"That's without reason or good cause; there are exceptions there, such as being with parents, having jobs, things

like that."

A previous curfew had been put into place three years ago, but it is set to expire in May, and Rushing thinks it has been a positive step to cut down on juvenile delinquency.

"It's provided us with a great tool to contact these people and see what they're doing, and maybe keeping someone from getting into a little mischief that they might not otherwise do," said Rushing.

on her creations, but more often, prefers to do them freestyle.


"(A pattern) primarily gives you a definite size, so you'll know the definite size you're going to have," said Davis. "You can embellish as you want. You can add beads or more wreaths or take weaves away. You can still make it your own, but with a pattern you pretty much know the size you're going to come up with, because it gives you finished dimensions."

PD's McCullar still seeking volunteers for bike rodeo

Stormy McCullar, crime prevention and public information officer for the Pampa Police Department, is still seeking assistance for this year's Police Department Bike Rodeo.

McCullar said that she still has a variety of jobs to be filled for the rodeo, which is hosted jointly by Pampa EMS and set for Saturday, May 19 from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. at Central Park.

"I need people to come out and actually help," McCullar said. "If they want to get up earlier, they can help me set up and then they can leave if they don't want to actually participate in the bike rodeo. I'll need help with the takedown crew as far as putting everything up and cleaning everything up.

"We also need help manning the booths during the actual bike rodeo itself," she continued. "If we don't get enough volunteers, I'll have to cut down on the booths, as far as the police department is

Who's the rich guy? Obama, Romney duel

BOCA RATON, Fla. (AP) - One candidate is worth up to \$250 million, ran a private equity firm and plans to build an elevator for the cars at his beach house. The other is the former head of the Harvard Law Review who became a best-selling author and millionaire and now lives in the world's most famous mansion - 1600 Pennsylvania Ave.

Just don't expect Mitt Romney and President Barack Obama to embrace their elite status. In a campaign year when populism sells, they are trying to stick the rich guy label on each other, making clear that being wealthy and privileged is not necessarily a political asset when you're running for president in this uncertain economy.

Obama, making a middle-class pitch in wealthy Florida enclaves, opened a new push by Democrats on Tuesday to increase taxes on millionaires, emphasizing a fight with Republicans. The proposal stands little chance of passing in Congress but serves as a stark general election contrast with Romney.

"We've got to choose which direction we want this country to go," Obama told a boisterous audience of students at Florida Atlantic University. "Do we want to keep giving tax breaks to folks like me who don't need them? ... Or do we want to keep investing in those things that keep our economy growing and keep us secure?"

The former Massachusetts governor, who opposes the plan, has faced withering criticism from Democrats who try to paint him as a ruthless financier who has paid lower tax rates unavailable to typical middle class families.

On the other hand, Romney's team contends Obama's plan would raise taxes on small businesses, harming an engine of growth and job creation at a time when the economy needs it the most.

Romney campaign spokeswoman Gail Gitcho said Obama was the "first president in history to openly campaign for re-election on a platform of higher taxes," and the Republican National Committee called the idea of higher taxes on millionaires a "political distraction" that would do little to cure the nation's debt problem.

Obama is pitching the "Buffett rule," named after billionaire investor Warren Buffett, which argues that wealthy taxpayers should not pay taxes at a lower rate than middle-class wage-earners. Obama has proposed that people earning at least \$1 million annually — whether in salary or investments — should pay at least 30 percent of their income in taxes. Many wealthy people earn most of their income through investments, which is taxed at 15 percent, allowing them to pay a lower overall rate.

Obama's team and Senate Democrats have teed up the issue ahead of the annual mid-April deadline when many Americans file their income tax returns with the federal government. In addition to Obama's speech, the president was expected to appear with millionaires and their secretaries who support the plan at the White House on Wednesday while Vice President Joe Biden was discussing the issue in a campaign speech in New Hampshire on Thursday. Yet beyond tax policy, the Buffett rule serves as a touchstone in the contenders' fight to portray each other as the candidate of the elite at a time of 8.2 percent unemployment.

While both Romney and Obama are millionaires, there is a huge difference in their wealth. Presidential candidates have to disclose broad outlines of their holdings, but it's possible to discern only a wide range. Romney is worth \$190 million to \$250 million, according to the filings. Obama is worth between \$1.8 million and nearly \$12 million.

