# 2nd round of Skinner DNA testing expected soon

Death-Row inmate stills maintains innocence in grisly 1993 triple homicide.

Results from a second round of DNA testing in the Hank Skinner murder case, are expected soon according to the Texas Attorney General's Office.


"The second round of DNA testing is still pending," said Tom Kelley, a spokes-

man for the AG. "DPS anticipates results early this month."

In early November, the AG's Office released an advisory that crime scene evidence tested by a Texas Department of Safety lab consistently indicated that Skinner killed Pampa resident Twila Busby and her adult sons on New Year's

Eve in 1993. Skinner was convicted of the crimes in 1995 and now sits on death

31st Judicial District Court of Gray County. District Attorney Franklin McDonough said Monday the case is being prosecuted by the AG's Office.

For nearly 20 years Skinner has maintained his innocence, claiming he was unconscious from drugs and alcohol when the murders occurred and that a relative of Busby's is the real killer.

Skinner said in a recent television interview that one piece of evidence, a windbreaker originally found at the murder scene, is missing and cannot be tested.

The windbreaker resembled one that was owned by Busby's uncle, Robert Donnell, who is now deceased.

Rob Owen, co-director of the University of Texas at Austin's Capital Punishment Clinic, said in November he found it troubling the AG's Office would release

# **Drug busts** keep local cops busy

The Pampa Police Department and Gray County Sheriff's Office had their plates full this past weekend as both organizations pulled multiple drug arrests and even

dissolved a volatile situation at Pampa Regional Medical Center.

The PPD late Saturday evening arrested Kala Dawn Seymour, 24, Pampa, and Corey Don Anglin, 32, Amarillo, after a routine traffic stop turned up around 29 grams of what department officials suspect is methamphetamine.

Seymour and Anglin were booked into the Gray County Sheriff's Office early Sunday morning.

PPD public information officer Stormy McCullar said all substances seized as evidence must first be tested using the department's drug kit before it is officially identified.

The PPD responded early Monday morning to a distress call from the Pampa Regional Medical Center in response to an incident involving assault with a deadly weapon.

McCullar said victim Zachary Organ had been stabbed by a known assailant but that he would recover from his injury.

"That's about it," McCullar said. "We don't know much about it. They're still investigating."

McCullar said Organ does not intend on pressing charges against the person who stabbed him.

Friday evening, the GCSO arrested two individuals on serious drug charges: Thomas Roman Brown, 34, Lefors, for possession of a controlled substance — greater than 400 grams and Edgar Hernandez, 25, Albuquerque, N.M., for possession of marijuana — over 5 and under 2,000 pounds.

# Sweetwater Creek to be surveyed by state

The Gray County Commission heard a presentation Friday from representatives with the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (ECQ) regarding a planned study of recreation levels at Sweetwater Creek.

Sweetwater sits at the most extreme northern end of Gray County and primarily runs through neighboring Wheeler County.

Sweetwater was initially placed upon the TX303(d) list, the statewide water

quality and inventory index, in 2002 for having a high level of bacteria.

The ECQ representatives said Friday the planned study will only analyze how the creek is being accessed by the public, how the public is using the creek and for what reasons.

"Is it accessible? Are there signs that people are using it?" said the group's spokesperson.

The commissioners seemed reassured to hear this as they noted Sweetwater Creek rarely has water in it so a study of it, they said, would be prove rather

The ECQ's current study will not further investigate chemical levels present in the creek, officials said.

The group spokesperson said the Texas ECQ has studied Sweetwater's recreation levels periodically since 1974, upon passage of the federal Clean Water Act.

TX303(d) list describes Sweetwater Creek, technically, as running "from the Oklahoma state line in Wheeler County to the upstream perennial portion of the stream northwest of Wheeler in Wheeler County, a tributary of North Fork Red River."



Michael Morton was released in 2011 after DNA testing showed he didn't kill his wife. A court of inquiry is examining if Judge Ken Anderson acted improperly in 1987 when he was a district attorney prosecuting Morton.



# Perry's tech fund shows \$6M in potential losses

velopment initiatives.

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Gov. Rick Perry's pet fund that gives taxpayer dollars to high-tech Texas startups is leaving room for \$6 million in potential losses due to troubled investments, according to a new state report.

The allowance for bad debts is a drain on the value of the Texas Emerging Technology Fund, which Perry calls an economic sparkplug but that critics have blasted because of its performance and politics.

An annual report released last week shows that barring the state getting its money back from failed projects, the fund now stands at \$2.4 million above what the state has put in — down from \$4.6 million a year ago.

Employment levels also fell at more than 130 companies in the fund, but a true employment picture is unclear because several startups didn't submit new figures.

