Action group brings concerns to city

The Pampa City Commission meeting Tuesday was standing room only as close to 50 residents showed up to express concern over a multi-family housing project that may be developed in their neighborhood.

The action group of concerned residents who have protested a multi-family housing development planned for their neighborhood aired their concerns at the Pampa City Commission meeting on Tuesday.

Nearly a dozen residents took to the podium during public participation to express to the commissioners their fears over how the 48-unit apartment complex would increase traffic flow in their neighborhood, impact their property values and overcrowd the local school system.

Resident Stuart Stoffle addressed safety issues and noted

that felons would be allowed to rent the apartments if they had been clean and stayed out of trouble the previous two years.

"I'm not for it," Stoffle said.

Dennis Williams discussed how the local schools are already overcrowded and how having more children in that area would be a disservice to the students attending Austin and Travis elementaries.

"Austin is busting at the seams right now," Williams said. "So is Travis."

Williams also asked about how the apartment complex would affect the local drainage system.

"Will the sewage system in place right now be able to handle this?" Williams then questioned if taxes would be affected.

The commissioners did not answer Williams' questions because they do not hold back-and-forth conversations during public participation. They can only offer factual information in **CONCERNS** cont. on page 3

Semi slips on ice, crashes on Hobart

A semi-tractor towing a semi-trailer and hauling hazardous materials crashed Tuesday night at the intersection of Hobart and Alcock streets. There were no injuries. The Pampa Fire Department secured the chemical spill. Traffic had to be rerouted for almost two hours.

Pampa Police officers responded a few minutes after 6 p.m., Tuesday to a traffic accident involving a semi-tractor on the 200 block of Hobart Street at Alcock Street near Allsup's.

The driver of the semi-tractor, Bernard Vicente Pacheco, was towing a semi-trailer. Both units were traveling north on Hobart. Pacheco attempted to turn west onto the 1000 block of Alcock but failed to control his speed, causing the truck to roll on its side and damag-

ing both the tractor and the in-tow trailer.

According to the accident report, the semi-trailer was transporting hazardous materials — two, 550-gallon containers of potassium hydroxide solution. Five gallons of the solution spilled onto the roadway. The trailer was

also carrying four, 550-gallon containers of friction reducer. None of the friction reducer containers ruptured or had spillage.

"When we respond to an accident in that situation, we work the accident," said

Stranded couples to arrive today in Mobile, Ala.

■ Eight from Pampa among passengers in Gulf on ill-fated Carnival cruise ship.

Four couples from Pampa are among the 4,200 passengers and crew members who were stranded on a Carnival Cruise Line ship in the Gulf of Mexico after a fire broke out on the vessel.

The couples are Steve and Jamie Croomer, Amy and Noah Sutherland, Matt and Jenny Elliff and Lori and Chad Giles.

The ship is now being towed to Mobile, Ala., where it is expected to arrive today.

The Carnival Triumph was about 150 miles off the coast of Mexico's Yucatan Peninsula, heading back Sunday morning to Galveston — where it had departed last Thursday on a four-day trip — when a fire broke out in an engine room, according to Carnival Cruise Lines.

The ship's automatic fire extinguishing

County Commission to meet Friday

The Gray County Commissioners Court will meet at 9 a.m., Friday, at the Gray County Courthouse.

The commissioners will consider a road crossing request by Texas Express Pipeline on County Roads N and 1.

"If a company wants to trench or bore across a roadway, we need to be notified about it," said Judge Richard Peet. "We have a road crossing policy."

The commissioners will also consider criteria of a Reinvestment Zone and election to participate in a tax abatement.

