The extra point attempt was blown wide right and the Harvesters lead 6-0.


However, the defense, which played well, allowed the home run ball on a third down and two situation allowed the Dumas runner to round the corner and 55 yards later tied the score.

cer of Amarillo Community Federal Credit Union, deferred comment on the robbery to authorities Monday.









Tragedy in Benghazi borne of ignorance and intolerance

"Men never do evil so completely and so cheerfully as when they do it from religious conviction."

That famous epigram was found in the notes left by the 17th-century French mathematician and philosopher Blaise Pascal, who was preparing a defense of the Christian faith when he died in 1662. The evils wrought by Hitler and Stalin believe it. What happened in Libya on Tuesday suggests it still holds some truth.

Angered by a scurrilous video mocking the Prophet Muhammad, apparently filmed with the support of right-wing Christians, Libyan Muslims attacked the U.S. consulate in Benghazi. Among them, and perhaps inciting them, was a squad of well-armed Islamist militants. Four U.S. diplomats were killed, among them Ambassador J. Christopher Stevens.

The protests quickly spread to Egypt, where the U.S. Embassy was overrun, but without casualties. On Wednesday the protests spread to Yemen, Tunisia, Iraq and Iran. The Quran, while not explicitly forbidding visual depictions of Muhammad, makes it clear that his name and image are to be honored. Some supplemental teachings are stricter, and in some Muslim sects, the faithful rise up in what they see as righteous anger.

Which is, of course, what some Christianist sects in this country do in opposition to the Muslim faith. Christians and Muslims have been killing each other in God's name since the 7th century. Reason does not signify.

Secretary of State Hillary Clinton asked an important question Wednesday morning in eulogizing Mr. Stevens: "Today, many Americans are asking -- indeed, I asked myself -- how could this happen? How could this happen in a country we helped liberate, in a city we helped save from destruction? This question reflects just how complicated and, at times, how confounding the world can be."

Many people don't do well with complicated and

Republicans + Nazis = apples and oranges

Maybe comparing Republicans to Nazis started with the 1964 Goldwater/Johnson presidential race.

Republican presidential candidate Barry Goldwater accepted an invitation to visit an American military installation located in Bavaria, Germany. On "CBS Evening News" hosted by Walter Cronkite, correspondent Daniel Schorr said: "It is now clear that Sen. Goldwater's interview with Der Spiegel, with its hard line appealing to right-wing elements in Germany, was only the start of a move to link up with his opposite numbers in Germany." The reaction shot -- when the cameras returned to Cronkite -showed the "most trusted man in America" gravely shaking his head.

Or maybe it began when Goldwater accepted the Republican nomination, and Democratic California Gov. Pat Brown said the "stench of fascism is in the air."

Or maybe Republicans-as-fascists narrative really jumpstarted during the 1968 presidential campaign. For commentary at the political conventions that year, ABC hired left-wing pundit Gore Vidal and matched him with conservative pundit William F. Buckley. If the network was looking for fireworks, they were not disappointed. Quarreling with Buckley over the

impact of anti-Vietnam War dissidents, Gore called Buckley a "crypto-Nazi." Incensed, Buckley fired back: "Now listen, you queer, stop calling me a crypto-Nazi, or I'll sock you in your goddamn face and you'll stay plastered."

More recently, former Vice President Al Gore said: "(George W. Bush's) executive branch has made it a practice to try and control and intimidate news organizations, from PBS to CBS to Newsweek. ... And every day, they unleash squadrons of digital brownshirts to harass and hector any journalist who is critical of the president."

Entertainer and liberal activist Harry Belafonte, when asked whether the number and prominence of blacks in the Bush administration suggested a (SET ITAL) lack (END ITAL) of racism, said, "Hitler had a lot of Jews high up in the hierarchy of the Third Reich."

Then-NAACP Chairman Julian Bond pulled out the Nazi card in 2004 while criticizing congressional Republicans and the White House: "They preach racial equality but practice racial division. ... Their idea of equal rights is the American flag and Confederate swastika flying side by side."

