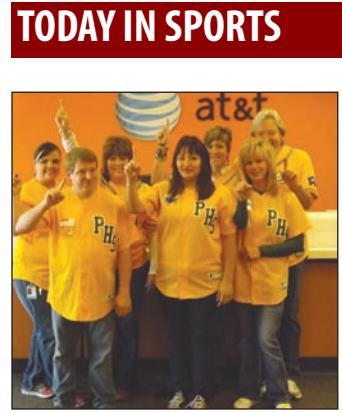

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## Pampa ISD hires 2 new principals

The Pampa Independent School District (PISD) Board on Thursday hired two new principals for Austin and Travis elementary schools.  
 The Board hired Kathy Phillips, assistant principal in the Southlake Carroll School District, to serve as the new principal at Austin Elementary, beginning next year. Phillips has previously worked as an elementary school counselor and taught. Austin principal Beverly Underwood plans to retire at the end of this school year.  
 Jennifer Studebaker will serve as the new principal at

Travis Elementary next year, replacing Joe Fabian who will retire in a couple of months. Studebaker, currently the assistant principal at Pampa High School, has previously taught as well.  
 In other business, the Board received a construction update on the district's new central administration facility from developer James Hicks.  
 Hicks reported that demolition of the old Albertson's building is 90 to 95 percent complete.  
 "That part of the project is going really well," Hicks said.  
 Hicks noted that the construction crew is almost finished installing the interior piping. He then recommend-

ed the Board not continue at this time with replacing the exterior piping. He said they should wait for mechanical bids to be submitted next week.  
 "It does need to be done but I don't think we should do it right now," Hicks said.  
 Hicks added that the developers have received inquiries from more than 100 contractors, subcontractors and suppliers.  
 "The project is being well received," Hicks said. "The response and the activity on the project has been very good."

## Circus coming to Pampa May 4

The big top is coming to Pampa.  
 The Carson & Barnes Circus of Hugo, Okla., will do two big-top shows at 2 and 5 p.m. on May 4 at Recreation Park.  
 The shows will feature clowns, jugglers, elephants, acrobats — everything you expect from a big-top circus.  
 There will be elephant rides, camel rides and pony rides.  
 School children can experience the magic of the circus

and meet the animals up close and personal before the scheduled performances.  
 Starting at 9:30 a.m., any school group or anyone from the public can show up when the circus folks start rolling out the canvas, said Charles Watson, advance coordinator for Carson & Barnes.

## Bill would ensure free breakfast for poorest students

Many students at Arnoldo Cantu Sr. Elementary School in San Juan, a Rio Grande Valley town just east of McAllen, do not have much. The Texas Education Agency estimates that 89 percent of the students in the school's district are from low-income households. But every morning, all of the school's 927 students can count on a federally subsidized breakfast.  
 Offering free breakfasts to all interested students in low-income areas, not just to those who qualify under federal guidelines, is a program that some state legislators are trying to expand to schools in poor neighborhoods across Texas.  
 Senate Bill 376, written by state Sen. Eddie Lucio Jr., D-Brownsville, would require schools to offer free breakfast to all students at public schools where 80 percent of the student body qualifies for free or reduced-price meals.  
 The left-leaning Center for Public Policy Priorities estimates the bill could mean a morning meal for as many as 731,000 additional students.  
 "As one of 10 kids growing up in Brownsville many years ago, I understand the struggles that parents go through to maintain their households, and feed their children," Lucio said.  
 The bill has passed the Senate and will go to the House, where a similar bill has passed out of a committee.  
 Under the School Breakfast Program, which began in 1966, children whose household income below 185 percent of the federal poverty line are eligible for a low-cost school breakfast; those below 130 percent receive free breakfasts. (For the current school year, 185 percent of the poverty level is \$42,643 for a family of four; 130 percent of the poverty level is \$29,965 for a family of four.) The federal government reimburses the school for each meal served. The breakfast program, and a similar one for lunches, is administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.  
 Research has shown that students who eat breakfast are better able to concentrate and do better in school.

## 29th Annual ZBQ set for May 4

 Church member and treasurer Brian Kuehl, said the new smoker will al-

low for the event to stay consistent.  
 "Before we would have it at Celanese, Thomas Automotive, or a member's house, but now we can have it at the church every year."  
 The new smoker was built by church member Brian McAdoo. McAdoo owns a cabinet shop downtown and used to weld.  
 The neat thing about this event is that all of the proceeds go back to the community in some form or fashion.

