

Early voting for the 2012 General Election continues on the second floor of the Gray County Courthouse until Friday, Nov. 2.

Hours are 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. There is no waiting and early voters are usually in and out within a few minutes.

Voters need to bring their registration cards. If you cannot find your card, then you can bring your driver's license instead.

If you vote at the polls on Tuesday, Nov. 6, you will need either your registration card or driver's license.

Polls open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. and there is handicap access at all seven locations. Poll locations are:



Super Playground will be dismantled STAFF REPORT

The aging Super Playground equipment at West Highland Park will soon be dismantled and the city will install two new playground sets at popular park

locations.

The new equipment will be installed at Central Park and Recreation Park.

The target date for the playground systems to be ready for kids to play on is Jan. 1, weather permitting, said Pampa Public Works Director Donny Hooper.

Hooper said the two new play-

ground systems will provide upgrades to the already popular park locations and give kids more opportunity for outdoor activity and recreation.

"The new playground equipment will be really nice. It is something I think the community will be very proud of," he said.

The city will begin next week the dismantling of the Super Playground, which has been closed for the past few weeks

due to dangerous conditions. Hooper said the park has reached a point of disrepair and that city leaders, along with the Pampa Rotary Club, who had originally raised funds for the

Super Playground, have agreed the park has reached the end of

its life span. "It is very sad that we have to tear it down," Hooper said. "It has been a great attraction and has provided so much toward quality of life here-in Pampa."

He will also participate in the soccer match that will follow, his speech.


The soccer match, as with all the events sponsored by Wheel time Inc., will have volunteers and participants on the field at the same time.

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


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


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

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New York jailers worry about dental floss as weapon

WHITE PLAINS, N.Y. (AP) — Dental floss may prevent toothaches, but it's given jailers plenty of headaches.

When a group of New York prisoners sued last month to demand access to dental floss, officials said they had to consider "security issues." As it turns out, jail — and jail-break — history is tightly tangled with the stringy

decay fighter.

In Texas, officials believe a prisoner used floss to cut his way out of his cell, then jumped a fellow inmate and knifed him

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In Maryland, Illinois,
West Virginia and
Wisconsin, inmates collected enough floss to
braid it into ropes and
escape, or try to, over

prison walls.

A group of escaped prisoners on the run in Texas used floss to sew up their

gunshot wounds.

And a man in an Illinois jail used floss to stitch together the dummy he left in his bed when he took off.

Experts say floss, or the plastic holder it sometimes comes in, has been used to strangle enemies, to escape, to saw through bars, to pick handcuffs, to make a hand grip on a shank and to hoist contraband from one level of

cells to another.

"These inmates can
make a weapon out of a
chewing gum wrapper,"
said Steven Kayser, whose
company sells a floss
product advertised as pris-

on-safe. "Floss is right up there on the danger list."

Officials at the Westchester County Jail in Valhalla were somewhat leery when 11 inmates, acting without a lawyer, filed a \$500 million lawsuit demanding access to dental floss.

Lead plaintiff Santiago Gomez said the jail was "violating inmates' federally protected civil rights by not allowing inmates access to dental floss, while acknowledging that it will result in cavities if you fail to floss your teeth."

He said the inmates had been brushing three times a day, "tongue and gums included," but were still getting cavities, bleeding gums, enduring constant tooth drilling and mental anguish.

Deputy Commissioner Justin Pruyne said the jail is not required to supply floss to inmates and said floss posed security concerns. But the jail has since brought in a supply of Kayser's "Floss Loops" — circles of rubbery floss with no hard plastic that are designed to break easily before they can be used as a weapon.

It's not clear if that has satisfied the prisoners.
The lawsuit has not been dropped

An episode of the science TV show "Mythbusters" a few years ago set up an experiment to challenge the floss-as-security-risk theory. The show used a floss-equipped robot to test whether floss — combined with toothpaste to make it more abrasive —

could really saw through a bar on a jail cell.

The feat was declared "plausible," given 300 days at eight hours a day — the kind of time that an inmate might have.

Regulations of prison floss vary around the

In northeastern Texas, officials believe Antonio Lara used dental floss and toothpaste to saw his way out of a cell at a county jail and kill a gang rival in 2000.

"We do not carry traditional dental floss because of security concerns," said Jason Clark, spokesman for the Coffield Unit near Palestine, Texas. "Floss can be used to make ropes, weapons, cut through bars, even just reinforce the grip on a shank."

Instead, inmates are allowed plastic holders with a small piece of floss stretched across, he said.


In California, the state approves Floss Loops. Regular floss can be used as a garrote, said Terry Thornton, spokeswoman for the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation.

