federal court in San Antonio, Texans may have to wait a little longer to vote in their party primaries while incumbents and big-name candidates watch their advantages slip
away The court ruling and a tight time-
line make it hard for primaries to take place on April 3 which was already a delay from Texas' original primary date of that because the Legislature's maps have not been cleared under the Voting Rights Act and a set o maps drawn by a federal court in
San Antonio were flawed, the three San Antonio were flawed, the thre
judges in San Antonio need to try again to come up with maps that will compensate for Texas' growing population, but not discriminat
against against minorities.
That will take
Antonio court scheduled a meet ing for Feb. 1 to discuss next steps Republican and Democratic officials all voiced hope on Friday that the

the election on April 3, but if the federal judges do not begin work until Feb. 1, that date is nearly impossible.

cians. Those running for Congress or the Legislature don't know what
their districts will look like their districts will look like an some can't even be sure they shoul

incumbents because their biggest
advantage is name recognition and advanage is name recogniuion and
fundraising. The longer the prima-
ry race, the more time challenger ry race, the more time challengers
have a chance to campaign and raise
money. The Texas primary cam-
paign was originally scheduled to paign was originally scheduled to
last only through the first 10 weeks of the year but will now last at least 14 weeks, maybe more.
"The more time a challenger has on make up ground and get out there fundraising, the better off you are as a challenger," said James Henson, director of the Texas Politics Project
at the University of Texas at Austin at the University of Texas at Austin.
"Challengers are loving this.". In court, the chairman of Republican Party, Steve Munisteri, lestified that he wanted to hold the primary as early as possible to give
Texas the greatest possible voice Iexas the greatest possible voice The later the primary, the less likely Texas will influence the outcome. A corollary is that if the presidential
race has been decided by the time race has been decided by the time
Texans vote, fewer of them turn out. Low turnout can be a big problem for incumbents facing challengers, most of whom are usually backed by activist gr
incumbent.
"Low turnout, all things being equal, benefits people who are highly organized, and that tends to be the activist groups," said Henson, who
studies voting patterns, "But in the studies voting patterns. "But in the
cases of some incumbents that have good campaign operations, that can give them an advantage."
The biggest race in Texas this
year is for the U.S. Senate. It Gov year is for the U.S. Senate. Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst is the best known
candidate, and thanks to his personal candidate, and thanks to his personal
fortune and impressive fundraising, he is the perceived front-runner. But the indefinite primary may diminish
those advantages. those advantages.
