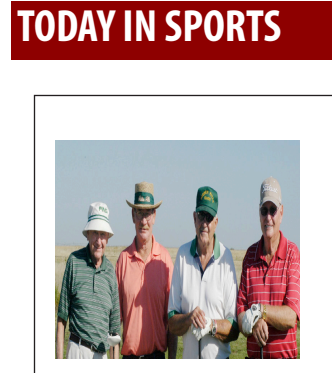

The chamber is making it happen!

PAMPA — The Pampa Chamber of Commerce currently is neck-deep in activities and changes expected to propel the highly-successful entity well into the future.

One of those changes comes Dr. Joe Donaldson, 94, who recently donated 21 signed and numbered art prints, all western and American art, to the chamber.

Dr. Donaldson said he had the photos in his office for a long time before he retired and thought the chamber might appreciate them now.

"The chamber was and is a big part of me," he said.

With the help of Gail Kincaid, his daughter visiting from Austin, Dr. Donaldson pointed out his favorite prints, both iconic images of cowboys. The doctor went into practice in 1949 and continued until 1992 although he did work for the local prison for six to eight years after that.

A woman who walked into the chamber immediately brightened up upon seeing Dr. Donaldson.

"You took my mother's gall bladder out one time," said Audie Atherton with a smile.

Meanwhile, Chamber Executive Director Jane Steele said the art is part

of many physical changes currently going on at the chamber, including painting and new furniture. They were provided for by generous donations, she said.

The changes will help the chamber ensure their office visually reflects the chamber's huge successes, officials said.

"It's a complete revamp," Steele said. "Lamps, chairs, everything ... It's going to have a decidedly 'southwestern' flavor."

Then there's the 28th Annual Country Fair Boomtown Gala set for Oct. 20. John Curry, chamber board member, said this is easily the chamber's biggest fundraiser of the year. The \$30 tickets are available at the chamber headquarters and with chamber board members.

The Pampa News will print several more stories about the fair. Also, expect a list of every chamber board member that Country Fair tickets can be purchased from in the weekend edition.

"There's something for everyone to enjoy," Curry said.

Also, expect more Pampa News coverage in the chamber's Co-Op Marketing Campaign for 2012. It will allow matching funds for any advertising program that promotes shopping, eating and staying overnight in Pampa, officials said. And finally, Steele reminded a reporter that the Texas CattleWomen's Style Show is this Saturday at the Pampa Country Club.

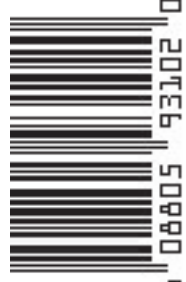




Dear Abby...

DEAR ABBY: Last night at a restaurant, my husband and I were surprised to see a male server wearing a blond wig and full makeup. I was, to say the least, shocked and very glad we hadn't brought the children, ages 11 and 14, with us. How do you explain something like that to an 11-year-old? The 14-year-old would be able to "get it."

What kind of policies are in place for restaurants in cases like this? What if customers are offended? Could I request a different server or just leave? Your comments would be appreciated. — **TAKEN ABACK IN CALIFORNIA**

DEAR TAKEN ABACK: In California, people have the legal right to dress in a style not typical of their gender without fear of discrimination or retaliation. That right is protected by state law. If customers find it offensive, they can either request a different server or take their business elsewhere. Presumably, the customer would pay for food that had already been prepared.

Because children today grow up quickly and are less sheltered than in past decades, I recommend you explain to your 11-year-old that not all people are alike, and the importance of treating

others with respect. It's called **REALITY.**

DEAR ABBY: My boyfriend, "Shane," and I have been together more than a year. My problem lies in child support issues.

I'm a college student and full-time employee at a major company. I make a pretty good living considering my age. Shane is an electrician, and half of every paycheck he earns is going to his child's mother. I understand the money is being given to support the child, but every time we see him, the kid says his mommy is broke.

Because my boyfriend's check is half gone by the time he brings it home, I must pick up the slack regarding the bills. Shane helps out any way he can, but it's never enough, so I have to step in.

I love him, he treats me like a queen and I have yet to have a major problem with him. But it's the money situation. I feel a little guilty for feeling this way. What do I do in this situation? Please help. — **FEELING GUILTY IN COLORADO**

DEAR FEELING GUILTY: Stop feeling guilty. Your feelings are natural considering that Shane isn't carrying his half of the load he shares with you financially. Talk to him about the way

the inequity is making you feel because if you don't, your resentment will only grow. He may need to find a second job so you have to "step in" less often. The alternative is to accept that the present will also be your future.

Time for people to take elections away from parties?

Americans heard a lot about the Founding Fathers during the Republican convention last week. The Founders' names are sure to be dropped this week as the Democrats meet. But James Madison and George Washington said a few things you didn't -- and won't -- hear at national party gatherings.

