Pampa's Freedom Museum welcomes new plane

Vietnam War era F105-D is latest addition to museum's fleet of aircraft

There's a new bird in town, and Andy Epps couldn't be happier about it.

Epps, curator of Pampa's Freedom Museum USA, was at the museum on Sunday with fellow veteran Rod Porter, admiring the F105-D fighter-bomber that they had just spent the weekend helping to rebuild. The plane, which arrived in pieces on Friday, is the newest addition to the museum's fleet of battle-used military vehicles and the fifth aircraft to grace the facility's grounds, joining an F4 fighter, a B-25 bomber and a pair of helicopters.

It came via Lackland Air Force Base in San Antonio, with the Freedom Museum paying \$33,000 to have it shipped to Pampa. The money was raised with the help of contributors from all around the city, according to Epps.

"We had the opportunity to get this one from the Air Force," Epps said. "We just worked with them and they finally approved one for us. Thanks to the good people of Pampa, Texas. They donated the money and we finally got it.



NRCS announces partnership to protect wildlife habitats

Lesser prairie chicken among species that benefit

The Natural Resources Conservation Service has announced a partnership with farmers and ranchers to protect wildlife habitats, including the lesser prairie chicken, an at-risk species in Texas. With the Lesser Prairie Chicken Initiative and the Working Lands for Wildlife program, landowners can receive up to 75 percent financial assistance in the installation of

conservation practices to benefit the bird. The conservation methods, which also promote healthy grazing lands, include prescribed grazing, upland wildlife habitat management, brush management, prescribed burning and range planting.

"We are excited about this partnership opportunity to work with Texas landowners and producers to advance the habitat and conservation of the lesser prairie chicken," says Don Wilhelm, state coordinator for the U. S. Fish & Wildlife Service's Partners for Fish and Wildlife Program in Texas.

People interested in the Working Lands for Wildlife program, which creates a \$33 million partnership with farmers and ranchers, can apply at their local NRCS office by today. If funds remain, a second sign-up period will be held through Wednesday, May 30.

The population of the lesser prairie chicken, a ground-nesting bird native to rangelands in Texas. New Mexico, Oklahoma, Colorado and Kansas, has declined over the last few decades due to habitat fragmentation, degradation of habitat and loss of native prairie. Over 90 percent of the bird's habitat occurs on private land.

"The aim of the program is to focus available conservation dollars and wildlife expertise on the recovery of this at-risk species," says Salvador Salinas, state conservationist for the NRCS in Texas. "Our mission is to provide financial and technical assistance to help private landowners and other producers voluntarily restore or enhance their land to create a more sustainable habitat for the lesser prairie chicken, while ensuring the viability of farming and ranching in Texas."

Weather changing Big Bend landscape

PANTHER JUNCTION (AP) -Surrounded by large patches of strawyellow sotol and withered prickly pear, federal botanist Joe Sirotnak summarized the causes of a massive plant die-off that has changed the Big Bend desert landscape, at least tempo-

"This is from the freeze, and that's from the drought. It's a double-whammy," he said, with a sweep of the hand.

The first blow came when only 2.53 inches of rain fell during 2011 at the headquarters of Big Bend National Park, less than a fifth of normal precipitation. And the second was a fiveday freeze in February 2011, when the mercury dropped almost to zero.

"The freeze and drought were acute events, unprecedented in living memory," Sirotnak said.

The drought extended throughout the Big Bend and into northern Mexico, and desert plants once thought to be nearly indestructible, such as creosote bush and lechuguilla — a spiky miniature agave known affectionately as "shin dagger" - succumbed in massive numbers.

The extraordinary plant mortality, first reported in the Big Bend Sentinel, extended to upland trees such as oak, madrone, piñon and juniper. And There will be this vulnerable period while this spring has been somewhat wetter, bringing flowers and some regeneration, the scars might last for

"The question that remains is, is this a long-term landscape-changing event or not?" asked Sirotnak, 41, who has worked at the national park since the late 1990s. "There's a good indication that 20 years from now, you could still see the effects of the drought of 2011 in the plant community."

Cactus specialist Michael Terry, a botanist at Sul Ross State University in Alpine, is seeing the fatal effects of the drought on these supremely hardy

"I'm just seeing them dying. I can think of a half-dozen species at least, maybe a dozen," he said.

