Election Day today; polls open from 7 to 7

Gray County voters, as well as voters around the state, are being asked today to vote on 10 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution.

Polling places for the seven

County Election Gray Administrator Linda Lewis said that she expects a light turnout for this election after only 173 Gray County voters participated in early voting.

"It's a pretty disappointing turnout considering the critical issues on that ballot," Lewis said

Court grants Skinner stay of execution

Death row inmate Hank Skinner's appeals were answered on Monday, when the Court of Criminal Appeals of Texas granted the convicted murderer a stay of execution.

At issue for Skinner has been the testing of DNA evidence from his case, which was denied most recently by the 31st District Court in Gray County.

"Because the DNA statute has changed, and because some of those changes were because of this case, we find that it would be prudent for this Court to take time to fully review the changes in the statute as they pertain to this case," said the Court of Criminal Appeals in its ruling.

The Court of Criminal Appeals ruled that the Gray County court has 15 days to enter its legal determinations, which should be forwarded to the criminal court within 30 days.

"The Court of Criminal Appeals with its decision (yesterday), has ensured that Mr. Skinner's request for DNA testing will receive the thorough and serious consideration it deserves," said Rob Owen, lead appeals attorney for Hank SKINNER cont. on page 2

Pampa EDC mulls TIPS strategic plan

The Pampa Economic Development Corporation (PEDC) mulled over a strategic plan from TIP Strategies (TIPS), an Austin based consulting firm, at a meeting yesterday.

"They have a lot of information and ideas in here. We just need to refine it," said Clay Rice, executive director of the PEDC.

Gary Sutherland, president of the PEDC board, saw some issues with the broadness of the proposed plan. "(TIPS has) done some stuff in population areas that were similar to ours, but the problem is that people that do this kind of work don't come from a community of 20,000 people," Sutherland said. "They come from the big cities. They have big city ideas. They understand metropolitan areas. They probably do more work in metropolitan areas, and when you're looking at West Texas areas where populations are declining in the small communities, you have problems that you have to deal with, and there are time constraints and money constraints in whatever you're doing. That's TIPS cont. on page 3



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Two face court for kidnapping

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — Two men arrested in connection with the kidnapping of an El Paso man who managed to get free in Clines Corners, N.M. are headed to federal court.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation says 40-yearold Jesus Manuel Gallegos and 34-year-old Brandon Lawrence Jones are scheduled Monday to appear in U.S. District Court on various charges after another man told agents that Gallegos and Jones took him from El Paso, Texas, and made him withdraw money from ATMs.

The man told authorities he escaped from the kidnappers after they fell asleep at a travel center east of what we're trying to address in this docu-Albuquerque on Sunday morning.

FBI spokesman Frank Fisher says the men were arrested Sunday shortly following the man's escape.

It was unclear if the men had hired attorneys.

Plea in prostitution ring case

EL PASO (AP) — Three men accused of being part of a ring that forced more than 10 women into prostitution and apartments" to middle income. in the West Texas border city of El Paso have pleaded not guilty to the charges in federal court.

Forty-three-year-old Alarcon Wiggins of Baltimore, the alleged ringleader, along with Mark Corey Williams and Deyonta Thompson waived their right to request bail Monday.

Wiggins did not appear and entered his plea in writing while Thompson stood mute, the equivalent of a not guilty plea.

The three defendants were among five men and five women arrested in October in Baltimore. They are accused of enticing a group of women to move to El Paso, where prosecutors allege they ran a forced prostitution ring and seized the women's profits and cellphones so they couldn't seek help.

Defense starts in polygamy trial

ROBERT LEE (AP) — The defense will begin arguing its case in the trial of a 75-year-old ex-polygamist bishop accused of performing an illegal marriage ceremony.

The defense for Fredrick Merril Jessop plans to call two or three witnesses Monday.

The prosecution rested Thursday after one of Jessop's wives identified him in the courtroom. Much of the prosecution's case rested on documents seized in a 2008 raid on the Yearning for Zion Ranch near Eldorado. It is owned by the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints.

Jessop is accused of "sealing" a marriage between church leader Warren Jeffs and a 12-year-old girl. Jeffs is serving a life sentence for sexually assaulting that girl and another 15-year-old girl.

Jeffs excommunicated Jessop sometime after he performed the wedding ceremony.

Blagojevich sentencing set

CHICAGO (AP) — Ousted Illinois Gov. Rod Blagojevich is scheduled to be sentenced on his multiple corruption charges Dec. 6.

The new date appeared on a federal court website Monday. In September, Judge James Zagel had indefinitely delayed an Oct. 6 sentencing date for Blagojevich — apparently because it would have conflicted with a related trial.

