break of disease. "In this instance, because we're talking about the Department of State Health Services, what you would normally be dispensing is some sort of medication," Courtney said. "That could be in the form of an H1N1 shot, or a pill to counteract some sort of viral infection or something like that, a widespread infectious thing. DSHS would come in and bring the medicines and assist in setting it up. A group of volunteers from the community would be main staff of the POD. Hereford has actually done it a couple of times, because of some medical problems over there with a large segment of the population."

Gray County has seen two fullscale POD drills over the years, the last of which was held in 2009 as a joint effort between the DSHS, emergency management jurisdictions within Gray County and various civic groups, businesses and volunteer responders. Tuesday's event,

Gray County FSA accepting nominations for county committee

The Gray County USDA Farm Service Agency will begin accepting nominations for the local county committee election today, said Matthew Street, executive director of the local FSA.

Elected county committee members are responsible for making decisions on federal farm program issues and initiatives, such as the FSA's conservation, commodity, disaster and price support programs. The committees are made up of three to five members, all elected by farmers and ranchers in the area, who serve three-year terms.

All newly elected committee members (and their alternates) will take office on January I next year.

Street encouraged Gray County's farmers, ranchers and landowners to turn in their nominations.

"County committees are unique to FSA and are a valuable resource that gives locally elected farmers and ranchers who participate in FSA programs the opportunity to impact farm programs at the local level," he said. "I hope to see a high level of participation during the nomination and election process."

Nominations may come from producers themselves, as well as groups that represent minority and female farmers and ranchers. Producers may nominate themselves.

"In order to have fair representation of the demographics and agricultural interests in the community, I encourage all producers, including women, minority and beginning farmers and ranchers to participate in the nomination and election process," said Street.

To be eligible, a nominee must participate in an FSA-administered program, be eligible to vote in a county committee election and live within the local administrative area in which he or she is a candidate. Forms for eligible nominees, as well as more information about the county committee election itself, can be found online at www.fsa.usda.gov/elections.

Nomination forms must be postmarked or received by the local USDA Service Center by Sunday, Aug.







Texas City residents sue BP

TEXAS CITY (AP) — More than 50,000 Texas City residents have joined a class-action suit against BP PLC, alleging they got sick in 2010 from a 41-day emissions release from a refinery that was the scene of a deadly explosion.

Texas has also sued BP over the release, which occurred as the British oil giant was battling the catastrophic Gulf of Mexico spill. The Environmental Protection Agency is also investigating.

The Galveston Daily News reports that residents say they became ill from the release. BP maintains the emissions didn't harm anyone.

Texas says BP emitted 500,000 pounds of chemicals, including carbon monoxide and benzene, during April and May in 2010.

Shelter for illegal kids closes

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A federal agency has closed the last of five temporary emergency shelters in Texas that housed unaccompanied illegal immigrant children.

The Department of Health and Human Services says the last four children staying at the Lackland Air Force Base near San Antonio have been relocated and the shelter there closed down Wednesday.

Spokesman Kenneth Wolfe says the department has opened new permanent, state-certified shelters and is expanding existing facilities.

The dormitory at Lackland, which opened in April, could hold up to 300 youngsters. Most of the kids who stayed there were caught near the border with Mexico.

The San Antonio Express-News reports that the agency has rounded up 8,541 unaccompanied children since October, exceeding the 2011 total.

Judge dismisses Facebook case

NEW YORK (AP) — A federal judge in Texas has rejected a legal challenge to Facebook and leading investment banks over the company's initial public offering of stock.

One disgruntled shareholder had sought to compel Facebook to answer questions, which could then form the basis of a formal lawsuit. The judge ruled this week that the shareholder had to do the research on his own first before getting the court involved.

Other cases have been filed against Facebook and its investment banks, claiming that analysts at those banks, including Morgan Stanley, cut their financial forecasts for Facebook just before the IPO and told only a handful of clients.

Facebook's stock is trading at \$27.81 as of Thursday afternoon, up 2 percent for the day but down nearly 27 percent from the May IPO price.