Bond later fied whom he meant by "they." Speaking at historically black Fayetteville State University in North Carolina in 2006, Bond said, "The Republican Party would have the American flag and the swastika flying side by side."

Wisconsin Gov. Scott Walker, who dared to rein in excessive public employee compensation packages, received the full Nazi treatment. The hardleft blog Libcom.org wrote: "Scott Walker is a fascist, perhaps not in the classical sense since he doesn't operate in the streets, but a fascist nonetheless. ... He is a fascist, for his program takes immediate and direct aim at (a sector of) the working class ..."

This brings us to the recently concluded Republican National Convention. California Democratic Party Chairman John Burton offered this analysis: "(Republicans) lie, and they don't care if people think they lie. As long as you lie, (Nazi propaganda minister) Joseph Goebbels -- the big lie -you keep repeating it."

dismissing Republicans' concern over the possibility of voter fraud, Pat Lehman, a leading member of the Kansas delegation, told The Wichita Eagle: "It's like Hitler said, if you're going to tell a lie, tell a big lie, and if you tell it often enough and say it in a loud enough voice, some people are going to believe you."

Next up, we have the chairman of the South Carolina Democratic Party. Dick Harpootlian compared the state's Republican governor to Hitler's mistress. When told that the Republicans were holding a competing press conference at a NASCAR Hall of Fame basement studio, Harpootlian told the South Carolina delegation: "(Gov. Nikki Haley) was down in the bunker, a la Eva Braun."

How casually Democrats make Hitler-Nazi-fascist references to demean their political opponents is astonishing. By calling political opponents "fascists" because of policy disagreements, Democrats trivialize a regime responsible for exterminating 6 million Jews in a war that resulted in the deaths of over 50 million people.

Where does this cavalier Nazi talk take us?

In 1994, schoolteachers in Oakland, Calif., took 70 mostly black high school students to see "Schindler's List." Some of the kids began laughing during a scene where a Jewish woman was mercilessly killed. In a Los Angeles Times opinion piece called "Why Would Anyone Laugh at 'Schindler's List'?" a theater employee wrote: "A three-hour-plus film in black and white about the Holocaust may not be everyone's choice, but those who decide to view it must be prepared and understand. I find it hard to believe kids today are so desensitized to violence that when they see the strange convulsions of someone who's been shot, their first instinct is to laugh. If one of their friends was gunned down on the way home, would they stand there and burst into laughter at the way he/she died?"

Oakland This students/"Schindler's List" disconnect is aided and abetted by leftists like Gore, Bond and Burton who shout words like "Nazi" or "fascist" or "Hitler" at conservatives.

And, no, it appears they have no shame.

John Stossel: Discussing all of the Clinton myths

Bill Clinton got rave reviews for his speech at the Democratic National Convention. My wife said: "Clinton was great. He made Republicans look like liars and losers." Clinton, now a sainted elder statesman, also gets credit for the booming economy of the '90s.

Today, he appears in an Obama commercial -- in full "I feel your pain" mode -- saying that Obama "has a plan to rebuild America from the ground up."

When someone claims anyone can rebuild a society from the ground up, I say he is arrogant and delusional.

Clinton then tries to scare viewers by telling them that Republicans want to "go back to deregulation. That's what got us in trouble in the first place."

Ah, the progressives' George W. Bush deregulation myth: Bush's anti-regulation crusade caused our problems. This is a lie that seems true because of constant media repetition. In fact, Bush talked deregulation but vastly increased the regulatory state. He hired an astounding 90,000 new regulators. Under Democrats and Republicans, regulation

A rare exception was repeal of the Glass-Steagall Act, which forbade financial companies from offering both commercial and investment banking services. You know who signed that?

Bill Clinton.

He was right to sign it (backed by Treasury Secretary and later Obama adviser Larry Summers) because outlawing full-service banking put American banks at a competitive disadvantage.