"But for that matter, you can pull thread from your socks or bed linens to choke someone. It's not just razor blades and toothbrush shanks in prison. We've seen underwear used as a weapon."

New York's state prison system permits dental floss, but only the unwaxed variety. The waxed is "much stronger," said spokesman Peter Cutler.

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Self-interest works best in the marketplace

On TV, my Fox colleague Bill O'Reilly says, "The recession was brought on largely by greedy Wall Street corporations.'

Give me a break. Bill's smart. If he believes such things, we who care about freedom have done a poor job communicating econom-

Blaming problems on 'greed" is a mindless cliche. Yes, Wall

Street was greedy but that's nothing new. Greed is a constant. Did you ever turn down a raise? We need a

free market because it restrains greed. Laws against theft and fraud help, but competition does more. With this election approaching, and statist, eager-toregulate candidates in ascent, we need more Americans to understand

The statist left says it's government's job to protect consumers and help poor people. But greed more precisely, the pursuit of self-interest in the free market would work better. The market (if not corrupted by corporate welfare and bailouts) harmonizes the interests of diverse people who don't even know each other and might not even like each other. It motivates them to work hard to serve customers.

When markets are free (alas, ours is not; in America today, too often people "partner" with politicians and get rich through government), those who charge too much, or skimp on quality or service, lose money to competitors who serve people better.

What could be more humane? Nothing has done more than markets to lift people out of the mud and misery of primitive life.

But progressive blogger Sally Kohn argues: "We all have a little greed in us. The question is, what values do we hold alongside greed as a society ... so that we operate for the better good of everyone?" What values? My

vision of the "better good" may be different from hers. I don't want government to decide for me

"Property rights constrain self-interest," libertarian economist Donald Boudreaux pointed out. "We're all self-interested. We care more about ourselves, our family and our loved ones than we care about strangers. ... The problem with government is that it is the institution that best allows people to grab more than what they deserve.'

That's what happened under communism and increasingly, it's happening in America. As Joseph Sobran put it: "'Need' now means wanting someone else's money. 'Greed' means wanting to keep your own. 'Compassion' is when a politician arranges the transfer."

This is a threat to freedom and the route to stagnation.

Kohn rightly objects to "crony capitalism facilitated by government," but goes on to highlight government's "positive side ... values of community."

Whoa! "Community" is a loaded word. Statists misuse it to criticize individualism, as though the two don't coexist, as if, without government, people don't work together. But this is nonsense. Real communities emerge organically from individuals who volunteer to come together for common purpose. Communities are not created by government edict, which amounts to a threat of violence against peaceful people. As classical liberals like Herbert Spencer and F.A. Hayek taught, there is no conflict between individualism and social cooperation. These are two sides of the same coin of freedom. Individualists form families, clubs, charities, churches and softball leagues, and participate in thousands of voluntary communities.

But what about the poor? Kohn said government is needed to assure equality, just as parents make sure a cake is not unfairly divided among family members.

"The reality is ... we have fixed resources."

Auto bailout could be key to Obama victory in Ohio

LORDSTOWN, Ohio (AP) — President Barack Obama's decision to help America's automakers

autos and Obama's campaign constantly reminds voters they'd be jobless if not for the decision to inject taxpayer dollars into General Motors and Chrysler. However, the move has not translated into automatic support for the president, even in areas that depend on the industry. Republican Mitt Romney also is pitching these voters hard with his message that Obama hasn't balanced Washington's checkbook the same way voters must.

One in eight jobs in Ohio can be linked to the auto industry — whether it's working on a factory floor or selling groceries

to plant workers. The presidential race's outcome could boil down to whether voters interpret

Obama's move as saving Detroit or bailing it out. But like other flashpoints in this rough campaign, there is little middle ground between the versions of

for voters' neighbors. "I couldn't imagine what Lordstown would be," said Brian Axiotis, a 37-year-old Obama supporter who works in information technology and lives in nearby Newton Falls. "A lot of folks would lose their houses. Consider the mess that would have resulted. It'd be a ghost town all over the area."

Texas executes convicted killer for 1991 slaying

HUNTSVILLE, Texas (AP) — Convicted killer Bobby Lee Hines was executed Wednesday for strangling and repeatedly stabbing a suburban Dallas woman at her apartment 21 years ago.

Hines, 40, was 19 and on probation for burglary when he stabbed 26-year-old Michelle Wendy Haupt 18 times and strangled her with a cord. Haupt had moved from the Pittsburgh area to Carrollton to work at a computer company in Dallas, and Hines was staying next door with a maintenance man for her apartment complex.

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Asked by a warden to make a final statement, Hines repeatedly asked for forgiveness.

