## Higdon: Salvation Army closing year with budget shortfall



Fortunately, Pampa doesn't have that many homeless people when compared to Temple, where Cpt. Martha Higdon of the Pampa Salvation Army used

"We were running a soup kitchen and feeding 150 homeless people a day," said Higdon, who relocated to Pampa in June with her husband and family to operate Pampa's Salvation Army.

Her husband, Frankco, also is a Salvation Army captain and

But just because Pampa isn't feeding 150 people a day in a soup kitchen doesn't mean there

emergency travel expenses if there are deaths in the family.

"We call it homeless prevention," she said.

But as 2012 is coming to a close, Higdon said the agency is experiencing a \$10,000 shortfall in its budget.

"We lost two of our major donors this year," she said. "That makes a big difference. What donations we receive makes a difference on how many people we are able to help."


The Salvation Army is a United Way agency, but that money is divided up among 18 different agencies in Pampa.

Since Higdon is still fairly new to her job, she is not familiar with all of the agency's expenses, but estimates it costs at least \$150,000 a year to operate the charity's facility at 701 S. Cuyler St.

Some of the those expenses, like utilities, are shared with the Boys and Girls Club of Pampa, which is housed in the same

It's never easy to turn away an adorable kitten, especially when it shows up on your doorstep, with its sad eyes glimmering and clutching at your heartstrings. And it's only that much harder to say "no" when four adorable kittens show up at the front door seeking shelter, warmth and compassion.

## Military families worried by U.S. fiscal cliff cuts

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) -Emerging from more than a decade at war, military families are confronting a new worry at home: the prospect that a deal between Congress and the White House over federal spending cuts could chip away at military health insurance. pensions and other services long considered untouchable.

"It's a fear of the unknown, and it's worse when members of your family might be deployed," says military spouse Jeremy Hilton, of Burke, Va., who cares for a disabled child while his wife serves as an active duty Air Force officer.

If Congress and President Barack Obama don't agree on spending cuts by Jan. 1, a package of acrossthe-board cuts would take effect that would hit the military heavily. If they do agree on steps to ward off those cuts and stop automatic tax increases, it's likely the military will still see reduced spending, but more targeted. The talks about the

#### DPS increases holiday **DWI** enforcement

AUSTIN - The Texas Department of Public Safety will increase DWI patrols from Dec. 21 to Jan. 1, which includes both the Christmas and New Year holidays.

DPS troopers will focus DWI patrols in high-risk locations at times when alcohol-related crashes are most frequent. The enhanced patrols that target intoxicated drivers are funded through a grant from the Texas Department of Transporta-

"Drinking and driving are always a concern during holidays, and there is no doubt that increased enforcement by DPS and other law enforcement will help save lives," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "But the public must also do their part to help make sure all travelers on our roads have a safe and happy holiday season. Plan ahead. Designate a nondrinking driver or find alternative transportation if you plan to drink."

During the Christmas/New Year holiday enforcement effort last





## Amarillo orthodontist pleads guilty to fraud

AMARILLO, Texas (AP) — A West Texas orthodontist has pleaded guilty to improperly billing the state Medicaid program for millions of dollars. The Amarillo Globe-News reports that Michael David Goodwin pleaded guilty Thursday to one count of health care fraud. The 63-yearold Goodwin faces up to 10 years.


An investigation by showed authorities that Goodwin was billing Medicaid for work done by dental assistants and booking patients at 10-minute pushing them to rush treatments.

He also billed for work he supposedly did at his Amarillo office on days that flight records showed he was in Indiana. Goodwin admitted filing \$2.6 million in billings, some of which were not medically necessary, for at least four years starting in 2008. Prosecutors have moved to dismiss related charges against Goodwin's wife and office manager.

so-called fiscal cliff are ongoing and details of what could be cut have not emerged.

U.S. Defense Secretary
Leon Panetta and Joint
Chiefs Chairman Gen.
Martin Dempsey have
warned it would be devastating to the all-volunteer
force if the Pentagon were
forced to make billiondollar cuts in a short-order
fashion.

