'Pete the Cat' entertains at Austin

'Pete' will visit other 3 elementary schools this week.

New York Times best-selling children's author Eric Litwin, better known as "Pete the Cat," kept the students of Austin Elementary entertained on Monday with some of his now-famous characters as well as a few new ones.

Litwin produces the popular children's series with James Dean, a former electrical engineer from Georgia who become an artist when he retired.

At Austin, Pete introduced new characters from an unreleased story, "Bedtime at the Nut House," and led the children in sing-a-longs that were "nutty" to say the

"Go up to bed/Go up to bed, All little nuts need to go up to bed," Pete would sing. But the children would

respond, in unison, "Never!," followed by laughter. "All little nuts need to

go up to bed," Pete said. "Never!" the children cried back again and again.

And when Pete strummed his guitar, the children would wiggle around on the floor to the rhythm of the jovial tune.

Even though the chorus was spirited and rambunctious, Pete ensured the students learned the moral of the "Bedtime" story: When you love someone, it's OK to be a little nuts.

Beverly Principal Underwood graciously volunteered to serve as a pageturner and assist Pete with

his performance about loving different-colored pairs of shoes, a simple life lesson about practicing tolerance of other cultures.

Pete's exhibition was entertaining and educational; he taught the importance of speaking in multiple languages as the lyrics to one of his songs were in "Cat."

And how does one speak in "Cat?"

"Meow-meow-meow," of course.

Litwin spends most of the year on the road, performing in school gymnasiums and

festivals around the country. "I travel about 10 days out of every month and most of those are out of town," he

said. Litwin, a former teacher, said he enjoys touring and gets to test out new material and characters when performing for the children, his

faithful fan base. "My stories work really well for feedback," he said. Litwin also performs as a means to share his passion to promote literacy in early education.

"I get to connect with teachers and students and I get to share my interests call and response, repetition, music and structured movement," he said, adding that teaching students these study skills can benefit their performance in the classroom.

Pampa Chamber's shopping program keeps it local

The Pampa Chamber of Commerce's shop local program places the focus on community as it stresses the importance of shopping at the corner store instead of the big-box national retail chain in a neighboring

Pampa Chamber Executive Director Jane Steele credits local retailer Aaron Simon with developing the idea for the program.

"The chamber of commerce's program to shop local was developed by our retail committee this summer,' Steele said. "It was the brain child of committee member and business owner Aaron Simon of Pampa Office Supply."

Steele said that Simon had proposed that the Pampa chamber institute the "buy local" program after seeing the effects similar programs had while visiting other cities like Los Angeles

and Oklahoma City. "As a result, a joint venture began between Aaron and the Pampa Chamber of Commerce," Steele said. "He designs and prints the posters and the chamber contributes to the costs and distribution."

Simon shared his thoughts on the importance of community members supporting local retailers.

"Obviously, it would help my business," Simon joked. "But for the economy, when people spend their dollars locally, it allows for growth.

Steele said when residents spend locally, the sales taxes collected on those purchases are funneled into city coffers. The funds are then budgeted each year for city services like the Pampa police and fire departments, Public Works Department and Lovett Memorial Library.

"When you shop locally, you simultaneously create jobs, fund more city services through sales tax, invest in neighborhood improvement and promote community development," Steele said.

Simon echoed Steel's sentiments about spending in the community to bolster the local economy.

"When people shop out of town, their money supports other towns," he said. "They give sales tax to those towns," which fund city services and amenities

The Coffee Memorial Blood Center is holding a blood drive from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Wednesday at Clarendon College's Pampa campus, 1601 W. Kentucky Ave.

Every eligible donor who gives blood will receive a free T-shirt and will be entered into a weekly drawing for a one-year supply of milk (52 gallons) courtesy of Plains Dairy.

A Picture ID or donor ID card is required and you must be at least 17 years old to donate.

Right now there is a critical need for Type O negative blood because there have been a lot of car accidents in the region, said Suzanne Talley, director of marketing and public relations for Coffee Memorial.

