Invitations are not limited however to just the graduates of 1963, but includes all students who started in high school with that class.

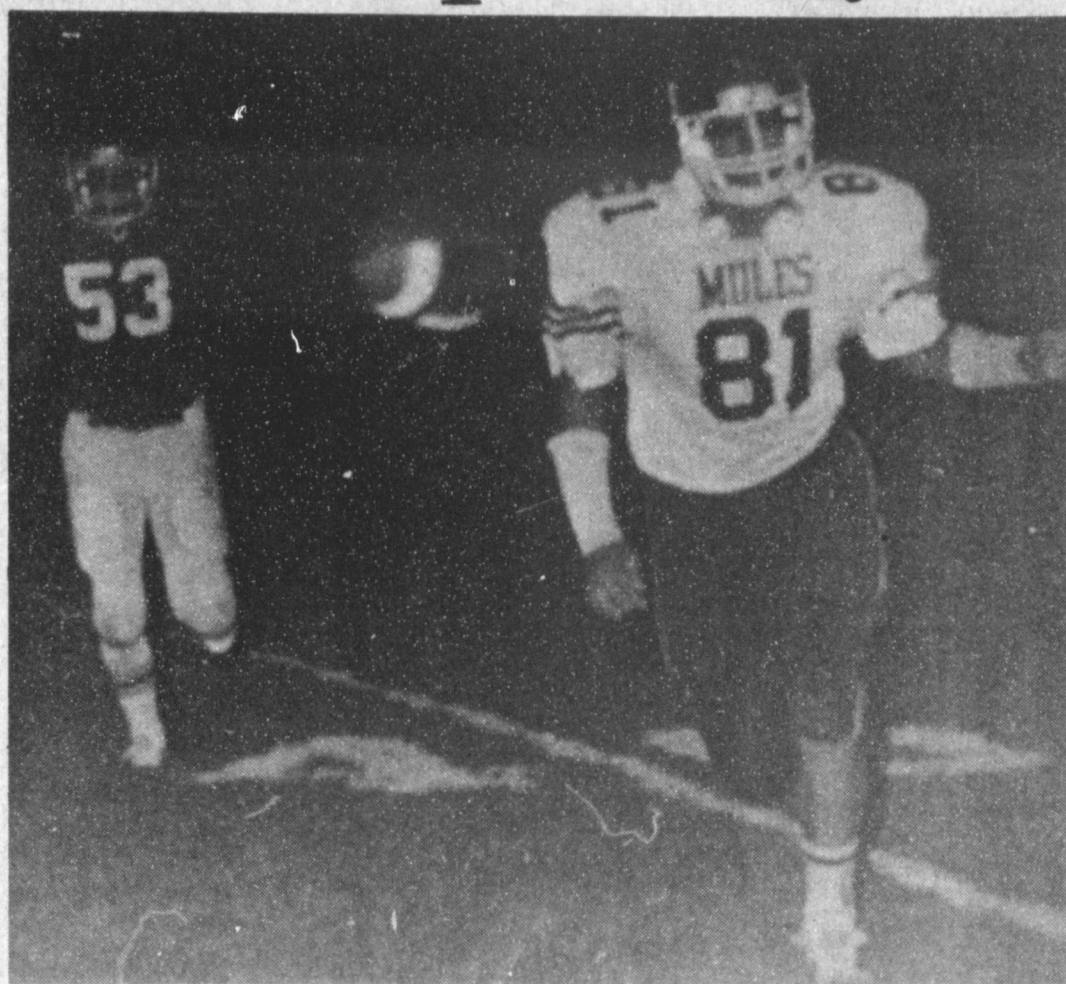

## Windbreak Seedlings Available

Jim Lutz, of the Soil Conservation Service in Muleshoe has notified the Journal that Farmers and ranchers in Bailey County and 95 other West Texas Counties can now purchase low-cost conifer seedlings for use in planting windbreaks around their fields and farmsteads. Stepped-up production by the Texas Forest Service's West Texas Nursery in Lubbock has made this possible.

Lutz further stated that catalogues and order blanks are available in the SCS office as well as the ASCS office and the Bailey County Extension Office. "Most of these trees are evergreens, and will go pretty fast, so those who wish to order

## Producers Face Big Decisions On 1984 Programs

With the nation's farmers coming close to the end of the 1983 farm year, their thoughts are beginning to turn to getting their land "put up" and in shape, as well as making decisions on the new farm programs recently announced for 1984.