"It makes all us peons crazy," said Hilton. "If our military leadership says it would be a problem, we are all worried about what would happen. We rely on our military community, on our military infrastructure, for support."

Hilton, 40, graduated from the Air Force Academy and switched to the Navy to serve eight years as a submariner. He decided to leave the uniformed military and stay home to care for the couple's two children, and work on a master's degree.

Because President Obama has said the pay-

checks and housing benefits of the uniformed military would not be affected if the fiscal cliff talks fail and automatic cuts start, defense experts say the cuts will fall most heavily on civilian Pentagon employees and contractors. Reducing their numbers would directly affect active duty military and their families because those civilians provide much of the day-to-day staff for base services including hospitals, day care facilities, commissaries and even the guards who man many of the gates.

JD Brunson, 47, whose spouse retired as a master sergeant after 24 years in the Air Force, says she and her 56-year-old husband contribute to their military health insurance by paying \$41 monthly

Brunson said the military insurance covered everything for her husband's cancer surgery, which she said cost them only \$100 even though it tallied a \$99,000 bill. The Columbia resident says she is a certified nursing assistant and her husband does maintenance work for a local church and they still

rely on the military health insurance, since their work doesn't provide such beneficial insurance.

"It's vital to us," she says. "It's owed us."

The automatic spending cuts and tax increases that would go into effect in January fall heavily on the Department of Defense, slashing some \$500 billion from future defense spending. So far, the lame-duck Congress and the White House have been unable to come up with an agreement that works around the \$1.2 trillion in automatic cuts. These cuts would come on top of some \$487 billion in spending reductions set to take effect over the coming 10 years.

One of the potential targets to budget cutters is the military's health care system known as Tricare. It provides health coverage to some 10 million active duty men and women, retirees, reservists and their families. Costs for the program have skyrocketed from \$19 billion to \$53 billion in the Pentagon's latest budget request, making it a possible target.

The uniformed military enjoys nearly cost-free

care. In his most recent budget, President Obama has proposed increasing fees for those in the military who retired after 20 years of service and are still of working age. One proposal suggests changing a fee structure that has been unchanged for 11 years by asking \$230 for an individual and \$460 for a family. That is far less than what civilian federal workers pay for their health care, about \$5,000

Air Force Reserve retiree Howard Rowell, 83, of Columbia, has survived a bout with prostate cancer, and his 77-year-old wife Tita has survived major surgery for colon cancer.

Rowell says their care is completely covered, with about 80 percent paid by Medicare and Tricare picking up the remainder. "It's a really good deal for us, because it doesn't cost us anything," says Rowell, who said he joined the Marines at 17. He entered the University of South Carolina and its ROTC program after three years in the Marines and went on to serve 25 years in the Air Force Reserve.

"We have no co-pays at all," Rowell said of his health insurance. Such costs could add up to about \$2,000 out of pocket for him if the system were changed, he said.

Rowell said he has been

Rowell said he has been fortunate financially as a private businessman and that he might be able to afford an increase in taking on some of the medical costs now covered by Tricare, should Washington decide to pare the program. But he uses his savings to help his five children, seven grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren, some of whom have no insurance.

"I sure hope they don't change it," he said of his health insurance benefits. "It's a big worry."

Rowell says he's disconcerted about the lack of information coming from Washington on details of the fiscal cliff talks.

"I'm in the dark," he said.

year, DPS troopers made more than 1,100 DWI arrests, and approximately 350 were the direct result of the increased patrols. DPS enforcement also resulted in more than 15,000 speeding citations, 2,000 seat belt/child safety seat citations and 18,000 other citations.

In addition, troopers made 1,020 fugitive arrests and 623 felony arrests during routine patrol operations.

DPS offers the following additional tips for safe travel during the holidays:

#### Circus claims vodka saves elephants

MOSCOW (AP) — Circus trainers claim two of their elephants were saved from the Siberian cold by vodka.

Emergency ministry spokesman Alexander Davydov said Friday that the elephants were in a trailer that caught fire Thursday outside the city of Novosibirsk, forcing trainers to take them out into the bitter cold before another truck arrived to deliver them to a warm gym at a local community college.

