





Barbecue cookoff to introduce Pampa Fuels, LLC

Company signed yearlong lease option for block at Pampa Energy Center

Aside from the sweltering heat, a Pampa summer is not complete without barbecue and the rodeo. At a Pampa Economic Development Corporation (PEDC) meeting yesterday afternoon, the PEDC and Open Range Engineering discussed festivities, including a barbecue cook-off, to take place during the last day of the rodeo on Saturday, August 11. The event will be sponsored by Pampa Fuels, LLC, which recently signed a lease option with the Pampa Energy Center (PEC), the PEDC's industrial park that currently houses operations for Enbridge Energy and Flogistix.

The event will take place from 2 to 6:30 p.m. at the Las Pampas Square parking lot, with booths for vendors and organizations, as well as free barbecue. There will be no fees for booths

or to enter the barbecue cook-off.

The PEDC will have a booth to display schematics of Las Pampas Square following construction, and the Pampa High School student council, cheerleaders, local churches and vendors will also have a presence.

"I'm going to try to have lots of games for kids, so it's a big family event," said Stephanie Nelson of Open Range, a coordinator of the event. "We just really want everyone in the community involved."

The event will be just one part of a day of activity, with the rodeo parade at 10:30 a.m., an event from the Downtown Business Association from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m., and the conclusion of this year's Top O' Texas Rodeo. Open Range, which manages the PEC site, hopes that the event will give the community a chance to learn more about Pampa Fuels, which in June signed a yearlong option to lease a block at the PEC. While Ron Nelson of Open Range was optimistic the deal would go through, he emphasized that it has not been finalized yet.

Annual water quality report to be distributed this week

City no longer using water from Lake Meredith

This week, Pampans will receive the city's annual water quality report, which goes over the results of water samples of municipal water.

With test results from 2011 for potential contaminants like arsenic or mercury, the report shows that the city is not in violation of any state or federal drinking water requirements.

In the past, Pampa used water from Lake Meredith year's drought, Hooper still hopes people will do

and the city's wellfield, but after the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority (CRMWA) decided not to distribute the lake's water to its member cities, including Pampa, the city now uses water from CRMWA's Roberts County wellfield and Pampa's wellfield.

"It'll all groundwater, which is better quality," said Donny

Hooper, Pampa's public works director.

"We're proud of the report, and want the public to be educated about our water system," he added.

"We're proud of the product we produce."

While this summer has not been as severe as last vear's drought. Hooper still hopes people will do

their best to conserve water.

"We've had more rainfall, but we encourage people to follow voluntary conservation, because we're still not pumping Lake Meredith water since there hasn't been enough rainfall to end the drought," said Hooper.

"I feel we've been able to meet demand, because people are being conservative with water and being careful to conserve every drop they can."

The city hopes to have four new wells online by next summer, and has already drilled two of them.

For now, Hooper says the city is watching daily to make sure water supply levels are recharged each night

"People's help to conserve water has helped to maintain the system," he said. "July and August are the most critical months for us."



Perry: Medicaid a failure

AUSTIN (AP) — Texas Gov. Rick Perry is calling Medicaid a failure as he defends his decision to oppose any expansion of the program as part of the national health-care overhaul.

Perry told Fox News Monday that adding uninsured Texans to Medicaid — as proposed by the overhaul recently upheld by the Supreme Court — "is not unlike adding a thousand people to the Titanic." He says Texas won't participate in the expansion or create a health care exchange required by the law.

He says every Texan is able "to have access to health care" and the state should get to decide how to pay for it. The state has more than 6.2 million uninsured people. Perry announced he would oppose an insurance

exchange and a Medicaid expansion in a letter Monday.

TxDOT: Future funding bleak

AUSTIN (AP) — A top official at the Texas Department of Transportation says the future of transportation funding in Texas is bleak because of aging highways, shrinking tax revenues and inflation.