Democrats contend Romney's past as head of the private equity firm Bain Capital is a major weakness because he was paid to reorganize companies, a process that sometimes led to the elimination of jobs. Obama's campaign has repeatedly pressed Romney to release several years of tax returns, pointing to personal tax records that have shown investments in the Cayman Islands and a Swiss bank account. There have been no indications, however, that the investments were used to avoid taxes.

And then there are some of the video clips circulating on YouTube: Romney's proposed \$10,000 bet to January, discussing health insurance providers, that he likes "being able to fire people who provide services to me," and more recently his comment in February that he's "not concerned about the very poor" because they have an "ample safety net."

Romney's wealth gained more attention last month when Politico reported that planned renovations to his San Diego-area oceanside home included a four-vehicle garage with. an "elevator lift" to transport vehicles between floors.

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Romney, focusing ever more attention on Obama, has made a concerted push to paint the president as a detached liberal who doesn't fully grasp the depths of the nation's economic woes. Obama, who has written two best-selling books and taught at the University of Chicago School of Law, is portrayed as an enthusiastic supporter of government instead of private enterprise.

In one dig, Romney calls Obama a "nice guy ... who spent too much time at Harvard" - though Romney himself earned a joint JD/MBA at Harvard, spending more time there than Obama. Romney also says the president suffers from "years of fly- ... ing around on Air Force One, surrounded by an adoring staff of true believers telling you that you're great and doing a great job."

Both would be considered wealthy by any standard. Romney's campaign has estimated that he is paying more than \$6.2 million in taxes on \$45 million in income for the past two years. Obama and his wife, Michelle, reported income of \$1.73 million last year, mostly from books he's written, and they paid more than \$450,000 in federal taxes.

Both Romney and Obama have made appeals to Americans by highlighting more routine endeavors: Obama ventured into an Irish pub on St. Patrick's Day to down a pint of Guinness and frequently talks about his devotion to basketball and other !! sports. Romney, whom aides describe as a penny-pincher, has used Twitter to remind voters about flying Southwest Airlines and grabbing lunch at Subway. In January, one of Romney's sons circulated a photo of his dad doing his own laundry.

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Tenet pays billing settlement

NEW YORK (AP) — Hospital operator Tenet Healthcare Corp. has agreed to pay \$42.8 million to resolve allegations it overbilled Medicare for the treatment of patients who needed intense inpatient rehabilitation.

The Dallas company said Tuesday that the settlement resolves inquiries by the U.S. Department of Justice, Department of Health and Human Services and the U.S. Attorney's Office for the Northern District of Georgia.

The allegations involve the admission of patients at 25 facilities from May 2005 to December 2007. The Justice Department said Tenet billed Medicare for patients who did not meet the standards for admission to inpatient rehab facilities. Medicare pays those facilities at a higher rate because patients require more difficult rehabilitation and more medical supervision than patients at other types of facilities.

The Justice Department said it was the single largest U.S. recovery to date involving inappropriate inpatient rehab admissions.

Tenet said it already set aside money to cover the settlement and will make the payment in the second quarter.

The company said it now operates only eight inpatient rehabilitation centers. It also runs 50 hospitals and around 100 outpatient health centers.

Charges in senator office attack

FORT WORTH (AP) — A homeless man accused of throwing a bag filled with six Molotov cocktails at the office of state Sen. Wendy Davis last month has been charged with arson.

The Tarrant County Criminal District Attorney's Office says 40-year-old Cedric Steele was formally charged Tuesday with the second-degree felony punishable by two to 20 years in prison.

Steele was arrested March 20, hours after the incident in which no one was injured. Investigators say he tried unsuccessfully to speak to Davis in the days before the alleged attack and talked of aliens after his arrest.

Davis wasn't in her Senate district office when staffers heard fire alarms and smelled a strange odor. They opened the door to find burning bottles and waist-high flames, which they put out with a fire extinguisher.

ERCOT expects no outages

AUSTIN (AP) — The state's electric grid operator is predicting that Texas will make it through the summer without rolling outages after the system was pushed to the brink last year.

Trip Doggett, CEO of the Electric Reliability Council of Texas, told lawmakers Tuesday there should be enough power since forecasters are not anticipating the same extreme temperatures seen during last summer's record drought.