"I know that I took somebody special from y'all," he said as Haupt's father stood a few feet away, watching through a window. "I know it wasn't right, it was wrong. I wish could give it back, but I know I can't.

"I wish there was something I could do."

He said he loved his family, believed life in prison would be a worse punishment, and then declared that he was "going home."

As the lethal dose of pentobarbital was administered, he said he could feel it and was stopped in midsentence. He snored once, then slipped into unconsciousness. Twelve minutes later, at 6:28 p.m., he was pronounced dead.

"It's like a backache, it never goes away," Harold Haupt said afterward about the pain of losing his daughter. "It's always

"On the upside of this, Bobby Hines paid the ultimate price, a life for a life, and that's the good news. The bad news is it took 21 years, a lot of taxpayer money and all he did was go to sleep. He didn't suffer like my daughter did. He got like a forever sleeping pill."

In the pre-dawn hours of Oct. 20, 1991, a neighbor heard screaming and called police, but officers were unable to find the source. When other residents told the apartment manager later that day about screams and loud noises that sounded like a bowling ball being dropped repeatedly, they persuaded him to open Haupt's door and found her dead.

Hines was arrested that day. Hines' older brother, a manager at the complex,

told police he suspected ment. He was scheduled his brother was involved, according to court records. And witnesses said Hines had bragged about having a passkey that allowed him to enter anyone's apartment.

Police interviewed Hines, noticed he had scratches on his face and neck, and got consent from his roommate to search the apartment. Detectives found Haupt's blood on Hines' clothing and several things that had belonged to her, including a distinctive gold charm she wore on a necklace.

Hines was tried and convicted in March 1992.

He initially was scheduled to die in 2003, but his execution was delayed for eight years until the courts resolved claims that he was mentally impaired and, thus, ineligible for capital punishto die in May and the U.S. Supreme Court refused to review his case, but the Dallas County district attorney's office again delayed the execution so that new DNA testing could be conducted. Those tests confirmed Hines' guilt, and the punishment was reset.

Relatives and friends of Hines filed a federal civil rights lawsuit Tuesday against the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, top agency officials and prison wardens and "all persons involved" in Hines' execution, contending their rights had been violated because Hines had been on death row more than two decades and that his lawyers had been misleading. A federal judge in Houston dismissed the suit Wednesday.

Last week, the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals rejected an appeal from Hines, whose lawyer argued previous attorneys failed to investigate and show how Hines had been abused by his father.

William Hughey, who was one of Hines' trial lawyers and is now a state district judge in East Texas, recalled Hines' case as one "where it was clear his childhood had significant impact as to who he was and how he ended up."

Hines, who had declined to speak with reporters, first was arrested at age 12 for auto theft and had other arrests for assault and burglary. He was on 10 years' probation when the slaying occurred.

Obama assails opponent Romney in bid for women's vote

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) — A scratchy-voiced President Barack Obama powered through a sleepless drive to get his supporters to vote Thursday and planned to set an example by becoming the first president to cast his own ballot ahead of time.

With a new Associated Press-GfK poll showing that Republican Mitt Romney has erased Obama's 16-point advantage among women, the president tried to keep a GOP abortion controversy alive. The risers behind him stacked with female supporters, Obama made a veiled reference to Indiana Senate candidate Richard Mourdock's comment that pregnancies resulting from rape are "something God intended."

"As we saw again this week, I don't think any politician in Washington, most of whom are male, should be making health care decisions for women," Obama said. "Women can make those decisions themselves."

It was the president's first mention of Mourdock's comment at a rally, but Obama said Wednesday night on "The Tonight Show with Jay Leno" that "rape is rape." His campaign also has been intensifying its criticism of Romney for refusing to pull his support for Mourdock, even though the Republican presidential nominee said he disagrees with Mourdock's

comment. Beyond the statement from an aide, Romney and his aides have tried to avoid the subject. While picking up breakfast at a downtown Cincinnati

diner Thursday morning, Romney refused to answer repeated questions about Mourdock's comment and whether he would call for Mourdock to take down a TV ad Romney filmed for him earlier this week.

Ignoring questions from reporters standing a few feet away, Romney instead posed for pictures with kitchen staff and greeted surprised diners during the brief stop at the First Watch cafe.

Romney's campaign reached out to women by sending Ann Romney on daytime's "Rachael Ray" show, where she prepared her meatloaf cakes recipe and took cameras along on a trip to Costco to shop in bulk for family gatherings. Mrs. Romney said that, with 30 mouths to feed, her family always eats buffet-style and that "Mitt is often at the front of the line."

