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

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Dewhurst funds Senate campaign

AUSTIN (AP) — Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst has given his campaign for the U.S. Senate \$6 million in the last six weeks, demonstrating the advantage of being a multimillionaire politician.

In a routine campaign filing Friday, Dewhurst said he also raised another \$500,000 in contributions, for a total

Dewhurst has served as lieutenant governor since 2003, but before that he created a natural gas business. His total wealth is over \$250 million. His name recognition and the ability to finance his own campaign made him the front-runner to replace retiring U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison.

Former Dallas Mayor Tom Leppert is another selfmade millionaire businessman in the race. Former Texas Solicitor General Ted Cruz has relied on support of tea party groups across the state and nation.

Coin toss decides city election

WOLFFORTH (AP) — A winner has been chosen by a coin toss in a Texas city council election.

Church administrator Bruce MacNair won Friday's flip that decided the race between him and Bryan Studer.

The two had agreed to the coin toss to decide the contest for a seat on the Wolfforth (WOOL-furth) city council after each received 118 votes in last weekend's

The men saved the tiny city the \$10,000 cost of a run-

MacNair won by drawing heads. He says he's glad the election is over.

Wolfforth is a bedroom community near Lubbock with about 3,700 residents.

Ex-priest sentenced in murder plot

DALLAS (AP) — A Dallas jury has sentenced a former Roman Catholic priest to 60 years in prison for plotting the death of a man who accused him of sexual abuse. Prosecutors had asked for a life sentence for 53-yearold John M. Fiala during Friday's closing arguments.

Defense attorney Rex Gunter said anything more than 15 years would be a "travesty."

The Dallas Morning News (http://bit.ly/Kucuq3) reports the ex-priest will be eligible for parole after 15

years. Fiala was convicted Thursday for solicitation of capital

His accuser testified Fiala sexually assaulted him — at least once by gunpoint — when he was a boy in West Texas, and threatened to hurt his family if he told any-

The hit man Fiala hired for \$5,000 was actually an undercover police officer.

Men sentenced in drug ring

McALLEN (AP) — Prosecutors say two men have been sentenced for their roles in a South Texas drug ring that smuggled marijuana from Mexico to Houston.

Lauro Arturo Treviño Sr. and Roberto Lee Coronado were sentenced by a federal judge during a court hearing Friday in McAllen. Both men had previously pleaded guilty to possession with intent to distribute

Sixty-year-old Treviño, of Roma, was sentenced to more than five years in prison while 33-year-old Coronado, of Edinburg, was given a prison term of more than four years.

The two were part of a group of more than 20 who were indicted in November, accused of being part of a drug smuggling operation based in Starr County.

Authorities say during their investigation they seized five tons of marijuana and \$120,000 in drug proceeds.

Houston activists arrested

HOUSTON (AP) — Police arrested three people who blocked a door in the Harris County District Attorney's office as part of a protest of this week's acquittal of an ex-Houston police officer for his role in the alleged beating of a black teenage burglary suspect.

The protesters blocked the door for several hours Friday after not being included in a meeting between District Attorney Pat Lykos and several Houston black community activists to discuss the verdict.

Andrew Blomberg was acquitted by an all-white jury of official oppression, a misdemeanor, for his part in the alleged beating of Chad Holley during a 2010 arrest.

The protesters were charged with criminal trespass, a misdemeanor.

In a statement, Lykos said if anyone wishes to see her, there is an appropriate way to schedule a meeting.

DeLay's appeal delayed

AUSTIN (AP) — A court hearing that had been set for next week in the appeal of ex-U.S. House of Representatives Majority Leader Tom DeLay's 2010 money laundering convictions has been canceled.

The 3rd Court of Appeals in Austin on Friday canceled oral arguments in DeLay's appeal without giving a reason. No new date was set.

The Austin American-Statesman reports the cancellation follows a request by DeLay's attorney to have one of the justices on the court - a Democrat - recuse herself because of "anti-Republican remarks" the judge is alleged to have made at a political convention.

DeLay, a Houston-area Republican, has been free on bond pending his appeal of his three-year prison sentence for his role in a scheme to illegally funnel corporate money to Texas candidates in 2002.

Bush to DC for ceremony

WASHINGTON (AP) - Former President George W. Bush plans to return to the White House for the unveiling of his official portrait later this month, marking a rare visit by the two-term president who has largely shunned the spotlight since leaving office.

The White House and Bush's office said Bush and former first lady Laura Bush will return to the White House on May 31 for the release of their portraits.

Bush has avoided politics since he left office in January 2009. The portrait ceremony will be his first visit to the White House in more than two years.

MORNINGRUSH Texas ordered to pay ex-inmate \$2M

Texas Supreme Court ordered the state Friday to pay about \$2 million to an ex-inmate who spent 26 years in prison for murder before his conviction was overturned, a decision legal experts said could set a new standard for when ex-prisoners should be compensated.

Texas has paid nearly \$50 million to former inmates who have been cleared. But state Comptroller Susan Combs had resisted paying Billy Frederick Allen, arguing that his conviction was overturned because he had ineffective lawyers, not because he had proven his innocence.

The state Supreme Court, in a unanimous opinion written by Justice Dale Wainwright, disagreed, saying the state's criminal courts had shown Allen had a legitimate innocence claim and he should be paid.

Jeff Blackburn, chief counsel of the Innocence Project of Texas, which works to free wrongfully convicted inmates, said Friday's ruling could open the door for more compensation claims from exprisoners.

"The floodgates are not opening, but what this will do is give a fair shake to people who are innocent," Blackburn said. "This is a major step forward in terms of opening up and broadening the law of exoneration in general."

Texas' compensation law is the most generous in the U.S., according to the national Innocence Project. Freed inmates who are declared innocent by a judge, prosecutors or

What makes Allen's case different is that he didn't have an innocence declaration. What he had instead was a Court of Criminal Appeals ruling that reversed his conviction based on ineffective counsel and supported a lower court's finding that the evidence against him was too weak for a reasonable jury to convict him.

