ou can buy custombuilt bird houses, used electronics and maybe even an old clarinet or saxophone that's been converted into a wall lamp at the Tarpley Shop on North Hobart Street.

That is, if you're lucky enough to find the owner, Glenn

"Buzz" Tarpley, who prefers not to keep regular hours.

"This is a hobby for me for the next 10 years or so. If people can catch me then they can buy it," said the 79-yearold Tarpley, who owned the Tarpley Music Store in Pampa until it closed five years ago.

# Amarillo man charged in Slatten's death

Joshua Keith Rigo was arrested Thursday for murder, first-degree felony, in the death of Kristi Dawn Slatten, the 42-year-old Lefors

Texas Rangers and the Gray County Sheriff's Office will continue to process evidence and follow leads. The next step will be to present the case to the Gray County Grand Jury, said Trooper Daniel Hawthorne with DPS in Amarillo.

He said Thursday's murder arrest warrant came from the Texas Rangers.

Asked if the Rangers have determined a motive, Hawthorne said, "I'm sure the Rangers are working on that but won't talk about it until it goes to the grand jury.

Hawthorne said if convicted Rigo could

face 99 years or life in prison. To be charged in Texas with murder, felony of the first degree, it must be shown that the suspect both intentionally and knowingly killed his victim,

# City Commission meets Tuesday

The Pampa City Commission will meet at 4 p.m., Tuesday, to accept a \$250,000 grant award from the Pampa Economic Development Corp.

The resolution to approve the grant is a second and final reading, as the Commission first approved the award at its meeting in December.

The funds will be used to demolish more than 100 condemned residential structures around Pampa.

Also on Tuesday's agenda are two public hearings. The first public hearing will be for the Commission to receive public comments concerning Open Range Development's request to plat the Edwin Park subdivision. The second hearing will involve public comments on Robert Forester's application to rezone property at Lot 8, Block 3, Boyd Annex Addition, from agricultural to commercial. The Commission will consider award-

ing bids for the following delinquent tax properties: 720 E. Murphy, Lots 11 and 12, Block 22, Wilcox Addition, for \$400; 1036 Varnon, Lot 13, Block 5, Prairie Village Addition, for \$301; and 611 Barnes, Lots 5-7, Block 14, Wilcox Addition, for

which carries the death sentence, there must be intent and knowledge, along with committing another felony such as robbing a bank, Hawthorne said. He added that killing a

child, a law enforcement officer or a corrections officer also can carry a death sentence.

Slatten was found dead in her home Tuesday by the GCSO after they received a 911 call.

Authorities investigating the scene determined there was foul play and that Slatten's Chevrolet Avalanche was missing. A warrant was issued for the stolen vehicle and shortly afterward authorities stopped the truck on U.S. Highway 60 two miles west of Panhandle.

Rigo was the driver.

The passenger, Steve Preston Dean, 47, of Amarillo, was arrested on unrelated charges. Both men were taken to the Carson County Jail.

# Author offers spot in book for finding lost dog

BROOKLINE, Mass. (AP) — There's a new mystery on Dennis Lehane's mind, and the bestselling author is offering a special reward: Find his lost dog and get a spot in his next book.

The plot kicked off Christmas Eve, when the crime novelist's rescue beagle Tessa escaped from his yard after an outdoor gate latch didn't lock all the way.

Since then, Lehane's family has launched an all-out search.

They've posted fliers, organized foot searches and used social media to try to bring Tessa back to their home in Brookline, Mass., near Boston.

The 47-year-old author of books including "Mystic River" and "Gone, Baby, Gone" is offering a monetary reward and has said he'll name a character in his next book after whoever finds Tessa.

Lehane said Thursday outside his home that he's surprised by the media attention the story has attracted, and thinks it has something to do with the character offer.

### Cat that spent a week in Mass. tree found

MARION, Mass. (AP) - A stray cat that spent at least a week stuck in a Massachusetts tree before plunging 80 feet to the ground and fleeing has been found, and all things considered, appears to be in good health.

A Marion Animal Hospital veterinarian said Wednesday it's "unbelievable" that the cat dubbed Fortunate has just a couple of pulled muscles and a possible parasitic infection.