Concerning the Reinvestment Zone, Peet said a company wants to install power lines through Gray County, starting on opposite ends in neighboring counties,

Snowstorm can't stop the pancake tradition

Texas man arrested in N.J. after cops find \$800k in drugs

GREENWICH TOWNSHIP, N.J. (AP) — State troopers inspecting a tractor-trailer in New Jersey arrested a Texas man after finding \$800,000 worth of drugs hidden in the truck. The troopers stopped the vehicle on Interstate 78 in Greenwich Township on Tuesday. The troopers say they seized 64 pounds of marijuana and 20 kilograms of cocaine hidden in the ceiling and behind the wall of the truck's sleeper berth. Bail is set at \$250,000 for 34-year-old Andres Garcia of San Benito, Texas. He's charged with possession and possession with intent to distribute marijuana and cocaine.

Detective says fugitive is schizophrenic
DALLAS (AP) — A Florida detective who was stabbed near Dallas by a prisoner being transferred to Nevada told a 911 operator that the prisoner is "a schizophrenic." Miami-Dade Det. Jaime Pardinias can be heard breathing heavily in a recording of the 911 call police re-

leased Wednesday. He tells the operator he has been stabbed in the neck, describes Alberto Morales' height, weight and appearance and then adds, "He's a schizophrenic." Morales escaped Monday after using a piece from his eyeglasses to stab Pardinias while they were stopped in the parking lot of a Wal-Mart in Grapevine, a community near Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport. Authorities are still searching for Morales, a 42-year-old convicted sex offender.

regard to questions asked by the public.

Jennifer Licklider, who has served as the group's spokeswoman and led the neighborhood action group's meeting Monday night at Calvary Baptist Church, also spoke.

"I'm concerned about this housing project being put in my backyard, directly in my backyard," she said. "I'm concerned about privacy, property values and traffic."

Taylor Harris addressed the safety issues commonly associated with high-density housing.

"It's a safe community

and there's an expectation of privacy and that's why I moved there," he said. "I'm pro-Pampa. I'm pro-growth...but I believe there are more appropriate areas in town."

While that may be true, the developer, Overland Property Group, selected that site for a specific reason. Texas Housing Authority, which will fund the operation, ranks the community using a scoring system.

Currently, Pampa is one of three communities that Overland is looking at, along with Levelland and Plainview. For Pampa's score to rank the highest, the apartment complex would have to be built in the targeted area, Harris' neighborhood.

Mayor Brad Pingel also addressed those present concerning the proposed apartment complex.

"At this point, the city is not involved other than giving information to the developer," he said.

Earlier in the meeting, Pingel said, "At this time the city has no position, one way or the other," regarding the apartment complex.

The Pampa News spoke with Overland developer Brett Johnson on Tuesday, who said he and associates plan to meet with the concerned residents next week.

The location of the development is east of Navajo Road and between Laguna Road and Sioux Place.

system kicked in and soon contained the flames, and no injuries were reported, Carnival reported.

After breaking down, the ship drifted north in the Gulf of Mexico.

Chad's father, Steve Giles, said Wednesday they were about 150 miles out from Mobile.

Giles said his son and the other passengers were allowed, one by one, to

call out from a phone on board the ship after they were unable to recharge their cell phones.

"They have no way to charge their phones," he said.

Steve said the fire began next to Lori and Chad's cabin.

Though they were unharmed, Steve said, "It will probably be a while until you can get them on another cruise ship."

Steve said his son told him passengers had been sleeping on the deck because their rooms were

too hot and covering themselves with sheets to shade themselves from the sun.

Passengers who became ill were taken off the ship with helicopters, Steve said.

Steve said after the ship docks in Mobile, the couples will likely travel to Houston by bus.

"After that they'll probably take a couple of days to rest," he said.

Pampa PD public information officer Stormy McCullar. "EMS takes care of the injuries and the fire department takes care of the HAZMAT."

Pa. grad student sues, says C-plus cost her \$1.3M

EASTON, Pa. (AP) — Talk about grade inflation.

Graduate student Megan Thode wasn't happy about the C-plus she received for one class, saying the mediocre grade kept her from getting her desired degree and becoming a licensed therapist — and, as a result, cost her \$1.3 million in lost earnings.

Now Thode is suing her professor and Lehigh University in Bethlehem, claiming monetary damages and seeking a grade change.