Whooping cranes survive drought

HOUSTON (AP) — The endangered whooping cranes that winter on the Texas Gulf Coast survived a historic drought and their numbers have risen.

Biologists had feared the cranes would not have sufficient forage because the drought had made their preferred foods scarce.

During a drought in 2009, biologists counted more than 50 dead birds. This time, they conducted prescribed burns to bring food to the surface. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service said Thursday some cranes never made it to the coast, and a few left early. But they estimate there are 245 birds in the flock now. They found three dead birds.

They say the flock is so large they can't count individual birds. The cranes' numbers have been rising since a low of 15 in 1941. They are now in Canada.

Twins charged in pot operation

SAEGERTOWN, Pa. (AP) — The Pennsylvania attorney general has charged twins from Texas with heading an operation that shipped as much as 20 pounds of marijuana each month to northwestern Pennsylvania over the last two years.

Online court records don't list attorneys for Marcelino Rodriguez, of Eddy, Texas, and Miguel Rodriguez, from Corpus Christi, Texas, who were charged Tuesday along with five Pennsylvania residents and two more Texans.

State prosecutors say Marcelino Rodriguez was arrested on unrelated drug charges in Crawford County in August 2010, and continued to direct the operation using phone calls from the county prison. Those calls were recorded by law enforcement, which helped lead to the charges.

The brothers are 29 years old and face charges of participating in a corrupt organization, which carries up to 20 years in prison, and other drug-related crimes.

Suspect in Houston death kills self

HOUSTON (AP) — Houston police say a man believed responsible for the death of his ex-girlfriend whose body was found in a bathtub has killed himself.

Police on Thursday announced the death of 39-year-old Nathan Mitchell of Houston. Mitchell was discovered dead Wednesday of an apparent self-inflicted gunshot wound at a home where he allegedly had been hiding.

The body of 37-year-old Lashonda Moye was located June 4 in the tub of another residence after officers were summoned on a report of a home invasion. Officers say Mitchell was in the tub with the woman and he was taken to a hospital for treatment of unspecified injuries.

A coroner determined the woman had been strangled.

Another Mexican journalist killed

VERACRUZ, Mexico (AP) — Authorities in Mexico's Gulf coast state of Veracruz say unidentified assailants kidnapped and killed a reporter for the local edition of the Milenio newspaper, the fifth such killing in the state in a months and a half.

Journalist Victor Manuel Baez Chino covered the crime beat for the local edition of the national newspaper Milenio, as well as for a news website called "Police Reporters."

Veracruz state spokeswoman Gina Dominguez said Baez Chino was reported kidnapped outside the offices of the website in the state capital as he left work late Wednesday.

Stand your ground defendant could get life

HOUSTON (AP) — A retired Texas firefighter convicted of fatally shooting his unarmed neighbor during a dispute over a noisy birthday party was described as abusive and a bad neighbor Thursday during the punishment phase of his trial.

Raul Rodriguez, 47, was convicted of murder Wednesday in the 2010 death of Kelly Danaher, a 36-year-old elementary school teacher. Rodriguez had argued he was within his rights under Texas' version of a stand-your-ground law.

The punishment phase began Thursday with prosecutors in Houston-presenting neighbors, former co-workers and Rodriguez's exwife. They testified Rodriguez was abusive, a bad neighbor and had once shot a dog.

Defense attorneys won't get their chance to call witnesses until June 25. The delay was caused by scheduling conflicts.

Rodriguez could be sentenced to up to life in prison.

Rodriguez was angry about the noise coming from Danaher's home, where the family was having a birthday party for Danaher's wife and young daughter. Rodriguez went to the home and got into an argument with Danaher and two other men attending the party.

In a 22-minute video he recorded that night, Rodriguez can be heard telling a police dispatcher "my life is in danger now" and "these people are going to go try and kill me." He then said, "I'm standing my ground here," and shot Danaher after some-

body appeared to grab his camera. The two other men were wounded.

