The event, which runs from 5-8 p.m., is a fundraiser with all proceeds going toward scholarships for the students at St. Matthew's Day School. Church members will also host a book sale and bake sale on Tuesday.

All of the food served at the supper is prepared by church members.

"The bacon fryers start coming in at 8 a.m. and cook a couple hundred pounds of bacon," Kelly said, adding that the pancake chefs show up in the kitchen shortly after that.

### **City Commision** meets Tuesday

The Pampa City Commission will meet at 4 p.m., Tuesday, to consider approving, on first reading, an ordinance validating the petition filed on Dec. 26, 2012 to call for a local option liquor election. The meeting will also cover providing notice of a Special Election to submit the proposition to legalize the sale of mixed beverages in restaurants within the city limits by food and beverage certificate holders only.

The Commission will also discuss the city's responsibility to provide notice of a General Election to elect a mayor and commissioners for Wards 1 and 3.

The Commission will consider awarding a bid in the amount of \$72,000 for the purchase of a used hydraulic excavator.

Also on Tuesday's agenda is an item to consider adopting a resolution supporting the legislative activity and goals of the Alliance of Xcel Municipalities (AXM).

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### A common sense crop for America's common good

Four years ago, Michelle Obama picked up a shovel and made a powerful symbolic statement about America's food and farm future: She turned

a patch of White House lawn into a working organic garden. That

was a great move, earning kudos from just about

Monsanto and the pesticide lobby. But now, as she begins another four years in the people's mansion, the first lady is probably asking herself: "How can I top that? What can I do this time around to plant a crop of common sense in our country's political soil that will link America's farmers, consumers, environment and grassroots economy into one big harvest of common good?" Thanks for ask ing, Ms. Obama, and please allow me to intrude into your thoughts with a one-word suggestion: hemp. Plant a good, healthy stand of industrial hemp next to your organic garden! This would, of course, drive the anti-drug zealots up the wall (a good place for them, I think). "Holy J. Edgar Hoover," they'd scream, "hemp is a distant cousin of marijuana!" Well, yes, but the industrial variety of cannabis lacks the psychoactive aspects of pot, so their hysteria is misplaced. Industrial hemp won't make anyone high, but it certainly can make us happy, because it would deliver a new economic and environmental high for America. Plus, hemp production is firmly rooted in American history. Question: Besides being founders of our republic, what did Thomas Jefferson and George Washington have in common? Answer: Both farmed hemp. Most of America's founders were strong promoters of this extraordinarily useful agricultural crop,

protection of the country." The first draft of our Constitution was written on hemp paper. "Old Ironsides" was powered by sails of hemp cloth. As late as World War II, the government urgently pushed farmers to grow the crop as part of a "Hemp for Victory" program.

So why are American farmers today prohibited from producing this patriotic, profitable, pesticide-free plant? Political nuttiness. Most recently, in a frenzy of reefer madness, U.S drug police decided that President Dick Nixon's "Controlled Substance Act of 1970" not only outlawed marijuana, but also its non-narcotic cousin, industrial hemp. If ignorance is bliss. they must've been ecstatic, yet their nuttiness remains the law of our land today.

While our nation is the world's biggest consumer of hemp products (from rope to shampoo, building materials to food), the mad masters of our insane "drug war" have lumped hemp and marijuana together as "Schedule 1 controlled substances" - making our Land of the Free the world's only industrialized country that bans farmers from growing this benign, profitable, job-creating and environmentally beneficial plant. Thus, the U.S.A. is consuming millions of dollars' worth of products made from hemp, that hemp comes from producers in other countries, because our farmers aren't allowed to grow it in the U.S.A. and reap the economic benefits here at home.

As Bowman puts it: "Can we just stop being stupid?" To help move us in that direction, he's seeking 100,000 signatures on a online petition requesting that President Obama include the words "industrial hemp" in his Feb. 12 State of the Union speech.

#### Agree on the personal decisions


How you distribute your assets is only one part of estate planning. Equally, if not more important, is designating a guardian for your

### The wrong man for Defense Secretary

Americans who are concerned about traditional freedoms and the Second Amendment have no difficulty understanding the message of the popular

bumper strip: "If guns are outlawed, only outlaws will have guns." It should be just as easy to grasp the corollary:

If nukes are

outlawed, only terrorist countries will have nukes.

But somehow, Barack Obama and Chuck Hagel don't get it. In a 2007 campaign speech, Obama promised: "Here's what I'll say as president: America seeks a world in which there are no nuclear weapons."

Chuck Hagel is listed as one of six directors of a dangerous group called "Global Zero U.S. Nuclear Policy Commission." This mischievous outfit's goal is "to move toward a world without nuclear weapons," and its publications boast Obama's enthusiastic endorsement: "Global Zero will always have a partner in me and my administration.'