A judge is hearing testimony in the case this week in Northampton County Court. Lehigh and the professor contend her lawsuit is without merit. Northampton County Judge Emil Giordana declined to dismiss the suit Wednesday, ruling that there was enough evidence for the suit to proceed, according to The (Easton) Express-Times (<http://bit.ly/Ye2Aj1>).

Thode took the class in the fall of 2009. Her instructor, Amanda Eckhardt, testified this week that she stood by the grade, saying Thode failed to behave professionally and thus earned zero out of 25 points in class participation, bumping her down a full letter grade.

"I ... believed she received the grade she earned," Eckhardt said.

The C-plus prevented Thode, an otherwise A student, from going on to the next class and advancing in her professional therapist studies, the newspaper reported. She wound up getting a master's degree in human development instead.

Her attorney, Richard Orloski, argued that Eckhardt targeted Thode because she is an outspoken advocate for gay marriage.

Eckhardt testified that while she believes marriage is between a man and a woman, she would never allow her personal views to influence her treatment of students. She said Thode had outbursts in class, did not participate appropriately, was emotionally unstable and failed to heed a warning letter.

Stephen Thode, the plaintiff's father and a longtime finance professor at Lehigh, testified on his daughter's behalf and said her participation score was highly irregular.

"I have never heard of a case, not just at Lehigh, where a student achieved a zero in class participation where they attended and participated in every class," he said.

Northampton County Judge Emil Giordano is presiding over the nonjury trial and is expected to rule on Thode's lawsuit after testimony concludes.

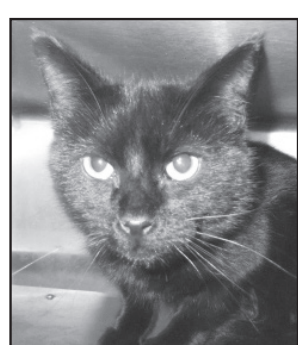

'Zero Dark Thirty' threatens Bush-the-incompetent narrative

In "Zero Dark Thirty," the movie about the killing of Osama bin Laden, one of the first scenes shows a terrorist being water-boarded, where useful information gets extracted. The movie thus asserts the controversial practice leads to actionable intelligence.

Not only was former President George W. Bush criticized for "authorizing torture," his critics argued that "torture doesn't work." During the 2008 presidential campaign, then-Sen. Barack Obama said: "Torture is how you get bad information, not good intelligence. ... No more secret authorization of methods like simulated drowning."

When I am President, America will once again be the country that stands up to these deplorable tactics. "Zero Dark Thirty" threatens that narrative.

Here's the problem. Presumably to help make the film as accurate as possible, and, many suspect, to aid in his re-election, President Barack Obama's administration gave the filmmakers what some describe as "unprecedented access" to the State Department.

At the time, many conservatives criticized the cozy relationship the screenwriter and director enjoyed with the State Department. (The film, ultimately, didn't come out until after Obama's re-election.)

The Obama administration was not happy. How dare the movie suggest that waterboarding "worked" and that it led to information useful in leading us to bin Laden?!

So in a rare comment on the alleged accuracy of a movie, the head of the CIA issued a statement denying that waterboarding played a positive role in leading to bin Laden.

The film, wrote acting CIA Director Mike Mo-

rell, "takes significant artistic license, while portraying itself as being historically accurate. ... 'Zero Dark Thirty' is a dramatization, not a realistic portrayal of the facts. ... Whether enhanced interrogation techniques were the only timely and effective way to obtain information from those detainees, as the film suggests, is a matter of debate that cannot and never will be definitively resolved."

This statement didn't satisfy the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence, prompting a probe of the CIA's contacts with the filmmakers.

Chairman Dianne Feinstein, D-Calif., and two other committee members, Sens. Carl Levin, D-Mich., and John McCain, R-Ariz., sent a letter to Morell, challenging his statement.

The senators claimed that Morell's words were "potentially inconsistent" with their committee's studies and asked him to "provide specific examples of information that was obtained in a 'timely and effective' way from CIA detainees subjected to the CIA's enhanced interrogation techniques."

