New book will examine Woody Guthrie's faith

■ *"Bring Your Own God" reveals Guthrie had strong religious consciousness*

Written by Steve Edington, a Unitarian minister from Nashua, N.H., a book on Woody Guthrie's spirituality called "Bring Your Own God" will be released in a few weeks. During a recent trip to the Woody Guthrie center in Pampa, where the folk music icon spent his early adulthood, the

author said Guthrie thought of God as "the ultimate oneness of everything."
 "I always knew he had a strong religious consciousness," said Edington. "What surprised me was how strong and pronounced it actually was. I really wasn't aware of how deeply infused the religious and spiritual part of his life was."
 While researching for the book, Edington read through songs, letters and journals

of the musician in the Woody Guthrie Archives in New York.
 "Probably the most moving or heartbreaking thing I came across in working on the book was all the letters that he sent to people after his and Marjorie's daughter, Cathy, died in an apartment fire in Brooklyn," said Edington. "She was about four years old. He wrote responses to all of the letters of condolences that came in. I couldn't believe it. I spent a whole day just looking at one letter after another. ... There would be, sometimes, these two page, typewritten, single-spaced letters that he wrote to all the people who had responded to them."
 In one of the letters, Guthrie wrote, "No

matter what your faith may be, ... I want to tell you, you can get your helpful and instructive thoughts, ideas, visions and hopes from (it)."
 Edington describes Guthrie as a "universalist."
 "He was grounded in Christianity," Edington said. "The person or figure of Jesus was very central to him, but as you can see from this, he had sort of gotten to the point where he decided there are certain truths to be found (in world religions). But his focus still largely stayed Christian."
 Edington added that Guthrie's faith in

FDA approves new home test for HIV that yields quick results

■ *New test will be available in pharmacies, grocery stores and online by October*

Under consideration since 2005, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has approved the first home test for HIV that can yield results within 20 to 40 minutes. Developed by OraSure Technologies, the OraQuick test will be available through 30,000 pharmacies, grocery stores and online vendors by October, according to the company.
 Through a mouth swab, the test uses a person's saliva to detect for HIV, or the human immunodeficiency virus, which causes AIDS (acquired immunodeficiency syndrome). Compared with a previous home test, which involved mailing a blood test to a lab for further testing, OraQuick gives results much more quickly.

Health professionals like Dr. Adrian Pay, a physician who practices internal medicine through Pampa Regional Medical Center (PRMC) and his private practice, believe the test will revolutionize how people approach a disease that has become more normalized over the years.
 "The disease and diagnosis itself is a very personal problem," he said. "For some people, it can be more than just embarrassing, so obviously, ... whenever you enhance the privacy of such a test, especially in the privacy of your own home, that will certainly make the diagnosis better, quicker and also get people to the doctor or to the right treatment a lot sooner."
 Since HIV was first discovered in the 80s, with an awareness of the virus and improved treatments, including antiretro-



viral drugs, the way the public and medical field thinks about the virus, as well as AIDS, has changed.
 "As far as doctors, the way we view it, it is more like a chronic illness like diabetes, rheumatoid arthritis, high blood pressure or emphysema, meaning it is a chronic disease that has symptoms, but it also has treatment," said Pay. "You can use the treatment to treat the symptoms, and also the underlying disease from the virus, and make people live longer, healthy lives."
 "Some people can still work and still function well with the treatments that are available for HIV, and there is a lot of research that shows that HIV patients do better when they get on treatment, and usually when they're with an HIV specialist. These people are able to live functional, fruitful lives, and still contrib-

ute to society."
 People infected with HIV who take antiretroviral drugs are less likely to transmit the virus to another person.
 "The virus, when you first get infected, it really starts building up in the bloodstream, and it can turn a person potentially into a transmitter of the virus," said Pay. "The treatments are intended to bring down the viral copies, or genetic material of the virus, in the bloodstream, and when you can bring those levels down as soon as and as much as possible, you do decrease the infectivity of that person who's infected."
 Pay noted that, while HIV can't be transmitted through saliva, that fluid does contain particles of the virus, making the OraQuick test a possibility. However, because home tests can be confusing, he recommends people confirm positive test results through additional testing.
 "The key to remember is that any test has some error in it," Pay said. "Even though this test is pretty accurate, almost

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Coast Guard ends boater search

HOUSTON (AP) — The Coast Guard has called off its search for a boater who went missing after two boats collided near Baytown in Southeast Texas.