"And here's the tricky part: These are the species that normally would have come up and produced seed by now that are not answering the call of spring. There is no water."

Terry's main worry is soil loss caused by the demise of vegetation such as creosote bush.

"Everything that would normally hold the soil in is now dead, and it will where horrible erosion can occur," he

Retired Sul Ross Professor Michael Powell, 74, who has studied the plants of the Big Bend for more than 50 years, said the biggest unknown is what the future holds.

"The million-dollar question is, will the flora change? No one really knows," he said. "I think what we're seeing is climate change, and it is expressed in these kinds of ways. It's been getting drier in West Texas for a long time."

So far in 2012, 2 inches of rain has fallen at Panther Junction, already below average this year but still wetter than in 2011. The ocotillo and surviving prickly pear are flowering.

And if the rains return to normal and keep coming, the effects of the drought of 2011 on the Chihuahuan. Desert might fade, Powell said.

"If things stay that way long enough, for years and years, then ultimately the desert plants will come back," he said.

"But if we keep having these severe: droughts without fairly long periods of normal precipitation, then it's logical we will see floristic changes in the

the military and the federal government, moving planes for them as well as museums. He let us know that there were seven of these that were sitting out at Lackland that were going to be released."

The aircraft is in excellent shape, Epps said, with only a few missing parts that the museum is looking to acquire and install. The plane's good condition is in keeping with its reputation as a durable machine tailored to bearing the brunt of strike bombing during the early stages of the Vietnam War.

"It was ugly, it never flew very good and it was hard to get off the ground, but the pilots loved it," said a reverent Porter, who loaded munitions for F105s during his days in the Air Force. "You could shoot it all to hell and it would still come home. It was just hard to knock

you down. It took a lot of punishment. "It still to this day, as far as I know, flew more sorties than any other type of plane in history. Just that squadron that this one was in over at Korat had over 93,000 sorties, and it was only there for three years. This thing was a workhorse during Vietnam."

Porter has yet to trace the plane's tail number, but he confirmed that the plane was at Thailand's Korat Air Force Base — the air force's largest front line facility in Thailand during Vietnam — from 1966 to 1969, three years before Porter himself arrived at Korat.

"(Porter) lived and breathed with these aircraft when he was over there," Epps said. "I'm thrilled to death (to have the plane here). This is wonderful. ... You know, it's just like the F4. They're both Vietnam vintage air craft, and what makes them special is the way you see these veterans look at them, like Rod Porter and Joe Martinez here in town and others. This means something, like a lot of special memories. It's almost like: in my mind, we're playing a role to help people understand the past and what's gone on, and we're helping folks like Joe and Rod remember some times that are awfully important in this country."

Epps paused to laugh, the fatigue from reassembling

the aircraft evident in his voice.

"I'm kind of worn out," Epps chuckled. "We've been living with this thing for three days, and I'm just so happy it's here. ... I don't know what else to say about it. It's something that people need to come see. They need to know the history. This plane was designed in 1951, tested in 1955, the Air Force adopted it in 1958, and it is a beauty."

Man receives life for shooting

FORT WORTH (AP) - A 20-year-old Fort Worth man has received an automatic life sentence without parole for the robbery and fatal shooting of a teenager

Damian Lamon Murkledove was convicted Friday in the death of 18-year-old Daniel Garner, an Everman High School graduate who lived with his mother and four foster children. Because prosecutors did not seek the death penalty, Murkledove automatically received life.

Prosecutors said Murkledove and two others, who are yet to face trial, went to Garner's house to commit a burglary. Garner, who was playing a video game, was shot five times.

Cop accused of firing gun drunk

DALLAS (AP) — A Dallas police officer is accused of firing a gun while driving drunk early Sunday when he was off duty.

Authorities say Dallas police Officer Rafael Mendoza was arrested in nearby Mesquite on charges of drunken driving, aggravated assault with a deadly weapon and marijuana possession.

One 911 caller said a bullet hit his car.

Mendoza is now on administrative leave pending investigations by Mesquite police and Dallas police

It's unclear when Mendoza returned to work after being placed on leave last summer. He'd been charged with domestic assault and unlawful restraint. A woman said after they'd been arguing, he knocked her on the ground, handcuffed her and threatened to send her to

Body found in burned car

TEXARKANA, Ark. (AP) — Arkansas State Police and the Hempstead County Sheriff's office are working with Texas law enforcement officers to investigate the death of a man found in a burned vehicle near the Arkansas-Texas state line.