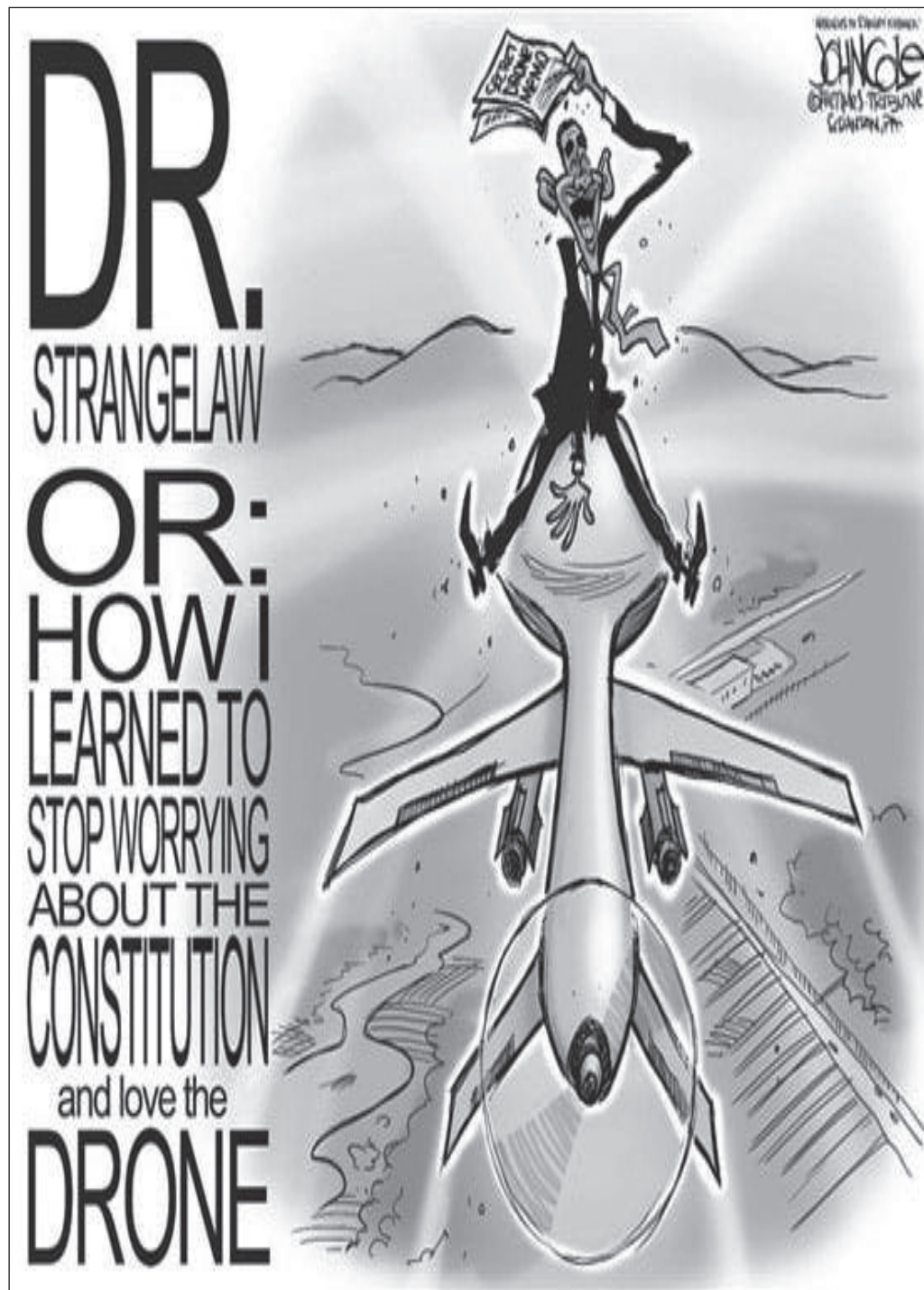
The trio of senators also sent a letter to Sony Pictures, saying the studio has "an obligation" to correct "the impression that the CIA's use of coercive interrogation techniques led to the operation against Osama bin Laden."

