Nachtigall gives update on Habitat

At yesterday's Pampa Chamber of Commerce luncheon, Paul Nachtigall of Gray County's chapter of Habitat for Humanity discussed the history of the young organization.

Habitat recently purchased a house - the local chapter's first - on Street, Charles which will become the future home of Janna Sims and her children. The Sims family's house was destroyed in a fire in 2010.

"After learning that Habitat not only builds homes but also renovates homes, there was once again a glimmer of hope, and we as a board determined that we should move in that direction," Nachtigall said.

"I want to make sure that nobody that's living in Pampa, Texas, that needs a home that Habitat can work with is going to be turned away," he added. "We're going to be able to supply them with a home. It may not be a brand new, scratch, built-from-theground-up house, but it will be a house that will put a roof over their head that is solid, and provides them cover and comfort."

The bulk of the work on Habitat homes is done by volunteers, with electric and plumbing done by licensed contractors, and the projects are funded by grants and donations of money, materials and time.

Habitat had a work day on its first home in early May.

"We were able to accomplish a great deal, but there's still a great deal to be done," said Nachtigall. "The work we need to accomplish cannot and will not be accomplished by a small group of people. It will require the effort of people all across Pampa, from all walks

When the house is ready to go, the Sims family will make monthly payments to Habitat, which will finance the home. Families who participate HABITAT cont. on page 5A





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Lawmakers pan first year of STAAR test

AUSTIN (AP) — Education leaders in the Texas House aired a series of grievances about the state's new standardized test on Tuesday, but also acknowledged that growing pains are common every time the state implements a new statewide testing system.

Lawmakers on the Public Education Committee were alarmed that so many of the first ninth graders to take the State of Texas Assessments of Academic Readiness, or STAAR, test this year performed poorly. They branded many aspects of the implementation of the new test sloppy.

They also wondered aloud if students who fail to pass STAAR tests early in high school would have enough time to catch up and pass subsequent tests before they get so far behind that they simply drop out.

Committee members heard testimony from superintendents who urged scrapping rules requiring that STAAR's results count toward 15 percent of the final grades of high school freshman. The committee also was told that that districts are setting aside extra money to pay for additional summer school instruction since so many students aren't passing the new tests during the regular school year.

STAAR is in the process of replacing a standardized test known as TAKS, which is used to measure academic accountability among students, teachers and school districts. It was designed to be more demanding — but final standards are being adopted gradually over the next four years to ensure the test is implemented smoothly.

Figures released June 8 by the Texas Education Agency show that if the final STAAR standards were already in place, more than half of Texas high school freshmen would have failed in

When ninth-graders' scores were judged against final standards, the biology passing rate was 41 percent and the algebra 1 passing rate was 39 percent. In English, it would have been 34 percent for writing and 46 percent for reading. In world geography, it would have been 40 percent.

By comparison, 70 percent of ninth grade students taking the last version of the TAKS math passed — though the TAKS test placed less emphasis on algebra.

Rep. Scott Hochberg, a Houston Democrat who is retiring from the Legislature, noted that STAAR has now been made so difficult that answering fewer than 40 percent of the questions correctly is passing. He asked: "With such a low percentage, should we look you square in the eye and say 'you've passed algebra 1'?"

The Texas Education Agency points out that there are always early hurdles when implementing new standardized tests, and that STAAR is the latest in a series of attempts to create a better statewide system for measuring accountability — a point the committee seemed willing to concede.

Further hampering STAAR, though, are requirements that the tests be given with several weeks remaining in the school year so that there is enough

time to determine the results. Doing so has prompted complaints from teachers that there's not adequate time to prepare students for exams that cover an entire year's worth of material.

Another controversial aspect of STAAR has been the rule that tests in key subjects count toward 15 percent of ninth graders' final grades. The provision was designed to ensure students take the test seriously — but sparked outcry from many who said it could hurt students' grade-point aver-

Texas suspended the rule for this school year, but the test is set to count toward final grades beginning in 2012-2013.

However, the superintendent of the Amarillo school district, Rod Schroder, prompted applause inside the hearing room Tuesday when he suggested doing away with the requirement altogether.

Hochberg quipped, "you're preaching to the choir" and the committee indeed appeared receptive to the idea — except Rep. Mark Strama. The Austin Democrat countered that STAAR results should count for 15 percent of students' final grades, and thus eliminate the need for teachers to spend time administering a separate final exam.

"I know there are a lot of parents who think that the 15-percent rule is raising the stakes of testing and I think that that's a misapprehension," he said. "What it does is it makes this test replace a day of testing, not a day of instruction."

