Jose T. Cervantes, 68, died April 23, 2012, in Pampa.

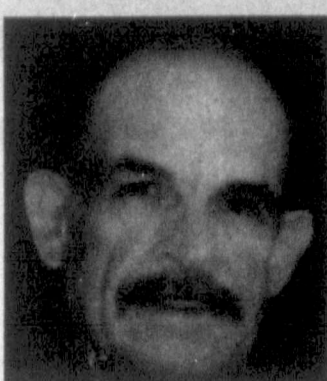
Services were held Friday, April 27, 2012, at Canaan Christian Church, with Pastor Jacobo Velasquez, officiating.

Amazon, Texas reach deal on tax spat

Pilot hurt in Amarillo crash

AMARILLO (AP) — Officials say a helicopter crash during a landing attempt at an airport in the Texas Panhandle has left the pilot slightly hurt. A spokesman for Rick Husband Amarillo International Airport said Friday that the cause of the crash has not been determined.

Steven Picou (PEE'-koo) says authorities do not believe weather was a factor. Forecasters say winds were gusting at nearly 30 mph at the time of the crash Thursday afternoon.

Both men on the Bell Jet Ranger walked away from the wreckage. Picou says the pilot suffered minor injuries and was taken to a hospital for observation.

An Xcel (ex-SEL') Energy spokesman says the chopper was being used to scan utility transmission lines.

The operator, Chesapeake Bay Helicopters Inc. of Chesapeake, Va., did not immediately return a message Friday.

Chicken feed recall in Texas

DALLAS (AP) — A Minnesota company has announced a voluntary recall of some mislabeled chicken feed sold in Texas.

The Feed Solutions recall involves one lot of DuMOR poultry layer 16 percent crumbles. The 50-pound bags were incorrectly packaged in DuMOR poultry grower/finisher bags.

The Shoreview, Minn., company says the incorrectly packaged feed can potentially harm young chicks. One complaint has been reported. A spokeswoman said Friday that the feed is mainly used by people who raise chickens in their yards, not for commercial sales.

The lot was produced March 15 for Tractor Supply Co. and distributed to a dozen stores, since March 22, in north and west parts of Texas. The lot number is: 2MAR15OKC1.

Workers sick from gas leak

BROWNSVILLE (AP) — Emergency officials say seven workers at an oil and gas maritime services company in South Texas have been overcome by leaking gas.

Brownsville Fire Department Chief Lenny Perez says the men became ill following a carbon dioxide leak. Perez says all seven workers were in stable condition when they were transported to a hospital Thursday afternoon.

Names of the men and further details on their conditions were not immediately available. The accident happened at Keppel AmFELS at the Port of Brownsville.

Company officials say the men are employed by a contractor and were working on a fire suppression system on a vessel.

Keppel AmFELS builds and services mobile drilling rigs and platforms.

Meth lab explodes in man's pants

OKMULGEE. (AP) — The Oklahoma Highway Patrol says a portable methamphetamine lab exploded in a man's pants as he tried to run away from a state trooper during a traffic stop.

Tulsa television station KOTV reports the incident happened shortly after midnight Friday in Okmulgee County. Authorities say the man tried to run away when the trooper asked him about a chemical smell.

Trooper Shiloh Hall says the man had an active meth lab in his pants that burst during a struggle with the trooper. The man was checked out by emergency personnel and booked in the Okmulgee County jail on a drug charge.

A portable meth lab is also known as a one-pot lab, where a smaller batch of the drug is manufactured.

Jury chosen in beating trial

HOUSTON (AP) — A jury has been chosen in the Houston trial of an ex-officer accused in the videotaped beating of a teen burglary suspect.

The panel of six jurors plus one alternate selected Friday will decide the fate of fired Houston police officer Andrew Blomberg.

Opening statements in the trial are set for next Thursday. Blomberg is charged with official oppression, a misdemeanor.

Security video from March 2010 appears to show several officers kicking and stomping on then-15-year-old Chad Holley near a business. Holley was later convicted in juvenile court of burglary and put on probation.

AUSTIN — Online retailer Amazon.com reached an agreement with Texas officials Friday to settle a sales tax dispute by expanding operations in the state and starting to collect sales taxes.

The deal comes less than a year after Amazon shut down a distribution center in Irving to protest a \$269 million tax bill sent by Texas Comptroller Susan Combs in 2010.

Combs and Amazon said in a joint statement that the settlement calls for the company to bring at least 2,500 jobs and \$200 million in capital investments. The company will begin collecting and paying sales tax July 1. Last year Gov. Rick Perry denounced Combs' decision to collect the taxes, saying it would cost Texas jobs and discourage companies from moving to Texas.

The announcement came the day after Amazon posted first-quarter profits that blew away analysts' estimates and boosted the company's stock.

The move is a dramatic reversal for Amazon, which has fought hard across the country against

being forced to collect state sales taxes. Texas law requires companies with a physical presence in Texas to collect sales tax. After Combs concluded last year that the company owed \$269 million in uncollected sales taxes, Amazon closed down the warehouse and argued it did not qualify under the law. The deal announced Friday settled that dispute.

In a Securities and Exchange Commission filing Friday, Amazon said it still believes it never owed Texas any taxes but had nevertheless reached a settlement. The national fight over whether online retailers should have to collect state and local sales tax just the same way local merchants must remains unresolved.

Local shops argue online retailers have an unfair price advantage because they are not required to collect taxes on behalf of

the state that in Texas can reach 8.5 percent of the sales price. Combs and Amazon's Vice President of Global Public Policy Paul Misener both committed to working toward a national solution to solving that problem.

"This is an important step in leveling the playing field in Texas," Combs said in a statement. "However, Congress should enact federal legislation that will give states access to revenues that are already due, which would resolve this issue fairly for all retailers and all states."

