Last day to register for 4-H retreat

Today is the last day to register for the district-wide 4-H Fish and Fun retreat at T. Boone Pickens' Mesa Vista Ranch. Kids must be a 4-H member in order to participate in the retreat, which is set for Monday and Tuesday.

"We discuss fishing, fish health, pond management, different breeds of fish, the fishing process and a healthy balance of fish in ponds," said Brandon McGinty of 4-H and the Gray Life AgriLife Extension Service.

To qualify, kids must be in third grade or 9 years old as of Sept. 1, 2011. "Clover kids" (children under 8 years of age) must be accompanied by an older 4-H sibling and parents.

Red Cross hosting volunteer orientation event today

The Eastern Texas Panhandle Chapter of the American Red Cross is seeking new volunteers, and today, Pampans can take the first step towards joining its ranks.

The Red Cross is hosting a volunteer orientation program at 4 p.m. at its 108 N. Russell St. office. With Panhandle weather ever unpredictable, Molly Maberry, volunteer coordinator for the Eastern Texas Panhandle chapter, said that the Red Cross wants to make sure that the area has enough volunteers prepared for any eventuality.

"When large disasters strike, people want to get involved with the Red Cross right then," said Mabery.

"What we really want folks to do is to train now so that when the time comes, you've got the training, we know your skill-set and we can put you to work right

According to Mabery, today's event is simply geared towards anyone considering becoming involved with the Red Cross.

"It's for any new volunteer," she said. "Anyone who's interested in volunteering with the Red Cross, kind of getting some more knowledge as to what we do and how they can fit into the organization. It's that first initial step in volunteering with us."

The Red Cross is currently in need of personnel to help bolster its volunteer numbers, Mabery said. A recent volunteer inventory came up with about 90 volunteers, give or take, she said, although the numbers tend fluctuate through the year.

"We've got lots of positions open for pretty much anybody that has any type of interest," Mabery said. 'We can work them into the organization. We're always looking for those good disaster action team members to support the community when there are house fires or, God forbid, tornadoes that happen, so that we can go out and serve those people the best way

we can. We're always in need of more support there." In the last month alone in the Panhandle, the Red Cross has responded to local house fires, staffed a shelter, performed post-storm damage assessment. handed out hundreds of tarps and other cleanup supplies and provided support for dozens of families. All of this work was done by a corps of 19 Red Cross



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Dem keeps low profile after ousting Reyes

EL PASO (AP) - Many entrenched members of the Texas congressional delegation overcame reshuffled political boundaries to win their primaries, but those new maps had nothing to do with how guitar-playing, twice-arrested former city councilman who advocates legalizing marijuana ousted a powerful Democrat in a doozy of an election-night stunner.

Beto O'Rourke kept a low profile Wednesday after defeating U.S. Rep. Silvestre Reyes in the El Paso district. The former House Intelligence chairman, meanwhile, returned to Washington after being denied even a runoff despite an endorsement from President Barack Obama and a campaign stop from former President Bill Clinton.

On Wednesday afternoon, Reyes released a statement congratulating O'Rourke on the victory and pledging to work with him to ensure a smooth transition.

"To all El Pasoans, I express my deep appreciation for the privilege of representing you for the past 15 years," Reyes said. "Your entrustment of this office to me has been a great honor."

The upset was a twist on the anti-incumbent fervor that swept through the U.S. House in the 2010 midterms. Then, it was Republicans swinging a wrecking ball to entrenched Democrats, but on Tuesday, O'Rourke ousted an eight-term congressman and fellow Democrat who he had attacked as becoming too cozy and ineffective to stay in Congress

At least that was the message in public. Behind the scenes. O'Rourke was embroiled in one of the nastiest U.S. House races nationwide this primary season.

Ads played up Reyes' ties to a company that was awarded a \$200 million contract and gave Reyes contributions and hired his children, while Reves shot back with television spots recounting O'Rourke being arrested for drunk driving and showing a cellphone video of O'Rourke rolling around on a barroom floor.

