to win

peace between Israel and Palestine, but last week mediators couldn't bring Israeli and Palestinian leaders back to the bargaining table. He said a trip to the region last week marked his 72nd time to the region.

In addition to his duties as a Mideast envoy, Blair has founded the Tony Blair Faith Foundation, which works to bring an understanding between different religions and The Tony Blair Sports Foundation, which encourages young people to play a sport, especially those who are socially excluded, among other duties.

## Sr. Hulsey emerges as a leading tackler on outside

At the end of last football season, then-junior Daniel Hulsey suffered a hamstring tear and had to spend most of the offseason recovering.

"I lost all strength in my leg," Hulsey said. "I just had to rebuild that back up over the summer. It was painful and wasn't able to do anything. I was concerned that I might lose my senior year."

Linebackers coach Tad Smith said that at the start of the 2011 season, the coaches were scrambling.

"(The staff) were really worried about what we were going to do because we didn't have him out there," Smith said.

It turned out the coaching staff had nothing to worry about, as Hulsey returned in good health for his senior season.

Hulsey said he has played outside linebacker since he started playing football in fourth grade. He added that he likes making plays.

"It's a position I love," Hulsey said. "You get to have some one-on-ones and make big plays for sure."

Hulsey's playmaking ability has helped him emerge as one of the leading tacklers the last two seasons. That's an accomplishment. Hulsey said, that he's proud of.

"It feels pretty good," Hulsey said. "I love playing and doing my job."

The senior said he doesn't really have a linebacker that he follows or models his game after.

"I just play," Hulsey said.

Smith said Hulsey has improved significantly from last season and has strong leadership.

"He's an aggressive young man," Smith said. "He likes to be in the midst of things. Right or wrong, he is going to go hard on every play and get to the ball. He's done some good stuff."

Hulsey said his top moment was when he made a play to help secure a 30-22 victory over Wichita Falls Hirschi last season, giving Pampa its first home victory since 2008.

"Against Hirschi, I was on a blitz and I sacked the quarterback and he fumbled it," Hulsey said. "Ryne (Richardson) picked it up and ran with it."

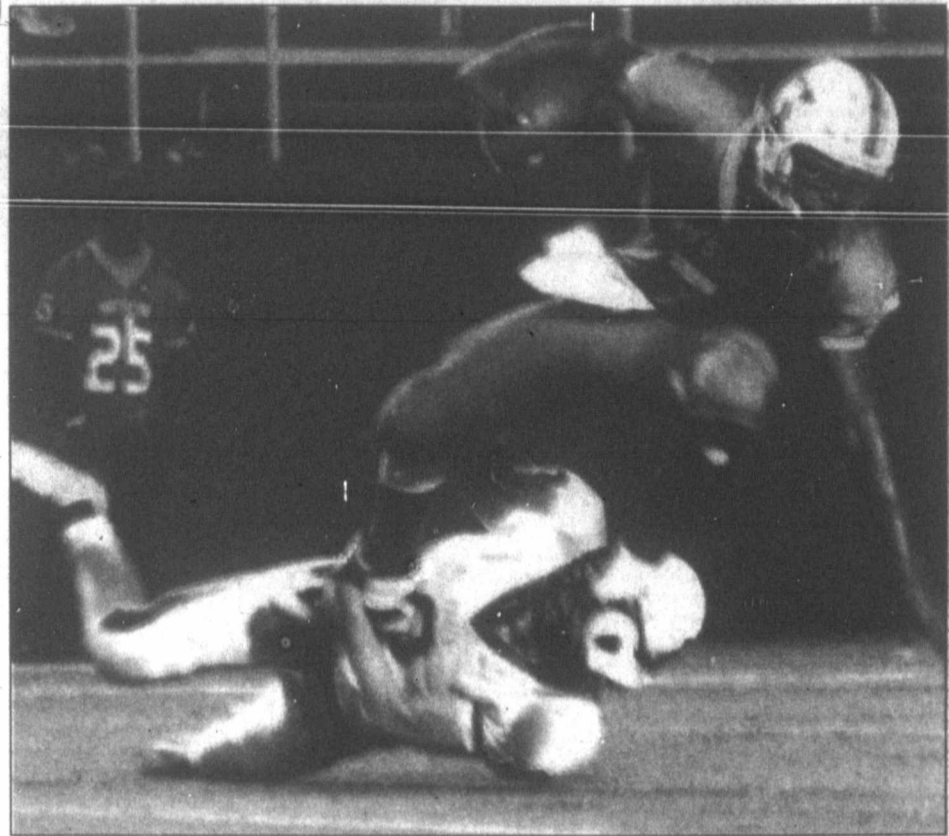

After the Pampa Alumni football team defeated the Borger Alumni on October 15, its players thought they were done for the year after their second game. Two days later, the team found out otherwise.

"We got a text from (alumni coach) Jason (Burklow) saying we are playing again," lineman Taylor Harris said.

Pampa will face another district foe when it battles the Palo Duro Alumni 6:30 p.m. Saturday at Harvester Field.

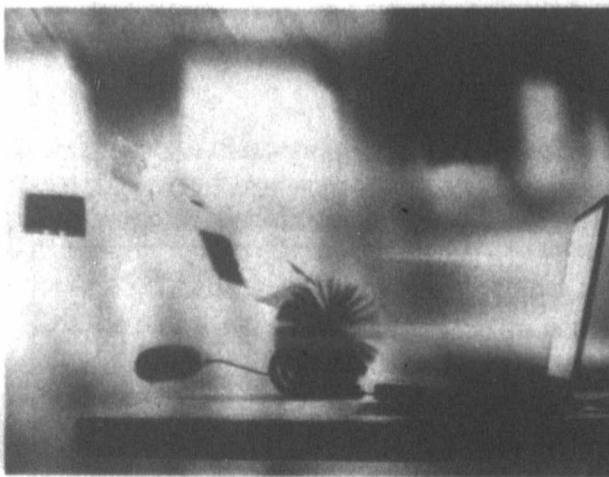
