Pampa EDC to consider \$350k loan for Pampa Mall

Public hearing slated for 4 p.m., Thursday.

Pampa Economic The Development Corp. (EDC) will hold a public hearing at 4 p.m., Thursday, at the Pampa EDC office, to consider a \$350,000 forgivable loan to J&M Bagwell Properties, LLC to be used for redevelopment of the Pampa Mall.

Developer Jason Bagwell intends

to utilize the funding to pay for roof repairs and renovations in the mall portion of the property.

"The biggest issue is definitely the roof," Bagwell said, adding that vandals have, in the past, stolen the copper out of the heating and air units on the roof. "Those are the biggest issues that you have to deal with.'

Bagwell said his development crew must also contend with serious, detrimental water holes that have allowed seepage and caused damage to the walls.

He said the \$350,000 loan will also cover new flooring for the mall's central corridor and will go toward remodeling the tenant spaces for expectant new businesses.

Pampa EDC Executive Director Clay Rice invited the public to attend the hearing and express their viewpoints on the redevelopment project.

"I think it's good to publicize it," Rice said. "Anybody can come and take part in the public hearing. There's a period where they can

Demolition begins on old middle school

Demolition began Monday on the old Pampa Middle School as the small building west of the gym was torn down. The demolition will be completed in stages as asbestos is removed from the old buildings.

After the buildings are torn down, the site will be redeveloped by Open Range Engineering Services, which plans to build town houses and quads. Open Range also has for sale commercial lots intended for restauants and other businesse

The former Pampa Middle School opened as Robert E. Lee Junior High School in 1958. The school's moniker was the Rebels and its colors were red and grey.

Pampa Junior High School was located downtown where the First National Bank drive-up is now located. Its nickname was the Reapers and its colors were blue and white.

When that school was torn down, all the junior high students in Pampa went to Pampa Middle School, which closed in 2010 when the new PJHS opened north of the city. Its moniker was the Patriots and its colors were red, white and blue.

Those wishing to own a piece of the nostalgia should visit a "garage sale" being held by Open Range from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., Saturday. A lot of old furniture and equipment will be

sold off at the event.

Items for sale include lockers, desks, tables, filing cabinets, mounted screens, basketball goals, books and even vinyl records. The old school is located at 2401 Charles St.

Metropoulos, which owns Pabst beer, has said it hopes to have the cakes back on shelves by this sum-

The judge also approved the sale of Wonder and other breads to Flowers Foods, which makes Tastykakes. Flowers will also get Nature's Pride, Butternut, Home Pride and Merita as part of the \$360 million deal.

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
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Worker admits cutting 10 babies at abortion clinic

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — A medical assistant told a jury Tuesday that she snipped the spines of at least 10 babies during unorthodox abortions at a West Philadelphia clinic. And she said Dr. Kermit Gosnell and another employee did the same to terminate pregnancies.

Adrienne Moton's testimony came in the capital murder trial of Gosnell, the clinic owner, who is on trial in the deaths of a patient and seven babies. Prosecutors accuse him of killing late-term, viable babies after they were delivered alive, in violation of state abortion laws.

Gosnell's lawyer denies the murder charge and disputes that any babies were born alive. He also challenges the gestational age of the aborted fetuses, calling them inexact estimates.

Moton, the first employee to testify, sobbed as she recalled taking a cellphone photograph of one baby left in her work area. She thought he could have survived, given his size and pinkish color. She had measured him at nearly 30 weeks.

"The aunt felt it was just best for her

(the mother's) future," Moton testified.
Gosnell later joked that the baby was so big he could have walked to the bus stop,

Jurors saw Moton's photograph on a large screen in the courtroom, which took on a bizarre look Tuesday as she testified near a hospital bed with stirrups and other aging obstetric equipment. Denied the chance to bring jurors to the shuttered inner-city clinic, prosecutors are instead recreating a patient room in court.

Moton, 35, sobbed as she described her work at the clinic. Because of problems at home, she had moved in with Gosnell and his third wife during high school, and she went to work for him from 2005 to 2008. She earned about \$10 an hour, off the books, to administer drugs, perform sonograms, help with abortions and dispose of fetal remains. Workers got \$20 bonuses for second-term abortions on

Saturdays, when a half-dozen were sometimes performed.