Since Type O negative is a universal donor, that blood type can be given to a recipient when there is not enough time to type the patient's blood, she said. There also is a less critical need for Type O positive,

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

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

Files on L.A. priests may be released

Los Angeles on priests accused of sexually abusing children could soon become public as a fiveyear legal battle over their release reaches its endgame. A judge will hear final objections Monday from accused priests and is also expected to begin hashing out a timeline for the release of thousands of pages of top-secret church documents on abusive clerics. Plaintiff attorneys have been trying to gain access to the files since a \$660 million settlement in 2007 called for their disclosure.

Earlier this year, the California Supreme Court declined to intervene af-

Both seen so far." attorneys for the church and the plaintiffs said they expected the documents would be made public within a month and no later than February after Monday's critical hearing. Private files on Franciscan friars accused of abuse were released earlier this year after a similar legal fight.

"There are explosive documents that are going to be coming out," said lead plaintiff attorney Ray Boucher, who has seen some of the material while reviewing it with archdiocese attorneys in preparation for the release. "I don't think there's any question but that the information that will be forthcoming ... is beyond

The files contain letters between church leaders, including the recently retired Cardinal Roger Mahony, letters to and from the priests themselves, notes and memos about reports of suspected abuse, medical and psychological records and — in some cases - paperwork petitioning for a particular priest's defrocking by the Vatican.

Plaintiffs in particular want to see if — and when archdiocese officials were warned about their alleged abusers or if the church avoided civil and criminal action by not reporting to police or shuffling accused clerics from

parish to parish or diocese to diocese.

The archbishop has apologized for his handling of the sex abuse scandal and has acknowledged missteps in how he handled several highly publicized cases, including that of former priest Michael Baker.

Baker told Mahony at a retreat in 1986 that he had molested two young boys but the archbishop has said he didn't alert anyone because the priest told him the children were illegal immigrants who had

returned to Mexico. The former priest was arrested in 2006 as he returned from a vacation in Thailand and ultimately sentenced to 10 years in prison for molestation.

Calif. man kills himself, 4 others others on Indian reservation

PORTERVILLE, Calif. (AP) — The church bell that rings out to announce the deaths of tribal members on the Tule River Indian Reservation tolled repeatedly after a man went on a shooting rampage that left a daughter, his mother and her two brothers dead. The suspect also died in a shootout with

police.

Authorities cornered Hector Celaya, 31, on a country road in the middle of citrus orchards 30 miles away from the reservation and about six hours after the Saturday night shootings, that also left two of his other children wound-


In the car with him were

two daughters: 8-yearold Alyssa who had lifethreatening injuries and 5-year-old Linea who was seriously hurt. Sheriff's spokeswoman Chris Douglass said it was unclear when Celaya shot his daughters. Celaya was wounded by deputies after he opened fire on them, and died hours later at a hospital, she said. By Sunday night, authorities confirmed that Alyssa had also died. Police said Celaya had a tattoo of her name on his right leg.

Authorities have not disclosed what motivated Celaya to kill his relatives, who lived in a travel trailer on a family compound on the reservation of about 800 people. But tribal members said the former custodian at the reservation's casino had a troubled past.

The remote reservation relies on the Eagle Mountain Casino for revenues. Each tribal member receives \$500 a month, but Hunter said most of the profit is invested into educational programs for the children.

Police said Celaya was "known to law enforcement" and "known to use drugs," though Douglass could not provide details.





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Verizon on the horizon

I am at war with my phone company. Compared with real wars, it is a nothing war, a luxury war. But every time I walk into my house, I

My home phone hasn't worked in a week. I have called at least five just during

or six times, just during this latest "outage." I have spent literally hours on the phone with them. This is the third time this month that the phone has stopped working.

And what do they say? Press 1 if you want to be put on hold for an hour. Press 2 if you want to wait to speak with someone who will ignore you. Press 3 if you want to make an appointment for repair service, which means you take a day off of work, and we never show up and don't even have the decency or respect to call you and tell you we aren't coming until you receive an automated call at 8 p.m. saying we've rescheduled your appointment for next week.