Yet Doggett said the reserve power supply will nonetheless be tight and predicted that lesser emergency measures will again be needed. Those steps include asking consumers to voluntarily conserve energy and buying power from other grids. Last summer's sweltering heat pushed the Texas power grid to full capacity. ERCOT escaped resorting to rotating residential outages by shedding large industrial and commercial users and buying power from Mexico.

Secretary serves as family treasure

Q: Seeing your "Antique or Junque" column in our local paper prompted me to send you the enclosed question and photo. This is a photo of an antique secretary that has been in my family for generations. In 1855, one of my ancestors commissioned it to be made by a professional cabinetmaker from Chittenango, N.Y. It is made of black walnut and is in excellent condition. The fruit shaped pulls on the drawers are hand carved, and the glass in the arched doors is original to the piece.

My secretary is a family treasure, and I would appreciate you giving me your opinion of its value and history.

A: The two part black walnut construction, the molded cornice over the two arched doors with glass above the fall front, hand carved fruit pulls, "race track" molding on each drawer, paneled sides, and scalloped apron with bracket feet are characteristic of Victorian Renaissance Revival furniture.


Your circa 1855 secretary would probably fetch \$3,500 to \$4,500 in an antiques shop.

Judge considers delay of Fort Hood trial FREE ADS Free

FORT HOOD, Texas (AP) — A military judge on Tuesday said he would consider postponing until October the trial of the Army psychiatrist charged in the deadly Fort Hood shooting rampage.

Maj. Nidal Hasan's attorneys asked that the trial be delayed from June until October, saying they needed more time to review the large volumes of evidence in the case. The judge, Col. Gregory Gross, previously delayed the court-martial from March until June. It's unclear when he will decide on the defense's second request for a postponement.

Hasan is charged with 13 counts of premeditated murder and 32 counts of attempted premeditated murder. He faces the death penalty if convicted in the November 2009 shootings on the Texas Army post.


Gross on Tuesday denied a defense motion seeking a Defense Initiated Victim Outreach specialist, Fort Hood officials said. The new program aims to help the defense respond to the needs of survivors and victims' families and possibly change their attitudes if they support the death penalty.


Gross also denied a defense request to force prosecutors to provide notes from meetings and conversations with President Barack Obama, the defense secretary and other high-ranking government officials after the Nov. 5, 2009, shootings. Defense attorneys have said they want to determine if anything was discussed that may have unlawfully influenced Hasan's chain of command to prosecute him.

Prosecutors have insisted no Army officers involved in the case have been influenced by higher ranking officials.

Last week, Gross denied a defense request to remove the death penalty as a punishment option if Hasan is convicted.

The 41-year-old Hasan remains jailed. He is paralyzed from the waist down, the result of being shot by police to end the rampage.

showing the president with favorable personal approval ratings and relatively high marks when respondents are asked whether he can relate to their problems. A poll released Tuesday by The Washington Post and ABC News found Obama with a double-digit lead over Romney, 49-37, when adults were asked who better understands their economic problems. About half of the respondents, 52 percent, said unfairness in the economic system favoring the wealthy represented a bigger problem for the country than over-regulation of the free market system, chosen by 37 percent.

Others, however, caution that Obama's populist message can only take him so far, especially with unaligned voters critical in a close election.

Matt Bennett, a former White House aide under Bill Clinton and vice president of Third Way, a Democraticcentrist group, pointed to polling released Monday by his organization that found many independent voters more focused on a presidential candidate emphasizing the increasing of opportunity instead of reducing income inequality.

"Tax fairness is just not their biggest concern and arguments about fairness didn't answer their primary economic worries," Bennett said. "What swing voters want to hear is an optimistic vision for putting the American economy back on top."

On April 11, 1862, the Civil War Battle of Fort Pulaski in Chatham County, Ga., ended a day after it began as the fort fell to Union forces.

On this date:

In 1689, William III and Mary II were crowned as joint sovereigns of Britain.

In 1814, Napoleon Bonaparte abdicated as Emperor of the French and was banished to the island of Elba.

In 1899, the treaty ending the Spanish-American War was declared in effect.

In 1912, Crosley Field, the longtime home of the Cincinnati Reds, had its opening day under its original name, Redland Field. (The Reds defeated the Chicago Cubs 10-6.)

In 1921, Iowa became the first state to impose a cigarette tax, at 2 cents a package.