In effect, the Court of Criminal Appeals, the state's highest court in criminal matters, supported Allen's claim of "actual innocence" and he should be paid, the state Supreme Court ruled.

Kristopher Moore, one of Allen's attorneys, said the ruling should send a message to Combs that the state's top financial officer is not qualified to interpret criminal lawo

"The only body allowed to answer the question of innocence in a case like this is the Court of Criminal Appeals, not the comptroller," Moore said.

Combs spokesman R.J. DeSilva called the ruling "helpful guidance" for the comptroller and said the state has already started the process of paying Allen.

"The Court's decision will also help us pay any other exonerees with similar circumstances to Mr. Allen," DeSilva said.

Combs' office has chal-

sation claims before the Texas Supreme Court. Another ex-inmate, Richard Sturgeon, had his conviction for a 1998 robbery overturned based on problems with his trial attorney and witnesses. He

filed a claim similar to

Allen's.

Texas has paid 80 people about \$49.5 million for wrongful conviction and imprisonment. Most were freed through DNA testing or because their cases involved a drug detective in the Texas Panhandle

town of Tulia who was

later convicted of perjury.

While DNA evidence has led to most of Texas' exonerations, those cases are expected to dwindle because DNA testing has become standard in modern investigations where such evidence exists. More former inmates like Allen — whose case has no DNA evidence are likely to account for more compensation cases,

Blackburn said. "Billy Allen is a classic case where technically speaking you could say that he wasn't really exonerated because certain magic words weren't used," Blackburn said. "The Supreme Court has a much more common sense approach to innocence." Allen was convicted in

the 1983 fatal shootings of James Perry Sewell and Sewell's girlfriend, Raven Dannelle Lashbrook. Allen said he'd frequently visited Sewell because he wanted to sell Sewell scraps of gold as part of a legitimate business, and that he'd leaned against Sewell's car a few days before the couple's deaths, according to court filings.

documents Court said Sewell was found "gagged, handcuffed and covered with blood" near an apartment building, and that Allen's handprint was discovered on top of the car, where Lashbrook was found dead. A police officer testified that when he asked Sewell who attacked him, he answered: "Billy Allen."

But a defense investigator after the trial found two paramedics who heard Sewell saying three names as he was dying. One heard him say "Billy Wayne Allen," the name of another possible suspect. The other paramedic remembered hearing a middle name, but couldn't recall it.

That new evidence left the officer's testimony ineffective, and the remaining major piece of evidence — the palm print on the car — would not have been enough to convict him, the Court of Criminal Appeals determined. Allen's conviction was overturned in 2009 and he was freed from prison.

Although prosecutors dismissed the charges, they said they still considered him a suspect and have kept the case open.

Today in History

Today is Saturday, May 19, the 140th day of 2012. There are 226 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On May 19, 1962, actress Marilyn Monroe sang a sultry rendition of "Happy Birthday to You" to guest-of-honor President John F. Kennedy during a star-studded Democratic fundraiser at New York's Madison Square Garden (the third of four arenas to bear that name).

On this date:

In 1536, Anne Boleyn, the second wife of England's King Henry VIII, was beheaded after being convicted of adultery.

In 1780, a mysterious darkness enveloped much of New England and part of Canada in the early

In 1909, the Ballets Russes (Russian Ballets), under the direction of Sergei Diaghilev, debuted in Paris.

In 1921, Congress passed, and President Warren G. Harding signed, the Emergency Quota Act, which established national quotas for immigrants.

In 1935, T.E. Lawrence, also known as "Lawrence of Arabia," died in Dorset, England, six days after being injured in a motorcycle crash.

In 1943, in an address to the U.S. Congress, British Prime Minister Winston Churchill pledged his country's full support in the fight against Japan.

In 1964, the State Department disclosed that 40 hidden microphones had been found in the U.S. embassy in Moscow.

In 1967, the Soviet Union ratified a treaty with the United States and Britain banning nuclear and other weapons from outer space as well as celestial bodies such as the moon. (The treaty entered into force in October 1967.)

In 1971, poet Ogden Nash, known for his humorous light verses, died in Baltimore at age 68.

In 1981, five British soldiers were killed by an Irish Republican Army landmine in County Armagh, Northern Ireland.

In 1992, in a case that drew much notoriety, Mary Jo Buttafuoco of Massapequa, N.Y., was shot and seriously wounded by her husband Joey's teenage lover, Amy Fisher. Vice President Dan Quayle sparked controversy by criticizing the CBS sitcom "Murphy Brown" for having its title character, played by Candice Bergen, decide to have a child out of wedlock.

In 1994, former first lady Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis died in New York at age 64.

Ten years ago: Boston Cardinal Bernard Law said in a letter distributed to parishes that he did not become aware until 1993 of sexual abuse allegations against the Rev. Paul Shanley. (Immediately afterward, Law said Shanley's authorization to serve as a priest was rescinded.) Walter Lord, author of "A Night To Remember," a minute-byminute retelling of the Titanic disaster, died in New York at age 84.

Five years ago: Group of Eight financial officials wrapped up two days of talks in Germany by calling for more aid, increased debt relief and responsible lending to Africa. Curlin nipped Kentucky Derby winner Street Sense to win the Preakness Stakes.

One year ago: President Barack Obama for the first time endorsed the Palestinians' demand that their eventual state be based on borders that existed before the 1967 Middle East war, a position that put him sharply at odds with Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu. Former Irish Prime Minister Garret FitzGerald, 85, died in Dublin. Katie Couric, the first regular solo anchorwoman of a network evening newscast, signed off the "CBS Evening News" for the last time after five

When President Obama announced his support for gay marriage, supporters and pundits declared it symbolic of a historic shift in American attitudes. But as the attention fades, the fact remains that voters in 31 states have rejected gay marriage and more are lining up to do so.

That leaves opponents of gay marriage to wonder if they're lagging behind history-in-the-making or leading it. Some say that, despite their convictions, they believe marriage between two men or two women will inevitably become law across the U.S. Others say that Obama's announcement strengthens their resolve, and will not slow the drive to protect an institution they consider vital to the nation's survival.