But in Texas, participation in the School Breakfast Program is less than 60 percent of that of the National School Lunch Program.

Childhood nutrition activists say the stigma of receiving free breakfasts when other students eat at home keeps some students from participating.

Because federal subsidies are tied to participation, the schools do not save money by serving fewer meals, said Anne Olson of the Christian Life Commission, an advocacy organization affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

Moreover, she said, it negates society's interest in feeding "children who otherwise might not be able to eat breakfast at home, at a time when they're developing physically and mentally."

The Houston Independent School District, the largest in Texas, where more than 80 percent of students are from low-income households, has made breakfast free for all elementary and middle school students.

One result has been increased participation — and a corresponding increase in federal subsidies.

There are additional benefits, said Brian Giles, the senior food administrator of the district.

"Anyone who's taught a student who may not have been fed on a given day knows that meal can mean the difference between a good day and a bad day for a child," he said.

Though the bill passed the Senate easily, there were some objections to expanding the program. Sen. Robert Nichols, R-Jacksonville, said the proposed bill was an inappropriate use of taxpayer money.

"I was always raised to believe that there's no such thing as a free lunch — even though it's breakfast," he said.

"Somebody pays. Ultimately, it costs the federal government, which in turn costs us all."

But Lucio, who was a middle school teacher before he was elected to public office, argues that the benefits outweigh the costs.

"I think we have an obligation to make sure that every Texas child has the resources they need to reach their full potential," he said.

## Woman, 80, swallows diamond at Fla. charity event

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) — The idea behind the Tampa Woman's Club charity event was simple.

For \$20, you could buy a flute of champagne and a chance to win a one-carat, \$5,000 diamond.

Organizers of the Saturday afternoon event placed \$10 cubic zirconia stones in the bottom of 399 of the 400 champagne glasses. The prized diamond, donated by Continental Wholesale Diamonds, was placed in the last.

The problem? Miriam

Tucker, 80, accidentally swallowed it.

Tucker told local media that she didn't want to put her finger in the glass to get the jewel. Instead she took a few sips of champagne. As she was talking and laughing with other women at the table, she realized she swallowed the jewel.

"What a dumb thing," she said.

Meanwhile, organizers and jewelers Joy Pierson and Andy Meyer were puzzled that no one came forward with the diamond.

"We knew the winner had to be at one of two tables," Pierson said, who along with Meyer examined each stone with probes and a loupe.

As they hovered near the table, Tucker eventually spoke up. "She said she swallowed what was in her glass," Pierson said.

Event chairwoman Gina Roth insisted that Tucker follow her to a hospital for an X-ray. The diamond didn't show up, but Tucker already had a colonoscopy scheduled for Monday.

She told Dr. Bruce Edger-

ton what happened and he retrieved the diamond, put it in a biohazard bag and gave it to Tucker's daughter.

After the procedure, they went to a jewelry store and had the diamond cleaned, tested and verified.

"It's an amazing story," said Tucker, who hasn't decided on a setting for the diamond. She plans to bequeath it to her 13-year-old granddaughter, where the diamond will "stay in the family with a story to go with it."

The jewelers said they've participated in other charity events in which they held a drawing for a diamond.


But this was the first time they used a champagne glass.

## Falling gold is a good thing

In the last two days, gold has plunged so deep that it's being called the worst drop — at least in percentage terms — in 30 years. That brings us back to the early Ronald Reagan period, when falling gold was regarded as a good thing.

Back then, lower gold showed inflation coming down after the horrible 1970s. It also showed confidence in the economy recovering and greater respect for the dollar. Over the next two decades, in the '80s and '90s, gold basically dropped in round numbers from \$800 an ounce all the way to \$250. Stocks soared. So did jobs and the economy. It was one hell of a good period.

But markets have reacted a bit differently this time. On Monday, stocks fell over 200 points in tandem with gold's \$150 drop. Maybe it was tax-selling in the stock market. Or the constant rumor of Cyprus gold-selling to raise bailout cash. But investors aren't happy. It doesn't look like the '80s and '90s. And I'm hearing the usual cacophony of impending catastrophe.

But I'm not buying it. I still think falling gold is a good thing. And whatever the short-term turbulence, a more subdued price for gold (and commodities) bodes well for the future economy. There is no end-of-the-world scenario here, as there was after the finan-

cial meltdown. Nor is there an end-of-the-U.S.-dollar scenario, as many investors fear, nor an end to euro. Nor is there any massive inflation scenario, supposedly from the Fed cranking up all those printing presses.