In 1945, during World War II, American soldiers liberated the notorious Nazi concentration camp Buchenwald in Germany.

Santorum's early success pushed GOP right

WASHINGTON (AP) — From obscure former senator driving a pickup truck across Iowa, Rick Santorum made a surprising - he calls it miraculous — leap to become the most formidable threat to Mitt Romney's march to the Republican nomination. His shoestring campaign, which ended Tuesday, was a constant reminder of Romney's trouble connecting with the party's conservative core.

Santorum's presence in the race pushed to the fore polarizing social issues, such as abortion, access to birth control and gays in the military, that many in the party preferred not to delve into as the GOP prepared to court independent voters in the general election campaign against President Barack Obama. Although he accused the media of unfairly focusing on that part of his broader campaign, Santorum was unapologetic about taking on such issues. "We did focus a lot, yes, on the families and on the dignity of human life and on the moral enterprise that is America," he said Tuesday in Gettysburg, Pa., as he announced his decision to suspend his campaign. He added: "We were winning in a very different way because we were touching hearts. We were raising issues that, well, frankly, a lot of people didn't want to have raised." As it became obvious Santorum could not triumph in the primaries and caucuses, he began talking of an unorthodox strategy of stealing the nomination away from a weakened Romney at a divided Republican National Convention. Santorum argued that the delegates would embrace him as the true conservative in the race, even though most are being sent to the convention by voters who chose Romney. Many Republicans, bent on showing unity against Obama, considered such a strategy disastrous and began calling for the party to rally around Romney as the presumptive nominee. While Santorum avoided mentioning Romney on Tuesday, he pledged to stay in the fight to defeat Obama, which presumably means embracing the party's nominee at some point. In a recent interview, Santorum even said he was open to the possibility of becoming Romney's running mate.

"the worst Republican in the country" to challenge Obama.

Santorum likes to compare himself to President Ronald Reagan, a fellow conservative who happens to have lost his own first bid for the party's nomination before winning in a landslide four years later. The comparison suggests Santorum might expect better chances for himself in 2016, should Obama win re-election.

No matter what, Santorum has made himself a national name and gained influence over his party's agenda.

His withdrawal came after he had fallen hopelessly behind Romney in the race for GOP del-

"We'll see," said Collie, who views Romney as about the same as Obama. "I'm not opposed to a third party."

Early on, Santorum wrestled with competing images: He was the sweater-vest-wearing, smiling underdog, a devoted father of seven taking on the Republican establishment and a multimillionaire front-runner. But he could also come across as a stern moralizer, worried that birth control was harming the nation and government-funded preschools were indoctrinating America's children into liberalism. He seemed to think working mothers would do better to quit their jobs and home school

was bumpy.

Santorum, barely noticed amid a large, colorful Republican field, eked out a surprising victory over his better-funded opponents after doggedly holding 385 town hall meetings across the state. Initially Romney was declared the winner - by just eight votes — and Santorum was relegated to second place. But a few weeks later, the Iowa GOP sheepishly acknowledged errors in the balloting and declared Santorum the winner by 34 votes.

The delayed victory and a thinning field did little to help him in the next four states, where he typically finished in third or fourth place. Fundraising

(CBS Radio followed suit the next day.) Death claimed author Kurt Vonnegut in New York at age 84 and actor Roscoe Lee Browne in Los Angeles at age 81.

One year ago: A bloody, four-month standoff in the West African nation of Ivory Coast ended when troops loyal to the elected president routed and captured his rival, Laurent Gbagbo (loh-RAHN' BAHG'-boh), the longtime strongman who'd lost the vote but refused to give up power. A subway bombing in Minsk, Belarus, claimed 15 lives.

egates. And he risked an embarrassing loss in his home state of Pennsylvania if he stuck around for its April 24 primary. Polls indicated his once strong lead slipping away in Pennsylvania, which ousted Santorum from the Senate in a rout in 2006. Many voters there still remember him unfavorably.

Santorum said he came to the decision to leave the race with his family after his daughter Bella, who suffers from a rare and serious genetic condition, was hospitalized over the holiday weekend. She came home Monday night. Longtime Santorum adviser John Brabender said the candidate, his wife and top advisers agreed on Monday night that ending the campaign was for the best. "It was something everybody felt good about," Brabender said, and "wasn't something that gave us a restless night."