Both men repeatedly warned of the danger to our republic inherent in the growth of political parties.

"The arts of electioneering will poison the fountains of liberty," Madison wrote.

In his farewell address, Washington sounded the alarm about the "baneful effects" of parties, saying that they would eventually become the country's "worst enemy" and would leave liberty in ruins.

"In the course of time," said America's first president, political parties would become "potent engines, by which cunning, ambitious and unprincipled men will be enabled to subvert the power of the people, and to usurp for themselves the reins of government; destroying afterwards the very engines which have lifted them to unjust dominion."

In his new book, "The Parties Versus the People: How to Turn Republicans and Democrats into Americans," Mickey Edwards, a former GOP member of Congress from Oklahoma, sounds the warning again.

Edwards writes persuasively that the two political parties have overtaken our electoral system, leading to the current era of partisan demagoguery. Slavish party loyalty trumps political philosophy, be it liberal, conservative or something in between.

Here in Missouri, we have the perfect example of that. GOP strategists are desperately trying to push U.S. Rep. Todd Akin, a Wildwood Republican, out of the race against Democratic incumbent Claire McCaskill.

Akin became the nominee because the party system encourages extremism. He successfully ran for Congress six times in a safe Republican district, having to fear only challenges from his right, not from the center -- and nobody gets to Todd Akin's right.

He won the Aug. 7 Senate primary by espousing the same ideals that have guided his entire career. His more moderate opponents, knowing that Republican primary voters are extremely socially conservative, embraced the same ideals.

Now party leaders are demanding loyalty to some different set of ideals and are shocked that they aren't getting it.

They have themselves, and a broken electoral system that has been hijacked by party professionals, to blame.

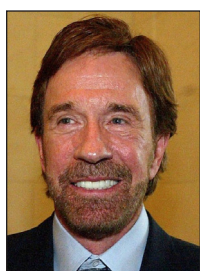
Edwards lays out a better system that is worth a serious look. He has three key suggestions to fixing the process by which we elect members of Congress. They closely mirror the suggestions we have put forth to improve Missouri's Legislature.

First, join Louisiana, California and the state of Washington in adopting open primaries. In those states, thanks to citizen initiative drives, independent voters no longer have to wait for the general election to have a say in who the top two candidates should be. All candidates, Democrats, Republicans, Libertarians and others, run in the primary together.

The general election then pits the top two candidates, whether or not they are from the same party. Imagine what would have happened in the Aug. 7 Senate primary had

Design a mudroom for your back door

Dear Pat: We are designing a new house. We have two children and think a mudroom between the garage and the kitchen would be nice. What is the best size to build, and what features should we consider for it? — Lori S.



many outdoor activities together, so several will be in the mudroom at the same time, plan on enough area for benches for them to sit and remove their dirty clothes and shoes. If you are skiers, you will need tall storage for the skis and a place to dry out boots, gloves and ski pants.

Plan your storage area in the mudroom so each person has a specific location for his things. This makes it much easier to locate items when they are needed, especially when the children are rushing to catch the school bus. Hooks on the walls for school bags are ideal.

Installing cabinets can keep the mudroom looking neat and clean. Benches, in which the seat lifts up are also excellent storage. Be sure to select cabinets and benches with ventilation holes or louvers. More often than not, the items that are thrown into them are damp. Without proper ventilation, they will stay damp and mildew.

You have many options for flooring, such as ceramic tile, decorative stone and concrete. Even though it looks great, avoid hardwood. The dampness will eventually harm it, as will the grit from dirty shoes and boots. Concrete is one of the least ex-

pensive flooring materials, and it can be tinted to make it more attractive. Whatever type of flooring you select, it should be sealed.

The mudroom will be framed like any other interior wall, but finishing it with drywall is not generally recommended. Drywall feels hard to the touch, but it can be easily dented and scratched from flying clothes, sports gear and shoes. If you really like painted drywall, apply it over a layer of plywood.

This will make it stronger and provide a better base for hanging hooks, cabinets, etc.

The best wall material for a mudroom is stained or natural wood. Stained tongue-and-groove pine paneling is particularly effective and durable. It does not nick easily, and scratches are not very apparent. Beadboard is also effective and inexpensive.

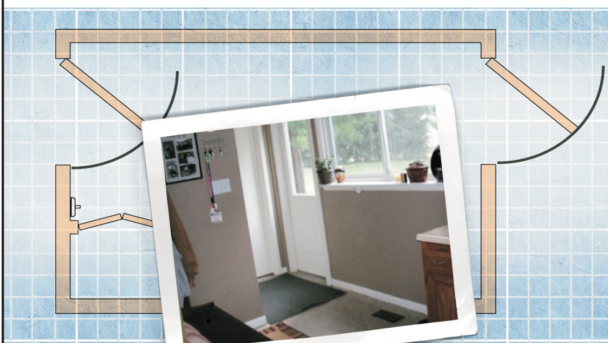

Mudroom Design

Mudrooms aren't the heart of the home, but they do keep the house functioning. They need to be designed right to function well. Here are some design tips:



FLOOR

Design with a durable and washable floor surface. The floor of the mudroom should be made of a hard, easy cleaning surface that allows for quick cleanup.