Backers of same-sex marriage often argue that, as more people see friends, family members and neighbors in committed gay relationships, misgivings fade. But opponents cite their own specific, personal experiences — as a missionary working with teens from singlemother households or a nurse treating a suicidal gay man — to explain their belief that the only way forward is for marriage to be limited to one man and one woman.

Many say that while their opposition to gay marriage begins with a reading of the Bible, it is confirmed by the challenges and observations of everyday life in a country whose values they see as crumbling. The politics of recent days, they say, will not change that.

That view is echoed in interviews with opponents from around the country, with some of the strongest conviction in states where gay marriage has been a hot issue.

In Minnesota, where a vote is set for this fall on an amendment similar to North Carolina's, missionary John Tolo said he'd long admired Obama for rising to become the nation's first black president. But he lamented Obama's stand on gay marriage as an unprincipled pursuit of campaign cash.

The president's stand contradicts the lessons of his own experience, said Tolo, recalling his own drug use and multiple sexual relationships after his parents divorced and, more recently, his work in

a poor part of St. Paul. In the Frogtown neighborhood, where Tolo's group has bought and is renovating an abandoned house that he says is a gathering point for teens, too many children grow up in households where there's "this fundamental breakdown of having a healthy father role model and a healthy mother role model," he said. "There's this major identity issue where men are just missing."

Tolo said that, while he supports the idea of some kind of legal recognition for same-sex couples, marriage is a sacred template for raising and caring for children as God intended. For government to try to broaden marriage risks undermining that, while infringing on the rights of Christians to define their own institutions.

"It's like saying Muslim women should no longer be allowed to wear burkas. To me, that's deeply offensive,"

Tolo said. "It's almost like the government wants to come and rewrite the Bible and, to me, that's a position that I don't think the government should take."

In North Carolina, Jennifer Cockerham's support for a gay marriage ban is rooted in a childhood spent in Bible Belt churches, warned against fornication and adultery. She said tornadoes and other cataclysmic events are a sign that God disapproves of the way Americans are living.

But with those beliefs as a foundation, Cockerham said certain experiences during her 23 years as a nurse cemented her opposition to gay marriage.

"My first encounter, personally, with a homosexual was when I had a patient who tried to commit suicide" after an argument with a lover, said Cockerham, who lives in Kernersville, N.C. "I felt really sorry for him because he had almost succeeded with the suicide attempt and I felt that he had so much more to live for than that particular lifestyle that had brought him there."

Visiting a daughter at college near San Francisco, she was dismayed by the openness of gay and lesbian couples.

"I know that made me feel uncomfortable and also made me feel concerned with the fact that they just needed the Lord. I felt they needed a heavenly father who could love them and teach them differently," she says.

On the night of the North Carolina vote, Cockerham stayed up until 1:30 a.m. watching reports of the results that were a fulfillment of her prayers.

Since Obama's announcement the next day, the president is in her prayers. "I can ask God for mercy for him," she says, "and I think the silent majority has finally spoken here in North Carolina."

Another opponent of gay marriage, April Brown of Lewisville, Texas, said the North Carolina vote and Obama's announcement are just the latest in a continuum of events, both public and personal, that have shaped her thinking on the issue over the past four or five

"I was evolving, definitely, just like the president," said Brown, the mother

Until a few years ago, Brown said she was heading toward acceptance of the idea of civil unions for gay couples. But she was troubled after reading about a lawsuit filed by a gay man against the eHarmony dating site, demanding it provide matchmaking for gays and lesbians. That struck a chord because Brown knew two straight couples who had met through eHarmony and gotten married. While same-sex couples might argue they had a right to be together, what gave gays or lesbians the right, she wondered, to demand a private business change its ways to suit them?

Brown, who describes herself as conservative, said she became more concerned as demands grew among gayrights advocates for a right to marriage, which she regards as a religious institu-

"I just began kind of questioning, what

do they really want?" she said.

Brown said she doesn't want to tell people they can't be together. But the word "marriage" means something more, the joining of a man and a woman that is critical for society to sustain itself. "That's when it goes from a right to a privilege," she said.

Still, Brown is uncertain what recent events may say about the direction of American society. In the short-run, she believes conservative voters who were skeptical of Mitt Romney could be galvanized to support his candidacy. She notes that polls show a majority of Americans now approve of same-sex relationships. But votes like the one in North Carolina show they will not embrace gay marriage, she said.

Others, though, are increasingly concerned that such votes will not be enough.

Tim Arensmeier, pastor at the Sonoma Valley Community Church in Sonoma, Calif., said that despite the 2008 approval of a proposition barring same-sex weddings in a state known for its liberal politics, he is certain the momentum is shifting toward widespread legalization of gay marriage. Obama's announcement is one more step in an exorable arch toward that end, he said. When the California proposition was overturned by a U.S. district judge, it convinced him that even a majority opposed to gay marriage is destined to fail.

Arensmeier, who is 71, said he would retire rather than agree to preside over such a marriage. But he remains troubled by what he sees around him. One of his daughters and her husband are in favor of gay marriage. So is one of his

'We still get along and I feel like it's possible to disagree with someone robustly and still be courteous and polite and have fun with them. I mean, Jesus said love everybody, for crying out loud," Arensmeier said. "Is that the way the country is going to go? I think it probably is."

But others who oppose gay marriage say the battle must be won.

When Mary and Rob Robertson of Damascus, Md., went to a rally in January at the state capital to protest legalization of gay marriage, they did so thinking of their four young children.

"I can just tell you that the confusion that is happening in our world in terms of morality will just wreak havoc for years down the road," Mary Robertson said. "My children, we have to explain the whole situation about homosexuals and lesbians and my son just says to me. 'Do I have to decide who I like?"

Robertson and others who oppose gay marriage say they're concerned they'll be labeled as extremists, when what they want is to protect their families and institutions.

"I just want you to know that we love everyone," she said. "But there's rightly ordered things in our lives, and if you look at a man's body and a woman's body, those two bodies fit together per-

fectly. And that's what God intended.