And then there was the May 3, 2011, interview, when NBC's Brian Williams asked Panetta: "Are you denying that waterboarding was, in part, among the tactics used to extract the intelligence that led to this successful mission (to kill bin Laden)?" Here, "Zero Dark Thirty" makes a real attempt to get it right. But this upsets the Bush-the-moronic-incompetent narrative.

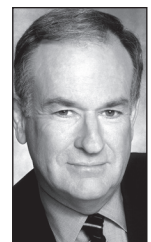

He was born on the Bayou

KRAEMER, La. — Roland Torres wants you to know a few things. He lives in a rural area where life is pretty straightforward. His family has been

active on the bayou for five generations, witnessing a daily battle of survival of the fittest. The birds, animals and reptiles who inhabit the vast swamps of south-central Louisiana live only as long as their wits and luck hold out. They are on their own 24/7.

So is Torres. A former game warden, Torres is of Spanish descent and still speaks the language of his Cajun ancestors: French. He makes a decent living giving tours of the bayou

and asks for nothing from the powers that be. What he has, he earns. He does not understand why some Americans accept government assistance. In this very poor part of America, someone who works hard can still earn a decent living.

Torres also has guns. And they came in handy immediately after Hurricane Katrina, when a horde of folks fled New Orleans about 70 miles away.

Torres tells me how "the good, the bad and the ugly" flooded his zone, looking for safety from the storm that just glanced his bayou. When some city thugs began to show menace, Torres calmly produced his arsenal. The danger quickly passed.

For almost 70 years, Torres has lived on the bayou. He has never ventured out of Louisiana, yet he loves America. He cherishes the values his

family handed down to him. He and his wife have been married for 51 years. They met in high school at age 16. Roland calls his wife an "angel."

They have three sons, two of whom work the bayou with Torres. They are entirely self-reliant. If he had to, Torres says, he could survive in the wilderness with a penknife, a spool of thread, some matches and a cache of dried rice.

The rice is for luring the birds that he would trap with the thread and cook with the matches. He says he could live for years off the land, even explaining how to eat sawgrass. "That can keep you alive if you know what you're doing," he assures me.

Torres watches some of the news programs on cable TV. Almost every modest dwelling in the swampland has cable. He likes the conservative shows. He doesn't quite

understand the big social changes taking place. He protects his family with guns.

Why should that bother anyone, he asks. I have no answer.

To Torres, President Obama is an enigma. He doesn't understand "income redistribution." Torres charges a fair price to show you his world, and you can take it or leave it. If you leave it, he'll find other work. There's always something a man can do to feed his family.

Millions of Americans believe exactly what Roland Torres believes. But they are seldom heard. Not many live shots coming out of the bayou.

Gov. Perry leaves California empty handed — for now

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Gov. Rick Perry is wrapping up his high-profile recruiting trip to California without having convinced any businesses to relocate to his state — at least not yet.

The Republican said Wednesday that he met with "entrepreneurs and business leaders from across the Golden State." He also held a reception for more than 200 California companies who have expressed interest in moving.

But Perry offered nothing concrete to show for the visit as he heads home.

Last week, Perry was featured in radio ads denigrating California taxes and regulation and touting Texas as friendlier to businesses.

He now says that competition between the states is healthy, even if it can sometimes get uncomfortable.

Perry likened it to a race, saying he'd rather be ahead and "letting someone look at my backside."

DPS seizes 43 kilos of cocaine

Coast Guard Acad. workers busted for sex on the job

NEW LONDON, Conn. (AP) — The U.S. Coast Guard Academy has disciplined a service member and five civilian employees for allegedly engaging in sex acts on campus and using government computers to send sexually explicit and other inappropriate content, an academy spokesman said Wednesday.