"Agent. Agent. Agent." That's what nice Matthew of Tuesday night said to say to bypass the automatic options that guarantee automatic inactivity. So I say it over and over again. Sometimes it doesn't work at all. Sometimes I stay on hold forever until I get a nice guy like Matthew who listens to me rant and rave until I calm down enough to tell him that I understand it's not his fault, that no one is "in dispatch" at that hour, and he promises to have someone come out first thing the next morning. And then no one comes. And no one calls. And I start with the next person.

next person.

I know. Young people don't even bother with landlines. They certainly shouldn't bother with Verizon, which of all the companies I deal with in trying to maintain a lifestyle dependent on technology is far and

away the absolute, No. 1 worst. It's not that the people are unpleasant. When you finally do get to a person, after an average of an hour of sitting with your cellphone (ATT, thank you) at your ear, they very pleasantly read the script that says, "I'm sorry for the inconvenience." I now have my answer: I'm sorry you're stuck working for a company that doesn't value its customers, that lies to them, that makes promises it can't keep. It must be terrible to work

for a company like that. Problem is, I need a landline. I have confidential conversations. I have endless conference calls where people say "Could whoever on a cellphone please go on mute, because we're getting all kinds of feedback." I'm not used to walking around with a cellphone permanently in my pocket so I can pick it up in whatever room I'm in. There really are people in my life, people I care about, who are used to calling me on my landline and worry when they get what sounds like a fax line when they call.

I know there are people in New York and New Jersey who still don't have phone service, or even electricity. My heart goes out to them. If Verizon can't fix my landline, it's no surprise that the companies responsible for these much larger problems are even more "powerless," and that the folks living like that are even angrier than I am.

I finally got an answer for what's going on not restoration of phone service, mind you, but an explanation. Rain. "Rain?" I said. I live in California. We did not have a superstorm. We did not have a hurricane. It rained for a few days. In the rest of the country, it would be just another day. In California, we say things like "we needed that rain." We get to use our umbrellas. We do not expect to be without phone service

for the month.



—"5 Broke Cameras" and "The Gatekeepers" are both about the Israelis' history of inhumanity toward the Palestinians.

—"Mea Maxima Culpa: Silence in the House of God" is another HBO-backed film by (previous Oscar winner) Alex Gibney, whose other films have ripped Enron and the War on Terror. This is another expose of Catholic Church inaction with sexually abusive priests, including Fr. Lawrence Murphy, who ran a Wis-

consin school for the deaf.

Exposes on the Catholic sex abuse scandal are a staple in this documentary branch of the Oscars.

David France of "How to Survive a Plague" wrote a book called "Our Fathers" that later became a TV docudrama. Kirby Dick earned an Oscar nomination in 2004 for "Twist of Faith." Amy Berg was awarded an Oscar nomination for "Deliver Us From Evil" in 2006

From Evil" in 2006. This is the first year that the Best Documentary Feature award has new rules - promoted by Michael Moore. Instead of films being screened by small groups (of about five) and then recommended to the whole membership, all the films are now supposed to be screened by all 173 members. That simply does not happen. That means some of the 100-plus documentaries in the field are inevitably cast aside if they offend the liberal sensibilities of the judges. So, bye-bye, "2016." Nominees are sup-

posed to have run for a week in theaters in New York and Los Angeles at least. Two of these films — "Mea Maxima Culpa" and "Ethel" — have yet to jump that minimalist hurdle. "Ethel" aired on HBO in October. None of it matters. There are no rules. Up with liberalism. Conservatism? Censored.

Gun discharges at Houston school

HOUSTON (AP) — School and police say a 15-yearold has been taken into custody after a gun he brought to a Houston-area high school discharged accidentally in a classroom.

No one was injured.

Spring Branch school district spokesman Steve Brunsman says the incident happened about 11 a.m. Monday as about 25 students and teachers were gathered in a classroom.

Brunsman says the students were immediately provided assistance from staff and social workers, and their parents were notified. He adds that the juvenile who was carrying the gun has been detained and the gun confiscated.

Crime Stoppers scammer gets 15 years in prison

DALLAS (AP) — A Dallas woman who conspired with an ex-police officer to scam the city's Crime Stoppers program has been sentenced to 15 months in federal prison.