The Komsomolskaya Pravda daily reported that trainer Leonid Labo had the animals, aged 45 and 48, drink 10 liters (2.6 gallons) of vodka diluted in warm water — and a veterinarian said later that only the tips of their ears were frostbitten.

Although scientists say that alcohol can make humans feel warmer but actually lowers their core body temperature, Novosibisk zoo director Rostislav Shilo told the daily that the vodka saved the animals from frostbite and pneumonia, without harming or even intoxicating them.



## Government gone bad

Politicians claim they make our lives better by passing laws. But laws rarely improve life. They go wrong. Unintended consequences are inevitable. Most voters don't pay

Intuition tells us that government is in the problem-solving business, and so the more laws passed, the better off we are. The possibility that fewer laws could leave us better off is hard to grasp. Kids visiting Washington don't ask their congressmen "What laws did you repeal?" It's always, "What did you pass?" And so they pass and pass — a thousand pages of proposed new rules each week - and for every rule, there's an unintended consequence, or several. It's one reason America has been unusually slow to recover from the Great Recession. After previous recessions, employers quickly resumed hiring. Not this time. The unemployment rate is still near 8 percent. It only fell last month because people stopped looking for jobs.

We can see our future in Europe — unless we change. Ann Jolis, who covers European labor issues for The Wall Street Journal, watches how government-imposed work rules sabotage economies.

"The minimum guaranteed annual vacation in Europe is 20 days paid vacation a year. ... In France, it starts at 25 guaranteed days off. ... This summer, the European Court of Justice ... gave workers the right to a vacation do-over. ... You spend the last eight days of your vacation laid up with a sprained ankle ... eight days automatically go into your sick leave. ... You get a vacation do-over."

Such benefits appeal to workers, who don't realize that the goodies come out of their wages. The unemployed don't realize that such rules deter employers from hiring them in the first place. In Italy,

some work rules kick in once a company has more than 10 employees, so companies have an incentive not to hire an 11th employee. Businesses stay small. People stay unemployed.

"European workers have the right ... to gainful unemployment," says Jolis. Both European central planners and liberal politicians in America are clueless about what really helps workers: a free economy. The record is clear. Central planners failed, in the Soviet Union, in Cuba, at the U.S. Postal Service and in America's public schools, and now they stifle growth in Europe and America. Central planning stops innovation. Yet for all that failure, whenever another crisis (real or imagined) hits, the natural instinct is to say, "Politicians must do

something." In my town, unions and civil rights groups demand a higher minimum wage. That sounds good to people. Everyone will get a raise! The problem is in what is not seen. I can interview the guy who got a raise. I can't interview workers who are never offered jobs because the minimum wage or high union pay scales "protected" those jobs out of existence. The benefit of government leaving us alone is rarely intuitive. Because companies just want to make a buck, it's logical to assume that only government rules assure workers' safety. The Occupational Safety and Health Administration sets safety standards for factories, and OSHA officials proudly point out that workplace deaths have dropped since it opened its doors.

Thank goodness for government, right? Well, not so fast. Go back a few years before OSHA, and we find that workplace deaths were dropping just as fast. Workers are safer today because we are richer, and richer societies care more about safety. Even greedy employers take safety precautions if only because it's expensive to replace workers who are hurt!

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP) — Steven Spielberg's Civil War epic "Lincoln" led the Golden Globes on Thursday with seven nominations, among them best drama, best director for Spielberg and acting honors for Daniel Day-Lewis, Sally Field and Tommy Lee Jones.

Tied for second-place with five nominations each, including best drama are Ben Affleck's Iran hostagecrisis thriller "Argo" and Quentin Tarantino's slaveturned-bounty-hunter tale "Django Unchained."

Along with Day-Lewis as Abraham Lincoln in Spielberg's epic, best dramatic actor contenders are Richard Gere as a deceitful Wall Streeter in "Arbitrage"; John Hawkes as a polio victim trying to lose his virginity in The Ses-Joaquin Phoenix as a Navy veteran under the sway of a cult leader in "The Master"; and Denzel Washington as a boozy airline pilot in "Flight."

