Winter blast blowing into Panhandle

STAFF REPORT

The National Weather Service in Amarillo has issued a special weather statement on the much colder weather expected late Saturday and Sunday.

Since this is the first major blast of winter so far this year, it is a good idea to review cold weather saftey tips.

The following is the statement from NWS regarding this weekend's weather:

A strong cold front is expected to move through the Panhandle region late Saturday night. This will bring an abrupt end to the very warm weather that the region has seen for the past several days. The coldest weather of the season so far and a slight chance of very light wintry precipitation is possible in the wake of this front.

Cold weather with high temperatures will be 10 to 25 degrees below normal on Sunday and Monday is expected. In fact locations in the western Oklahoma Northwestern



Panhandles may not get above freezing through the day on Sunday. Breezy winds are expected Sunday as well. This will result in wind chill values in the teens and 20s for much of the day. On Sunday night, much of the region will see low temperatures in the single digits and teens. Panhandle residents are encouraged to dress appropriately for the cold with warm layers, hats and gloves.

There is still considerable uncertainty in regard to wintry precipitation chances.

Much of the region will see a slight chance (20 percent) of precipitation through at least a portion of the period from early Sunday morning through early Monday morning. If any precipitation does develop it is expected to be in the form of light snow at this time. Snow accumulations, if any, should be very light. Less than one inch of snow accumulation is expected at this time. Though minimal accumulations are expected at this time motorists should pay attention to the latest forecast as even a small amount of snow could result in slick roads and impacts could be higher than normal as this would be the first wintry precipitation the region has seen this season.

Here are some winter weather facts:

Each year, dozens of Americans die due to exposure to cold. Add to that number, vehicle accidents and fatalities, fires due to dangerous use of heaters and other winter weather fatalities and you have a significant threat.

■ Threats, such as hypothermia and frostbite, can lead to loss of fingers and toes or cause permanent kidney, pancreas and liver injury and even death. You must prepare properly to avoid these BLAST cont. on page 2

PPD officers involved in Scott shooting back on duty

STAFF REPORT

The two Pampa Police Department officers involved in the shooting of David M. Scott last week in front of the Subway on North Hobart Street are now back at work in an administrative capacity, the Texas Department of Safety said in a released statement.

Officers Jimmy Skinner and Joey Roberts were placed on administrative leave at the time of the incident, which is standard policy at PPD when there is an officer-involved shooting.

The Texas Rangers have completed their investigation and presented the case to District Attorney Lynn Switzer of the 31st Judicial District, which includes Gray County. The case is expected to go before the Gray County Grand Jury on Dec. 12, said Trooper Daniel Hawthorne, a DPS spokesman based in Amarillo.

On Nov. 29 at 4:23 p.m., PPD received a 911 call for a domestic disturbance on 2100 block of Hobart Street. The investigation es-

tablishes that Pampa officers responded to the call and that the suspect, Scott, 45, of Miami, pointed a handgun at the officers, according to DPS. The officers then fired at Scott, who was pronounced dead at the scene by Judge Joe Martinez. Officers from PPD, Gray County Sheriff's Office and DPS responded to the shooting incident and dozens of spectators watched officers processing the scene

from nearby parking lots. Hawthorne said last week the Texas Rangers collected evidence and talked to witnesses. The Rangers are part of DPS and often handle investigations of officer-involved shootings or vehicle accidents that involve police in small towns like Pampa, he said.

Now that the Rangers have completed their investigation, Hawthorne said all information about the shooting will now be coming from the District Attorney's office.

Pampa's region comprises all of the Panhandle. The All-BAND cont. on page 5

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


Survivors include her husband: John Pontious of the home; two daughters: Becky Brooks of Plano, and Mis-

extreme dangers. You also need to know what to do if you see symptoms of these threats.

■ A major winter storm can last for several days and be accompanied by high winds, freezing rain or sleet, heavy snowfall and cold temperatures.