All six people misused computers at the academy in New London and some of them participated in consensual sex acts on school grounds during the workday, academy spokesman David Santos said.

Two of the civilian workers resigned and three were disciplined. The Coast Guard discharged the service member, who was stationed at the academy and was not a cadet, Santos said.

Academy officials didn't release the names of the six people or more details of their punishments, saying personnel decisions are confidential.

"It's something that we took very seriously and the behavior of the individuals involved is certainly not indicative of the academy community," Santos told The Associated Press.

The academy didn't pursue criminal charges, he said.

Santos said the improper activities took place within the past three years and the six people were disciplined in August. The academy first released information about the allegations and punishments Tuesday to The Day of New London under a federal Freedom of Information Act request. The academy denied the newspaper's request for the 2,113-page investiga-

tion report on the wrongdoing, citing a personnel files exemption allowed for in public record laws.

Santos said not all of the computer misuse involved sexually explicit content. Coast Guard policy bans the use of government computers for inappropriate discussions.

The academy also prohibits civilian workers and service members from engaging in sex acts on campus.

The academy's superintendent, Rear Adm. Sandra Stosz, said in a statement that the Coast Guard has extensive policies outlining appropriate actions and behaviors in the workplace and on government property.

"When an individual is suspected of violating these policies, we carefully follow the system in place to protect the rights of all involved in the matter," Stosz said.

LBJ, Lady Bird love letters released

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The entire collection of nearly 100 love letters written between Lyndon Johnson and Lady Bird Johnson during their 2½-month courtship in 1934 is being made available to the public for the first time beginning on Valentine's Day.

The letters at the LBJ Presidential Library at the University of Texas show an impatient Johnson, then a 26-year-old congressional aide, eager to marry 21-year-old Claudia Alta Taylor. She was known as "Bird," was a recent graduate of the university, and the future president had asked her to marry him a day after they met in Sep-

tember 1934. She wrote she loved him but "don't know how everlastingly."

They would tie the knot 10 weeks later in San Antonio and were married for 39 years. LBJ died 1973, Lady Bird in 2007.

Pastor wants social media fast for Lent

PITTSBURGH (AP) — A Pittsburgh pastor is all a Twitter with a new idea for a Lenten fast: No social media.

KDKA-TV reports the Rev. William Curtis has asked members of his church to give up social media sites like Facebook and Twitter for Lent, which began Wednesday and runs through Easter.

Curtis says he's not even asking his members for a full 40-day fast, just three or four days.

And, Curtis confesses, "It's going to be hard for me because I practically live on Twitter."