Although some of the 1984 programs do not offer much in the way of incentive for producer participation, the PIK wheat program and the possibility of cotton deficiency payments are a couple of saving points and in the program's favor.

New farm programs for wheat, feed grains and cotton do not contain any paid diversions, but certain percentages in acreage reduction will be mandatory if producers choose to be in the 1984 Farm Programs. Sign-up dates for the programs will begin on January 16 and run through February 24 on all three programs. No advance deficiency payments are in the program for 1984.

Producers who choose to participate in the 1984 program will be required to limit their 1984 planted acreage to no more than 70 percent of their farm's wheat base. Acreage bases for cotton, feed grains and wheat will be the average of the acreage planted and considered planted to each particular crop in the years of 1982 and 1983.

In the wheat program, farmers may divert an additional 10-20 percent of their wheat base and receive PIK equal to 15 percent of the established yield times the

acres diverted. Participants in the PIK wheat in 84 will not receive wheat from CCC stocks. Producers will agree, if in the program, to first use their outstanding price support loans. Those having no such loans and who are unable to harvest for PIK WILL NOT receive a PIK payment. Land designated for CUA must have been devoted to row crops of small grains in two of the last three years.

No offsetting or cross compliances will apply to any of the 1984 farm programs. Contracts signed on wheat, feed grains, and cotton will be considered as binding and farmers will be liable for liquidated damages if they attempt to withdraw from the programs after the end of the regular sign-up dates.

Secretary of Agriculture John Block put a request of 10 percent acreage reduction in for "conservation reserve purposes" in the 1984 feed grain program. The 1983 PIK program, according to the USDA secretary, accomplished acreage conservation, and the 1984 program is to encourage to continuation of this practice.

Regular CCC price support loan and purchase rates per bushel on 1984 feed grains will be: corn - \$2.55; Sorghum - \$2.42; Barley - \$2.08; oats - \$1.31 and rye - \$2.17. To be eligible for these price support benefits, a producer must agree to limit corn, sorghum, oats and barley acreages planted for harvest to not more than 90 percent of that farmer's

feed grain base and also they must devote to an acreage conservation reserve eligible cropland equal to 11.11 percent of the 1984 Cont. Page 9, Col. 4

## Defensive Unit Makes Difference

The Muleshoe Mules proved again "Together They Can" Friday night in Dumas, as they rolled from a one point deficit to overcome the Perryton Rangers 10-8 in the last two minutes of an out and out defensive battle for bi-district.

The Mules will play Post, possibly next Friday in Plainview if all goes according to plans of Friday night.

The Mules drew first blood after three quarters of a scoreless ballgame, when quarterback Jeff Hamilton pitched out sideways to Mark Moton who zipped 17 yards into the end zone for a Mule touchdown. Ray Vinson was in fine form and kicked the PAT for the Mules putting them in the lead 7-0 with less than 10 minutes remaining in the fourth quarter.

The Rangers retaliated on the next series, picking up some good yardage and more first downs than they had in the entire first half. A drive starting from the 22 yard line ate up lots of yardage for the Rangers, finally landing them squarely on the three yard line. From there, Mike

McKinley, talented newcomer took the ball over for Perryton for six points. A two point conversion by Wayne Buxton pushed Perryton into the lead 8-7 over the Mules.

The Mules however had not begun to use their bag of tricks and promptly began a long drive chock full of some spectacular plays. Garcia, Hysinger, Moton, Shaw, Hamilton and Norman with the help of their team-mates began to chew up the distance and the time.

With a minute and ten seconds remaining, Ray Vinson again took the field for the Mules with Kicking on his mind. Thanks to his concentration and the complete team effort of the Mules, Vinson was successful in booting the ball through the uprights from near the one yard line for a field goal and three additional points for the Mules.

This field goal, for the most part, finished the game, and put the Mules up 10-8 to beat Perryton and grab a bi-district win.

Windy Williams' big Mules really proved their mettle Friday night, although a near disaster occurred in the first play of the game after the kickoff. A 35 yard half back pass from Moton to Jeff McCarty was dropped after McCarty failed to find a good handle on the ball. The Mules weren't dampened by this for long, and pulled right out coming back with some long drives. Time after time, Hysinger and Moton pushed through for needed first down yardage.

Muleshoe retained possession of the ball and commanded the game the majority of the time. Penalties hurt both teams some.