The car, registered to a Saratoga, Ark., resident, was discovered Saturday by Bowie County, Texas, sheriff's deputies who responded to a report of a burning vehicle.

Hempstead County deputies went to the home listed on the vehicle's registration and found evidence of a disturbance inside.

Bowie County Sheriff James Prince told the Texarkana Gazette that after Hempstead County officials notified them about what they found, officers returned to the scene and made the grisly discovery.

Prince says investigators believe the death is a homi-

The identity and manner of death of the victim hasn't been determined.

Dallas FBI chief retires

DALLAS (AP) - Robert E. Casey Jr. headed the Dallas FBI when it thwarted a plot to blow up a downtown Dallas office building and used an emergency cellphone wiretap to help bring down a notorious band sionership of Ward 4, is of violent bank robbers.

But in his six years leading FBI operations from North Texas to the Panhandle, Casey has had to do more than fight crime. He said he's had to make decisions — some of which remain under wraps - about investigations, as well as improving public outreach and coordinating with local law enforcement.

"You have no peer in this office," Casey, 54, told The Associated Press in a recent interview. "I'm it on a lot of these decisions. And you have to grow into that job and that responsibility."

Since 2006 Casey has supervised hundreds of FBI agents and personnel in the more than 120,000 square miles of territory his field office oversees stretching from Amarillo to Tyler.

Casey started his career in the Houston Police Department as a patrol officer, and still keeps in his office photos and news clippings of his time there from a quarter-century ago. He wears a Rolex watch he was awarded for being named "Police Officer of the Year"

Oklahoma legislation protested

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — About 250 demonstrators marched on Oklahoma's state Capitol to protest legislation restricting reproductive rights.

UniteWomen.org organized "United Against the War on Women" marches and rallies across the nation Saturday in response to bills that it perceives as attacking reproductive, voting and human rights.

Demonstrators said measures such as the personhood act take away a woman's control over her own body. Senate Bill 1433 would declare that life begins at conception. Protesters said they want lawmakers to focus on education and health care issues.

Demonstrator Zane Wood told KOKH-TV that women have come a long way and their rights need to be pro-

SB 1433 didn't get a hearing Thursday before the House of Representatives adjourned for the week. The Senate passed the measure in February.

Bank freezes tribes' accounts

CONCHO, Okla. (AP) — A Clinton bank issued an administrative freeze on bank accounts of the Cheyenne and Arapaho Tribes of Oklahoma — prompting tribal leaders to declare a state of emergency Friday and announce that tribal assistance to the elderly, poor, children and medically needy could be drastically cut.

Tribal employees will be trimmed to a 32-hour workweek starting next week, said Lisa Liebl, a tribal spokeswoman. The tribe has several hundred employees, she

The tribes' Lucky Star casinos at Concho, Clinton, Canton, Watonga and Hammon are expected to continue normal operations, although that could change as tribal officials continue to evaluate the crisis, she said.

"We are presently looking at all our options and will not take our eyes off the goal of getting the funds restored and the essential governmental services provided," disputed tribal Gov. Janice Prairie Chief-Boswell said in a prepared statement.

Ex-official's property may be seized

SAN (AP) — Texas and U.S. authorities are trying to seize \$20 million in properties — including a San Antonio strip mall and South Padre Island condo unit from a former Mexican government official who is accused of buying them with embezzled money.

Javier Hector Villarreal, 41, the former treasurer of the border state of Coahuila, Mexico, is wanted on charges of money laundering and engaging in organized criminal activity in Bexar County, said Tom Kelley, a spokesman for the Texas Attorney General's Office. Villarreal is also wanted in Mexico, where authorities say he falsified documents to borrow \$222 million on the state's credit, then shuffled the money to relatives in the United

Federal prosecutors filed lawsuits last week in San Antonio seeking forfeiture of a dozen properties — including a pharmacy, a \$1.2 million home and a storage center — the San Antonio Express-News report-

ed. Court documents say all were purchased with money embezzled from the government of Coahuila, and are owned by companies created by Lorenzo Schuessler Jr., Villarreal's brother-inlaw and a San Antonio businessman and former real estate agent.