People can become trapped at home or in a other assistance. Attempting to walk

for help in a winter storm can be a deadly decision. ■ The aftermath of a

winter storm can have an impact on a community or region for days, weeks or even months.

Extremely cold temperatures, heavy snow and coastal flooding can cause hazardous conditions and hidden problems.

Here are risk factors from the cold weather.

Exposure to cold can cause frostbite or hypothermia and become lifethreatening. Infants and elderly people are most susceptible. What constitutes extreme cold varies in different parts of the country.

In the South, near freezing temperatures are considered extreme cold. Freezing temperatures can cause severe damage to citrus fruit crops and other vegetation.

Pipes may freeze and burst in homes that are poorly insulated or without heat. In the North,

extreme cold means temperatures well below zero. Wind Chill is not the

actual temperature but rather how wind and cold feel on exposed skin. As the wind increases,

heat is carried away from the body at an accelerated rate, driving down the body temperature. Animals are also affected by wind chill; however, cars, plants and other objects are not.

Some injuries related to cold weather:

■ 50 percent of injuries happen to people over 60 years old.

■ More than 75 percent of injuries happen to

extreme cold. A wind chill of minus-20 degrees Fahrenheit will cause frostbite in just 30 min-Frostbite causes a loss of

feeling and a white or pale appearance in extremities, such as fingers, toes, ear lobes or the tip of the nose. If symptoms are detect-

ed, get medical help immediately.

If you must wait for help, slowly rewarm affected areas. However, if the person is also showing signs of hypothermia, warm the body core before the extremities.



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



I had really wondered a lot about the "petition" until I saw who was


If I had just bought all that property on Hobart Street I would changed so I could get a return on my investment.

berg's body, the law-school student died. A jury convicted Galo for manslaughter and driving without a license. After serving 43 days in jail, he was released on home detention.

Don Rosenberg of Westlake Village -- in Los Angeles County -- blames San Francisco politics for his son's death. He also fears that the like-minded Obama administration will shield unlicensed drivers

to the detriment of public safety -- and Washington isn't giving him reason to believe otherwise.

This sanctuary city has been so eager to protect illegal immigrants who cannot obtain California drivers' licenses that in 2009, then-Mayor Gavin Newsom announced that the city no longer would impound the cars of unlicensed drivers automatically. In 2008, the AAA Foundation for Public Safety reported that 29 percent of fatal car crashes in California involved a driver without a valid license. No worries, San Francisco sent a message to folks who haven't even passed a driver's test: You can drive here and get away with it.

Accidents happen, but Rosenberg doesn't see this crash as an accident -- Galo, after all, backed over Rosenberg's son.

You can't blame California's law that denies driver's licenses to illegal immigrants. As a legal immigrant given temporary protective status, Galo was eligible for a driver's license. But he didn't have one, and he drove anyway. That decision demonstrated a reckless disregard for the safety of others and disrespect for the law.

Repeated disrespect. Five months earlier, police stopped Galo for driving the wrong way on a one-way street and driving without a license. He paid a \$220 fine. Then-Police Chief George Gascon now the district attorney supported the Newsom plan. He even told me at the time that it would help legal residents who couldn't afford to get a license or driver training. Does he still support it?



If so, thank groups like the Coalition for Humane Immigrant Rights of Los Angeles who have sold the idea that driving without a license is not a big deal. Spokesman Jorge-Mario Cabrera told me, "We don't believe that most traffic offenses should be deportable."

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Advent calendar continues story of birth of Jesus

In 1978, Disney brought to life the story of this invisible Advent character. I say invisible because he actually isn't mentioned in the biblical account. However, Mary certainly couldn't walk from Nazareth to Bethlehem at nine months pregnant. So it isn't a giant leap to believe that she probably made the journey on a donkey.