The cat was spotted in a Rochester, Mass., tree on Christmas Eve. Several rescue attempts failed before firefighters cut the branch it was perched on

Sunday.

Cat shelter founder Pam Robinson finally trapped the skittish feline on Tuesday.

Robinson tells The Standard Times she will keep the cat for a few weeks so it can regain weight before putting it up for adoption.

#### Pa. man claims booze on breath a week old

ALTOONA, Pa. (AP) Police say a central Pennsylvania man arrested for public drunkenness when he tried to report his cellphone had been stolen claimed that the booze officers smelled on his breath was a week old.

Altoona police didn't buy that, and say they also found brass knuckles, a small amount of marijuana and a pipe on 19-yearold John Ozio, before they decided to arrest him on Dec. 23. Ozio's public defender could not immediately be reached for comment.

He remained in the Blair County Prison on Thursday, awaiting a Feb. 8 preliminary hearing on charges of carrying an illegal weapon, marijuana possession, public drunkenness, underage drinking and criminal mischief.

Police say Ozio claimed someone planted the marijuana pipe in his backpack and that he carried the brass knuckles as "protection from being jumped."

#### Third per charged in death of TX boy

SAN ANTONIO (AP) A third caregiver has been charged following the death of a 5-year-old South Texas boy who showed signs of neglect and abuse.

San Antonio police on Thursday night arrested the boy's step-grandmother, Gloria Proo, on a charge of felony injury to a child.







# Abrams Brothers to play in Pampa on Jan. 24

Canadian troubadours The Abrams Brothers will play the M.K. Brown Auditorium at 7:30 p.m., Jan. 24, in support of their auspicious new album 'Northern Redemption' (United For Opportunity).

Tickets are available at the door. Individual tickets are \$20. Season tickets can be purchased for \$40, which includes the Jan. 24 event plus two more events TBA. Doors open at 7 p.m.

This is the first studio album of original material for the band, which consists of brothers John Abrams (vocals, guitar, mandolin, keyboard, percussion) and James Abrams (vocals, violin) and their cousin Elijah Abrams (bass).

Hooper added that the library has not been completely without heat the past couple of weeks as three of the facility's four units were not affected.





# One cheer for the cliff deal

One cheer out of a potential three is all anyone can logically give the fiscal-cliff deal. On the day after the bargain was clinched, the stock market gave a 300-point cheer. So

short run, extending tax cuts up to \$450,000 probably saved us from a recession. If all the tax cuts had expired,

In the

we'd have a \$500 billion tax hike, plus marginal rate increases, and that would have sunk the economy. So I'm going to bet that the big stock rally was a sign of relief that the final deal wasn't worse.

The final product was sort of a least-bad tax scenario. The top tax threshold got to \$450,000. Capital gains and dividends were capped at 20 percent. And even the estate tax did better than feared, with a 40 percent rate off a \$5 million exemption Plus, all the tax rates were made permanent — including the rate for the alternative minimum tax (AMT)

So it could have been worse. And it probably saved a recession. So that's the one cheer. But the rest of this story goes from bad to worse. Let's start with no

spending cuts. The spending sequester was thrown out the window. And I have zero confidence that much if any of it will be restored in the next couple of months. The wellpublicized ratio of 41 to 1 - tax hikes over spending cuts — is deplorable.

We'll see during the upcoming debt-ceiling battle whether Congress, including the Republicans, has a real appetite to cut spending. There will be talk about shutting down the government and, even worse, talk of a debt default. But right now it's hard to expect any consensus on real entitlement reform and spending restraint that would limit the federal share of the economy to 20 percent,

which is where it belongs. And that brings me back to the tax problem. The president is going to want another \$600 billion or

\$700 billion in tax hikes. The recent bill already curbs high-end exemptions and deductions. But get ready — more is on the way from Team Obama. More deduction caps. Maybe a value-added tax. Maybe a carbon tax. Or maybe they just keep taxing the rich.

And don't forget the Obamacare tax hikes, which are estimated to be roughly \$1 trillion over the next 10 years. That includes a 3.8 percent surtax on investment income above \$250,000 per family, a 0.9 percent hike in the Medicare payroll tax (also a \$250,000 threshold), a 2.3 percent medical-device tax, new caps on flexible health accounts and an Obamacare haircut for medical itemized deductions.

