

It was, in many respects, a very good year in 2011 for the Pampa Chamber of Commerce.

For many, the highlight of the Chamber's year came in March, when it hosted former First Lady Laura Bush for a speech during a banquet at Pampa High School.

That event was preceded by a February banquet, during which Culberson Stowers was awarded Business of the Year and Ramona Hite won Citizen of the Year. Both banquets were wellattended, with the Bush banquet involving Pampa High School in much of the planning and execution. With the banquets being such marquee events in Pampa, executive director Joe Weaver

The Chamber, though, was active in more avenues than just organizing banquets; the organization, for example, unveiled a new website in the fall. The Chamber's new online home, according to executive director Joe Weaver, is easier for users to navigate.

## Guard at border cut to less than 300

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Obama administration will keep a reduced contingent of National Guard troops working along the Mexican border for the next year, the Defense Department said Tuesday.

Starting in January, the force of 1,200 National Guard troops at the border will be reduced to fewer than 300 at a cost of about \$60 million, said Paul Stockton, assistant secretary of defense for homeland defense.

The remaining troops will shift their focus from patrolling the border on the ground looking for illegal immigrants and smugglers to aerial surveillance missions using military helicopters and airplanes equipped with high-tech radar and other gear. Exactly where those troops will fly or how many aircraft will be used has not been decided, he said.

"We are basically going from boots on the ground to boots in the air," said David Aguilar, deputy commissioner for Customs and Border Protection.

Border Patrol Chief Michael Fisher said his agency is working on identifying the "areas of greatest concern" along the border - areas that include Arizona and South Texas - and will station troops and aircraft accordingly.

President Barack Obama ordered a second round of Guard troops to the border last year, with the first of those troops arriving in California, Arizona, New Mexico and Texas in August 2010. President George W. Bush first ordered Guard troops to the southern from 2006 to 2008. They were supposed to be in place for about a year but Obama extended the deployment earlier this year. The smaller force is now expected to remain until the end of 2012.

Stockton said the remaining troops are "transitioning to much more effective support."

"This provides us with more flexibility in dealing with the persistent challenges posed by cross-border movement and illegal crossings," Stockton said.

According to the Government Accountability Office, the Pentagon has previously spent about \$1.35 billion for the deployments under Bush and Obama

Stockton said the Pentagon has budgeted about \$60 million for the mission in 2012.

Congressional Republicans have objected to reducing the number of troops, arguing that the border isn't

secure and reducing the number of people patrolling the area doesn't help security.

"If the Obama administration's goal is border security, their actions undermine their objective," said Rep. Lamar Smith, a Texas Republican and chairman of the House Judiciary Committee. "The administration's decision to draw down the National Guard troops along the U.S-Mexico border makes an already porous border worse."

Aguilar, who previously led the Border Patrol, said Tuesday there is still work to be done at the border but that successes in securing the frontier have allowed DHS to reduce the number of troops and change the mission.

In the fiscal year that ended Sept. 30 Border Patrol agents at the southern border made 327,577 arrests, the fewest since 1972. There are also more than 18,500 agents patrolling the border, the highest number in the agency's history.


When Bush first deployed the National Guard, there were just over 11,000 Border Patrol agents in the area who made more than one million arrests.



McALLEN (AP) — Three men have been sentenced to prison after being convicted of charges related to unlawful exportation of firearms to Mexico.

Chief U.S. District Judge Ricardo H. Hinojosa sentenced 40-year-old Oscar Bravo-Hernandez of Falcon Heights to seven years in prison. Thirty-four-year-old Luis Javier Lira Jr. and 35-year-old Jose Macedonio Castillo, both United States citizens living in Mexico, each received nearly four years followed by a two-year term of supervised release.

Bravo-Hernandez pleaded guilty to unlawful exportation of munitions. Lira and Castillo pleaded guilty to making false statements on federal firearms acquisition forms.

A news release states that agents of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives discovered that Lira and Castillo had purchased large numbers of firearms highly desired by Mexican cartels. Hernandez admitted traveling to Mexico to obtain orders.

#### Six passed fake payroll checks

SILSBEE (AP) — Police say six people have been accused of passing about \$40,000 worth of fake payroll checks in Southeast Texas.

Silsbee police Chief Mark Davis said Tuesday that five suspects who remain in custody are from Honduras and are believed to be in the U.S. illegally. He says a suspect from Houston has posted bond. All have been charged with forgery

Davis told The Associated Press that Friday was payday for a manufacturing firm in Silsbee. He says the fake checks were similar to those from a legitimate company that supplies temporary workers.