Five years earlier, Clinton supported the Riegle-Neal Interstate Banking and Branching Efficiency Act, which

finally legalized interstate branch banking. Federal and state laws that forbade intrastate and interstate branch banking -- that is, diversification -- were one of the worst features of American finance. They made banks highly vulnerable to failure of specific business centers and farm communities, helping to make the Great Depression what it was. (By contrast, Canada had no such restrictions and no bank

failures.) So Clinton -- not Bush -- was the bank deregulator. Were those acts responsible for the financial debacle of 2008? No. Bear Stearns, Lehman, etc. were not affiliated with commercial banks.

Banks got in trouble because they filled their portfolios with securities built on shaky mortgages. And here is where Clinton (SET ITAL) does (END ITAL) bear responsibility.

His secretary of housing and urban development was Andrew Cuomo, now governor of New York and apparent presidential wan-

Cuomo, as Wayne Barrett wrote in the Village Voice in 2008, made a series of decisions that "helped plunge Fannie and Freddie into the subprime markets without putting in place the means to monitor their increasingly risky investments. He turned the Federal Housing Administration mortgage program into a sweetheart lender with sky-high loan ceilings and no money down, and he legalized what a federal judge has branded 'kickbacks' to brokers that have fueled the sale of overpriced and unsupportable loans. Three to four million families are now facing foreclosure, and Cuomo is one of the reasons why."

Barrett goes "Perhaps the only domestic issue George Bush and Bill Clinton were in complete agreement about was maximizing home ownership, each trying to lay claim to a record percentage of hom-

HUD, Fannie and Freddie were their instruments, and as is now apparent, the more unsavory the means, the greater the growth. ... (Cuomo) did more to set these forces of unregulated expansion in motion than any other secretary and then boasted about it, presenting his initiatives as crusades for racial and social justice."

Naturally, Clinton's HUD secretary became New York's attorney general, he vowed to prosecute unscrupulous lenders. I'm waiting for him to prosecute himself.

President Clinton happily takes credit for reducing America's budget deficit and presiding over a period of strong economic growth. But this happened not because of wise leadership. Clinton had the good fortune to reside in the White House just as the high-tech information revolution kicked in and a Republican Congress stopped him

from spending what Democrats wanted to spend.

Progressives say that his increase of the top tax bracket did not prevent economic growth, but it never occurs to them that growth would have been even stronger had government not confiscated that money.

Sadly, most who watched St. Bill at the DNC will never know the truth.

We want to do everything possible to help keep our children safe when getting on and off the bus. I want to remind the community that passing school busses when stopped are putting children at risk of getting hit by the oncoming traffic. Texas Law requires drivers

to stop before reaching the school bus when the bus has activated its red flashing lights and displays a stop sign. Drivers may proceed when the bus resumes motion, the operator signals the driver to proceed, or the visual sig-nals are no longer acti-vated. to caution you about ongoing scams here in Pampa. Criminals scam in anyway there is communication such as, phone, mail, e-mail, and yes texting. They claim to be with different legit company to try to gain your trust. There are a few scams that the Police Department keeps seeing here in Pampa.

One of the main scams we keep seeing is the check cashing scheme, where a scammer will claim to be with a legit company and will send a check to you; unknown to the victim, the check or money order is fraudulent. The scammer will

then ask the victim to cash the check and keep part of the money but send the rest through WESTERN UNION or MoneyGram to them. I want to STRONGLY discourage anyone sending money through Western Union or MoneyGram unless you know the person accepting the money Personally.

We have also been

We have also been getting calls of scammers calling and "phishing" for information. For an example; the scammers will call and say they are with a well know company or government agency such as Medicare. They

will typically have your address, phone number and full name. They will then ask you to confirm your bank account number or social security number. Citizens have also said that when they have refused the caller the information they requested the scammer will get very agitated and threaten the citizens and in most cases the scammer would hang up on the citizen.

Again, I strongly encourage citizens not to give personal information over the phone. Thankfully the citizens we have spoken to have not fallen in the trap of theses scammers.

Remember, YOU ARE the number one person who can stop the criminals from scamming you!