The 54-year-old impeached governor was convicted at his retrial this year on corruption charges including attempted extortion for trying to sell or trade an appointment to President Barack Obama's vacated U.S. Senate seat. Jurors at his first trial had deadlocked on all but one count, convicting Blagojevich of lying to the FBI.

Blagojevich faces a maximum sentence of 305 years in prison. Most legal experts say Zagel is likely to sentence Blagojevich to around ten years.

Defense can't show 9/11 video

BOSTON (AP) — Lawyers for a Massachusetts man charged with conspiring to help al-Qaida have lost a bid to bar federal prosecutors from showing jurors gruesome videos of the World Trade Center burning after the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks and the beheadings of Americans.

Tarek Mehanna's lawyers argued that showing the videos would shock jurors and be unfair to Mehanna. The Boston Globe reports Judge George O'Toole Jr. denied the motion Monday and twice denied a defense request

Prosecutors say that after Mehanna made an unsuccessful trip to Yemen to try to get training at a terrorist camp, he returned home to Sudbury and began helping al-Qaida by translating and distributing online texts and videos promoting violent jihad.



The tension between ideology and pragmatism

When I first served in Congress, in the 1960s and 1970s, I would often sit on the floor of the House and listen carefully to members from both sides. I was trying to figure out the differences between the liberals and the conservatives, and to perceive how those differences could be narrowed or bridged. They broke over how to answer the overriding question of American government - the proper role of government with liberals seeing an expansive role and conservatives a limited one. At the time, there was plenty of gray area where the two could find common ground.

In recent years, the attitudes of liberals and conservatives toward government's role have become more complex. In general, conservatives want just a small role when it comes to taxes, the economy, and social welfare. But they are more supportive of an expansive national-security apparatus and Department of Defense. And they advocate government taking an active role in regulating such social issues as abortion and gay marriage. They generally like Edmund Burke's definition of a statesman as a person with "a disposition to preserve and an ability to improve.

Liberals generally accept the flip side: They'd prefer a person with the disposition to improve and an ability to preserve. They are more open to an expansive role for government on social welfare policy, job creation, and such interventions in the economy as regulation of antitrust, labor, consumer and environmental matters. They tend to look to government to help curb econom-

Americans free hand. To some extent, these are caricatures, of course. Individual politicians rarely fit into neatly defined categories. And the truth is, trying to reach agreement on complex issues forces both sides to temper the purity of their visions. Many conservatives may want to contract the reach of socialwelfare policy, but they're leery of threatening the existence of such programs as Social Security and Medicare. Similarly, while they espouse relying on market forces to solve most of our problems, they accept affecting the economy through changes in the tax code and believe government should direct some matters of social policy.

Likewise, most liberals are now open to leaving more responsibilities with the private sector. They want to see power and personal liberty diffused in a way that is compatible with a market economy - but still reliant on the government to help provide a secure old age, health and educa-

The result of this tension is our mixed economy - neither entirely free-market nor controlled by

ic and financial the state - and our pendulumpower. They're swing politics.

My experience is that apart from the ideologically committed, most Americans don't worry a lot about whether a given policy is "liberal" or "conservative." They worry about whether or not it works. And so as any given issue gets debated, the ideologues take stands that hew to their beliefs and only reluctantly yield on their views, while most voters want to see things get resolved in a manner that responds to the needs of the country. Taken together, the results of these debates set the country's direction and the speed at which it heads there.

When ideology trumps pragmatism, we find ourselves incapable of moving. Yet these ideological battles are engrained in the dialogue of our democracy. The argument between a smaller and a greater role for government has been with us since the very beginning of our nation; in some ways it defines our political history.

Our challenge today, as it has always been, is to balance the passions of those who find themselves firmly on one side or the other against the common sense of the great mass of Americans, who are most concerned about making progress on the problems that beset them. As the common phrase has it, they want not big overnment or small government.

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



I am a labor and delivery RN in a major medical center in California. More and more people today view birth as a sporting event. It's worse when the mother-inlaw wants to be there because





Sometimes it's important to stick to your convictions despite the emotional urge or outside pressures to change your mind. But other

times, you need to be flexible enough to change your mind when presented with a new set of facts.

Never has that been more apparent than in the business headlines in recent weeks. First, the CEO of Netflix decided to reverse his decision to split the company into two parts, after the announcement and its pricing changes caused an uproar from shareholders and customers.

Then the new CEO of Hewlett-Packard Co., Meg Whitman, decided to reverse the company's multibillion dollar decision to dump HP's personal computer division a decision made under the previous CEO, but one in which she had participated as a board member.

Each of these reversals cost shareholders a huge chunk of money. HP stock is down 36 percent for the year and Netflix lost 75 percent of its market value, not to mention 800,000 customers.
