Young firefighter on the job to help the community

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Firefighter Gregg Weston, 19, has been working with the Pampa Fire Department since January, after finishing EMT training and graduating from Fire Academy at Tarrant County College in Fort Worth.

Being on the scene of his first house fire in January was a little different than the simulated fires he dealt with at Fire Academy.

"My first fire was scary and exciting," Weston said. "I think I was more excited, but I was still a little bit scared. We knew everybody was out of the building, so we didn't have to go in, but my captain let me go in anyway, just because it was my first fire, to take control of one room. Then we went outside and fought it defensively."

After dealing with simulated fires, his biggest surprise with the house fire was the staggering heat.

"In an actual structure fire, it's a lot

hotter," he said. "I went in, kind of scrunched into a ball, and then sucked it up, got up and started fighting it. That was probably the biggest shock I've

Weston grew up in the Dallas-Fort Worth area, spending most of his time in Bedford. He was drawn into firefighting and EMT work after working as a lifeguard at a Grapevine hotel, where he saved the lives of several kids.

"It was an adrenaline rush," Weston said. "I kind of remember it, but I don't, because it was just instinct to jump in there. It was indescribable what the feeling was."

That experience inspired Weston to complete training as an EMT, which led him down the road to fighting fires.

"It's just another thing that allows me to help out people, because I want to help better my community," he said. "That's part of the reason I got into this. I like knowing that my community is safe, and I'm part of keeping it that

Woman gets 20 years on civilian and cop assault charges

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A woman authorities believe is 'mentally compromised," who struck a Pampa resident with her vehicle and attempted to hit a police officer with it as well, was convicted by a jury Tuesday of of aggravated assault against a public servant and aggravated assault with a deadly weapon, court records show.

Karla Dobbs, 56, was sentenced by 31st District Judge Steven Emmert to 20 years in prison, and ordered to pay \$2,000 in fines for her charges.

She was charged with assault following the incident, which occurred last September.

For several days leading up to the last September incident, Dobbs had been living in her car outside a home at Florida and Somerville. After she began throwing trash into the yard there, the resident, Jeremy Doucette, asked Dobbs to leave. She did, but returned later, driving her car into Doucette's lawn, where he was sitting in a lawn chair. Dobbs then struck Doucette with her car. He did not receive any injuries from the incident.

Two officers with the Pampa Police Department arrived on the scene, where Dobbs' vehicle was still in the lawn, and they attempted to apprehend her by breaking her passenger side window. She backed the car into the street, and an officer stepped in front of the vehicle to attempt to prevent Dobbs from driving off. However, she put her car into drive.

The officer discharged four bullets into the front grill and hood of the car to disable it, and jumped out of the way before Dobbs began to leave the scene. He received no injuries.

She made it a block away from the scene before her car stopped running, and she was apprehended by police.

Alcohol and drugs were not involved in the incident, according to a report from the Pampa PD at the time. However, Dobbs has a history of mental illness, which was the focus of the argument from defense attorney Harold Comer. At the time of the incident, Dobbs was not on medication, while he argued should mitigate punishment.

After receiving her charges, Dobbs was found to be incompetent to serve trial in an evaluation, and she was transported to the North Texas State Hospital, a mental healthcare facility in Vernon. After a 120-day stint there, Dobbs was found to be competent for trial, and returned to the Panhandle. She lived at Faith City Mission in Amarillo until trial.

Comer said he was disappointed with the outcome,

given Dobbs' mental health. "We think it was evident Karla Dobbs is a mentally compromised person, and should be held to a different standard as far as sentencing is concerned," he said. "She was in a mental condition such that she couldn't grasp the seriousness of her conduct, even though she

knew it was wrong.' Assistant District Attorney Jeromie Oney of the 31st District, who argued for the prosecution, said that Dobbs was a danger to herself and others, whether off or on medication. He added that Dobbs was committed to a mental health facility a few weeks ago after threatening suicide, despite taking her medication as prescribed at the time.

"Our position was she has these mental issues, but she's clearly shown she's a danger to the public, because she put (Doucette's) life in danger, she put an officer's life in danger, and now she's a danger to herself," Oney said. "She'll get treatment for mental issues in prison, too.'

Dobbs is currently in custody at the Gray County Jail.

