# Hernandez to receive Bronze Star tonight

Pampa resident and World War II veteran Joe G. Hernandez will be awarded the Bronze Star at 7 p.m., tonight at the Pampa Veterans of Foreign Wars Post, 105 S. Cuyler St.

Dinner will be served at 6 p.m. and the award will be presented by a staff mem-ber from U.S. Rep. Mac Thornberry's office.

Hernandez was born in Clovis, N.M. and moved to Pampa with his family when he was 4 years old.

He graduated from Pampa High School in 1944 and was inducted into the U.S. Army in September of that year.

He has lived through the Great Depression, the Dust Bowl and served his country in WWII.

Hernandez was a rifleman in the K Company in the 78th Division in Europe.

K Company entered combat in 1944 with 181 men on the roster and by Feb. 8, 1945 the roster had been reduced to 64 men.

Altogether, 450 men served in the company from July 1944 to July 1945.

Hernandez joined K Company as a replacement in February 1945 and was sent to the front line at Schmidt, Belgium.

Under heavy artillery attack, he became a runner, carrying messages to and from the front line.

He was wounded and was sent to a hospital in Paris for three weeks to recover.

On April 8, he was promoted to private first class.

After a 1947 study, the U.S. Army authorized the Bronze Star to all those who earned the Combat Infantry Badge in WWII.

After the war, Hernandez returned to Pampa and worked for the railroad. Later he became a letter carrier for the U.S. Post Office.

Now, 66 years later, Hernandez will receive his Bronze Star.

# Mall sale is opportunity for business to move out

While the sale of the Pampa Mall to local businessman Jason Bagwell paves the way for retailers and restaurants to lease in a prime spot on Pampa's busy Perryton Parkway, the change in ownership was an opportunity for one of the only two remaining to move out.

The Pampa Dialysis Center remains, but First Landmark Realty, which had an office just inside the main entrance, has moved to the NBC Plaza on North Hobart Street.

This was all part of the plan, said owner Irvine Riphahn, because First Landmark brokered the sale of the mall.

"We were thrilled that it happened because we wanted to sell it for a long time," Riphahn said.

Along with the intention to move out after the sale was closed on Jan. 30, Riphahn said sometimes it could get a little creepy being alone in a big empty building like the old mall.

"A lot of times I would keep the doors locked," she said. Riphahn and her staff, Lillith Brainard, Bobbie Nisbet, Chris Moore and Keely Downs, are now working out of a cozy office with plenty of other business folks to keep them





Toot'n Totum's decision to open in Pampa will add to the variety of convenience stores already operating in town, including Pak-A-Sak, Allsup's and Taylor's.

Mitchell said Toot'n Totum executives are currently discussing plans to open more convenient stores here in town.

# DPS trooper seizes drugs in Carson County

AMARILLO - The Texas Department of Public Safety conducted a traffic stop Saturday on Interstate 40 yielding 6,767 grams of methamphetamine and two grams of cocaine. The methamphetamine was valued at \$566,786 and cocaine at \$101.65.

At approximately 11:29 p.m. Saturday, a DPS trooper conducted a traffic stop on a 2000 Mercury Mountaineer traveling eastbound on I-40. The traffic stop was conducted two miles east of Conway in Carson County. The driver of the vehicle

was identified as Josue S. Valencia, male, 31, of Perris, California and his passenger Niza M. Ollo, female, 21, of San Bernardino, California.

During the traffic stop, the trooper conducted a search of the vehicle, and 6,767 grams of meth and two grams of cocaine were discovered. The contraband was located inside of the vehicle's spare tire and

a false car battery.

The driver and passengers were placed under arrest for possession of a controlled substance, a first degree felony, and booked into the Carson County Jail.

The contraband was allegedly being transported from Perris, Calif., to Wichita, Kan.

# Stray seal shows up at Maine hospital entrance

PORTLAND, Maine (AP) — A young seal wandered up a steep embankment and crossed four lanes of traffic to make an unexpected appearance at the entrance of Mercy Hospital on Friday.

Mike Therrian was out shoveling snow when he saw what he thought could have been a person bundled under a blanket at about 4 a.m. To his surprise, it was a 30-inch gray seal.

Hospital security was alerted, police officers dispatched and a marine mammal expert summoned. But Therrian and a co-worker from Seabreeze Property Service took matters into their own hands, encouraging the seal to move on before the arrival of seal expert Lynda Doughty.

We were calling it like a dog: C'mon, c'mon.' Oddly enough, it came to us," said Kevin Freeman, who took several photographs of the wayward seal.

With some coaxing the seal slid down the hill, crossed the Fore

River Parkway and crawled back into the river that empties into Portland Harbor.

Gray seals give birth to their pups from January to March, and the seal was a youngster who'd just left her mother, said Doughty, executive director of Marine Mammals of Maine. The seals sometimes crawl onto land to take a rest or to regulate their body temperature, she said.