"It was a very tough campaign. We both worked hard, but at the end of the day I respect him and I thank him for his service," said O'Rourke, adding that he welcomed Reyes' offer of assistance in the transition.

Reyes, 67, was the only congressional incumbent in Texas to lose in the primary. Others easily survived, including Democrat Lloyd Doggett winning in a new and predominantly Hispanic district and Democrat Eddie Bernice Johnson coasting against her first serious primary challengers in 20 years.

O'Rourke is unlikely to face much of a threat from the GOP nominee in the heavily Democratic district this November.

He was an unconventional candidate for being such a serious threat to an establishment incumbent like

O'Rourke has supported the idea of legalizing marijuana as a way of making a dent in the drug war being waged directly across the border from El Paso in violent Ciudad Juarez. O'Rourke, however, said during his campaign that he would not press for legalization in Congress because it wasn't a priority to this district.

He's also a former guitarist in an El Paso rock band that included members who now play in the Grammy Award-winning act The Mars Volta. He was arrested in the 1990s on charges of burglary and drunk driving, and has called his public service a way for atoning for those mistakes. O'Rourke said the burglary arrest happened after he tripped an alarm while jumping a fence at the University of Texas at El Paso in 1995 but prosecutors declined the case. As for the drunken driving arrest, he ays he received deferred adjudication 15 years ago and was not convicted but calls the incident "a mistake."

But O'Rourke also comes from a family with deep political roots. His father, Pat O'Rourke, was a former El Paso County judge who was a

popular longtime Democrat before switching parties in 1996, when he unsuccessfully ran for Congress as a Republican.

A super PAC called the Campaign for Primary Accountability spent \$240,000 on ads that linked Reyes to a controversial contract awarded to a company that gave him campaign contributions and hirec his children, spokesman for the super PAC Curtis Ellis said.

Gregg Rocha, a political science professor at the University of Texas at El Paso, said voters care less about the missteps in O'Rourke's personal life than the corruption scandal that has been weighing on

Reyes' defeat assures that Texas will lose a member of its Hispanic delegation. Texas was awarded four new U.S. House seats because of a population surge the last decade driven by Hispanics, whose numbers grew by 2.8 million in the last decade — second only to Califor-

Texas, however, hasn't elected more than six Hispanics to Congress since 1997. The majority of the voting-age population in two of the new districts is Hispanic, but the only Hispanic candidate remaining in those races is Domingo Garcia, who faces a runoff with state House Rep. Mark Veasey in newly created 33rd Congressional District.

Another runoff is also needed where Ron Paul's longtime South Texas district is up for grabs. The failed presidential candidate who announced his retirement from Congress before his latest run for the White House — didn't endorse any of the nine candidates scrambling to succeed him. Republican state Rep. Randy Weber will face attorney Felicia Harris in a July

The winner isn't a slam-dunk for election in November. The Democratic nominee is former U.S. Rep. Nick Lampson, whose candidacy makes the U.S. House race a rare general election toss-up in Texas.

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

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GRAPEVINE (AP) - U.S. Attorney General Eric Holder told law enforcement officials at a convention that acts of violence against officers are approaching the highest levels in nearly two decades and represent a low for the Texas primary

Holder spoke Wednesday at the Major Cities Chiefs runoff that will decide Association meeting in Grapevine, near Dallas. The group includes chiefs and sheriffs of the 63 largest law enforcement agencies in the U.S.

In remarks prepared for the gathering, Holder said that last year gun-related deaths surpassed deaths by any other cause among law enforcement personnel for the first time in almost 15 years. So far this year, he says at least 45 officers have died in the line of duty, 16 of them

He says the Justice Department in recent years has committed to protecting officers with various initiatives.

Debt company to pay restitution

DENVER (AP) — A Dallas debt-resolution company and its president have been told to pay nearly \$14 million in penalties and restitution to Colorado and former clients for violating state laws, Attorney General John Suthers said Wednesday.

Credit Solutions of America and Doug Van Arsdale each face \$5 million in civil penalties and a total of \$3.8 million in restitution to nearly 2,700 consumers, Suthers

Van Arsdale and the company can appeal the fines and restitution, said Fred Yarger, Suthers' spokesman.