It makes for a muddled snapshot of the tech fund that Perry launched in

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — The Iraq War veteran charged with killing a former Navy SEAL sniper and his friend on a Texas shooting range had to be shocked with a stun gun and restrained in his jail cell overnight after becoming aggressive, a sheriff said Monday.

Eddie Ray Routh, 25, is on suicide watch in the Erath County Jail, where he's being held on \$3 million bond, Sheriff Tommy Bryant said. Routh is charged with one count of capital murder and two counts of murder in the shooting deaths of Chris Kyle, author of the best-selling book "American Sniper," and his friend Chad Littlefield at a shooting range Saturday in Glen Rose.

Routh, a member of the Marines Corps Reserve, appeared ready to assault jailers Sunday night when they entered his solitary confinement cell because he refused to return his food tray, Bryant said.

After warnings, jailers used a stun gun once and then put Routh in a chair that restrains his arms and legs, Bryant said.

an advisory before all the evidence was tested.

Owen did not immediately return phone messages left on Monday.

Skinner claims that Donnell was abusive toward Busby and sexually assaulted her before he murdered her.

But DNA testing by DPS rebuts Skinner's claim, showing that Busby was not sexually assaulted before she was murdered. Six vaginal swabs and smears collected from Busby's body found no semen or DNA from any other person, the advisory states.

For years Skinner and his defense blocked any DNA testing, but last summer agreed believing the testing would exonerate Skinner.

The DPS test results do not support Skinner's claim an alternative suspect is the real killer, the AG advisory

During the trial, the state proved Skinner's bloody handprints were found throughout Busby's house.

Skinner admitted he was in the home during the murders but failed to call police or seek help for the

Skinner chose instead to flee to a friend's house wearing clothes soaked with the victims' blood, according to the advisory.

Skinner arrived at the friend's house with a cut would in the palm of his hand. He threatened to kill the friend and her children if she called police, and was hiding in a closet still wearing the bloody clothing when police arrived and arrested him a few hours after the triple murder.





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

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# Forgotten, but not gone

Last weekend, the 2012 Republican presidential nominee, Mitt Romney, and his wife, Ann, were in Washington, where they met with

last year's closed-to-thepress dinner was former Florida Gov. Jeb Bush's needling of his most famous sibling, when while addressing the then-unsettled GOP nomination contest — he reported that at one point his brother even thought about running again: "George,' I said, 'the Constitution prohibits you from running again.' He said, 'Wow, they put my name in the Consti-

The weekend's real political news, however, was being made by the GOP's 2008 standardbearer, Arizona Sen. John McCain, along with GOP Senate colleagues Jeff Flake of Arizona, Lindsey Graham of South Carolina and Marco Rubio of Florida, all of whom had been working with Democratic Sens. Chuck Schumer of New York, Michael Bennet of Colorado, Bob Menendez of New Jersey and Dick Durbin of Illinois to produce a comprehensive compromise immigration plan.

That plan — which said that after measures were taken to secure the border, undocumented immigrants could obtain legal status on a probationary basis once they had undergone a background check, and paid a fine and any back taxes owed — was proudly unveiled by the eight senators.

By losing the growing Hispanic vote nationally 71 percent to 27 percent to President Barack Obama after running a fierce get-tough-onillegal-immigrants campaign, Romney not

only made the senators' bipartisan immigration proposal possible. For his fellow Republicans, Romney made the switch on immigration impera-

As McCain put it on Wednesday at a breakfast hosted by Politico, "If you have a large bloc of Americans who believe you're trying to keep their ... fellow Hispanics down and deprive them of an opportunity, obviously that's going to have an effect.

What sort of an effect? McCain: "The trend will continue of lack of support from Hispanic voters, and also, as you look at the demographics of states like mine, that means we will go from Republican to Democratic over time."

One irony is that Mc-Cain was one of Romney's most important 2012 endorsers for the nomination. This surprised some of us who remembered the Romney TV spot four years earlier that charged that McCain had "pushed to let every illegal immigrant stay here permanently - even voted to allow illegals to collect Social Security. And Mitt Romney? He opposes amnesty for illegals."

Earlier in 2007, Romney test-drove his 2012 campaign when he attacked an Arkansas plan that enabled the children of undocumented immigrants to apply for college scholarships. Former Arkansas Gov. Mike Huckabee counterpunched: "I'm standing here tonight on this stage because I got an education. If I hadn't had the education, I wouldn't be standing on this stage, I might be picking lettuce. In all due respect, we're a better country than to punish children for what their parents did ....

In 2008, Romney got even tougher on Texas Gov. Rick Perry and the Lone Star State's Dream Act: "One of the things I still can't get over is the idea that a state would decide to give \$100,000 discounts to the children of illegals to go to school in their state.

ger should not be Secretary of State Hillary Clinton, whose

The continuing focus on that trivial issue — long since explained by Rice herself, as well as retired General David Petraeus and others, under oath understandably provoked an exasperated Clinton to scold Johnson, one of the dimmer idols of the Tea Party.