Amazon has said in the past that the complex-

ity of the state and local sales tax system makes it impossible for big online retailers to accurately collect sales tax and that it supports a national, standardized approach.

"We appreciate Comptroller Combs working with us to advance federal legislation," Misener said. "We strongly support the creation of a simplified and equitable federal framework, because Congressional action will protect states' rights, level the playing field for all sellers, and give states like Texas the ability to obtain all the sales tax revenue that is already due."

Today in History

Today is Saturday, April 28, the 119th day of 2012. There are 247 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On April 28, 1789, there was a mutiny on the Bounty as rebelling crew members of the British ship led by Fletcher Christian set Capt. William Bligh and 18 sailors adrift in a launch in the South Pacific. (Bligh and most of the men with him managed to reach Timor in 47 days.)

On this date:

In 1758, the fifth president of the United States, James Monroe, was born in Westmoreland County, Va.

In 1788, Maryland became the seventh state to ratify the U.S. Constitution.

In 1817, the United States and Britain signed the Rush-Bagot Treaty, which limited the number of naval vessels allowed in the Great Lakes.

In 1918, Gavrilo Princip, the assassin of Archduke Franz Ferdinand of Austria and the archduke's wife, Sophie, died in prison of tuberculosis.

In 1937, former Iraqi president Saddam Hussein was born in the village of al-Oja near the desert town of Tikrit (he was executed in Dec. 2006).

In 1942, pollster George Gallup said most Americans preferred to call the current global conflict "World War II" or "The Second World War" (other suggestions included "Survival War" or "War of World Freedom").

In 1945, Italian dictator Benito Mussolini and his mistress, Clara Petacci, were executed by Italian partisans as they attempted to flee the country.

In 1952, war with Japan officially ended as a treaty signed in San Francisco the year before took effect. Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower resigned as Supreme Allied commander in Europe; he was succeeded by Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway.

In 1967, heavyweight boxing champion Muhammad Ali refused to be inducted into the Army, the same day General William C. Westmoreland told Congress the U.S. "would prevail in Vietnam."

In 1987, Contra rebels in Nicaragua killed Benjamin Ernest Linder, an American engineer working on a hydroelectric project for the Sandinista government.

In 1988, a flight attendant was killed and more than 60 persons injured when part of the roof of an Aloha Airlines Boeing 737 tore off during a flight from Hilo to Honolulu.

In 1992, the Agriculture Department unveiled its pyramid-shaped recommended-diet chart that had cost nearly \$1 million to develop. (A revised pyramid was introduced in 2005; a new approach, "MyPlate," replaced the pyramid concept in 2011.)

Ten years ago: Severe weather, including tornadoes in Missouri and Maryland, killed at least six people. Alexander Lebed, the gruff former general who'd helped defeat the 1991 hard-line Soviet coup, was killed in a helicopter crash near the Russian town of Abakan; he was 52.

Five years ago: A suicide car bomber struck in Karbala, Iraq, killing at least 63 people. A suicide attack on Pakistan's Interior Minister (Aftab Khan Sherpao) killed 28 people; the official was slightly hurt. Death claimed "Tonight Show" assistant conductor Tommy Newsom at age 78 and character actor Dabbs Greer at age 90.

One year ago: President Barack Obama reshuffled his national security team, with CIA Director Leon Panetta succeeding Defense Secretary Robert Gates and Gen. David Petraeus replacing Panetta at the CIA. Convicted sex offender Phillip Garrido and his wife, Nancy, pleaded guilty to kidnapping and raping a California girl, Jaycee Dugard, who was abducted in 1991 at the age of 11 and rescued 18 years later. (Phillip Garrido was sentenced to 431 years to life in prison; Nancy Garrido was sentenced to 36 years to life in prison.) Canada's Patrick Chan won the world figure skating championships in Moscow.

A friendly little lesson on road rules

Drivin' My Life Away

OK, I'm gong to educate a few folks...though I doubt any of it will take hold.

1) If you and I arrive at an intersection at the same time and you are going straight (towards me) and I am turning left, you have the right of way. I am counting on you taking that right of way, and I am really not watching you personally, so when you motion to me to take the left turn, I probably won't notice. What I WILL notice is that your car is not moving. Maybe then I will see some shadowy motion behind the windshield. I might count it to you as being a nice person. But I am more likely going to regard you as a doofus. Just do what you are supposed to do, take the right of way.

2) If you are stopped at a four-way stop and I am approaching from the right or left, if it is apparent I am slowing down, you don't have to wait for me to come to a full stop before proceeding. That way, I won't have to wait on you to get out of the intersection before I can proceed.

Today in History

Today is Sunday, April 29, the 120th day of 2012. There are 246 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On April 29, 1992, rioting erupted in Los Angeles after a jury in Simi Valley, Calif., acquitted four Los Angeles police officers of almost all state charges in the videotaped beating of Rodney King; the violence resulted in 55 deaths and more than \$1 billion in damage.

On this date:

In 1429, Joan of Arc entered the besieged city of Orleans to lead a French victory over the English.

In 1798, Joseph Haydn's oratorio "The Creation" was rehearsed in Vienna, Austria, before an invited audience.

In 1861, the Maryland House of Delegates voted 53-13 against seceding from the Union. In Montgomery, Ala., President Jefferson Davis asked the Confederate Congress for the authority to wage war.

In 1916, the Easter Rising in Dublin collapsed as Irish nationalists surrendered to British authorities.

In 1945, during World War II, American soldiers liberated the Dachau concentration camp.

In 1946, 28 former Japanese officials went on trial in Tokyo as war criminals; seven ended up being sentenced to death.

In 1961, "ABC's Wide World of Sports" premiered, with Jim McKay as host.