Romney was kicking off a daylong swing through three Ohio towns, sharpening his focus on a state critical to his hopes of winning the White House. The Republican's advisers say their internal data has him tied to win the state's 18 Electoral College votes, but public polling has shown Obama with a slim lead.

Romney is working to cast Obama's campaign as focused on small issues while the Republican ticket is focused on fixing the nation's serious fiscal problems.

"His campaign seems to be smaller and smaller by the day," Romney told more than 2,000 people in an airplane hangar off the tarmac in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, on Wednesday as his campaign plane loomed behind him. "Attacking me is not an agenda for the future."

The AP-GfK released Thursday shows the presidential race still a virtual dead heat nationally, with Romney favored by 47 percent of likely voters and Obama by 45 percent. That result is within the poll's 4.2-point margin of error.

national Although polls show the race is close, Romney is struggling to overtake Obama in the state-by-state march to racking up the 270 Electoral College votes needed for victory. Romney has far fewer paths to reaching that threshold than Obama, who starts with more states - and more Electoral College votes - in his win column. The race is centered on just nine states, where polls show competitive races: Ohio, Florida, Iowa, New Hampshire, Virginia, North Carolina, Colorado, Nevada and Wisconsin.

The president's morning rally kicked off the second day of his 40-hour battleground state blitz.

After spending the night on Air Force One en route to Florida, he was heading to Virginia and Ohio before heading back to the White House.

Shortly after 7 a.m. and less than five hours after his day ended in Las Vegas, Obama was at a Krispy Kreme doughnut shop near downtown Tampa, and minutes later delivered the still warm doughnuts to a nearby firehouse.

He said he wanted to come by early - noting he is not often out this early — to thank them for all they do.

Obama then spoke to about 8,500 people at a morning rally in Tampa, a swing area of battleground state Florida.

While GM paid back its loan and the government took an ownership stake, the Treasury Department estimates Washington might lose about \$25.1 billion on its investment. It smacks of government waste for its critics.





equipment was installed about 20 years ago.

"The cost of continuous repairs and the constant vandalism along with cover material spontaneously combusting has brought us to the conclusion that it was just time to make a decision concerning safety and cost of keeping the park in working order," he said.

The two new sets of equipment are not intended to replace the Super Playground but to update and enhance to two most active parks in Pampa, he said.

"We are giving them a facelift," Hooper said. "We had some playground funds left over from last year and had budgeted funds this year for some improvements in the park system.

"We also came across a 50/50 funding match for park equipment that we we could put in two systems for the price of one.

Because of the 50 percent discount the city got on the equipment, it's like "buy one get one free," Hooper said.

For Central Park, the city will pay \$50,000 for the playground unit, \$7,000 for the rubber mulch that goes at the base of the equipment and \$12,500 for installation.

For Recreation Park, the unit will cost \$35,000, the rubber cover material will cost \$4,000 and installation will cost \$12,500.

Hooper said the Public Works Department will begin the site layout next week and the new equipment should be delivered within the next four weeks.

Hooper said he is confident in the possibilities of a future project that will replace the Super Playground with a large playground.

"Of course, we would seek public input and get the community involved when we reach that point in the planning process and when we have someone step up with fundraising like the Rotarians did with the Super Playground," he said.



Pampa plans for a hard-nosed fight against Borger Friday

There will be no doubt that despite records the game between Pampa and Borger will be a close one.

These district rivals both need the victory Friday night.

The Bulldogs need the victory to have a chance to make the playoffs this year, and the Harvesters would clinch a playoff appearance.

"There will be no tricks, no pretending, just straight up man on man football," said Pampa Head Football Coach Heath Parker. "It will come down to which team controls the lines of scrimmage.

The Borger Bulldogs are 0-7 on the season but have lost the lead in four games this year with less than two minutes remaining in the game.

Borger's strength is their offensive line, returning four of five starters last year district winning team. Offensively, Borger lost their quarterback Jacob Rendon for the season, causing Bulldogs Coach James Day to revamp the offense.


A large part of the offense was based on Rendons' athletic ability, and without him Day has turned to the experience of his offensive line and solid running core of running backs.

Kendrick Freeman will be returning as a sophomore, seeing action last year as a freshman, as well as transfer from Amarillo, Dontrae Butler. Butler is a strong fullback who runs and blocks, and Borger will run between the tackles 95 percent of the time.

The Bulldog offense now lines up in a two back set, both running backs recorded 160 plus yards rushing last week at Dalhart, and more than 150 yards per game the last four weeks.

Defensively Bulldogs are young and talented and will give the Harvesters improving offense a challenge.

their last four opponents to less than there average offensive output.


Chris Rivera, Larry Regan, Sheldon Reeve, and Chris Howard all have played outstanding as well as the whole defense that, has created turnovers.


