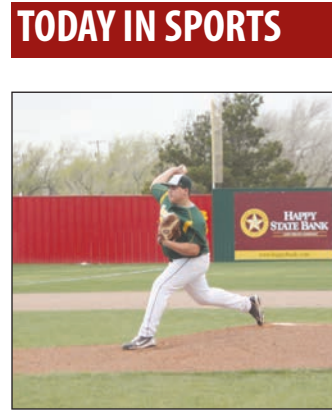

County hires new museum director

The Gray County Commissioners Court has appointed Courtney Oxley to serve as the new director of the White Deer Land Museum.

"We were very impressed with her," Judge Richard Peet said on Tuesday.

Peet said Oxley will begin at her new post next week.

The selection was agreed upon by a hiring committee, comprised of three county commissioners and two members of the White Deer Land Museum Advisory Board.

Peet noted during Monday's meeting that the committee had interviewed six or seven applicants.

Oxley will serve as both museum director and curator.

Former curator Anne Davidson passed away in January. Assistant Kay Lard had since filled Davidson's position on an interim basis.

"It's been interesting," Lard said of her time serving as interim director, "I was just happy to be here."

Lard is a Pampa native and said she moved back to town to work specifically under Anne.

Proper lawn maintenance can save water, money



Editor's note: This is the first article in a new weekly series providing water conversation tips to our readers.

Lawns get up to 35 percent of water for non-agricultural use, so it makes sense and saves dollars to be as thrifty with yard water as possible. A lawn only needs water twice a week, less if it rains, and overwatering is not only wasteful and costly, but can actually damage the roots

of healthy grass.

To help you know how much water your lawn is getting — whether you have a state-of-the-art sprinkler system or drag around a hose — you can accurately measure using a lawn gauge provided by Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District (PGCD). These can be picked up at garden centers, home centers and AgriLife Extension offices around the district. The gauges come with instructions

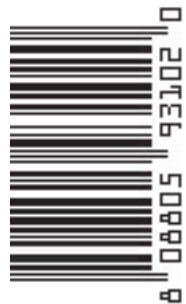

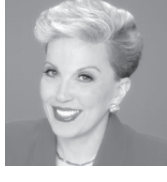

Has she fallen in love with her cellphone? Even if we don't have sex all the time, I would just like to be able to talk to her or hold her for a minute before we go to sleep. Any suggestions other than throwing her phone out the window? — ABANDONED HUSBAND IN UTAH

DEAR ABANDONED: You

say your wife has responded and things are hopeful. That means she is at least receptive to working on your marital relationship.

The problems that cellphones cause in relationships is something I am hearing about with increasing frequency. People have become so dependent upon their digital companions that in some cases it's impossible to turn them off because people have become literally addicted.

In cases like this, a licensed therapist should be consulted. Of course, like any addiction the sufferer must be willing to admit there is a problem and want to do something about it. I'm nervous about being around this man. I don't want to compromise his sobriety, but I can't stand seeing him at every meeting and event I attend. My husband is also

bothered by it, and I'm considering not attending any meetings at all because he's creeping me out. How should I handle this? — SOBER AND CREEPED OUT

DEAR CREEPED OUT: If there is a group moderator or contact, discuss this with that person. Because you want less contact with your "admirer," look around for another group. Even if you will have to travel a bit farther, it will be worth the effort.

If you do happen to run into him in the future and he tries to engage you in conversation about other patients from your program, cut the conversation short by telling him you are not interested in hearing about them. One of the hallmarks of 12-step programs is anonymity — and it should be respected.

Wheat freeze clinics throughout Panhandle Thursday

Wheat Freeze Assessment Sessions will be held April 18 across the High Plains, South Plains and Rolling Plains after temperatures dipped into the teens and low 20s on April 9-10, threatening much of Texas' wheat crop.

Dr. Calvin Trostle, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service agronomist in Lubbock, and Dr. Clark Neely, AgriLife Extension state small grains and oilseeds specialist in College Station, will attend the meetings to help evaluate samples participants bring and train them to spot freeze damage.

"We have indeed unquestionable and major potential injury on our wheat crop for grain," Trostle said. "The absolute temperature is one factor and the duration of these temperatures is another. When com-

bined, these two issues significantly raise the injury potential."