Rodriguez's reference to standing his ground is similar to the claim made by George Zimmerman, a neighborhood watch volunteer who is citing Florida's standyour-ground law in his defense in the fatal February shooting of an unarmed teenager, Trayvon Martin. Rodriguez's case, however, was decided under a different kind of self-defense doctrine.

Texas' version of the law was revised in 2007 to expand the right to use deadly force. It allows people to defend themselves in their homes, workplaces or vehicles, but a person using force can't provoke the attacker or be involved in criminal activity at the time.

Third firm in Perry's tech fund bankrupt

SAN ANTONIO (AP)

— A third company awarded taxpayer dollars through Gov. Rick Perry's business-hatching Emerging Technology Fund has filed for bankruptcy, folding after the state cut off money that was tied to hitting milestones not in the original contract, the president of the startup said Thursday.

The bankruptcy filing raises the amount of failed investments by the state's venture capital-like fund to \$2.5 million. Although that's a sliver of the tech fund's total \$192 million portfolio, this latest bankruptcy brought fresh criticism to a fund shadowed by questions over accountability and transparency.

NanoTailor Inc. President Ramon Perales said his Austin-based startup had been making progress. But he told The Associated Press that after NanoTailor received its first \$250,000 award in 2010, the state took another \$1 million in potential funding off the table when the company couldn't hit new benchmarks the state now required to receive the full investment.

Perry spokeswoman Lucy Nashed said the state cut off an underperforming NanoTailor to protect taxpayers, adding that the company would have been required to sign off on any contract revisions.

"We were concerned about continuing to offer any further taxpayer dollars," she said.

Perales would not elaborate on the new milestones he said the state set or how realistic they were, saying: "The fact of the matter is they added them for whatever reason."

The company filed for Chapter 7 bankruptcy in May. The AP was the first to locate the filing while researching the fund's recipients.

Perry's office oversees the Emerging Technology Fund, which was created in 2005 to help launch tech start-ups in Texas by investing early-seed funding. The awards are not grants, because the state

takes equity positions in each company, but the stakes are not made public. Nashed said there is still \$60 million available for new projects

The high tech fund has drawn scrutiny from the right and left. Republican state Rep. David Simpson, who rode the tea party wave into the Legislature in 2010, said Thursday that \$250,000 has now been wasted because the government went into the business of "picking winners and losers."

The watchdog group Texans for Public Justice, which has been critical of Perry's pot of dollars for businesses, said NanoTailor's bankruptcy doesn't help the fund's track record.

"It is the nature of an emerging technology fund that there is going to be a certain amount of failure," said Andrew Wheat, the group's research director. "That is another question that could be better sorted

out by our state officials: How much risk is too much risk?"


Perales said NanoTailor used licensed technology from NASA to make carbon nanotubes for industries ranging from aerospace to pharmaceuticals. He said the company had six employees and about 20 investors, but Nashed said filings with the state indicate the startup lagged in attracting outside dol-

NanoTailor requested their next round of funding four months after being given the \$250,000, Nashed said. The state told NanoTailor in January 2011 that the company had not made enough progress to receive more funding but that they were welcome to address those concerns and re-apply. NanoTailor never did,

Nashed said.

NanoTailor stands out as among the smallest investments of the fund, which has given \$192 million early-seed funding to more than 130 companies. Estimates put the fund's worth at \$4 million more than what the state has invested, Nashed said.

Are we already in a global recession?

Is it possible that we are already in a global recession but just don't know it yet? And is the U.S. itself -- still the epicenter of the world economy -- standing on the front edge of another recession? I sincerely hope I'm wrong. But

warning signs are everywhere.

The eurozone economy is flat on its back. Greece may be headed for a political crackup and an exit from the euro and European Union. Deposit runs in Greece and elsewhere are beginning, and a credit emerging economies like China, India and Brazil are slumping.

Here at home, ex-Clinton strategists James Carville and Stan Greenberg sent a memo to President Obama telling him that his campaign message of slow and steady recovery progress is out of touch with Main Street America. They're right. Of course, Obama's "private sector is doing just fine" statement is part and parcel of his disconnect from economic reality.