A chance for an almost surefire field goal was passed up after a Mule drive which began on the 28 yard line. In a 4th down situation on the 3 yard line, the Mules went for a TD, rather than the field goal. The TD failed and the Mules ended up have to give the ball to Perryton.

The Mules threatened many times, and got several penetrations. The Rangers however, put up a good goal line stand and played some good football. The Mules also had a couple of turnovers that hurt.

All in all, the entire game was strictly defense; and scoring only came about in the fourth quarter. Much of

## RRC Adopts Changes On Ag Deregulation

The Railroad Commission has adopted amendments to a rule approved in August that deregulated the transportation of agricultural commodities in Texas.

The amendments, proposed by RRC Chairman Mack Wallace, contain additional definitions for terms that were contained in the rule. The amended rule will be published for public comment in the Texas Register.

Eligible agricultural commodities are now defined as cotton, seed cotton, cottonseed and cotton burs; live animals, including livestock, poultry and game birds; grain (including rice); fresh fruits and fresh vegetables; wool and mohair; peanuts; nuts; seed; oil seed; fresh eggs; raw milk; sugar cane; manure produced by livestock, poultry or game birds; and hay.

The rule exempts from RRC-approved rates the transportation of these commodities for farmers, ranchers or cooperative organizations between points of production, processing or storage or to any point of first manufacture. The amendments contain additional definitions for these terms.

However, agricultural commodity carriers are still required to have a Commission permit and comply with the Commission's safety, vehicle registration, and insurance requirements. Such a permit will be valid for one year throughout the state.

The agricultural deregulation rule was the result of a bill approved during by the Texas Legislature earlier this year. Before that legislation was adopted, a carrier could get a seasonal agricultural permit from the Commission that would exempt certain commodities from Commission-approved rates. A seasonal permit was valid for 120 days and a 75-mile radius.

**SPS Coal Power Plant Confirmed Near Lubbock**

Southwestern Public Service Company announced today that its board of directors has approved future construction of a new coal-fired electrical generating plant northeast of Lubbock, near Idalou, Texas.

Berl M. Springer, SPS board chairman and chief executive officer, said the board action authorizes preliminary engineering design and planning, along with other preparations necessary in advance of establishing a construction schedule.

Springer estimated it will be at least two years before the start of construction. The plant will be needed to serve SPS customers throughout the South Plains during the decade of the 1990s. Details on the size and cost of the facility have not been finalized.

In 1982, SPS obtained an option to purchase 2,880

acres at the site near Idalou, in anticipation of future power plant construction. The Company purchased the land in September 1983.

The new facility will be SPS' sixth coal-fired generating unit. The Company made a decision in the early 1970s to begin decreasing the utility's dependence on natural gas-and increasing its use of coal-as boiler fuel.

Although more than 50% of the electricity generated

by SPS for its customers is now produced at coal-fired power plants, the Company still must rely substantially on natural gas to fuel the older plants.

Springer noted that "while there may be short-term fluctuations in natural gas prices, the long-run price trend is upward. For this reason, coal is a cheaper alternative to gas, and coal supplies are available for the expected 40-year life of the genera-

ting unit." "Also," Springer pointed out, "coal can be burned-and is being burned-with little or no environmental damage. We are confident that we are not harming the environment, especially because we use low-sulfur Western coal."

Harrington Station, near Amarillo, was SPS' initial coal-fired generating plant. It has three units, with a total capability of producing 1,114,000 kilowatts. Tolks Station, near Muleshoe, has one unit completed with a second unit scheduled to go into service in mid-1985. Tolks' two units will have the capability to produce 1,111,000 kilowatts.

Springer said the Lubbock

area plant eventually will have approximately the same generating capability as the Company's other coal-fired stations.

"The SPS board decision," Springer said, "represents another step forward in ensuring an economical and adequate supply of electricity for Lubbock and the South Plains as well as the other areas we serve."

Southwestern Public Service primarily provides electric service to a population of more than one million in a 70,000 square-mile area of the Panhandle and South Plains of Texas, eastern and southeastern New Mexico, the Oklahoma Panhandle, and southwestern Kansas.

**TV Violence, Aggression Relationship Questioned**

Does violence on television lead to aggression in society?

That was the question posed by researchers at National Broadcasting Company

(NBC) in a 12-year study entitled "Television and Aggression: A Panel Study." Conclusions of the recently released study indicated that there was no relationship between violence on TV and aggression in society.

However, a professor of radio-TV film at Texas Christian University said because the study did not find a relationship between television violence and aggression does not prove there is none.