Coast Guard Petty Officer Andrew Kendrick said Sunday officials don't believe the boater is alive.

Kendrick says a Baytown Police dive team and Texas Parks and Wildlife boats remain on the scene in an effort to try and find the boater's body.

The man went missing Saturday after a 17-foot motor boat collided with a jon boat, sending two men aboard the jon boat into a waterway near a park in Baytown, located east of Houston.

Kendrick says a Coast Guard boat searched overnight while a helicopter searched until it got dark Saturday and then resumed looking on Sunday. Coast Guard crews spent about 17 hours searching.

Austin deck collapses, injures 10

AUSTIN (AP) — Officials say 10 people were injured after a deck in an Austin home collapsed during a party. Most of the people suffered minor injuries.

The deck collapsed during a Saturday evening party, sending 20 or so people 18 feet down to a canyon hillside below. After falling into a ravine, the individuals slid another 20 feet.

Austin Fire Department spokesman Palmer Buck told the Austin American-Statesman that four people were sent to hospitals for broken bones and other non-life threatening injuries. Six others were treated for minor injuries.

The deck surrounded an above-ground pool and was attached to the back of a house overlooking a ravine in a steeply hilled area in northwest Austin.

Buck says city building inspectors are investigating the cause of the collapse.

Prosecutors probing Texas DPS

AUSTIN (AP) — Prosecutors in Travis County say they are pursuing two separate criminal investigations into contracting irregularities at the Texas Department of Public Safety.

The Austin American-Statesman reports the probes follow the departure of two high-level DPS employees in the past 18 months: Janice Bruno, director of the State Administrative Agency, which handled more than \$1 billion in federal Homeland Security grants between 2006 and 2011, and Mark Doggett, the chief information technology officer for DPS.

Gregg Cox, chief of the Travis County District Attorney's public integrity unit, told the newspaper his office is looking at events involving Bruno and Doggett.

DPS fired Bruno in June 2011 for violating procurement rules. Doggett was suspended earlier this year by DPS over allegations of misconduct. He resigned in April.

close to 99 percent, there is still that slight chance that it could be inaccurate. The recommendation still by many medical health groups out there with this test is if you get a positive test on this home test, go get it confirmed at your doctor's office or at a clinic that is trained in this, because you do not want to make a lot of medical decisions, or maybe even go through medical treatment, if the test is a false positive."

Pay said HIV testing, and testing for other sexually transmitted infections (STIs) is available through the women's clinic and ER at PRMC, the Genesis Clinic, the Family Medicine Center and through private practices, including Pay's office.

"This test can have its

limitations, and that's why there's that rule of if there are any questions or concerns about this test, please go get help or further advice and counseling for medically trained professionals, so that one does not make a rash decision on a test like this at home," he said.

Pay recommends additional STI testing for patients who test positively for HIV.

"A common myth is that HIV infection comes along by itself, but actually, HIV infection can come along with other sexually transmitted diseases or infections," he said. "One of them that people forget about is hepatitis C. Chronic hepatitis C virus is a very potentially serious virus that is very commonly transmitted along

with HIV, so again, it is one thing where if a person is worried about being infected with the HIV virus, they should maybe look at other potential infections."

Pay also noted another myth, which is the idea that HIV is a death sentence.

"That is not as true these days as when maybe the disease first broke out, because we do have all kinds of good treatment, and doctors and centers that know how to take care of it," he said. "We can get people to live longer, and live fruitful lives with the disease."

"It still is a very serious disease and a very serious infection, but it is treatable. HIV patients can have hope."

God wasn't tied to a specific doctrine or ideology.

"He just believed, pretty much what the title says, that we are all part of some reality that's bigger than ourselves," he said. "You can call it God, you can call it a life force or spirit of life. He believed that, but he decided that out of all the religious faiths, and maybe even some philosophies, each offered a different route to what he called 'the oneness of all things.'"

As Guthrie coped with Huntington's disease towards the end of his life, his writings remained focused on the topic of spirituality, faith and religion.