And the reality isn't good. Whether you're a Democrat or Republican, take a look at the numbers:

Job growth has been slipping badly for three months. Retail sales and factory orders are down two straight months. Real incomes are flat. Household wealth is way underwater from the housing collapse, dropping nearly 40 percent in the last three measured years. And gross domestic product was an anemic 1.9 percent in the first quarter. Nearly all leading Wall Street economists are marking down their second-quarter estimates to 2 percent or less.

But here's the key point: 2 percent growth is not a recovery. Many economists would call it a growth recession. When you get that low, there's little margin for

First is the deflationary impact of a sharp, nearly 10 percent rise in the exchange value of the dollar relative to the euro. That's imparting a deflationary influence on the economy, where both import and producer prices have recently turned negative. The good side of commodity deflation is that oil and retail gas prices have fallen considerably; the bad side is that manufacturers may hold back production and that debtors have to climb out of deeper holes.

As someone who always touts the merits of a strong King Dollar, why am I complaining now that we have one? That's my second reason for the latest economic stall: King Dollar is not being accompanied by lower tax rates.



All this is why the tax-cliff problem needs to be solved immediately. If the tax cuts are extended sooner rather than later, the economy might straighten out faster than most folks think. But House Speaker John Boehner told me that while he's ready to talk to President Obama; the phone isn't ringing. And while House Republicans are expected to pass a tax-cut extension in July, it won't go anywhere without White House support.

Unfortunately, the president is still talking about tax hikes on the rich. He should listen to Bill Clinton, who argues for a full tax-cut extension to stop recession. If we wait until after the election to address the tax cliff, we will face uncertainty and chaos, bringing us closer to recession.

Isn't there some way to nip this worst-case outcome in the bud?

Kidnapping by Mexican police on video

MEXICO CITY (AP) — There it was on video: Five heavily armed policemen barge into a hotel in western Mexico before dawn and march out with three handcuffed men in underwear.

But police weren't making an arrest. Prosecutors say they apparently were taking orders from criminals. Just hours after the three were seized, they were found asphyxiated and beaten to death.

Mexicans have become inured to lurid tales of police collaboration with narcotics gangs during 5½ years of a drug war that has cost more than 47,500 lives. But seldom can they actually see it occur, and the video broadcast on national television was a shocker.

"One assumes that in some cities ... the municipal police work for the drug cartels," said Jorge Chabat an expert on security and drug trafficking at the Center for Economic Research and Teaching. "But what is different here is that there is a video. It's not the same thing to imagine that this going on, and to see it."

While the kidnapping and murder occurred in January, and the faces of several officers were clearly seen on the videos, the officers were not detained until June 6, when soldiers and state police raided a local police station. And they still have not been formally charged with any crime.

"It took time to obtain the video tapes, to do the investigation, and to get the arrest warrants," said Jalisco state prosecutor's spokesman Lino Gonzalez said Thursday. "We didn't have the information."

Police are investigating whether the gunmen who order the police throughout the tape belong to the New Generation cartel based in western Jalisco state where the kidnapping occurred. The gang is aligned with powerful fugitive drug lord Joaquin "El Chapo" Guzman.

The delayed arrests came less than three weeks before national elections in which security and corruption are major issues. The municipality, Lagos de Moreno, is run by Mayor Jose Brizuela, a politician for the Institutional Revolutionary Party, or PRI, who is running for state

Then he and his fellow officers trot into the hotel and present the list at the reception desk, apparently asking what rooms the men are staying in.

In the next segment of the video, the victims are trotted out of the hotel in their underwear with their hands

cuffed behind their backs. One is being hustled along by a man in civilian dress, who stuffs him into a patrol car. The gunmen — police are investigating whether they belong to the Jalisco New Generation drug gang — appear to be calling the shots throughout, with the police officers serving as gofers.