In 1974, President Richard M. Nixon announced he was releasing edited transcripts of some secretly made White House tape recordings related to Watergate.

In 1983, Harold Washington was sworn in as the first black mayor of Chicago.

Ten years ago: A year after the loss of a seat it had held for over 50 years, the United States won election to the U.N. Human Rights Commission.

Five years ago: A man shot and killed two people when he opened fire in the parking lot of the Ward Parkway Center in Kansas City, Mo.; the gunman, David W. Logsdon, was killed by a police officer inside the mall. (Police later determined that Logsdon had also beaten to death his neighbor, Patricia Reed.) An elevated section of highway that carried motorists from the San Francisco-Oakland Bay Bridge to a number of freeways was destroyed after heat from an overturned gasoline truck caused part of one overpass to crumple onto another.

One year ago: Britain's Prince William and Kate Middleton were married in an opulent ceremony at London's Westminster Abbey amid pomp, circumstance — and elaborate hats. President Barack Obama visited Tuscaloosa, Ala., one of the sites of deadly tornadoes two days earlier, saying he had "never seen devastation like this."

Wildfire app unveiled

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Wildfire-ravaged Texas is getting a new Internet tool designed to help anyone spot the fire risk where they live, and offer guidance on how best to respond.

The Texas Forest Service on Friday unveiled the new app, the Texas Wildfire Risk Assessment Portal, or TxWRAP, on the steps of the state Capitol. Built in conjunction with the Texas A&M University System, it uses mapping technology to allow homeowners and the general public — not just emergency response officials — to scrutinize areas up to within a 2-mile radius of where they live to spot places where wildfires might erupt.

Its projections are based on factors including drought, wind, humidity and other climate conditions, as well as an area's topology and even things such as shrubs near homes and other buildings that could feed the flames.

Some 26,000 fires across Texas since December 2010 have burned more than 3.9 million acres. The worst was in the town and surrounding county of Bastrop, near Austin, where blazes in September killed two people, destroyed more than 1,650 homes and charred 33,000 acres.

Texas A&M Chancellor John Sharp said the app, "was a first and only of its kind in the world and will save a lot of lives and save a lot of property." He said

he expects the model to be copied by states and municipalities across the U.S.

Sharp said university researchers, state forest service officials and national experts have, "discovered a weather pattern that, when it happens in conjunction with a certain amount of humidity, a certain amount of wind and things like that, you can predict almost with certainty where wildfires are going to be."

No charges for border agent

EL PASO (AP) — Federal prosecutors said Friday there was insufficient evidence to pursue charges against a U.S. Border Patrol agent in the shooting death of a 15-year-old Mexican national in 2010.

The agent didn't act inconsistently with Border Patrol policy or training regarding the use of force in the death of Sergio Hernandez-Guereca, the U.S. Department of Justice said in a statement announcing the decision, which was quickly denounced by the Mexican government.

U.S. authorities have said the agent shot Hernandez while trying to arrest illegal immigrants crossing the Rio Grande on June 7, 2010. Some witnesses said people on the Mexican side of the river, including Hernandez, were throwing rocks at the agent. Border agents are generally allowed to use lethal force against rock throwers.

The shooting occurred under one of the border bridges in El Paso, and it was recorded by an eyewitness with a cellphone.

The Mexican government issued a statement saying it "profoundly regrets and expresses its strong opposition to the deci-

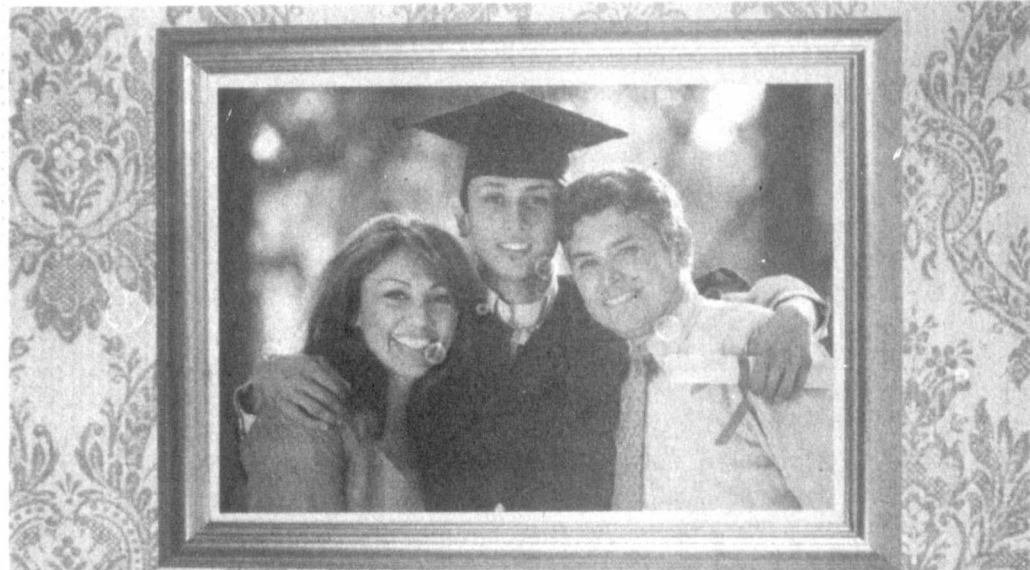
sion" and was considering its next step. Mexican ambassador to the U.S. Arturo Sarukhan had a similar reaction to the decision, tweeting: "Mexico strongly rejects it."

The U.S. Justice Department also concluded that no federal civil rights charges could be pursued, saying that "accident, mistake, misperception, negligence and bad judgment were not sufficient to establish a federal criminal civil rights violation."

The department said it conducted a thorough investigation, including interviews with more than 25 civilian and law-enforcement witnesses.

