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County mulls abatement for wind project

Public hearing on tax abatement set for March 1 Commission meeting.

The Gray County Commissioners Court debated the merits of granting a tax abatement for a wind power generating project proposed by Pioneer Green Energy, of Austin. Pioneer Vice President Colin Fleming presented the project's outline to the County Commission Friday morning.

The plan involves Pioneer operating wind farms in Roberts and Hemphill counties but would require installing power lines throughout the western portion of Gray County to connect the wind generators to a power substation located south of Lefors.

On Friday, the Commission approved, by 3-1 vote, to establish criteria of a Reinvestment Zone, covering the area in which the power lines would run through Gray County. Commissioner Jeff Haley cast the lone, nay vote.

Pioneer is requesting a tax abatement within that zone, which led to the commissioners' debate.

Haley asked Fleming why Pioneer is seeking the abatement.

Fleming said it's necessary to make the project work due to its size and complexity.

Judge Richard Peet agreed with Haley and said he's not sure why the abatement is needed to run power lines.



Federal agent in Austin charged with solicitation

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - State authorities say they've arrested a federal agent in Central Texas for using the Internet to arrange a sexual tryst with an underage girl.

The attorney general's office announced Friday that 50-year-old Forrest William Johnson was charged with a felony count of online solicitation of a minor.

Johnson worked in law enforcement for U.S. Customs and Border Protection at Austin-Bergstrom International Airport.

Authorities say Johnson posted an explicit online advertisement and was contacted by an undercover officer posing as a 15-year-old girl. He was arrested Wednesday when he arrived for the encounter.

Austin resident The posted a \$20,000 bond Thursday. If convicted, he faces two to 10 years in prison and up to a \$10,000 fine

Williamson County jail records did not indicate an attorney representing Johnson.

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Two people have been given prison sentences for running a Ponzi scheme that involved more than 150 people and resulted in losses of more than \$10

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — A Fort Worth police officer who already had a driving while intoxicated charge pending when he was arrested in the fall on suspicion of drunken driving has been fired.

The Fort Worth Star-Telegram reports that according to a disciplinary letter filed with the Civil Service Commission, Zebadiah Rosado's termination was effective Jan. 18. Rosado has appealed his firing.

The letter says lab results taken after he was stopped in Fort Worth in October showed a blood alcohol concentration of 0.10, above the legal limit of 0.08. Attorneys for Rosado did not immediately return calls Friday.

"I just don't see the necessity," Peet said.

He added that, typically, the county would approve a tax abatement for a project that offers employment opportunities for Gray County citizens. The only jobs created for this phase of the project would be for the initial construction work, which would last between 6-7 months.

"I don't see the incentive," Peet said, adding that the county would not recognize considerable tax revenues from power lines. He said the real incentive is for Roberts and Hemphill counties, where the wind turbines would be located.



Haley said that if the county were to grant the tax abatement, other operators could come seeking abatements for their projects. However, abatements cannot be granted retroactively; they are specifically for new projects.

"How do we pick and choose the winners and losers?" asked Haley. "Will we just show favoritism to the best lobbyist?"

Peet said the abatement would include a disclaimer that approval would not reflect upon any other working business relationships between the county and other companies who currently operate large projects in Gray County.

"I'm not comfortable with the concept," Haley said.

"You're going to build this project

anyway, right? It's coming across, said Commissioner regardless," Gary Willoughby.

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Obama's gangster government operates above the law

Presidents' State of the Union addresses are delivered in the chamber of the House of Representatives in the Capitol. The classical majesty of

the 44th president is running an administration that too often seems to ignore the rule of law. "We can't wait," Barack Obama took to saying after the Republicans captured a majority in the House and refused to pass laws he wanted. He would act to get what he wanted regardless of law

One example: his recess appointments in January 2012 of three members of the National Labor Relations Board and the head of the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau. Last month, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia ruled unanimously that the NLRB recess appointments were unconstitutional. The decision, written by Judge David Sentelle, noted that the Constitution speaks of "the recess," not "a recess," and reasoned that it could only be referring to the recess between annual sessions of Congress. Obama, like many presidents before him, interpreted the phrase as referring to any recess during which Congress is not in session. But he went one step further. When Harry Reid became Senate majority leader in 2007, he started holding pro forma meetings of the Senate every three days and stating that the Senate was not in recess. George W. Bush, who had made recess appointments before, stopped doing so. Bush took the view that, since the Constitution says that each branch of Congress makes its own rules, the Senate was in session if the Senate said so. Obama took the view that he would decide whether the Senate was in session. Who cares

what the Constitution savs?