Snubbed completely was the low-budget critical darling "Beasts of the Southern Wild," which won top honors at last January's Sundance Film Festival. Also shut out was the stripper hit "Magic Mike," which had good buzz for supporting player Matthew McConaughey, who also earned acclaim for roles in "Bernie" and "Killer Joe." Another film to not notch a single nomination was "The Hobbit," a prelude to the "The Lord of the Rings" films, which all got Globe nods.





The Republican Party establishment should tread carefully here, because even if they choose not to vote for Watts — if he decides to even seek the job - it is his skin color and perspective that is central to the GOP having any sort

of presidential future. We might as well not play footsy: the Republican Party is largely a group composed of, and targeting, white Americans. Yes, there are minority Republicans. But when you look at the most recently election

and saw how President Barack Obama was able to destroy Mitt Romney at the ballot box with a racial coalition that rolled up massive support among blacks, Hispanics and Asians, the GOP has a problem. The day has passed when the GOP can win the presidency largely focusing on white Americans. Folks, this is simple math. With the nation moving towards becoming a majority-minority country, the Republican Party cannot afford to continue to ignore, alienate and frankly, tick off minority voters.

J.C. Watts is trying to get party leaders to understand that as a former college football legend at the University of Oklahoma, he knows when a failed game plan needs to be thrown out. In football, if you lose, you often get rid of the coach, and find someone who can recruit better players to put them on the path to winning. Does that mean the GOP

should throw out RNC chairman Reince Priebus? Not necessarily. But it is abundantly clear that the modern day GOP had better find a new game plan or they are going to be on the outside of the Oval Office for quite some time. J.C. Watts is no stranger to this discussion. When he served in the

leadership of the House Republican Conference as a member of Congress from Oklahoma, he tried to quietly address these issues within the party; it often fell on deaf ears. Now Watts can look to his Republican buddies and say, "Didn't I tell you? Now are y'all ready to pay attention?"

But as long as guys, like Mitt Romney surrogate John Sununu, a former New Hampshire governor and chief of staff to President Ronald Reagan, continue to assert that supporters of President Obama voted for him because of handouts, the GOP will resemble that old, drunk uncle you hate to invite over for family dinner because he manages to make himself look like a fool. The Republican Party's problem isn't that they have to better explain their policies to minorities. No. It's that they all need to shut up and LISTEN. Yes, listen. Because every time a top GOP official opens their mouth, all they seem to do is insult the very people they need to vote for

them. This is about relationships. It is about having a dialogue. It's about listening to desires and to see where there is agreement, whether it's education, the environment, entre-

preneurship, sentencing reform, immigration or a host of other issues. Too often, the GOP is afraid to talk to minorities, especially Black folks, and that results in turning them off in a huge way. And just saying, "Look! We have elected some minorities to office" ain't gonna cut it. How did having a Hispanic governor in New Mexico and Sen Marco Rubio, R-Fla., help Mitt Romney in the last election?

Watts understands that having a dialogue with black, Hispanic and Asian business owners about issues other than taxes is going to make a difference. Sorry, GOP, just touting smaller government and fewer taxes won't cut it. The discussion must be broad and touch upon the issues that impact these voters every day. And the only way a Priebus can even understand how to talk to and work with black folks is having a relationship with the likes of J.C. Watts, Colin Powell, Texas Education Commissioner Michael Williams, Florida Lt. Gov. Jennifer Carroll, Rep. Tim Scott, former Citigroup and Time Warner Chairman Richard Parsons, and so many others, and say to

## 'Lincoln' leads Golden Globes with 7 nominations

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP) - Steven Spielberg's Civil War epic "Lincoln" led the Golden Globes on Thursday with seven nominations, among them best drama, best director for Spielberg and acting honors for Daniel Day-Lewis, Sally Field and Tommy Lee Jones.

Tied for second-place with five nominations each, including best drama are Ben Affleck's Iran hostagecrisis thriller "Argo" and Quentin Tarantino's slaveturned-bounty-hunter tale "Django Unchained."