U.S. District Judge David Godbey sentenced 38-year-old Malva R. Delley on Monday for her guilty plea last year to conspiracy to make a false statement to a financial institution.

Delley was part of a scam that brought her and for-

mer Crime Stoppers director Theodora Ross more than \$250,000. Ross provided bogus tip information to Delley, who then presented the information to a bank.

The 52-year-old Ross was sentenced last week to nearly four years in prison after pleading guilty to income tax evasion and conspiracy to commit wire fraud.

Both Ross and Delley must pay \$212,291 in restitution.


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
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Forth Worth man on meth faces life sentence in prison

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — A North Texas man with a history of assault faces up to life in prison after being convicted of killing a woman who had let him stay with her. The penalty phase resumes Tuesday in Fort Worth for 34-year-old Frank Byrd. The Fort Worth man was convicted Friday of murder in the January fatal shooting of 39-year-old Hilary Eaton.

The Fort Worth Star-

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Telegram reports prosecutors say the pair had argued and Byrd was paranoid after sleepless days on a methamphetamine binge. Further details on the dispute were not immediately available. Byrd's former girlfriend at times also stayed at the Eaton home. Byrd's criminal record includes convictions for aggravated assault with a deadly weapon and aggravated sexual assault of a child.

Jobs issue will be part of 2016 campaign

(AP) — Jobs were a signature issue of the 2012 elections. And they're likely to be so in the 2014 midterm and 2016 presidential contests as well. That's because the jobless rate may not return to its pre-recession levels of 5-6 percent for another five to 10 years.

President Barack Obama clearly has benefited politically from the drop in the jobless rate from its peak of 10 percent in October 2009 to just below 8 percent on Election Day. The Labor Department Friday said that the rate dropped still more — to 7.7 percent in November from October's 7.9 percent.

The White House quickly hailed "further evidence that the U.S. economy is continuing to heal." But Alan Krueger, chairman of the president's Council of Economic Advisers, also acknowledged "more work remains to be done."



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
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
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Dutchman launches life-sized Noah's Ark replica

DORDRECHT, Netherlands (AP) — Just as the first storms of winter roll in, Dutchman Johan Huibers has finished his 20-year quest to build a full-scale, functioning model of Noah's Ark — an undertaking of, well, biblical proportions.

Huibers, a Christian, used books 6-9 of Genesis as his inspiration, following the instructions God gives Noah down to the last cubit.

Translating to modern measurements, Huibers came up with a vessel that works out to a whopping 427 feet (130 meters) long, 95 feet (29 meters) across and 75 feet (23 meters) high. Perhaps not big enough to fit every species on Earth, two by two, as described in the Bible, but plenty of space, for instance, for a pair elephants to dance a tango.

Johan's Ark towers across the flat Dutch landscape and is easily visible from a nearby highway where it lies moored in the city of Dordrecht, just south of Rotterdam.

Gazing across the ark's main hold, a huge space of stalls supported by a forest of pine trees, visitors gaze upon an array of stuffed and plastic animals, such as buffalo, zebra, gorillas, lions, tigers, bears, you name it. Elsewhere on the ark is a petting zoo with actual live animals that are less dangerous or easier to care for — such as ponies, dogs, sheep, and rabbits — and an impressive aviary of exotic birds.

"This boat — it's amazing," said Alfred Jongile, visiting from South Africa with his Dutch wife.

For Huibers, a builder by trade, it all began with a nightmare he had in 1992, when the low-lying Netherlands was flooded, as it has been many times throughout its history.

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Gov't to investigate cell phone apps

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government is investigating whether software companies that make cellphone apps violated the privacy rights of children by quietly collecting personal information from mobile devices and sharing it with advertisers and data brokers, the Federal Trade Commission said Monday. Such apps can capture a child's physical location, phone numbers of their friends and more.

The FTC described the marketplace for mobile applications — dominated by online stores operated by Apple and Google — as a digital danger zone with inadequate oversight. In a report by the FTC's own experts, it said the industry has grown rapidly but failed to ensure the privacy of young consumers is adequately protected. The FTC did not say which or how many companies it was investigating.