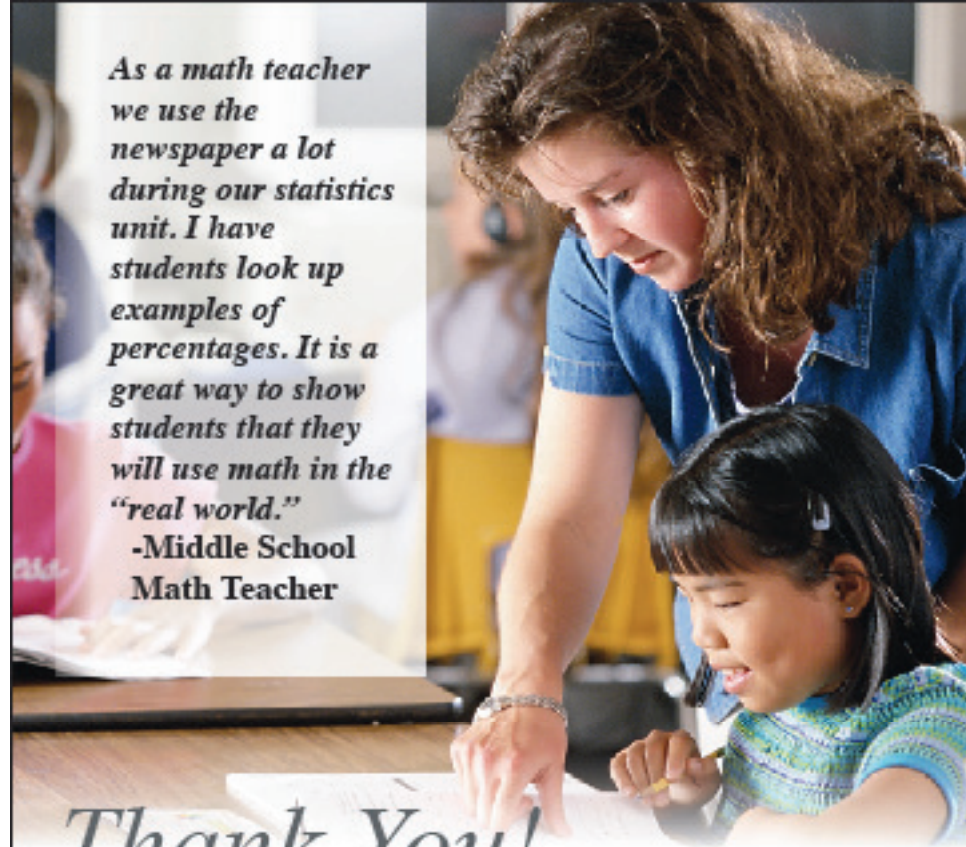

Dear Abby...

DEAR ABBY: It bothers me greatly to know that so many children continue to start smoking at an early age. My husband and I did that, and now we're paying an awful price. We have had emphysema for years. Four of our children also took up the habit. I finally started paying them to quit (\$100 every two weeks they didn't smoke — up to five payments). I decided to head off the temptation our grandchildren would face. We told them if they didn't start smoking by the age of 18, we'd pay them \$2,000. So far, seven of the 10 have collected a nice check on their 18th birthday, and we expect the remaining three to collect in turn. They have grown up understanding that cigarettes are "gross" and, if they start smoking, it will cost them a lot of money! Abby, you're the best way to spread ideas. I hope you will think it worthwhile to pass this one along. — DO AS I SAY, GAINESVILLE, FLA.

DEAR DO AS I SAY: I'm passing it along, but frankly, I'm not crazy about bribery. One would think that, having witnessed firsthand the serious health issues you and your husband are experiencing, your grandchildren would have understood what awaited them if they took up the habit.

The tobacco industry has done a huge disservice to young people by marketing their products to them — and not just in the form of cigarettes, but also with flavored chewing tobacco, which is equally addictive. According to the U.S. Surgeon General, nearly 90 percent of smokers start by age 18. In 2006, U.S. District

Judge Gladys E. Kessler of Washington, D.C., ruled the major cigarette manufacturers were guilty of fraud and racketeering under the federal RICO Act. (When the tobacco companies appealed, the Supreme Court rejected it without comment.)

She wrote that for more than 50 years the tobacco industry "lied, misrepresented and deceived the American public, including smokers and the young people they avidly sought as 'replacement smokers,' about the devastating effects of smoking....

"They suppressed research, they destroyed documents, they manipulated the use of nicotine so as to increase and perpetuate addiction, they distorted the truth ... so as to discourage smokers from quitting."

It is extremely important that young people be educated about — and prevented from — using tobacco. Smokers who start as teenagers increase their chances

of becoming addicted. Think about it: reduced lung function, early heart disease, cancer, asthma, disfigurement. Yes — it could happen to YOU.

DEAR ABBY: I have a wonderful husband and adorable grandchildren, but I have developed deep feelings for a man I met at the gym where I go with a friend.

I find myself thinking of this man during the day and night. I don't want to have an affair nor do I want him to know what I feel. When the thoughts of him come, they overwhelm me so I try to pray. I have no plans to cheat on my husband. What else can I do? — CONFIDENTIAL IN GREENVILLE, N.C.

DEAR CONFIDENTIAL: Because you have a wonderful husband and a life you do not want to be disrupted, I recommend that when you finish exercising at the gym you take a COLD shower. And if that doesn't work, go to an all-female gym.