Travel restrictions challenged in former BP engineer's case

NEW ORLEANS (AP)

 A former BP engineer charged with deleting text messages about the company's response to the 2010 oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico is asking for a federal judge's permission to travel freely throughout the U.S. while he is free on bond.

Earlier this month, a magistrate in New Orleans ordered Kurt Mix, 50, of Katy, Texas, to limit his travel to Louisiana, Texas, Massachusetts and New York after a prosecutor claimed he had intended to leave the country for a job in Australia and wouldn't return.

But in a court filing late Thursday, Mix's attorneys argue the travel restrictions aren't warranted prosecutors haven't shown he poses a flight risk.

"Throughout the entirety of the Government's investigation, Mix has gone to great lengths to comply with the Government's request that he remain in the United States, oftentimes at great personal sacrifice to him and his family," the lawyers wrote. "Simply put, Mix's conduct over the course of the Government's investigation utterly refutes the Government's assertion that he presents a risk of

flight." U.S. District Judge Stanwood Duval Jr. didn't immediately rule on Mix's request.

Mix, who was freed on \$100,000 bond following his arrest in Texas on April 24, pleaded not guilty on May 3 to two

counts of obstruction of justice. Each count is punishable by up to 20 years in prison and a \$250,000

During Mix's arraignment, defense attorney Joan McPhee said her client had a job with Apache Corp. waiting for him in Australia but "sat patiently at home for several months" because he knew he was the target of a federal probe.

Prosecutors, however, said they learned from Mix's lawyers that he was no longer willing to wait and planned to accept the job offer. They also noted that Mix's wife is a native of China who has family in that country and that Mix had applied for a green card to Canada as recently as March.

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Officials: Teachers unprepared for new Texas standards

AUSTIN (AP) — Texas school teachers should be better trained to prepare students for the state's higher standards and new statewide tests and their salaries should be raised to make the profession more attractive, the higher education commissioner told lawmakers

on Friday.

Commissioner Raymund Paredes said he reached that conclusion after looking at national and international studies examining teacher quality around the world, particularly with the introduction of new standardized tests that make greater demands on students.

"They don't have the faculty in K-12 that can teach to those standards. As we move to end-of-course exams and higher levels of rigor, I am fearful and virtually certain we are going to face exactly the same challenge," Paredes said.

The testimony set off spirited questioning in the Senate Education Committee, which was holding a hearing on how the state prepares teachers and principals in public schools.

"How do we hold these kids accountable for taking these high-stakes tests if they don't have a teacher who is adequately prepared?" asked Sen. Royce West, D-Dallas.

"We have to move to higher standards for teachers, we have to move to better training for teachers and we have to particularly develop better policies," Paredes replied.

Democratic Sen. Wendy Davis of Fort Worth was concerned the state was not being fair to teachers.

"If we are not giving our teachers the tools they need to help those students best succeed in those standardized tests, then we measure the teachers based on the student's performance, it's probably pretty unfair to those teachers," she said.

Paredes said studies of successful public schools around the world showed that recruiting the best college students and enrolling them in effective teacher training programs were the keys to success. Then it was important to treat teachers well, he said.

"We don't pay teachers enough, we don't train them as well as we should and we don't make the profession very attractive," he said. He recommended diverting funding from programs that do not improve student test scores and use those funds for salaries.

Last year the Republican-controlled Legislature cut \$4 billion in spending for public schools, the first such cut since World War II. That has forced school districts to lay-off teachers across the state.

Stan Carpenter, dean of the College of Education at Texas State University, reported that enrollment in the largest teacher training program in the state had dropped 5 percent in recent years because of the poor economy and widespread reports of teacher layoffs. He said the state should use every possible incentive to attract more top students into education.

West questioned whether the Legislature would accept the recommendations.

"Are we prepared in Texas for the government to pay for teacher training and provide the kind of compensation ... that we ought to provide in order to get the best and brightest to teach the next generation of Texans to be world leaders?" West asked his fellow senators. "If not, we ought to shut up."

Conservative Sen. Dan Patrick, R-Houston, complained that the Texas higher education system does not prop-

erly train teachers and that schools don't spend money efficiently.

"Everyone wants to fix this but I don't want to put more money to teachers if our universities and colleges aren't going to change the way they teach our teachers to teach," Patrick said.

We need to fund universities based on what we need, like high quality teachers," he said.



New water quality initiative to provide \$2.8M in Texas

CORSICANA (AP) — A national water quality initiative will provide \$2.8 million in funding to farmers, ranchers and timberland owners along a major watershed of the Trinity River Basin to encourage conservation practices that will have a positive impact on Texas' rivers, lakes and streams.

The new plan from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Natural Resources Conservation Service is voluntary, though federal, state and local soil and water conservationists said Thursday it's critical. The Trinity River Basin is the most populated river basin in the state and provides water for more than 40 percent of Texas' population — nearly 8 million people.

"By working together, we're going to see cleaner water," the service's State Conservationist Salvador Salinas said. He visited a cattle ranch near Corsicana that is seen as a model of stewardship and conservation.

The agency's proposed practices include better ways of dealing with fertilizers and pesticides and encouraging prescribed grazing, field borders, cover crops and reduced tillage to lessen erosion.

Another proposed suggestion to help stop erosion and increase the amount of clean rainwater that runs off into rivers and lakes calls for restoring native grasslands in rural watershed areas.

"When you boil it down, it's all about water and grass," said rancher Gary Price, as he stood in his

pasture's knee-high grass Thursday. "I can't make it rain, but there are things I can do to keep water on the land."

If and when rain falls on Price's 20,000-acre ranch on the targeted watershed, the deep-rooted native grasses absorb it and can recharge underground aquifers instead of hitting bare soil, which adds more runoff mud and silt into the flood-control pond. Price said he rotates where his cattle graze to give the grasslands time to recover.

Last year, when 20 of his water tanks ran dry during the drought, Price said he didn't know how he would survive. But the mild winter and conservation efforts already in place allowed his livestock and land to not only pull through but also thrive.

Price credits the National Resources Conservation Service with helping him gain the technical expertise and conservation tips needed to do that.