He said temperatures in the northwest and northern South Plains hovered around 20-22 degrees; the Amarillo region, 20 degrees; the southeast Panhandle, 22-25 degrees; and north of the Canadian River, about 15-20 degrees. Some areas were below 28 degrees for about 24 hours.

"There has been enough jointing now into the Panhandle that the growing point most likely experienced the cold temperatures that cause damage," Trostle said. "Also, the strong wind speed overnight April 9-10 probably circulated the temperatures farther into the canopy, whereas on still nights with only a light breeze, this probably doesn't happen as readily."

"Likewise, on a windy night, the low end of the field, if there is one, for example, a playa bottom or a

draw, might be less likely to demonstrate injury relative to the rest of the field."

Producers planning to attend one of the meetings should bring 10-20 samples from each field, including roots; a pocket knife or razor blade to cut samples; and field data, such as variety and planting date. When collecting samples please dig instead of pulling the plants so the plants can be diagnosed properly.

on how to use them to get the most "bang" for your water buck.

How much to water

Apply enough water to wet soil to a depth of 4-6 inches. After watering your lawn, determine the depth the water reaches by using a soil probe or screwdriver. Even during the hottest months, one inch of water per week is usually adequate.

When to water

Stress for your lawn is natural, especially during the summer. When your lawn is ready for water, it will have a grayish cast and footprints will remain in the turf. Wait for these signs of stress to appear before watering. Avoid watering on a windy day and only water in early morning or late evening to reduce evaporation. Avoid watering sidewalks, gutters and other non-porous surfaces. If it rains, adjust your water-

ing schedule accordingly.

Saving water = Saving dollars

At the current City of Pampa rate of up to \$4 per thousand gallons (the rate varies with amount used), watering your yard can easily cost \$100 or more each month.

Again, this is just watering the lawn. It

does not include showers, washing dishes or laundry, or flushing the toilet.

Putting the proper amount of water at the proper time saves money, establishes a healthy lawn and conserves water for future generations.

As we like to say, "If you ain't savin'...you're misbehavin'!"

Lefors FD to open McLean substation

■ Commission approves up to \$7,000 to equip new McLean ambulance.

The Gray County Commissioners Court on Monday unanimously approved the City of Lefors' plan to expand the coverage area of the Lefors Fire Department (LFD) into McLean by opening a substation in town to house an ambulance.

Commissioner Jeff Haley said Lefors' volunteer fire and EMS departments have agreed with the City of McLean to locate a licensed ambulance in McLean to be used at local emergency scenes that require EMS services.

"The reason to do so would be to cut down on the driving time from Lefors," Haley said. "The other thing is to take advantage of some people who are licensed (to drive ambulances)."

Lefors Fire Chief Sy Brown said McLean has two crew members that can serve as EMS drivers and three who can perform EMT duties.

The commissioners noted that the City of McLean owns the building it plans to use for the substation, so Lefors will not be required to cover rent or utility expenses.

"They need help, Judge," Haley said, of the community of McLean.

Commissioner Joe Wheeley then shared his gratitude for Brown and all of the volunteer firefighters who serve the rural communities, which, by their nature, are isolated and distanced from primary fire departments in

metro areas.

The Commission voted to expend up to \$7,000 for the McLean-Lefors EMS to be used for ambulance equipment.

In other business, the Commission unanimously approved a \$10,000 expense for Gray County District Attorney Franklin McDonough's staff payroll requirements.

McDonough informed the commissioners that the state has cut funding to DA offices across Texas by \$10,000 each. That leaves McDonough \$10,000 short in salary commitments previously made to three employees who have always drawn a portion of their paychecks from that state funding.

McDonough explained that the salary adjustment request is not for a raise or bonus — it's simply to fulfill salary commitments.

The DA said he intends to draw the \$10,000 from his department's Forfeiture Budget, which currently sits at around \$243,000.

Commissioner Gary Willoughby noted that this was not something that McDonough could have controlled. This direction came from the state on down and placed McDonough in an uncomfortable position. Willoughby then thanked the DA for resolving the issue.