Here are a few of Global Zero's specific recommendations: replace our offensive nuclear missiles with what they call "soft" instruments of power, such as multilateral cooperation, reduce the number of our nuclear missiles

further than what Obama agreed to when the Senate ratified the New START Treaty in 2011, eliminate "all tactical nuclear weapons" and our "Minuteman land-based ICBM force" and announce "reciprocal presidential directives" (Obama is a specialist at issuing unilateral direc-

Here are a couple of the really silly statements in Global Zero's report: "security is mainly a state of mind, not a physical condition," and "nuclear weapons have increasingly become liabilities, not assets." The Global Zero report includes a lame endorsement of anti-missile defense, but it's clear that modernizing our missile defense system is not a priority, maybe not even wanted by the group.

Global Zero isn't Hagel's only dalliance in the search for a nuclear-free world. He also serves on the board of the Ploughshares Fund, a George Soros-funded group that advocates getting rid of our nuclear weapons.

The Ploughshares Fund is downright serious about getting rid of U.S. nuclear weapons. It urges massive decreases in our defense capabilities and slashing the U.S. nuclear force to only 292 deployed missiles. It promotes global governance — no surprise there — and also opposes U.S. development of a missile-defense system.

Ploughshares contributes to many anti-war and anti-nuclear groups

that criticize U.S. foreign policy and military. It is a big backer of the Connect U.S. Fund (CUSF), which promotes global governance and tries to direct global policy by "grant-making on human rights, non-proliferation

and climate change." CUSF calls for massive slashes in our military budget so that U.S. money can be spent on "sustainable energy," financing a "green stimulus" and combating "climate change as a security threat." Other CUSF projects include urging U.S. troops overseas to wear the U.N.'s blue helmets, using the U.S. Armed Forces to take on the task of fighting "global warming" and "global poverty" and stationing U.S. "peacekeeping" forces

worldwide. Chuck Hagel sits on the board of a fund that is the main financial backer of a globalist group urging the United States to join the U.N.'s International Criminal Court. There are many reasons why this is a dangerous idea, but one of the most obnoxious is that this U.N. Court could prosecute American citizens and soldiers for alleged "war crimes" and other anti-American accusations.

Hagel also showed his globalist philosophy by supporting the U.N. Law of the Sea Treaty (LOST). Fortunately, the U.S. has never ratified LOST; in December it proved its threat to national sover-

eignty by overruling the high court of Ghana with a decision that is domestically enforceable in that country and not subject to

It's no wonder that the ranking Republican on the Senate Armed Services Committee, Republican Senator Jim Inhofe of Oklahoma, announced he could not vote to confirm Hagel as Defense Secretary because Hagel is philosophically opposed to vital issues affecting our national security. These issues concern our spending, our international engagement, and particularly our nuclear modernization.

Senator Inhofe added: "At a time when North Korea is threatening our allies with nuclear capabilities, and Iran continues to pursue a nuclear weapon and the means to deliver it, the security of our own nation and of our allies requires us to be vigilant with our own nuclear weapons and defense systems.' Senator Inhofe is exactly right: America needs a Secretary of Defense who values and upholds U.S. sovereignty and military superiority.

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
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### Cheating scandal in El Paso

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### GOP leaders tackle immigration

LITTLETON, Colo. (AP) — It was little surprise when freshman Rep. Mike Coffman in 2010 voted against a bill to grant citizenship to some young illegal immigrants.

After all, the Republican Marine Corps veteran had just won the seat in Congress formerly held by firebrand Rep. Tom Tancredo, who had pushed the party to take a harder stance against illegal immigration.

The bill, known as the DREAM Act, died in the Senate.

Now Coffman has changed course. He has introduced legislation to let unauthorized immigrants brought into the country as children to earn citizenship if they serve in the military.

And he spoke hopefully about an immigration overhaul that a bipartisan group of senators outlined last week.

Since the November elections, many other Republicans nationwide have tempered their tone on immigration — if not reversed course completely — after years of tacking right to appeal to grass-roots activists who dominate GOP primarries.

On Tuesday, House Majority Leader Eric Cantor became the latest high-profile Republican to shift gears.


A leader of the conservative caucus and previous opponent of the DREAM Act, Cantor called for allowing illegal immigrants brought here as children to become citizens.

### Ex-teacher jailed for child porn

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — An ex-mechanic with a West Texas school district has been sentenced to six years in prison after investigators found nearly 140,000 child pornography images at his home.