"This review took into account evidence indicating that the agent's actions constituted a reasonable use of force or would constitute an act of self-defense in response to the threat created by a group of smugglers hurling rocks at the agent and his detainee," the department's statement said.

Last year, a judge in West Texas threw out a \$25 million wrongful death lawsuit against the U.S. government over the fatal shooting. But the judge allowed a civil case against the agent to move forward.

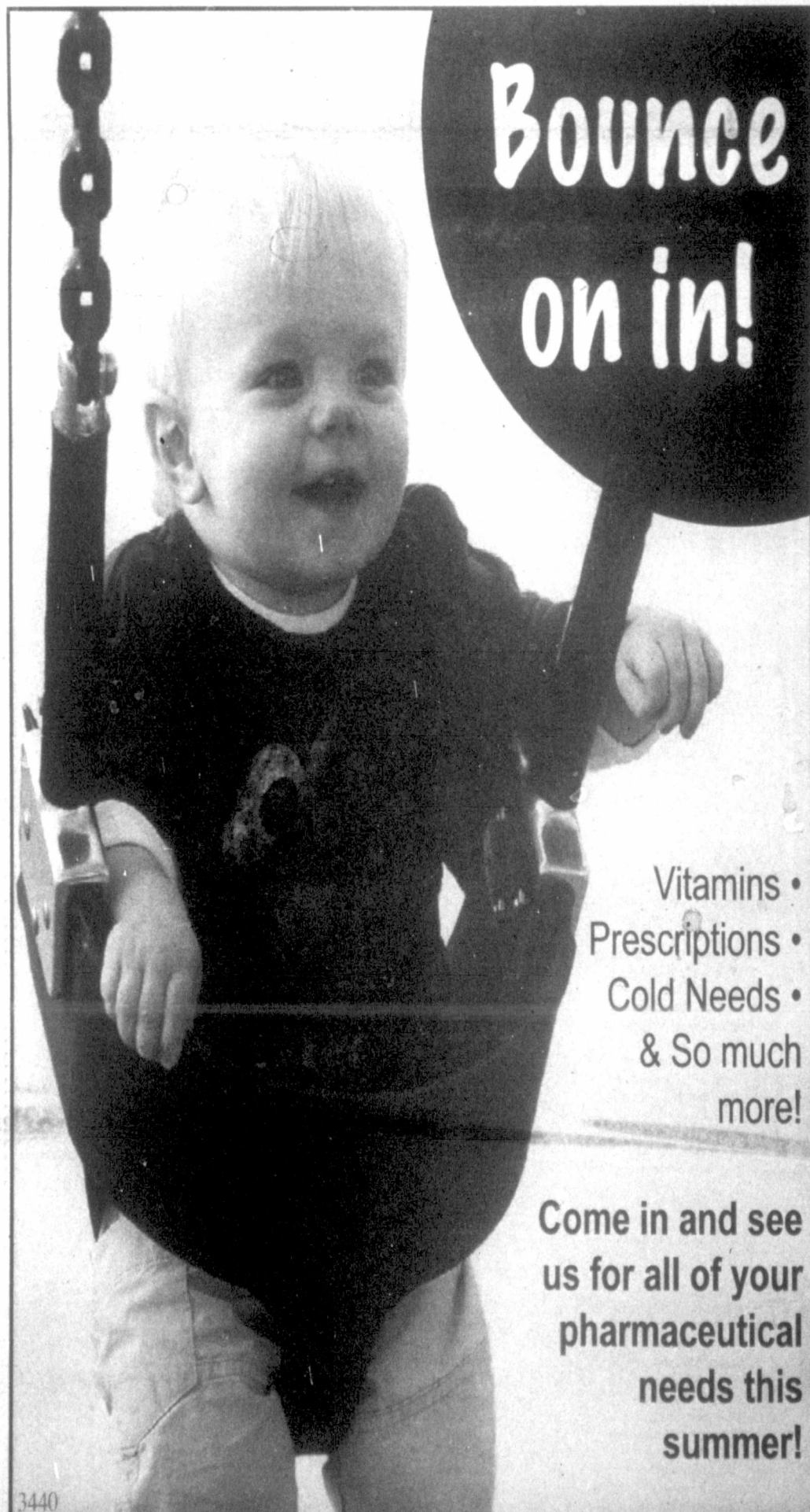

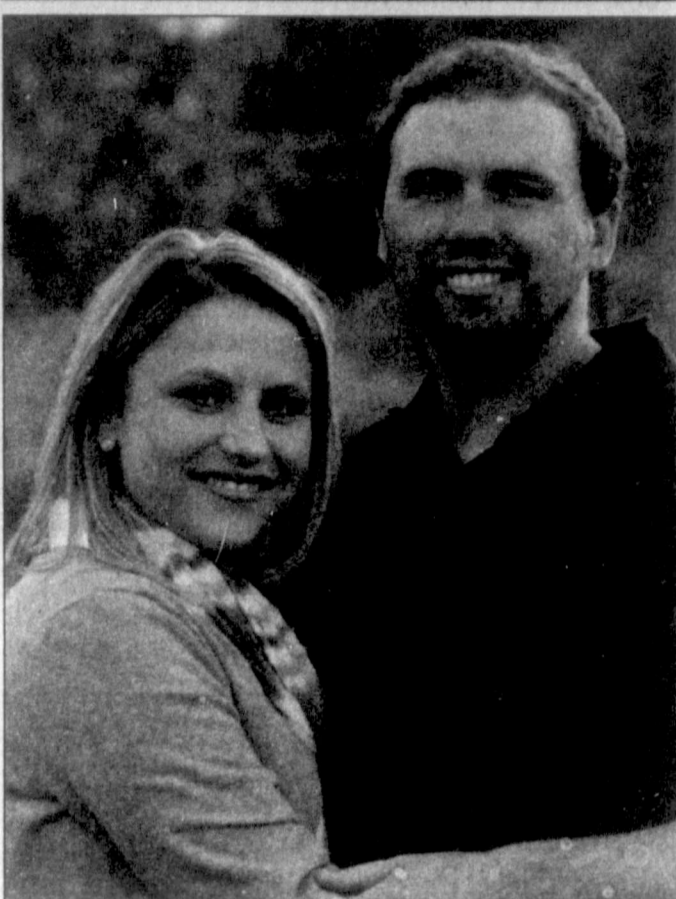

RESOLUTION NO. R12-003

A RESOLUTION ORDERING A BOND ELECTION TO BE HELD IN THE CITY OF PAMPA, TEXAS, MAKING PROVISIONS FOR THE CONDUCT OF THE ELECTION AND RESOLVING OTHER MATTERS INCIDENT AND RELATED TO SUCH ELECTION.

WHEREAS, the City Commission of the City of Pampa, Texas hereby finds that an election should be held to determine whether said governing body shall be authorized to issue bonds of said City in the amount and for the purpose hereinafter identified; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF PAMPA, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: An election shall be held on the 12th day of May, 2012, in the City of Pampa, Texas, which date is not less than seventy-one (71) nor more than ninety (90) days from the date of the adoption hereof and is a uniform election date pursuant to V.T.C.A., Election Code, Section 41.001, for the purpose of submitting the following measure:

"SHALL the City Commission of the City of Pampa, Texas, be authorized to issue general obligation bonds of the City in the principal amount of \$3,000,000 for permanent public improvements and public purposes, to wit: constructing and equipping the City of Pampa Animal Welfare Facility; such bonds to mature serially or otherwise over a period not to exceed FORTY (40) years from their date, to be issued and sold in one or more series at any price or prices and to bear interest at any rate or rates (fixed, floating, variable or otherwise) as shall be determined within the discretion of the City Commission at the time of issuance or sale of the bonds; and whether ad valorem taxes shall be levied upon all taxable property in the City sufficient to pay the annual interest and provide a sinking fund to pay the bonds at maturity?"

SECTION 2: The entire City shall constitute one election precinct for this election and the M. K. Brown Auditorium, 1000 N. Sumner, Pampa, Texas is hereby designated the polling place. The election officers and maximum number of clerks for said polling place shall be determined and appointed in accordance with the provisions of an election services contract (the "Contract") to be executed with the Gray County Elections Administrator.

On election day, the polls shall be open from 7:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M.

SECTION 3: Early voting shall be conducted by the City Secretary at the City Hall, 200 W. Kingsmill Street, Pampa, in accordance with the provisions of V.T.C.A., Election Code. Early voting for this election shall begin Monday, April 30, 2012 and end Tuesday, May 8, 2012, and the hours designated for early voting by personal appearance at such main early voting place shall be from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on each day, except Saturdays, Sundays and official State holidays. Pursuant to the provisions of subsection (d) of Section 85.005 of the Texas Election Code, early voting by personal appearance at the main early voting place shall be conducted for at least twelve (12) hours between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. on Tuesday, May 1, 2012 and Wednesday, May 2, 2012.