As Sentelle pointed out, Obama's view would entitle the president to make a recess appointment any time the Senate broke for lunch. "This cannot be the law," the judge wrote. Critics of his decision argue that under it the recess appointment power would be vanishingly small. But

under Obama's view, the Senate's power to advise and consent could effectively vanish. The Framers contemplated that the Congress would take long recesses (as for many years it did) and that it could take months for senators to return to Washington to act on appointments. It's plausible that the Framers would have considered recess appointments unnecessary in an era of jet travel. It's not plausible that they would have approved of getting rid of the Senate's power to vote on appointments altogether.

Meanwhile, decisions of the NLRB and the CFPB are in legal limbo, pending a Supreme Court decision. Hundreds of thousands of people and are affected and millions of dollars are at stake. There is a price for not observing the rule of law. There are other examples. For several years, the Obama administration has refused to obey a law requiring the president's budget to be submitted on a certain date. As Budget Director, Treasury nominee Jack Lew refused to obey the law requiring him to issue a report in response to the trustees' report on Medicare. During the 2012 campaign, the Pentagon told defense contractors not to inform employees that they may be laid off if the sequester took effect as required by the WARN Act. University of Pennsylvania law professor David Skeel pointed out that this violated the standard rules of bankruptcy law established, interestingly, during the New Deal.

How can you close the college savings gap?

Dear Carrie, I'm the father of three teenage daughters. I've been saving for college since they were babies, so I'm shocked to find myself \$100,000 short. How can I cover this gap? The oldest is 16. --A Reader

Dear Reader, First, I want to congratulate you for making saving for your daughters' educations a prior-

ity. It's no easy task to keep that as a primary goal in the face of all the other costs of raising children. A national Sallie Mae study, "How America Pays for College

2012," found that the typical family covered just 28 percent of their kids' college costs through savings and income in 2011-12. So give yourself a little credit.

But it's no wonder that parents are struggling. According to the College Board, average total charges for in-state students at four-year public colleges and universities in 2011-12 were close to \$18,000 a year. Total costs for out-of-state students were over \$30,000 per year. Yearly total costs at private nonprofit four-year institutions were close to \$40,000. And these are just the averages! Multiply these average annual costs by four years and then by three children and you have a tremendous challenge. Fortunately, with some research and planning -- and a little help from your daughters themselves -- there are ways to meet it head-on.

Research — and apply for — all financial aid

A lot of parents make the mistake of thinking their kids won't qualify for financial aid -- and make the even bigger mistake of not applying for it. But whether it's through private scholarships or government grants and loans, there's a considerable amount of financial help out there -- and not all of it is asset based.

Again, according to the College Board, in 2011-12, fulltime undergraduate students received an average of \$13,218 per student in financial aid from a combination of federal loans and other sources. That's pretty encouraging.

Equally encouraging is the fact that the Department of Education has made the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) process more streamlined and easier to navigate.

Consider, too, that in FAFSA calculations, only 5.64 percent of parents' assets are considered available for college expenses. There's also an asset protection allowance (which

increases as the parents age), so a certain percentage of assets won't be counted. Retirement accounts and the value of your primary residence are also excluded.


I don't know how close your daughters are in age, but another factor that increases eligibility for aid is how many kids you have in college at the same time. Finaid.org is a good resource to research ways to maximize financial aid eligibility.

Help with student loans

There's a lot written about the burden of student debt these days, and there's no denying that paying back student loans can be an albatross for many years if not managed wisely. But today, student loans are a fact of life and a viable way to pay for an education. The average student loan debt for 2011 graduates was \$26,500. However, you don't necessarily have to saddle your daughters with the entire bill. To cover the shortfall in savings, you could finance a certain percentage of college costs through student loans (ideally federal) and help your daughters pay them back over time.

You can also put your kids to work, be tax-smart and protect your own retirement.

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Media could go easier on GOP extremists

It's a sad day for extremism when the head of the National Rifle Association gets yelled at on

LaPierre том on that ROSSHIRT infamous

NRA ad in which a dark voice asks: "Are the president's kids more important than yours? Then why is he skeptical about putting armed security in our schools when his kids are protected by armed guards at their schools?"

When LaPierre defended the ad, Wallace said: "Do you really think that the president's children are the same kind of target as every schoolchild in America? That's ridiculous, and you know it, sir."

LaPierre probably did

not expect that. Fox News has tended to be a safe haven for extremists. But something is happening there — and elsewhere.