The police then watch and wait in front of the hotel while the men's luggage and vehicle are stolen. Finally, the police truck carrying the victims follows the gunmen as they drive away in the own pickup and the stolen vehicle.

In any case, the release of the dramatic images comes less than three weeks before national and state elections in which security is a major issue. Critics accuse President Felipe Calderon of setting off a bloodbath with his strategy against gangs, while his party's presidential candidate, Josefina Vazquez, has suggested her opponents are ready to compromise with the cartels.

Jalisco is governed by Calderon's party. The man who was mayor of Lagos de Moreno when the video was shot is now a rival party's candidate for the state legislature.





All this is why the tax-cliff problem needs to be solved immediately. If the tax cuts are extended sooner rather than later, the economy might straighten out faster than most folks think. But House Speaker John Boehner told me that while he's ready to talk to President Obama, the phone isn't ringing. And while House Republicans are expected to pass a tax-cut extension in July, it won't go anywhere without White House support.

Unfortunately, the president is still talking about tax hikes on the rich. He should listen to Bill Clinton, who argues for a full tax-cut extension to stop recession. If we wait until after the election to address the tax cliff, we will face uncertainty and chaos, bringing us closer to recession.

Isn't there some way to nip this worst-case outcome in the bud?

Kidnapping by Mexican police on video

MEXICO CITY (AP) -There it was on video: Five heavily armed policemen barge into a hotel in western Mexico before dawn and march out with three handcuffed men in underwear.

But police weren't making an arrest. Prosecutors say they apparently were taking orders from criminals. Just hours after the three were seized, they were found asphyxiated and beaten to death.

Mexicans have become inured to lurid tales of police collaboration with narcotics gangs during 51/2 years of a drug war that has cost more than 47,500 lives. But seldom can they actually see it occur, and the video broadcast on national television was a shocker.

"One assumes that in some cities ... the municipal police work for the drug cartels," said Jorge Chabat an expert on security and drug trafficking at the Center for Economic Research and Teaching. "But what is different here is that there is a video. It's not the same thing to imagine that this going on, and to see it."

While the kidnapping and murder occurred in January, and the faces of several officers were clearly seen on the videos, the officers were not detained until June 6, when soldiers and state police raided a local police station. And they still have not been formally charged with any crime.

"It took time to obtain the video tapes, to do the investigation, and to get the arrest warrants," said Jalisco state prosecutor's spokesman Lino Gonzalez said Thursday. "We didn't have the information."

Police are investigating whether the gunmen who order the police throughout the tape belong to the New Generation cartel based in western Jalisco state where the kidnapping occurred. The gang is aligned with powerful fugitive drug lord Joaquin "El Chapo" Guzman.

The delayed arrests came less than three weeks before national elections in which security and corruption are major issues. The municipality, Lagos de Moreno, is run by Mayor Jose Brizuela, a politician for the Institutional Revolutionary Party, or PRI, who is running for state

A city policeman carrying an assault rifle runs over to their truck and is given what appears to be a list. Then he and his fellow officers trot into the hotel and present the list at the reception desk, apparently asking what rooms the men are staying in.



cuffed behind their backs. One is being hustled along by a man in civilian dress, who stuffs him into a patrol car. The gunmen — police are investigating whether they belong to the Jalisco New Generation drug gang - appear to be calling the shots throughout, with the police officers serving as gofers.

The police then watch and wait in front of the hotel while the men's luggage and vehicle are stolen. Finally, the police truck carrying the victims follows the gunmen as they drive away in the own pickup and the stolen vehicle.

In any case, the release of the dramatic images comes less than three weeks before national and state elections in which security is a major issue. Critics accuse President Felipe Calderon of setting off a bloodbath with his strategy against gangs, while his party's presidential candidate, Josefina Vazquez, has suggested her opponents are ready to compromise with the cartels.

Jalisco is governed by Calderon's party. The man who was mayor of Lagos de Moreno when the video was shot is now a rival party's candidate for the state legislature.