The reality is that all those QE reserves from the Fed never circulated through the economy. Most of them are on deposit at the central bank. And because everyone is still risk-averse, the demand for cash is so high that the turnover, or velocity, of money keeps falling.

Last I looked, the M2 money measure was growing at less than 7 percent. And the Fed's favorite inflation target, the personal consumption deflator, was only 1.3 percent over the past 12 months. The much-heralded printing-press/roaring-inflation episode hasn't happened — at least not yet.

The U.S. economy is growing slowly at 2 to 3 percent, but at least it's growth. Profits have propelled stocks to all-time highs. Housing is gradually recovering. Jobs are erratic, but rising.

And even the dollar is up over the past year against the broad trade-weighted index of currencies. It's not a Reagan recovery, nor is it a Clinton recovery. But it's not the end of the world, either. I think the real message of the gold selloff is that it's a good thing, not a bad one.

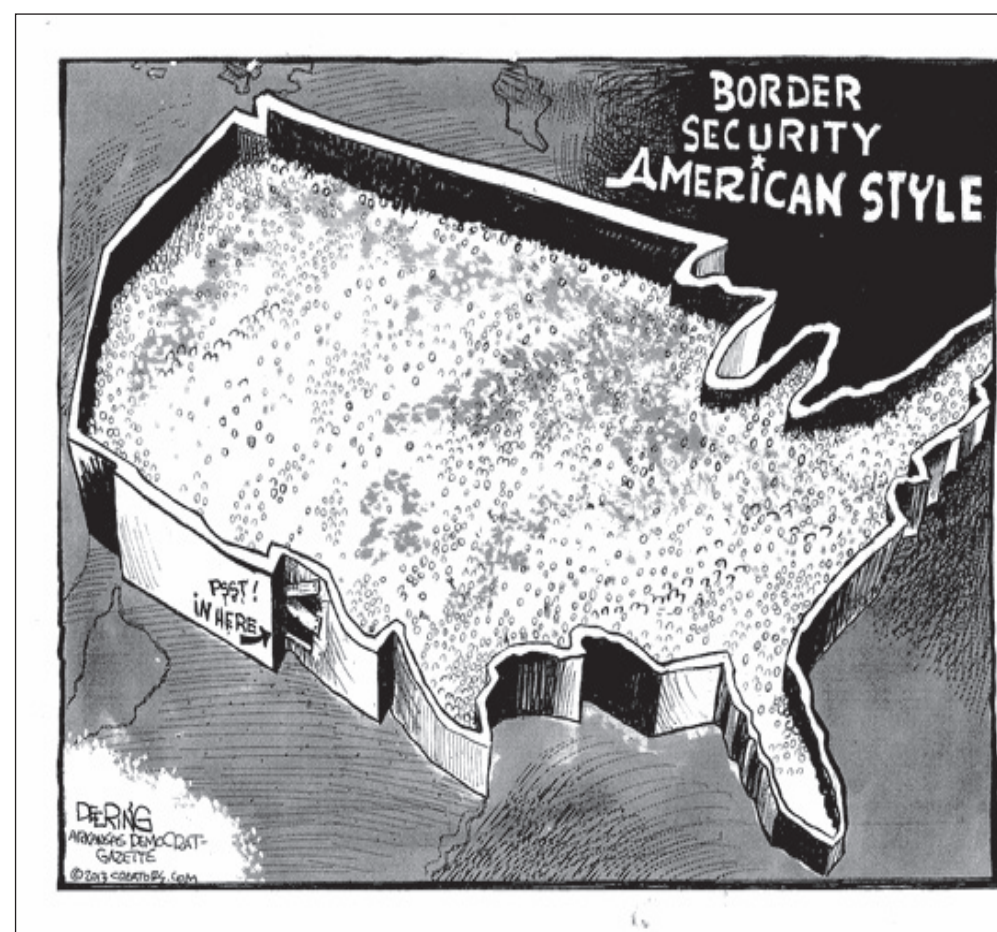

## Bouncin' Around

### The things a grandmother will do

Taking care of someone's pets and mail while they are away, watering their plants, keeping an eye on things — most of us have done this. So when

our daughter and her family told us they were going to Canada for two weeks over the past Christmas holidays, we didn't think there would be any problems with that. After all, a cat (who bears

