County Commission lays out airport cost concerns

Airport Advisory Board requested to make court aware of future expenses

Commissioners with Gray County discussed concerns regarding costs for the county's Perry Lefors Airport terminal

building project at its meeting Thursday morning at 9 a.m. at the county court-house.

The county, which has received \$600,000 in grants to build a new terminal, but is absorbing all costs leading up

to the building's construction. Several purchases, including a \$10,000 concrete building and a temporary plumbing hookup to a trailer, which cost \$4,200, were made without informing the court.

"That (plumbing hookup) possibly could have been done in house, as opposed to bringing in Larry Baker, because that was pretty expensive," said Gray County Judge Richard Peet.

He added that he didn't want the cost of the project to "balloon continuously,"

and requested that Paul Loyd, president of the Airport Advisory Board, make the court aware of any future expenses. Peet also discussed the importance of maintaining the building after it is completed.

"When we have this new terminal, we want that terminal to be maintained in such a way that it is an attractive facility for people flying in here and the gentlemen flying out of here," he said. "In the past, I think that the facility started to **COUNTY** cont. on page 5


"(My kids) thought if we had a sandwich shop, it would draw people in to see my gifts, and see the crafts, and it just escalated to this is what it is now," she said.

Revised loan rates, base quality ranges for cotton producers

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) announced this month through the Gray County Farm Service Agency that it has revised loan rate ranges and base-quality ranges for upland cotton strength and length uniformity, and changes to the staple lengths for which distinct color and leaf loan rate differentials are provided.

CCC uses measures of strength and length uniformity in determining the price support value of a bale of upland cotton. The base-quality ranges for these factors are those for which loan rate premiums and discounts do not apply.

Effective with the loan schedule for 2012 crop

upland cotton, the value ranges for strength and length uniformity loan rate adjustments will be denoted in whole units, consistent with the price reporting of the Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS). For example, the 2011-crop loan adjustments were provided for ranges such as 25.5 - 26.4 grams per tex for strength and 79.5 - 82.4 percent for length uniformity. Effective for the 2012 crop, whole-unit ranges are established such as 25.0 - 25.9 grams per tex for strength and 80.0 - 80.9 percent for length uniformity.

Effective with the 2012 crop loan schedule, the base quality range for strength is established at 26.0 - 28.9 grams per tex and for length uniformity at 80.0 - 81.9 percent. These new ranges are consistent with AMS price reporting and the objectives of the marketing

assistance loan program.

CCC is also revising the upland cotton staple lengths for which distinct differentials are provided. All upland cotton having staple lengths of 31/32-inch and shorter will be subject to one distinct schedule of color grade and leaf differentials. Additionally, upland cotton of staple length 37/32-inch will be subject to color grade and leaf differentials separate from those applicable to all upland cotton of staple lengths of 38/32-inch and longer.

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Women's Health Program funding to cease

AUSTIN (AP) — The federal government on Thursday began making good on its promise to cut off all funding for the Texas Medicare Women's Health Program amid an escalating fight over the state's ban on funding for clinics affiliated with abortion providers.

In a letter to state officials, Cindy Mann, director of the federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, said her agency regretted the move. "We had hoped not to be at this

point. But, unfortunately, as we've made clear to the state at all points in this process, we don't have a choice," Mann said on a conference call with reporters after send-

"Medicaid law is clear," she said. "Patients, not state government officials, are able to choose the doctor and health care providers that are best for them and their

ing the letter.

The standoff stems from a law passed by the Legislature last summer and took effect Wednesday. It bars state funding for clinics affiliated with abortion providers.

The Obama administration had pledged to stop funding the Women's Health Program because federal law requires women to be able to choose any qualified clinic.

Gov. Rick Perry counters that states have the right, under federal law, to determine qualified providers in the program. The program provides care to

about 130,000 women between the ages of 18 and 44 earning less than \$20,000 a year or less than \$41,000 for a family of four — with federal funds paying 90 percent of its cost and Texas covering the rest. Mann said that last year it cost

about \$41 million, and about \$34 million of that came from Washington.

grams similar to the one in Texas, and all of them except Texas are continuing to participate in their programs with federal support, Mann said.