His wife, Sue Price, paraphrased the agency's motto — "helping people help the land" — in expressing her gratitude: "Thank you for helping us, help the land."

Gary Price, whose 77 Ranch received the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association's Outstanding Rangeland, Stewardship award for 2012, said he plans to

apply for the new initiative funding to help him continue his efforts. The application deadline is June 15.

The Natural Resources Conservation Service plan covers 152,309 acres of seven sub-watersheds, known collectively as the Chambers Creek Watershed. It was targeted because of the high levels of sediments, chemicals and other pollutants.

"This is not going to be a quick process to correct this issue but you've got to start somewhere," said Darrel Andrews, Tarrant Regional Water District's assistant director, environmental division. "I don't underestimate the impact that a project like this can have on the generations to


The Chambers Creek Watershed is a sub-watershed of the Trinity River Basin, whose headwaters begin north of Dallas-Fort Worth and run south through Houston and into the Galveston Bay outlet.

Andrews said most people don't make the connection between the area's watersheds and the water they use daily to drink or brush their teeth. Most think of the lakes as only a place to launch personal watercraft or fish for largemouth bass, he said.

"There's a real disconnect," Andrews said. "This effort, in the end, it's about education."









Texas jobless rate under 7 percent for first time in three years

AUSTIN (AP) — The Texas unemployment rate is less than 7 percent for the first time in three years, falling to 6.9 percent for April as 13,200 nonfarm jobs were added, the state employment agency said

The jobless rate fell from 7.0 percent in

March and 8.0 percent a year ago, according to Texas Workforce Commission figures. The state's jobless rate was last below 7 percent at 6.9 percent in March 2009.

The national unemployment rate is 8.1

"I am encouraged that our steadily

improving labor market continues to offer good prospects," said Ronny Congleton, the commissioner representing labor.

Eight of the 11 major industries in Texas gained jobs in April, led by construction with 7,300 jobs. Manufacturing added 6,300 jobs, and trade, transportation and utilities picked up 2,900 positions.

Leisure and hospitality lost 4,300 jobs, while professional and business services dropped 2,600 positions. The state also saw a slight increase in initial claims for unemployment — 80,887 in April compared with 74,343 in March.

"Mammography always has (helped women's health)," she added. "It's not an issue of affordability, because they're relatively cheap. It's patient education.'

Wright says she still occasionally encounters women who tell her they don't believe mammograms are a valuable procedure.

"How else are you going to detect breast cancer when it's one millimeter large?" she said. "About the time you feel it, when it's a centimeter, it's already too late.'

Regarding her visual arts, Lewis again cites her family as inspiration, although she added that she's often spontaneously sparked by things around her.




Lewis, 77, said that she took a hiatus from concentrating on art because of her family and is grateful for the chance to hone her talents once again.

Influx of artists changing small southwest Texas town

EL PASO (AP) -Selling Marfa is not a difficult job for Kaki Scott, the 29-year-old executive director of the Marfa Chamber of Commerce.

"Most of the time I'm just directing traffic," Scott said. "Every now and then, people kind of stumble through Marfa and say, 'What's going on here?' "

Marfa doesn't look like any of the surrounding towns in far west Texas. Outsiders come to soak up the diverse culture of this former ranching town of 1,900 people about 200 miles southeast of El Paso.

Marfa has become an art oasis in the desert, a town more cosmopolitan than some imagine.

With that in mind, it's not a big surprise around here that the nationally distributed Smithsonian Magazine lists Marfa as No. 8 among "The Top 20 Best Small Towns in

America" in its May issue. "It's just a flyspeck in the flat, hot, dusty cattle country of southwest Texas -- closer to Chihuahua than Manhattan" but Marfa is cooking, the magazine suggests, "thanks to an influx of creative types from way downtown: filmmakers like the Coen brothers, who shot "No Country for Old Men" in Marfa, indie rock bands and others who have brought such outré installations as Prada Marfa, a faux couture shop in the middle of nowhere by the artists Elmgreen and Dragset.'

"The mentality of the community has shifted. We're really more progressive, willing to look at the possibilities," Scott said. "The majority of the people who live here are lovely. But there is definitely a gap between old Marfa and new Marfa. A lot of people in the established community feel like the town has been overrun with a different kind of people, people with worldly ideas, people with open minds to different kinds of lifestyles. of Marfa. That's been a kind of fric-

resentment has to do with money, the disparity between newcomers and older families with modest means and deep roots in Marfa.

"The creative people are a bit louder and more flamboyant than the local people," Scott said. "But without them, the whole community would have folded and collapsed. We're definitely better off with the new direction Marfa has taken.'

Scott grew up in Marfa, finished school in nearby Fort Davis, went away to college and returned five years ago.

Marfa once was better known for the mysterious lights dancing in the nearby desert and as the town where Elizabeth Taylor, Rock Hudson and James Dean hung out while filming the Western epic movie 'Giant" in 1955.

Now, Marfa has a funky cantina in a former funeral home, fine-dining restaurants, open-air art spaces, New York-style galleries, a gourmet food truck, a vintage trailer park, plus an interesting mix of creative people and world-class contemporary art. The locals still crave red enchiladas at Mando's.

Walking along Highland Avenue, the main drag in Marfa, you're more likely to encounter people who previously lived in Sweden, Austin, New York, Los Angeles, Germany or Japan.


Marfa has become a destination, a pit stop, for various entertainers going from one venue to another. The reunited El Paso band At The Drive-In lured 500 fans to Marfa in April.

The late New York sculptor and critic Donald Judd started Marfa's transformation into an arts colony in the 1970s. He bought and restored various properties in Marfa.

Judd's works still attract visitors from across the world to the Donald Judd and Chinati foundations. Chinati Foundation runs a museum and sculpture park on 340 acres that used to be an Army camp on the southern outskirts

Alexandra Vargo, a 23-year-old intern from Scott suggests that some Philadelphia, recently showed 100 mill aluminum boxes that Judd installed in former artillery sheds.

> "Marfa is a little art oasis in the desert," Vargo said, A recent small tour of



Tiny Marfa (population 1,900) in southwest Texas has become an oasis of sorts for artists.