Santorum and Romney talked by phone on Tuesday and agreed to meet in person soon, Brabender said.

One Pennsylvania supporter, Chad Collie, said Santorum's withdrawal left him "speechless."

Collie, owner of a plaster and drywall business, had brought his wife and two children, ages 3 and 5, to what he expected to be a Gettysburg campaign event for the "truly genuine conservative" he planned to support in the state's GOP primary. Would he be willing to vote for Romney instead? their children, as his wife, Karen, did.

He called Obama "a snob" for wanting all Americans to have the opportunity to go to college. And he said fellow Roman Catholic John F. Kennedy's famous 1960 speech about the separation of church and state made him want to "throw up."

Republicans questioned whether Santorum could appeal to party moderates and independents - and female voters — if he were the party's nominee. Santorum pointed to his four years in the House and 12 as a senator and argued that he had a stronger command of foreign and military affairs and the national economy than his opponents.

He reveled in his underdog status, reminding supporters that his campaign lacked the money and slickness of Romney's effort and that he spoke from the heart rather than prepared notes. At times, though, he appeared to talk himself into unnecessary controversies, as when he said the economy wasn't the race's top issue and that unemployment didn't concern him as much as the federal government's threat against individual freedom.

Santorum did things the hard way, with relatively little money and scant campaign organization. At times on the campaign trail he bunked in a supporter's guest room.

Even his breakthrough win in the race's first contest, the Iowa caucuses,

remained a problem, and Santorum was at times overwhelmed by the often negative TV ads supporting Romney.

Santorum's big night came Feb. 7, when he won all three of the states voting: caucuses in Colorado and Minnesota and a nonbinding primary in Missouri

Santorum and Romney tussled in a series of debates. Santorum tried to cast Romney as unable to challenge Obama on his health care law because of his support of a similar health care policy in Massachusetts. Yet Santorum stumbled --- he was even booed — when he acknowledged during an Arizona debate that in Congress he had supported the No Child Left Behind law and other legislation he disagreed with because he had to support the overall Republican effort and "take one for the team."

As other candidates peaked and fell to the wayside, Santorum soldiered on to become the only realistic threat to Romney's ascension. Despite winning Super Tuesday contests in North Dakota, Oklahoma and Tennessee and later balloting in Kansas, Alabama, Mississippi and Louisiana, he kept falling further behind Romney in the delegate count. Santorum said he won those 11 states 'against all odds.'

"Miracle after miracle," he said Tuesday. "This race was as improbable as any race that you will ever see for president."

"I was jealous about my brother because he was getting all the attention when he was born," says Stephanie, 8.








Santorum suspends Republican presidential campaign

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GETTYSBURG, Pa. (AP) — Bowing to the inevitable after an improbably resilient run for the White House, Rick Santorum quit the presidential race on Tuesday, clearing the way for Mitt Romney to claim the Republican nomination.

'We made a decision over the weekend, that while this presidential race for us is over, for me, and we will suspend our campaign today, we are not done fighting," he said.

Santorum, appearing with his family, told supporters that the battle to defeat President Barack Obama would go on but pointedly made no mention or endorsement of Romney, whom he had derided as an unworthy standard-bearer for the GOP.


The former Pennsylvania senator stressed that he'd taken his presidential bid farther than anyone expected, calling his campaign "as improbable as any race that you will ever see for president."

"Against all odds," he said, "we won 11 states, millions of voters, millions of votes.

Santorum signaled his intent to maintain a voice in the campaign to come, saying: "This game is a long, long, long way from over. We will continue to go out and fight and defeat President Barack Obama.

Santorum spoke with Romney before the announcement, a Republican source close to the campaign said, and Romney asked to meet him sometime in the future

The delegate totals told the tale of



Santorum sidered a factor: former House Speaker Newt Gingrich and Texas Rep. Ron Paul.

Santorum had hoped to keep his campaign going through the Pennsylvania primary on April 24, but decided to fold after his severely ill 3-year-old daughter, Bella, spent the weekend in the hospital.

Santorum, a feisty campaigner who took everyone by surprise with his win in Iowa's leadoff caucuses, ran on his conservative credentials and his experience in Congress — he was a House member for four years and senator for 12 — but was hobbled by a lack of money and organization.