In rough terms, when you add the Obamacare tax hikes on successful investors, earners and small-business owners to the new fiscal-cliff bill, you're looking at a roughly 12 percent decline of incentive rewards from lower profitability and less

Of course this is antigrowth. Of course this will reduce the long-term growth potential of the U.S. economy. And of course the added revenues will be spent, bloating the budget and reducing the economy's potential to

Economic growth is the key to reducing the spending, deficit and debt share of the economy. Specifically, grow the gross domestic product denominator with real personal and corporate tax-rate reform and reduce the demand for government dependency.

That's the solution to our problem.

It's a European economic model. And it's the exact reverse of supplyside economics. You can't tax your way into prosperity or a balanced budget. The economic pie grows smaller. Government grows bigger. Redistribution and government dependency grow more powerful and pervasive.

# Revitalizing aging shopping center a worthy endeavor

Pampa is named after the La Pampas low lands, a fertile plain that includes several Argentine provinces and most of Uruguay.

In June, the 50-year-old Coronado Shopping Center was renamed Las Pampas Square after it was purchased by the Pampa Economic Development Corp., headed by Clay Rice as executive direc-

Like the Argentine region its name resembles, the Square can prosper and grow much as Pampa itself has done over the decades.

Since PEDC became the new property owner, Steeles discount department store has opened next to Hastings and energy company Enbridge in November opened an office that is home to 235 of its employees.

The PEDC is working ambitiously to improve the center's appearance with new landscaping and decorative awnings while replacing a lot of the old plumbing and wiring. Rice said the buildings are

still structurally sound, but have gone through the normal wear and tear you'd expect over five decades. Rice said there a few new

business prospects, and some of the existing businesses may be relocating within the center.

About half of the center's 200,000 square feet is available for leasing.

Cinema 4 in the Square shows current flicks in its four theaters, but it is hidden in

the back and has no marquee along heavily traveled North Hobart Street.


A new sign is in the works for the Square that will have a theater marquee.

Clay said the Square is a work in progress.

He describes it as part of a bustling economic hub that includes McDonald's and other nearby restaurants, the AmericInn hotel, the M.K. Brown Memorial Auditorium and several nearby banks.

Revitalizing the Square is a worthy endeavor, not just for that side of town, but for the entire city.

As new businesses and shoppers are attracted to the center, they will likely travel about and spend money in other parts of town, raising the tide for everybody in Pampa.

# If demography is destiny, good news for Texas, D.C.

Demographics buffs get a special Christmas present every year courtesy of the Census Bureau: its annual estimates of the populations of the 50 states and the District of Columbia.

This gives demographers a chance to see where the nation is growing and where it is not, and to get an idea of the desti-

nation of immigrants and of the flow of people into one set of states and out of another.

Nationally, the Census Bureau estimates that the United States has grown from 308 million people when the Census was conducted in April 2010 to almost 313 million in July 2012, a rate of 1.7 percent. If that continues through the decade, the nation's population will rise at a lower rate but by a larger number in this decade than it did in 2000-2010.

The fastest growth in the last two years has been in two small enclaves — in the District of Columbia (5.1 percent), thanks to the federal government and gentrification, and in North Dakota (4 percent), thanks to the

Bakken shale oil boom.

Neither is up to 700,000 people yet, though North Dakota, after nearly a century in the 600,000s, is almost there.

The next-fastest growth rate is in the giant state of Texas. Its population rose 3.6 percent, to 26 million. This single state accounts for 18 percent of total U.S. population growth.

Two other states grew more than 3 percent, Utah and Colorado, thanks to high birth rates and newcomers eager to live near ski areas. And Florida, where growth stagnated after the housing bust, grew at 2.7 percent.

The two biggest growth states of the last two decades, Nevada and Arizona, are growing again, but at a pace behind Washington state and at about the same rate of the South Atlantic states of Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina and Georgia.

The two states that lost population in the last two years are economically beleaguered Rhode Island and Michigan. But Michigan seems to be rebounding, growing enough in the last year that its 2010-12 estimated population loss was only 275 people.

Immigration is sharply down from the levels of 1982-2007. International migration, as the Census Bureau calls it, was

only 0.6 percent of 2010 population in the last two years. It topped the 1 percent level only in New Jersey, New York and Florida.