"When he said 'All my songs flow out of Christ,' that was one of the things he wrote during that time in those journals," said Edington. "As you can imagine with anyone in that kind of situation, his faith kind of waxed and waned. I would find times where he would write very affirmatively how God was going to help him get through it, and in other places, he would slip into despair. He goes back and forth, but it primarily, overwhelmingly indicated his faith."

"I think it was his faith that nurtured and sustained him throughout that time," he added.

On July 16, 1862, Flag Officer David G. Farragut became the first rear admiral in the United States Navy.

Salad days of public sector are over

San Bernardino, Calif., has now followed Stockton into bankruptcy.

Harrisburg and Scranton, Pa., and Jefferson County, Ala., home to Birmingham, are already there to welcome them.

Detroit has been taken into receivership by Michigan. A plan under discussion is to level a fourth of the city and reconvert it into the pasture and farmland it used to be a century ago.

On the Web, one may find a pictorial tale of two cities: Hiroshima, a smoking flattened ruin in 1945, now a beautiful gleaming metropolis. And Detroit, forge and furnace of democracy in 1945, today resembling Dresden after Bomber Command paid its visit.

Other American cities are exploring bankruptcy to escape from under the mountain of debt they have amassed or to get out of contracts that an earlier generation of politicians negotiated.

No longer shameful, bankruptcy is now seen as an option for U.S. cities. The crisis of the public sector has come to River City.

What happened to us?

In the Reagan-Clinton prosperity, officials earned popularity by making commitments that could be met only if the good times lasted forever. They added new beneficiaries to old programs and launched new ones. They hired more bureaucrats, aides, teachers, firemen, cops.

Government's share of the labor force soared to 22.5 million. This is almost three times the number in the public sector when JFK took the oath of office. These employees were guaranteed job security and high salaries, given subsidized health care, and promised early retirement and pensions that the private sector could not match.

The balance between the private and public sectors shifted. As a share of the U.S. population, the number of taxpayers fell, as tax consumers -- the beneficiaries of government programs and government employ-

ees who run those programs -- rose. The top 1 percent now pays 40 percent of the income tax. The top 10 percent pays 70 percent. The bottom half, scores of millions of workers, pay nothing. They ride free.

This could not go on forever. And when something cannot go on forever it will, by Stein's Law, stop. The Great Recession brought it to a stop. We have come to the end of the line.

U.S. cities depend on property and sales taxes. But property tax revenue has fallen with the collapse of the housing market. Sales tax revenue has fallen as a result of the recession that has kept the consumers out of the malls.

Revenues down, cities and counties face a choice. Raise taxes, or cut payrolls and services. But if taxes rise or workers are laid off and services decline, Americans in our mobile society move across city and state lines, as they are moving from California to Colorado, Nevada and Arizona.

This does not end the crisis, it exacerbates it.

Bankruptcy not only offers cities relief from paying interest to bondholders, it enables mayors to break contracts with public service unions. Since the recession began, 650,000 government workers, almost all city, county or state employees, have lost their jobs. Millions have seen pay and benefits cut.

The salad days of the public sector are over. From San Joaquin Valley to Spain, its numbers have begun to shrink and its benefits to be cut.

A declaration of bankruptcy by a few cities, however, has an impact upon all -- for it usually involves a default on debts. This terrifies investors, who then demand a higher rate

of interest for the increased risk they take when they buy the new municipal bonds that fund the educational and infrastructure projects of the solvent cities.

Cities and counties have no way out of the vicious cycle. Rising deficits and debts force new tax hikes and new cuts in schools, cops and firemen. Residents see the town going down, and pack and leave.

This further reduces the tax base and further enlarges the deficit.

Then the process begins anew. This is what is happening in Spain and Greece, which have reached the early 1930s stage of rioting and the rise of radical parties.

Since the New Deal, Keynesianism has been our answer to recession. As the private sector shrinks, the public sector expands to fill the void until the private sector returns to health. Only Keynesianism is not working.

Obama gave us an \$800 billion stimulus and four deficits totaling \$5 trillion. The Fed tripled the money supply and put interest rates at near zero. The banks are flush with cash. But the engine will not turn over.

What about supply-side tax cuts? But with the Bush tax cuts still in place, taxes are generating the smallest share of gross domestic product in decades.