Authorities also are seeking forfeiture of properties owned Villarreal's family members in the Rio Grande Valley, including a Harlingen car wash and a house and several commercial properties in Brownsville.

Villarreal, a former computer equipment salesman who went into government service in 2008, was arrested in Mexico in October and was freed after posting bail. Shortly afterward, he came to the U.S.

"The facts show Villarreal has received in excess of \$26 million in foreign exchange transactions and cross border wires since (2009)," one of the affidavits states.

In February, Villarreal was arrested in East Texas with his wife, Maria Teresita Botello, and a relative, Oswaldo

Coronado. Sheriff's deputies reported finding \$67,000 in cash in the 2011 Mercedes SUV they were driving. The three were turned over to U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement, according to court documents. They were released, and days later the Mexican government issued Interpol warrants for Villarreal's arrest.

Villarreal's whereabouts are unknown.

Before being charged, he told Mexican media that the allegations were politically motivated and he denied any involvement in Schuessler's businesses. In March, Bexar County prosecutors filed a lawsuit seeking to keep \$6.5 million that the Drug Enforcement Administration Attorney Texas General's Office seized from bank accounts linked to two companies that the government says Schuessler controlled for Villarreal.

Schuessler and Villarreal came to the attention of JP Morgan Chase's anti-moneylaundering unit in 2010 timillion-dollar wire transfers. Schuessler then told bank investigators he was a "front" for Villarreal, according to affidavits.

Schuessler does not face criminal charges and his lawyers deny the allegations. Attorney Van Hilley, who is representing Schuessler in the forfeiture suits, disputed that Schuessler had called himself a "front."

"We are contesting the government's theory that the money in question qualifies as contraband under the state or federal statutes," Hilley said. "My client believes that the money legitimately came out of Mexico."







Today in History

Today is Monday, April 30, the 121st day of 2012. There are 245 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On April 30, 1812, Louisiana (formerly the Territory of Orleans) became the 18th state of the Union.

On this date:

In 1789, George Washington took office in New York as the first president of the United States.

In 1803, the United States purchased the Louisiana Territory from France for 60 million francs, the equivalent of about \$15 million.

In 1900, engineer John Luther "Casey" Jones of the Illinois Central Railroad died in a train wreck near Vaughan, Miss., after staying at the controls in a successful effort to save the passengers.

In 1911, a fire broke out in Bangor, Maine, destroying much of the downtown area before it was brought under control the next morning; two deaths were blamed on the blaze.

In 1912, Universal Studios had its beginnings as papers incorporating the Universal Film Manufacturing Co. were filed and recorded in New York State.

In 1939, the New York World's Fair officially opened with a ceremony that included an address by President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

In 1945, as Russian troops approached his Berlin bunker, Adolf Hitler committed suicide along with his wife of one day, Eva Braun.

In 1958, the American Association of Retired Persons (later simply AARP) was founded in Washington, D.C.

In 1968, New York City police forcibly removed student demonstrators occupying five buildings at Columbia University.

In 1973, President Richard M. Nixon announced the resignations of top aides H.R. Haldeman and John Ehrlichman, along with Attorney General Richard G. Kleindienst and White House counsel John Dean.

In 1980, Queen Juliana of the Netherlands abdicated; she was succeeded by her daughter, Princess Beatrix.

In 1997, the Senate approved the nomination of Alexis Herman to be labor secretary. ABC-TV aired the "coming out" episode of the situation comedy "Ellen" in which the title character, played by Ellen DeGeneres, acknowledged her homosexuality.



Lawmakers to talk school discipline

AUSTIN (AP) — This week lawmakers will examine one of the most expensive and controversial questions facing school districts: what to do with undisciplined kids.

State law requires districts to set up Disciplinary Alternative Education Programs for students from elementary to high school who are removed from their classes for "mandatory or discretionary disciplinary reasons." These programs can be inside the schools or at a different location and some school districts contact private companies to operate them.

One thing all the programs share is expense. In March, the advocacy group Texas Appleseed reported that the Dallas Independent School District spent \$11.3 million on disciplining kids, a total that does not include the \$20.3 million cost of campus security in Dallas.

Last year the Republican-controlled Legislature cut spending by more than \$500 per-student last year, a move that forced schools to cut budgets this year, and there are more cuts coming in the fall. Therefore school districts are looking for places to save money and in Dallas, special schools for kids with disciplinary problems cost the district \$9 million.