Obama's budget keeps growing

No matter how you slice the Obama budget pie, the inescapable fact is that the president wants to get rid of the roughly \$1 trillion budget-cutting sequester and substitute in a \$1 trillion-plus tax hike. In other words, more spending, more tax-

ing. Growth-busting. The GOP should just say no. And let me provide some counsel to my Republican friends in Washington, in particular in the House. Balanced budgets don't create growth. This mantra is wrong. It's growth that creates balanced budgets.

Cut spending? That's a pro-growth measure. Lower tax rates? Another pro-growth measure. The combination of limited government and true tax reform will balance the budget soon enough, with government coming in at a smaller share of gross domestic product while sufficient investment and work incentives get growth moving toward the 4 or 5 percent range. That kind of growth would make up for the lost ground of the past 15 years. And if you add in deregulation and a sound King Dollar, you'd have a growth budget that would propel America back into prosperity.

Indeed, with some tweaking of eligibility requirements, a true economic-growth budget would lower food-stamp enrollment, unemployment compensation, disability benefits and other forms of welfare-dependency spending that plague the country. Medicare is a more complex issue, but Social Security would be solved by a long-run growth spurt.

Of course, this is not what President Obama is aiming for. He wants more than \$500 billion in tax revenue from a 28 percent income-tax deduction limit. But this is not tax reform, since there are no offsetting reductions in marginal tax rates. He also wants

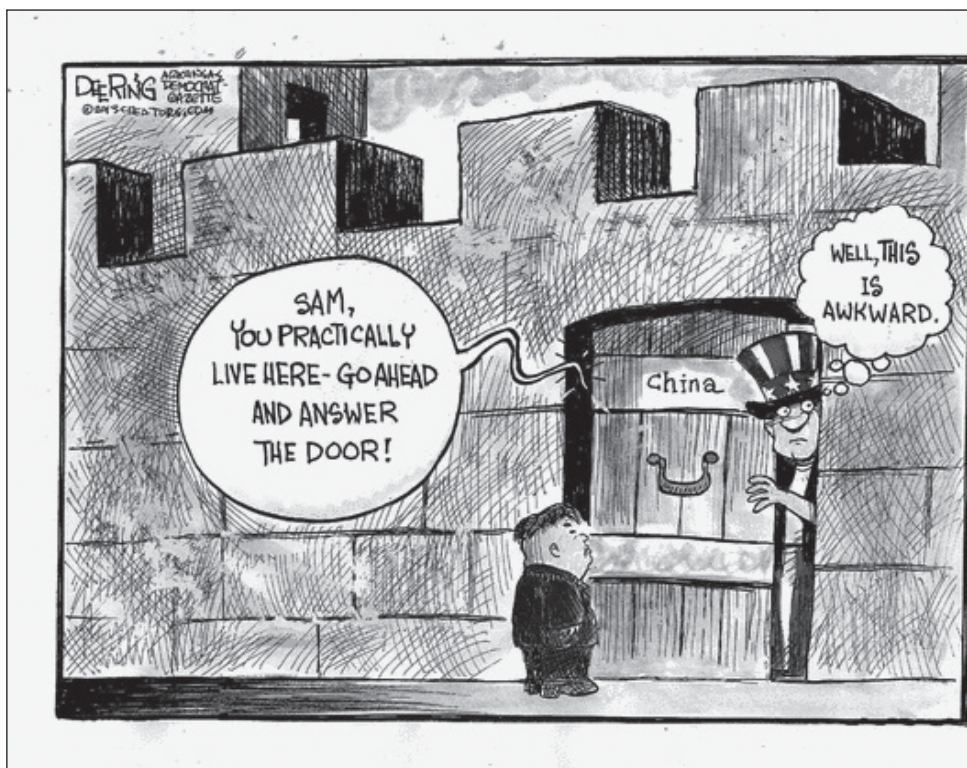
a \$50 billion Buffett rule that would jack up taxes on capital gains and dividends. He would slap energy companies with a \$100 billion tax hike, at least. Offshore corporate income would see a \$150 billion tax increase. And banks and financial institutions would get slammed with \$100 billion in new taxes.