When the Wisconsin Republican began to harp on this topic yet again interrupting her answer, after stupidly asserting

that Clinton could have resolved any questions about the attack with "a very simple phone call" to the burned-out Benghazi compound — she responded sharply: With all due respect, the fact is we had four dead Americans. Was it because there was a protest or was it because there were guys who went out for a walk one night who decided they would kill some Americans? What difference at this point does it make? It is our job to figure out what happened and to do everything we can to make sure it never happens again.

No doubt Clinton's utterly sane retort will undergo dishonest editing, in the style of James O'Keefe, to make her sound cavalier or arrogant. But it is the Republicans in Congress whose attitude toward the deaths of Ambassador Christopher Stevens and his fallen comrades has seemed cynical and false, ever since they first sought to exploit the incident politically during the presiden-

tial campaign. Meanwhile, having historically supported reductions in federal spending on diplomatic security, they have done nothing useful so far to enhance the safety of Americans serving abroad. Worse still, their questions to Clinton indicate that very few of them, even at this late date, have bothered to learn the basic facts surrounding the Benghazi incident.

By contrast, Clinton has assumed responsibility in a meaningful way ever since Sept. 11 — which is to say that she has taken action to ensure a serious response. As required by law, she empowered an independent investigation, which resulted in dozens of recommendations for improved security and held several high-ranking State Department officials to account for the lapses in Libya. It is worth noting that Thomas Pickering, the distinguished CONASON cont. on page 5

former diplomat who led the probe, fixed culpability for the security flaws at Benghazi at "the assistant secretary level,' rather than with Clinton herself. Nobody in Washington understands the workings of the U.S. foreign service better than Pickering, who served in top positions under both presidents Ronald Reagan and George H. W. Bush. Certainly not John-

son or Paul, who rather comically asserted that "if (he) were president," he would have fired Clinton. Always hard to imagine, a Paul presidency seemed even more remote when he quizzed her about obscure rightwing conspiracy theories involving Syria, Turkey and Libya.

As Joan Walsh observed in Salon, those irate and ignorant inquisitors on Capitol Hill appeared small and peevish in their confrontation with Clinton, a woman whose serious,

diligent, tireless approach to public service has armed her with an enduring popularity at least three times greater than her Republican adversaries in Congress. Their feeble attempts to cut her down, echoed by the usual loudmouths on radio and cable television, only make her bigger.

If they persist, she probably will be president someday.

tions from the respected Pew Research's Social & Demographic Trends, Hispanics, who constituted just 3.5 percent of the U.S. population in 1968 and 17 percent in 2011, will jump to 29 percent of the U.S. total in 2050. Asian-Americans, who were a tiny 0.6 percent in 1960, will increase to 9 percent. With African-Americans growing to 13 percent of the nation, this would mean that whites — who had been 85 percent of all Americans in 1960 would shrink by the middle of the century to approximately 47 percent.

A bipartisan immigration bill staking out the path to citizenship will not, by itself, be a political silver bullet for a GOP still trying to shake off the anti-immigrant baggage the Romney candidacy

# Gov. Perry praises charter schools, voucher plan

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) Gov. Rick Perry is calling for increasing the number of public charter schools in Texas and lauding a voucher plan.

Addressing the State Board of Education on Friday, Perry told its members that "in terms of philosophy, this is where the rubber meets the road."

He said more students should be able to leave traditional campuses for charter schools. Current law caps licenses to operate charters statewide at 215.

Perry also repeated his previous support for "scholarships," or vouchers allowing parents in poor performing school districts to use public money to send their children to private schools.

The governor added that all high school students need increased exposure to technical training on everything from engineering to veterinary science. He said that leads to "stable, good paying" jobs.

#### Russian judge fired for falling asleep in court MOSCOW (AP) — A

Russian judge has been

fired after he caught 40 winks in court and then sentenced an outraged defendant to five years in

Judge Yevgeny Makhno of Blagoveshchensk City Court in Russia's Far East was forced to resign Friday for obviously falling asleep several times while trying a businessman on charges of fraud.

The case became a national scandal after the defendant's lawyer posted several videos online of Makhno asleep in court. The videos were then shown on state television.

Makhno claimed that he was not sleeping, but listening with his eyes closed, the reports said.

But since a higher court decided not to punish him, Makhno only has to take an exam to be reinstated.

The defendant, however, will be given a new trial.

#### 'Timebomb' label a store, not a threat

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Pittsburgh police say an abandoned backpack with the word "timebomb" on it prompted a bomb scare, though it appears the alarming label was a bumper sticker from a nearby store called Timebomb Clothing.