"Pokey the Clown" and his sponsors

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McALLEN (AP) — Hours after a man fatally shot one of his girlfriend's sons and critically injured another in a South Texas hotel room as police tried to check on the family, police found what they believe to be the body of children's mother, authorities said.

Laredo Police spokesman Joe Baeza said officers arrested 36-year-old Demond Bluntson at the Holiday Inn-Civic Center in Laredo and were holding him pending formal charges. Baeza said police were consulting prosecutors about the charges Tuesday evening.

Police went to the hotel about midday after receiving a call from police in the family's hometown of El Campo, a city more than 200 miles northeast of Laredo, saying the family might be in some kind of trouble, Baeza said.

The desk clerk directed officers to a room on the 14th floor, where they knocked, identified themselves as police and immediately heard several shots, Baeza said. One shot came through the room door and narrowly missed two officers, he said.

Police cleared the building, which was packed with a convention, then entered the room and arrested Bluntson. Police determined the boys' mother, Brandy Cerny, had not checked into the hotel.

Ex-deputies charged in drug run

McALLEN (AP) — Two former South Texas sheriff's deputies have been indicted on federal conspiracy charges arising from an undercover federal bust of a drug trafficking operation.

A Justice Department statement Tuesday says Ruben Silva and Victor Carrillo were Duval County deputies at the time of last month's undercover bust. Sheriff Romeo Ramirez fired them earlier this month, saying federal and state agents presented him with evidence of

The indictment alleges Silva and Carrillo arranged to use a sheriff's office patrol car to smuggle more than 20 pounds of cocaine north from Mission, Texas, on the border with Mexico.

Silva is jailed with bond set at \$100,000. His attorney, Douglas Daniel of San Antonio, didn't return a message seeking comment Tuesday. A warrant has been issued for Carrillo's arrest.

Ninth defendant arrested

EL PASO (AP) — The U.S. attorney's office says a ninth suspect has been arrested after he was accused of being part of an alleged scheme to launder a drug gang's earnings with millions of dollars' worth of racehorses.

Raul Ramirez was arrested Monday afternoon at a border port of entry near El Paso. He's due to appear in court Friday in El Paso.

Ramirez is charged with money laundering, as are brothers Miguel Angel and Oscar Omar Trevino, reputed to be top leaders of Mexico's infamous Zetas drug cartel. Also charged are the Trevinos' brother Jose and 10 others. Five are believed to be at large in Mexico.

Ramirez is accused of helping disguise ownership of the horses by bidding on behalf of Antonio Colorado, who then transferred ownership to Trevino.

SBC votes in black president

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — The Southern Baptist Convention voted Tuesday to elect its first African-American president in one of its biggest steps yet to reconcile the 167-year-old denomination's troubled racial past and appeal to a more diverse group of believers.

The Rev. Fred Luter Jr. was unopposed in being elected by thousands of enthusiastic delegates on Tuesday at the annual meeting of the nation's largest Protestant denomination in his hometown of New Orleans.

Pastor David Crosby of First Baptist New Orleans nominated Luter, calling him a "fire-breathing, miracleworking pastor" who "would likely be a candidate for sainthood if he were Catholic."

Crosby recalled how Luter built the Franklin Avenue Baptist Church from a tiny congregation to a megachurch of nearly 8,000 before the buildings were destroyed by

Hurricane Katrina in 2005. Members of Luter's mostly black church came to worship at Crosby's mostly white church, and the pastors worked together for 21/2 years as Luter rebuilt Franklin Avenue. Today, with a Sunday attendance of 5,000, Luter's church is once again the largest Southern Baptist church for attendance in the state.

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Texas truck driver arrested with ammunition at the Mexican border was trying to make an unauthorized U-turn when a Mexican customs agent ordered him to enter an inspection area, the agent told a judge in Ciudad Juarez, Mexico.

Javin Bogan was arrested April 17 when he tried to enter Mexico carrying 268,000 rounds of ammunition. He that he took a wrong turn on his way to a West El Paso medical supplies company. Mexican prosecutors allege he tried to clandestinely smuggle bullets commonly used by drug cartels.

Truckers entering Mexico from El Paso at the Bridge of the Americas are supposed to use a specially designated lane that leads to an inspection area. Bogan was in the lanes for passenger cars, according to Mexican customs agent America Zubia Saenz.

"I saw a vehicle blocking the lanes for the tourist vehicles, an area not authorized for cargo vehicles," Saenz said in a May 29 deposition before a judge in Ciudad Juarez, Chihuahua.

She ordered Bogan to drive his truck into the 'yellow zone" where trucks are inspected. He produced documents for the truck and the cargo at her request, she said.