Yarger said the settlement was approved by the administrator for the Uniform Consumer Credit Code, an independent agency within Suthers' office.

Yarger said state officials have not been in contact with Van Arsdale or the company. No current phone listings could be found for either.

Credit Solutions of America failed to renew its registration to operate in Colorado after 2009, Yarger said.

The company also was accused of violating provisions of the Colorado Debt Management Services Act, including providing required information and disclosing period accounting reports and other information, Yarger said.

Consumers who will get restitution had contracted with Credit Solutions of America to negotiate with their creditors about the consumers' debts.

Yarger said the settlement involves only Colorado and no other states.

D.A.'s ex-investigator sentenced

BROWNSVILLE (AP) - A former South Texas district attorney's investigator has been sentenced to a year and a day in federal prison in a corruption case tied to a disgraced ex-judge in Brownsville.

Jaime Munivez was sentenced Wednesday, nearly six months after a guilty plea on two counts of interference with commerce under color of official right.

Prosecutors said Munivez provided fake legal documents to an associate of former state District Judge Abel C. Limas, who pleaded guilty to racketeering last year. The yearslong federal investigation of Limas has swept up nearly a dozen lawyers and others connected to his court.

Munivez, a former bailiff for Limas, was a criminal investigator for the Cameron County district attorney's office until May 2011. District Attorney Armando Villalobos is also under federal indictment on corruption

Gang drops anti-gov't leaflets

MEXICO CITY (AP) — The governor of the northern Mexico state of Sinaloa says drug traffickers apparently used an airplane to drop thousands of leaflets accusing him of taking orders from drug lord Joaquin Guzman.

Drug cartels in Mexico frequently post videos and hang banners from bridges to get their messages out. But the incident in the Sinaloa state capital of Culiacan would be the first time in recent memory that traffickers have resorted to aerial leafleting, if it is confirmed.

Sinaloa Gov. Mario Lopez Valdez said Wednesday that the leaflets expressed anger about the death in custody of a suspected member of another cartel at a state prison. cartel.

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Primary turnout low; Violence against officers a 'crisis' runoff may be lower

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Although turnout was elections, the late-summer who wins the Republican nomination for an open U.S. Senate seat will likely attract even fewer voters to the polls.

Establishment GOP favorite Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst and tea party darling Ted Cruz, who were the top two finishers in Tuesday's election, each said the expected low turnout is an advantage as both men gear up for the second round of what has already been a nasty and expensive race.

Who's right may ultimately depend on just how low turnout goes.

After the primary was twice delayed because of legal fights over redrawing Texas' political districts, about 11 percent of registered Republicans cast ballots Tuesday. That means about 1.4 million people voted in the GOP race to replace retiring U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison.

Dewhurst won 43 percent of the vote, 10 points better than Cruz, an attorney and former state solicitor general. But because neither got more than 50 percent, the race moves to a July 31 runoff.

Cruz claims his fiery brand of grassroots populism inspires the kind of hardcore conservatives who will reliably cast ballots in a second round of voting — thus carrying him to the GOP nomination. But Dewhurst campaign pollster Mike Baselice says his candidate did well among senior citizens and repeat Republican Party primary

voters - both groups like-

ly to vote in the runoff. Mark Jones, a political scientist at Rice University, estimates that turnout for the July runoff will fall to between 750,000 and million ballots cast because of the Texas heat, the chance that many families could be on vacation and the fact that little may be at stake in many local races statewide.


Jones said Cruz has a group of fierce supporters who will likely enthusiastically vote for him a second time — but he doesn't appear to have the money to grow that base in any significant way over the next two months. Dewhurst, meanwhile, enjoys far broader support among mainstream Republicans, but many of those voters may not be so anxious to participate in the runoff.

"The trick for Dewhurst will be to get July 31 to look as close as possible to May 29th," Jones said. "The higher the turnout is, the better it is for Dewhurst. The lower it is, the better it is for Cruz."

The wild card could former Dallas Mayor Tom Leppert, who finished third in the nine-Republican Senate race with 13 percent of the vote.