Shop owner Brian Brick tells the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette that his store sells merchandise, including bumper stickers bearing the shop's name. A bomb squad official says the "timebomb" label appeared to be a bumper sticker.

The bag was found on the front steps of an apartment building Thursday, prompting the bomb squad response before the bag was found to be harmless about 10 a.m.

Brick says this isn't the first time the store's name has alarmed authorities. He says postal officials asked him to stop mailing items in plain brown wrappers because the Timebomb" label caused such parcels to be inspected for threats

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — Fire officials in Fort Worth say 11 horses have been killed in a fastmoving stable fire.


A Fort Worth police officer spotted flames about 2:30 a.m. Monday. Firefighters and police were able to rescue eight horses from their stalls as they battled the fire.

# Reader's reactions to past columns

Q: In a recent column, you advised a woman not to work just to build up her own Social Security account because she would get higher benefits as a spouse on her husband's Social Security record. I think you did this woman a disservice. You failed to mention important disability protection she could earn by working and paying taxes on her own account. You also didn't tell her husband about survivor's benefits he might be due on his wife's record if she should die before he does benefits he wouldn't get if she doesn't work and pay Social Security taxes.

A: I don't think I did the reader a disservice. I considered the disability and survivor benefit options but decided they were not worth bringing up — and certainly not worth all the Social Security taxes she would pay for very minimal return. Before I explain my reasoning, let me review the situation.

A 57-year-old woman had spent her life as a homemaker. She was considering taking a job and wondered if it would be worth it from a Social Security perspective. I told her that if she was taking a job to help fulfill her life or to bring extra income into the household, then she should go for it. But if she was working just to get the Social Security credits, then it was probably not a very good idea. That's because anything she might be due on her record would just reduce what she will already be able to get on her husband's account. Based on what she told me about her husband's situation, she would be due about \$600 per month in wife's benefits on her husband's record at age 62. (He is 10 years older than she is.) And whatever she gets in re-

from her husband, so she'd end up with the same amount of monthly Social Security efits.

You are right that she would potentially be due disability benefits if she worked and paid Social Security taxes. But she would have to work for about five years before that disability protection would kick in. In other words, she wouldn't qualify for disability until age 62. And again, at that point, whatever disability payment she received (maybe about \$500 monthly), would come off the top of spousal benefits she is due, leaving her with the same total Social Security benefits.

In her case, the only advantage to qualifying for Social Security disability benefits at age 62 is that she would get Medicare coverage at age 64, as opposed to waiting until the normal Medicare eligibility age of 65. (People on Social Security disability get Medicare coverage two years after their benefits start.) So if she wanted to work and pay Social Security and Medicare taxes for five years, based on the slim chance that she might become disabled and thus get Medicare one year before she'd normally qualify for it, she should go ahead and work. But I don't think that makes much sense.

And there is even less reason to work and pay taxes in order for her husband to get survivor's benefits on her record. He is getting a much higher Social Security retirement benefit than she would ever be due. So that means that he would never qualify for any monthly widower's benefits on her account. would be totally pointless for his wife to work and pay thousands of dollars in Social Security taxes so that he possibly could someday get a check for 255 bucks!

Q: In a recent column, you mentioned the annual costof-living-adjustment Social Security beneficiaries, like me, got this year. But you didn't tell the whole story. You failed to mention that Medicare premiums went up, wiping out a big chunk of our Social Security

A: As I've explained many times in this column, I am a retired Social Security guy, and I write a column about Social Security issues. The cally, the law says the Part B column you refer to summarized the Social Security changes for 2013 — not the Medicare changes.

I know most people tend to equate Social Security and Medicare. But they are two separate government programs administered by two separate government agencies. The Social Security Administration's only role in Medicare is to enroll people in the program. After that, the agency essentially washes its

hands of Medicare business. As a retired SSA employee, I tend to wash my hands of Medicare issues, too.

But since you brought it up, I will point out that the Medicare Part B premium paid by all but the most wellto-do beneficiaries went up from \$99.90 in 2012 to \$104.90 in 2013 — a five dollar monthly increase. The average monthly Social Security retirement benefit went up \$21 this year, so factoring in the Medicare increase, most people's net Social Security check increased

As I pointed out in the column on Social Security changes, the annual COLA increase is based on changes to an inflation-measuring tool called the Consumer Price Index. But changes to the Medicare Part B premium are tied to increases in the cost of health care. Specifipremium must cover 25 percent of the costs of running that part of the Medicare program. The taxpayers pick up the other 75 percent. I predict that any coming reforms to the Medicare program will call for its beneficiaries to pick up a larger percentage of program costs.

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
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# Nine wrestlers headed to El Paso