SECTION 4: For purposes of processing ballots cast in early voting, the election officers for the early voting ballot board for this election shall be appointed and designated in accordance with the provisions of the Contract.

The Central Counting Station for the tabulation and counting of ballots for this election shall be located at the Gray County Elections Office, Gray County Courthouse, Pampa, Texas, and the Manager, Tabulation Supervisor, Presiding Judge and Alternate Presiding Judge at the Central Counting Station shall be appointed and designated in accordance with the provisions of the Contract.

The Manager and Presiding Judge of the Central Counting Station may appoint clerks to serve at such Station, as provided by Section 127.006 of the Election Code.

SECTION 5: A voting system or systems meeting the standards and requirements of the Texas Election Code, as amended, is hereby adopted and approved for early voting by personal appearance and by mail and for election day voting.

Ballots shall be prepared in accordance with V.T.C.A., Election Code, and permit electors to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid measure which shall appear on the ballot substantially as follows:

"THE ISSUANCE OF \$3,000,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS FOR CONSTRUCTING AND EQUIPPING THE CITY OF PAMPA ANIMAL WELFARE FACILITY"

SECTION 6: All resident qualified electors of the City shall be permitted to vote at said election. This election shall be held and conducted in accordance with the provisions of V.T.C.A., Election Code and V.T.C.A., Government Code, Chapter 1251, and as may be required by law, all election materials and proceedings shall be printed in both English and Spanish.

UT allowing fight at Sun Bowl

EL PASO (AP) — The University of Texas System chancellor announced Friday he will allow a high-profile boxing match to be held on the school's El Paso campus if law enforcement can ensure a safe environment, reversing a 3-day-old ban that had upset city leaders.

Chancellor Francisco Cigarroa had earlier canceled the June 16 fight between Julio Cesar Chavez Jr. and Andy Lee at the Sun Bowl, citing only a "higher than normal" security risk. A law enforcement official told The Associated Press on Friday that a federal risk assessment had warned that leaders of warring Mexican drug cartels would attend.

Cigarroa set several conditions for the fight to go forward: State, local and federal law enforcement must promise they can handle any security measures, the contract with the promoter and the security plan must be approved by system officials in advance, and no alcohol can be served.

The chancellor said he met by teleconference with local and federal law enforcement and city leaders and they assured him they can provide proper security.

In a video statement, Cigarroa praised El Paso and the entire border region.

"This is a region that I grew up in, that I truly love, and that I admire," he said. "The process of my decision-making process resulted in angst and at times anger by the El Paso community, and I accept that."