She once had to kill a baby delivered in a toilet, cutting its neck with scissors, she said. Asked if she knew that was wrong, she said, "At first I didn't."

Abortions are typically performed in utero. In Pennsylvania, abortions cannot legally be performed after the 24th week of pregnancy.

Moton has pleaded guilty to third-degree murder, which carries a 20- to 40year term, as well as conspiracy and other charges. She has been in prison since early 2011, when Philadelphia prosecutors released the harrowing grand jury report on Gosnell's Women's Medical Center and arrested the doctor, wife Pearl and eight current or former employees. Most of them are expected to testify.

Women and teens came from across the mid-Atlantic, often seeking late-term abortions, Moton said. She recalled one young woman from Puerto Rico who did not speak English and appeared to be 27 weeks pregnant.

One patient, a 41-year-old refugee, died after an overdose of drugs allegedly given to her during a 2009 abortion.

And they say he made even more on the side running a "pill mill," where addicts and drug dealers could get prescriptions for potent painkillers. Authorities found \$250,000 in cash at his home when they searched it in 2010.

Mortar explosion in Nev. kills seven N.C. unit Marines

(AP) — A mortar shell explosion killed seven Marines and injured a half-dozen more during mountain warfare training in Nevada's high desert, prompting the Pentagon to immediately halt the use of some of the weapons worldwide until an investigation can determine their safety, officials said Tuesday.

The explosion occurred Monday night at the Hawthorne Army Depot, a facility used by troops heading overseas, during an exercise involving the 2nd Marine Expeditionary Force from Camp Lejeune, N.C. Several Marines from the unit were injured in the blast, authorities said.

The mortar round exploded in its firing tube during the exercise, said Brigadier General Jim Lukeman at a news conference at Camp Lejeune. He said investigators are trying to determine the cause of the malfunction.

Lukeman extended condolences to the families of the victims. "Our first priority is to provide them support and we're doing that now," he said.

The Marine Corps said in a statement that it suspended all use of highexplosive and illumination mortar rounds that were in the same manufacturing lots as the ones that were fired in Nevada. The Pentagon suspended use of those rounds worldwide across all branches, not just the Marines.

The Marines were also considering a stop-usage order affecting the mortar tubes like the ones in the accident.

It was not immediately clear whether more than a single round exploded, a Marine Corps official said, speaking on condition of

anonymity because the official wasn't authorized to speak about an ongoing investigation.

Eight men under the age of 30 were taken to Renown Regional Medical Center in Reno with injuries, such as penetrating trauma, fractures and vascular injuries. One of them died, five were in serious condition, one in was fair condition and another was discharged, said spokesman Mark Earnest.

The identities of those killed won't be released until 24 hours after their families are notified.

"We send our prayers and condolences to the families of Marines involved in this tragic incident," said the force's commander, Maj. Gen. Raymond C. Fox. "We mourn their loss, and it is with heavy hearts we remember their courage and sacrifice."

The rescue was complicated by the remoteness of the site, which is favored because the harsh geography simulates conditions in Afghanistan.

The 60mm mortar is a weapon that traditionally requires three to four Marines to operate, but it's common during training for others to observe nearby. The firing tube is supported in a tripod-like design and fires roughly a 3-pound shell, some 14 inches in length and a bit larger than 2 inches in diameter.

The mortar has changed little since World War II and remains one of the simplest weapons to operate, which is why it is found at the lowest level of infantry units, said Joseph Trevithick, a mortar expert with Global Secu-

"Basically, it's still a pipe and it's got a firing pin at the bottom," Trevithick said. Still, a number of things could go wrong from a fuse malfunctioning, a problem with the barrel's assembly to a round prematurely detonating inside the tube, he

The Marine Corps official said an explosion at the point of firing in a training exercise could kill or maim anyone inside or nearby the protective mortar pit and could concussively detonate any mortars stored nearby in a phenomenon known as "sympathetic detonation."