He said that while Romney was accumulating more delegates, "we were winning in a very different way. We were touching hearts" with a conservative message.

In a statement, Romney called Santorum "an able and worthy competitor" and congratulated him on his campaign.

"He has proven himself to be an important voice in our party and in the nation," Romney said. "We both recogting the failures of the last three years behind us and setting America back on the path to prosperity."

With Romney on his way to the nomination and a contest against the president, Obama's campaign manager, Jim Messina, sharply criticized Romney for waging a negative ad campaign against his opponents.

"It's no surprise that Mitt Romney finally was able to grind down his opponents under an avalanche of negative ads. But neither he nor his special interest allies will be able to buy the presidency with their negative attacks," Messina said. "The more the American people see of Mitt Romney, the less they like him and the less they trust him."

Santorum said the campaign had been "a love affair for me, going from state to state. ... We were raising issues, frankly, that a lot of people did not want raised."

He spoke almost nostalgically of the race, and of his trademark sweater vest, a pointed visual contrast to his suited rivals.

"Over and over again we were told, 'Forget it. You can't win,'" he said.

Eventually, the improbable had to bow to reality: Santorum would have needed 80 percent of the remaining delegates to win the nomination before the party's national convention in Florida in August. And that couldn't happen as long as Romney was in the race because most upcoming primaries use some type of proportional system to award del-. egates, making it hard to win large num-

nize that what is most important is put- bers of delegates in individual states.

In most states, Santorum's delegates can now support any candidate they choose.

Gingrich, who has been splitting the votes of those who questioned Romney's conservative credentials with Santorum, made an immediate play for his supporters.

He said the former senator's campaign was "a testament to his tenacity and the power of conservative principles.

"I am committed to staying in this race all the way to Tampa so that the conservative movement has a real choice. I humbly ask Senator Santorum's supporters to visit Newt.org to review my conservative record and join us as we bring these values to Tampa."

Paul also congratulated Santorum for "running such a spirited campaign" and called himself "the last - and real - conservative alternative to Mitt Romney."

Suspending the campaign allows Santorum to keep paying off nearly \$1 million in debt, according to recent Federal Election Commission filings. Those debts include about \$500,000 for media consulting and tens of thousands more for telemarking and online advertising, records show.

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Other presidential candidates have eventually extinguished their debt and terminated their campaigns. Former Minnesota Gov. Tom Pawlenty officially shuttered his campaign committee on Tuesday, owing as much as a half a million dollars last fall but slowly whittling that figure down.

Texas spends oil spill cash on conservation

HOUSTON (AP) — Texas is the first state to confirm a deal to spend settlement money from the Gulf oil spill for long-term coastal conservation, working with a private nonprofit to cut through red tape and buy 80 acres of prime habitat for endangered whooping cranes

A three-way deal calls for MOEX Offshore 2007 LLC, a partner in the ill-fated offshore well, to give \$2 million to the Texas Nature Conservancy, which will use it to buy a tract of coastal land where whooping cranes spend the winter. The nonprofit will then give the property to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department to be incorporated into Goose Island State Park. The contract with the landowner has been signed and the handover is tentatively set to be finalized by the end of May. The Associated Press was given the details of the deal signed Tuesday before it was made public. The arrangement allowed the state agency to bypass cumbersome red tape that often slows down government business and to quickly acquire land that likely would have been sold and subdivided for residential use. The \$2 million is part of a \$90 million settlement MOEX made with the federal government and the Gulf states after the 2010 rig explosion that killed 11 people and caused the worst offshore spill in U.S. history. MOEX and several other companies partnered with BP to drill the well and are now being held accountable for the disaster.

Alaska's Prince William Sound, trustees dedicated \$400 million of the \$900 million settlement for long-term conservation and restoration, helping preserve more than 600,000 acres of habitat for animals hurt by the disaster, said Stan Senner, who was the science coordinator for the Exxon Valdez trustee council.