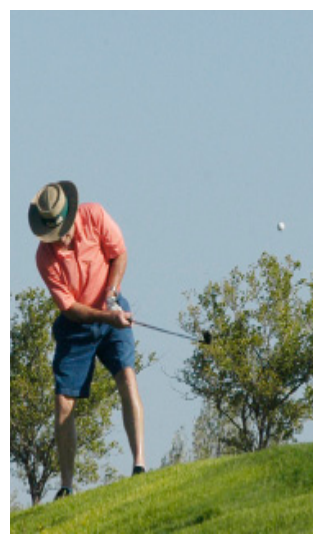

Obama's jobs Czar, GE's Jeffrey Immelt, is now urging American companies to welcome Chinese investments. That would be another route to losing control of American innovation and patents to Chinese state-owned enterprises.

Reagan never would have deceived the American people by pretending that our foreign competitors are cutting their tariffs when in fact they simply replace tariffs with a Value Added Tax of comparable amount. Reagan would not have dishonestly called the present system "free trade" when Communist China is cheating us in so many ways because they use trade to build up their military as rapidly as they can with our money.

Mitt Romney understands the threat from Communist China better than any of his Republican

competitors and certainly far better than President Obama. Romney said, "I don't want a trade war, but I don't want trade surrender, either. I will begin on day one by designating China as the currency manipulator it is."

Years ago, Ronald Reagan admonished the Japanese about their currency manipulation. He told the Japanese that if they didn't revalue their yen, the United States would take unilateral action to reduce Japanese imports.

Again and again, we are told that times have changed, that it's OK that the American economy is shifting from manufacturing to a service economy. But that means, we are not making things; we are just reselling stuff that other countries make, and that doesn't produce good jobs or a strong economy.

The Republican Party platform recognizes the dishonesty of so-called free trade. It sets forth what it labels the "downside" in this statement:

"Some governments have used a variety of unfair means to limit American access to their markets while stealing our designs, patents, brands, know-how, and technology -- the 'intellectual property' that drives innovation. The chief offender is China, which has built up its economy in part by piggybacking onto Western technology advances, manipulates its currency to the disadvantage of American exporters, excludes American products from government purchases, subsidizes Chinese companies to give them a commercial advantage, and invents regulations and standards designed to keep out foreign competi-

tion. The current administration's way of dealing with all these violations of world trade standards has been a virtual surrender."

We cheer the Republican platform for restoring our demand for American "military superiority." Manufacturing is an essential component of that goal.

McCaskill also been in it. The Republicans would have had to seek independents, moderates, and, yes, even Democratic votes.

Both parties fought this change in California, which most recently adopted the system. The parties lost. The people won.

Second, Edwards suggests redistricting reform, taking politics out of the process by which congressional districts are divided up. This page has urged several times in recent months that Missouri adopt a nonpartisan redistricting commission similar to those in Iowa and 12 other states. That's a far better way to draw boundaries than allowing politicians to cut deals to protect their own turf.

Finally, Edwards writes that the influence of money is destroying political campaigns. Again, Akin's example helps prove the point.

When powerful Republican interests outside of Missouri can put pressure on a candidate to step out of a race by threatening to withhold millions of campaign dollars, the system has been turned upside down.

At a fundraiser at the Republican National Convention, Karl Rove, the king of GOP strategists, told a crowd, "We don't care who the candidate is," as long as it's not Todd Akin.

At the same event, BusinessWeek reported, Rove joked about the possibility of Akin

being mysteriously murdered.

Other GOP leaders seem to have no problem with Rove's tactics. Rove controls tens of millions in secret campaign donations. Therefore, he rules.

George Washington never knew Karl Rove, but he is the embodiment of the "cunning, ambitious and unprincipled men" the nation's first president warned about.

Edwards, a conservative Republican, describes almost perfectly what the nation just witnessed in his party's convention:

"Candidates who seek to be on the November ballot find themselves under great pressure to take hardline positions. This tendency toward rigidity -- and the party system that enables it -- is at the root of today's political dysfunction."

This is the great challenge for Americans: It is time to fix our dysfunction in Congress, not by sending a new batch of extremists or party loyalists to Washington, D.C., but by changing the system to one more in line with what our Founders intended.

Edwards puts it this way: "As a citizen, take back your democracy. End partisan rule. Do it now."
