## Big Daddy Weave to perform at M.K. Brown

'Redeemed' No. 1 song on Christian charts for 9th week.

Regular listeners Christian radio have undoubtedly heard "Redeemed" by Big Daddy Weave, which has been No. 1 on the Christian charts for nine consecutive weeks.

The popular Christian group, formed in 1998 by brothers Mike and Jay Weaver with some of their musician

friends while attending the University of Mobile, is performing at the M.K. Brown Memorial Auditorium on Feb. 10.

Songwriter and lead singer Mike Weaver said the song reflects a day when he was overwhelmed with feelings of self-loathing, mainly because of his weight, while alone in his garage.

"I was feeling hurt; I was feeling like a failure," he said during a phone interview Thursday with The Pampa News. "I have always struggled with my weight. Even the name of the band is selfdeprecating humor."

Weaver said originally there were no plans to turn "Redeemed" over to their record label, Word Records, until one day when their A&R guy (artist relations) asked whether they had another song left in the hopper.

"I sent him a little work tape by email and his response was, 'This is the strongest thing you have ever turned in," Weaver said. "It was my own brand of hurt, of feeling like a failure, but God takes the stuff we hate about ourselves and turns them into victories."

#### Obama's gun measures now face tough road

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Barack Obama's sweeping gun-control package faces an uncertain future on

Capitol Hill, where majority House Republicans are rejecting his proposals while the president's allies in the Democratic-controlled Senate are stopping well short of pledging immediate action.

The fate of his plan could ultimately hinge on a handful of moder-

ate Democratic senators. Although they are unlikely to endorse the president's call for banning assault weapons, they might go along with other proposals, such as requiring universal background checks on gun purchases.

Several of these senators responded warily after Obama unveiled his propos-



1930 to Zeke and Mahalie Fitzhugh in Lancaster, Texas. He married the love of his life Joy Cope on July 1, 1950. Sgt. Fitzhugh entered the United States Air Force where he obtained the rank of Staff Sergeant. Sgt. Fitzhugh then joined the Irving Police Department in 1955, before

moving to Amarillo and joining the Amarillo Police Department in September 1957. Sgt. Fitzhugh was injured in the line of duty while serving in the patrol division of APD. Sgt. Fitzhugh made a full recovery, but was unable to return to patrol. He was reassigned to the radio communications division of Amarillo Police Department. Sgt. Fitzhugh became well known throughout the Texas Panhandle for his golden, deep voice, and superior knowledge of the communication age. Sgt. Fitzhugh was a legendary figure in the dispatch and police network. He was well known for his yearly Christmas Eve recital of his "BOLO" for the jolly St. Nick over the airwaves of the police radio. Sgt. Fitzhugh retired from law enforcement in 1986 after nearly four decades of service. Sgt. Fitzhugh was well known in his retirement to recall stories of his past with great detail and accuracy of events. His love of law enforcement could be seen in his smile when he told his memories of service.

Sgt. Fitzhugh was preceded in death by his wife Joy, a son Dwayne, a granddaughter Meagan Lamberson Green, two brothers and five sisters.

Weaver's father also said it was the strongest thing he ever wrote, he added.

Weaver went public with his struggle with weight in 2009 when he announced on Christian radio his goal to lose 90 pounds.

He came close, burning off 84 pounds, before his weight started to go back

"I was destroyed because I hadn't met my goal," he said. "God spoke to me that day in the garage.'

After that, Weaver said, he and the other band members began to share the story of his transformation.

And now, that message is being shared with millions of listeners on the airwaves with the song 'Redeemed."

"People have shared stories about how the song has changed their lives, he said.

"It's wonderful when people accept what it is. This is really greater than what I had foreseen."

Asked if the band would ever crossover into mainstream pop or rock, as Amy Grant did during the 1980s, Weaver responded, "Not unless God takes us there."

Weaver is keenly aware that Christian artists don't become multimillionaires like their pop and rock music contemporaries.

General seating for Big Daddy Weave's Pampa concert is \$10 and VIP seats are \$20, while a ticket to see The Rolling Stones will set you back a few hundred bucks.

"Nobody gets into Christian music for the money," Weaver said. "It's about the ministry, it's about the outreach. God takes care of us through good times or bad times.

Weaver said the band likes to sponsor children in underdeveloped countries through an organization called World Vision.

"We went to Tanzania (in East Africa) last year and were so blown away

by what a dollar can do in this country," he said.

Asked what his advice would be to somebody who wants to start a praise band or get into the Christian music business, Weaver referenced Proverbs 3, 5 and 6.

"Just let it happen. Just leave it to the Lord," he said. "When God opens the doors be faithful and walk through them and he will take care of the rest."