Fight promoter Bob Arum of Top Rank said he was surprised by Cigarroa's restrictions. Arum said he'll have to

get assurances from the University of Texas at El Paso and local police by early next week that they can be met. If not, Arum said he'll move the fight to Houston.

"This is preposterous. We've never had one bit of problems in Los Angeles, Houston or San Antonio, which are all big Hispanic communities, on a Chavez fight," Arum said.

The risk report, done by the Immigration and Customs Enforcement Homeland Security Investigations, had said leadership of both the Sinaloa and Juarez cartels would be present at the fight — but specified there were no specific threats to the city, the event or those attending it, according to the law enforcement official.

The cartels have waged a bloody war in Ciudad Juarez across the Rio Grande from El Paso for control of drug smuggling routes and other criminal enterprises in the city.

The official, who is familiar with the contents of the report, spoke on condition of anonymity because the official isn't authorized to release the information.

University of Texas at El Paso officials confirmed Friday that university police had received a federal report earlier this month, but declined to discuss its contents.

Homeland Security Investigations "sent a security assessment to UT System who sent it to us and it wasn't for another two weeks they (UT System) decided to cancel," said Veronique Masterson, a public information officer at UTEP.

Cigarroa's previous

decision to cancel the fight without releasing any details angered El Paso officials and state lawmakers, who accused him of fostering a culture of fear that the city has been overrun by cartel-related violence. Despite the drug war raging in Mexico, El Paso ranks among the safest cities in the nation in terms of violent crime.

A day after the cancellation announcement, local, state and federal law enforcement officials in El Paso, including a representative of ICE, said they had picked up no intelligence of a credible threat or security risk associated with having the fight in El Paso.

State Sen. Jose Rodriguez, D-El Paso, who had asked the Texas system Board of Regents to overrule Cigarroa, on Friday dismissed the cartel report as "incredulous."

The cartel leaders weren't likely to show up at a high-security, highly publicized event with a strong police presence, Rodriguez said.

"Logic tells us, common sense tells us, these people would stay away," Rodriguez said.

Arum laughed at the cartel warning.

"Of course members of the cartels will come. When I first started promoting, there were mafia families at Madison Square Garden," Arum said. "It would seem like a good place to arrest them."

Arum called El Paso a natural place to host a fight with a popular Mexican boxer like Chavez Jr. The 51,500-seat Sun Bowl drew more than 40,000 fans to watch Oscar de la Hoya fight in 1998.

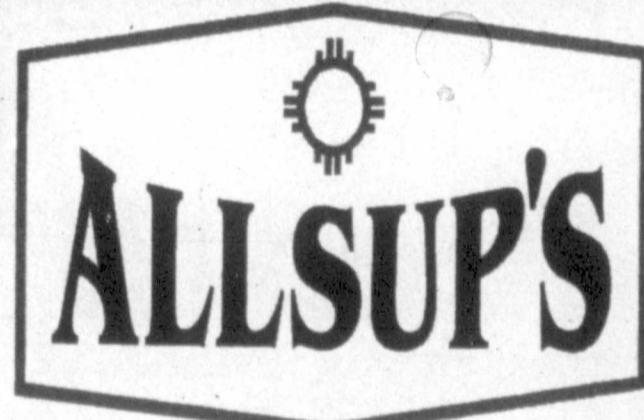

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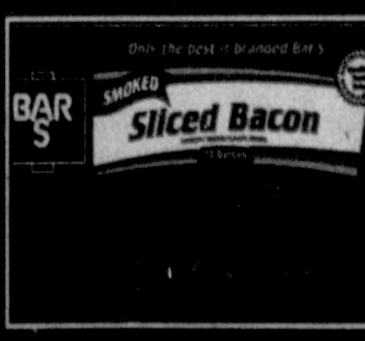

'The Cabin in the Woods' could be instant classic for horror fans

"The Cabin in the Woods" comes from

the minds of Joss Whedon ("Buffy the Vampire Slayer," "Firefly" and the upcoming "Avengers") and Drew Goddard ("Buffy," "Angel," and "Cloverfield"), and if the movie is any indication, their minds are a fun place to be, as well as a bit screwed up.

First off I have to say the movie is more fun if experienced with little to no knowledge upfront. One of the best parts of the movie for me was sitting there for the first hour or more and having absolutely no clue what was going on.

With that warning out

of the way, the movie is about five college kids who go to spend the weekend in a cabin in the woods, only to meet terror and tragedy while there. It's the typical — and most used — horror setup around. But there's a twist, one which trailers appear to give away, but which in

all actuality is spilled in the very first scene of the film. The cabin in the woods is under the control of some mysterious, government looking agency, which is pulling the strings.

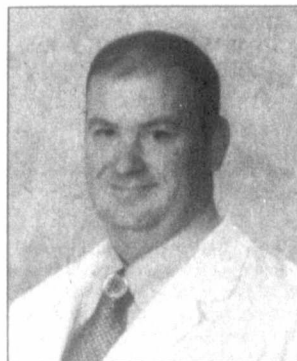
The five kids are your typical horror movie characters: Curt, the jock (played with glee

by Thor himself, Chris Hemsworth, who can be seen on May 4 in "Avengers"); Dana, the good girl (Kristen Connolly); Jules, the naughty one (Anna Hutchison); and Marty, the stoner (Fran Kranz, who steals the show in every single scene he is in).

Unlike most horror films that have these stereotypical characters, the gang here is a little more than what they seem, and each one has a distinct reason for being part of the film. To say any more about the plot would be a disservice to anyone who hasn't seen the film. As I said, not knowing makes the movie better.

What you do need to know is that this is not only a horror film, but also a comedy, and on a much deeper level, a commentary on the current state of horror films, a movie that some people will be able to watch, enjoy and move on, and that others will debate about for years to come.