The official said a worldwide moratorium after such an accident is not unusual and would persist until the investigation determines that the weapon did not malfunction in ways that would hurt other Marines or that mortars manufactured at the same time as the one involved in

The official said it would be normal to warn other U.S. military branches that use 60mm mortars, such as the Army, about the Marines warning. The moratorium could last for weeks or months.

The investigation will focus on whether the Marines followed procedures to properly fire the weapon, whether there was a malfunction in the firing device or in the explosive mortar itself, the official

The Hawthorne Army Depot stores and disposes of ammunition. The facility is made up of hundreds of buildings spread over more than 230 square miles, and bunkers dot the sagebrush-covered hills visible from the highway. Hawthorne is in the shadow of Mt. Baker, which reaches an elevation of 11,239 feet.

To qualify for the loan, all repairs must meet current City of Pampa building codes. The interest rate of the loan is prime +1. Quarterly interest will accrue until Jan. 1, 2014 — monthly principal and interest payments will then begin. The term of the loan is 20 years. Further details of the loan

- include: • Forgive \$1 for each square foot retail or office space per year for 5 years; (1) for additional squarefoot space leased from tenants relocating within city limits; (2) will apply for businesses brought into the mall from outside city limits, not to exceed
- \$350,000. Subordination on the loan to Happy State

Bank, which means a subsidiary — or "second" loan, issued by Pampa EDC, would rank second in payback priority to a loan issued by Happy State Bank;

• Require, prior to funding, a deed of trust, Pampa EDC named on the insurance policy, assignment of rents and a copy of the title insurance.

Thursday's public hearing will be part of the EDC's monthly Board of Directors meeting. Also on the agenda is consideration of a \$20,000 grant for the City of Pampa to be used for demolition of blighted commercial properties.

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Optimism in the air

You might not know it from the acrimonious political debate on cable and broadcast TV, or on talk radio, or on websites and blogs. But here's a

counterintuitive observation: Amidst all the negativism out there, I believe optimism LAWRENCE is in the

That's

KUDLOW

Optimism.

Sometimes you have to search for it, or read it in the fine print. But I believe the political economy is getting better, not worse.

Let me make a few points to defend what most folks believe is an indefensible position.

The stock market is hitting record highs daily, returning a tremendous amount of wealth to the half of American households that own shares. This investorclass wealth-creation alone is sparking a new sense of confidence and optimism.

Then on a smaller scale, housing — the other great source of American wealth — is beginning an impressive recovery. Over 60 percent of Americans own their own home, a key form of wealth. Like stocks, the housing recovery is creating a new sense of optimism after a very long and depressing dry spell.

Then there's the anemic economic recovery. It's the worst in modern times going back to 1947. But wait a minute

 things are looking up here, too.

Let me quote from the highly respected economists Conrad DeQuadros and John Ryding: "In the last two weeks, we have seen manufacturing ISM, non-manufacturing ISM, ABP employment, payrolls, jobless claims, retail sales, and industrial production beat expectations and show

an upswing in economic activity. Record profits for business may be driving this economic pickup. And

it's all unfolding after the

supposedly catastrophic

budget-cutting sequester, and after a tax-hike bill that supply-siders like myself opposed (although income and investment taxes went up much less than feared).

In fact, even the eruption in government spending is showing signs of calming down. Taking into account a modest recovery, spending-cut bills of roughly \$2 trillion and an end to the failed spending stimulus of 2009, the federal spending share of the economy has dropped from 25 percent in 2009-10, to 24 percent in 2011, to just below 23 percent last year.

As I have argued time and again, spending cuts and limited government lower the overall tax burden and promote economic growth.

Finally, Fed policy remains highly accommodative, while there are no real signs of an inflation problem. The Fed has stabilized nominal gross domestic product (total spending in the economy) at around 4 percent, which will probably move higher toward 5 percent in the next year. And King Dollar is strengthening. All this is

Ryan's new budget roadmap is more vision than green-eyeshade exercise: Repeal Obamacare. Replace it with a patient-centered health care system. Go for true pro-growth tax reform by lowering marginal rates and broadening the base for individuals and businesses. (By the way, Obama is talking about corporate tax reform Maybe common ground can be found.)

And yes, after his first significant meeting with President Obama, and despite the major differences, Paul Ryan says it's possible to achieve common ground.