Stanford slapped with 110 years for role in \$7 billion swindle

HOUSTON (AP) — Former jet-setting Texas tycoon R. Allen Stanford, whose financial empire once spanned the Americas, was sentenced Thursday to 110 years in prison for bilking investors out of more than \$7 billion over 20 years in one of the largest Ponzi schemes in U.S. history.

U.S. District Judge David Hittner handed down the sentence during a court hearing in which two people spoke on behalf of Stanford's investors about how his fraud had affected their lives.

Prosecutors had asked that Stanford be sentenced to 230 years in prison, the maximum sentence possible after a jury convicted the one-time billionaire in March on 13 of 14 fraud-related counts. Stanford's convictions on conspiracy, wire and mail fraud charges followed a seven-week trial.

Stanford's attorneys had asked for a maximum of 41 months, a sentence he could have completed within about five months because he has been jailed since his arrest in June 2009.

During Thursday's sentencing hearing, Stanford gave a rambling statement to the court in which he denied he did anything wrong. Speaking for more than 40 minutes,

Stanford said he was a scapegoat and blamed the federal government and a U.S.-appointed receiver who took over his companies for tearing down his business empire and preventing his investors from getting any of their money back.

"I'm not here to ask for sympathy or forgiveness or to throw myself at your mercy," Stanford told Hittner. "I did not run a Ponzi scheme. I

didn't defraud anybody." Prosecutor William Stellmach chastised Stanford for his lack of remorse for defrauding thousands of people of their life savings.

"To the bitter end, he was a con man and a coward," Stellmach said during the

Stanford was once considered one of the richest men in the U.S., with an estimated net worth of more than \$2 billion. His financial empire stretched from the U.S. to Latin America and the Caribbean. But after his arrest, all of his assets were seized and

he had to rely on court-appointed attorneys

to defend him.

Calling Stanford arrogant and remorseless, prosecutors said he used the money from investors who bought certificates of deposit, or CDs, from his bank on the Caribbean island nation of Antigua to fund a string of failed businesses, bribe regulators and pay for a lavish lifestyle that included yachts, a fleet of private jets and sponsorship of cricket tournaments.

Defense attorneys portrayed Stanford, 62, as a visionary entrepreneur who made money for investors and conducted legitimate business deals. They accused the prosecution's star witness - James M. Davis, the former chief financial officer for Stanford's various companies — of being behind the fraud and tried to discredit him by calling him a liar and tax cheat.

Ali Fazel, one of Stanford's attorneys, said he was disappointed with the sentence.

"It's a harsh punishment. It's tough on him," he said. "He feels like he didn't do anything."

Prosecutors declined to comment after the sentencing

Angela Shaw, a Dallas-area woman who

founded the Stanford Victims Coalition and spoke during the hearing, said while she had hoped the financier would receive the maximum sentence, she was more upset that Stanford didn't apologize in court for what he did.

"It would have gone a long way to show there is some level of remorse and some measure of humanity," she said.

Hittner also ordered Stanford to forfeit \$5.9 billion, but that was mostly symbolic because Stanford is penniless.

The jury that convicted Stanford also cleared the way for U.S. authorities to go after about \$330 million in stolen investor funds sitting in the financier's frozen foreign bank accounts in Canada, England and Switzerland.

But due to legal wrangling, it could be years before the more than 21,000 investors recover anything, and whatever they ultimately get will only be a fraction of what

The financier's trial was delayed after he was declared incompetent in January 2011 due to an anti-anxiety drug addiction he developed in jail. He underwent treatment and was declared fit for trial in December.

Redecorate home with new hardware

Dear Pat: I am redecorating my house. At a recent home show, I saw some very attractive elegant interior door hardware. Is it possible to install new hardware on my old doors to jazz them up a little? -- Claudette B.

Dear Claudette: If someone asked what you notice first when you walk into a home for the first time, most people generally would not think of looking at the door hardware. However, door hardware can make a significant difference in the general feel of quality about a home without one even being overtly aware of it.

Can you remember the type of doorknobs your parent's house had when you were growing up? Quite possibly, they were clear crystal with real brass trim. Today, these would give the home an elegant look even on an old door with a few nicks and scrapes.