To judge from the statewide figures, immigrants have stopped heading in large numbers to the heartland and have mostly been going to a few metro areas - New York, Boston, Washington, Miami and Orlando.

Immigration is only slightly above the national average now in California and Nevada and below it in Arizona, with its immigration enforcement laws. Net Mexican immigration has halted. California is likely getting more Asians than Hispanics.

Movement within the country has been at low levels; people tend to stay put when economic times are bad, as they did in the

But New York, New Jersey, Connecticut and Illinois did see an outflow of more than 1 percent of their 2010 populations. People evidently aren't enamored of their high (and in Connecticut and Illinois, increased ) tax

And there was significant outflow from the auto states of Michigan and Ohio, as well. But outflow from California was much lower than in the past and amounted to less than half of the immigrants who moved in.

The biggest domestic inflow in percentage terms, though the numbers aren't huge, was to booming North Dakota and the District of Columbia, 2.6 and 2.4 percent of their 2010 populations. That's big in just two years.

After that, the biggest inflows in percentage terms were in the secondlargest and soon to be third-largest states, Texas and Florida, and in Colorado. Tampa, Orlando, Houston, Austin, Dallas and Denver are drawing people in.

Nationally, natural increase — the excess of births (8.9 million) over deaths (5.6 million) – was almost double the number of immigrants (1.8 million).

Babies seem to come disproportionately to opposite ends of the political spectrum.

The big stories: the Bakken shale, big government, the Texas boom and the continued slide down I-95 from the Northeast to the South Atlantic from Washington, D.C., to Florida.

# 2012 statewide gas price average most expensive on record

According to the AAA Weekend Gas Watch, 2012 proved to be the year with the most expensive annual statewide average on record.

The annual average price for a gallon of regular unleaded gasoline in Texas in 2012 was \$3.43.

The previous annual record was \$3.37 in 2011, and the third most expensive year for gas prices was in 2008 when the annual average was \$3.13.

Factors like major hurricanes, refinery outages and tension in the Middle East impacted gas prices sending markets in an upward swing for most of the year.

The highest daily Texas statewide average of the year was \$3.84 on April 5 and 6, while the lowest daily statewide average was \$3.03 a gallon on Dec. 20.

Gas prices in Texas averaged \$3.09 a gallon statewide in December, which was the lowest monthly average of the year. April was the most ex-

pensive month for gas this year, with a monthly average of \$3.80. As a result of continued

negotiations in Washington, forecasts about gas prices in 2013 remain very uncertain.

Even as a fiscal cliff deal is reached, AAA Texas forecasts that gas prices in 2013 will remain high, but may be cheaper than in 2012 due to increased domestic crude oil production and that demand is expected to remain lower than in recent years.

This week the statewide average for a gallon of regular unleaded in Texas increased six cents and is \$3.13, according to the AAA Texas Weekend Gas Watch. Motorists in Texarkana are paying the most on average at \$3.19, and drivers in El Paso are paying the least at \$3.03.

The average price for

fuel in the Lone Star State is 16 cents less than the national average of \$3.29.

"What happens with gas prices this year will depend what happens both domestically and globally," said AAA Texas/New Mexico representative Sarah Schimmer.

"Regardless of where gas prices go in the coming year, consumers can keep more money in their pocketbooks by keeping their car maintained to ensure maximum fuel efficiency, traveling light, and combining trips. To help consumers iden-

# US economy adds 155K jobs; rate remains 7.8 percent

WASHINGTON U.S. employers added 155,000 jobs in December, a steady gain that shows hiring held up during the tense negotiations to resolve the fiscal cliff.

The solid job growth wasn't enough to push down the unemployment rate, which remained 7.8 percent last month, the Labor Department said Friday. The rate for November was revised up from an initially reported 7.7 percent.

The government also said hiring was stronger in the previous month than first thought. November's job gains were revised up 15,000 to 161,000. October's increase was nearly unchanged at 137,000.

The "gain is perhaps better than it looks given that firms were probably nervous about adding workers with the fiscal cliff looming," said Paul Ashworth, an economist at Capital Economics.