Therrian and Freeman said they decided to encourage the seal to get back into the water after they had trouble raising anyone at the early hour. The distance from the hospital to shore was about 150 to 200 yards, and they tossed snow over sidewalks to make a path.

It was high tide and the seal knew what to do. "She got down there on the rocks, she got her nose in the water, and she just took right off," Freeman said.

Doughty said the men meant well but she encouraged people to leave seals alone and to call a toll-free marine mammal rescue hotline so the animals can be properly assessed.

### 900 dead pigs found floating in Shanghai river

BEIJING (AP) — Chinese officials say they have fished out 900 dead pigs from a Shanghai river that is a water source for city residents.

Officials are investigating where the pigs came from. A statement posted Saturday on the city's Agriculture Committee's website says they haven't found any evidence that the pigs were dumped into the river or of any animal epidemic.

The statement says the city and Songjiang district governments started retrieving the pigs on Friday night. By late Saturday afternoon they had recovered and disposed of more than 900.

The statement says the water and environmental protection bureaus are ramping up monitoring of the river's water quality.

# South Korea, US begin drills as North Korea threatens war

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — North Korean state media said Monday that Pyongyang had carried through with a threat to cancel the 60-year-old armistice that ended the Korean War, as it and South Korea staged dueling war games amid threatening rhetoric that has risen to the highest level since North Korea rained artillery shells on a South Korean island in 2010.

Enraged over the South's joint military drills with the United States and recent U.N. sanctions, Pyongyang has piled threat on top of threat, including vows to launch a nuclear strike on the U.S. Seoul has responded with tough talk of its own and has placed its troops on high alert.

The North Korean government made no formal announcement Monday on its repeated threats to scrap the armistice, but the country's main newspaper, Rodong Sinmun, reported that the armistice was nullified Monday as Pyongyang had earlier announced it would.

The North followed through on another promise Monday, shutting down a Red Cross hotline that the North and South used for general communication and to discuss aid shipments and separated families' reunions.

The 11-day military drills that started Monday involve 10,000 South Korean and about 3,000 American troops.

Those coincide with two months of separate U.S.-South Korean field exercises that began March 1.

The drills are held annually, and this year, according to South Korean media, the "Key Resolve" drill rehearses different scenarios for a possible conflict on the Korean peninsula using computersimulated exercises.

The U.S. and South Korean troops will be used to test the scenarios. Also continuing are large-scale North Korean drills that Seoul says involve the army, navy and air force. The South Korean defense ministry said there have been no military activities it considers suspicious. The North has threatened to nullify the armistice several times in times of tension with the outside world, and in 1996 the country sent hundreds of armed troops into a border village. The troops later withdrew.

was used Monday to give hundreds of South Koreans approval to enter

North Korea to go to work. Their jobs are at the only remaining operational symbol of joint inter-Korean cooperation, the Kaesong industrial complex.

It is operated in North Korea with South Korean money and knowhow and a mostly North Korean work force.

The North Korean rhetoric escalated as the U.N. Security Council last week approved a new round of sanctions over Pyongyang's latest nuclear weapons test Feb. 12.

Analysts said that much of the bellicosity is meant to shore up loyalty among citizens and the military for North Korea's young leader, Kim Jong Un.

"This is part of their brinksmanship," said Daniel Pinkston, a Seoulbased expert on North Korea with the International Crisis Group think tank. "It's an effort to signal their resolve, to show they are willing to take greater risks, with the expectation that everyone else caves in and gives them what they want.'

Part of what North Korea wants is a formal peace treaty to end the Korean War, instead of the armistice that leaves the peninsula still technically in a state of war.

It also wants security guarantees and other concessions, direct talks with Washington, recognition as a nuclear weapons state and the removal of 28,500 U.S. troops stationed in South Korea.

Pinkston said there is little chance of fighting breaking out while war games are being conducted, but he added that he expects North Korea to follow through with a somewhat mysterious promise to respond at a time and place of its own choosing.

North Korea was responsible for an artillery attack that killed four South Koreans in 2010. A South investigation found that North Korea torpedoed a South Korean warship that same year, killing 46 sailors.

Pyongyang denies sinking the ship.

Among other threats in the past week, North Korea has warned Seoul of a nuclear war on the divided peninsula and said it was cancelling nonaggression pacts.

South Korean and U.S. officials have been closely monitoring Pyongyang's actions and parsing its recent rhetoric, which has been more warlike than usual.

One analyst said Kaesong's continued operations show that North Korea's cutting of the Red Cross communication channel was symbolic. More than 840 South Koreans were set to cross the border Monday to Kaesong, which provides a badly-needed flow of hard currency to a country where many face food shortages, according to Seoul's Unification Ministry

"If South Koreans don't go to work at Kaesong, North Korea will suffer' financially, said analyst Hong Hyun-ik at the private Sejong Institute in South Korea. "If North Korea really intends to start a war with South Korea, it could have taken South Koreans at Kaesong hostage."