"The strategy of protecting habitats for the species actually worked," said Senner, who is now director of conservation science for the Ocean Conservancy. "They did learn a lesson from the Exxon Valdez. I think there are a number of things they can do in the Gulf region that do provide for longterm conservation benefit and one of those is going to be protecting habitat as is proposed in Texas." While all five Gulf states have wish lists of coastal conservation and restoration projects, this is the first project to be announced since the settlement was reached in February. Until now, most money spent has been either emergency cash funneled toward cleanup or urgent projects mostly paid from a pot of \$20 billion BP set aside to pay individual claims in the immediate aftermath of the spill. More recent settlements, including with MOEX, include civil penalties the companies owe under the Clean Water Act and other federal rules. Texas got about \$6.5 million from MOEX and decided that half would go to the office responsible for preserving and overseeing its land and water resources and half would be spent by the parks service. Texas was able to cut the first deal because it had already pinpointed a few projects that were almost ready to go and working with the Nature Conservancy, a

private nonprofit that can spend money and do research without dealing with governmental red tape, allowed it to speed things along.

"There's very solid agreement on what the priorities are, so we can move quickly on execution," said Laura Huffman, state director of the Nature Conservancy in Texas and one of the people involved in nailing down the contract.

Ted Hollingsworth, the parks service's director of land conservation, said it has little of its own money for land acquisition and was looking even before the settlement for money to buy the property north of Corpus Christi. One of the things that made the project urgent, he said, was the fear that it would be sold to a private developer and more habitat would be destroyed. "From a simple real estate perspective, subdivision residential development would have been a very clear use for that property," Hollingsworth said. "There was a high probability that the area would have been further compromised and divided if it had remained in the private arena." The 80-acre property provides land and water habitat for the whooping cranes, is adjacent to seagrass that helps prevent coastal erosion, oyster beds, marshes, salt flats and important aquatic habitat and includes a mature forest, which Hollingsworth said is important for migratory song birds. These birds cross the Gulf of Mexico, they leave the Yucatan, they leave Mexico ... they fly sev-eral days nonstop," he said, "and by the time they reach the Texas Gulf they have to have a place to rest and eat and these forests are absolutely critical."

Nude maid service raises eyebrows

LUBBOCK (AP) - Police in this staunchly conservative West Texas city are keeping close tabs on a young entrepreneur's recently opened cleaning service that offers nude maids.

Lubbock police Sgt. Jonathan Stewart said the owner of Fantasy Maid Service of Lubbock doesn't have a permit to operate a sexually oriented business and officers are watching for any violation, which would bring a \$2,000 fine.

But owner Melissa Borrett insists she's not operat-

ing such a business. Customers pay \$100 an hour for one maid or \$150 an hour for two maids, and no touching is allowed, she said.

"I run a maid service," the 26-year-old entrepreneur said. "We really just clean houses. These girls are not performers. They're maids."

The West Texas native and mother said she started the business about a month ago because she was struggling as a waitress to make ends meet. She had even been living at the Occupy Lubbock encampment near Texas Tech University's campus in Lubbock.

"I just decided to go a little bigger, work a little smarter," she said.

Her business model isn't unique, but the city's ordinance requires all sexually oriented businesses to apply for a permit, which costs \$650 a year, and to post a \$5,000 surety bond or letter of credit.

Such businesses are defined as any commercial venture whose operations include "providing, featuring or offering of employees or entertainment personnel who appear in a state of nudity, seminude or simulated nudity and provide live performances or entertainment" intended to sexually stimulate or gratify customers "and which is offered as a feature of a primary business activity of the venture."

Stewart wouldn't say how police planned to keep tabs on the maid service, and Borrett said she would hire an attorney to fight any attempt by the city to shut her down.

So far, Borrett said, business has been good and she is now busy interviewing to hire more maids. She currently has three on staff. She offers a regular discount to government employees and law enforcement, and an ad posted Friday on the online bartering site Craigslist offered 20 percent discounts for Easter weekend.



Rocket maker considering Texas commercial launch site

BROWNSVILLE (AP) - Private rocket-maker SpaceX is considering a new Texas launch site near the Mexico border to send commercial spacecraft into orbit.

The proposed Cameron County launch pad is competing with other potential sites in Florida and Puerto Rico, said Gilbert Salinas, executive vice president of the Brownsville Economic Development Council. There is no immediate timetable for a decision.

SpaceX spokeswoman Kristin Brost Grantham said Tuesday that the Brownsville area is one of many potential locations, but she didn't comment any further.

"It's being called the commercial Cape Canaveral," Salinas told The Brownsville Herald.