The movie won't be for everyone, but for horror fans, especially those who can go in with no expectations and an open mind, it will almost certainly be an instant classic.

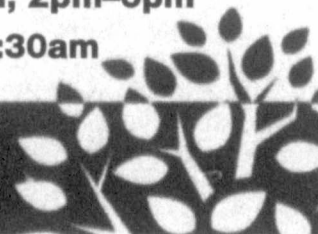

With both starting pitchers throwing well, Friday's game between the Pampa Harvesters and Borger Bulldogs came down to who scored first. Unfortunately for the Harvesters, junior James Thompson hung the first crooked number in a 5-2 loss at Harvester Field.

"James pitched well," head baseball coach Kaleb Snelgrooves said. "That (Chayse) Tracy kid pitched well (for Borger). They stacked some singles on us. ... Tracy kept us

off balance. We didn't hit the ball well and if you don't do that, you aren't going to win."

Tracy limited the Harvesters to two hits through the first six innings and struck out seven. Despite its lack of production, Pampa had runners in scoring position in four of six innings.

Senior Cole Engle said the team couldn't get a hit to fall.

"We had a hard time hitting them," Engle said. "We had that one inning we got close to scoring, when James and I got on. Killgo and (Jared) Lusk were up. That last inning we got a

"I felt like I threw pretty well," Thompson said. "They hit the ball. They hit some bloopers that we missed. I thought we played well as a team. They made plays behind me. It just didn't go our way."

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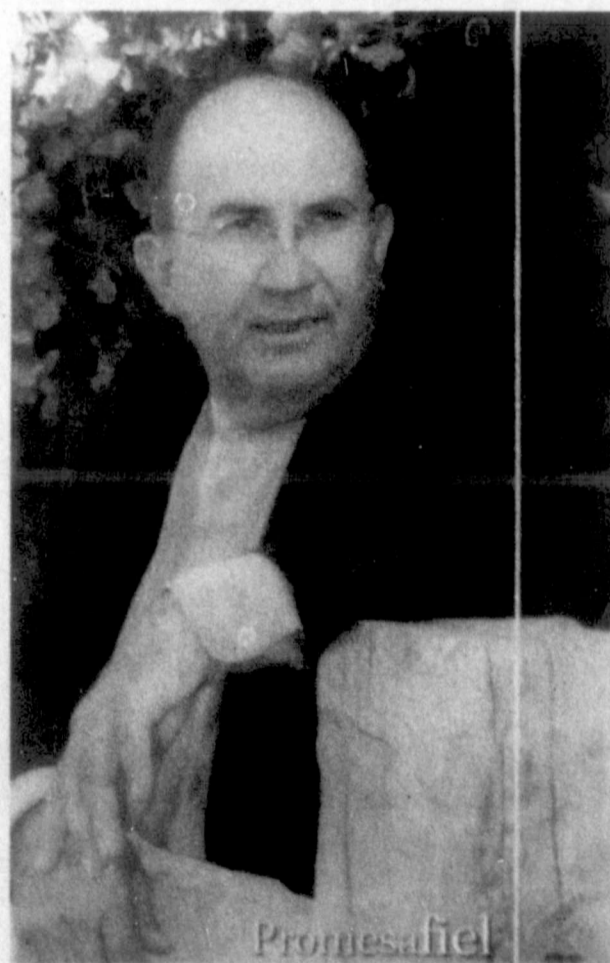
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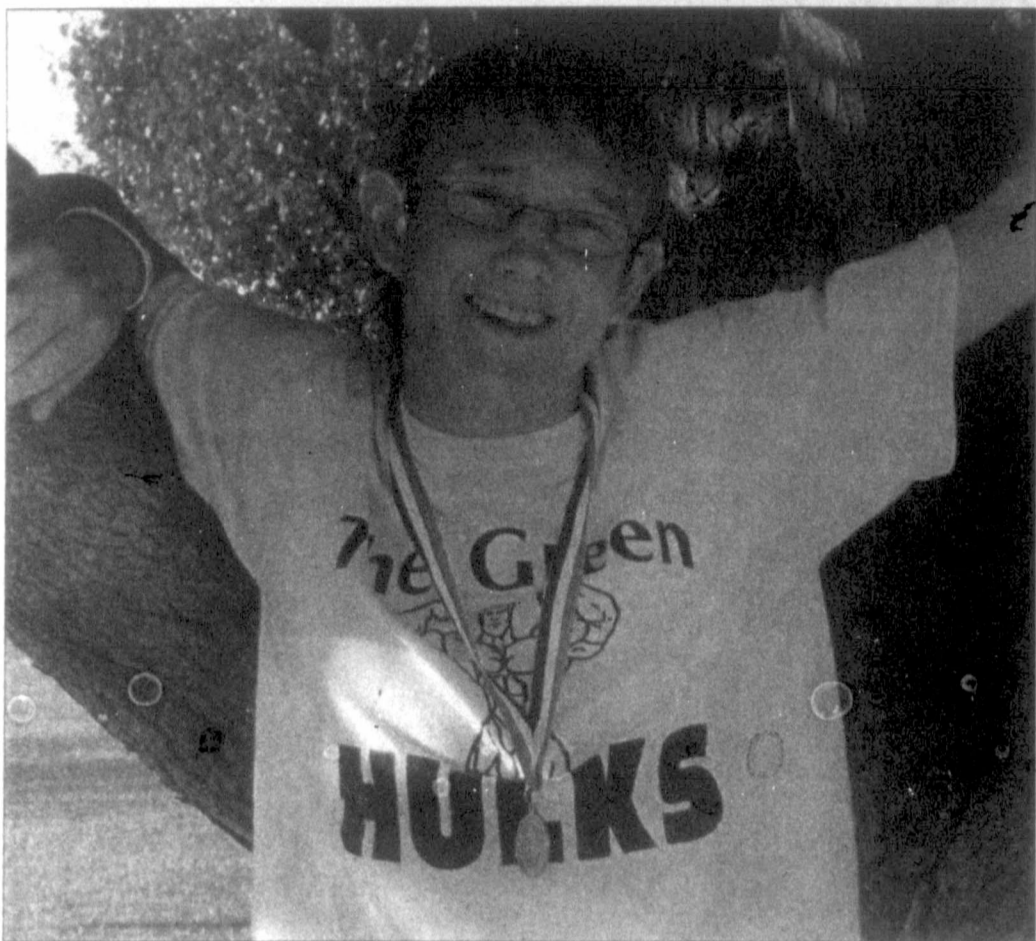