Robust hiring in manufacturing and construction fueled the December job gains. Construction firms added 30,000, the most in 15 months. That increase likely reflected hiring needed to rebuild after Superstorm Sandy and also gains in home building that have contributed to a housing recovery.

Manufacturers added 25,000 jobs, the most in nine months.

Other higher-paying industries also added jobs. Professional and business services, which include jobs in information technology, management and architecture, gained 19,000. Financial services added 9,000. health care 55,000.

Lower-paying industry sectors were mixed. Restaurants and bars added 38,000 jobs. Retailers cut 11,300, a sign that the holiday shopping season may have been weak. But those cuts came after three months of strong

All the job gains last month came from private employers. Governments shed 13,000 jobs, mostly in local school systems.

Hiring still isn't strong enough to quickly reduce still-high unemployment. For 2012, employers added 1.84 million jobs, an average of 153,000 jobs a month, roughly matching the job totals for 2011.

But the stable hiring last month shows that employers didn't panic during the high-stakes talks between Congress and the White House over tax increases and spending cuts that weren't resolved until New Year's.

That's an encouraging sign for the coming months, because an even bigger federal budget showdown is looming. The government must increase its \$16.4 trillion borrowing limit by around late February or risk defaulting on its debt. Republicans will likely demand deep spending cuts as the price of raising the debt limit.

Friday's report did point to some weakness in the job market. For example, the number of unemployed actually rose 164,000 to 12.2 million. 192,000 people entered the

work force last month, but most of them didn't find jobs.

The unemployment numbers come from a government survey of households; the number of jobs added each month comes from a separate survey of businesses.

A broader category that includes not only the unemployed but also part-time workers who want full-time jobs and people who have given up looking for work was unchanged in December at 22.7 million.

Despite still-modest job growth, the economy is improving. Layoffs are declining. And the number of people who sought unemployment aid in the past month is near a four-year

The December jobs report showed that hourly pay is staying slightly ahead of inflation. Hourly wages rose 7 cents to \$23.73, a 2.1 percent increase compared with a year earlier. Inflation rose 1.8 percent over the same period.

The once-depressed housing market is recovering. Companies ordered more long-lasting manufactured goods in November, a sign that they're investing more in equipment and software. And Americans spent more in November. Consumer spending drives nearly 70 percent of economic

Manufacturing is getting a boost from the best auto sales in five years. Car sales jumped 13 percent in 2012 to 14.5 million. And Americans spent more at the tail end of the holiday shopping season, boosting overall sales that had slumped earlier in the crucial two-month

The Department of Public Safety suspended both troopers in late December. DPS didn't immediately provide further details Fri-

An Irving woman and her adult niece on Dec. 17 sued both troopers and DPS director Steve McCraw. Angel and Ashley Dobbs say the search videotaped by a patrol car camera was illegal and humiliating.

The women say Ferrell stopped them after seeing cigarette butts thrown out a window. Helleson searched the pair. No drugs were

#### Texas allows gun show messages in Houston

HOUSTON (AP) — Texas transportation officials have overruled a district office and restored use of electronic freeway signs for public safety traffic updates near firearms-related events

Texas Department of Transportation officials in Houston on Thursday said use of such signs was suspended amid complaints following a gun show the day after the Dec. 14 massacre at a Connecticut school. A gunman killed 26 people, including 20 children, then himself.

TxDOT officials on the state level later Thursday said the local decision to stop using traffic advisory signs at firearms-related events was wrong. TxDOT spokeswoman Veronica Beyer says message boards are used to help direct traffic when there's an accident and at large events for public safety.

Such signs are also typically used for high trafficvolume situations such as rodeos and sporting events.

#### **Texas company must** pay for faked tests

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — A judge says a Houston company must pay \$1 million in fines and community service payments for falsifying water tests at an offshore production platform in 2009.

The U.S. Attorney's Of-

fice in New Orleans says in a news release that U.S. District Judge Eldon Fallon sentenced W&T Offshore Inc. on Thursday. The company had pleaded guilty to tampering with monitoring required under the Clean Water Act.

Permits require monthly tests of whether oil and grease discharges are within federal limits.

Prosecutors say that, at least six times in 2009, a contractor's employees filtered samples before sending them to a lab. A news release did not identify the contractor.