It is not difficult to replace the old doorknobs with new ones. Before you install the new ones, fill in all the imperfections in the door surface with wood filler, and paint the doors. Two coats of semigloss latex paint is the best to use. Spend a few extra dollars per gallon and get special latex paint for interior doors and trim. It is more durable than standard semigloss paint used on walls.

Remove the two long screws that hold the old doorknob in the door, and remove the doorknob. It may be stuck from years of painting, so just tap it with a rubber mallet to knock each half loose. The actual latch itself may be just pressed into a hole in the door edge, or it may be screwed in, as is often done on exterior doors.

The two halves of the doorknob will have a long rod that passes through the latch mechanism in the center. It is usually square so when it rotates, it retracts the latch when you turn the knob to open the door. Take the rod along to your home center store. Hopefully, you will find a new doorknob with the same size rod so you will not have to also replace the latch mechanism inside the door.

You will have many door hardware options from which to select. The prices will range from a low of less than \$10 to a high of more than \$100. Many builders install the lowest-priced "builder-quality"



ones. These are often shiny brass plating with little detail. They should work for several years with normal use, but the feel and appearance of them makes it obvious they were inexpensive.

Door hardware in the \$50 range is often the threshold for an elegant-looking, high-quality, longlasting product. In this price range, you should be able to get decorative round and lever handles, which are popular today. In the \$100 range, you will find some unique cast models, which offer

the most decorative detail work.

Good-quality door hinges are also important to consider. Although much of the hinge is hidden from view when a closet or room door is closed, the pin still shows. One way to jazz them up is to install hinge pins with decorative balls or Victorian finials.

For doors that are opened often, consider install new hinges. This is more for smooth, quiet operation than for their appearance. Stamped polished solid brass ones are generally adequate. If your budget is not tight, extruded hinges are the hest quality

Armstrong considering 'all options' amid drug charges

AUSTIN (AP) — Lance Armstrong is gearing up for a fight over the latest round of doping allega-

Armstrong's lawyers demanded access to evidence gathered by the U.S. Anti-Doping Agency, including test results and the names of witnesses who said they saw the seven-time Tour de France champion use performance-enhancing drugs.

Armstrong has until June 22 to respond in writing to the fresh allegations, the first step of what could be months-long process.

"I'm exploring all my options," Armstrong said in a telephone interview Thursday with The Associated Press from Paris. "They're not limited only to arbitration with USADA. I think there are other questions that need to be answered with regard to their behavior and tactics."

"They are well known to move the goal line on you," he said, referring to the drug agency.

"We are entitled to certain things, certain pieces of evidence, if not all the evidence in terms of what will be in front of the review board," he said.

The AP obtained a copy of the letter Armstrong's attorney, Robert Luskin, sent to USADA.

"(We) cannot protect Mr. Armstrong's rights without knowing who is saying what and what events that

allegedly occurred over the course of a decade and a half," Luskin wrote. "Even at this preliminary stage, your reliance on secret witnesses making deliberately vague charges

is unconscionable." The letter noted that USADA and other drug agencies "have long demonstrated their zeal to crucify Mr. Armstrong. ... We have learned the hard way not to underestimate USADA's obsession with

Mr. Armstrong." In a previous letter, Luskin complained that USADA officials tagged along with federal criminal investigators to interview witnesses during a two-year probe that ended in February with no criminal charges against Armstrong.


Armstrong had hoped that case would end the doping questions that have dogged his career, but USADA said it would press its own investigation. The agency notified Armstrong on Tuesday that the new charges would be filed.

Armstrong could be stripped of the Tour titles he won from 1999 to 2005 and banned from cycling, though he retired from the sport last year.

USADA says that blood samples from 2009 and 2010 are consistent with performance-enhancing drug use and that more than 10 former Armstrong teammates and support

personnel will testify they saw him use drugs or talk about using them.

USADA has said it will not release the names of witnesses at this stage to protect them against possible attempts at intimida-