And there's no serious corporate tax reform in this budget. Even with some temporary tax-credit offsets, some have suggested that there might be room for a 1 percentage point business tax cut, from 35 percent to 34 percent. That's pathetic. Instead, the most powerful growth measure would have small-business, sub-chapter-S-type firms pay the same 25 percent tax rate as large C-corp companies might. This would be a huge growth booster, and it would attract investment from all over the world. Then there's the budget's incredible and arbitrary limit or tax on — or even possible confiscation of — IRA-type tax-advantaged savings accounts. Who exactly gave the federal government the right to tell free people how much they can save for retirement? Obama wants a \$3 million cap on these accounts. And he thinks \$205,000 a year in some kind of annuity would "be substantially more than needed for reasonable retirement." This is statism at its worst.

Plus, people pay taxes when they redeem their IRAs. And on top of that, the U.S. needs more saving to promote more investment and create more jobs and growth. Better that savings and investment are tax-free and we tax consumption, instead.

I'll give a modest "yes" to political thaws on gun control and immigration if they're done right. But I give an absolute "no" to the Obama high-tax-and-spend budget proposal.

Could Christianity be considered homophobic?

That "loving Jesus means hating gay people" is "proclaimed in Christian churches and on Christian television and radio broadcasts."

So declares Dan Savage in his review of Jeff Chu's "Does Jesus Really Love Me: A Gay Christian's Pilgrimage in Search of God in America" — on page one of The New York Times Book Review.

Who is foremost among those who have made "anti-gay bigotry seem synonymous with Christianity"? The Family Research Council and the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops. So says Savage. And who is he? A cradle Catholic who says he "was in church every Sunday for the first 15 years of my life. Now I spend my Sundays on my bike, on my snowboard or on my husband."

One gets the point. And in handing this review to an apostate Catholic and atheist homosexual, the Times was nailing its anti-Catholic colors to the mast. Yet what Savage alleges and the Times published is a lie.

No true Catholic church can preach that Jesus

hates gays. "Love your enemies" is the message of Christ. Hate the sin and love the sinner is taught as gospel truth in Catholic schools.

This has been Catholic doctrine for 2,000 years. Yet, in contending that America is reaching a "cultural tipping point," Savage is not all wrong.

Undeniably, the Christian view, though mislabeled "homophobia," alienates millions. Many of America's young have come to accept that homosexuality is a natural preference of a significant minority and ought to be accommodated, and same-sex unions ought to be treated as traditional marriages.

Case in point. At George Washington University, two students have demanded that Father Greg Shaffer of the Newman Center be removed for creating an environment hostile to gays.

The priest's offense: When Obama endorsed same-sex marriage, Shaffer posted a blog, Restating Catholic teaching condemning homosexual acts as unnatural and immoral. In private sessions, Father Shaffer also counseled gay students to remain celibate for the rest of their lives.

One senior, Damian Legacy, says he was shaken by Father Greg's admission that he was risking his soul and by his ouster from the Newman Center

after the priest learned he was in a relationship with a male student.

Legacy and his partner have filed complaints against the Rev. Shaffer with the university Office for Diversity and Inclusion, alleging his homophobia has had a detrimental effect on the emotional health of gay students. They are asking the Student Association to cut funding to the Newman Center.

Though a minor collision in the culture war, this clash at GW may be a harbinger of what is coming, as the homosexual community seeks to have its agenda written into law and fastened onto the nation.

For traditional Christianity's view that homosexual acts are immoral and same-sex marriage an absurdity cannot be reconciled with the view that homosexuality is natural and normal and gay marriage a human right.

The issue is pulling the Republican Party apart. It is pulling Christian communities apart. It is pulling the nation apart.

Like abortion, it is an issue on which both sides cannot be right. Yet it is an issue of paramount importance both to devout Christians and to the homosexual rights movement. What happens if the gay rights movement, as it appears it may, succeeds politically on same-sex marriage, but many Chris-

tians refuse to recognize such unions and continue to declare that American society has become ungodly and immoral?

Gay rights advocates often compare their cause to the civil rights struggle of half a century ago. But there is a fundamental difference.

When Martin Luther King Jr. called on the nation to "live up to the meaning of its creed," he heard an echo from a thousand pulpits. Treating black folks decently was consistent with what Christians had been taught. Dr. King was pushing against an open door. Priests and pastors marched for civil rights. Others preached for civil rights. But if the gay rights agenda is imposed, we could have priests and pastors preaching not acceptance but principled rejection.

Prelates could be declaring from pulpits everywhere that the triumph of gay rights is a defeat for God's Country, and the new laws are immoral and need neither be respected nor obeyed.

