King stops in Pampa to raise funds for wounded vets

■ **King: "Helping wounded veterans is my passion."**

With an entourage of local cyclists and motorcyclists, Scot King rolled into Pampa on Saturday, as part of a cross-country cycling trip to raise awareness and funds for wounded veterans. He passed through Pampa's VFW Post on the second leg of his trip, which began in Annapolis, Maryland.
 "This leg of my trip has been a little more difficult, but the word is out more," said King. "We're starting to get more notice of what we're doing, and that's huge."

"What's really changed for me is how many people I see who really care about our veterans," he added. "It's unbelievable. ... The veterans are going to need our help for a long time. The ones that are coming home after Iraq and Afghanistan right now, this nation needs to open up their eyes and realize it's going to be a floodgate of issues that we, as a nation, need to make sure we take care of, and that's not just from the veteran's point of view, but it's also from the family's."
 King, a veteran himself, served with the Marine Corp from 1986 to 1990, and after that time has developed a passion for helping wounded veterans and their families, through a nonprofit called "Remember the Wounded Ride."
 "I've ridden over 8,000 miles now on my bicycle," he said. "While I'm on this trek, I'm gathering stories for combat wounded veterans and combat veterans, and some of them have some really unique stories that need

to be heard by the American people."
 "I'm also getting the state flag from every capital, and in 2013, we're going to take those flags from the 48 states, and I'm going to go to Hawaii and Alaska and get their flags as well, and we're going to hang those flags at the Veteran Memorial Coliseum in Portland, Oregon," he added.
 So far, the nonprofit has released one book, "America's Heroes: Untold Stories of Honor, Courage and Sacrifice," with plans for others to come. While traveling across the country, King said that veterans who have never spoken about their experiences opened up to him.
 King also said he has a special place in his heart for Vietnam veterans, including a good friend who lost both legs in the war.
 "He's probably the most amazing person I've ever met," King said. "He does everything, and he can't use prosthetics. But to see that, is absolutely amazing."

Obama to offer comfort

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Barack Obama dashed to Colorado on Sunday to meet with families of those gunned down in a movie theater and to hear from state and local officials about the shooting that left 12 people dead and dozens more injured.

Air Force One was to touch down at Buckley Air Force Base in Aurora late Sunday afternoon for the president's hastily arranged 2½-hour visit, which would include a private meeting with the victims' loved ones and perhaps a public comment about the shooting early Friday morning at a busy multiplex.

For Obama, it was another unhappy occasion for him to serve as national consoler in chief, a role that has become a crucial facet of the presidency. National tragedies can present an opportunity for presidents to show leadership and rise above partisan politics, as with President Bill Clinton and the Oklahoma City bombing and President George W. Bush and the Sept. 11 attacks.

But in moments of sorrow, presidents can risk looking detached and out of touch. Bush's handling of Hurricane Katrina is an often-cited example.

Sunday's trip was Obama's second time to Colorado in less than a month to comfort residents in a state that's critical to the November election. He made a quick visit in late June to Colorado Springs, where hundreds of homes were destroyed in the most devastating wildfire in the state's history.

"These families need that kind of contact by our elected leader," Aurora Police Chief Dan Oates told CBS' "Face the Nation." "It will be very powerful and it will help them. As awful as what they've been through and what they're going through has been, having the president here is very, very powerful."

"I think the president coming in is a wonderful gesture," Aurora Mayor Steve Hogan said on ABC's "This Week." "He's coming in, really, to have private conversations with the families. I think that's totally appropriate."

DISD training after boys-only trip

DALLAS (AP) — The Dallas Independent School District has agreed to provide gender-equality training to its principals and other district officials following a U.S. Department of Education investigation into a boys-only field trip to see a movie earlier this year.

The agreement with the department's Office of Civil Rights, reached last week, aims to prevent any repeats of the outing that would exclude students from educational opportunities based on gender.

The school district spent \$57,000 on the February field trip for the district's 5,000 fifth-grade boys to see "Red Tails," about the legendary Tuskegee Airmen. Most girls stayed at their schools and watched "Akeelah and the Bee," a fictional story about a girl who competes in a spelling bee. Not all saw it, though, because not all principals showed it.

"I think it's good to have a refresher training," district Superintendent Mike Miles told the Dallas Morning News. "I knew we had an issue with the 'Red Tails,' and now we are going to comply. It will be good training."