As part of three years on probation, W&T is to have three-quarters of its 107 offshore facilities audited.

#### 1 in 24 admit nodding off while driving

NEW YORK (AP) This could give you nightmares: 1 in 24 U.S. adults say they recently fell asleep while driving.

And health officials think the number is probably higher. That's because some people don't realize it when they nod off for a second or two behind the wheel.

In a government study released Thursday, a little over 4 percent of U.S. adults said they fell asleep while driving at least once in the previous month. earlier studies Some reached a similar conclusion, but the survey by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention was far

The results are from a survey of 147,000 adults in 2009 and 2010.

#### Children rescued in exploitation probe

DALLAS (AP) — U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement says 36 of 123 sexually exploited children identified in a five-week, international child pornography investigation were rescued in North Texas.

ICE Director John Morton revealed on Thursday that more than 200 adults had been arrested on allegations arising from the probe, which ended in early December. It found 110 victims in 19 U.S. states. The others were living in six countries.

ICE spokesman Carl Rusnok in Dallas says 36 children were identified and rescued in the Dallas-Fort Worth area. He provided no other details.

Morton says the investigation is part of the agency's effort to find and rescue victims, and arrest abusers and people who make or transmit child pornography.

ness started more than 80 years ago by Tarpley's grandmother, Clara.

The Pampa store opened on North Cuyler Street in 1926 but shuttered in February 2007 due to lack of business.

Tarpley retired in 1991 and now spends an hour or so each morning building bird houses from cedar (or tinkering with whatever other project pops into his head) in the cavernous workshop in back of the small storefront at Hobart Street and Kentucky

"This used to be an electrician's place that they rented from Tarpley music," he said.

Now, it's a woodworker's dream with band saws, table saws, drill presses and every hand tool imaginable.

Looking through the front window, you see what looks like a small retail area.

But it isn't a retail area at all, because there's no cash register, no sales clerk, and, of course, no designated business hours.

What you will find, however, is a lot of interesting stuff and oddities, like a Detroit-built Farrand pump organ that still works, a handmade birdhouse with a toy Hummer parked in the carport, another birdhouse built in the shape of a caboose, a vintage two-way radio used by law enforcement, and — a true flashback to the 1970s a Pioneer receiver with a

turntable and 8-track player. (A "Pink Floyd" tape is sticking out of the tape

Then there's Tarpley's small collection of old clarinets and saxophones converted into lamps.

As a former music store owner, Tarpley got to know a lot of band directors in town, either when they came into his store or through his visits to the schools.

One day, probably back in the '60s or '70s if his memory serves correctly, Tarpley said he overheard a junior high band director say to a student, "If you can't play that any better than that, then I'm gonna make a lamp out of it.'

The teacher's sarcastic remark inspired him to actually make lamps from musical instruments.

So where is Buzz-the-Owner when he's not at the shop?

Well ... he doesn't like to get too specific at first, but if you look around the shop, you might be able to make an educated guess. In the northwest corner

is Tarpley's "golf corner," where he has a few dozen golf hats hanging on peg boards. Then he admits: " I like

to play golf every chance I get. I like to fish, hunt, I'm pretty active."

Tarpley's son and nephew, John and David respectively, work for the family business at the company's operations office in Amarillo.

David said each summer the Tarpley men and boys go on a three-day fishing trip in the mountains of northern New Mexico.

"We were always doing something as a family outdoors," David recalled. "We were either hunting or fishing. I have great memories of Bill (David's father) and Buzz.

Though David went to college, he said he learned more about running a business from his father and uncle than he did in school.

John said he was adopted by Buzz and his wife, Jewel, when he was 9 days

"But there has never been any question that I'm a part of the Tarpley family," he said.
"I am very blessed to be

in this family and Buzz has

always been a role model and someone I looked up to.' John played basketball while attending Pampa

schools, and said during that entire time his dad only missed one game. As a music store owner,

John said his dad never missed a beat.

"He put a tremendous amount of his life and hours into that store."

# Transocean's \$1.4B oil spill deal will help Gulf recover

**NEW ORLEANS** (AP) — A \$1.4 billion settlement between the Justice Department and Deepwater Horizon rig owner Transocean Ltd. will pump hundreds of millions of dollars into projects designed to help the Gulf Coast recover from the nation's largest offshore oil spill.