"What most people don't understand is that there is a difference between proving that a thing is false and failing to prove it is true," said Dr. Charles Beadle. "This study does not attempt to answer many questions of concern to parents, educators or the public in general."

The 500-page study could easily be "boiled down to fewer than a dozen pages of useful information," he said.

The study began in 1970 and was published in 1982. "This gives the impression that this is truly a longitudinal study. Unfortunately the data was collected only between 1970 and 1973," said Beadle.

Fort Worth, Tx, and Minneapolis, Mn, were the two cities selected for the study. Researchers wanted an urban community in the Central time zone. Fort Worth had almost four times more murder and non-neglect manslaughter than Minneapolis during the period of study where 58 boys were rated for both aggression and viewing measures.

"There is no doubt that NBC expected to find no relationship between television and aggression," continued Beadle. "The experimenters knew this. No matter how hard they tried to bend over backwards to be fair, they no doubt were subconsciously predisposed to that outcome. Research must be totally blind and double removed from its funding source."

**On Mag Subscriptions**

The Better Business Bureau of the South Plains has received calls from all over the South Plains area regarding a company called TRADE-TECH out of San Diego, Ca. going door to door selling magazine subscriptions. As far as this office knows, none of the representatives of this company have permits to peddle in Lubbock.

According to the BBB / San Diego, this company is too new in their area to issue a report, however; they also have them listed as Star Gazers out of Las Vegas, Nevada. A check with the BBB / Las Vegas reveals that Star Gazers is owned by Lonnie Devine and the company has the same address and principals as a company called Magnet and a company called Star Press International a/k/a National Press & Associates. Bureau files on National Press & Associates shows that the company is out of

Florida and that the Orange County Circuit Court issued a default final judgement against Lonnie Devine and David L. Combs, owners, charging them with non-delivery of books and magazines, failure to give refunds, and misrepresentation. They have also been ordered to relieve themselves of any interest in Star Press International and National Press & Associates must reimburse injured consumers, and forfeit all property. The final hearing was April 15, 1983 and any consumers who had complaints after that date should forward them to the Federal Trade Commission's Atlanta regional office.

Representatives of TRADE-TECH are presently in the Lubbock area selling their magazine subscriptions and based on Bureau files, BBB / South Plains advises caution in dealing with this company. Company representatives are requesting checks to be made out to "CASH" so if you were to have a complaint, you would not have proof that you gave the check to the company. The representatives do not have a license to peddle in Lubbock and from the calls this office has received, they have not obtained licenses anywhere else on the South Plains either.

If you are approached by a representative of TRADE-TECH or any other company, ask to see their license to peddle (they should also be wearing an i.d. badge in Lubbock) and if they cannot produce such i.d., call the Police Department immediately.

**SPS Coal Power Plant Confirmed Near Lubbock**

Southwestern Public Service Company announced today that its board of directors has approved future construction of a new coal-fired electrical generating plant northeast of Lubbock, near Idalou, Texas.

Beri M. Springer, SPS board chairman and chief executive officer, said the board action authorizes preliminary engineering design and planning, along with other preparations necessary in advance of establishing a construction schedule. Springer estimated it will be at least two years before the start of construction.

The plant will be needed to serve SPS customers throughout the South Plains during the decade of the 1990s. Details on the size and cost of the facility have not been finalized.

In 1982, SPS obtained an option to purchase 2,880

acres at the site near Idalou, in anticipation of future power plant construction. The Company purchased the land in September 1983.

The new facility will be SPS' sixth coal-fired generating unit. The Company made a decision in the early 1970s to begin decreasing the utility's dependence on natural gas—and increasing its use of coal—as boiler fuel.

Although more than 50% of the electricity generated

by SPS for its customers is now produced at coal-fired power plants, the Company still must rely substantially on natural gas to fuel the older plants.

Springer noted that "while there may be short-term fluctuations in natural gas prices, the long-run price trend is upward. For this reason, coal is a cheaper alternative to gas, and coal supplies are available for the expected 40-year life of the generating unit."

"Also," Springer pointed out, "coal can be burned—and is being burned—with little or no environmental damage. We are confident that we are not harming the environment, especially because we use low-sulfur Western coal."

Harrington Station, near Amarillo, was SPS' initial coal-fired generating plant. It has three units, with a total capability of producing 1,114,000 kilowatts. Tolok Station, near Muleshoe, has one unit completed with a second unit scheduled to go into service in mid-1985. Tolok's two units will have the capability to produce 1,111,000 kilowatts.