Principals are scheduled to attend a two-hour training session in August. The district's school leadership department will also undergo training, he said.

Emails obtained by the newspaper showed that the trip was conceived by then-interim schools chief Shirley Ison-Newsome, who was recently made an assistant superintendent overseeing a cluster of schools and given a raise. Most of the money for the trip came from a fund for an early childhood initiative, the emails showed.

The Texas Education Agency was also investigating the funds used to pay for the trip. The status of that investigation was not immediately known.

Officer killed after collision

LANCASTER (AP) — A police officer returning home after his shift has died after colliding with a suspected drunk driver in Johnson County south of Fort Worth.

KDFW Channel 5 reports that Lancaster Police Officer Dustin Dodson died late Saturday at a Fort Worth hospital. The accident happened shortly before 7 a.m. Saturday as 25-year-old Dodson was headed home.

Phyllis McFall with Lancaster Police communications confirmed Dodson's death to The Associated Press Sunday.

Venus Police officer James Robinson told The Associated Press that 22-year-old Ricardo Espinoza of Alvarado was arrested Saturday on suspicion of driving while intoxicated and an accident causing serious injury, which would likely be upgraded following Dodson's death. Robinson says a witness led police to Espinoza. He was being held Sunday pending formal charges.

Minister killed in carjacking

HOUSTON (AP) — Police say a young Houston minister has been killed in an apparent carjacking and authorities are searching for his attackers.

The Houston Chronicle reports that two men approached 21-year-old Desmond Jones early Saturday in an apartment complex parking lot, shot him and took his car.

The Harris County Sheriff's Office said the married father of two had just returned from a fast-food restaurant around 1:30 a.m. The stolen car was a silver 2012 Chrysler 300 sedan. He was pronounced dead after being flown to a local hospital.

Bishop James Dixon II, chairman of the Harris County Council for a Safer County, called for a prayer vigil Saturday in the parking lot where Jones was shot. He said Jones was a well-known musician and minister in the area.

Man gets prison for accident

BURNET (AP) — A judge has sentenced a Texas man with a history of suffering seizures to three years in prison for a deadly 2010 traffic accident.

The Austin American-Statesman reports Troy Dean Klaerner was sentenced Friday after pleading guilty to manslaughter earlier this year. Prosecutors had sought a 10-year sentence, but state District Judge Guilford Jones III noted 49-year-old Klaerner's remorse, as well as his ongoing health issues and the cost of keeping him in custody.

Court documents showed that seven days before the crash that killed 39-year-old Christopher Lee Smith on a bridge over Lake Marble Falls, a neurologist told Klaerner to stop driving.

The Texas Department of Public Safety says people with epilepsy can generally drive as long as they have not had a seizure in six months.

Suspect's gun range application denied

AURORA, Colo. (AP) — Shooting suspect James Holmes applied to join a Colorado gun range last month but never became a member because of his behavior and a "bizarre" message on his voice mail greeting, the range's owner said Sunday.

Holmes, 24, emailed an application to join the Lead Valley Range in Byers on June 25 in which he said he was not a user of illegal drugs or a convicted felon, said owner Glenn Rotkovich.

But when Rotkovich called to invite him to a mandatory orientation the following week, he said he heard Holmes' voice mail greeting that was "bizarre — guttural, freakish at best."

It identified the number as belonging to "James," so Rotkovich said he left a message.

He left two other messages but eventually told his staff to watch out for Holmes at the July 1 orientation and not to accept him into the club, Rotkovich said. His comments were first reported by Fox News.

"There's something weird here," Rotkovich said he concluded.

Holmes is being held without bond on suspicion of multiple counts of first-degree murder after a shooting rampage minutes into a premiere of "The Dark Knight Rises" early Friday that left 12 people dead and 58 wounded. He is scheduled for an initial hearing Monday and has been assigned a public defender.

The gunman's semiautomatic assault rifle jammed during the attack at the Aurora movie theater, forcing him to switch to another gun with less firepower, a federal law enforcement official told The Associated Press. That malfunction and weapons switch during the shooting rampage might have saved some lives.

As the investigation into the massacre continued Sunday, the University of Colorado said it was looking into whether Holmes used his position as a graduate student to order materials in the potentially deadly booby

traps that police said they found in his apartment.

Holmes got deliveries over four months to his home and school, authorities have said. The university is looking into what was received at the school to assist police with their investigation, said spokeswoman Jacque Montgomery.