This serves as a reminder that sometimes things which are hardly noticeable can be a necessary part of the story. In fact, God seems to specialize in wallflower people, nobodies, and invisible folks. More than 2,500 people are mentioned in the Bible, yet not even 10 percent would be considered by most as important. However, without those other 90 percent most of the big stories in the Bible would never have happened.

God wove part of His Advent tapestry with priceless threads: baby Jesus, Mary, Joseph and angels. But most of it was composed of common threads; this donkey being one. What is the point?

Have you ever felt "common," "invisible," "a nobody?" I'll bet you have because at one time or the other most everyone has felt that way. So does that make it true? Are you in-

No, you are not! That is what the donkey should remind you of. When God is at the helm everyone and everything plays a necessary part in His plan. And most importantly He weaves you into His work of art because He loves

Prayer: Awesome God, I find myself all too often wondering why You would even bother with

December 10 - The me. But then You are faithful to remind me that the value You place on me isn't clouded with all of the muck and mire of this fallen world. Your price tag is right, my perception is wrong. Deliver me from my dark perceptions of myself. And may this Advent season prompt me to see everything through "my father's eyes". Amen.

December 11 - Distance and Elevation

In 2008, a young BBC correspondent, Aleem Maqbool, began a 12-day re-enactment journey from Nazareth to Bethlehem. His only friend sharing the Advent re-enactment journey was his donkey, Cynthia. Aleem chose the most direct path of the two available routes and still ended up walking almost 100 miles, much of the time up and over mountains and through remote wilderness areas. Sounds tough huh.

Now consider why Joseph probably didn't choose that route. There were two basic routes from Nazareth to Bethlehem. One was the route Aleem selected and it surely was the shortest. However, when we consider: the number of mountains that had to be overcome; the numerous remote wilderness areas where danger was a serious concern; the fact that very few Jewish travelers went this way; and the aversion Jews had to Samaritans and traveling through Samaritan country, it seems very unlikely that Joseph would have taken his nine-month pregnant wife this way.

The other route (Nazareth, over to Jordan River, down to Jericho, over to Bethlehem) did add 50 more miles to the journey, but: it allowed them

to travel with many other Jews for companionship and safety; they bypassed most all of the mountains; it kept them away from most of the dangerous remote areas; and they avoided Samaritan terri-

Now figure in the elevation points: Nazareth 1,200 feet; Jericho -1,000 feet (below sea level); Jerusalem - 3,500 feet; Beth-lehem 2,500 feet. That meant that it was 2,200 feet downhill from Nazareth to Jericho and then 4,500 feet uphill for 15 miles through Jerusalem and then five miles downhill 1,000 feet to Bethlehem. Remember, that final 20 miles was at the end of

the 150-mile trip. So how are you doing with your obstacles and difficulties? Handling them as well? You can, you know. You can handle your troubles just a well as Mary and Joseph handled theirs. How? By doing the same thing they did; relying on God each day for the needed strength, power and guidance.

Prayer: Almighty God, I've gotten through most of life's obstacles and difficulties, but not as well as I could have.

I relied on Your strength, but only a little bit. I know that to do better, I have to rely on You more. So Lord, here I am ready to fall into

I want to rely only on You; no more on me.

Hamilton, Greinke remain on market after winter meetings

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — A quiet winter meetings figures to lead to a busy rest of December, given how few moves actually got finished at sprawling Opryland hotel.

As teams headed home Thursday, the biggest free agents were still on the market. The availability of slugger Josh Hamilton and pitcher Zack Greinke held up decisions on other signings and possible trades involving Rangers infielder Michael Young and Mets Cy Young Award winner R.A. Dickey.

The Yankees, quiet thus far, were pursuing former Boston star Kevin Youkilis and also met with the agent for Mark

With most clubs already packed up, Philadelphia acquired outfielder Ben Revere from Minnesota for right-handers Vance Worley and Trevor May. Hamilton could remain with Texas, and Seattle seemed to

be interested. Greinke's options include staying with the Los Angeles Angels, moving up the coast to the Dodgers or signing with the Rangers. Mariners general manager Jack Zduriencik said that after

taking in information from other clubs and agents, it was time to return home and "cool your jets."