The issue is acceptance. We know of how America refused to accept Prohibition and, in good conscience, Americans broke the laws against the consumption of alcohol.

Become like children No. 5

No series would be complete on the children in the Bible who serve as outstanding examples for us to follow without Jephthah's daughter. Her story can be found in Judges 11:29-40. Jephthah is one of the leaders mentioned in the book of Judges. In the midst of an intense battle against the Ammonites, Jephthah cried out and made a vow to the Lord. "If you give the Ammonites into my hands, whatever comes out of the door of my house to meet me when I return in triumph from the Ammonites will be the Lord's, and I will sacrifice it as a burnt offering." The Lord granted Jephthah's request with a devastating victory.

Jephthah certainly made his way home full of joy and excitement. However, all of that disappeared when his daughter ran out of the house to welcome and celebrate with her father. That is when he no doubt remembered the foolish vow he had rashly made.

I have always felt certain that Jephthah believed that one of the household animals would have been first to hear him coming. (In our day it would be our pet dog that would hear our arrival first and come to greet us.) His reaction proves that he never considered the possibility of the loss of his daughter.

"When Jephthah returned to his home in Mizpah, who should come out to meet him but his daughter, dancing to the sound of timbrels! She was an only child. Except for her he had neither son nor daughter. When he saw her, he tore his clothes and cried, "Oh no, my daughter! You have brought me down and I am devastated. I have made a vow to the Lord that I cannot break."

Now to the point of this brilliant example. Examine carefully her immediate words and compare them with what your words might have been: "My father," she replied, "you have given your word to the Lord. Do to me just as you promised, now that the Lord has avenged you of your enemies, the Ammonites. But grant me this one request," she said. "Give me two months to roam the hills and weep with my friends, because I will never marry."

She didn't argue, whine, complain or rebel. Instead she immediately SACRIFICED herself for God's glory and her father's vow. What a one-in-a-mil-

lion godly teenage girl; willing to sacrifice all of her dreams and her future to bring glory to Jehovah.

All she asked of her father was his permission to go spend two months with her friends. Not in wild partying like all too many young people would have done, but in mourning that she would never marry.

There are those who believe that Jephthah killed his daughter and literally offered her as a burnt offering. I DO NOT believe that is what happened. Notice that Jephthah made a 2 part vow: 1- it will be the Lord's; 2- sacrifice it as a burnt offering. So the moment she "was the Lord's", who had the say so concerning what would happen to her? That's right, the Lord. And the Lord had a clear opinion concerning the sacrificing of children. Dt 12:31 "You must not worship the Lord your God in their way, because in worshipping their gods, they do all kinds of detestable things the Lord hates. They even burn their sons and daughters in the fire as sacrifices to their gods."

Jephthah's daughter was not killed and made a burnt offering. Instead, she lived her entire life single, a virgin with no husband and no children. And her sacrifice had such an impact on all who lived in that region, that "each year the young women of Israel go out for four days to commemorate the daughter of Jephthah the Gileadite."

Are you willing to be as sacrificial with your life? Can God count on you when He needs someone who is totally sold out to Him, holding nothing back? Does God own you "lock, stock and barrel"? If not, time to repent. God will settle for nothing less than owing ALL OF YOU! God is looking for slaves who care more about doing His will than about doing their own. Check these verse out.

Rom 12:1 Therefore, I urge you, brothers and sisters, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God—this is true worship.

Heb 13:15 Through Jesus, therefore, let us continually offer to God a sacrifice of praise—the fruit of lips that openly profess his name.

Heb 13:16 And do not forget to do good and to share with others, for with such sacrifices God is pleased.

Golf Thought of the Week

Hips before hands.

Listen to golf commentators enough, and you'll pick up "smooth transition" as one of their go-to phrases. This is an asset that you can add to your game without much difficulty and is sure to add distance and consistency.

A smooth transition is nothing more than changing from backswing to downswing in the right order and, obviously, without any breaks in the 'chain' between your feet and the club head. I see lots of club golfers who lead this process with the arms. But why use just the arms when you

can take advantage of all the power your body can generate? The lower body needs to initiate the transition to keep it smooth, consistent and powerful.