Texas Appleseed found that the Disciplinary Alternative Education Program cost the district \$57,000 per student a year, more than a veteran teacher's salary. That's about seven times more than what a Texas school

district spends per student on average.

And since the state school finance system only pays when a student shows up for class, referring 22,827 students for out-of-school suspension and into alternative programs last school year cost the district at least \$2 million in state funds, the group found.

In terms of the state's share, the Texas Education Agency expects 94,819 to be enrolled in Disciplinary Alternative Education Programs in 2012 at a cost of \$14.7 million. Schools districts across the state will spend much more. Groups across the political spectrum agree there must be more cost-effective ways to encourage good behavior, keep classrooms safe and provide a good education.

So it's no surprise the House Public Education Committee on Monday will hear testimony about Disciplinary Alternative Education Programs as well as Juvenile Justice Alternative Education Programs, which schools set up for students expelled from their districts. The lawmakers want to hear from experts on how these

programs are working, whether they need to be changed and whether technology could make them better.

Committee Chairman Rob Eissler, R-The Woodlands, said lawmakers will follow up to see how the laws they pass are implemented.

"Anytime you take a child out of normal circumstances it's going to be extra cost because of the extra cost of staff, not that we'd say it's too expensive and just do away with it," he said. "The question is how can we do it better, and how can it be effective so it isn't so expensive."

In July, the Council on State Government and Texas A&M University studied nearly a million Texas 7th-grade student records to see how school discipline programs affected student achievement and the juvenile justice system. They found nearly 15 percent had been assigned to the disciplinary program and 7 percent were sent to a juvenile justice program, even though only 3 percent of such referrals were mandated by state law. Nearly 75 percent of special education students had been suspended.


Schools expelled more boys than girls and more minorities than whites, and suspended or expelled students were three-times more likely to be in contact with law enforcement, according to the study. Lastly, while half of Texas schools enforced the disciplinary programs as expected, 22 percent had higher discipline rates than expected, and 27 percent less. The authors said this is proof that some schools are doing a better job with discipline than others.

"Nonwhite students and students with specific educational disabilities were especially likely to be removed from the classroom for disciplinary reasons," the report's author's concluded. "In addition, students who were suspended or expelled were at increased risk of repeating a grade, dropping out, or coming into contact with the juvenile justice system."

While the report analyzed the problem, finding solutions will require parents, teachers, administrators and lawmakers to unravel the causes. Creating better relationships between tudents, parents, teachers and administrators will be visible authors said.

Eissler said he ts to learn more Monday about how younger children and special education students are treated and how schools are enforcing discipline. He cited anecdotal reports of police issuing citations to young children with bad consequences for the kids.

The Senate Education Committee will also investigate these issues. This is one case where everyone hopes they can find a better, more cost-effective solution.



Pampa's Holmes third in regional 1600, hopes to advance

LUBBOCK – Junior J'Cee Holmes and Mark Elms, head girls track coach, will be anxiously awaiting results from the other regional meets.

"We are going to keep our fingers crossed," Elms said. "The top two runners from each region go and then the next fastest time. They will look at all the third place times in the state. We'll keep our fingers crossed that (Holmes') 5:37.44 is the next fastest time.'

Holmes finished third in the 1600-meter run (5:37.44) Saturday at the 3A Region 1 Track Meet in Texas Tech's R.P. Fuller Track. There are four regional meets and Holmes can also advance if one of the top two finishers in Region 1 drop out.

Holmes also placed fifth in the 3200meter run on Friday and scored eight points for the Lady Harvesters.

Senior Reid Miller scored the only points for the Harvesters, with his fifth place finish in the 110-meter hurdles (15.31). Miller said he was satisfied with his performance.

"I'm fine with that," Miller said. "There are some things that happen. Some people are just incredible. My goal was to make it to finals, since I didn't last year. Getting to place overall, I'm good with that."

Tad Smith, head boys track coach, said the boys ran well.

"They came down here and tried their best," Smith said. "I'm pleased with what they did. When you get down here it's a different type of race. Every one is fast. My older guys knew what was going on. My younger guys' eyes were wide open. They can come back and try again next

"I didn't run my fastest time," Truitt


said. "I'm not too happy about it." Truitt said she enjoyed getting to run.


The Lady Harvesters had two freshmen and one sophomore compete.