"There can be a domino effect," he said. "I think when clubs are focusing on a certain position, a certain need, there's options out there. And once one option goes away, then that changes the landscape of what a club would want to do. Everybody's got their ducks lined up in a row, and it's just a matter of how things fall. And there's timing involved.'

The annual meeting wasn't much of a swap session. The Phillies-Twins deal was just the fourth trade over the four days.

Atlanta announced a one-year deal with outfielder Reed Johnson on Thursday, and Texas said reliever Koji Uehara had reached an agreement with Boston. Minnesota agreed with reliever Jared Burton on a \$5.5 million, two-year contract that includes a club option for 2015, and third baseman Ian Stewart said he is re-signing with the Chicago Cubs, confirming the move on Twitter.

But the 25-foot wide dais with a podium backed by MLB logos was used just three times: Yankees general manager Brian Cashman discussed Alex Rodriguez's hip injury; Major League Baseball announced an auction benefiting Stand Up to Cancer; and the Mets talked about David Wright's \$138 million, eight-year contract, which had been agreed to last week.

The Yankees have been quiet, watching as catcher Russell Martin agreed with Pittsburgh last week and backup third baseman Eric Chavez went to Arizona during the meetings. Wanting to get under the \$189 million luxury tax threshold in 2014, the Yankees are being cautious. Still, Cashman maintained it hasn't been a rough week for him.

"Because I don't read the papers as much as I used to," he said. "This year's marketplace, it might be strong in terms of

the dollars being thrown around, but I don't think it's a strong market in terms of the available talent."

As the meetings ended, Cashman had made a \$12 million offer to Youkilis, who would play third base while A-Rod recovers. The Phillies were trying to obtain Young, the infielder who has been with the Rangers for his entire 13-season career and would have to approve a trade. Arizona was listening to offers for outfielder Justin Upton.

"It seems like when people leave the winter meetings, there's a bit of a quiet period," Red Sox GM Ben Cherington said. "People kind of get out of the frenzy, maybe take a step back and realize that maybe something they were talking about isn't such a good idea. Sometimes things get close and never end

For all the talk, the Dodgers have made only one big move since the end of the season, re-signing closer Brandon League. But they've been quite busy over 2012. After they were bought in May for \$2 billion by a group headed by Mark Walter and Stan Kasten, Los Angeles added stars Hanley Ramirez, Adrian Gonzalez, Carl Crawford and Josh Beckett. The Dodgers face a Sunday deadline to reach a deal with South Korean pitcher Ryu Hyun-Jin, whose rights they gained for a \$25.7 million

Quite different from the days under the previous owner, Frank McCourt.

"You couldn't get an agent to return a phone call," Dodgers general manager Ned Colletti said. "Now you've got them lined out the door."

Texas GM Jon Daniels was popular, too, given his interest in Hamilton and Greinke, and talks involving Upton and a possible a multi-team trade.

"It just makes it tougher, more than two clubs," he said, adding he had a variety of trade and free-agent options. "There are a couple of big decisions that are going to impact the direction. We've narrowed it down, but there's still a couple ways we can go. Some of that is up to us, and some of that is up to the guys on the other side of the table.'

After exploring trades involving Dickey, Mets GM Sandy Alderson said it was possible the team could keep the knuckleballer without a deal for beyond 2013.

"I don't think it's necessarily the optimum result, but it's a possible result," he said.

Some teams worry about overpaying this early in the offseason. Other clubs conclude they must.

"You run into people, like, 'Man, I didn't want to do that, but I had no choice," Cashman said. "So they're getting a problem solved, but they're not happy with their solution and what they had to do to solve it. I don't want to be in that position. I'd rather feel good about what I'm doing."