### Deficient levees found across America

NEW ORLEANS (AP) Inspectors taking the first-ever inventory of flood control systems overseen by the federal government have found hundreds of structures at risk of failing and endangering people and property in 37 states.

Levees deemed in unacceptable condition span the breadth of America. They are in every region, in cities and towns big and small: Washington, D.C., and Sacramento Calif., Cleveland and Dallas, Augusta, Ga., and Brookport, Ill.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has yet to issue ratings for a little more than 40 percent of the 2,487 structures, which protect about 10 million people. Of those it has rated, however, 326 levees covering more than 2,000 miles were found in urgent need of repair.

The problems are myriad: earthen walls weakened by trees, shrubs and burrowing animal holes; houses built dangerously close to or even on top of levees, decayed pipes and pumping stations.

The Associated Press requested, under the Freedom of Information Act, details on why certain levees were judged unacceptable and how many people would be affected in a flood. The Corps declined on grounds that such information could heighten risks of terrorism and sabotage.

The AP found specifics about the condition of some levees from federal and state records and in interviews with more than a dozen officials in cities and towns. The number of people who might be affected by a breach could not be

determined because there are many different factors in a flood, such as terrain and obstacles. Local governments are

responsible for upgrading unacceptable levees. Some local officials say that the Corps is exaggerating the dangers, that some deficiencies were approved or not objected to by the federal government and that any repairs could cost them hundreds of thousands, if not millions, of dollars.

"It's just not right to tell a little town like this to spend millions of dollars that we can't raise," said Judy Askew, mayor of Brookport, a hardscrabble town of about 1,000 on the banks of the Ohio River.


Compared with other types of infrastructure, the nation's levees, within and outside federal jurisdiction, don't fare well. They earned a D-minus for overall condition from the American Society of Civil Engineers in its latest report card in 2009, ranking behind dams, bridges, rails and eight other categories.

control systems came into dramatic focus in August 2005 when Hurricane Katrina's rain and storm surge toppled levees in New Orleans and tore up the Gulf Coast. It left 1,800 people dead and was the costliest storm in U.S. history with damage estimated at \$108 billion.

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

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## Motivation to prosper

On Nov. 29, 1766, Benjamin Franklin wrote for the London Chronicle: "I am for doing good to the poor, but I differ in opinion of the means. – I think

the best way of doing good to the poor, is not making them easy in poverty, but leading or

driving them out of it. In my youth I travelled much, and I observed in different countries, that the more public provisions were made for the poor, the less they provided for themselves, and of course became poorer. And, on the contrary, the less was done for them, the more they did for themselves, and became richer."

I love seeing and hearing stories of people rising above adversity. Here is a story of one of those special people. Eighteen-year-old Dawn Loggins embodies what can help the poor and at the same time reduce entitlements, government control and dependency.

Dawn was raised in abject poverty by drugaddicted parents, who were in and out of jail, squatted in houses and faced multiple evictions. By her teenage years, she had bounced around to eight different schools and often had to study at home by candlelight because they didn't have electricity. She went days, weeks and even months without showering because they didn't have running water. She and her elder brother, Shane, would have to fill up milk jugs with water from local parks just to flush their toilets, cook or take a bath. In the summer of 2011, in between her junior and senior year, Dawn was invited to attend a six-week residential summer school program in Raleigh, N.C. But when she called to return home at the end of it,

she discovered that her

mother and stepfather's

phone had been discon-

nected. They had moved again, but this time, they had gone without Dawn, her brother and leaving a forwarding address.

Dawn should have

been turned over to the state, but her school and local community of Lawndale — a small town of about 600 in the Appalachian foothills of western North Carolina — rallied around her and helped her through instead. At first, Dawn crashed on the couches or floors of friends' houses. Eventually, a woman who is a custodian and bus driver took her in and allowed her to finish her senior year while living in her house. And high-school counselors, teachers and others in town made sure she had food, clothes and school supplies.

But Dawn never expected handouts. She got a job as a janitor at her own high school, where she cleaned the hallways, classrooms and bathrooms — before and after school.

Despite her family neglect, abuse and abandonment. Dawn learned the power to overcome the past. She told NBC News: "There were times when I felt like it would just be easiest if I gave up. ... But it was never in me to give up, because I did realize that I was never going to be successful unless I got an education."

Throughout it all, Dawn earned an A average in her classes, including three Advanced Placement courses and an honors class. She was also president of the photography club and was involved in band club and the National Honor Society.

She also started a community service program collecting thousands of letters for active-duty troops.

And after she graduated, she applied to five colleges and was accepted at none other than Harvard University, where she is in her freshman year.