Baselice claims his polling shows that Leppert supporters prefer Dewhurst over Cruz by 50 percent to 20 percent — but Jones said those who voted for Leppert are also more likely to get disillusioned and skip the runoff entirely.





Today in History

Today is Thursday, May 31, the 152nd day of 2012. There are 214 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On May 31, 1962, former Nazi official Adolf Eichmann was hanged in Israel a few minutes before midnight for his role in the Holocaust. (Eichmann's remains were cremated, the ashes scattered in the Mediterranean Sea.)

On this date:

In 1790, President George Washington signed into law the first U.S. copyright act.

In 1859, the Big Ben clock tower in London went into operation, chiming for the first time.

In 1889, more than 2,000 people perished when a dam break sent water rushing through Johnstown, Pa.

In 1910, the Union of South Africa was founded.

In 1911, the hull of the British liner RMS Titanic was launched from its building berth at the Port of Belfast, less than a year before the ship's fateful maiden voyage.

In 1912, U.S. Sen. Henry M. "Scoop" Jackson was born in Everett, Wash.

In 1941, "Tobacco Road," a play about an impoverished Southern family based on the novel by Erskine Caldwell, closed on Broadway after a run of 3,182 performances.

In 1961, South Africa became an independent republic as it withdrew from the British Commonwealth.

In 1970, a magnitude 7.9 earthquake in Peru claimed an estimated 67,000 lives.

In 1977, the trans-Alaska oil pipeline, three years in the making, was completed.

In 1985, at least 88 people were killed, more than 1,000 injured, as over 40 tornadoes swept through parts of Pennsylvania, Ohio, New York and Ontario, Canada, during an 8-hour period.

In 1994, the United States announced it was no longer aiming long-range nuclear missiles at targets in the former Soviet Union.


Ten years ago: A three-judge federal panel in Philadelphia ruled that public libraries could not be forced to install software that blocked sexually explicit websites. (However, the U.S. Supreme Court later upheld the use of the filters in public libraries.) European Union countries formally signed on to the Kyoto Protocol, a pact aimed at stemming pollution and global warming that has been opposed by the United States. The World Cup soccer tournament opened in Asia for the first time with a match between Senegal and defending champion France in South Korea, which was co-hosting the event with Japan. (Senegal upset France, 1-0.)

Five years ago: President George W. Bush, under international pressure to take tough action against global warming, called for a world summit to set a long-term global strategy for reducing greenhouse gas emissions. In a breach of security, detailed plans for the new U.S. Embassy under construction in Baghdad appeared on the website of the architectural firm that was contracted to design the massive facility. Former Presidents Jimmy Carter, Bill Clinton and George H.W. Bush attended the dedication of the Billy Graham Library in Charlotte, N.C.

One year ago: Angered by civilian casualties, Afghan President Hamid Karzai said he would no longer allow NATO airstrikes on houses. Former Bosnian Serb military commander Ratko Mladic was placed in a U.N. detention unit in the Netherlands to await trial on genocide charges. Atlanta became the first city in the NHL's modern era to lose two hockey teams as the Thrashers' owners agreed to sell the struggling franchise to a group that moved it to Winnipeg.

Conservatives score victories in primary

DALLAS (AP) — Two groups will continue to dominate Texas politics next year: the conservatives and the more conservatives.

Little more than 10 percent of the electorate voted in the Republican primary on Tuesday, and those who did sent a clear signal they expect Texas to remain on the rightward course set 34 years ago when Bill Clements became the first Republican governor in 100 years.

In the race to replace retiring U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, Republican operatives in Austin thought Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst was a shoo-in. But GOP voters clearly said "not so fast" and forced the long-serving politician into a runoff with Ted Cruz, the charismatic young tea partier with the backing of national conservative groups.

Dewhurst must now dig even deeper into his \$250 million personal fortune to finance the continuation of what has already been an ugly campaign. National activists will go back to their supporters to make sure Cruz has enough money to keep up.