Transocean, which owned the rig that sank after an explosion killed 11 workers and spawned the 2010 spill in the Gulf of Mexico, agreed Thursday to pay \$1 billion in civil penalties and \$400 million in criminal penalties and plead guilty to a misdemeanor charge of violating the Clean Water

Much of the money will fund environmentalrestoration projects and spill-prevention research and training.

Congress approved legislation that dedicates 80 percent of the civil penalty for environmental and economic recovery projects in the Gulf states.

"While this small step forward will not bring back the 11 lives that were lost or reverse the extraordinary damages caused by the Deepwater Horizon disaster, it is incremental progress in Transocean making it right," Louisiana Gov. Bobby Jindal said in a statement. "Natural resources damages and response costs are excluded from this

agreement. Now the focus remains on BP to fulfill the commitments of their PR campaign to put this tragedy behind us."

The proposed settlement resolves the Justice Department's civil and criminal probes of Transocean's role in the Deepwater Horizon rig disaster.

The deal, which is subject to a federal judge's approval, also calls for Transocean to implement a series of operational safety and emergency response improvements on its rigs.

'This resolution of criminal allegations and civil claims against Transocean brings us one significant step closer to

justice for the human, environmental and economic devastation wrought by the Deepwater Horizon disaster," Attorney General Eric Holder said in a statement.

Transocean said it believes the settlement is in the best interest of its shareholders and employees and eliminates "much of the uncertainty associated with the accident."

"This is a positive step forward, but it is also a time to reflect on the 11 men who lost their lives aboard the Deepwater Horizon," the company

"Their families continue to be in the thoughts and prayers of all of us at Transocean."

BP PLC, which leased the rig from Transocean, already has agreed to pay a record \$4.5 billion in penalties and plead guilty to manslaughter and other criminal charges related to the spill.

The deal with BP doesn't resolve the federal government's civil claims against the London-based oil company.

U.S. Sen. Mary Landrieu, a Louisiana

Democrat, said the Transocean settlement will dedicate \$800 million of the civil penalty and \$300 million of criminal penalty to coastal protection and restoration work.

"While this is an important achievement, I hope it will be one in a series of settlements to bring justice and resolution to our region," she said in a statement.

U.S. Sen. David Vitter, a Louisiana Republican, said he hopes it leads to "much bigger final action with BP, the main culprit in this horrible disaster."

# Three NYPD officers shot in separate incidents

NEW YORK (AP) — Three New York City police officers were recovering Friday, hours after being shot in separate incidents that left one suspect dead and four under arrest.

The shootings occurred in a one-hour span Thursday night.

Off-duty Police Officer

Juan Pichardo was shot in the thigh at his family's Bronx car dealership by one of two men who entered the business around 6:30 p.m.

An hour later in Brooklyn, two plainclothes transit officers were injured in a shootout on a subway car. A man pulled a handgun from his waistband and opened fire, police said. One of the officers returned fire, killing the suspect.

"In recent weeks, we've heard some people say that the only thing that stops a bad guy with a gun is a good guy with a gun. But sometimes the good guys get shot and sometimes, they are killed," Mayor Michael Bloomberg told reporters Thursday.

"Tonight, thank God, three good guys — three New York City police officers, who acted heroically — are going to make it," the mayor said. Last year, 11 police

officers were shot while on duty and one while off duty, none of them fatal.

Pichardo was working off-duty at the car dealership when two men, one armed with a handgun, entered while two other men waited outside in a getaway car, Commissioner Raymond Kelly

After the two feigned interest in buying a car, one of them pulled out a handgun and ordered Pichardo and an employee onto the floor in a back office and started to ransack the place.

"A few minutes after the robbery, Officer Pichardo stood up and grabbed the gunman, who fired, striking the officer in the right thigh," Kelly

Although wounded, Pichardo and the other employee wrestled the gunman to the ground and disarmed him. His accomplice fled in the getaway car with the two others, but they were stopped a short distance away and arrested.

Kelly said Pichardo had recognized the gunman as a member of a Bronx robbery crew. The suspect's gun was reported stolen from North Carolina in Dec. 2012, he said.