Fox News Channel hit a 12-year low in prime-time ratings last month in the 25- to 54-year-old demographic. The network has cut loose Dick Morris and Sarah Palin — two of the channel's most extreme voices. And that should make one thing clear: Extremism isn't selling as well these days.

On election night, Republicans and Fox News viewers had a rendezvous with reality. Since then, on taxes, immigration and guns, Republicans have made votes or statements that directly oppose past party orthodoxy.

But the Republican Party establishment is beginning to repudiate extremism. The reason isn't that extremist policies won't work; they never were going to work, and that was never the issue. It's because extremist politics won't win.

If this Republican Party makeover takes the form of abandoning extremist positions in controversial policy debates, this is a very good thing, both for the Republican Party and for the country. But if the effort broadens into a campaign to target and defeat extremist Republican candidates — as Karl Rove's new Conservative Victory Fund proposes it could cause an eruption of the long-simmering Republican civil war.

Extremists always feel under siege, even in the best of times. It's hard to maintain rigid views in a fluid world, so facts and change are constantly keeping extremists on the defensive. But taking direct character attacks from their own party's leadership — being told they are not fit to lead — that is beyond what they will bear. After he was elected president in 1968 with 43 percent of the vote, Richard Nixon began working hard to convince "the great silent majority"

of Americans that he was on their side against civil rights, busing, anti-war protests and spoiled, rebellious college students. Nixon's aim was to bring together in 1972 the 57 percent of the voters who supported either him or Wallace in 1968

Nixon got what he want ed; the Wallace voters are now part of the Republican Party. If Republicans want to change their party. they should try to do it slowly and skillfully and respectfully. If they make frontal assaults on the extremists — trying to suppress them and shame them — they will make revolutionaries of the people they're trying to defeat.

Pressure doesn't always work so well with extremists. They're extremists. Good luck, Karl.

Homeless Serb finds comfort in tomb among the dead

NIS, Serbia (AP) — To Bratislav Stojanovic, the best way to cope in the world of the living is to descend among the dead.

The 42-year-old homeless man has been dwelling at a cemetery in Nis, a city in southern Serbia, for more than 15 years, turning one of the underground tombs there into a place of his own.

Stojanovic has spent many of his days - and nights — holed up in deadly silence among the human remains. He says he finds the experience strangely comforting rather than unnerving.

"It is quiet here," he explained. "I'm not afraid of the dead, they can't harm me. The living can."

Stojanovic has piled a mattress and blankets in the tomb, which has a concrete roof but is open on one side. It is how he slides into the tiny space, but the opening also allows in cold and rain. Scattered in the tomb are old plastic bottles as well as candles that he picked up from other graves and which he burns at night to see. There is even a skull lying around, he said.

The old cemetery is located in the downtown and has been closed since the mid-1970s, when the last of its dead were laid to rest there and authorities set up a new burial location away from the center.

The headstone of Stojanovic's resting place is partly broken but still bears pictures of the people buried below. Around the cemetery some graves have been opened and apparently robbed.

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
"Hardly anyone comes here anymore," Stojanovic said. "I am all by myself."

Stojanovic has been out in the streets since the mid-1990s, when his country got caught up in a swirl of ethnic wars, international sanctions and crippling economic crisis.

Formerly a construction worker, Stojanovic at one point could no longer hold down a job and found it hard to get along with his aging father, with whom he was living.

Over the years, Stojanovic found himself spending more time in the streets than at home. Two years ago, the family house caught fire and burned to the ground, killing his father and leaving him with nothing.

The local authorities in Nis have offered Stojanovic a place in a home for the elderly, but he has refused. He said there are people who help him from time to time, but he mostly gets by on what he finds in garbage containers, including food, cigarettes and clothes.

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Meteor explodes over Russia, injures 1,100 people

MOSCOW (AP) — A meteor streaked across the sky and exploded over Russia's Ural Mountains with the power of an atomic bomb Friday, its sonic blasts shattering countless windows and injuring about 1,100 people. The spectacle deeply frightened many Russians, with some elderly women declaring that the world was coming to an end.

Many of the injured were cut by flying glass as they flocked to windows, curious about what had produced such a blinding flash of light.

The meteor — estimated to be about 10 tons - entered the Earth's atmosphere at a hypersonic speed of at least 54,000 kph (33,000 mph) and shattered into pieces about 30-50 kilometers (18-32 miles) above the ground, the Russian Academy of Sciences said in a statement.