The suspects were captured late Saturday after allegedly returning, for a second day, to try to cash more fake checks at some of the same businesses.

Police in Port Arthur and immigration authorities are assisting with the investigation.

#### Oklahoma killing arrest made

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) - Bethany police have announced an arrest in the death and dismemberment of a woman found stuffed in a duffel bag and say another woman was forced to watch the torture and killing of the victim

Jimmy Lee Massey was arrested for the death of 19-year-old Carina Saunders. Her body was found Oct. 13.

Police Chief Phil Cole said at a Tuesday news conference in Bethany that Massey was already in the Oklahoma County Jail on drug charges.

Court documents do not list an attorney for Massey.

Cole said the woman forced to watch the killing knew Massey and was being sent a message to cooperate with drug and prostitution rings.

Cole said Saunders also apparently knew Massey but that there is no indication she was involved in criminal activity.

## Gunfire heard before near Edinburg school

McALLEN (AP) Authorities had previously responded to reports of gunfire around the South Texas middle school where two teen boys were shot last week on an outdoor basketball court, the school district's lawyer said Tuesday.

The local sheriff's office, constable and school district police responded to Harwell Middle School on the earlier occasion, but only confirmed that shots from afar had been heard, said Renee Rodriguez-Betancourt, attorney for the Edinburg Consolidated Independent School District.

"There were shots heard from afar," Rodriguez-Betancourt said. "There weren't shots at the school or anything of that matter." Reached while out of town, she said she did not recall the exact date of the earlier incident.

After the boys were shot Dec. 12, investigators questioned three men who were found on adjacent ranchland. Two were practicing target shooting and were in line with the students. A third was an illegal immigrant with an assault rifle who was trespassing.

Nicholas Tijerina, 13, was left with no movement in his legs after the bullet passed through a lung, his liver and a bone in his spine. The 14-year-old boy's identity has not been released, but he was reportedly stable. The boys were among about 50 kids trying out for the school's basketball team in a parking lot converted to a basketball court behind the school.

The McAllen Monitor first reported the earlier incident Tuesday

On that occasion school administrators contacted superintendent, who the sent another administrator to investigate, Rodriguez-Betancourt said. The Hidalgo County Sheriff's Office was the first agency to respond, but the school district police and constable were also involved, she said.

ately respond to messages left on his cell phone seeking comment. The school district police chief also did not immediately respond to a request seeking comment. The district offices are closed this week for the winter break. School board President Carmen Gonzalez declined to comment, citing an open investigation.

Investigators are awaiting the results of ballistic testing in hopes of matching one of the bullets fired to one of the rifles

"We've identified the exact location where the shots came from," Trevino said. He had previously said investigators believed the target shooters were about 800 yards or nearly a half mile from the students, but Tuesday Trevino said their location was just short of a mile from the school.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Food Safety and Inspection Service announced the recall Monday by Chef's Requested Foods Inc.

The product's label reads "Chef's Requested Center Cut Steak" and includes the establishment number "EST.5792."

The U.S.D.A. says in a Tuesday news release that the product was distributed to retail stores in Arizona, California, Maryland, Ohio and Texas. The mislabeling was discovered by a retailer who notified Chef's Requested Foods — which notified the U.S.D.A.

Both the company and the Food Safety and Inspection Service say no health problems have been reported.

#### Man decapitated by rail car

HITCHCOCK (AP) — Galveston County authorities say a man has been found dead after apparently being decapitated by a railroad car.

An autopsy has been ordered on the body located Monday night along a rail line near Hitchcock. Some employees of Fort Worth-based BNSF Railway discovered the body.

Sheriff's Maj. Ray Tuttoilmondo (too-leh-MAHN'doe) says no signs of foul play were initially found.

Officials say the Hispanic man, believed to be in his late teens or early 20s, had a pierced tongue and eyebrows.

"We spoke to the landowner, he assured us that he wasn't going to allow hunting and that the hunting that was previously done wasn't going to be done anymore and he wasn't going to allow it because of the school area being around there," Rodriguez-Betancourt said.

Sheriff Lupe Trevino said he would neither confirm nor deny the earlier incident. Generally, he said if his deputies respond to a school they defer to police unless it appears to be a major crime involving injuries or significant loss of property.

If something did occur "days and days" before the Dec. 12 shooting, it would not be part of their evidence so someone else would have to release it, he said.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Dec. 21, 1861, President Abraham Lincoln signed a congressional act authorizing the Navy Medal of Honor.