Both campaigns will struggle to get their supporters to the polls since turnout is normally even more dismal for runoffs than for primaries. Turnout is important because hardcore voters always show up to the polls, and in Texas that means the more conservative activists. High turnout dilutes their influence, while low turnout magnifies it.

The national tea party group FreedomWorks was key to getting out the conservative vote for Cruz, training 100,000 activists in Texas.

"This is an incremental but important victory for the limited government grassroots movement in Texas," said Ryan Hecker, the group's chief operating officer. The group said it will continue to help Cruz and other tea party candidates across the country.

That activism flowed down the ticket into legislative races, with at least 40 new members headed to the 150-seat Texas House. Those races also saw voters choose the more conservative candidate in many races, and three committee chairs lost their seats while a fourth is in

Empower Texans, a statewide conservative group, crowed about their victories in a perennial battle with Speaker Joe Straus, whom they've repeatedly targeted for being too moderate. The group's primary challenger to Straus lost, but tea party favorite Rep. Bryan Hughes, R-Mineola, announced Tuesday that he will run for speaker in January, when House members will vote for their leader.

No Democrat has held statewide office in Texas since 1998, and Republicans will almost certainly control both house of the Legislature next year. The Republican Party so thoroughly dominates Texas politics that the only real competition for power comes from within it.

Straus has come to personify a probusiness, establishment wing of the party that leans toward pragmatism. As speaker, he appoints committee chairs, who then decide what bills

move forward in the Legislature. The fact that so many of his allies have retired, or lost re-election bids, will force Straus to compromise with the more conservative wing in order to hold on to power.

Gov. Rick Perry leads to social conservative wing of the GOP, and he has done his best to set the agenda for the Legislature, often stepping on

A key sticking point between Straus and Perry is the governor's new Texas Budget Compact. Perry has called on all Texas GOP members to sign the pledge not to increase state taxes or spending, even if the state has increased revenues. Straus has refused to sign any pledges ahead of the legislative session, preferring that lawmakers keep their options open to find solutions rather than be locked into prior commitments.

Perry is looking to maintain his conservative credentials as he considers running for re-election in 2014 or running for president again in 2016. But many suburban Republicans returned home last year to parents angered by more than \$4 billion in cuts to public education spending. Schools have laid off teachers, increased class sizes and cut extra programs to make ends meet, a move that angered many Republican voters.

However based on the results, those angry voters did not cast ballots in the Republican primary, or decided to place tea party values over their concerns about school

Canine 911 emergency

Emergencies are rarely convenient. Heart attacks happen on honeymoons. Strokes strike in the dead of night. Humans have entrenched systems to accommodate these events: dispatchers, ambulances, paramedics, emergency rooms. Thankfully, so do dogs.

Emergency animal hospitals are where we turn when things go wrong with our animals after hours. Only Hollywood gets to plan its disasters head to tail. The rest of us have to plan for the possibilities. Having a good emergency clinic on speed dial is as important as having a diligent vet for regular checkups and maintenance.

I was reminded of this recently when I had a scare myself.

Something was wrong with my German shepherd, Nilo. He was listless. His breathing was labored. My heart sank. It was a Sunday.

I've had sick dogs. I've had injured dogs. I've lost dogs to cancer. Needless to say, I was worried and anxious as I helped Nilo into the car and drove him to Mother Lode Pet Emergency Clinic in Shingle Springs, Calif.

Stepping into the clinic, I was probably more nervous than Nilo, who's a pretty smooth operator in most circumstances. But on this day, he wasn't feeling well, which was obvious — and not only to me.

Within seconds of our arrival, we were greeted by a nurse. Nurse Pug. She approached Nilo calmly, looked him over with gentle eyes and then lay down next to him on the floor and rolled onto her back. I'll never forget her soft fawn coat, her sweet, smooshed pug face or the way she seemed to say to Nilo, "Don't worry. It'll be DK. Nurse Pug will take good care of you until the doctor can examine you."

Turns out Nurse Pug is the antidote to "waiting room disorder," the symptoms of which include nausea, digestive upset, dry mouth or extreme drooling,

depending on the species. But Nurse Pug was just the beginning.