Perry, who slammed the federal government constantly during his short-lived bid for the Republican presidential nomination, has directed state health officials to find the funding to keep the program going from other parts of the budget, but he has promised not to raise revenues to cover the costs.

Planned Parenthood issued a statement criticizing the actions taken by Perry and the Texas Legislature.

"Perry's comments to the rightwing political group Empower Texans that he would take the funding from the already devastated Health and Human Services budget show just how insincere his claims are that he will continue to protect this program for the women and families in our state that rely on it," the statement said.

The law is part of a long-running campaign by conservatives in the Texas Legislature to shut down abortion providers by imposing strenuous regulations and cutting off state and federal funds for their non-abortion services. Perry and Republican state lawmakers specifically don't want Planned Parenthood clinics, which treat 40 percent of the program's patients, to get any state funding, even when that money is not spent on

"It is the height of political posturing for the Obama administration to put the interests of abortion providers and their affiliates, like Planned Parenthood, over the well-being of more than 100,000 low-income Texas women," Perry said in a statement Thursday. "I

About 29 other states have pro- will not stand by and let this administration abandon these Texas women to advance its political agenda; Texas will fund these services with or without the federal government."

Perry had indicated that state officials were discussing the possibility of losing federal funding for the Women's Health Program for weeks. But asked if state leaders and their federal counterparts had been discussing a compromise prior to Thursday's letter, Mann said, "there hasn't been any negotiations on that, nor could there be."

Mann said the phase-out of federal funding will be gradual so women do not suddenly find themselves without health care.

Texas will continue to receive funding for three more months, and if it assumes control of the program during that time, all federal funding would cease.

If not, federal support would continue to be decreased over the next six months.

She said an entirely Texas-run program would not be subject to federal guidelines, but that Texas must present a plan to assume control of - or entirely phase-out the Women's Health Program by April 16, and that the plan must be approved by federal authorities. Until then, Mann said, the state should continue enrolling women into the program to ensure those eligible aren't left without health care coverage.

Perry's spokeswoman Catherine Frazier challenged Mann's contention the state was to blame for ending the standoff.

"It is hypocrisy for CMS to say the state needs to ensure women are not left without health care coverage when they are ones responsible for attempting to end this coverage," she said.



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Business tax amnesty offered

AUSTIN (AP) - Texas has scheduled a limited amnesty period to help businesses pay some tax bills without penalty.

Comptroller Susan Combs on Thursday announced the Fresh Start amnesty period will run June 12 through Aug. 17.

Businesses can use the time to set their records straight, without penalty and interest, on tax reports they failed to file. The amnesty covers taxes and fees originally due before April 1, 2012.

Amnesty does not apply to taxes that were reported but not paid or filing periods that businesses have in audit.

Fresh Start applies to sales tax, franchise tax and other state or local taxes or fees administered by the comptroller's office, except Public Utility Commission gross receipts assessments.

A similar 2007 tax amnesty generated about \$100 million for the state.

Kidnapped boy in foster care

HOUSTON (AP) - Child-welfare officials say a boy who was allegedly kidnapped by his babysitter eight years ago is healthy physically and emotionally.

Miguel Morin is in foster care in Texas after police arrested a family friend accused of running off with the boy back in late 2004.

Lisa Rose, an investigator for child-protective services, testified Thursday that the boy is a normal height and weight and that he's well-mannered. But he cannot read or name the school he attends.

Miguel's parents agreed to provide DNA to confirm that the boy is theirs. It's not clear when the three might be reunited

Low water level closes hatchery

WICHITA FALLS (AP) - Texas wildlife officials have closed one of the state's five fish hatcheries because of lack of water from the ongoing drought.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department fish hatcheries director Todd Engeling said Thursday in a news release that two lakes that feed Dundee State Fish Hatchery southwest of Wichita Falls have not gotten the good rains enjoyed recently in other parts of the state.

The release says Lake Kemp is 1 foot above the level at which the hatchery loses authorization to use water from the lake.

The 97 ponds at Dundee, where striped bass and hybrid striped bass are primarily produced, represent 34 percent of Texas' available capacity for freshwater fish production.