Other best-drama nominees put forward by The Hollywood Foreign Press Association are Ang Lee's shipwreck story "Life of Pi" and Kathryn Bigelow's Osama bin Laden manhunt thriller "Zero Dark Thirty."

Nominated for best musical or comedy were: the British retiree adventure "The Best Exotic Marigold Hotel"; the Victor Hugo musical "Les Miserables"; the first-love tale "Moonrise Kingdom"; the fishing romance "Salmon Fishing in the Yemen"; and the lost-soul romance "Silver Linings Playbook.'

Globe attention can give contenders a boost for Hollywood's top honors, the Academy Awards, whose nominations come out Jan. 10, three days before the Globe ceremony.

The directing lineup came entirely from dramatic films, with Affleck, Bigelow, Lee, Spielberg and Tarantino all in the running.

Filmmakers behind best musical or comedy nominees were shut out for director, including Tom Hooper for "Les Miserables" and David O. Russell for "Silver Linings Playbook."

Along with Day-Lewis as Abraham Lincoln in Spielberg's epic, best dramatic actor contenders are Richard Gere as a deceitful Wall Streeter in "Arbitrage"; John Hawkes as a polio victim trying to lose his virginity in "The Sessions"; Joaquin Phoenix as a Navy veteran under the sway of a cult leader in "The Master"; and Denzel Washington as a boozy airline pilot in "Flight."

Dramatic-actress nominees are Jessica Chastain as a CIA analyst hunting Osama bin Laden in "Zero Dark Thirty"; Marion Cotillard as a whale biologist beset by tragedy in "Rust and Bone"; Helen Mirren as Alfred Hitchcock's strong-minded wife in "Hitchcock"; Naomi Watts as a woman caught up in a devastating tsunami in "The Impossible"; and Rachel Weisz as a woman ruined by an affair in "The Deep Blue Sea."

For musical or comedy actress, the lineup is Emily Blunt as a consultant for a Mideast sheik in "Salmon Fishing in the Yemen"; Judi Dench as a widow who retires overseas in "The Best Exotic Marigold Hotel"; Jennifer Lawrence as a young widow in a new romance in "Silver Linings Playbook"; Maggie Smith as an aging singer in a retirement home in "Quartet"; and Meryl Streep as a wife trying to save her mar-

riage in "Hope Springs." Nominees for musical or comedy actor are Jack Black as a solicitous mortician in "Bernie"; Bradley Cooper as a troubled man fresh out of a mental hospital in "Silver Linings Playbook"; Hugh Jackman as Hugo's long-suffering hero Jean Valjean in "Les Miserables"; Ewan McGregor as a British fisheries expert in "Salmon Fishing in the Yemen"; and Bill Murray as Franklin Roosevelt in

"Hyde Park on Hudson." Competing for supporting actor are Alan Arkin as a Hollywood producer helping a CIA operation in "Argo"; Leonardo Di-Caprio as a cruel slave

owner in "Django Unchained"; Philip Seymour Hoffman as a mesmerizing

cult leader in "The Master"; Tommy Lee Jones as firebrand abolitionist Thaddeus Stevens in "Lincoln"; and Christoph Waltz as a genteel bounty hunter in "Django Unchained."

The supporting-actress picks are Amy Adams as a cult leader's devoted wife in "The Master"; Sally Field as Mary Todd Lincoln in "Lincoln"; Anne Hathaway as a mother fallen into prostitution in "Les Miserables"; Helen Hunt as a sexual surrogate in "The Sessions"; and Nicole Kidman as a trashy mistress of a Death Row inmate in "The Paperboy."

Snubbed completely was the low-budget critical darling "Beasts of the Southern Wild," which won top honors at last January's Sundance Film Festival. Also shut out was the stripper hit "Magic Mike," which had good buzz for supporting player Matthew McConaughey, who also earned acclaim for roles in "Bernie" and "Killer Joe." Another film to not notch a single nomination was "The Hobbit," a prelude to the "The Lord of the Rings" films, which all got Globe nods.

With three nominations, "Salmon Fishing in the Yemen" was a surprise inclusion Thursday, since the film had virtually no awards buzz behind it.