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



US starts landmark Agent Orange cleanup in Vietnam

DANANG, Vietnam (AP) — Vo Duoc fights back tears while sharing the news that broke his heart: A few days ago he received test results confirming he and 11 family members have elevated levels of dioxin lingering

in their blood.

The family lives in a two-story house near a former U.S. military base in Danang where the defoliant Agent Orange was stored during the Vietnam War, which ended nearly four decades ago. Duoc,

58, sells steel for a living and has diabetes, while his wife battles breast cancer and their daughter has remained childless after suffering repeated miscarriages. For years, Duoc thought the ailments were unrelated, but after

seeing the blood tests he now suspects his family unwittingly ingested dioxin from Agent Orangecontaminated fish, vegetables and well water.

Dioxin is a persistent chemical linked to cancer and birth defects.

Police kill man outside workplace

HOUSTON (AP) — Houston police have shot and killed a man who allegedly fired into his estranged wife's office, then tried to enter the building.

Internal affairs officers are reviewing Tuesday afternoon's shooting. Police say the officer who fatally shot 33-year-old Monta Cordell Fizer has been with the force since 1984.

Police say a 911 call from the woman, who had a restraining order against her husband, summoned offi-

Investigators say Fizer, who briefly ducked into a waiting taxi he apparently took to the building, refused to put down a pistol and threatened to harm his spouse. Officer J.M. Macphail shot the husband before the suspect could enter the woman's building.

Houston police believe Fizer was also responsible for a climate change. shot fired into the building early Tuesday.

Ouch! July in US was hottest ever in history books

WASHINGTON (AP) — This probably comes as AMARILLO (AP) — A federal judge says the JetBlue no surprise: Federal scientists say July was the hottest month ever recorded in the Lower 48 states, breaking a record set during the Dust Bowl of the 1930s.

> And even less a surprise: The U.S. this year keeps setting records for weather extremes, based on the precise calculations that include drought, heavy rainfall, unusual temperatures, and storms.

The average temperature last month was 77.6 degrees. A neuropsychologist testified that Osbon had a "brief" That breaks the old record from July 1936 by 0.2 degree, according to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. Records go back to 1895.

'It's a pretty significant increase over the last record,' said climate scientist Jake Crouch of NOAA's National Climatic Data Center in Asheville, N.C. In the past, skeptics of global warming have pointed to the Dust Bowl to argue that recent heat isn't unprecedented. But Crouch said this shows that the current year "is out and beyond those Dust Bowl years. We're rivaling and beating them

Three of the nation's five hottest months on record have been recent Julys: This year, 2011 and 2006. Julys in 1936 and 1934 round out the top five.

Last month also was 3.3 degrees warmer than the 20th century average for July.

Thirty-two states had months that were among their 10 warmest Julys, but only one, Virginia, had the hottest July on record. Crouch said that's a bit unusual, but that it shows the breadth of the heat and associated drought.

For example in 2011, the heat seemed to be centered mostly in Oklahoma and Texas. But this summer "the epicenters of the heat kind of migrated around. It kind of got everybody in the action this month," Crouch said.

The first seven months of 2012 were the warmest on record for the nation. And August 2011 through July this year was the warmest 12-month period on record, just beating out the July 2011-June 2012 time period.

But it's not just the heat that's noteworthy. NOAA has a measurement called the U.S. Climate Extreme Index which dates to 1900 and follows several indicators of unusually high and low temperatures, severe drought, downpours, and tropical storms and hurricanes. NOAA calculates the index as a percentage, which mostly reflects how much of the nation experience extremes. In July, the index was 37 percent, a record that beat the old mark for July last year. The average is 20 percent.

For the first seven months of the year, the extreme index was 46 percent, beating the old record from 1934. This year's extreme index was heavily driven by high temperatures both day and night, which is unusual, Crouch said.

'This would not have happened in the absence of human-caused climate change," said Pennsylvania State University climate scientist Michael Mann.

Crouch and Kevin Trenberth, climate analysis chief of the National Center for Atmospheric Research, said what's happening is a double whammy of weather and

August 9 is the 221st day of the year (222nd in leap years) in the Gregorian calendar. There are 144 days remaining until the end of the year.