Production of the fish will shift to other facilities. Wichita Falls is about 140 northwest of Dallas.

Gallagher suffers heart attach

LEWISVILLE (AP) - The comedian Gallagher is hospitalized in stable condition after suffering a heart attack at a North Dallas bar before going on stage for a show.

Gallagher's promotional manager, Christine Scherrer, says the 65-year-old is sedated and "slowly recovering" after collapsing Wednesday night.

Marc Cummins, the manager of Coach Joe's Hat Tricks in Lewisville, says the comedian collapsed in his office about 20 minutes before a show that was due to start at 9 p.m.

Cummins says the club's promotions director performed CPR on Gallagher before paramedics arrived.

Last March, the comedian best known for smashing watermelons with a sledgehammer suffered a minor heart attack after collapsing during a performance in Minnesota. His full name is Leo Anthony Gallagher.

Wheelchair schemes nets prison

BEAUMONT (AP) - A Texas woman has been sentenced to nearly four years in federal prison for falsifying Medicare and Medicaid claims for wheelchairs.

Lula Thurman of Humble received the 46-month sentence Wednesday as a result of pleading guilty to conspiracy to commit health care fraud.

The 61-year-old Thurman filed claims for wheelchairs supposedly damaged by Hurricane Katrina and Hurricane Rita that the government says didn't exist.

The scheme netted nearly \$484,000, and Thurman was ordered to pay restitution in that amount.

She entered the plea last October after being indicted five months earlier.

He got off to an often riotous start as he name-checked all the musicians that have inspired him over the years from Elvis to Johnny Rotten and James Brown. Springsteen is the focus of extreme attention at the moment with a new album, "Wrecking Ball," that debuted at No. 1 in 14 countries after its release last week and a tour scheduled.

Paver bricks create attractive driveway

Dear Pat: I just converted my old one-car garage into a study and built a new two-car garage. I would like to install some type of decorative or unique driveway to it. What options do I have? — Carla M.

Dear Carla: A two-carwidth driveway is a wide area, and it can make a difference in the overall appearance of your home. After all, 95 percent of the people visiting your house will come by car. The first thing they will see and walk on is the driveway, so make it a distinctive entrance.

Laying a brick driveway can create unique color and patterns, and it certainly is a project most homeowners can handle themselves. Bricks are readily available in most areas at a very reasonable price.

They are also durable enough to handle the weight of a car. The gaps between the bricks allow water to quickly drain to eliminate puddles. In cold or rainy climates, the surface texture of the bricks and the many edges create a nonslip surface for tires and for foot traffic.

For a distinctive appearance, check with some local demolition companies to locate used bricks. These often are available in a variety of colors that you can mix for your driveway. If you find some which were inside a chimney, these black ones can add a unique antique appearance to your driveway. Laying the bricks on angles in a herringbone pattern is particularly attractive.

Lay a bed of crushed gravel covered by a smooth bed of sand. Place the bricks on this bed and then fill in the gaps with more sand. If a brick does break in the future, it is easy to replace it with a new one. When you buy your bricks, purchase a couple dozen extra for future repairs.

Pavers are another do-it-yourself driveway option to consider. They look somewhat similar to bricks, but they interlock creating a more stable driveway. They are designed specifically for this application, but are quite a bit more expensive than bricks. You should create the same type of gravel and sand bed for pav-

ers as you do for bricks.

Stone creates the most attractive driveway of all. There is a wide range of color, sizes and textures available, so you can create any natural look you desire. Colorful stones can be found at a local stone quarry or some landscaping shops. Stones can get heavy, so you will likely need a helper to build the driveway.

When you select your stones, choose large ones with angular edges. This makes them more stable than smaller ones under the weight of a car. Definitely avoid rounded stones because they will not stay in position when cars repeated drive

over them. Plan on doing some restoning every year to keep it looking nice.

Another option is concrete, but it will have to be professionally installed. Concrete is the most durable of all driveway surfaces. It also creates a smooth, hard surface that is easy to keep clean of leaves, dirt and snow.