Dr. Heidi Hilleary and vet tech Tessa were on duty that day. These two embody the Mother Lode mission: to provide "comprehensive and compassionate expert emergency pet care." Nilo was in competent, caring hands, and that meant the world to me.

When all was said and done, Nilo's blood work was good. He's healthy and at home. He has a little arthritis creeping in, which was likely the source of his discomfort. Nothing we can't manage. Can you hear my sigh of relief?

The whole experience served as a reminder to me to 1) encourage dog owners to keep the number of a good emergency animal clinic on hand and 2) thank these people for the great service they provide.

The people — and the pug — at Mother Lode made all the difference, and I know there are veterinarians, technicians and support staff in emergency animal hospitals across the country who work crazy hours and provide huge relief: a place to go when crisis comes at an inconvenient time, quality care, unqualified dedication.

Thank you, Dr. Hilleary. Thank you, tech Tessa. Thank you, Nurse Pug. Thank you all.

BROWNSVILLE Villalobos' office. (AP) — A state judge on Wednesday dismissed a citizen's attempt to remove a south Texas district attorney under federal indictment for corruption charges, but suggested the prosecutor should step down temporarily.

Two blocks away, a federal judge sentenced a former investigator from that prosecutor's office to a year and one day in prison on his own corruption charges.

The cases were separate, but stemmed from an expansive yearslong investigation that began with a corrupt former state judge and ensnared nearly a dozen people tied to his court.

Cameron County District Attorney Armando Villalobos was being targeted under a Texas law that allows some residents to submit a petition to a district court seeking the elected official's removal. Federal prosecutors had indicted Villalobos earlier this month.

Visiting Senior Judge J. Manuel Banales told attorney Juan Angel Guerra on Wednesday that his client's petition had failed to meet the state's requirements. Banales, however, rejected the petition without prejudice, meaning others could still make a similar request.

"The fact that Mr. Villalobos has been indicted by a federal grand jury should raise serious concerns to everyone in this community and it may be the more prudent and honorable thing for Mr. Villalobos under the circumstances to voluntarily step aside on a temporary basis pending the disposition of those charges," Banales said. "Because if he's acquitted then he convicted he forfeits the

Attorneys for Villalobos had maintained that the court lacked jurisdiction to rule on the request because the state had not been properly joined to the case.

What's next for Romney? Challenge Obama, raise money

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) — What's next for Mitt Romney? The Republican presidential nomination finally in hand, he will spend the next three months trying to undercut President Barack. Obama on the economy while portraying himself as Mr. Fix It for a nation with stubbornly and painfully high unemployment.

Romney also faces key decisions between now and his acceptance of the party's nomination in late August in Florida: Where should he compete most aggressively? Who should be his running mate?

At the same time, he must dive anew into fundraising and work to win over voters who are distracted by their own summer plans and day-to-day pocket-book worries — while withstanding Obama's attacks on his own claims as a jobs creator.

Not that Romney is publicly sweating the hurdles that come with being the little-known challenger to a personally popular president.

"People will get to know me better," Romney told Fox News in an interview that aired Wednesday, the day after he sealed the GOP nomination with his primary election victory in Texas. He says the general election campaign is only beginning even though his chief challenger dropped out more than six weeks ago.

With a smile, he said of the voters, "My guess is they're going to get to know more about me than they'd like to by the time we're finished."

As if on cue, Obama's campaign opened a fresh critique of the GOP nominee-in-waiting, assailing his economic record as governor of Massachusetts. It's the second phase of an effort by Obama to define Romney negatively in voters' eyes. The Democrat already has spent weeks hammering the Republican on his record at the private equity company he founded.

Obama himself made a courtesy call to Romney to congratulate him on his nomination victory. An Obama aide said the president told Romney in a brief and cordial chat that he looked forward to debating America's future with him.

Romney spent the day in California,

plunging into a week filled with fundraisers and efforts to unite Republicans after a divisive primary season. Already he's proven adept at both, hauling in enough cash to cut into the advantage that

Obama has while getting most of his former Republican rivals to close ranks around him.

