NEW YORK (AP) - Hospital operator Tenet Healthcare Corp. has agreed to pay $\$ 42.8$ million to resolveave allegare tions it overbilied Medicare for the treation.
The Dallas company said Tuesday that the settiement resolves inquiries by the U.S. Department of Justice, Department of Health and Human Services and the U.S. Attorney's Office for the Northern District of Georgia.
The allegations involve the admission of patients at 2 facilities from May 2005 to December 2007. The Justice Department said Tenet billed Medicare for patients who did not meet the standards for admission to inpatient rehab facilities. Medicare pays those facilities at a higher
rate because patients require more difficult rehabilitation
 of facilities.
The Justice Department said it was the single largest U.S. recovery to date involving inappropriate inpatien Tenet said it alr

## Nude maid service raises eyebrows

LUBBOCK (AP) - Police in this staunchly conservative West Texas city are keeping close tabs on a young entrepreneur's recently opened cleaning
service that offers nude maids. service that offers nude maids.
Lubbock police Sgt. Jonathan Stewart said the owner of Fantasy Maid Service of Lubbock doesn't have a permit to operate a sexually oriented business and officers are watching for any vioiation, which
would bring a $\$ 2,000$ fine would bring a $\$ 2,000$ fine.
But owner Melissa Borrett
ing such a business. Customers pay $\$ 100$ an thating such a business, Customers pay $\$ 100$ an hour
for one maid or $\$ 150$ an thour for two maids, and no touching is allowed, she-said.
"I run a maid service," the 26 -year-old entrepreneur said. "We really just clean hou
are not performers. They're maids."
The West Texas native and mother said she started the business about a month ago because she was struggling as a waitress to make ends meet.
She had even been living at the Occupy Lubbock She had even been living at the Occupy Lubbock
encampment near Texas Tech University's campus in Lubbock.
"I just decided to go a little bigger, work a little marter," she said.
Her business model isn't unique, but the city's
ordinance requires all sexually oriented tusinese to apply for a permit, which costs $\$ 650$ a year, and to post a $\$ 5,000$ surety bond or letter of credit. Such businesses are defined as any commercial venture whose operations include "providing, fea-
turing or offering of employees or entertain personnel who appear in a state of nudity, seminude or simulated nudity and provide live performances or entertainment" intended to sexually stimulate or gratify customers "and which is offered as a feature
of a primary business activity of the venture" of a primary business activity of the venture." Stewart wouldn't say how police planned to keep
abs on the maid service, and Borrett said she would hire an attorney to fight any attempt by the city to shut her down.
So far, Borrett said, business has boen good and she is now busy interviewing to hire more maids.
She currently has three on staff She offers a regular discount to gov ment, and an ad posted Friday on the online barterment, and an ad posted Friday on the online barter-
ing site Craigslist offered 20 percent discounts for
Easter weekend.