Events

48 BC – Caesar's civil war: Battle of Pharsalus – Julius Caesar decisively defeats Pompey at Pharsalus and Pompey flees to Egypt.

586 BC – Solomon first temple totally destroyed by the Babylonians led by King Nebuchadnezzar. That occurred on the 9th day of Av, 586 BC.

70 AD – Jewish revolts against the Romans caused the Roman General Titus, later who became Caesar, to beseige the city. The second Temple was completely destroyed by fire on the 9th of Av, 70 AD.

378 – **Gothic War:** Battle of Adrianople – A large Roman army led by Emperor Valens is defeated by the Visigoths in present-day Turkey. Valens is killed along with over half of his army.

1944 – Continuation war: The Vyborg–Petrozavodsk Offensive, the largest offensive launched by Soviet Union against Finland during the Second World War, ends to a strategic stalemate. Both Finnish and Soviet troops at the Finnish front dug to defensive positions, and the front remains stable until the end of the war.



That is a question at the heart of most debates about the federal government. Declaring war, writing executive orders, legislating, allocating taxpayers' money and even influencing what your children learn and eat are just a very small sample of subjects hotly under dispute right now.

Well, I know a position more powerful than the presidency.

I wholeheartedly believe in the Spanish proverb that says, "An ounce of mother is worth a pound of clergy." But I also believe that men and fathers hold a unique role and power to restore our homes and country.

I believe that as families go, so goes the nation. And men possess three specific keys (powers) that can draw them, their spouses and their children nearer to one another and God, as well as make them all better citizens.

Before I reveal those three keys, I need to tell you where I learned them -- from a dearly departed saint who greatly influenced me: Dr. Edwin Louis Cole. I owe what I know to him.

Dr. Ed Cole is called the "Father of the Christian Men's Movement" because he influenced millions of men worldwide, including many leaders who lead the movement today. His mission statement was simple and powerful: "I have been called to speak with a prophetic voice to the men of this generation and commissioned with a ministry majoring in men to declare a standard for manhood."

My wife, Gena, and I first met Ed and his wife, Nancy, in 1998 at a banquet honoring "Walker, Texas Ranger." Over the next four years, there would be many choice moments between Ed and

One night in that period, Dr. Cole drove across Dallas through a thunderstorm simply to deliver a message that God had laid on his heart to encourage us to get grounded in the Bible in order to discern between the genuine and the counterfeit in life. What a great lesson. What a great man!

As I shared in my auto-

biography, "Against All Odds," in 2002, Ed called our home and asked us to pray for him because he was very ill. After we prayed with him over the phone, we decided to fly to Dallas to see and pray with him personally. It was one of the most moving moments of our lives. It wasn't long after that when he passed to his heavenly home.

God loved me through Ed Cole, and I thank God for him. And I look forward to thanking Ed again when I see him one day in heaven.

I never will forget or take for granted Ed's influence in my life. He influenced me to increase my trust in God and to be a faithful husband and father, and -- even though I was a "TV tough guy" -- he challenged me to be a real man. He challenged me with the three keys I alluded to earlier: to be a better role model, mentor and motivator to my family.

What I wrote and detailed to men and fathers about manhood and fatherhood via those three keys in my New York Times best-seller "Black Belt Patriotism" I learned from Ed. Another great book for men is "Courageous," by our friend Randy Alcorn. It's based upon the movie but expanded with 80 percent more story content.

I am not a perfect father or husband. Truth be known, I've learned far more from my failures than from my successes. However, I won't allow them to stop me from pressing on. And I don't believe that you should allow failures to hinder your fatherhood, either. As Ed used to say, "you don't drown by falling in the water; you drown by staying there."

Do you have a few role models, mentors and motivators in your life? I hope so. If not, Ed still can be a part of your life today through his resources found at the Ed Cole Library, at http://www. edcole.org. In commemoration of the 10th anniversary of Ed's homecoming to heaven, his children and our friends, Joann Webster and Paul Cole, have curated a special edition of "The Collection," which is a compendium of Ed's lifework in one digital location.

Ed's legacy message is this: If we men continue to fight to be the best husbands, fathers and men we can be, we will not only give our family members what they need but also get in return what we need and simultaneously help to restore our country, one home at a time.