Among 400 apps designed for kids examined by the FTC, most failed to inform parents about the types of data the app could gather and who could access it, the report said. Others apps contained advertising that most parents would find objectionable or included links to Facebook, Twitter and other social media services where kids post information about themselves.

The report said mobile apps can siphon data to "invisible and unknown" third parties that could be used to develop a detailed profile of a child without a parent's knowledge or consent.

"It's not hypothetical that this information was shared," said Jessica Rich, associate director of the FTC's financial practices division.

The FTC also said it was investigating whether any of the apps developers engaged in unfair or deceptive trade practices, which would be illegal.

A trade group representing apps developers said the industry's growth has been fueled largely by small businesses, first-time developers and even high school students who do not have legal departments or privacy experts on staff. The FTC's report is a reminder of the importance of educating developers on best practices for privacy, the Washington-based Association for Competitive Technology said in a statement.

In one case mentioned in the FTC report, an app that allows children to paint pictures and save them in an online photo gallery didn't indicate that it included advertising. But investigators said the app ran an ad across the bottom of the screen for an online dating service that said, "See 1000+ Singles.

The FTC would not identify any companies it was investigating until a complaint is filed, Rich said. She said the agency expects the report will "light a fire" under the industry.

"We're not naming names, in part because we think this is a systematic problem, and we don't want people to think that if they avoid certain apps that they're home free," Rich said.

The commission is considering major changes to a 1998 law, the Children's Online Privacy Protection Act, that would impose tougher online safeguards for children under 13. Technology companies have warned that the proposed changes are too aggressive and could discourage them from producing kid-friendly content on the Internet. But public interest groups have pushed hard for the changes, saying expanded use of mobile devices and methods for collecting personal data have outpaced rules put in place more than a decade ago.

Only about 20 percent of the apps disclosed any information about the program's privacy practices, and the FTC said many disclosures were inadequate.

Q: I married my husband in June 2012 and he died suddenly in October, Am I eligible for widow's benefits on his account?

A: I'm sorry, but the law says you must have been months before you can be eligible for widow's benefits on his record.

There is one major exception to that duration of marriage rule. That exception says the nine-month requirement can be waived if the death was accidental. And "accidental" is defined as "receiving bodily injuries through violent, external and accidental means." Your email just said he died suddenly. If you meant he died suddenly in something like an automobile accident, then you would be eligible you meant he died suddenly from natural causes, like a heart attack, then the duration of marriage rule cannot be waived and you would not be eligible for widow's benefits.

There are other minor exceptions to the duration of marriage rule. They involve limited and rather unusual circumstances, so I am pretty sure they would not apply to you. However, you should talk to someone at your local Social Security office about this to make

Q: I was married to my first husband for 28 years. He died in 2001. I married my second husband in 2008, but we divorced last year. I am about to turn 60 and was thinking about widow's benefits from my first husband. But I was told that because I remarried before the age of 60, I forfeited my chances to get benefits on his account. Is this true?

If this widow has minor children in her care, she might be getting what Social Security calls "mother's benefits." Those payments are made to a widow of any age who is caring for her deceased husband's children --

If she's not disabled, and if she doesn't have minor kids at home, then either she is lying to you about her Social Security eligibility, or maybe she's fibbing about the other hand, men generher age!

O: You always write about women qualifying for various kinds of spousal benefits. But what about us men? Can we get Social Security from our wives or ex-wives?

A: Sure. But that's a "sure" followed by a big "IF." Almost all Social

Security rules are gender neutral. Just as a woman might qualify for a wife's or widow's benefit from her husband or ex-husband, a man might qualify for a husband's or widower's benefit from his wife or ex-wife.

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
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In other words, Social Security treats everyone equally. The problem is society has not treated all women equally. Because women generally make less money than men, and because women generally spend less time in the paid labor force than men do, women tend to get much smaller Social Security payments than men

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


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Advent devotionals from Pastor Mike Sublett

December 12 - Bethlehem

At the time of the Advent story, Bethlehem was just a tiny town with a population of only about 2,500. During major Jewish festivals and celebrations it served as a kind of extension of the capitol, Jerusalem, since it was only 5 miles away. However, remember that the final 20 miles of the 150 mile hike wasn't on a flat, well cleared road; rather 3,500 feet uphill along (by today's standards) a narrow path, a hiking trail if you will.