How much bigger a deficit should we run?

Liberal economists are saying, deficits be damned, print money and spend. With Republicans blocking tax hikes and Democrats resisting cuts in Medicare, Medicaid and Social Security, all eyes turn to the Fed.

As Milton Friedman said, "Inflation is the one form of taxation that can be imposed without legislation."

Suspending your benefits before they even start

Q. I am about to turn 66 years old. I was planning to wait until age 70 to file for my Social Security benefits because I wanted to get the delayed retirement bonus you mention so often in your column. But I found an article on the web that encourages people like me to file at age 66 and then immediately suspend my benefits. That way, if I change my mind before age 70, I can go back and get retroactive benefits until age 66. What do you know about this?

A. What I know is that you still can teach an old dog new tricks. I read the online article you referenced at MSN Money's website. It provided a Social Security benefit tip that I had never thought of. I initially felt badly about this because I was sure that after 40 years in the Social Security business, there was little, if anything, I didn't know about the program. But my guilt feelings were assuaged a bit when I contacted a colleague who still works for the agency — one of the brightest Social Security scholars I know — and he wasn't aware of this practice either! In fact, the Social Security Administration has just issued a memorandum to all its field offices making them aware of this little-known procedure.

Let me clarify that. The procedure isn't new or unknown. It's called "file and suspend." I've discussed this many times in past columns. You file for your Social Security

benefits at age 66, and then immediately suspend those benefits. But the online article points out a clever new reason to implement this tactic.

Many of my readers may legitimately wonder why in the world a person would want to file for Social Security benefits (at age 66 or later) and then immediately suspend those benefits.

In past columns, I've cited one big reason for doing so — and that is so your spouse may claim Social Security benefits on your record while you delay benefits until age 70. Here is an example.

Sid is 66 and still working. His projected Social Security benefit is \$2,200 per month. His wife, Nancy, is 62. She was a stay-at-home mom who never worked and paid Social Security taxes. Sid does not want to take Social Security now because he plans to wait until age 70 to have the delayed retirement credits (a 32 percent bonus for holding off on retirement collections until 70) added to his Social Security payment. However, the rules say Nancy cannot collect spousal benefits from Sid's record until he has signed up for Social Security himself.

But the "file and suspend" rule allows Sid to apply for Social Security retirement at age 66. Then Nancy would file for wife's benefits on Sid's record. At age 62, she'd be due a reduced rate of about 30 percent of Sid's benefit — or \$660 per month.

Next, Sid asks SSA to suspend his benefits. They would be stopped.

But Nancy's would continue. At age 70, Sid would request SSA to "unsuspend" his own Social Security benefits. At that point, he would begin to collect about \$2,900 per month in retirement benefits, including the delayed retirement credits.

Unfortunately, the rules do not allow Nancy to share in those extra benefits. Her rate would remain at the \$660 level. However, if Sid dies before she does, Nancy would get \$2,900 in monthly widow's benefits because a widow is allowed to get her deceased husband's full benefit with the delayed retirement credits.

But here is the newly cited reason you should consider filing for Social Security at age 66 and then immediately suspend those benefits: to protect your eligibility for back benefits if your circumstances change before you reach age 70. For example, if serious health issues afflict you in your late 60s, you may decide it is no longer worth it to delay your Social Security until age 70. You could then "unsuspend" your benefits and receive back pay benefits to age 66. (Of course, you would no longer be due the delayed retirement bonus.) Had you not filed for your Social Security benefits (and then suspended them) at age 66, you would not have been able to claim the retroactive benefits once you changed your mind. And under this "file and suspend" plan, if you remain healthy or your circumstances don't oth-



monthly spousal benefit, but would begin to receive almost \$3,000 per month in Social Security retirement benefits, including "delayed retirement credits" of eight percent per year.

Jack wouldn't want to employ the "file and suspend" strategy at age 66 because if he suspends his own benefits, he would also be required to suspend his husband's benefits on Jill's record.

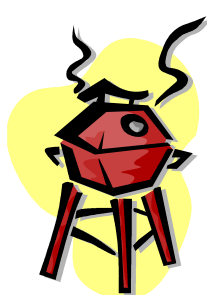