Springer said the Lubbock

area plant eventually will have approximately the same generating capability as the Company's other coal-fired stations.

"The SPS board decision," Springer said, "represents another step forward in ensuring an economical and adequate supply of electricity for Lubbock and the South Plains as well as the other areas we serve."

Southwestern Public Service primarily provides electric service to a population of more than one million in a 70,000 square-mile area of the Panhandle and South Plains of Texas, eastern and southeastern New Mexico, the Oklahoma Panhandle, and southwestern Kansas.

**TV Violence, Aggression Relationship Questioned**

Does violence on television lead to aggression in society?

That was the question posed by researchers at National Broadcasting Company

(NBC) in a 12-year study entitled "Television and Aggression: A Panel Study." Conclusions of the recently released study indicated that there was no relationship between violence on TV and aggression in society.

However, a professor of radio-TV film at Texas Christian University said because the study did not find a relationship between television violence and aggression does not prove there is none.

"What most people don't understand is that there is a difference between proving that a thing is false and failing to prove it is true," said Dr. Charles Beadle. "This study does not attempt to answer many questions of concern to parents, educators or the public in general."

The 500-page study could easily be "boiled down to fewer than a dozen pages of useful information," he said.

The study began in 1970 and was published in 1982. "This gives the impression that this is truly a longitudinal study. Unfortunately the data was collected only between 1970 and 1973," said Beadle.

Fort Worth, Tx, and Minneapolis, Mn, were the two cities selected for the study. Researchers wanted an urban community in the Central time zone. Fort Worth had almost four times more murder and non-neglect manslaughter than Minneapolis during the period of study where 58 boys were rated for both aggression and viewing measures.

"There is no doubt that NBC expected to find no relationship between television and aggression," continued Beadle. "The experimenters knew this. No matter how hard they tried to bend over backwards to be fair, they no doubt were subconsciously predisposed to that outcome. Research must be totally blind and double removed from its funding source."

**BBB Issues Alert**

**On Mag Subscriptions**

The Better Business Bureau of the South Plains has received calls from all over the South Plains area regarding a company called TRADE-TECH out of San Diego, Ca. going door to door selling magazine subscriptions. As far as this office knows, none of the representatives of this company have permits to peddle in Lubbock.

According to the BBB / San Diego, this company is too new in their area to issue a report, however; they also have them listed as Star Gazers out of Las Vegas, Nevada. A check with the BBB / Las Vegas reveals that Star Gazers is owned by Lonnie Devine and the company has the same address and principals as a company called Magnet and a company called Star Press International a/k/a National Press & Associates. Bureau files on National Press & Associates shows that the company is out of

Florida and that the Orange County Circuit Court issued a default final judgement against Lonnie Devine and David L. Combs, owners, charging them with non-delivery of books and magazines, failure to give refunds, and misrepresentation. They have also been ordered to relieve themselves of any interest in Star Press International and National Press & Associates must reimburse injured consumers, and forfeit all property. The final hearing was April 15, 1983 and any consumers who had complaints after that date should forward them to the Federal Trade Commission's Atlanta regional office.

Representatives of TRADE-TECH are presently in the Lubbock area selling their magazine subscriptions and based on Bureau files, BBB / South Plains advises caution in dealing with this company. Company representatives are requesting checks to be made out to "CASH" so if you were to have a complaint, you would not have proof that you gave the check to the company. The representatives do not have a license to peddle in Lubbock and from the calls this office has received, they have not obtained licenses anywhere else on the South Plains either.

If you are approached by a representative of TRADE-TECH or any other company, ask to see their license to peddle (they should also be wearing an i.d. badge in Lubbock) and if they cannot produce such i.d., call the Police Department immediately.