He's also picking up high-profile endorsements. Former Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice confirmed to The Associated Press that she is backing Romney.

Those efforts — and the turning of his primary campaign into a general election operation — have been his prime focus. He's making only a handful of public appearances for now, but aides say they expect the campaign to ramp up to a full sprint by July 4. Romney has said he plans to take a week off around the holiday, suggesting that may be the time when he makes final deliberations on whom to choose as his vice presidential nominee.

Little is known about just where in that process Romney may be, though there is no shortage of Republican rising stars informally auditioning for the role.

While work on that front is certainly going on behind the scenes, Romney's aides are spending this week publicly pressing anew a criticism that the candidate himself has been making for months against Obama. They're highlighting the hundreds of millions of dollars in economic stimulus money that the administration provided to Solyndra, the solar-energy company that went bankrupt and whose executives had contributed to Obama's campaign.

It is a sign of the overarching argument Romney will make against Obama in the coming weeks: that Obama's economic efforts have been politically motivated, have wasted taxpayer dollars and, ultimately, have failed.

The renewed Solyndra criticism is also an attempt to answer Obama's

recent criticism — in speeches and advertisements — of Romney's tenure at the helm of Bain Capital. Obama has argued that Romney's time as a private equity executive before entering politics — the basis for his campaign's claim that he's best suited to lead an economic recovery — was aimed at enriching shareholders, not serving the public.

Romney largely survived that opening salvo, judging by early polls and interviews with both Republicans and Democrats.

National surveys show Obama either statistically tied with Romney or only slightly ahead of him. And polls in the most hotly contested states show Romney competitive with Obama.

"They haven't worked," GOP strategist Charlie Black, an informal Romney adviser, said of the Bain criticisms. "People are worried about the economy and jobs."

Democratic strategist Steve Elmendorf said too few voters had heard the argument.

"The reality is it's June," said Elmendorf. "To say the Bain argument has worked or not is ridiculously premature."

A handful of swing-voting states will be the most hard fought as Obama and Romney aggressively build get-out-the-vote organizations and air a flood of advertisements in their efforts to reach the 270 Electoral College votes needed to win the White House.

Across the country, Romney's campaign is going through growing pains as it seeks to turn a stripped-down primary operation into a full-scale general election campaign. Aides say offices will open and more staff will join the team, but they also say they don't anticipate being able to match the staffing levels of Obama, who has had teams in place for months in states like Florida and Ohio. The Republican National Committee also is in the midst of boosting its staffing to help Romney.

Already, Obama's and Romney's campaigns, as well as super PACs supporting and opposing each, have spent more than \$80 million in advertising on the general election campaign through the month of June, accord-

ing to ad-tracking reports provided to The Associated Press by Smart Media Group of Alexandria, Va.

Of that, Obama's campaign has spent \$31 million-plus on TV ads in about 10 states. He's been on the air most heavily in Florida, Iowa, Ohio and Virginia, an indication of where his team may think the race will be won or lost. A Democratic-leaning super PAC also has been on the air to help him, though it's spent only about \$6.3 million.

Romney himself has run ads in just five battleground states: Iowa, New Hampshire, North Carolina, Ohio and Virginia. But he's been significantly helped by pro-Romney outside groups, who have been on the air in several others — most heavily in Florida, Ohio and Virginia.

Even so, Republican outfits, including Romney's campaign and supporting super PACS, have combined to spend about as much as Obama and his allies. And in the coming weeks, Romney plans to focus heavily on fundraising so that he'll be able to make strategic decisions about where to devote most of it state by state.

To that end, Romney is spending the week courting donors in California, starting Wednesday in Fresno, Bakersfield and in Hillsborough, a wealthy enclave just outside San Francisco.

He planned major fundraising events Thursday, Friday and Saturday in southern California. On Tuesday, Romney was in Las Vegas wooing Sheldon Adelson, the primary financing source of a group that backed Newt Gingrich's failed primary campaign. And Romney also attended a fundraiser hosted by Donald Trump.

a team," Hutto said. "We can get more comfortable playing together."


Also returning from last season's bi-district finalist team is junior starter Derrek Pollard. Powell said it will help them get used to playing with the younger players.