Could the Kansas City Chiefs' quarterback have listened better to his teammate? Could he have noticed a change in the linebacker's temperament? Did Belcher utter something under his breath that may have let on that he was capable of killing his girlfriend and himself?

"When you ask someone how they're doing, do you really mean it?" Quinn wondered. "When you answer back, are you really telling the truth?"

The murder-suicide last Saturday raised similar questions among players and coaches across the NFL. In an era in which physical safety is of paramount importance, it's become clear that ensuring the emotional well-being of the men who play the game is just as essential.

"The relationships you have with people face-toface, on a daily basis, kind of get brushed aside for everything else that's out there," Quinn said. "A lot of times people hide their issues, their problems. They don't talk to anyone

until it's too late." This past July, the NFL established an emergency hotline that operates 24 hours a day and connects players, staff and family members in crisis with mental-health professionals who are not affiliated with the league or its teams. The group, which provides a similar service to the Veteran's Administration, is required to keep its conversations confidential unless the individual calling indicates they may harm themselves or others.

Robert Gulliver, the NFL's chief human resources officer, said "absolutely, players and staff are taking advantage of the opportunity" provided by the hotline.

Gulliver couldn't say Belcher had whether called, citing its confidentiality policy, and could not provide any data that indicates how much it is being used. But Gulliver did say that what happened to Belcher may cause the NFL to consider more offerings in the future.

"Mental health continues to be, in general society, an area that often has a stigma attached to it," Gulliver said. "We're trying to change that culture and break down that stigma and show people that mental is part of total

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That stigma is pervasive in the NFL, where a macho culture has been long ingrained.

In numerous interviews with current and former players, The Associated Press found many who said they would refuse to seek support for various reasons. Maybe their issues would get back to their coaches and affect their playing time or their contracts. Maybe their teammates would view them differently.

Several players indicated that the same attitude that carried them to the NFL — that in some ways they are indestructible makes it difficult for them to reconcile needing outside help.

"In all my years playing football, I've never really seen a guy come out and say he needed help with this or he was having issues with this," said Rams offensive tackle Wayne Hunter, who's in his ninth year in the league. "Guys, including myself, generally keep our personal issues to ourselves.'

Hunter said that when he was with the Jets, he took advantage of a team psychologist who provided support. Otherwise, he leaned on teammates.

"It was nice to have another set of ears other than the team psychologist," Hunter said. "The psychologist analyzes and sometimes over analyzes

- I'm talking generally speaking — and they give you what they think is a right answer. But going to a friend gives you another perspective, gives you his side and a more personal

Then there's the tightrope between offering help and prying into personal

"A football locker room is a microcosm of the rest of society," said Rams defensive lineman Chris Long. "When do you come up and help somebody out and when do you feel like you're intruding?"

Browns coach Pat Shurmur and Cowboys coach Jason Garrett both reminded players this week to seek help, whether their problems are with drugs and alcohol, their professional life or things happening at home.

that there is no judgment involved," Garrett said. "We're not judging you. We're helping you. We're here to help.

The NFL has numerous programs to help players and personnel deal with everything from personal and family relationships to the proper use of firearms. They begin even before athletes play a single down in the NFL with symposiums at most college allstar games, and continue with the NFL scouting combine and a three-day rookie boot camp that is required of any player se-

lected in the draft. The NFL's security team often works with local and state law enforcement to address issues and questions that players have with guns. The league also has a mandatory life skills program for all players and coaches, along with a 12-week Rookie Success Program that first-year players must complete.

"The resources the league and the teams offer are always good," Chiefs offensive lineman Ryan Lilja said, "it's just up to guys to take advantage of

Too often, that doesn't happen.

"Literally, I said I'll get down on my hands and knees and beg you to do this because it's the most important thing there is," Garrett said. "There's no issue that you have in your life that we can't somehow solve in some way and in some way make it better. I just say that from the bottom of my heart, because you never know what guys are going through and you just want to let them know they have a place to turn."