Amateur video showed an object speeding across the sky about 9:20 a.m. local time, just after sunrise, leaving a thick white contrail and an intense flash.

"There was panic. People had no idea what was happening," said Sergey Hametov, a resident of Chelyabinsk, a city of 1 million about 1,500 kilometers (930 miles) east of Moscow.

"We saw a big burst of light, then went outside to see what it was and we heard a really loud, thundering sound," he told The Associated Press by telephone.

The meteor hit less than a day before Asteroid 2012 DA14 is to make the closest recorded pass of an asteroid to the Earth about 17,150 miles (28,000 kilometers).

But the European Space Agency said its experts had determined there was

no connection — just cosmic coincidence.

The meteor released several kilotons of energy above the region, the Russian science academy said. According to NASA, it was about 15 meters (49 feet) wide before it hit the atmosphere, about one-quarter the size of the passing asteroid.

Some meteorite fragments fell in a reservoir outside the town of Chebarkul. The crash left an eight-meter (26-foot) -wide crater in the ice.

The shock wave blew in an estimated 100,000 square meters (more than 1 million square feet) of glass, according to city officials, who said 3,000 buildings in the city were damaged. At one zinc factory, part of the roof collapsed.

The Interior Ministry said about 1,100 people sought medical care after the shock wave and 48 of them were hospitalized.

Most of the injuries were caused by flying glass, officials said.

There was no immediate word on any deaths or anyone struck by space fragments.

Meteors typically cause sizeable sonic booms when they enter the atmosphere because they are traveling so much faster than the speed of sound. Injuries on the scale reported Friday, however, are extraordinarily rare.

"I went to see what that flash in the sky was about," recalled resident Marat Lobkovsky. "And then the window glass shattered, bouncing back on me. My beard was cut open, but not deep. They patched me up. It's OK now."

Another resident, Valya Kazakov, said some elderly women in his neighborhood started crying out

that the world was ending. Russian-language hashtags for the meteorite quickly shot up into Twitter's top trends.

Lessons had just started at Chelyabinsk schools when the meteor exploded, and officials said 258 schoolchildren were among those injured.

Amateur video footage showed a teacher speaking to her class as a powerful shockwave hit the room.

Yekaterina Melikhova, a high school student whose nose was bloody and whose upper lip was covered with a bandage, said she was in her geography class when a bright light flashed outside.


"After the flash, nothing happened for about three minutes. Then we rushed outdoors. I was not alone, I was there with Katya. The door was made of glass, a shock wave made



Russian television ran footage of athletes at a city sports arena who were showered by shards of glass from huge windows. Some of them were still bleeding. Other videos showed a long shard of glass slamming into the floor close to a factory worker and massive doors blown away by the shock wave.

The vast implosion of glass windows exposed many residents to the bitter cold as temperatures in the city were expected to plummet to minus 20 Celsius (minus 4 Fahrenheit) overnight. The regional immediately governor urged any worker who can pane windows to rush to the area to help out.

Plans for prom barring gays rocks Ind. town

SULLIVAN, Ind. (AP) - A small Indiana community best known for its parks and corn festival has become the center of a national discussion about intolerance over a group's plans to host a "traditional" prom that bans gay students.

Residents and officials in Sullivan, a city of about 4,200 near the Illinois border, are scrambling to escape the uncomfortable spotlight cast when a teacher supporting the "traditional" prom for Sullivan High School said she believes people choose to be gay and that gays have no purpose in life.

"Î just ... I don't understand it," Diana Medley, referring to gays, told Terre Haute television station WTWO.

The comments by Medley, a special education teacher in a neighboring school district, have gone viral and sparked online campaigns to have her fired. A petition on Change.org calling for her dismissal had generated more than 17,500 signatures from as far away as the United Kingdom as of Thursday, and a Facebook page supporting a prom that includes all students had more than 27,000 likes.

The fallout has surprised many residents, who say the issue roiling the community in an area known for coal mining and attractive parks is being blown out of proportion.

"We are conservative around here. That's just the way of this town," said Nancy Woodard, 60, who owns the Hidden Treasure Exchange store. "In any town in this county, you'll find four or five churches no matter how small the town. ... The Bible is a big belief system here.

"Everybody has jumped on this little town. To me, there isn't any need for it, she said.

Sullivan High School Principal David Springer said talk of the "traditional" prom began in January, after a student began circulating a petition demanding that gays be allowed to participate in the grand march at Sullivan's April 27 prom. The "traditional" prom would not be sanctioned by the district and wouldn't be held at the school.

