Economy ended '11 with strongest weeks WASHINGTON (AP) - The final weeks of 2011 were among the economy's strongest as Americans
shopped and traveled more, ending the year with a shot of optimism for 2012.
That's the bright picture the Federal Reserve sketched
in a survey released Wednesday. It said all but one of its 12 banking districts experienced some growth from late November through the end of the year.
Some sectors of the economy, notably Some sectors of the economy, notably housing, remain
weak, the Fed said. But consumers spent more freely weak, the Fed said. But consumers spent more freely.
Factories made more goods. Americans stepped up Factories made more goods. Americans stepted up
travel. And the auto industry enjoyed its best stretch of the year.
Economists noted greater confidence in the tone of the report. For example, the central bank described auto manufacturing as "vibrant "in several districts.
Consumer spending was deemed "robust" in the Dallas region.
"It has been quite a while since we have seen the Fed use words like vibrant and robust to describe any part of the economy," said Brian "ethune, an economics profes-
sor at Amherst College. "I think one of the things driving the stronger language is that things are better than the Fed had been expecting.
The one district that didn't experience growth was Richmond, Va., although even there, the Fed said eco-
nomic activity either "flattened or improved slightly." nomic activity either
The report comes just six months after the economy nearly stalled under the weight of high food and gas prices and supply disruptions from Japan that slowed U.S. manufacturing.

The economy and the job market have both improved since then. And December may end up being the stron-
gest month of 2011 . Employers added 200,000 jobs. And the unemployment rate fell to 8.5 percent - the lowest tate in nearly three years.
"The Fed's report Wednesday confirms what everyone else has been seeing in the economic data from retail
sales to auto sales and manufacturing - activity is mproving," said Jennifer Lee, senior economist at BMO Capital Markets.
Most of the Fed's districts reported holiday sales increased over last year. In particular, New York and
Dallas' districts reported healthy gains. Boston, New York and Minneapolis reported exceptional growth in online sales.
Consumers are spending more on cars and travel, the survey noted. Auto sales in the Atlanta area were the
best sales in more than two years. Boston, New York, est sales in more than two years. Boston, New York,
Richmond and Atlanta experienced gains in tourism from a year ago. In Boston alone, businesses expect double-digit growth in hotel revenue in 2012 .
U.S. manufacturing continued to lift the economy, U.S. manufacturing continued to lift the economy,
particularly in industries that make heavy equipment and particularly in industries that make heavy equipment auto
steel. That has helped boost energy, farming and auto manufacturing sectors, the report said.

Reserve Program (CRP) land; eligible producers are paid $\$ 10$ per acre to keep their expired CRP acreage in grass.
For cropland, on the other hand, EQIP offers financial aid for the installation of terraces, diver-
sions and waterways. It also offers funds towards the implementation of a no-till/strip till program, with an incentive of $\$ 25$ an acre to reduce tillage operations and increase crop residue. Another option available involves the planting of cropland to grass (native or introduced) Similarly, AWEP offers monetary assistance to
producers who agree to improve water conditions producers who agree to improve water conditions
on their property. AWEP practices in Gray County on their property. AWEP practices in Gray County
include the use of irrigation pipelines, converting include the use of irrigation pipelines, converting
existent pivots to more efficient ones and replacing pivots that are at least 20 years old. To be eligible, producers must have irrigated the offered acres in two of the last five years.
Finally, the WHIP provides funds to develop
habitat for wildlife and fish habitat for wildlife and fish on private land. In exchange for participants agreeing to a wildlife
habitat development plan, the NRCS will offer costshare assistance for the initial implementation of certain practices, including prescribed grazing and range planting.
The NRCS accepts applications for EQIP, AWEP and WHIP, but the year is divided into certain funding periods for all three programs. The current
