Tax rate up for city vote on Tuesday

PAMPA — The City Commission on Tuesday will consider formally extending its current tax rate of .621027 per \$100 valuation for other

Tuesday's will be the second and final vote on the matter. It went through two hearings unchallenged and passed unanimously unanimously through the commission's first reading and vote on Sept. 11.

Sept. 18 was the first official city commission vote on the tax rate.

Any tax increases this year will be due to increased property values, not the unchanged tax rate, Pampa City Manager Richard Morris has said.

In other business, on Tuesday, the commission will:

- Consider adopting on second and final reading — an ordinance amending the monthly rates charged for water within and outside the cor-
- porate limits of the city of Pampa. Consider adopting — on second and final reading — an ordinance of the city of Pampa amending the monthly rates charged for sewer service within and outside the corporate limits of the city of Pampa.
- Consider adopting on second and final reading — an ordinance amending rates for solid waste disposal for residential and other customers within and outside the corporate limits of the city of Pampa.

GCARC holds its popular Autumn ride this Sept. 29

PAMPA — Officials are urging area residents to turn out en masse Sept. 29 for the annual autumn trail ride sponsored by Gray County Association for Retarded Citizens. The rain date is Oct. 13.

The ride, the primary fundraising event for the organization is for the benefit of the Sheltered Workshop. This year their primary goal is to raise \$50,000 to build a much-needed aboveground tornado shel-

The site of this year's ride will be the Chris Britten Ranch near Howardwick.

The Britten family extended an invitation for the event. Riders are required to have their own horses, which must have proof of a valid Coggins test.

The ride will begin about 9 a.m., but registration will open at 8 a.m. It is helpful if riders can fill out entry forms ahead of time or call so that there can be an idea of how many to plan for. Entry fee for the ride is \$30 per person, and includes lunch and snacks.

Each rider is asked, if possible, to collect donations or sponsorships for their ride. Prizes are given for the most funds raised over a minimum amount, and include gift

certificates to Horse and Rider, Wayne's Western Wear, feed, and hay. The donations should be made to GCARC, and are 100 percent tax deductible.

GCARC is in the process of a name change to Panhandle Association for the Intellectually Disabled, or PAID, but will continue to operate under the old name until the change is official.





Time to change the state of politics??

"I hate Obama!"

"Bush is an idiot."

"I loathe that Romney."

How many times have you heard something close to this regarding a candidate for high office?

Too often, probably.

If you have ever said that yourself or have at least thought something like that before, you have just been manipulated by the protectors of our two-party system.

With all the money now flowing into the public sector -- both in terms of government largesse and the campaigns to get into power and control all of that wealth -- the stakes for ascending to political office have never been higher.

On one hand, negative campaigning is not novel -- some of the campaigns from the 19th century in America were shockingly vile. The difference is, what separated candidates back then were actual ideas and ideology. Since government only made up a tiny percentage of the nation's economy, getting elected was not about a windfall of power, money and largesse; it was about the honor of service and the ability to imprint one's ideology on the country's future.

Not anymore. It's all about power -- getting it and retaining it.

The proliferation of lobbying money, political action committees and the growth of government itself have made holding high state and most any federal office a valuable position. Yes, there are still some true ideologues in Washington but not as many as who claim that moniker.

Mostly, our federal government is made up of career politicians who have rigged the game in favor of the status quo and who battle over the head of a pin needle to see who can tip the balance of power toward one party or another.

While voter apathy plagues the nation, the party leaders know exactly what to do get their bases out to vote in November -- demonize the opponent. And too many of us fall for it, year after year.

The truth is, there really isn't that much ideological difference between the two parties. Republicans are allegedly for lower taxes, but they are often guilty of raising them. Democrats are allegedly in favor of civil liberties, but they are quick to insert government into our everyday lives.

No, it's not ideology that separates most candidates from the two major parties. But they create the illusion of big differences so that you will vote against the other guy. Think about it -- in local elections, when you are voting for people you know, you likely are casting your ballot for somebody. But too often, in federal elections, it seems like people are as much voting against a candidate -- or, even worse, people holding their noses and voting for the "lesser of two evils."

The minute people realize that they are being used and manipulated is the day we can move toward changing the dreadful system that American politics has become.

So there I am, pulling into a gas station in my town, and Tarek is smiling. He owns the station, and right now he's charging me \$4.25 a gallon. American motorists may not be better off than they were four years ago, but Tarek certainly When President Barack Obama

took office, the average price for a gallon of regular gas was \$1.84. That means gas prices have more than doubled on Obama's watch. But why? The primary reason is that the

system is rigged. Oil companies watch the worldwide speculation market, and if the traders are bidding the price of oil up because Iran misbehaves or something, up goes the pump price. When the speculators sell short, the price of gasoline drops, but not nearly so much as it jumped. That cycle is repeated a few times a year.