A federal judge in El Paso on Thursday sentenced 46-year-old Jose Miranda. The former El Paso Independent School District mechanic pleaded guilty in Oc-

tober to receipt and possession of material involving the sexual exploitation of children.

Investigators last May searched Miranda's residence. Authorities recovered computers and equipment that yielded more than 5,300 videos and about 133,000 images of minors engaged in sexually explicit conduct.

Pollard led all Pampa scorers with 12 points and Hutto and Cory Ponce both scored 6 points.

"I thought we played great," said Pampa coach Matt Embry. "Our effort was second to none. Credit

"They're a good team but I still think if we played them tomorrow, we'd beat them.'

With the loss, Pampa drops to 10-16 overall and 4-3 in district play.


Pampa put in 17 points in the third to regain the lead 32-26. Pampa maintained its lead throughout the fourth quarter to seal the victory, 46-44.

### Slow play needs to change — and fast

How long is a round of golf? Four hours? Six? We clearly need some flexibility, but most of us agree we need a solution

to the ongoing issue of slow play. The USGA tainly had enough. In a recent statement they plans for a

'multi-faceted programme" to bring together various stakeholders and resolve slow

play once and for all. USGA president Glen D. Nager calls the pace of play "one of the most significant threats to the game's health". He ex-"Industry that research clearly shows that... the amount of time it takes to play a round of golf detracts from the overall experience to drive players away from golf.

And the issue affects all players. Tiger Woods complained after a recent round that he had played "nine holes in just over them were par threes. I started losing my patience a little bit, and that's when I made a few mistakes."

For most of us, slow play doesn't fit comfortably with the high-paced world we live in. We want to enjoy time on the course, but not six hours of it. Here are some keys to speeding up play:

Mark your ball. You should do this anyway, but confusion over which ball is yours is totally unnecessary.

Know the course. Take a few minutes before playing a new layout to plan not just how you'll approach each hole, but also how to get around.

No more than two practice swings.

Perhaps most important: hit more fairways. This one demands polishing your swing and hitting the range, but it will save plenty of time (and frustration) on the course.

Do your bit to free up the fairways. You'll have more fun, too. Contact me for any other tips or to book a lesson.

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

### Super Bowl outage due to faulty device

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — The failure of a device meant to protect the power supply to the Superdome caused the Super Bowl blackout, the stadium's power company said Friday as it took the blame for the outage that brought the game to a halt for more than a half-hour.

Officials of Entergy New Orleans, a subsidiary of New Orleans-based Entergy Corp., said the device, called a relay, had been installed to protect the Superdome from a cable failure between the company's incoming power line and lines that run into the stadium.

Company officials said the device performed without problem during January's Sugar Bowl and other earlier events.

They said the device has been removed and replacement equipment will be in-

The power failure at Sunday's big game cut lights to about half of the stadium for 34 minutes, halting play between the Baltimore Ravens and San Francisco 49ers.

Officials of the power company and from SMG, the company that manages the stadium for the state, had said earlier this week that they believed the problem originated in the switching gear, which is housed in a building known as "the vault" near the stadium. The Superdome has a direct line feeding from a nearby Entergy power substation. Once the line reaches the vauit, it splits into two cables that then go into the Superdome.

The FBI had ruled out cyberterrorism as The announcement came as Entergy of-

ficials prepared to go before a committee of the City Council on Friday for questions about the outage. The council is the

regulatory body for the company. SMG and Entergy announced earlier this week that they had been unable to find a specific cause for the outage and would hire an independent consultant. It wasn't immediately clear whether they

The electrical equipment had been replaced after stadium managers expressed concerns the Superdome might be vulnerable to a power failure like the one that struck Candlestick Park during a 49ers Monday Night Football game in 2011.



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



In response to American Heart Month, Pampa Regional Medical Center Radiology is offering the first 10 patients a free calcium scoring for February.

Patients must have a signed prescription from their doctor and register as an outpatient. After the first 10, there will be a charge from the radiology group (HPRA) to read the images.


Coronary Artery Calcium Scoring is the most effective, noninvasive test currently available to determine if early CAD is present, and if so, to what extent. The test will help determine to what degree, if any, you are at risk for a heart attack before you have any symptoms. Calcium scoring is recommended for anyone with risk factors with no clinical signs, women ages 55 and over, and men 45 and older. Calcium scoring is a form of Cat Scan (CT), which will capture crosssectional images of the heart and arteries.



### Senators seek deal on gun-safe background checks

WASHINGTON (AP) - A bipartisan quartet of senators, including two National Rifle Association members and two with "F" ratings from the potent firearms lobby, are quietly trying to find a compromise on expanding the requirement for gunsale background checks.