PETA offers tips to keep pets safe in winter weather

Although they equipped with fur coats, dogs and other animals can still suffer from frostbite and exposure, and they can become dehydrated when water sources freeze. Cold weather spells extra hardship for "backyard dogs," who often go without adequate food, water, shelter, or veterinary care — it can also pose challenges for wildlife.

With snow and low temperatures predicted for your area, will you please consider sharing the following information with your audience now and through the winter in order to help protect animals?

· Keep animals inside. This is absolutely critical when it comes to puppies and kittens, elderly animals, small animals, and dogs with short hair, including pointers, beagles, pit bulls, Rottweilers, and Doberman pinschers. Short-haired animals will also benefit from a warm sweater or a coat on walks.

 Don't allow your cat or dog to roam outdoors. During winter, cats sometimes climb under the hoods of cars to be near warm engines and are badly injured or killed when the car is

· Wipe off your dogs' or

Every year, PETA re- cats' legs, feet, and stomyour animals sick if they ingest them. You should also increase animals' food rations during the winter because they burn more calories in an effort to stay warm.

· Keep an eye out for stray animals. Take unidentified animals inside until you can find their guardians or take them to an animal shelter. If strays are skittish or otherwise unapproachable, provide food and water and call your local humane society for assistance in trapping them and getting them indoors.

· If you see animals left outside without shelter from the elements, please notify authorities. For information on what constitutes adequate shelter, click here.

• During extreme winter weather, birds and other animals may have trouble finding food and water. Offer rations to wildlife who are caught in storms or white-outs by spreading birdseed on the ground. Provide access to liquid water by filling a heavy water bowl and breaking the surface ice twice a day. Remember to remove the food once the weather improves to encourage the animals to move on to warmer areas. For more information, visit PETA.org.

Nat'l legislators look to pass Child Protection Act

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — U.S. Sen. John Cornyn and Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott are urging the passage of a new federal law to fight child pornography, sexual predators and human trafficking. The two Republicans are expected to call for the passage of the new Child Protection Act on Friday. If signed into law, the act would increase the penalties for child pornography, protect child witnesses and give U.S. marshals new authority to obtain time-sensitive documents. Cornyn is sponsoring the bill in the Senate with Democratic Sen. Richard Blumenthal from Connecticut. U.S. Rep. Lamar Smith and Democratic Rep. Debbie Wasserman Schultz are sponsoring the bill the in the U.S. House.

El Paso World War II vet to receive military honors

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — The family of a World War II veteran injured in 1944 when he was struck by a German tank in France will be getting his military honors in a West Texas ceremony. The U.S. Army on Friday is scheduled to award a posthumous Purple Heart and two Bronze Stars to Pvt. Juan C. Marquez. The honors at Fort Bliss come years after Marquez suffered. shrapnel wounds and later broken ribs and a separated shoulder when he was hit by the tank. Marquez died in 1948 after being struck by a car. He left behind a wife and four sons.

One son eventually looked at his father's Army documents and saw he was wounded in combat. Antonio Marquez says U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison helped get the medals.

Houston-area family arrested for robbery

RICHMOND, Texas (AP) — A Houston-area man, his daughter and his son have been indicted over a credit union robbery by armed thieves in disguises. Fort Bend County records show 50-year-old Ronald Catt, 20-year-old Hayden Catt and 18-year-old Abigail Catt were being held Friday on aggravated robbery charges. The men were jailed on bond of \$140,000 apiece.

The daughter's bond is \$100,000. Online jail records don't list attorneys for the Catts, who were arrested Nov. 9 and indicted Monday. First Community Credit Union in the Katy area was robbed by two gunmen wearing orange traffic vests and sunglasses. One man had a fake moustache. The other wore a painter's mask. Abigail Catt allegedly drove the getaway vehicle. Investigators are reviewing similar robberies in Texas and the Portland, Ore., area, where the Catts formerly lived.