To create a unique appearance, consider making a curved driveway. With concrete, you can make any shape you wish. Forms are also available to create various textures in the surface to simulate stone or brick patterns. The form is just pressed down into the concrete before it totally sets up.

Accused shooter held on \$4M bond

BEAUMONT(AP) - A man charged in the fatal shooting of a bystander outside a Texas courthouse, sparking a shootout with law enforcement and a brief hostage situation, was ordered held on \$4 million bond Thursday.

Bartholomew Granger, 41, was also accused of wounding three other people in the incident Wednesday, including his daughter whom authorities said he ran over with a pickup truck as he tried to flee the scene.

Granger, who was on trial at the Jefferson County Courthouse in Beaumont in a separate criminal case, is now charged with one count of murder. Beaumont lies about 80 miles east of Houston.

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The most important skill in politics

Watching Capitol Hill these days, I'm often struck by how issues that were present at the dawn of our Republic continue to reverberate. In the very first session of Congress, when members had to grapple with how to make the new government work, they also had to come to grips with how they themselves could work together. This wasn't easy.

They came from different regions, with different concerns and sensibilities. They had their own, deeply rooted personal beliefs. And even at such an early moment in our history, they were divided by their political agendas. Yet, wrote historian Robert Remini a few years ago, "The members disagreed at times, and even quarreled, but never to the point of creating irreconcilable factions within the House. This cooperation and harmony was essential in the beginning. The members knew it, and therefore worked together to provide a proper start to this 'new experiment in freedom." Politicians who knew how to compromise, in other words, were vital to the survival of our young democracy.

They're no less important today, though you wouldn't guess this if you've been paying attention to this year's campaigns. Politicians running for office don't talk about compromise much — except to sneer at it. They know that voters like decisive statements about principle. And, ever the optimists, they spend their time on the stump hoping that the election will bring an overwhelming victory to their point of view, so that compromise won't be necessary once they're in office.

You already know where this is headed. That doesn't happen much; decisive elections are rare. It's much more common to find houses divided or — especially in the Senate majorities that aren't nearly big enough to avoid the need for one side to deal with the other. Indeed, even should one side get a comfortable majority, our complex system of checks and balances, the Constitution's dispersal of power, and procedural obstacles to protect the minority would come into play, making it difficult in most cases to avoid the necessity of compromise.

Even more important, there is a vast difference between campaigning and actually governing. While they're campaigning, politicians tend to concentrate on those who agree with them ideologically — they want to "fire up the base" and present as stark a difference as possible with their opponents. But this requires a different mindset from the one required once you're in office: when you're campaigning, you have no interest in compromise; when you have to legislate, scorched-earth tactics just alienate the people you have to work with. Yet it's often hard for politicians to change mindsets.

This is not to say that standing on principle is wrong. Sometimes it is the appropriate and proper stance for a politician to take. But let's be clear: taking that position has consequences. We've seen what happens when the two parties in Congress back themselves into their respective corners and refuse to allow their members to find common ground: governing well and effectively becomes next to impossible. Our problems don't get resolved. If all politicians were to take the position that they're going to stick to their views no matter what and not compromise,

it would create gridlock. The status quo would never change.

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Congress's historically low standing in the polls these days stems from the widespread perception that it's unable to act, even in the face of immense challenges at home and abroad. That is why the most important political skill in the country today is the ability to seek and find a

consensus about ways to remedy the problems facing us - and to convince both one's political opponents and one's allies that it's the proper way to move forward. This is a skill that's in short supply today, yet we cannot govern this country unless politicians compromise.

There's one other group who also need convincing: ordinary citizens. Our country seems to be growing ever more divided at a time when, more than anything else, we need to give our politicians room to be politicians, not standard-bearers. The men and women we elect to office need to be able to govern without worrying that if they make concessions or even enter into negotiations with the other side, they'll be voted out of office in their party's

This requires a more sophisticated understanding of the role of comproise than the partisan commentators and activists who help shape our political debate would like to see. But without it, our government won't work. It's as simple as that.

Paul hesitant to back Romney if he wins nomina

COLUMBIA, Mo. (AP) - Republican candidate Ron Paul refused Thursday to commit to backing Mitt Romney if the former Massachusetts governor becomes the party's nominee for president.