One method to get you doing this right is to place your golf bag just outside your front foot while hitting balls on the range. Use this as a marker for where your hips are, and make sure your hip rotation starts the downswing, NOT the hands or arms.

You should see benefits as soon as you get the feel for this. Feel free to contact me to book a lesson and I'll help you get this foundation stone of your long game right.

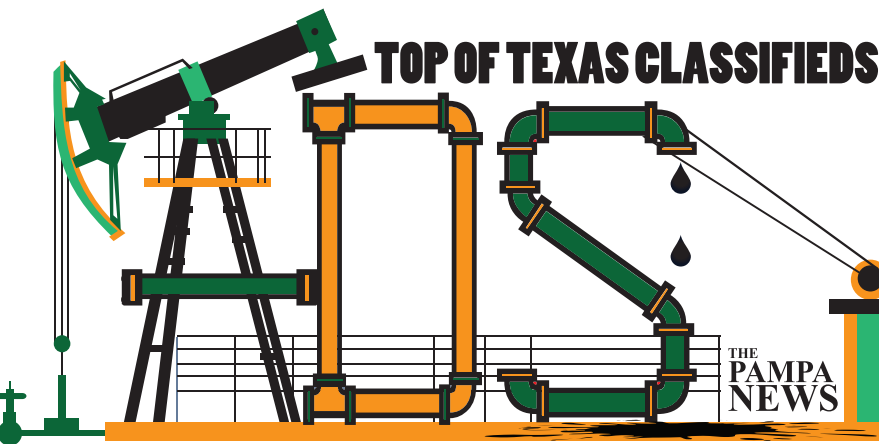

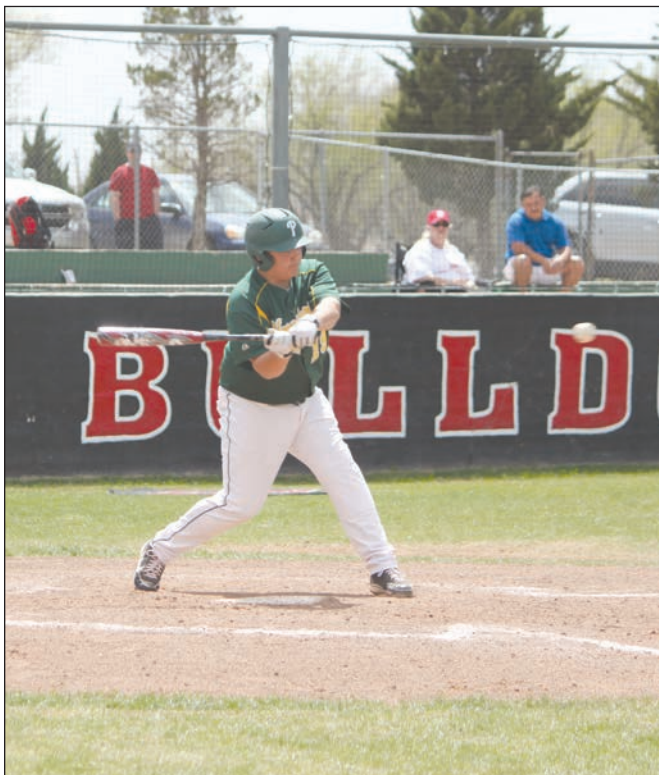

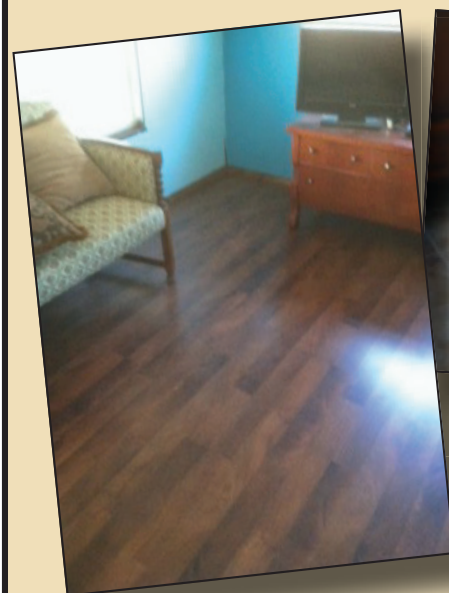
