# West Texans Ask For LPG Supplies

AUSTIN — West Texas

farmers, county judges, drillers and liquified petroleum gas dealers turned out Monday to urge railroad Commission examiners to assure supplies of LPG to heat West Texas homes and preserve the area's economy.

Otherwise, Midland LPG dealer Jack Walcher said, "It's going to be terrible this winter — there's no way we can supply these people."

WELCHER'S TESTIMONY was echoed and re-echoed by numerous witnesses before the examiners considering regulations to ensure LPG supplies to areas where LPG is produced, but where shortages have occurred or are likely.

Abilene LPG dealer Donald Day said he will not have sufficient gas for customers this winter, although he has made attempts to locate additional supples.

Like several other dealers,

Day said his contract with Warren Petroleum for LPG had not been renewed. And dealer J.H. McCann of Big Spring had a similar story

Walcher said he had lost 25 per cent of his supply — which goes to homes, agricultural uses (such as irrigation pumps) and drilling rigs — and he has not been able to replace.

WALCHER TESTIFIED he has attempted to lease underground cavern storage to hold LPG for the "terrible" winter he predicted — but said that he has had little success with the endeavor.

Citing the Marfa-Presidio area as an example, Walcher commented that five gallons are used in the winter for each gallon in the summer — so if he is pro-rated by his supplier on the basis of summer use, he will have inadequate amounts for customers this winter.

"It's going to cause a lot of people to get cold," he com-


"I think we have a right to expect some of this fuel to come back to us." he added. Borden County Judge Glen

#### FFA



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

#### **School Board Minutes**

Borden County Independent School District

The Board of Trustees met on July 18, 1973 at 8:30 p.m. in a regular session.

The meeting was called to order by President John R. Anderson at which time the minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. The July bills were considered for payment. The motion carried to pay the bills.

Depository bids were accepted by the Board for the purpose of selecting a depository bank for the biennium of September 1, 1973 to August 31, 1975. Criterion for selecting the depository bank was based on the bid. The First Nat-ional Bank of Big Spring was selected as School Depository for a term of two years, beginning September 1, 1973 and ending August 31, 1975 with the following bid: Under \$100,000, 5% for 30 to 89 days: 51/2 percent for 90 days to 1 year: 6% for 1 year or longer. Over \$100,000, 7% for 30 days to 6 months: 7 1/4% from 6 months to 1 year: 7 1/2% for 1 year or longer, with no interest charged on money borrowed by the school.

A financial report was submitted by the Superintendent and approved by the board.

Recommendations were submitted by Superintendent McLeroy to hire Mr. Joe Copeland as Science teacher for the sch-ool year 1973-1974, and Mrs. Joe Copeland as Kindergarten teacher for the year 1973-1974. The recommendations were ap-

proved.

Mr. Jim Burkett, a school board member for the past 8 years, announced his resignation as a board member. Mr. Burkett expressed to the board his appreciation to the people of Borden County for allowing him to serve. He explained that his reason for resigning was to allow his wife an opportunity to apply for the position of school nurse. Mr Burkett then asked for permission to leave the meeting. The board expressed regret over the resignation but accepted the resignation.

Mr. McLeroy accepted the application of Mrs. Frances Burkett R.N., and recommended that she be employed as the school nurse for the year 1973-1974. The board then officially hired Mrs. Burkett.

There being no further business, President Anderson concluded the meeting.

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
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