That is what I mean by a man who is more powerful than the president -- not just Ed Cole but you! The president can't make or mold your family without your permission. He might try, but that is your jurisdiction and power,

endowed by God. Protect

As Ed used to say, "do not let others create your world for you, for they will always create it too small." He also said, "The power of choice is our only true freedom in life."

Only you have the ability to order your private world. You also have the ability to create, hinder or improve life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness in your heart and home.

In fact, I don't believe one can truly experience life, liberty and happiness as the Declaration of Independence states without a proper lineup of priorities for God, family and country. Those are the priorities our Founding Fathers lived by.

Thomas Jefferson clearly revealed that when he wrote to his daughter Mary the year before his presidency, "My attachments to the world, and whatever it can offer, are daily wearing off; but you are one of the links which hold to my existence, and can only break off with that."

He espoused the same sentiment eight years later, at the end of his presidency, to the renowned explorer William Clark: "By a law of our nature, we cannot be happy without the endearing connections of a family."

Now there's a worthy reflection of power and a way to improve your life, your home and our country this Father's Day.

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Chinese unaware of Gu case on eve of murder trial

HEFEI, China (AP) — One of China's most politically charged murder trials starts here Thursday. But talk to the student at the cafe, the taxi driver, the software salesman and the flower seller — none of them has any idea that a courtroom in this grimy industrial city soon will be the center of China's political universe.

As everywhere in the country, the talk in Hefei is more about China's medal success at the Olympics than the drama surrounding Gu Kailai, who is accused of murdering a British businessman, when her husband Bo Xilai ruled the roost as the Communist Party boss of Chongqing metropolis.

Gu's case may have riveted the international community, but it is barely causing a ripple among ordinary Chinese, underscoring how far removed such high-stakes political maneuvering is from their lives. The lack of awareness points in part to the government's relative success with censorship and limiting media exposure of the case, which has embarrassed the Communist Party ahead of its carefully managed once-a-decade reshuffle of power later this year. Bo was a contender for a top job until his downfall earlier this year.

"I rarely pay attention to such news because politics has very little to do with my own life," said Gong Genwu, a 23-year-old computer software salesman who was strolling back to work after lunch outside a shopping mall across from the Hefei Intermediate People's Court.

Gong said this was the first time he had heard about the trial and even Gu's name. Pressed for an opinion on the scandal as a whole, he added:

"What can I say? If a murder really was committed by someone close to a high official, this shows that they are on a different level than ordinary people. Perhaps some of them lack morals."

As the party boss of Chongqing, Bo was prominent, powerful and popular. Lawyer Gu — even though she didn't have an official role in the party — wielded enormous influence thanks to her husband.

Their life fell apart when an aide to Bo fled briefly to an American consulate in February, apparently with evidence of the Bo family's involvement in the death of Neil Heywood, a British businessman who had dealings with Gu. That resulted in Bo's removal from key posts and an April announcement that Gu and a household aide were chief suspects in the Briton's murder.



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Curiosity sends back flood of new views from Mars

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — NASA's latest adventure to Mars has given the world more than just glimpses of a new alien landscape.

It opened a window into the trip itself, from video footage of the landing to a photo of the rover hanging by a parachute to a shot of discarded spacecraft hardware strewn across the surface. And the best views — of Mars and the journey there — are yet to come.

"Spectacular," mission deputy project scientist Joy Crisp said of the footage. "We've not had that before."

Since parking itself inside an ancient crater Sunday night, the Curiosity rover has delighted scientists with views of its new surroundings, including the 3-mile-high mountain it will drive to. It beamed back the first color picture Tuesday revealing a tanhued, pebbly landscape and the crater rim off in the distance.

Locale aside, Curiosity is giving scientists an unprecedented sense of what it took to reach its Martian destination. The roving laboratory sent back nearly 300 thumbnails that NASA processed into a low-quality video showing the last 2 1/2 minutes of its white-knuckle dive through the thin Martian atmosphere.

In the video, the protective heat shield pops off and tumbles away. The footage gets jumpy as

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Curiosity rides on a parachute. In the last scene, dust billows up just before landing.