## An unqualified Jack Lew will tax and spend

The worst part of the Jack Lew nomination for treasury secretary is not simply that he has

no qualifications, standing or experience in the financial world or international sphere (think G20 and European

debt crisis). Nor is it simply that he doesn't have any seasoned currency opinions (under Obama, the greenback has dropped 10 percent, while

gold has doubled). Yes, these are big disqualifiers. But the real problem is that Lew is a left-liberal Obama spearcarrier, whose very appointment signals a sharp confrontation with the Republican House over key issues such as the debt ceiling, the spending sequester, next year's budgets and taxes.

From all the way back when Lew was staff advisor to Tip O'Neill, he has been a man of the left.

So as treasury secretary, I expect the former Obama budget director to push for trillions of dollars in new tax hikes, absolutely minimal spending restraint and no serious entitlement reform.

Instead of being a fresh face who can generate a clean start for a new slate of fiscal compromises, Lew — who doesn't play well with the other kids

— is going to represent the same old Obama confrontation with the

Republican House. It didn't have to be this way. As treasury secretary, Obama supporter Larry Fink of Blackrock would have tremendous support from the financial community in the effort to solve our fiscal imbalances. So would budget reformer Erskine Bowles. Or Amex CEO Kenneth Chenault. Or even the outspoken Democratic

banker Jamie Dimon. These are all men of experience, high standing and respect within financial circles. Any one of them would have given Obama credibility and led us to serious talks about growing the economy and keeping us out of bankruptcy. Lew has none of their qualities.







"I will look closely at all proposals on the table, but we must use common sense and respect our Constitution," said Sen. Jon Tester, D-Mont. Tester told the Missoulian newspaper in his home state recently that he supports background checks but doesn't think an assault weapons ban would have stopped the shootings at an elementary school in Newtown, Conn., where a gunman massacred 20 children and six adults before turning the gun on himself.

Obama's proposals came a month after the shootings in Newtown, which he has called the worst day of his presidency.

announcements His capped a swift and wideranging effort, led by Vice President Joe Biden, to respond to the deaths.

The \$500 million plan marks the most comprehensive effort to tighten gun laws in nearly two decades.

It also sets up a tough political fight with Congress as Obama starts his second term needing Republican support to meet three looming fiscal deadlines and pass comprehensive immigration reform.

The White House strategy for pressing Congress centers on building public support for the president's measures.

"There's only one voice powerful enough to make this happen: yours," Obama wrote in an op-ed Thursday in The Connecticut Post.

The president is also expected to travel around the county pitching for his proposals and could activate his still-operational campaign organization, Organizing for America, to fight for the plan as

Campaign manager Jim Messina sent an email to Obama supporters Thursday urging them to sign a petition backing the president's proposals and promising "more soon from the organization.

Obama, seeking to sidestep some congressional opposition, also signed executive actions Wednesday, including orders to make more federal data available for background checks and end a freeze on government research on gun violence.

But he acknowledged that the steps he took on his own would have less impact than the broad measures requiring approval from Capitol Hill. He is also calling for limiting ammunition magazines to 10 rounds or less.

"To make a real and lasting difference, Congress, too, must act," Obama said.

The question now is

how and whether that hap-House GOP leaders

have made clear they'll wait for the Senate to act first, since they see no need to move on the contentious topic if it doesn't. "House committees of jurisdiction will review these recommendations. And if the Senate passes a bill, we will also take a look at that," said Michael Steel, spokesman to House Speaker John Boehner.

rank-and-file Many Republicans scorched Obama's proposal. "The right to bear arms is a right, despite President Obama's disdain for the Amendment,' Second said Rep. Tim Huelskamp, R-Kan.

While the assault weapons ban is seen as having little if any chance of passage, support may coalesce behind requiring universal background checks, which is a top priority for advocacy groups that see it as the most important step to curbing gun crimes.

The Brady Campaign to Prevent Gun Violence says 40 percent of gun sales are conducted with no criminal background checks, such as in some instances at gun shows or by private sellers over the Internet. Obama would seek to require checks for all sales.

Sen. Chuck Schumer, D-N.Y., already has sponsored a bill to require universal background checks that the Senate could take up, while Sen. Frank Lautenberg, D-N.J., has legislation banning ammunition magazines with more than 10 rounds.

Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid, D-Nev., a gun-rights backer who's been supported by the National Rifle Association in the past, responded cautiously, saying he was committed to ensuring the Senate considers legislation on gun violence early this year. He didn't endorse any of Obama's

## Choose and work with plywood correctly

Dear Pat: I want to do some remodeling projects around my house. I went to a home center store to buy plywood, but there must have been 20 types. How do I know what type to use for various projects? — Sabina K.

Dear Sabina: Various types of plywood are used in most homeimprovement and woodworking projects. In order to meet all the needs of these varied projects, many plywood types with various properties are offered, as you have found.