Two other customs agents, Federico Anaya and Adriana Ramirez, told the judge the bullets were loaded in boxes on several pallets inside the trailer. They said that while the bullets were wrapped in plastic, they were easy to spot once inside the trailer.

After Bogan's arrest, Mexican prosecutors initially said in a news release that the ammunition was stashed under the floorboards of the trailer.

Jose De La Rosa, Bogan's lawyer Mexico, said that by showing the bullets were not hidden and that his client had all the correspond-

term of five to 30 years. Instead, De La Rosa said, he would settle for a charge of possession of ammunition. That carries a possible prison sentence of two to six years but could easily be converted into a fine because Bogan has no prison record, De


Bogan remains in a maximum security prison in the state of Veracruz, some 200 miles east of Mexico City.

De La Rosa said he wants Bogan transferred to Ciudad Jaurez, where all of the judicial proceedings in his case will be carried out.

Mexican political leaders have blamed their U.S. counterparts for not doing enough to stem the flow of

weapons and ammunition used by warring drug cartels. In February, Mexico's president Felipe Calderon travelled to Ciudad Juarez and unveiled a billboard made out of destroyed guns that read "No More Weapons." The billboard is at the Bridge of the Americas and is intended to be seen from the U.S.





Today is Wednesday, June 20, the 172nd day of 2012. There are 194 days left in the year. Summer arrives at 7 p.m. Eastern time.

Today's Highlight in History:

On June 20, 1782, Congress approved the Great Seal of the United States, featuring the emblem of the bald eagle.

On this date:

In 1791, King Louis XVI of France and his family attempted to flee the country in the socalled "Flight to Varennes," but were caught.

In 1837, Queen Victoria acceded to the British throne following the death of her uncle, King William IV.

In 1863, West Virginia became the 35th state.

In 1893, a jury in New Bedford, Mass., found Lizzie Borden not guilty of the ax murders of her father and stepmother.

In 1921, U.S. Rep. Alice Mary Robertson, R-Okla., became the first woman to preside over a session of the House of Representatives.

In 1947, Benjamin "Bugsy" Siegel was shot dead at the Beverly Hills, Calif., mansion of his girlfriend, Virginia Hill, apparently at the order of mob associates.

In 1948, the variety series "Toast of the Town," hosted by Ed Sullivan, debuted on CBS television.

In 1963, the United States and Soviet Union signed an agreement to set up a "hotline" between the two superpowers.

In 1967, boxer Muhammad Ali was convicted in Houston of violating Selective Service laws by refusing to be drafted. (Ali's conviction was ultimately overturned by the Supreme Court).

In 1972, three days after the arrest of the Watergate burglars, President Richard Nixon met at the White House with his chief of staff, H.R. Haldeman; the secretly made tape recording of this meeting ended up with the notorious 18½-minute gap.

In 1979, ABC News correspondent Bill Stewart was shot to death in Managua, Nicaragua, by a member of President Anastasio Somoza's national guard.

In 1982, President Ronald Reagan proclaimed National Bald Eagle Day.

Ten years ago: The U.S. Supreme Court ruled, 6-3, in Atkins v. Virginia that executing mentally disabled murderers was unconstitutionally cruel.

Five years ago: For the second time, President George W. Bush vetoed an embryonic stem cell bill as he urged scientists toward what he termed "ethically responsible" research. Sammy Sosa, playing for the Texas Rangers after a year out of baseball, hit his 600th home run, making him the fifth player to reach the milestone. (The round-tripper came in the fifth inning of Texas' 7-3 victory over Sosa's former team, the Chicago Cubs.)

One year ago: Syrian President Bashar Assad promised a national dialogue to consider political reforms, but his vague overtures to a prodemocracy uprising fell flat as protesters took to the streets shouting "Liar!" and demanding his ouster. "Jackass" star Ryan Dunn was killed in a fiery car crash near Philadelphia; he was

GOP won't say Obama plan is amnesty

WASHINGTON (AP) — When it comes to President Barack Obama's new immigration policy, Senate Republicans are quite sure they don't like it. They just don't want to say if it amounts to amnesty, at least not yet, while they await guidance on the politically charged issue from presidential candidate Mitt Romney.

"If it leads to citizenship as a reward for some kind of illegal entry, I think it could be argued" to be amnesty, said Senate Republican leader Mitch McConnell, who normally is one of Obama's most plainspoken critics.

Sen. Saxby Chambliss of Georgia said the president's announcement last Friday could be called "amnesty light," if not the real thing.