Springer said the school. which has 545 students in grades 9-12, has never banned same-sex pairs from the event.

"I've been to eight grand marches and ... we always had girls go out together, and a lot of times they just didn't have a date,' Springer said. "Our prom is open to all of our students."

But others say calls for a "traditional" prom, fueled by Medley's comments, speak to a larger climate in which gay students fear being bullied and aren't welcome.

"When someone says your kid has no purpose, how do you think that makes a parent feel?" asked Annette Gross, Indiana state coordinator for Parents, Families and Friends of Lesbians and Gays (PFLAG), whose son came out at age 19.

Aaron Gettinger, a 20-year-old Stanford University student who graduated from Sullivan High in 2011, said he isn't surprised by the push for a "traditional" prom that would ban gav students. He said he was bullied daily because he is gay and encountered viewpoints similar to those espoused by Medley.

"It's just the way that it is," he said. "It's part of a way of thinking that the rest of the country needs to know still exists and goes on."

Organizers of the "traditional" prom declined to comment, and it's unclear whether the event will still happen.

School officials and the minister of a church where planners met Sunday have worked to distance themselves from the flap.

Dale Wise, the church's senior minister at Sullivan First Christian Church, said his church turned off its fax machine and took its website offline Tuesday because both were the target of hate mail and pornographic messages.

Wise said the planning group met at the church because it allows community meetings to take place there but the church "had no affiliation whatsoever" with the "traditional" prom effort.

Springer said his staff has been inundated with calls and emails about Medley, whom he noted doesn't work for his school. She teaches in the Northeast School Corp., a neighboring district.

Neither Medley nor Northeast officials returned calls seeking comment.

The district issued a statement this week saying Medley was "expressing her First Amendment rights" and that "the views expressed are not the views of the Northeast School

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Ex-mayor's \$1B in gambling woes stun San Diego

SAN DIEGO (AP) — Maureen O'Connor was a physical education teacher who won a seat on the San Diego City Council when she was only 25 years old, later winning two terms as the city's first female mayor as she charmed voters with a populist flair.

But her rapid rise was matched by her fall, culminating Thursday when she acknowledged in federal court that she took \$2.1 million from her late husband's charitable foundation during a decade-long gambling spree in which she won — and lost — more than \$1 billion. O'Connor pleaded not guilty to a money laundering charge in an agreement with the Justice Department that defers prosecution for two years while she tries to repay the foundation and receives treatment for gambling.

O'Connor, 66, once had a personal fortune that her attorney estimated between \$40 million and \$50 million, inherited from her husband of 17 years, Robert O. Peterson, founder of the Jack in the Box Inc. fast-food chain. She is now virtually broke, living with a sister. O'Connor walked across the courtroom with a cane, appearing frail and struggling to maintain composure at one point as her attorney wrapped his arm around her shoulder and placed his hand on her head. At a news conference, she said she always intended to repay the foundation and appeared to blame her behavior on

a brain tumor that was diagnosed in 2011.

"There are two Maureens - Maureen No. 1 and Maureen No. 2," said O'Connor, who declined to take questions. "Maureen No. 2 is the Maureen who did not know she had a tumor growing in her brain." O'Connor's game of choice was video poker at casinos in San Diego, Las Vegas and Atlantic City, N.J. Her attorney, Eugene Iredale, said she played for hours at a time.



Penn State: Scandal costs stand at more than \$27M

STATE COLLEGE, Pa. (AP) — Penn State's bill for legal fees, consultants and other costs associated with the Jerry Sandusky child sex abuse scandal stands at more than \$27.6 million.

An updated figure as of November 2012 was provided this week on a university website.

It includes a \$13 million price tag for board of trustees communications and the internal investigation into the scandal by former FBI Director Louis Freeh.

Freeh's findings released last summer were the subject of renewed scrutiny earlier this week after Joe Paterno's family released an extensive response conducted by its own experts.

The late coach's family said the report was flawed and said Freeh made unfounded accusations that Paterno acted to cover up allegations against Sandusky.

Sandusky, a former assistant football coach unof child sexual abuse involving 10 boys.

He maintains his innocence.

Among other Penn State costs, nearly \$7.5 million went to university legal services or defense, including the law firm representing the university to facilitate settlements with people who have told the school they suffered damages related to the Sandusky scandal.

About \$4 million covered other legal defense fees including those for three school ex-administrators facing criminal charges related to the scandal.

University insurance policies should reimburse some of the fees and costs, but Penn State has said it won't dip into tuition dollars, state appropriations or donations.