James Bass testified before the House Appropriations and Transportation Committees, which is reviewing the problems they'll face when the Legislature meets again

Lawmakers fund Texas highways with a combination of federal money, fuel taxes, government bonds and contracts with private companies. But lawmakers have not raised fuel taxes since 1993 and more fuel efficient vehicles means revenues are not keeping up. Privatelyoperated toll roads have also become unpopular.

Bass discussed another options to improve highway funding by adjusting the fuel tax. He said under the current system, transportation funding will become a critical problem in 2015.

State mulls prison care changes

AUSTIN (AP) — Additional cuts to the health care system for Texas prison inmates could make it unconstitutional.

In testimony to the Senate Finance Committee Monday, doctors responsible for managing inmate care said they did not know how they could make further cuts.

Last month, Gov. Rick Perry asked state agencies to offer proposed budgets that cut present spending by 10 percent. Lawmakers already cut state spending by \$15 billion last year.

Experts also told senators that there is little the state can do to tap federal Medicaid funds to cover the costs been fatally shot by U.S. of caring for prisoners.

Mexico says Border Patrol shot national

MEXICO CITY (AP) A Mexican citizen has Border Patrol agents on the border with Texas in an incident that the Mexican government is calling a disproportionate use of force.

The Border Patrol said opened fire along the Rio Grande on the Texas-Mexico border after being pelted by rocks and having a gunman point a weapon in their direction from the Mexican side of the river. The agency said it did

The Mexican Foreign Ministry said late Sunday that a citizen had been killed by a gunshot fired by a U.S. agent at the Los Tomates-Veterans international bridge. It did not identify the victim or provide details about the incident. Mexico said its consulate in Brownsville had sent U.S. authorities a message demanding an exhaustive investigation without regard to the consequences.

"The Mexican government has said once again that the disproportionate use of force for purposes of immigration enforceunder any circumstances," the Foreign Ministry said.

Juana Maria Soto of Matamoros said her brother, 30-year-old Juan Pablo Perez Soto, was shot and killed by a Border Patrol agent Saturday morning. She said she had received little information, but she believes her brother was on the Mexican river bank cutting firewood and said she understood that the agent crossed to the Mexican side to shoot him.

Border Patrol spokesman Henry Mendiola said Monday that the incident remains under investigation and they have not confirmed that someone was shot, but he disputed any suggestion that agents crossed the border into Mexico.

"Our agents are not going to go into Mexico to neutralize something like this," Mendiola said.

He said Border Patrol agents came upon a group of people on the U.S. side SHOOTING cont. on page 8

Viewpoints

Today in History

Today is Tuesday, July 10, the 192nd day of 2012. There are 174 days left in the year.

Today's Highlights in History:

On July 10, 1962, AT&T's Telstar 1 communications satellite, capable of relaying television signals and telephone calls, was launched by NASA from Cape Canaveral. President John F. Kennedy signed the All-Channel Receiver Act, which required that new TV sets be capable of receiving UHF (ultra-high frequency) channels 14 through 83 in addition to VHF (very high frequency) channels 2 through 13.

On this date:

In 1509, theologian John Calvin, a key figure of the Protestant Reformation, was born in Noyon, Picardy, France.

In 1890, Wyoming became the 44th state.

In 1919, President Woodrow Wilson personally delivered the Treaty of Versailles to the Senate, and urged its ratification. (However, the Senate rejected it.)

In 1929, American paper currency was reduced in size as the government began issuing bills that were approximately 25 percent smaller.

In 1940, during World War II, the Battle of Britain began as Nazi forces began attacking southern England by air. (The Royal Air Force was ultimately victorious.)

In 1951, armistice talks aimed at ending the Korean War began at Kaesong.

In 1961, Mildred E. Gillars, also known as "Axis Sally," was paroled from a federal prison in West Virginia after serving 11 years for treason for her propaganda broadcasts from Nazi Germany during World War II.

In 1973, the Bahamas became fully independent after three centuries of British colonial rule.