On this date:

In 1620, Pilgrims aboard the Mayflower went ashore for the first time at present-day Plymouth, Mass

In 1910, 344 coal miners were killed in Britain's Pretoria Pit Disaster

In 1948, the state of Eire, or Ireland, passed an act declaring itself a republic.

In 1958, Charles de Gaulle was elected to a seven-year term as the first president of the Fifth Republic of France.



Right around now is when people start fretting over creches in the public square and arguing as to whether publicly funded Christmas symbols violate the establishment clause of the First Amendment. And right about now is also when certain Jewish groups begin insisting that the answer is to place a Hanukkah menorah right next to that creche, which leads atheists to complain about a plague on both their houses.

Years ago I was approached to bring one of these creche cases, and I politely declined. I'm not sure whether the creche violates the First Amendment or not, but to quote one of my favorite films, I really don't give a (darn). Not my issue.

There are plenty of First Amendment issues that make my blood boil, but this isn't one of them. If you want to have an official Christmas tree or menorah or whatever, mazel tov. Too many other things to worry about in this world than giving some of my conservative pals a chance to claim that my lib-



to keep the tree out of the public park doesn't mean that there will be one in my house. There won't be. It doesn't belong. I'm Jewish.

The essence of the First Amendment, in

my book, is the freedom each of us has to pray or not to pray, to choose religion or no religion, to celebrate our holidays free from outside interference.

So all vou Christmas Jews, I will fight to the end to defend your right to put up a tree and sing carols and the rest. But why? Why are you celebrating the birth of Jesus?

Need I point out that I don't know of any Christians who celebrate Hanukkah, much less the more important holy days of Yom Kippur and Rosh Hashanah. And while we're at it, ask any educated Jew, and they'll tell you that Hanukkah calendar, and that elevating it to Christmas-like standing is only one step away from putting up that tree. It's a nice holiday, and I love jelly donuts (even if my single attempt to bake them failed), but it's not the Jewish Christmas. There is no Jewish Christmas. Christmas is a Christian holiday, based in Christian faith.

Some years ago, before ideology took over talk radio, I interviewed a rabbi about Christmas, and he made a point I'll never forget: If you want your grandchildren to be Jewish, you shouldn't be celebrating Christmas with your children. And in the years since, as I look around, there is great truth to what he said.

Porcelain breakfast set is pretty in pink Oklahoma panel OKs

Q: I have enclosed a photo of my beautiful pink porcelain breakfast set. There are 14 pieces. Each is marked "Victoria Czecho-Slovakia." They are in very good condition, with the exception of the missing sugar bowl.

If you have any information about my set and its value, I would appreciate hearing from you.

A: Victoria Porcelain Factory made your breakfast set. They produced porcelain and earthenware in Bohemia, from 1883 to 1945. Czechoslovakia existed from 1918 to 1992. It is now the Czech Republic and the Slovak Republic. The covered dish is used for serving pancakes; the covered pitchers are for syrup or milk

Your breakfast set was made in the early 1900s and would probably be worth \$175 to \$225.

dinner plates that I inherited from my aunt. I have always admired them, and she gave them to me when she moved into a retirement home. Each plate, on the borders and in the centers, is decorated with hand-painted red, blue, green and yellow flowers. The background is off-white.

What can you tell me about my heirlooms?



This breakfast set was made by Victoria Porcelain Factory in what used to Czechoslovakia.

A: Ridgway has made earthenware and semi-porcelain in England since 1879. Bedford Ware was produced at their Bedford, Staffordshire, factory. "Everglades" is the pattern name and "6794" is the design number. Your plates were made around 1928, and similar plates are selling in the range of \$20 to \$40 each on the Internet.

Q: We recently purchased an old lithograph in a dilapidated frame. Overall, it measures about 13 inches by 28 inches. Even though there is some staining from the wood backing and also a little damage along the edges, we liked the colors and bought it. There is a caption that says, "Good Morning" and a copyright mark in the lower left corner that reads "Copyright 1881 Woolson Spice Co., Toledo, Ohio.' I researched online for information on our lithograph, and I found the company sold roasted ground coffee and made advertising cards. How do we repair the small tears and preserve the paper, which is very brittle? Also, what is it worth?

A: You have an advertising chromolithograph that was given away with purchases. Some tears are beyond repair. A good framer experienced with fragile paper could reframe your lithograph to prevent further damage.

Considering the poor condition, your lithograph would probably be worth \$50 to \$100.