Under newly inaugurated President Park Geun-hye, South Korea's Defense Ministry, which often brushes off North Korean threats, has looked to send a message of strength in response to the latest comments from Pyongyang.

The ministry has warned that the North's government would "evaporate from the face of the Earth" if it ever used a nuclear weapon.

The White House also said the U.S. is fully capable of defending itself against a North Korean ballistic attack.

On Monday, Park told a Cabinet Council meeting that South Korea should strongly respond to any provocation by North Korean-led international Korea. But she also said Seoul should move ahead with her campaign promise to build up trust with the North

U.S. mainland is within the range of its long-range missiles, and an army general told a Pyongyang rally last week that the military is ready to fire a long-range nuclear-armed missile to turn Washington into a "sea of fire."

While outside scientists are still trying to determine specifics, the North's rocket test in December and third atomic bomb test last month may have pushed the country a step closer to acquiring the ability to hit the U.S. with weapons of mass destruction.

Analysts, however, say Pyongyang is still years away from acquiring the smaller, lighter nuclear warheads needed for a credible nuclear missile program.

# AgriLife Ext. Service to offer food manager training course

#### SUBMITTED

A professional food manager certification training course will be offered March 27-28 at the Gray County Annex, located at 12125 E. Frederic Ave. in Pampa by the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service in Gray County.

Statistics indicate foodborne illness continues to be a health issue in the U.S., with one in six Americans becoming sick each year — 128,000 requiring hospitalization and 3,000 will die due to a foodborne illness, said Joan Gray-Soria, AgriLife Extension family and consumer science agent in Gray County.

Facilities under the Texas Department of State Health

Services jurisdiction are required to have one certified food manager on site, Gray-Soria said. In 2010, the city of Pampa also adopted the rule to require each food establishment to have one certified food manager.

The "Food Safety: It's Our Business" training will help individuals attain the required certification, which is good for five years, she said. The program cost is \$125, which includes training, materials and a national food manager certification examination.

Foodborne illnesses are estimated to cost thousands of dollars in lost wages, insurance and medical bills, Gray-Soria said. With these statistics, knowledge of how to prevent foodborne illness is essential.

The benefits of improved food safety include: in-

creased customer satisfaction, improved relationships with health officials and prevention of bad publicity and lawsuits due to foodborne illness, she said.

The program will cover identifying potentially hazardous foods, common errors in food handling, preventing contamination and cross-contamination, teaching and encouraging personal hygiene for employees, complying with government regulations, maintaining clean utensils, equipment and surroundings, and controlling pests.

Foodborne illnesses can be prevented by following simple food safety practices, Gray-Soria said.

# Texas adds 310,900 jobs over the year: 10,400 jobs added in January

AUSTIN — Texas employers continued to expand their payrolls in January with the addition of 10,400 total nonfarm jobs for a total of 310,900 jobs added over the year. In January 2013, Texas reported more than 11 million total nonfarm jobs.

After declining for six consecutive months, the unemployment rate in Texas rose slightly in January to 6.3 percent, and was down nine-tenths of a percentage point over the year. It remained well below the nation's January unemployment rate of 7.9 percent.

"The Texas economy continues to add jobs and create opportunity, with growth in all 11 major industries over the last year," said Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) Chairman Andres Alcantar. "I encourage job seekers and employers to visit WorkInTexas.com, or a local Workforce Solutions office, to take advantage of the quality services available to them.'

Eight out of 11 major industries saw positive growth over the month, with Leisure and Hospitality leading the way in hiring for January with 8,900 jobs added. This industry has added 62,500 jobs over the last year for a 5.9 percent annual growth rate.

"It's good to see so many different opportunities continuing to arise here in Texas," said TWC Commissioner Representing Labor Ronny Congleton. "For example the Trade, Transportation, and Utilities industry alone has grown by nearly 64,000 jobs over the past year. That's more than any other industry in Texas."

The Mining and Logging industry, which includes oiland gas-related jobs, added 19,700 jobs from January 2012 to January 2013 for a 7.6 percent annual growth rate. The Construction industry grew by 28,500 jobs over the last year for a 5.0 percent annual growth rate.

Q: I am so upset by these crybaby women who gripe and complain about not getting enough money from their husband's Social Security accounts. I am the one with an ax to grind. I worked hard all my life. And I can't get a nickel on my husband's Social Security record. Yet all these stay-at-home women rake in the dough from their sugar daddy husbands and then they have the gall to complain it's not enough money! What can possibly be fair about that? Why can't I get any of my husband's Social Security?

A: Mom? Is that you? Are you still turning over in your grave because you just can't let this go?

OK, so that wasn't my mother with a heaven-sent albeit spite-filled message from the afterlife. But it was just another example of the thousands of irate emails I've received over the years from working women who are upset that they oftentimes can't get any benefits from their husband's Social lar. I'm not an anthropologist. Nor am I a psychiatrist. But speaking of those good things, our neighbors behind us across the alley were living the American dream. (That alley was like the proverbial "tracks." 