In 1985, the Greenpeace protest ship Rainbow Warrior was sunk with explosives in Auckland, New Zealand by French intelligence agents; one activist was killed. Bowing to pressure from irate customers, the Coca-Cola Co. said it would resume selling old-formula Coke, while continuing to sell New Coke.

In 1991, Boris N. Yeltsin took the oath of office as the first elected president of the Russian republic. President George H.W. Bush lifted economic sanctions against South Africa.

In 1992, a New York jury found Pan Am guilty of willful misconduct and responsible for allowing a terrorist bomb to destroy Flight 103 in 1988, killing 270 people, opening the way for civil lawsuits.

Ten years ago: The House approved, 310-113, a measure to allow airline pilots to carry guns in the cockpit to defend their planes against terrorists (President George W. Bush later signed the measure into law). A unified Senate approved harsh new penalties for corporate fraud and document-shredding (however, the legislation was never enacted).

Five years ago: China executed the former head of its food and drug agency for approving untested medicine in exchange for cash. A judge in Los Angeles sentenced pizza deliveryman Chester Turner to death for murdering 10 women and a fetus during the 1980s and '90s. The American League defeated the National League 5-4 in the All-Star game. Pulitzer Prizewinning cartoonist Doug Marlette, 57, died in an auto accident near Holly Springs, Miss.

One year ago: The space shuttle Atlantis docked with the International Space Station, the final such hookup in orbit. An overloaded cruise vessel sank in Russia's Volga River, killing 122 people. Some 70 people were killed when a train derailed in northern India. Britain's best-selling Sunday tabloid the News of the World, brought down by a phone-hacking scandal, signed off with a simple front page message, "THANK YOU & GOODBYE." Acclaimed French choreographer Roland Petit, 87, died in Geneva.

One nation under government, not God

When Barack Obama promised to "fundamentally transform the United States" we could not have anticipated the extreme transformations he would seek. The evidence is rolling in that he is determined to transform America into a totally secular land where religion is permitted only within the walls of a church and is banned in every public place, public gathering and public school.

Obama tipped us off to his animosity toward religious Americans when, campaigning in San Francisco in 2008, he insulted religious people in small towns. He said, they "get bitter, they cling to guns or religion or antipathy to people who aren't like them or anti-immigrant sentiment or anti-trade sentiment as a way to explain their frustrations."

In April 2009, Obama delivered a speech at Georgetown University, only after his staff had pressured the Catholic college to conceal the monogram for the name of Jesus that was always displayed above the podium. In May 2009, he cancelled the traditional White House event honoring the National Day of Prayer, saying that he would pray only in private.

Obama began censoring religious words out of important American documents, such as the Declaration of Independence, from which he many times deleted the word "Creator." In a November 2010, speech, Obama pretended to quote the U.S. national motto, "In God We Trust," but he changed it to "e pluribus unum" (out of many, one).

When Obama gave the traditional Presidential Thanksgiving Day address in 2011, it's not clear whom he was thanking on this uniquely American holiday, but it was not God.

Barack Obama is trying to morph our traditional religious liberty to the lesser scope of freedom of worship. That means worship only inside a church, or maybe a synagogue, but not any public affirmation of belief in God.

In July 2011, Obama's Department

Affairs banned any mention of Jesus Christ during burials at Houston N a t i o n a l Cemetery. The ban was lifted only after hundreds of demonstrators protested.

Veterans

In September 2011, the U.S. Army revised guidelines for Walter Reed Hospital to read: "No religious items (i.e., Bibles, reading materials...) are allowed to be given away or used during a visit." The hospital rescinded this policy only after Congressman Steve King, R-Iowa, reported it to the House of Representatives.

In February 2012, the Air Force removed the Latin word for God, Dei, from the logo of the Rapid Capabilities Office, and it was also removed the Latin motto, which means "Doing God's Work With Other People's Money." The new logo says, "Doing Miracles with Other People's Money."