## \$6.5B budget for '12

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) - State leaders expressed cautious optimism Tuesday about Oklahoma's recovery from the recession, as they certified preliminary revenue figures that show lawmakers will have an estimated \$6.5 billion to spend on next year's budget.

The amount certified by the Board of Equalization is roughly the same amount that the Legislature spent last year, although a shortfall of approximately \$150 million is predicted for the upcoming fiscal year because of the loss of one-time revenue.

"We're very encouraged that our economy is growing. It's moving in the right direction," said Gov. Mary Fallin, who chairs the seven-member board. "But we also know that with one-time funds that will not be available that we've had the previous couple of years ... we still need to be optimistically cautious about the amount of money that we will have."

Fallin will use the \$6.5 billion figure to craft her executive budget proposal that lawmakers typically use as a starting point for budget negotiations. During the December board meeting in 2010, lawmakers approved a \$6.1 billion preliminary budget estimate.

The final certified amount that the Legislature will appropriate will be determined in February.

The board on Tuesday also freed up \$6 million from a higher education reserve fund to help shore up next year's budget. The panel approved \$63 million in funding for the Oklahoma Higher Learning Access Program scholarship, also known as Oklahoma's Promise, but directed that \$6 million of that funding come from the scholarship program's cash reserve fund. That move freed up an additional \$6 million in certified general revenue funds.

"I think it's important that state leaders and my office and the Office of State Finance look at all of our reserve funds, our cash funds, to see if there are pockets of money that we're not aware of that can be used to help in balancing our budget," Fallin said.

State revenue has been boosted by revenue collections from virtually every tax category exceeding official estimates prepared by the Oklahoma Tax Commission. Collections from personal and corporate income taxes, sales taxes, and gross production taxes on oil all have exceeded the estimates so far this fiscal year. Only collections from the gross production tax on natural gas, which fell nearly 20 percent below the estimate, was less than the projected amount.


Leaders in the GOP-controlled House and Senate have been warning for weeks that despite consistent positive revenue reports, state agencies should prepare for a relatively flat budget next year because of the loss of one-time revenue like federal stimulus funds, cash reserve money and funds from a transportation bond issue that were used to shore up last year's \$500 million shortfall.



## I-40 reopened, but weather closes many thoroughfares

Panhandle were urged to stay off ice-packed roads Tuesday after up to 10 inches of snow covered parts of the region.

Several major thoroughfares were closed after the storm clipped the far northwest part of the state the day before the official start of winter. Numerous wrecks were reported, some with injuries, as vehicles slid off roads. No fatalities were immediately reported, according to the Texas Department of Public Safety

Do not go to the Panhandle," DPS Trooper Lonny Haschel said. "We're really discouraging people from traveling, especially west of Amarillo right now."

About 15 miles of Interstate 40, the main eastwest road through the Panhandle, reopened Tuesday west of Amarillo to the New Mexico line. However,

AMARILLO, Texas (AP) - Travelers in the Texas authorities said they still preferred that travelers remain home and not venture out onto the ice-packed roads. Segments of other highways, including U.S. 385 into Dalhart and U.S. 87 north and west of Amarillo, remained shut down.

> "We need roadways clear so crews can get in and take care of this snow and ice," Haschel said.

> The National Weather Service had a blizzard warning and winter weather advisory in effect until midday Tuesday for the Amarillo area.

> Amarillo was spared the brunt of the storm, receiving only 1 to 3 inches of snow Monday night. But road closures prompted the Amarillo Globe-News to announce on its Web site that it would not be able to deliver newspapers to several area towns. About 1,500 homes in the Amarillo area were reported to be without power early Tuesday. Public schools in the

city remained open.

The Dalhart Independent School District called off classes Tuesday after the area received up to 7 inches of snow. The National Weather Service says flurries were still falling Tuesday in Dalhart, located 30 miles south of the Oklahoma state line.

Forecaster Todd Beal told The Associated Press that 10 inches of snow had fallen since Monday outside Texline, near the border with New Mexico.

"The northwest part of the Texas Panhandle got hit pretty hard," Beal said, adding that the storm was moving east Tuesday and the worst was over.

Haschel said officials are more prepared for snow and wintry weather in the Panhandle than elsewhere in Texas and "we have the equipment and personnel we need" to deal with it.

### Five killed in Texas plane crash

AUSTIN (AP) - A single-engine plane of the areas of the state that suffered the crashed amid a rainstorm in central Texas, killing the pilot, his wife and two children from Georgia, as well as his brother who lived in Texas, officials said Tuesday.