The suspect was described as a budding scientist, brimming with potential, who pursued a graduate program even as he planned the attack with "calculation and deliberation," police said.

Holmes' apartment was booby trapped with jars of liquids, explosives and chemicals that could have

killed "whoever entered it," Aurora Police Chief Dan Oates said, noting it would have likely been one of his officers.

Investigators spent hours removing the explosive materials Saturday.

Inside the apartment, bomb technicians neutralized a "hypergolic mixture" and an improvised explosive device containing an unknown substance, said James Yacone, an FBI special agent. There also were containers of accelerants, creating "an extremely dangerous environment," he said.

Oates said on CBS' "Face the Nation" that he had never seen a booby trap as elabo-

rate as what was found in the apartment.

By late Saturday afternoon, all hazards had been removed from the apartment and residents in surrounding buildings were allowed to return home, police said.

Today in History

Today is Monday, July 23, the 205th day of 2012. There are 161 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On July 23, 1962, the first public TV transmissions over Telstar 1 took place during a special program featuring live shots beamed from the United States to Europe, and vice versa.

On this date:

In 1885, Ulysses S. Grant, the 18th president of the United States, died in Mount McGregor, N.Y., at age 63.

In 1886, a legend was born as Steve Brodie claimed to have made a daredevil plunge from the Brooklyn Bridge into New York's East River. (However, there are doubts about whether the dive actually occurred.)

In 1914, Austria-Hungary issued a list of demands to Serbia following the killing of Archduke Franz Ferdinand by a Serb assassin; the dispute led to World War I.

In 1942, Harry James and his Orchestra recorded "I Had the Craziest Dream" in Hollywood for Columbia Records.

In 1945, French Marshal Henri Petain, who had headed the Vichy government during World War II, went on trial, charged with treason. (He was convicted and condemned to death, but the sentence was commuted.)

In 1951, Henri Petain died in prison.

In 1952, Egyptian military officers led by Gamal Abdel Nasser launched a successful coup against King Farouk I.

In 1967, a week of deadly race-related rioting that claimed 43 lives erupted in Detroit.

In 1977, a jury in Washington, D.C., convicted 12 Hanafi Muslims of charges stemming from the hostage siege at three buildings the previous March.

In 1982, actor Vic Morrow and two child actors, 7-year-old Myca Dinh Le and 6-year-old Renee Shin-Yi Chen, were killed when a helicopter crashed on top of them during filming of a Vietnam War scene for "Twilight Zone: The Movie." (Director John Landis and four associates were later acquitted of manslaughter charges.)

In 1986, Britain's Prince Andrew married Sarah Ferguson at Westminster Abbey in London. (The couple divorced in 1996.)

In 1997, the search for Andrew Cunanan, the suspected killer of designer Gianni Versace and others, ended as police found his body on a houseboat in Miami Beach, an apparent suicide.

Ten years ago: Thousands of Palestinians marched to bury their dead after an Israeli airstrike killed a top Hamas leader and 14 civilians, including nine children. Welsh archbishop Rowan Williams was chosen to be the 104th Archbishop of Canterbury, spiritual leader of the world's Anglicans. A frail but determined Pope John Paul II arrived in Toronto at the start of an 11-day trip that also took him to Guatemala and Mexico. Novelist Chaim Potok died in Merion, Pa., at age 73. Actor Leo McKern died in Bath, England, at age 82.

Five years ago: In the first political debate of its kind, all eight Democratic Party contenders, appearing on CNN, fielded questions submitted by the public on YouTube. A violent home invasion in Cheshire, Conn., resulted in the deaths of a prominent doctor's wife, Jennifer Hawke-Petit, and their daughters, Hayley and Michaela; two suspects, Steven Hayes and Joshua Komisarjevsky, were almost immediately arrested (both were convicted and sentenced to death). Comic Drew Carey was tapped to replace legend Bob Barker on the CBS daytime game show "The Price is Right."

One year ago: Singer Amy Winehouse, 27, was found dead in her London home from accidental alcohol poisoning. Retired Army Gen. John Shalikashvili, the first foreign-born chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, died at Madigan Army Medical Center near Tacoma, Wash., at age 75. Nguyen Cao Ky, 80, the flamboyant former air force general who'd ruled South Vietnam for two years during the Vietnam war, died in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia. A bullet train crash in southern China claimed 40 lives.