Also in February 2012, the U.S. Army warned Catholic chaplains not to read from an archbishop's letter opposing the Obama administration's mandate that all employers, including religious hospitals, schools and colleges, must pay for abortifacients drugs,

contraceptives and sterilizations for their employees. People were shocked by the military order telling chaplains what they cannot say to members of their own faith during a religious service.

A prime example of Obama's hostility to religion is the Supreme Court case of Hosanna-Tabor Evangelical Lutheran Church and School v. EEOC, in which the Obama administration challenged the longtime religious exemption that prevents politicians from controlling the hiring and firing of employees of religious institutions. The church had fired one of its minister/teachers,

and she sued to get her job back.

With the help of Obama's Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, EEOC, this case got up to the U.S. Supreme Court. Obama's lawyer made the astonishing argument that the federal government could force the Lutheran church to rehire her, but the Obama administration's case was so ludicrous that in January 2012 it lost 9 to 0.

Obama's first judicial appointment, David Hamilton, had worked for the Association of Community Organizations for Reform Now as a fundraiser, as vice president for litigation for Indiana's American Civil Liberties Union branch and was known for blocking pro-life and pro-decency laws. Even the left-leaning American Bar Association called him "not qualified."

Hamilton was most noteworthy as a district court judge for striking down a prayer in 2005 used in the Indiana Legislature that mentioned Jesus Christ and ordering the Indiana Legislature to "refrain from using Christ's name or title or any other denominational appeal." At the same time, Hamilton stated that it is permissible for the Legislature to use the word "Allah."

After that, President Obama promoted David Hamilton to the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Seventh Circuit.

Another ACLU-type judicial appointment made by President Obama was federal Judge Michael Urbanski. He suggested in court that the Ten Commandments be censored down to six commandments in order to make the posting of the commandments legal under the First Amendment.

Barack Obama has a record of hostility to religion that we have never before seen in any American president.

Texas House Speaker Straus calls for truth in budgeting

AUSTIN (AP) — Texas lawmakers should stop using an accounting practice that allows them to use balances in funds specially dedicated for other programs to balance the state's general revenue budget, Texas House Speaker Joe Straus said Monday.

The practice, known as funds consolidation, allows lawmakers to stockpile funds intended for programs such as improving hospital trauma care or helping poor people pay their utility bills and then using that money to balance the state budget. By law, the State Comptroller must certify that the budget is balanced every two years and lawmakers use a variety of accounting methods to achieve

Straus spoke as a House Appropriations Subcommittee met to work on making the budget more transparent and to study transportation spending.

Straus said the current budget was balanced on \$4.9 billion of dedicated funds. As a result lawmakers, did not appropriate those special funds for their dedicated uses.

'The state collects millions of dollars each year through surcharges to repeat traffic offenders and drunk drivers. That money is supposed to go for hospital trauma care, but much of it sits unspent so that is can be counted for budget certification," Straus told the committee. "We should make the budget more transparent by spending these fees toward their intended purposes or by not collecting them at all.'

Last year, lawmakers used spending cuts and a variety of accounting tricks to balance the state budget. They cut more than \$4 billion in public education spending, pushed \$2 billion in education spending into next year's budget and underfunded Medicaid, the health care program for the poor and disabled, by \$4.8 billion.

Straus acknowledged that lawmakers will face growing public school and Medicaid costs in another difficult budget when they meet again next year, but he urged the subcommittee to develop a plan for the Legislature to wean itself off the funds consolidation accounting trick.

"In the end, Texans will have a budget that is fairer, simpler and more straightforward," Straus said. "The goal ... is to be more honest with the taxpayers and fee-payers

Rep. John Otto, a Republican vice chairman of the

House Ways and Means Committee, said he expected the Legislature would need to reduce the 20-year-old practice over time.

"We didn't get here overnight and we're not going to fix it overnight," Otto said. "I would at least hope that the House and the Senate will put a cap on it until we can get where we want to be."