An anti-war candidate, Paul said he'd need more information about Romney's international agenda to make that decision.

"I'd talk to him and see what kind of a foreign policy he is going to have," Paul, a congressman from Texas, told reporters at a rally two days before most of Missouri's counties hold their Republican caucuses. "Mitt's a friend and we talk a lot. We just disagree on the issues."

Paul has pursued a strategy focused on caucus states, but he trails Romney, former Pennsylvania Sen. Rick Santorum and former House Speaker Newt Gingrich in the presidential race and has yet to win any of the states that have already voted.

Missouri's caucuses Saturday are the first step in a lengthy process of awarding the state's 52 delegates to the Republican National Convention. Paul so far has earned just 48 delegates, the least of the contenders,

compared to Romney's 495 delegates, according to the latest count by The Associated Press.

Paul hit strongly on his anti-war theme while speaking to about 1,000 people at the University of Missouri's flagship campus. Romney and Santorum also campaigned in Missouri this week.

Paul shied away from naming any of his rivals but suggested they all want to plunge the U.S. deeper into military conflicts in the Middle East.

"They're just itching, the other candidates are saying. 'When are we going to go get Syria? Why don't we start dropping bombs on Syria? When are we going to hit Iran?" Paul said. "The Republicans are going to be in trouble unless they come our way and decide they want a president who's more for peace than for war."

He later added: "If you keep voting for warmongers,

yes, this is going to be very negative.

Romney said last week that he was not prepared to support military action against Syria, where the government has cracked down on political dissent. Gingrich also has opposed sending U.S. troops or equipment to

Santorum has said he favors providing military equipment to the Syrian people but stopped short of backing airstrikes. Santorum has said he would order Iran's nuclear facilities be bombed unless they were opened for international arms inspectors. Romney has said he would combine diplomacy with "a military option" to stop Iran from acquiring nuclear weapons, including returning U.S. aircraft carrier groups to the nearby seas.

Paul told reporters Thursday that sanctions against Iran wouldn't work because they don't hurt the govern-

"It hurts the people who are trying to change their government," he said.





Puppy helping blinded Texas third grader find his way

LEWISVILLE (AP) -The new companion in Zach Thibodeaux's life is young and blond, with a moist nose that snuggles in close whenever opportunity allows.

Natura, a 20-month-old Labrador retriever, is the Lewisville boy's latest bid for independence as he moves toward a life of blindness.

It's been more than a year since Zach, a 9-yearold third-grader, was diagnosed with cone-rod dystrophy, an incurable disease quickly stealing away his eyesight. With just slivers of his vision remaining, Zach sees Natura mostly as a shadow, a vaguely golden shape at his side.

Natura became a part of Zach's life three months ago as part of the K9 Buddy program run by California-based Guide Dogs for the Blind. By providing visually impaired kids and adults with canine companions, K9 Buddy aims to foster independence and the prospect, should they choose, of having an actual guide dog someday.

"Basically, it's to teach them the responsibility of having a dog, so when it's time to receive their own guide dog they know how to live with a dog as well as work with one," said Sandi Alsworth, who oversees Guide Dogs for the Blind's puppy-training efforts in Texas and Arizona.

Zach is learning to be fully in charge of Natura's behavior and well-being, meaning he could qualify for a guide dog as early as age 14. Typically, recipients must be 16.

"We'll be watching him grow into a natural guidedog user as he ages," Alsworth said.

As Zach is proud to point out, he's just one of seven kids in the U.S. to have a dog like Natura. "And the only one in Texas," he said.

For Zach, having a dog not only spurs maturity, it's improving his cane skills and providing companionship during what is increasingly an isolating disability.

Zach knows the situation is a trial run of sorts. He and Natura are constantly together; they play fetch and tug-of-war.

"It's just more fun to have a dog and not be alone," Zach said.

Zach has long been fond of animals, and last year, Johanna Uek, his mother, got him a pair of dogs — a small terrier and a Chihuahua mix to help ease the stress of dealing with his worsening condition.