"I'm cautiously optimistic about this," he

Q: It seems that we are experiencing more frequent natural disasters, and we may likely experience one ourselves.

In December, our cousins faced a major flood in their home and are still trying to recover from it. We understand that no one can be totally prepared, but what are the basics?

Support for same-sex marriage crosses party lines

In an opinion article in the Columbus Dispatch, Ohio Republican Sen. Rob Portman announced that he has changed his mind

and now supports same-sex marriage. He wrote that on learning that one of his sons

is gay he "wrestled with how to reconcile

my Christian faith with my desire for Will to have the same opportunities to pursue happiness and fulfillment as his brother and sister."

He is not the only prominent Republican to come to this view in this way. Former Vice President Dick Cheney is another.

And at the Conservative Political Action Committee convention, a panel sponsored by the Competitive Enterprise Institute drew a large and approving crowd for a discussion labeled, "A Rainbow on the Right: Growing the Coalition, Bringing Tolerance Out of the Closet."

It's clear now that support for same-sex marriage crosses party lines. That's what one might expect, from polls that show a huge shift of opinion on this issue over the last two decades.

In the early 1990s, large majorities opposed samesex marriage. In 1996, Bill Clinton didn't hesitate be-

fore signing the Defense of Marriage Act, which barred the federal government from recognizing same-sex marriages. He now urges its repeal.

In 2004, after the Massachusetts Supreme Judicial Court by a 4-3 margin discovered that the state's 1780 Constitution required recognition of same-sex marriages, George W. Bush supported the Family Marriage Amendment, which would bar such marriages across the nation.

That was never going to be ratified, but it did help Bush mobilize traditionminded voters in states like Ohio in the 2004 election.

Now many polls show majorities or pluralities of Americans favor same-sex marriage. Last November, voters in Maine, Maryland and Washington approved same-sex marriage.

Voters in Minnesota rejected a constitutional amendment that would ban it. That's in contrast to the results in 30 states, all but one of them in 2008 or earlier, where voters approved similar amend-

Many of those states would surely vote the other way now, including California, whose 52-to-48 percent vote against same-sex marriage in 2008 was overturned by federal trial and appeals courts in a case now before the Supreme Court.

The Supreme Court could rule that the Constitution requires same-sex marriage everywhere.

Or it could affirm the appeals court's rationale, which applies to California only.

Or it could say that the Constitution leaves this issue to the states.

That's the outcome that, as a supporter of same-sex marriage, I prefer.

Nine states and the District of Columbia have legalized same-sex marriage, most by legislative or popular vote. Another 11 states have no constitutional amendment barring

And the 30 states with such constitutional amendments could repeal those amendments by popular vote.

That would require continuing debate and discussion. A good place to start is for everyone to recognize that, as Portman writes, "well-intentioned people can disagree on the question of marriage for gay couples.'

I believe that large majorities of people on both sides take their stands out of good motives. Yes, you can find some haters on both sides if you look hard.

But the large majority of Americans believe that their view — traditional marriage or extension of marriage to same-sex couples — is or would be good for individuals and good for society.

Backers of traditional marriage can cite hundreds of years of experi-

ence and tradition. Backers of same-sex marriage can cite the growing acceptance of gay individuals and couples in all

parts of the country. Those who oppose it fear it will weaken the institution of marriage.

But so far I haven't seen evidence that extending marriage to the 3 or 4 percent who are gay has weakened the institution nearly as much as the much larger number of Americans who get divorced or have children without getting married at all.

This is an issue that divides Americans not just on partisan or religious but most conspicuously or generational lines. Young people, including many Republicans, heavily favor same-sex marriage. Elderly people, including many Democrats, heavily oppose it.

If opinion continues to move toward samesex marriage, it will be a tough issue for Republicans, since most of their voters currently are opposed.

But it will be a tough issue for some Democrats, as well, since many black voters are staunchly opposed.

But it's an issue we can handle better if we respect and acknowledge the good faith of those on the other

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



When the error was realized, she says the airline took immediate steps to get Hendrix back to his owner.



Murder trial of Mich. grandma nears end

Walton says the murder conviction is warranted because Layne fired 10 shots over a six-minute span, striking Hoffman six times.