The plywood types are categorized in general grades and then further defined by specific properties, wood species and adhesives. The prices can vary significantly, and some high grades of plywood will cost more than solid woods.

Before discussing the various grades and uses of plywood, it helps to understand how plywood is produced and what gives it its specific properties. Plywood is made by laminating thin layers of wood together with adhesives to create a strong, thick sheet.

The layers are oriented such that the grain on each adjacent sheet is perpendicular to the one above and below it. This gives it its strength, size and stability, and minimizes the possibility of warping as moisture levels change throughout the year. It has an odd number of layers (from three to seven) so that the exposed layer on each side has the grain running in the same direction.

Most plywood has a face side and a back side because only one side is generally exposed. The face side is higher quality wood with less imperfections, so check both sides of the sheet when purchasing plywood. For projects where both sides can be seen, plywood with two face sides is available.

Basic plywood grades are from A to D, with A being the best and most expensive. A sheet of Grade A plywood should have no or very few minor blemishes and be finely sanded. Grade D is the least expensive plywood, and it usually has the maximum number and severity of blemishes allowed.

Depending upon your project, you may not need a high-quality finish on both sides. For these applications, select plywood which is

graded A-C. This sheet of plywood will have Grade A quality on the face side, but only Grade C quality on the back side. For strictly structural use, C-D (commonly called CDX) plywood is adequate.

The type of adhesives used depends upon the application. Indoor plywood, which will not be exposed to high levels of moisture, uses one type of adhesive. This type of plywood can be made of select hardwoods and softwood and can be used for cabinets, furniture, indoor sheathing, etc.

Exterior plywood is the most common type you find at most home-center stores. The adhesives

are more resistant to high levels of moisture. It is available in the highest grades through CDX. Structural plywood uses the strongest adhesives and is most moisture resistant. CDX is the most common


There are also specialty plywoods for very high quality cabinetry and furniture. These use finely finished hardwood veneers of various species and hardwood core sheets often made of poplar for stability. These hold a screw well and can be used similarly to solid hardwood sheets. For a curved surface, bending plywood is available. The grains in the layers all run in the same direction for easy bending.

#### Texas advocate calls Obama's gun safety proposals 'common sense'

AUSTIN — President Obama has unveiled a plan aimed at curbing gun violence in America. The package of legislation for Congress includes a ban on high-capacity magazines, the reinstatement of a ban on some assaultstyle weapons and a proposal to have mandatory background checks for all gun purchases, including private sales.

Tommie Garza, once the executive director of the now-defunct Texans for Gun Safety, calls the reasonable, measures even for a strong Second Amendment state like Texas.

'We definitely are and we have to keep that in mind. It's going to have to be a balance, a good balance and just bringing good sensible ideas to the table, on all sides."

The National Rifle Association says law-abiding gun owners should not be blamed for the acts of criminals and madmen, and the organization claims the push is more about attacking the Second Amendment than keeping children safe.

Heather Martens is also a gun safety advocate in mid-America. She says the Second Amendment and public safety are not contradictory. She says moving forward with these plans is something many gun owners can get behind.

"I grew up in a hunting family, myself. I learned to shoot when I was 10 years old. The NRA I knew as a child is not the NRA of today. NRA lobbyists today represent the firearms industry, especially manufacturers of assault weapons."

President Obama also announced 23 executive actions, which include a directive to strengthen the national criminal background-check system. Martens likes the move to allow for the study of gun violence at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

"Congress has prevented these studies for a number of years now. President Obama said 'We don't benefit from ignorance.' We need to find out what's really happening out there in order to understand how to better prevent gun violence."

For every 100,000 people in Texas, there are about 11 firearms deaths per year, slightly higher than the national average.

#### AAA Texas: statewide average drops slightly, down one cent

The statewide average for a gallon of regular unleaded fuel in Texas is one penny less than last week and now sits at \$3.17, according to the AAA Texas Weekend Gas Watch. People in Dallas are paying the most on average at \$3.20, and drivers in El Paso are paying the least at \$2.96 per gallon. Today's statewide average is twelve cents less than the national average of \$3.29.

Drivers in certain regions of the country may be seeing price increases as a result of an operational glitch at a California refinery and an electrical fire at a refinery in Illinois. Crude oil prices have traded in a narrow range to begin the year and analysts say there's an ample supply of product inventories in most parts of the country. They also say there's continued weak demand which has largely offset upward pressure on prices from a weaker U.S. dollar and some positive economic news.

"Currently drivers in Texas are paying about \$44 to fill up the typical 14-gallon size fuel tank," said AAA Texas/New Mexico Representative Doug Shupe. "While the national average price at the pump is up

slightly over last month, drivers in nearly half of the states have seen prices de-