"It all depends on how you define 'amnesty,' and I'm not going to get into that debate," added Arizona Sen. Jon Kyl, second-ranking party leader and another frequent critic of Obama.

"I wouldn't use the A-word to describe this. ... That's a word that gets used a lot," said Sen. John Cornyn. The Texas lawmaker is in charge of the party's efforts to win control of the Senate this fall and has seen internal divisions develop since Obama's announcement between his party's establishment and lawmakers and candidates more aligned with the tea party.

These days, at least, amnesty is most often used by Republicans wanting to accuse Democrats of being soft on illegal immigration, much of which involves Hispanics who make their way across the border from Mexico.

In his announcement, Obama said the government will no longer seek to deport illegal immigrants under the age of 30 who were brought to the United States before they turned 16 and have been in the country for at least five continuous years. They also must have no criminal history and either have graduated from a U.S. high school, have earned a GED diploma or certificate or have

served in the military.

amnesty, this is not immunity, this is not a path to citizenship, this is not a permanent fix," Obama said from the White House Rose Garden. "This is the right thing to do." Administration officials said about 800,000 individuals could be affected.

While the White House and Democrats in Congress say the president's action was modeled on the DREAM Act, that measure includes a path to citizenship, a critical political distinction.

Romney, who has vowed to veto the DREAM Act, has recently softened his rhetoric on immigration as he works to cut into Obama's support among Hispanic voters. So far, he has not said whether he supports or opposes what the president did.

McConnell and others said they want to hear what the former Massachusetts governor is going to say on the subject in a speech later this week. Romney is "the leader of our party" at least until the November election and perhaps well afterwards, McConnell

While they sidestepped the question of amnesty, McConnell and several other Republicans sent Obama a letter seeking an explanation of his authority to bypass Congress on the policy switch. The request, announced by Sen/Charles Grassley, R-Iowa, also asked precisely how the new policy would work, and whether federal funds will be used to implement it.

Whatever Romney Republicans aligned with the tea party are more outspoken than the party's establishment on the

"This is amnesty," Sen. Jim DeMint of South Carolina, a favorite of tea party Republicans, said last week in a quick reaction to Obama's announcement.

"Congressman (Jeff) Flake and President Obama, advocates for amnesty," Wil Cardon alleged in one emailed statement, issued as part of his uphill battle for the GOP nomination to the Senate in

Andrew Wilder, a campaign

spokesman for Flake, said the "Let's be clear, this is not congressman "does not support giving amnesty to illegal immigrants, and he never has."

Rep. Steve King, R-Iowa, one of the party's more outspoken lawmakers in the immigration issue, has announced he intends to file suit challenging Obama's authority to bypass Congress and change the policy on his own.

Also in the House, Rep. Ben Quayle, R-Ariz., has introduced legislation to block Obama from implementing his own policy. In some regards, his state serves as a microcosm of the broader debate inside the party.

In addition to Kyl's comments, Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz., told reporters during the day he neither wanted to "repeal it or not repeal" what Obama announced.

Like many other Republicans, McCain said Obama was now doing "something that he said he didn't have constitutional authority to do a year ago." Also like other members of his party, he said the president's announcement had complicated efforts to work out a comprehensive solution to a vexing problem.

House Speaker John Boehner told reporters that because the economy is so weak, Obama has "turned to the politics of envy and division, which I don't think the American people are going to accept."

Boehner said Obama's announcement "puts everyone in a difficult position," including young illegal immigrants who 'from no fault of their own" are in the United States, as well as lawmakers seeking legislation to tackle more than just the problem of younger illegal immigrants brought to the United States as children.

Democrats have applauded Obama's announcement, many of them adding that he acted after Republicans refused to permit a more wide-ranging immigration measure advance in Congress.

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
Ice was a luxury in Victorian era

Q: Enclosed is a photo of a silver tankard that has been in our family for somewhere around 100 years. On the bottom are the words, "Barbour Silver Co. — Quadruple -50."

What can you tell me about the history and value of my tankard?

A: You have a Victorian tilting ice pitcher with a matching goblet and stand. It was made around 1880 by Barbour Silver Co. in Connecticut. "Quadruple" means your pitcher is silver plate rather than sterling silver. Available ice was a luxury in the Victorian era. Silver plate ice pitchers were a symbol of wealth and status. They are lined with metal, glass or porcelain to help keep ice from melting quickly. Few tilting ice pitchers have survived with their stands and goblets intact.

Similar pitchers that are in excellent condition and not in need of re-silvering are selling in the range of \$300 to \$600.