Chinati artworks lured visitors from places such as Houston, New York, Paris and Salt Lake City, including Annie Gray, 32, of Washington, D.C., a former U.S. Supreme Court researcher.

"I knew about some of the Donald Judd works and wanted to see them," she said. "But I had never heard of Marfa until we came out here."

Alberto Tomás Halpern, 24, works as a photographer and reporter with the Big Bend Sentinel, the weekly Marfa newspaper owned by his parents. He went to college in Washington, D.C., and came back to Marfa.

"Geographically, Marfa is really isolated. But I always tell people Marfa is in the middle of everywhere," Halpern said. "The arts and cultural institutions have really put Marfa on the map. We get people here from all corners of the globe."

Joe Cabezuela, 67, leads a group trying to restore what remains of Blackwell School, an adobe structure dating to 1889 and a segregated school for Mexican-American children until 1965. The state has designated the building a historic site.

"Before the art people came into town, Marfa was almost a ghost town. It was pretty bad," Cabezuela said. "There's been more work. But there's been bad vibes among some people from Marfa.'

Cabezuela suggests that

some of the resentment has to do with inflated real

estate values. "Eventually, it'll be like Santa Fe. We'll have to live in a mobile home outside the city limits," he said, joking.

Marfa native Mateo Quintana, 74, recalls looking out the window of his small barbershop and seeing mostly empty stores across the street.

"The artists revived Marfa," Quintana said. "The town was failing when they came and started fixing up a lot of places. "When I was young, everyone mostly worked on ranches."

Dirk Vaughan, 55, a front-desk clerk at the Paisano Hotel, described Marfa as a composite of newcomers like himself plus well-established Hispanics and old Anglo ranching families.

"It's just a really broad, very diverse place to live with a lot of interesting cultural aspects," he said. "It's not a typical small town. A lot of cultural things come here because of the influence of all the different arts foundations.'

David Branch, 35, earned a master's degree in architecture at the University of Texas at Austin. He is helping restore a two-story adobe house, one of the oldest houses in Marfa, for a Houston family. "It's a struggle to make a living out here, but there's community people here that are intriguing and inspiring and that's helpful, especially when you've removed

Redding, 55, first came to Marfa to visit Judd's world-renowned collection at the Chinati Foundation. She fell in love with Marfa and decided to settle down here six years ago.

"I just had a feeling that this town was unique and that I wouldn't miss the things that a big city had to offer," she said.

Redding pointed out that Marfa lacks shopping malls, pharmacies and other comforts that some people might crave. But Marfa continues to attract tourists from all over the world, not just elite art groups. "This town is all of us," Redding said. "That's what makes it unique and special."






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

Rains jump-start cotton crop, but subsoil moisture critical

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COLLEGE STATION – The forecast for Texas cotton remains mixed, depending upon which part of the state you're talking about, said Dr. Gaylon Morgan, associate professor and Texas AgriLife Extension Service state cotton specialist, College Station.

On May 15, Morgan had recently returned from the Lower Rio Grande Valley, Coastal Bend, and Upper Gulf Coast with an encouraging report. Recent rains in South Texas, in many places very substantial ones, had vastly benefited the recently planted cotton crop there, he said.

"Cotton in the Valley looked overall pretty good, with cotton just emerging to cotton already flowering," Morgan said. "They had good moisture early and actually got a couple of showers when I was down there. They were pretty pleased."

In the South Plains, High Plains and Rolling Plains, it could be a different story, he said. Growers there are just starting to kick off planting. All three regions have received some rain in the last couple of weeks, but generally it was just enough to help with planting and ensure the crop emerges. After an extended drought last year, and a dry winter and spring, subsoil moisture has been severely diminished.

"It is difficult to make a cotton crop without a full profile of soil moisture," Morgan said. "You can get it up if you don't have a full profile, but timely rains are essential throughout the (growing) season for dryland cotton and are important for our irrigated cotton also."

By a "full profile," Morgan means moisture present 3 to 4 feet deep, the average rooting depth of cotton.

Some widespread, very substantial and frequent rains will be needed to replenish deep-soil profile moisture "at this point, especially in Southern High Plains and western Rolling Plains," he said.

Climatologists are predicting above-average temperatures and near normal precipitation for the High Plains, Rolling Plains and Southern Plains this summer, but there's still a chance growers could make a decent crop, Morgan said, depending on some 'ands' and 'ifs.'

"It just depends upon what happens from here on out if you don't have that profile moisture," he said. "If they're planting now or even into the middle of June, and they



can get the crop up, and if they get some timely rains now through the middle of the summer, they could still make a good crop."

By timely, Morgan meant good rains at least every couple of weeks.

"Cotton can handle (dry spells) for awhile. And the other factors are going to be how much wind and high heat they have — the overall evapotransporation loss."

On an average year, about 70-80 percent of the more than 5 million of cotton planted in Texas are planted in the High Plains, Rolling Plains and Southern Plains, Morgan and

Lower prices for cotton have changed planting intentions this year in some parts of the state, but to a lesser extent in the western areas, he said.

"In 2012, we have observed a significant decrease – 10 to 25 percent — in cotton acres in South and Central Texas, with these acres replaced with more corn and/or sorghum acres in 2012," he said. "This acreage shift is a due to good grain prices and declining cotton prices from 2011. However, as you move to Rolling Plains and Southern High Plains the crop rotation options are fewer, and cotton acreage probably will not decline a too much."

AgriLife Extension district reporters compiled the following summary for May 7-14:

PANHANDLE: The region had cooler temperatures with some moisture reported. Precipitation amounts ranged from a trace to 1.5 inches. Soil moisture continued to vary from very short to adequate, with most counties reporting short. Corn and cotton farmers continued planting. The cooler temperatures slowed the growth of most crops, including corn and cotton. Warmer temperatures were needed to help these crops emerge and become established. Wheat was in from very poor to excellent condition, with most counties reporting poor to fair. Reports of wheat diseases increased in step with lack of moisture. Rangeland and pastures varied from very poor to good condition, with most reporting poor to fair. Cattle were in good condition.

