School board will hear admin buidling update

■ May suspend policy to incorporate state test score as part of a student's grade.

By Sasha Heller sheller@thepampanews.com

The Pampa Independent School Board will meet Thursday to hear an update on plans for the district's new central administration facility and to consider suspending a policy that would incorporate a state standardized test to count as 15 percent of a student's overall grade.

James Hicks, President of Wiley Hicks Construction, who the board selected for the project last month, will present the initial round of cost estimates for Pampa ISD's future home in the rebranded and redesigned Las

Pampas Square.

On Nov. 30, Commissioner of Education Michael Williams announced that, for the 2012-13 school year, school districts may defer the requirement of an end-of-course assessment to count as 15 percent of a student's final course grade.

This is the second consecutive year that the state Board of Education has deferred the requirement.

Superintendent Dr. David Young is not in favor of the state's policy and said he would support the board's decision to suspend it, if they choose to do so.

"It's a bad idea to co-mingle standardized test results with class performance as a class grade," Young said. "We are electing, along with most school districts in the state, to temporarily waive this requirement." Young said he expects the State Legislature to strike down the measure.

"We have every indication that is going to happen."

Young then explained how the idea to include standardized test scores with class grades originated. He said students would take the test as freshmen, sophomores and juniors, but the juniors' scores were the only ones