A deal, given a good chance by several participants and lobbyists, could add formidable political momentum to one of the key elements of President Barack Obama's gun control plan. Currently, background checks are required only for sales by the nation's 55,000 federally licensed gun dealers, but not for gun show, personto-person sales or other private transactions.

The senators' talks have

included discussions about ways to encourage states to make more mental health records available to the national system and the types of transactions that might be exempted from background checks, such as sales among relatives or to those who have permits to carry concealed weapons, said people who spoke anonymously because they were not authorized to describe the negotiations publicly.

The private discussions involve liberal Sen. Chuck Schumer of New York, who is the No. 3 Senate Democratic leader; West Virginia Sen. Joe Manchin, an NRA member and one of the chamber's more moderate Democrats; Sen. Tom Coburn, R-Okla., another NRA member and

one of the more conservative lawmakers in Congress; and moderate GOP Sen. Mark Kirk of Illinois.

"It will not limit your ability to borrow your Uncle Willie's hunting rifle or share a gun with your friend at a shooting range," Schumer said last week in one of the senators' few public remarks about the package the group is seeking. He said he believed a bipartisan deal could be reached.

Polls show that requiring background checks for nearly all gun purchases has more public support than Obama's proposals to ban assault weapons and high-capacity ammunition magazines, and it is among those given the best chance of enactment. Even so, it is opposed by the NRA and many congressional Republicans, who consider it intrusive and unworkable for a system they say already has flaws.

"My problem with background checks is you're never going to get criminals to go through background checks," Wayne LaPierre, NRA executive vice president, told the Senate Judiciary Committee at its gun control hearing last week.

Federal data on gun purchases is gathered by the National Instant Criminal Background Check System, which is run by the



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### South Africans called to arms over raped teenager

JOHANNESBURG (AP) — The chime sounds every four minutes on the radio station, reminding listeners that statistically yet another child or woman in South Africa is being

It's also a call to arms for citizens outraged over the gang-rape of a teenager who was mutilated — her body carved open from her stomach to her genitals — and left for dead on a construction site. While India agonizes with its high prevalence of rape because of a fatal attack on a young woman on a bus, South Africans are now becoming galvanized by the attack on the teenager in a small town. Civil society and governments in both countries are saying this must stop.

The injuries to the 17-year-old were so horrific that nurses in the operating theater, where doctors tried in vain to save her life, are undergoing

The chimes on Talk Radio 702 are part of a campaign urging South Africans to identify perpetrators of rape that has become endemic. One in four females is raped here according to several studies, from months-old babies to 94-year-old grandmothers.

The Citizen newspaper published an editorial calling for citizens to take collective responsibility in the fight against sexual crimes.

"Somehow, somewhere there must be a tipping point where society is so convulsed by a collective anger over rape that we begin to turn the tide against this terrible scourge," the newspaper said. "Each of us needs to ask what we can do to stop this awful trend. And then we must act accordingly. You can help."

The Star newspaper's editor Makhudu Sefara ran a front-page editorial saying "Stand up. Speak out. Help us turn this evil around once and for all."

And at a busy intersection near Johannesburg's young men and women wearing black and red waved placards saying "Stop rape."

South Africans appear to be inspired by the mass demonstrations in India that protest a culture of sexual violence and revulsion over the gang-rape of a 23-year-old woman on a New Delhi bus who died of internal injuries from a metal bar.

India, with a population of 1.2 billion people, had 24,206 rapes reported in 2011. South Africa, population 50 million, reported 2.5 times that number of rapes last year.

Opposition politician Lindiwe Mazibuko described "a silent war against the children and women of this country ... We live in a deeply patriarchal and injured society where the rights of women are not respected."

She said she would request a national dialogue on the crisis.

President Jacob Zuma, who was acquitted on charges of raping the in 2005, said Thursday "that government would never rest until the perpetrators and all those who rape and abuse women and children, are meted with the maximum justice that the law allows.'

For Professor Rachel Jewkes, a doctor heading the Women's Research Unit of South Africa's Medical Research Council who has studied sexual violence here for 20 years, much more is needed.

"I'm jolly pleased to hear that even Jacob Zuma has belatedly come in, but we need to remember that actually women are raped and actually die from their injuries from rape almost every day in South Africa, and we need to make sure that the very, very profound sense of horror and outrage that people feel now is translated into something concrete.'


Shaheda Omar, clinical director of Johannesburg's Teddy Bear Clinic for child victims of abuse, said: "We've had huge outcries in the past then things just fall through the cracks again, but I think there's a stronger sense of solidarity

Omar has worked with child victims for 28 years

and suffers trauma spasms and headaches as a result. She said the government needs to enact "stringent measures, actions having consequences and perpetrators being brought to

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