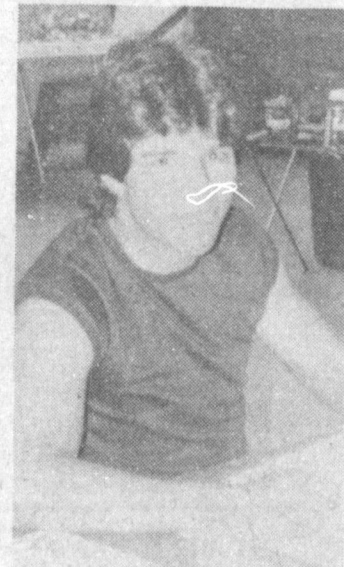

## Three Out Of Six Ain't Half Bad

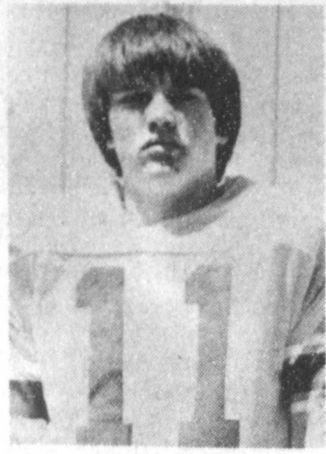
Three out of six ain't half bad-----and, Coach Brent Fountain has three Three Way Eagles who are listed as some of the leading high school athletes in sixman football this season.

The Eagles have been officially dubbed by area sports writers and several coaches as the team that "just doesn't quit." Although Three Way is listed about sixth in both offense and defense statistics for six man teams, that ranking is not indicative of the ability of three particular members of Fountain's squad.

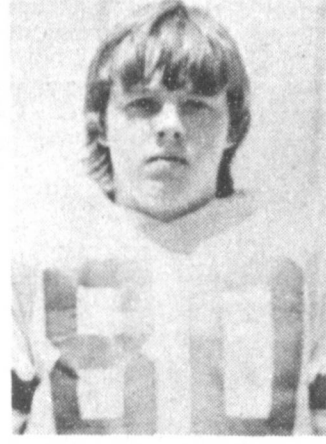
These three outstanding members of the Eagles include Bret Stegall, Brad Stegall and Steve Roberts.

Bret Stegall, an up-and-coming sophomore quarterback, has attempted passes 163 times this season, completing 73 with only 9 interceptions. Stegall has passed for a total of 1072 yards and 18 touchdowns and averages 134 yards per game passing. One of the good things about Stegall is the fact that he is a sophomore, and Coach Fountain is "tickled to death" to have him in the lineup for two more years.

Perhaps a lot of Bret Stegall's success can be related with his brother Brad. Brad Stegall is the current leading receiver in six man high school football. With eight games under his belt, he has been on the receiving end of 33 passes from brother Bret, for a total of 592 yards and an average of 17.9 yards per catch. Brad has been personally responsible for fourteen



BRET STEGALL



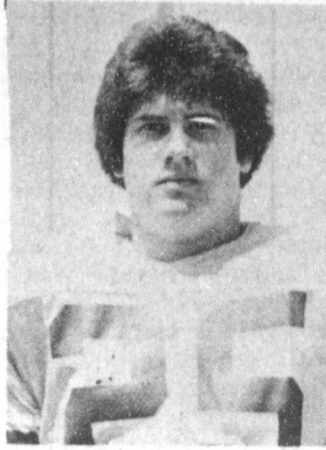

touchdowns and has totaled 85 points for the Eagles. He has an average of 4.1 carries per game. He is also listed on the top scorer's list in six man play.

Steve Roberts is the third man in this trio, and when the playing goes to the trenches, Roberts is usually the man up front. In rushing yardage Steve has carried 117 times in eight games for a total of 1015 yards so far. He averages about 9 yards a carry and 126.9 yards rushing per game. Roberts is listed as the fourth leading scorer in six man and has 17 TD's to his credit. He's also the kicker for the Eagles and is responsible for 139 points

on the board in both TD's and kicks. Roberts is also very adept as a receiver.

Bret Stegall recently earned area high school player of the week honors after his performance against a tough Wellman team. Bret passed in that

game for a total of 372 yards and five touchdowns. Out of 55 attempts, Stegall connected on 30 of his passes for the total of 372 yards.

Brad Stegall also had an outstanding game against Wellman, with 184 yards in 11 receptions; and Roberts had 108 yards in 12 receptions.

Of course, as any sportsman knows, these three do not make the entire team, and Three Way has a number of other outstanding players who all contribute to the team in their own ways. The Stegall boys and Roberts, however, have distinguished themselves in the six man football ranks and are therefore due the recognition.

This is Coach Brent Fountain's first year at Three Way, and at six man football, but you can bet it won't be his last.

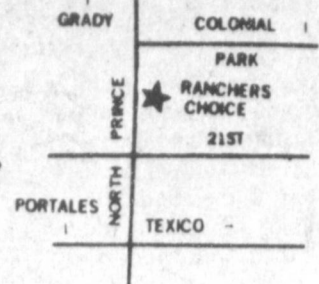