There will be some friendly rivalry among the hosts at the Globe ceremony, Tina Fey and Amy Poehler. Both were nominated for best actress in a TV comedy, Fey for "30 Rock" and Poehler for "Parks and Recreation."

Fey and Poehler follow Ricky Gervais, who was host the last three years and rubbed some Hollywood egos the wrong way with sharp wisecracks about A-list stars and the foreign press association

The Sarah Palin drama "Game Change" leads TV contenders with five nominations: including best movie or miniseries and acting honors for Julianne Moore, Woody Harrelson, Ed Harris and Sarah Paul-

Best TV comedy series nominees are "The Big Bang Theory," "Epi-sodes," "Girls," "Modern Family" and "Smash." TV drama picks are "Breaking Bad," "Boardwalk Empire," "Downton Abbey: Season 2," "Homeland" and "The Newsroom."

Hayden Panettiere was in Nashville, Tenn., when she got word that she'd been nominated as best supporting actress in a TV series for "Nashville."

"I had my phone on my chest sleeping because they told me to be around just in case, but I never expected to get this call," she said. "It took me a second

and then it hit me and I just started welling up. I got pretty emotional.

Globe acting winners often go on to receive the same prizes at the Oscars. All four Oscar winners last season — lead performers Meryl Streep of "The Iron Lady" and Jean Dujardin of "The Artist," and supporting players Octavia Spencer of "The Help" and Christopher Plummer of "Beginners" — Globes first.





them, "Please, take the time to educate me on the issues and concerns resonating among black folks and how our agenda can appeal to them."

Then you sit back, shut up and take notes. The same happens with other constituencies that the Democratic Party has dominated. This is the only effective way the GOP will come to grips with the enormous problems they have in these communities. You first must know why there is so much resistance and then methodically address the is-

sues. And that means having an extraordinary outreach program that will need to be funded and staffed. The fact is a massive outreach effort that is needed may not pay off for the GOP in 2016. But laying the groundwork today could mean seeing the fruits of that labor then and beyond.

I can guarantee the GOP one

thing: if they ignore minority constituents and dismiss them, they will get destroyed at the ballot box. The only way for fruits to prosper is if the seed is planted, cultivated and tended to. The GOP has been unwilling to get its hands dirty and do the hard work when it comes to minority voters. Keep it up and you'll starve to death. I guaran-

tee it.









### Google Maps return to iPhone with new mobile app

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Google Maps has found its way back to the iPhone.

The world's most popular online mapping system returned late Wednesday with the release of the Google Maps iPhone app. The release comes nearly three months after Apple Inc. replaced Google Maps as the device's built-in navigation system and inserted its own map software into the latest version of its mobile operation.

Apple's maps application proved to be far inferior to Google's. The product's shoddiness prompted Apple CEO Tim Cook to issue a rare public apology and recommend that iPhone owners consider using Google maps through a mobile Web browser or seek other alternatives until his company could fix the problems.

Among other things, Apple's maps misplaced landmarks, overlooked towns and sometimes got people horribly lost. In one example brought to light this week, Australian police derided Apple's maps as "life-threatening" because the system steered people looking for the city of Mildura into a sweltering, remote desert 44 miles from their desired destination.

Google Inc., in contrast, is hailing its new iPhone app as a major improvement from the one evicted by Apple.

The additional tools in the free iPhone app include turn-by-turn directions. Google's previous refusal to include that popular feature on the iPhone app —while making it available for smartphones running on its own Android software— is believed to be one of the reasons Apple decided to develop its own technology. The increasing friction between Google and Apple as they jostle for leadership in the

smartphone market also played a role in

the mapping switch.

Google's new iPhone mapping app also offers street-level photography of local neighborhoods for the first time on Apple's mobile operating system, as well as three-dimensional views, public transit directions and listings for more than 80 million businesses around the world. The app still lacks some of the mapping features available on Android-powered phones, such as directions inside malls and other buildings.