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


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Let's Eat!

Texana's Kitchen: God Save The Queen...and spotted dick!

I love the English....Don't you? I mean, after all, they have been one of our strongest allies in matters of world affairs, and aside from that whole Revolutionary War thing, have been our closest friends. Maggie Thatcher was the BOMB. I so miss her. And the Queen....Don't let her fool you. She looks like a sweet little old lady, but she is

Brits are generally considered to be a genteel and proper sort, often standing on the same propriety that their ancestors did hundreds of years ago. Good manners and social formalities, although a bit more relaxed today, are still widely practiced. And the English ladies aren't afraid to wear great hats!

Which makes it seem even funnier to me that they would give their food names like Spotted Dick, and Cock A Leekie Soup. Oh, the thoughts running through my head right now (medical conditions, freckles in the wrong places and such). My mouth wants to say more, but my head knows better and is keeping mum.

The fact that they can call these dishes by their names, and do so with a straight face, tells me that the British are very disciplined, and are not to be trifled with. Methinks they are much tougher than their proper manners would have you think.

Or maybe it's just me, and I have a sense of humor that people in polite society would find vulgar. I can live with that. The Two Fat Ladies would have got it.

The truth of it is that Cock A Leekie Soup—a chicken and leek soup- is delicious and simple-the austere kind of food that makes you remember being a kid. And Spotted Dick—a dense raisin studded cake that is steamed rather than baked, will warm you to your very soul.

Sooooo, we say toe-MAY-toe, they say toe-MAH-toe.

Although we speak English on both sides of the Atlantic, you can see that ordering food could obviously cause more than a little bit of confusion to visitors in either country.

Here are a few translations to help you navigate your way through a menu if you visit your friends on the other

- American / English
- Sausages / bangers
- Chips (as in potato Chips) / Crisps • French Fries / Chips
- · Bacon (sliced) / Rashers • Biscuits / Scones
- Crackers or Cookies / Biscuits
- Endive / Chicory
- Graham Crackers /Digestive Biscuits
- Ham / Gammon
- Frosting / Icing Scallion /Spring Onion
- Candy / Sweets
- Golden Raisins Sultanas Whole Wheat / Wholemeal
- Red or Green Sweet Peppers / Capsicum

· Bubble and Squeak—most comparable to Hash in the United States. It is made of leftover roast vegetables, panfried in a skillet with mashed or roasted potatoes. As the mixture cooks, it makes bubble and squeak noises, hence the name. American Hash is typically leftover meat, potatoes, and other vegetables, and pan-fried.

Roast Beef—We both roast our beef in about the same way, and with or without vegetables. Simply seasoned, browned, and roasted until tender, served with brown gravy. The English have us beat here, too. They serve the most amazing Yorkshire Pudding with theirs, and few people in the United States have had the pleasure. My Granny made it, so I was one of the lucky ones, and I make it now, too. It is rather like a cross between a soufflé and a gougere, or popover. Big, light and puffy, but moist, egg-y, and dense at the same time. Holy cow—I am so making

Toad In The Hole—the English version is link sausages (bangers) cooked atop a puffy, soufflé-like batter. Some Americans call an egg fried in a piece of pan-fried toast that has had a hole cut out of it as Toad in The Hole, but it is more frequently called Egg in The Basket.

Full English—A traditional big English breakfast. Usually some fried eggs, fried sausages, bacon, potatoes or bubble and squeak, roasted tomatoes. An American breakfast typically contains eggs, meat-bacon, sausage or ham steak-fried potatoes, and a biscuit or toast. Really big breakfasts might also include pancakes, waffles, or French toast. In both countries, however, an increased focus on health has meant an increase in the number of people eating smaller items, such as oatmeal, cold cereal, or fruit.

Pudding-In the United States, pudding refers almost solely to sweet custard. The only real exception is bread pudding, which is bread baked in a custard base. The English are very fond of puddings, and they make them in both sweet and savory versions. English puddings are more like a bread or cake, and tend to be steamed. Dense and moist, they hold up well to heavy additions like dried fruit, nuts, and in the savory versions, meats. The closest thing to an English pudding in the Unites States is fruit-

Pies—Although there are more savory options finally becoming popular, pie in the Unites States usually refers to a dessert. Just as with the English version, pies consist of fruit, nut or custard fillings baked in a pastry shell. But the English have us beat, hands down, when it comes to savory pies. They have steak and kidney pies, pork pies, fish pies, cottage pie and shepherd's pie. Some are baked in a round pastry shell-like a dessert pie, and some are made into handheld pockets, such as pasty's. Mmmmm. PIE!

Chicken Tikka Masala—This is an Indian inspired dish, made of chicken stewed in a colorful, tasty sauce of yogurt and many spices—something very common to Indian food. It was created in England, and is practically the national dish of England these days. It is becoming more and more available in the US. The only difference between here and there? In America, everyone thinks it's authentically Indian, and the English know better.

Fish and Chips—pretty much the same on both sides of the pond. Battered and fried cod, crispy French fries, sprinkled with vinegar. Booya! Who doesn't love that? Fish-N-Chips seems to have been the "Great Uniter" between English and American food culture.

In England, they have "chip shops" all over. Places where you can get your fried food groove on. Some of them have made their way stateside, and they are gaining popularity. Not only are they frying up fish and chips, they will pretty much batter and fry anything. Pizza slices, grilled cheese sandwiches, candy bars, cheesecake wedges, cookies, fruit, hamburgers. Oh, and let's not forget fried macaroni and cheese.

Not to be outdone, Texas has the State Fair-Fried Food Capital of The World. The WORLD. They have introduced the world to such greats as batter- fried bacon, fried butter, and fried Coke.

I'm not sayin' it's right. I'm just sayin'.

So without further fanfare, I present for your dining pleasure:

Fish and Chips

Chips (French Fries):

**important to start these first, as they are par-cooked before, and fried crispy just before serving.

- 2 large russet potatoes, peeled Oil for frying
- Salt, to taste

Peel the potatoes, and cut into long sticks ½" in diameter.