NASA twice tried to record a Mars landing. In 1999, the Mars Polar Lander carried similar gear, but it slammed into the south pole after prematurely shutting off its engines. Another effort was aborted in 2008 during the Phoenix lander's mission to the northern plains when mission managers decided not to turn it on for fear it would interfere with the landing.

"It's too emotional for me," said Ken Edgett of the Malin Space Science Systems, which operates the video camera. "It's been a long journey and it's really awesome."

The full high-resolution video will be downloaded when time allows and should give the first peek of a landing on another planet.

Curiosity's journey to Mars spanned eight months and 352 million miles. The rover gently touched down Sunday night after executing an elaborate and untested landing routine. The size of a compact car, it was too heavy to land using air bags. Instead, it relied on a heat shield, parachute, rockets and cables to lower it to the ground.

During its seven-minute plunge through the atmosphere, Curiosity shed the spacecraft parts. On Tuesday, scientists got their first view of the castoffs

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

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Arafat's autopsy RAMALLAH, West Bank (AP) — Swiss experts have been invited to the West

Bank to test Yasser Arafat's remains for possible poisoning, the chief investigator looking into the 2004 death of the Palestinian leader said Wednesday.

The announcement followed weeks of zigzagging on the autopsy issue by officials in the Palestinian Authority, the self-rule government that Arafat established. Their conflicting positions and hesitation triggered speculation they were trying to quietly kill the investigation.

Last month, Switzerland's Institute of Radiation Physics said it had detected elevated levels of radioactive polonium-210 on stains on Arafat's clothing, reviving longstanding rumors in the Arab world that the Palestinian leader was poisoned.

However, the lab said the findings were inconclusive and that only exhuming Arafat's remains could bring possible clarity. Lab officials also said polonium decays quickly and that an autopsy would need to be done within a few months at most. They also said they needed a formal invitation to proceed with testing.

The Arab satellite TV station Al Jazeera first published the findings of the Swiss lab. The station had approached the lab on behalf of Arafat's widow, Suha, who had demanded that her husband's remains be examined and provided the lab with his clothing. She also asked the French government in a lawsuit to investigate her husband's death. No decision has been made on the suit.

Know your dog nose to toes

You probably know that ticks cause Lyme disease in dogs. But did you know that removing a diseased tick in the early stages of attachment could save your dog a lifetime of pain, decreased mobility and possible damage to the heart, kidneys and nervous system?

You probably know to keep your dog away from chocolate and candy. But did you know that a handful of raisins could induce kidney disease? And would you recognize the symptoms of failing kidneys?

You probably know that a limping dog is an uncomfortable dog. But did you know that a dog with a "skip" to his gait might have a patellar luxation? And did you know that a consequence of patellar luxation is degenerative joint disease that causes chronic pain and lameness?

You probably know that obesity leads to diabetes in dogs and humans. But do you know how diabetes presents in a dog? Would you notice the symptoms of lethargy, decreased appetite, excessive water consumption and increased urination?

You probably know all oout the dangers of snakes hidden in tall grass. But what about the danger of some grasses themselves? Foxtail barbs designed to move forward and not backward pose a serious threat of soft tissue damage and infection when left embedded in a dog's nose, ear canal, paw or skin.

A little bit of awareness is all it takes to prevent

most of these scenarios from spinning dangerously out of control. Daily attention to your dog's overall being can save you thousands of dollars — and his life.

I call it the nose-totoes one-minute morning checkup, and it's the best return on investment you'll ever see.

As the name suggests, start at the nose and work back. Check the nose, eyes, ears and gums. At first, you're looking to get a feel for your dog's norm. Once you know his norm, you'll readily pick up on changes drippy nose, bad breath, inflamed gums, foul-smell-

From there, palpate head to tail, back to belly for lumps. As a dog ages, lumps become more common. Most of the time, they are nothing more than fatty fluid. Sometimes, though, they're malignant and should be removed. Your vet will know the difference. Draw a map of your dog's body, and keep track of those you've had checked.

Check the niches of his paws for ticks, foxtails or any other foreign body. Check his paw pads to ensure they aren't dry and cracked.

Pay careful attention to your dog's weight. Any unexplained significant weight loss or gain should be reported to his veterinarian. "Significant" varies depending on size. A onepound loss over the course of a week is not particularly noteworthy in a Great Dane. In a Pomeranian, it's significant.

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