Those dogs moved on to a relative's house with Natura's arrival. Despite her larger size, she's a typical puppy, bounding up and down stairs, tongue lapping, tail whipping side to side.

Zach called her over one morning at his father's Addison townhouse and slid a red muzzle over her snout as she obediently waited, all business.

"When that leash is on, it's work time," Adam Thibodeaux said. "Her personality changes."

They stepped outside and toward the small park abutting the complex. It was cold and wet, but Zach knew this was something he had to do.

He sensed the damp air, the soggy soil. "It rained again last night?" he asked as Natura wandered onto a patch of grass and circled, sniffing the ground.

"Give her a longer leash, Zach," his father said. "She's got a real short leash right now."

They began their stroll, a morning-chat routine for Zach and his dad. Natura, docile and content, knew the route now, a winding path barely an eighth of a mile long. "Natura is different,"

Zach said. "My other dogs, they scream. They blow up: RAAR RAAR RAAR RAAR!" The two actually met

last summer. But only by chance did they reunite.

After Zach applied for a companion dog through the K9 Buddy program, Guide Dogs for the Blind called on Beth Allen, co-founder of newly launched Lone Star Puppy Raisers in Garland, whose members train puppies to become full-fledged guide dogs.

Natura had been among the new group's first six puppies, and when Allen stopped by Zach's home to assess his readiness for a dog, she brought Natura with her.

"It was just a fluke that they were able to meet," Allen said. "They got to walk down the street a little bit together.

The two obviously clicked. But Natura was already on her way toward becoming a guide dog. By Labor Day weekend, she was headed to California to be matched with a visually impaired person in the Bay Area.

But during the transition, she showed signs of stress - first on the plane, then during the loud mechanized noise of a ramp being lowered on

a van for the disabled. "That's a huge part of what guide dogs do," said Guide Dogs for the Blind's Alsworth. "It was asking too much of her. . That's trauma they didn't want to put her through on a daily basis."

Natura had a change of

"Only 60 percent of dogs who go through the training end up working as guides," Allen said. Some instead become companion dogs for diabetics, search-and-rescue dogs or therapy dogs.

Natura was placed in the K9 Buddy program, and though Alsworth recalled the dog's affinity for Zach, the two flights she'd have to take from Northern California to Dallas would be terrifying for her.

Response came quickly after she explained the situation in an email. Within minutes, someone had volunteered to drive Natura from Los Angeles to Palm Springs.

More emails and phone calls followed as a relay system fell into place. "I had three MapQuest screens up," Alsworth said. "I had no clue where these people lived."

Ultimately, Natura's four-day trek to Dallas unfolded in six legs. Alsworth herself was part of so-called Team Natura, driving the last leg from Phoenix with another volunteer and arriving in time to meet Zach on New Year's Day.

"He was quite surprised," Alsworth said. "It was a touching moment for all of us."

Don't pull the leash till you've asked her to come to you. Hold the kibble to your waist so she'll come to your side. Don't pet Natura before she's finished a task or she'll think she's done.

The instructions fly as Alsworth helps Zach with his dog-handling skills on a frigid February morn-

"See what happened there? she said after Zach called Natura over, noting that the dog actually came to him before the order. "Why? Because you did this.'

She yanked the leash. "So she had the option of either having her head pulled off or coming with you," Alsworth said. "Wait until you say 'come' to pull."

Alsworth said having a dog will provide Zach with what she called "a bridge to society," sparking interaction.

"When you have a cane, people move out of the way," she said. "When you have a dog, people come toward you.'

In coming years, Zach will attend Lone Star Puppy Raisers meetings to continue Natura's training and hone his own dog-handling skills.

"She has totally bonded with Zach," his father said. "They're really a pair now.'

And Zach's parents, who are divorced, agree the experience is teaching their son to empathize with the duties of parent-

"It's building his confidence," Uek said. "He's

Thibodeaux said Zach has had to learn to put off play-

ing his video games after

learning to take care of school until he feeds Natura. and takes her for a walk.

"That's been the best thing about this," he said. "I've seen Zach grow into responsibility."





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

"It's another close game that we lost," Snelgrooes said. "We want some revenge. They are a good team.