Salinas told the newspaper that local economic development officials are working with Gov. Rick Perry's office to help close the deal. He estimates that SpaceX could lower unemployment by 1 percent in an area that has one of the state's highest jobless rates. The February unemployment rate in the Brownsville-Harlingen area was 10.9 percent, second only to the McAllen area. The jobless rate statewide is 7.1 percent.

The newspaper reported Monday that local officials have been in contact with Space X for more than a year, but have kept the talks quiet. The news went public this week when the Federal Register published a notice from the Federal Aviation Administration that the agency is seeking an environmental review for the project.

According to the FAA notice, SpaceX would launch its Falcon 9 and other spacecraft from the launch pad over the Gulf of Mexico. Plans call for as many as 12 launches a year at the Cameron County site.

The company is working to demon-

strate that its big Falcon 9 rocket and Dragon capsule can ferry supplies to the International Space Station now that NASA has retired its shuttle fleet.

In 2010, SpaceX, became the first private business to launch a capsule into orbit and return it safely to Earth. The company is run by PayPal co-founder Elon Musk.

SpaceX currently has a launch pad at Cape Canaveral Air Force Station in Florida and is developing a launch site at Vandenberg Air Force Base in California. The company also operates a rocket development facility in McGregor, Texas.

Texas listed fourth among states in teenage birth rate

NEW YORK (AP) -Teen births fell again in the United States in 2010 with the highest rate once more in Mississippi, according to a new government report.

Nearly every state saw a decline in teen births from 2007 to 2010, with the biggest drop in Arizona at 29 percent. Rates stayed about the same in three states: Montana, North Dakota and West Virginia.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention previously reported that U.S. births by mothers of all ages had dropped in 2010 for the third straight year. Experts think the

The rate for teenage moms reached its lowest point since record-keeping began in 1940. The rate fell 9 percent to about 34 per 1,000 girls ages 15 through 19. The decline was seen among all racial and ethnic groups.

The CDC report released Tuesday focused on state figures. The authors say the teen declines have been attributed to pregnancy prevention efforts. They note that a recent government survey showed more use of contraception by teens. Even as it leads the

nation with 55 teen births per 1,000 girls,

Mississippi's rate has been falling like everywhere else. It dropped 21 percent over three years. New Hampshire has the lowest teen birth rate at just under 16.

Since 1991, the overall teen rate has dropped by 44 percent. Without that decline, the authors calculated, there would have been 3.4 million more babies born to girls by 2010.





Before getting started on a gourd, it must dry out for about six months and be cleaned, inside and out. After this process is com-

order the all-natural color and then dye it."

Davis and her husband occasionally find shed antlers on their family farm, and she enjoys the accents that they bring to her baskets. She begins by drilling holes in the antler, and gluing "spokes" into the holes in order to anchor the weave of the basket.

"The curve of your antler determines the shape of the basket," Davis said. "The principle's all the same. I anchor it in, and then weave and fill, but I don't always get the curve. Sometimes it will be straighter, sometimes rounder, more shallow."

After Davis finishes weaving, there's still work to be done before the basket reaches a desired shape.

"Eventually, it will be filled in, and then it will roll around like a bowling ball, because your antler's heavy," she said. "So then, you wet it when it's totally

pleted, Davis can get started decorating the gourd.

"I draw the design on, and then I wood-burn it, and then I come back with a dye, and just paint in the wood-burn, ... and that way your paint doesn't run quite as bad," she said.

Davis has taught her granddaughter, Madison Davis, how to weave baskets, and she also weaves once a week with three

other basket-weavers. "Two are starting weav-

ers, and I like to see their excitement and them getting anxious to learn to do (baskets), and one, we started classes together, so she's woven a long time also," Davis said. "We try and help each other. Everyone has their easy weave and their hard weave.'

can have maybe two to three extra people to help me set up and two to three extra people to help me take down, that would be a big help."


McCullar said that the police department will provide water for any volunteers.

"We're excited about that," Hopkins said. "We need to come out strong in the last three games and hold our winning streak from last year."


"We got a new goal: We can't drop one," Gill said. "Just because we clinch we can't drop one."

The Lady Harvesters shot 388 in the second round, bringing its total to 763. Borger finished second, 29 strokes behind Pampa and will advance to regionals.







Senior Jared Lusk slides into third against Dalhart on Tuesday. The Harvesters won 11-3 and hold a one-game lead in district.

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