Bloomberg said Pichardo was in stable condi-

tion at Jacobi Medical Center in the Bronx.

The Brooklyn shooting, which left a suspect dead, took place at about 7:30 p.m. at the Fort Hamilton Parkway subway station at 62nd Street, according to Police Commissioner Raymond Kelly.

Two plainclothes officers assigned to Transit District 34, Michael Levay and Lukasz Kozicki, were on patrol when they observed a man moving between subway cars, a violation of transit regulations, Kelly said.

The commissioner said that in the past police have found that "people who are looking to commit crimes will walk through the cars."

As the train approached the station, Kelly said the officers approached the man, who was sitting down, and asked him for identification.

The man stood up and appeared to reach for his wallet, but instead "pulled a 9-millimeter Taurus handgun from his waistband and opened fire," Kelly said.

"A witness said that the gunman appeared to notice the officer's bulletresistant vest, and, as a result, aimed low before he fired," Kelly said.

Kelly said Levay has a welt on his back and

#### Third adult charged in San Antonio death

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A third caregiver has been charged following the death of a 5-year-old South Texas boy who showed signs of neglect and abuse.

San Antonio police on Thursday night arrested the boy's step-grandmother, Gloria Proo, on a charge of felony injury to a child.

Police say Josiah Williams on Dec. 27 was found dead at the family's San Antonio home. An autopsy indicated abuse and malnutrition. Investigators say the child had two black eyes and other cuts and bruises.

The boy's father,

Charleston Williams, and stepmother Crystal Williams took custody of Josiah after his biological mother went to prison. Police last week

charged the couple with injury to a child. Sgt. Jim Cole says Proo is the mother of Crystal Wil-

NEW ORLEANS (AP) The Coast Guard says it safely evacuated a man with heart disease from a sailboat in the Gulf. In a news release, the

Coast Guard said officials received a call early Thursday about a husband and wife aboard a 64-foot sailboat that was bound for Houston after a trip to Cozumel, Mexico.

The woman reported that the man, who had a history of heart disease, had slumped over and was unresponsive.

A helicopter from the Coast Guard Aviation Training Center in Mobile, Ala., hoisted the man and woman from the sailboat and took them to the Coast Guard Air Station in Belle Chasse, where the man was reported in stable condition Thursday.

# Texas inmate who was ordered retired in 1980 has been waiting ever since

GATESVILLE, Texas (AP) — Jerry Hartfield was still a young man when an uncle visited him in prison to tell him that his murder conviction had been overturned and he would get a new trial.

Not long afterward, he was moved off of death

"A sergeant told me to pack my stuff and I wouldn't return. I've been waiting ever since for that new trial," Hartfield, now 56, said during a recent interview at the prison near Gatesville where he's serving life for the 1976 robbery and killing of a Bay City bus station worker. He says he's innocent

The Texas Court of

Criminal Appeals overturned Hartfield's murder conviction in 1980 because it found a potential juror improperly was dismissed for expressing reservations about the death penalty.

The state tried twice but failed to get the court to re-examine that ruling, and on March 15, 1983 11 days after the court's second rejection — then-Gov. Mark White commuted Hartfield's sentence to life in prison.

At that point, with Hartfield off death row and back in the general prison population, the case became dormant.

"Nothing got filed. They had me thinking my case was on appeal for

Do you have your Jacket & Overalls?

27 years," said Hartfield, who is described in court documents as an illiterate fifth-grade dropout with an IQ of 51, but who says he has since learned to read and has become a devout Christian.

A federal judge in Houston recently ruled that Hartfield's conviction and sentence ceased to exist when the appeals court overturned them — meaning there was no sentence for White to commute. But Hartfield isn't likely to go free or be retried soon because the state has challenged a 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals' decision favorable to Hartfield, arguing he missed a one-year window

in which to appeal aspects

A 5th Circuit panel of the New Orleans court agreed with the district court in an October ruling, but last month it made a rare, formal request to the Texas appeals court asking it to confirm its decadesold decision to overturn Hartfield's conviction.

Hartfield's current attorney, Kenneth R. Hawk II, recently described the case as a "one-in-a-million" situation in which an inmate has been stuck in the prison system for more than three decades because no one seems to know what to do with