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When they finally entered the town they found a rural setting that was more famous as the home for sheepherders than anything else. Bethlehem was where the money-grubbing priests kept most of the sacrificial sheep they were grooming for sale at the temple. Huge herds grazed in the fields outside Bethlehem and were the No. 1 boost for the local economy.

So what does this all say about Bethlehem? It was hard to get to, very rural, tiny and smelly. Then why did God pick Bethlehem as His son's birthplace? You would think that He would select Jerusalem, the kingly city for the King of Kings. But not so with God; He picked the town nobody was thinking about; the one not on anybody's "must see" list.

Do you sometimes feel around people like Bethlehem appeared among the cities and towns of Palestine; nothing special, not pretty/handsome, clothes not as nice, living in the run down part of town, poor, lower class, not many friends?

You see, in Jesus' day nobody really dreamed about visiting Bethlehem. But since the Advent, no world traveler would think of visiting that part of the world and not stop in Bethlehem. The Advent changed it all for that little town. And it can do the same for you too.

You just have to do what Bethlehem did. What was that you ask? Bethlehem cooperated and went along with God's plan. How? It didn't fight the plan and it allowed itself to be used by God. If you haven't already done that, then you can follow Bethlehem's lead right now. Just submit yourself to God and ask Him to take charge. And if you've already done that, then thank God for receiving you into His Kingdom.

Prayer: Father God, all too often I have thought of myself as a human Bethlehem. I've doubted the specialness that You put inside me. I don't want to do that anymore. I thank You for choosing me and I submit myself to Your Lordship. Amen.

December 13 – the inn

When you think of staying in a cheap motel, what comes to mind? What is your worst "motel" memory?

Now compare that with a small rock building, dirt floor, no air-conditioning or heating, no indoor plumbing, only an outhouse for a bathroom, no electricity and no food. YUCK! Are you ready for that overnighter?

The inns of Jesus' day were a far cry from even the cheapest of motels in America these days. But Mary and Joseph were content with so little that the YUCK INN described above was going to be just fine for them and their baby.

December 16 - sheep



that how the thickness of their wool acted like a giant sponge for holding plenty of dirt and musty moisture and you have a beginning idea of what a herd of sheep might smell like.

But how about we focus on a particular herd of sheep; one located just outside the town of Bethlehem. To be honest there wasn't anything really special about them, nor about their shepherds. (They were more than likely employed by the high priest as part of his scheme to rob the worshipers who came to the Temple in Jerusalem for the Jewish celebrations. The priests would disqualify the sheep that the worshipers brought and then sell them a pre-approved one at a jacked-up price.)

Every night with the sheep was just like all the others had been. That is until that one particular Advent night popped on to the scene. That night started out just like all the others; sheep lying on the ground dozing. Then

everything changed.

Do you ever feel like a sheep? You know, just going through the motions-waking, working, eating, sleeping, etc. Are you ready for a sudden change in your life? Ready to be a sheep with a whole new perspective on life, on the Advent? You better let God know. After all He's the Shepherd.

Prayer: Father God, I am so ready for a new life, one deeper and more focused on You than ever before. Please use this Advent season to enrich my spirit. I don't want it to just be another Christmas. I want it to bring me closer to You. I want this Christmas be as special as that night was for the sheep. Amen.

December 17 - the angel

Did you know that God wants to be your bright light too? Not your flashlight, but your bright light. He wants to show you the rocks and holes in life so that you don't fall over or into them and get hurt. But in the midst of the silence the heavenly choir exploded in praise. I'll bet that those shepherds about jumped out of their own skin. What a night that must have been.


Question: when and where was the greatest time of praise and worship through singing that you have ever experienced? How does remembering that time make you feel?


In February, authorities canceled concerts for Valentine's Day and instead organized readings of poems by medieval Mughal emperor Babur.