Enbridge building N.D. rail terminal

BISMARCK, N.D. (AP) — North Dakota regulators have approved the site plan for a new Berthold facility to load oil onto railroad cars.

The Enbridge pipeline company is building the terminal. Enbridge already has a Berthold station for loading oil into pipelines, and the network is expanding.

Enbridge is spending \$102 million to build the rail loading terminal for oil exports. The price includes the cost of land and new storage tanks and piping. North Dakota has almost a dozen rail terminals for loading oil.

Public Service Commission Chairman Tony Clark says about one-quarter of North Dakota's oil exports are shipped by rail, because pipelines can't handle it all.

Clark says railroad transport is more expensive than pipelines, but he says the railroad offers some flexibility that pipelines don't.

American, unions to renew talks

FORT WORTH (AP) — American Airlines plans to start contract talks this week with its unions while it waits for a federal bankruptcy judge to decide whether the company can impose its own terms on workers.

Thomas Horton, the CEO of American Airlines parent AMR Corp., said Wednesday that the talks will be mediated by another bankruptcy judge.

This month, American negotiated concessions from five groups representing nearly 11,000 of its 73,000 workers.

But it is in a standoff with pilots, flight attendants and mechanics. Horton said the impasse "has created uncertainty all around."

American and AMR filed for bankruptcy protection in November. AMR has been reworking aircraft leases and just finished a three-week trial in which it tried to persuade U.S. Bankruptcy Judge Sean Lane to let it break its existing union contracts.

AMR says that to survive it must cut jobs and reduce benefits and work rules in union contracts as part of a plan to save \$1.25 billion a year in labor costs. The unions say the proposed cuts are more than AMR needs to become profitable. The judge plans to rule by June 22.

American's unions have thrown their support behind a potential takeover bid from US Airways, which has promised the unions easier terms than American had proposed.

Exxon investors OK pay program

DALLAS (AP) — Exxon Mobil Corp.'s CEO had a good year in 2011 — he got compensation valued at \$25.2 million. Shareholders had a good year too, so on Wednesday they gave their approval to the oil giant's executive pay program.

Investors at Exxon's annual meeting cast about 78 percent of their shares in favor of the compensation-setting system, ignoring critics who said executive pay was too high.

Shareholders also voted against resolutions that took aim at a controversial method of drilling for natural gas and called on Exxon to set targets for cutting greenhouse gas emissions. Similar resolutions have been defeated at previous Exxon meetings.

They also rejected a measure to ban discrimination against gays and transgender employees. The company said it already prohibits bias of any kind including for sexual orientation, but the measure's supporters complained that Exxon does not offer benefits to partners of gay employees.

Rising oil prices helped boost Exxon's net income by 35 percent to \$41 billion in 2011, the company's best year since 2008. The stock rose 16 percent.

The company's board boosted Chairman and CEO Rex W. Tillerson's compensation by 17 percent, according to an analysis by The Associated Press. The combination of salary, stock awards and other compensation made Tillerson the 16th-highest paid executive among publicly traded U.S. companies last year.

Bob Evans to expand in Texas

SULPHUR SPRINGS (AP) — Bob Evans Farms Inc. says it will close two food production plants in Ohio next year and beef up production at its Sulphur Springs facility.

The Ohio-based restaurant and food company plans to shut down plants in Springfield in western Ohio and Bidwell in southern Ohio next summer as it focuses on convenience foods, packaged side dishes and other higher-growth opportunities.

It's also investing \$23 million or more to add lines and boost production of ready-to-eat foods at the facility in Sulphur Springs.

The plant opened in Sulphur Springs in 2004 when Bob Evans Foods converted the former Kozy Shack pudding plant to produce its line of breakfast tacos, links, sausage patties, etc.

Just three years ago, the company completed a \$16 million expansion that doubled the size of the original 52,770 square foot plant, helping boost the number of employees from the initial 60 to 190.

Sulphur Springs civic leaders have consistently praised Bob Evans Farms Inc., and corporate executives have frequently reacted in kind.







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