Then there's OPEC, which raises

prices every time the United States pumps dollars in the economy. Last week, the Fed released \$23 billion into the marketplace, hoping the cash would spur lending by the banks. The oil sheiks well understand that flooding the zone with currency devalues the worth of the dollar, so they raise their prices to get more greenbacks in the hope of keeping their staggering profits

Another reason Americans are getting hosed at the pump is that President Obama loathes the fossil fuel industry and does everything he can to inhibit production. He stopped the oil pipeline from Canada, makes ocean drilling very difficult and taxes the hell out of traditional energy. Of course, the folks pay the taxes. Obama is a green guy, and his

administration has invested about \$100 billion of taxpayer money in clean energy projects. In theory, that sounds good. Wind power, solar energy, electric cars -- all would make the planet cleaner and the sheiks poorer. The problem is

that the technology is not devel-

oped yet. The president knows that


but tilts at windmills anyway. In truth, the USA does not have an energy policy. The Department of Energy apparently has a giant dartboard, and whatever alternative energy industry is hit that day gets money. The bankrupt Solyndra solar company cost the taxpayers more than \$500 million. Other failed green enterprises have added to the incredible national debt, as

A few people are riding around in electric cars -- something that infuriates Tarek -- but not many. Those automobiles are generally expensive, and the plug-in stuff is complicated. American society is largely driven (sorry) by easy, convenient products. Risking electrocution in a rainstorm while firing up a Prius might hold some folks back.

Finally, there may be big trouble ahead at the gas station. If Israel attacks Iran over nukes, worldwide oil prices will explode, as well. \$8 a gallon? Could happen.

John Stossel: 'I like Gary Johnson'

I Like Gary Johnson

All political candidates call themselves freedomlovers, but they are not. Neither major party really opposes government control of the economy or of our personal lives. I'm a libertarian because I see the false choice offered by political left and right: Democrats talk about personal liberty; Republicans talk about economic freedom. But what they do once in power belies their words.

I say we're best off if government just leaves us alone to our peaceful cooperation with whomever we please. Let politicians (SET ITAL) advocate (END ITAL) moral behavior. Let them give to charities. But leave government -- which is physical force -- out of it.

That's why I like Gary Johnson, the former Republican governor of New Mexico. He's the Libertarian Party candidate for president. As governor, Johnson vetoed 750 bills, and yet he got re-elected in that blue state.

I asked Johnson what it means to be a libertarian.

"Fiscally responsible, socially accepting ... more liberal than Obama on several issues, more conservative than Romney on several issues."

Johnson proposes to cut federal spending by more than 43 percent: "Balance the federal bud-

get now. I think that unless we do that, we're going to find ourselves in a monetary collapse." To do that, he'd go where the money is. He'd cut the

big programs that will soon bankrupt us. That includes Medicare. Conventional wisdom says what he's proposing is cruel and, for a politician, suicidal. "Look, we've got to slash

Medicare spending. If we don't, we're going to find ourselves with no health care whatsoever. Medicaid, same thing. Military spending, same thing."

The left claims that without social spending, people would starve in the streets!

"This is the exact reaction that I got as governor of New Mexico, having vetoed all that legislation. ... Kids were going to starve, all the worst things were going to happen, and none of them did. And I got re-elected."

Who would decide what part of Medicare to cut?

"Give this up to the states. Fifty laboratories of innovation and best practice ... (instead of) Washington top-down, Washingtonknows-best -- that's what has us in the situation that we're in right now."

Johnson also says, "End the wars." Won't a pullout of our troops mean the ter-

"We have hundreds of millions of enemies ... that, but for our military interventions, we would not otherwise have. So let's take military spending back to 2003 spending levels. Start out with the premise that we should provide ourselves with a strong national defense. But 'defense' here is the operative word. Not 'offense' and not 'nation-building.' We're building roads, schools, bridges, highways and hospitals in (SET ITAL) other (END ITAL) countries, and we have those needs here in this country."

In one of Johnson's campaign ads, he compares the U.S. Constitution to the U.S. tax code.

"One is simple and about equal rights for all. The other is extremely complex and anything but equal rights for all. It's crony capitalism in a nutshell. It's the root of evil. Individuals, groups, corporations pay for loopholes. Both parties sell those loopholes. Eliminate the IRS. Abolish income tax (and) corporate tax."

How will government get

"With a national consumption tax. I'm embracing the Fair Tax. ... Adopting the Fair Tax would issue pink slips to half of Washington lobbyists."

Johnson would also legalize marijuana.

"Control it, regulate it, tax it."

I like Johnson's message: Let no one be coerced by government beyond the small amount needed to fund a limited government that keeps us safe. Do not let government forcibly take other people's money. When in doubt, leave it out -- or rather, leave it to the market and other voluntary institutions.

But sadly that's not how most people think. Most people think problems are things that are solved by laws. They assume it's just the laziness or stupidity of the "other" side's politicians that prevents government from solving our problems.

But government raresolves problems. Government is inefficient. There's almost nothing government can do that we cannot do better as free individuals and groups of individuals working together voluntarily.

Without big government, our possibilities are limit-