Prosecutors in Clemens case sought to preclude evidence

WASHINGTON (AP) — A motion partially unsealed late Friday shows that prosecutors in the Roger Clemens case sought to keep out allegations made against the government's key witness by his ex-wife.

In the motion, prosecutors urge the judge to prevent the former star pitcher from using the damag-

ing information concerning the witness, Brian McNamee — including that as a police officer, McNamee once placed a beer can in a dead woman's hand at a crime scene. The prosecutors argue the information is irrelevant to the trial.

The government had originally filed the motion under seal last month,

arguing its contents would subject potential jurors to prejudicial information about McNamee.

In a pretrial hearing, an attorney representing The Associated Press and The New York Times urged U.S. District Judge Reggie Walton to unseal the motion. He declined to do so, saying he shared the prosecutors' fears that the

information, if publicly disclosed, would complicate getting an impartial jury.

But when the jury was picked, Walton told the prosecutors that they would have to unseal information in the motion that wasn't already sealed in the New York divorce proceeding.

Walton has not yet

ruled on the government's motion to keep the information out.

Clemens is accused of lying to Congress when he said he never used performance-enhancing drugs. McNamee, the pitcher's former strength coach, says he injected Clemens with steroids and human growth hormone multiple times, which Clemens denies.

In a motion to "preclude evidence, comment and argument regarding government witnesses' prior bad acts," the government seeks to exclude the following:

—A 2001 incident during a Yankees road trip to Florida in which police reports said McNamee was seen having sex with an incoherent woman in a St. Petersburg hotel pool. The woman told police she could not remember what happened, and the date rape drug GHB was found in her system. McNamee, who was never charged, denied he assaulted the woman but instead told police he was trying to pull her out of the pool and rescue her from drowning. But he lied to investigators, including denying he worked for the Yankees, and falsely denying knowing how the woman became incoherent. The prosecution says that with the exception of the false statements to police, the 2001 incident is inadmissible.

—McNamee's "purported misconduct" as a New York City police officer. The prosecution says that in his unpublished manuscript, McNamee admits to being docked 30 days' pay for losing his gun. He also says he "tried to

Pampa will start play in the bi-district round on Friday.

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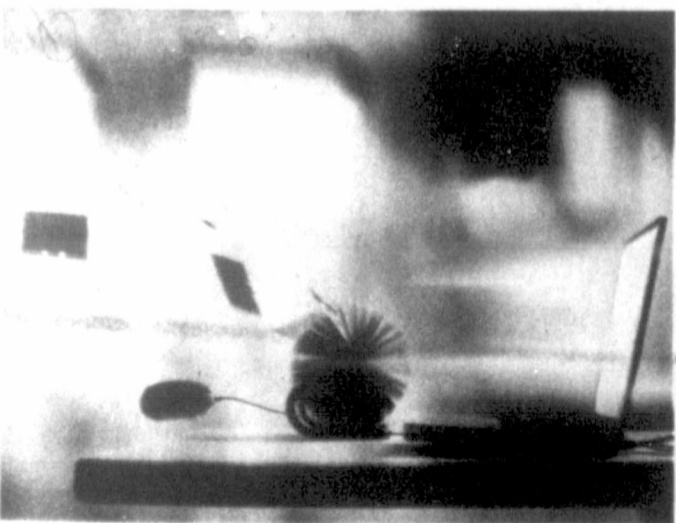
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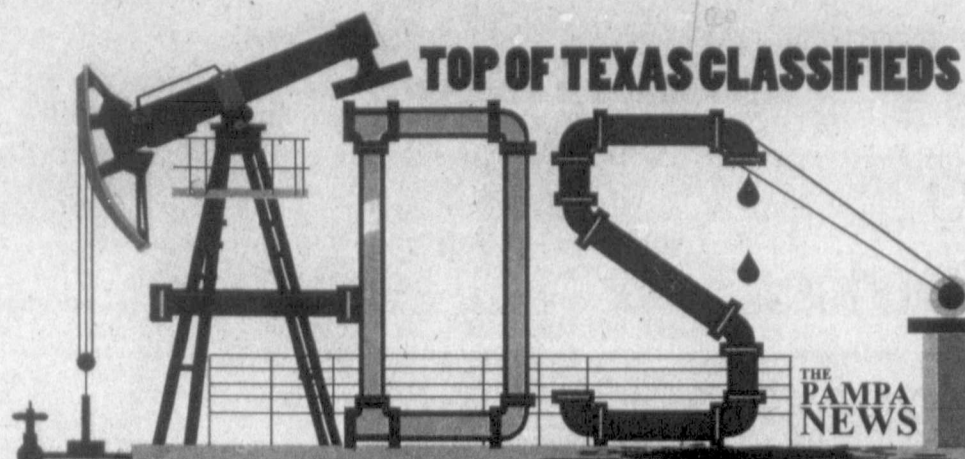