Democratic Sen. Kirk Watson of Austin welcomed Straus' call to end the practice.

"Budget honesty and transparency are among the most important issues facing Texas today," Watson said. "Ending the diversion of dedicated money has ranked among my highest priorities since I was elected to the Senate, and I have repeatedly filed bills and amendments to end this practice.'

In a second hearing later Monday, the subcommittee met with the Transportation Committee to address the shrinking budget for the state's highways and bridges. A large percentage of the transportation budget comes from fuel taxes, which have remained stagnant for the last 20

James Bass, chief financial officer at the Texas Department of Transportation, said that an aging transportation system, shrinking fuel tax revenues and inflation is hurting funding for the state's bridges and highways.

"We're in the era of uncertainty in 2015," Bass said. The fuels tax could be indexed to inflation or to vehicle fuel inefficiency to make sure highway funding would remain stable, he said. Another option could also tax vehicles on how many miles they travel rather than the amount of fuel they purchase.

Bill Hammond, president of the Texas Association Business, said the state's growing population and business community needs better infrastructure, and that means raising more revenue.

"We've come today to support raising the vehicle registration fee by \$50 a vehicle," Hammond said. "We need to make a much stronger investment in our infrastructure

Bass said that a committee asked to research the annual needs to the agency estimated Texas should be spending more than \$14 billion a year, while the Legislature only appropriates roughly \$10 billion for routine needs.

Opening statements set stage for voter ID trial

WASHINGTON (AP) - The state of Texas and the Justice Department gave opening statements Monday in a trial over Texas' new voter ID law, setting the stage for a legal battle over the federal Voting Rights Act.

At issue is a 2011 law passed by Texas' GOP- dominated Legislature that requires voters to show photo identification when they head to the polls. The state argued Monday that the law represents the will of the people and does not run afoul of the Voting Rights Act, passed in 1965 to ensure minorities' right

"Texas Democrats, like their national counterparts, have been wholly out of step with their constituents," said Adam Mortara, a lawyer representing Texas. "Voters want photo ID."

Mortara said the state's new statute is in line with similar laws that have cleared legal challenges

in Indiana and Georgia. He also said the Justice Department would not be able to prove that any voters — and particularly minority voters — would be hindered by the law.

"It's really quite difficult to find anyone who's registered to vote who doesn't already have a photo ID,"

Rep. Joe Pickett pointed out that much of the Department of Transportation's budget is from government bonds, which require the agency to pay interest on the debt. Lawmakers have authorized the agency to take on \$17.3 billion in debt, which will cost \$31.1 billion to repay.

Since the agency is reaching its debt limit, Picket asked at what point will the present bond funding for highway projects run out. Bass said most contracts will be awarded by the end of 2013 and there will be a major drop off in new projects after that.

near the Saturday morning. They detained some while others retreated toward the river and began throwing rocks. One agent who was not able to escape the rocks fired toward the group, Mendiola said. At the same time, another agent at the scene saw a person across the river in Mexico point a rifle toward them. That agent fired across the river, Mendiola said.

Soto said her 14-yearold son was one of those detained by Border Patrol. She has not been able to speak with him, but said the Mexican consulate told her he was unharmed.

Mendiola said several people had been taken into custody but that he could not provide details about the suspects or charges they face.

Border Patrol agents seizing 4,000 pounds of marijuana in March got into a shootout with drug smugglers. In that incident, it also was not known whether anyone on the Mexican side was hit.

Last summer, authorities said Border Patrol agents and rangers with



the Texas Department of Public Safety exchanged about 300 rounds of gunfire with suspected drug smugglers. Officials said the suspects threw rocks at U.S. lawmen in that incident, too.

In 2010, a Border Patrol agent in El Paso shot and killed a 15-year-old Mexican boy across the Rio Grande. Investigators say the agent fired after being attacked by people throwing rocks.