Place in a large bowl, covered with cold water.

Line a large baking sheet with newspaper or paper towels, and place wire racks on top.

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Heat oil in a deep fryer to 325 degrees.

Drain the potatoes very well, dabbing with a paper towel to remove excess water. Drop fries in small batches into the fryer, and cook for 5 minutes.

Remove from oil, and drain well, before spreading out on rack to cool.

Raise heat in fryer to 375 degrees and prepare the fish as directed below.

When fish has been fried, return the par-cooked potatoes to the 375 degrees fryer, in batches, to cook until crispy and browned, about 2 minutes.

Drain well and season with salt. Serve immediately.

Beer Battered Cod

- 2 lbs cod
- 1 ½ cup all-purpose flour
- 1 cup cornstarch
- 2 teaspoons salt
- ½ teaspoon cayenne (if you like it a little spicy)
- 2 cans cold lager
- Peanut or Canola oil (for deep-frying) Start heating oil to 375*

Slice cod at a diagonal angle into ½ thick pieces. Mix ½ cup flour and ½ cornstarch together in a medium

Mix 1 cup flour and ½ cup cornstarch with salt and 1 bottle of beer. Whisk together until smooth. Whisk in remaining beer, a little at a time until a very thin batter is formed. It should be the consistency of buttermilk.

When the oil is hot, dredge fish pieces, a few at a time, in the flour and cornstarch mixture. Shake off the excess, and dip into the batter, quickly dropping in to the hot oil.

Cook for a few minutes until golden brown and crispy. Drain on a wire rack that has been placed over a newspaper-lined baking pan. Repeat until all fish had been fried.

Fry the potatoes for the second time after you have done the fish, and serve immediately.



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Texas has enough drugs for 23 executions

HOUSTON (AP) -Texas prison officials disclosed Friday they have enough lethal drugs to execute as many as 23

In response to this week's opinion from the state attorney general's office that said the Texas Department of Criminal Justice could not withhold information about the drug supply, the department said it currently has 46 2.5gram vials of pentobarbital. A 5-gram dose about 3.4 ounces — is the first lethal drug used during each execution in Huntsville, according to Texas execution procedures.

The prison agency said it had similar supplies of two other drugs also administered to condemned inmates. It did not, though, identify suppliers of the lethal drugs, which the opinion also had addressed.

Executions also involve 100 milligrams of pancuronium bromide

and 140 milliequivalents harmful to employees of potassium chloride. Texas has 290 10-milligram vials of the pancuronium bromide - 10 are required per execution - and 737 20-milliequivalent vials of potassium chloride -

seven per punishment. The department's written procedures call for a matching set of drugs and syringes "in case unforeseen events make their use necessary." But in a brief statement emailed to reporters late Friday, the agency said a backup set of lethal drugs for executions "is not actually prepared, but an additional dose is available if needed."

The attorney general's opinion, dated Monday, was an answer to public information requests filed earlier this year by the Austin American-Statesman and British newspaper The Guardian.

Prison officials had argued that releasing the information could be

and provide death penalty opponents a way to harass the drug suppliers with the hope firms would refuse to do business with the state.

"We find your arguments as to how disclosure of the requested drug quantities would result in the disruption of the execution process or otherwise interfere with law enforcement to be too speculative," Sean Opperman, an assistant attorney general, wrote in the opinion.

The prison agency had 30 days to comply with the opinion or to challenge it in court. The status of the supplier question was not immediately clear.

that, while the attorgeneral's office "acknowledge(s) department's concerns," the corrections department didn't show how disclosure of the information "would create a substantial threat of

physical harm to any individual."

Department officials previously had indicated they had a sufficient supply to handle upcoming executions. At least five are scheduled for this summer, including one early next month.

Last year, one of the drugs Texas had used in the process, sodium thiopental, became unavailable when its European supplier bowed to pressure from death penalty opponents and stopped making it. No other vendor could be found, so the drug was replaced by pentobarbital.

The physical effects of pentobarbital on condemned inmates have not been noticeable during the executions, but the financial cost to the state has risen considerthe cost of the previous mixture at \$83.35. It's now \$1286.86, with the higher cost primarily due to pentobarbital.

Obama cash advantage

WASHINGTON (AP) President Barack Obama holds a cash advantage of more than 2-to-1 over Republican challenger Mitt Romney but the president's money advantage is beginning to dwindle.

Obama's campaign reported \$115.1 million in the bank through April and the Democratic National Committee had about \$24.2 million in its account at the end of last

Romney began raising money last month with the Republican National Committee and hauled in a combined \$40 million, nearly on parity with Obama and Democrats, who raised about \$43 mil-

Romney and Republicans reported \$61.4 million in the bank in April, meaning that in only a month, Obama's 10-to-1 cash advantage has fallen to 2-to-1 as Republicans prepare for the general elec-

Although it has yet to appear in a finance report, Romney and his wife, Ann, donated in May the maximum \$75,000 each to the Victory Fund, his campaign's joint fund with the Republican National Committee. It was their first donation this cycle to his campaign effort. A Republican familiar with the donation confirmed the amount but requested anonymity to discuss the matter ahead of the formal

filing report. Republicans are expected to be helped by GOPleaning outside groups planning to raise hundreds of millions of dollars to

defeat Obama. Obama campaign manager Jim Messina in a video to supporters earlier this week that the president has faced \$57 million in negative ads.

"One of the most important things we can do is get our arms the fact that his election is going to be close given the historic challenges the nation faced when the president first came into office," Messina said.

The infusion of campaign cash is funding spring television ads attempting to shape the narrative of the presidential campaign. Obama is spending about \$25 million on TV ads in May, an amount that was quickly matched by the GOP-leaning super PAC Crossroads GPS, which is advertising against Obama in 10 states.

Romney released an ad this week outlining plans for his first day in office, if elected, spending about \$1.3 million to air the ad in Iowa, North Carolina, Virginia and Ohio.



Since Kara graduated in 2010, Stephens was a part of two district champion volleyball teams, winning District MVP last season and a second team All-District selection in 2010.



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