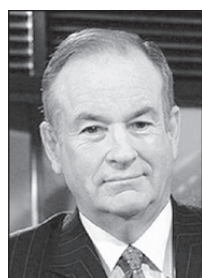


Secrets of success: the rest of the story

Simple questions sometimes require not so simple answers

Q. I enjoy reading your column, but I must complain that sometimes you are too long winded in your answers. Why can't you answer a simple question with a simple answer?

A. I constantly struggle with this issue. Of course, I could give "quick and dirty" answers to most of the questions I get. My record is seven questions answered in one column -- and that's pretty amazing considering the limited column space I have!

But every time I give a "quick and dirty" answer, I feel ... well ... dirty! I feel I've cheated my readers out of a thorough explanation of whatever Social Security topic I'm trying to explain. As I frequently point out in this column, Social Security can be a very complicated program with so many "ifs, ands or buts" associated with almost every situation. And I feel obliged to cover as many of those variables as possible to help folks understand the program.

Here is an example. I recently got an email from a reader who said he is turning 62 and is planning to file for Social Security. He asked what evidence the Social Security Administration needed to verify his age.

The "quick and dirty" answer would have been "a birth certificate." I guess that would have satisfied those readers seeking brevity: a simple three-word answer to a simple question. But frankly, I'd be doing my readers a disservice with that response.

I would have been more accurate to add the following clarification: "You will need a certified copy of your birth certificate that was recorded before your fifth birthday." Now I'm up to a 17-word answer.

But even that's not good enough, because Social Security rules say a religious record of birth is also acceptable proof of your age. So my answer now is: "You will need a certified copy of your birth certificate or a religious record of your birth that was recorded before your fifth birthday." (24 words!)

"But wait, there's more!" (As the late night ads on TV say.) I've learned over the last 40 years that many people have trouble with that phrase: "a certified copy." For example, I'm frequently asked if that means a photocopy that has been signed by a notary. So to my already 24-word response, I usually like to add something like this: "A certified copy is a copy of your birth or baptismal record that has been 'certified' by the custodian of the record. That almost always means the copy has a raised or embossed seal on it that has been signed by an official from the office that keeps the record." Gosh, that adds 50 more words, giving me a 74-word answer to that simple question!

But guess what? There are lots of folks out there for whom no birth or baptismal certificate was ever recorded. I certainly can't ignore them with my answer. So I usually like to give a better explanation of Social Security's policies regarding proof of age documentation. Therefore, I would add the following information.

"The Social Security Administration essentially follows this philosophy when it comes to proof of age: the earliest record of your birth is the best record of your birth. If you don't have a birth or baptismal certificate that was recorded before the age of five, they will ask you to provide the earliest record of your birth that is available. For example, that might be an old school record. It might be a record of a census that was taken when you were young and still living with your parents. SSA has established procedures for obtaining such records, and they will help you get the proof of age documentation that you need."

Wow! That added another whole paragraph and another 112 words. My "simple" answer is now up to 186 words and almost half of my column space.

And here's another twist. More than a few of my readers weren't born in the United States. Their birth was recorded in a foreign land. What kind of birth record do they need to provide? Many think their passport is enough. But it's usually not. Once again, SSA rules



say they have to try to get the earliest record of their birth. So if a birth certificate exists, even though it might be in

England or Germany or Mexico, you have to provide a certified copy of that record. And if it needs translating, that's OK. SSA has a staff of translators who will examine your foreign birth certificate.

I've stopped counting words to my "simple answer to a simple question." But I hope my readers get an idea of what I'm talking about. Sometimes a "quick and dirty" response is just a little too quick -- and a little too dirty. Clarification is often needed.

And by the way, here is one final twist to the question: "What kind of documentation do I need to prove my age when I file for Social Security benefits?" The answer just might be: "None at all!" That's because SSA possibly might have evidence of your birth already in its files. You see, at a certain point -- I'm not quite sure of the exact date -- the agency required people applying for a Social Security number to provide proof of birth in order to obtain that number. So then they usually coded your SSN application card to indicate that a birth certificate (or other acceptable record of birth) was seen by an SSA official. If your SSN application card has that special marking, you

probably will not need to provide a birth certificate when you file for Social Security benefits. SSA will tell you if you need to provide proof of your age when you file for benefits.

I could go on and offer even more clarification, but I think I'll just shut up!