The Piper Saratoga aircraft crashed just before 10 p.m. Monday in a farming and ranching community in northeast Brazos County, said Tom Vinger, a spokesman for the Texas Department of Public Safety.

The flight originated in Atlanta, stopped in Jackson, Miss., and was headed for Waco, Texas, when it crashed in a field north of Bryan and College Station. A resident called 911 to report the crash.

Vinger identified the victims as 33-yearold Michael D. Butler; his 34-year-old wife Kelly; their 14-year-old daughter Brooke; and son Braden, age 2. The family was from Stockbridge, Georgia, south

Also killed was the pilot's brother, David S. Butler, 37, of Mount Calm, Texas, a community outside Waco.

The plane had yet to begin its descent, and storms with rain and lightning were moving through the area when the crash occurred. Vinger said it was not clear if the weather played any role, and that authorities hadn't determined the cause of the crash.

Heavy snow fell Monday in parts of northwest Texas, though the crash occurred hundreds of miles south and east most severe weather.

Investigators from the Federal Aviation Administration and the National Transportation Safety Board were at the crash scene Tuesday and flew over the area in a helicopter, following a similar flight plan to the aircraft that crashed.

"From there, you can see a whole lot more than you can see from down here," said Department of Public Safety Cpl. Jimmy Morgan, who was also at the scene. "Maybe you can see something we don't."

A final determination on what caused the crash isn't expected for up to a year.

Brazos County Police Sgt. Charles Booker arrived on the scene within an hour of the crash and said Brooke Butler, 14, was ejected from the plane and thrown 50 feet.

One of the plane's wings broke away from the rest of the aircraft and came to rest more than 300 yards from the main crash area, he said. The plane smashed into a series of treetops as it sped toward the ground and left a radius of debris spreading outward more than 2 miles.

The owner of the land where the plane crashed told Booker a light rain had begun to fall in the area just prior to the crash, and it kept raining as Booker began investigating the scene.

Eventually it intensified into "a pretty good little downpour," Booker said.

## A&M ignoring distractions from changes

COLLEGE STATION. (AP) — A lot has changed for Texas A&M since its last game against Texas on Thanksgiving.

Mike Sherman was fired and replaced by Kevin Sumlin, but he won't coach the Aggies against Northwestern in the Meineke Car Care Bowl on Dec. 31. They'll be led by interim coach Tim DeRuyter, who must help the Aggies prepare for the game before he leaves to become Fresno State's coach.

"There are a lot of distractions, but we're just going to put that to the side," DeRuyter said.

DeRuyter, who was A&M's defensive coordinator before becoming the interim coach, said he worried about how the team would respond after all the upheaval. But so far his fears have been unfounded.

"A lot of crazy stuff has happened around us right now, but we've done a good job of keeping it together," safety Trent Hunter said.

Part of the motivation for players who will return next season could stem from the fact that Sumlin has been watching most of their practices.

"I said: 'Guys, this is your chance to impress him," DeRuyter said. "Our guys have embraced that. Having coach Sumlin out at practice has been kind of neat for guys to be able to show him what they can do.'

Sumlin, the former Houston coach, has taken over recruiting duties for the Aggies, but has not been involved in bowl preparations. He mostly stays out of the way at practice, occasionally asking about different play-

"We answer questions as we can," DeRuyter said. "He's been good as far as not being high-maintenance. I hope he's been enjoying things."

DeRuyter hasn't had much free time since being hired on Dec. 14 to replace the fired Pat Hill at Fresno State. He has felt torn while handling his duties at A&M and at his new gig. He said he often works 19-hour days to get everything done.

"It's really different," he said. "I'm not sure I was really smart about what I wanted to bite off here. I'm attacking both of them. I'm trying to do right by our players here, which is the most important thing.

I made a commitment to stay here and do that, but at the same time at night I'm trying to put a staff together and do some recruiting. It makes for a full day.

Senior quarterback Ryan Tannehill said the team has practiced well and that the Aggies are intent on getting their first bowl win since 2001. He's kept in touch with Sherman and the former coach has given him some advice.

"He said: 'Win this game and pull your teammates together and go out and play hard," Tannehill said. "He wants us to just continue on doing the things he's taught us throughout his time here. I think we can honor him that way."

They'll get a chance to do it in what is basically a home game in the Houston Texans' Reliant Stadium, little more than 100 miles from College Station. It was in Houston that the Aggies got their last bowl win, a 28-9 victory over TCU in the same bowl when it was called the Galleryfurniture.com bowl and played in the Astrodome.

Texas A&M entered the season with a top-10 ranking and 18 returning starters, but several close loss-