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
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
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Living a faithful life for eternity

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



Texas dad won't face charges in alleged attacker's death

SHINER (AP) — Hearing his 5-year-old daughter crying from behind a barn, a father ran and discovered the unthinkable: A man molesting her. The father pulled the man off his daughter, authorities say, and started pummeling him to death with his fists.

With his daughter finally safe, the father frantically called 911, begging a dispatcher to find his rural ranch and send an ambulance.

"Come on! This guy is going to die on me!" the man is heard screaming on the 911 call. "I don't know what to do!" A recording of the tape was played during a news conference Tuesday where the Lavaca County district attorney and

sheriff announced that the father would not face charges. In declining to indict the 23-year-old father in the June 9 killing of Jesus Mora Flores, a Lavaca County grand jury reached the same conclusion as investigators and many of the father's neighbors: He was authorized to use deadly force to protect his daughter.

"It's sad a man had to die," said Michael James Veit, 48, who lives across the street from where the attack happened in this small community run on ranching and the Shiner beer brewery. "But I think anybody would have done that."

The family ranch is so remote that on the 911 tape, the father is heard profanely screaming at a dispatcher who couldn't locate the property. At one point, he tells the dispatcher he's going to put the man in his truck and drive him to a hospital.

"He's going to die!" the father screams, swearing at the dispatcher. "He's going to f---- die!"

The tense, nearly five-minute call begins with the father saying he "beat up" a man found raping his daughter. The father grows increasingly frazzled, shouting into the phone so loudly at times that the call often becomes inaudible.

The Associated Press is not identifying the father in order to protect the daughter's identity. The AP generally does not identify victims of sexual assault.

"He's a peaceable soul," V'Anne Huser, the father's attorney, told reporters at the Lavaca County Courthouse. "He had no intention to kill anybody that day."

The attack happened on the family's ranch off a quiet,

two-lane county road between the farming towns of Shiner and Yoakum. A statement released by the district attorney said a witness who saw Flores "forcibly carrying" the girl into a secluded area scrambled to find the father. Running toward his daughter's screams, the father pulled Flores off his child and "inflicted several blows to the man's head and neck area," investigators said.

Emergency crews responding to the father's 911 call found Flores' pants and underwear pulled down on his lifeless body. The girl was examined at a hospital, and Lavaca County District Attorney Heather McMinn said forensic evidence and witness accounts corroborated the father's story that his daughter was being sexually molested.








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PHS grad Gage helps develop campers tennis skills

Social media to play big role in upcoming 2012 Olympics

LONDON (AP) — Tweet this: The London Games will be the first Olympics told in 140 characters or less.

The London Games will be the most tweeted, liked and tagged in history, with fans offered a never before seen insider's view of what many are calling the social media Olympics, or the "socialympics."

Hash tags, (at) signs and "like" symbols will be as prevalent as national flags, Olympic pins and medal ceremonies. Some athletes may spend more time on Twitter and Facebook than the playing field.

Mobile phones have become smarter, laptops lighter and tablet devices a musthave for technology lovers - meaning social-savvy fans, whether watching on television or inside the Olympic stadium itself, will be almost constantly online.

Organizers expect more tweets, Facebook videos and photos to be shared from London than any other sports event in history. The 2010 Winter Games in Vancouver offered just a small glimpse of

"Vancouver was just the first snowflake," said Alex Hout, the International Olympic Committee's head of social media. "This is

going to be a big snowball. Twitter is already braced for a surge of traffic. Launched in 2006, it has become a key outlet for sports fans to trade messages

during live events. Users sent 13,684 tweets per second during a Champions League soccer match between Barcelona and Chelsea in April, a record volume of tweets for a sporting event — busier even than the 2012 Super Bowl. Chances are good that will be one of the records broken in London.

"It could be the 100-meter final or something unexpected," said Lewis Wiltshire, Twitter U.K.'s head of sport.

At the last Summer Olympics in Beijing in 2008, Twitter had about 6 million users and Facebook 100 million. Today, the figure is 140 million for Twitter and 900 million for Facebook

"In Sydney (2000) there was hardly any fast Internet, in Athens (2004) there were hardly any smartphones, in Beijing hardly anyone had social networks," said Jackie-Brock Doyle, communications director of London organizing committee LOCOG. That's all changed. Here, everyone has all that and will be consuming the games in a different way."

Later this month, at trials in Calgary for Canada's Olympic track and field team, athletes will even wear Twitter handles on their bibs — encouraging fans to send mes-

sages of support as they race. Sponsors have also taken their Olympic campaigns online. Coca-Cola, Cadbury, Visa and BP are among those using Facebook to reach younger consumers. Samsung is even offering to paint the faces of Internet users with their national flag virtually, of course.