There still isn't a Google mapping app for Apple's top-selling tablet computer, the iPad, but the company plans to make one eventually. Google, which is based in Mountain View, Calif., declined to say when it hopes to release an iPad mapping app. For now, iPad owners can use the maps in an iPhone mode. That won't be the best experience, but it still may be better than Apple's offering on the iPad.

Google's free mapping app is likely to become one of the hottest commodities in Apple's app store, if for no other reason than pent-up demand among iPhone owners who are fed up with Apple's alternative. Some iPhone owners even refused to upgrade to Apple's newest software, iOS 6, because they didn't want to lose access to the old Google mapping application built into iOS 5 and earlier versions.

Apple didn't respond to a request for comment about Google's new apps late Wednesday, but it approved the technology before its release.



### New-found tale could be Hans Christian Andersen's

COPENHAGEN, Denmark (AP) — For years, the somber fairy tale about a lonely candle that wanted to be lit dwelt in oblivion at the bottom of a box in Denmark's National Archives. Its recent discovery has sent ripples through the literary world because it is believed to be one of the first tales ever written by Hans Christian Andersen. The famed Dane wrote nearly 160 fairy

tales in his life, including classics such as "The Ugly Duckling" and "The Little Mermaid." The tale of the candle may have been written when he was still a teen, experts say.Retired historian Esben Brage said Thursday that he found the six-page text on Oct. 4 while searching through archive boxes that had belonged to wealthy families from Andersen's hometown of Odense in central

Denmark.

The handwritten copy of the tale, titled "Tallow Candle," and dedicated to a vicar's widow named Bunkeflod who had lived across from Andersen's home, had been left seemingly untouched at the bottom of one of the boxes.

"I was ecstatic," Brage said. "I had never imagined this."

The short story tells the tale of how a tallow candle

seeks help from a tinder box to be able to ignite itself. A senior curator at the Hans Christian Andersen Museum in Odense said the work is likely one of the author's earliest, written at the age of 18 - seven years before his official debut in 1830.

"I often get calls about stuff thought to have been of Andersen's hand.

Arsola's sister took the bills that were partially intact to the bank and received \$400 to \$500 for it. She turned over the smaller shreds to Arsola, who enjoys



## Conservation important during dry times

During times of dry weather and severe drought, conservation is critical and farmers and ranchers need to manage their resources very carefully in these conditions.

This can be accomplished by implementing practices and techniques such as rotational grazing, improving irrigation efficiency, reducing tillage operations, installing terraces and waterways, improving residue management, or by keeping their land in grass rather than breaking it out for crop production.

The USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) offers technical assistance as well as cost share programs to help achieve those goals.

The cost share programs available for 2013 are the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) and the Agricultural Water Enhancement Program (AWEP). Each program offers assistance for eligible participants to install or implement structural and management practices eligible agricultural

gaged in livestock or agricultural production are eligible to participate in these programs.

Common EQIP practices include livestock water development (wells, pipelines, pumps, tubs), fencing, and brush management. In 2012, the NRCS payment schedule on a well was \$11/foot., pipelines (depending on size) ranged from \$0.74 to \$1.11/foot, and fences were \$0.82/foot. EQIP also offers an incentive (in 2012, \$4.09/ac) for implementing a prescribed grazing schedule.

For cropland, EQIP offers financial assistance for installing terraces, diversions, and waterways. On eligible cropland acres, a "No-till/Strip-till" program can be implemented. No-till/Strip-till offers an incentive of \$23.44/ac (in 2012) to reduce tillage operations and increase crop residue. Another option available is planting cropland to grass (native or introduced). AWEP practices in Gray County include converting existing pivots to a more efficient use of water, replacing pivots at

land. Persons who are en- least 20 years old, and irrigation pipelines. AWEP also offers an incentive for Irrigation Water Management (IWM).

This practice involves installing a moisture monitoring system that charts how much moisture is in the soil. These systems help conserve irrigation water by helping the farmer know when to water to avoid plant stress and whether to speed up or slow down the pivot.

EQIP and AWEP are continuous sign-up programs and NRCS accepts applications year round. The first funding window deadline for 2013 EQIP is Feb. 15. Applications not ready for funding by that time will be eligible for the second funding window ending on April 19.