the unlikely name of "Mouse") does not need a lot of care. And our daughter had only one plant which had not yet succumbed to her lack of gardening abilities. But then it happened. The day before they left, we got a phone call: "Mom? Don't forget to give Clark food and water while we're gone." Clark? I was all for taking care of our cute, cuddly grandcat. But Clark? Texas Brown is actually quite gentle and the males are very fragile if dropped, especially when they are molting. Males typically live about seven to 10 years, while females may live to be 30. They may bite, but the bites are seldom fatal, unless a person is allergic to the venom. The hairs on the tarantula's body can come out and irritate human skin, rather like small porcupine quills. Clark survived my care, as did the poinsettia plant. Unfortunately, Clark and the plant both expired about the same time. We don't know what caused Clark's demise, but he was respectfully buried in the backyard, and his obituary read "loved and missed by family and friends." Well, maybe not by Mouse.

# A new look for your lawn

Almost everyone wants a nice looking lawn. It's pleasing to the eye and increases the "curb appeal". But does a "nice looking lawn" have to be green? In the Texas Panhandle, where we must watch our use of water, it's good to know that there are attractive options to lush — and water guzzling — grass.

There was a time when, if you wanted a low-maintenance, low-water lawn, you pretty much had two choices: dirt, if you didn't care how it looked; or gravel, if you wanted something nicer. Both saved water. Neither was attractive.

## Xeriscaping: Water-conserving and attractive

Xeriscaping provides an alternative to the "rock-or-dirt" question with unlimited designs and an array of drought-tolerant plants. The term — from the Greek "xeros," meaning "dry" — was coined during the 1970's in Denver, Colo., to mean water-efficient landscaping. It is a method of gardening that requires choosing the appropriate plants for the location which can be maintained with little supplemental watering. Do not be misled to think about a landscape filled with cactus when referring to xeriscape gardening. Well-designed xeriscapes can be enchanting and beautiful.

## Seven principles of Xeriscaping

1. Plan and Design Comprehensively
  - Plan, considering view, slope, exposure and soils in area.
2. Evaluate Soil and Improve if Necessary
  - Soil can vary within a site. An analysis based on random sampling can provide information for plant selection and soil amendments. Check with a local landscaper or the county AgriLife Extension office about having your soil tested.
3. Create Practical Turf Areas
  - Reduce high-water-use turf areas, locating them separately so that they may be watered more efficiently, resulting in a significant reduction of water use.
4. Use Appropriate Plants
  - Plant selection should be based on the intended use in

the landscape.

- Use of more plants with low water needs and native plants will allow the maximum water conservation.
- 5. Water Efficiently
  - Group plants with like water needs, and water each group on separate zones.
  - Irrigation needs change with the seasons and weather.
  - Irrigate according to the needs of the plants rather than watering on a fixed schedule.
- 6. Use Organic Mulch
  - Mulch minimizes evaporation, reduces weed growth, slows erosion and helps prevent soil temperature fluctuations. Organic mulch like wood chips or bark is best.
  - Use of plastic is not recommended. It prevents air and water from filtering into the soil, and organic mulch will slide.
- 7. Maintain Appropriately
  - Proper pruning, weeding and fertilization, plus attention to the irrigation system, will preserve and enhance the quality of the xeriscape.
  - A landscape adapted to the environment will require less maintenance, less fertilizer and reduce the use of pesticides and other chemicals.

# Tips for teens, employers for summer hiring

AUSTIN — As summer approaches, the number of teenagers looking for work increases dramatically. According to a 2012 U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) study, the number of 16- to 19-year-olds employed or searching for work last year skyrocketed between April and July, increasing by almost 2 million workers for a total of more than 7.3 million in July 1.

"Summer employment can help Texas high school students learn the value of hard work and responsibility, while experiencing the pride

of earning their first paycheck," said Texas Workforce Commission Chairman Andres Alcantar. "TWC is committed to helping Texas' future workforce acquire the skills that will benefit them throughout their careers."

TWC reminds employers, workers and parents to familiarize themselves with state and federal laws, as well as safety regulations that address child labor issues. Any person under the age of 18 is considered a child when employed. Federal and state child labor laws are designed to protect youth against potentially detrimental occupational settings or working conditions

that could interfere with their safety, health or well-being. Employers also must comply with wage and hour laws and regulations enforced by the U.S. Department of Labor (DOL), available online at Youthrules.dol.gov. "I urge teenagers, parents and employers to educate themselves on the child labor laws designed to protect our children," said TWC Commissioner Representing Labor Ronny Congleton. "Safety should always be the most important factor as Texas

youths join the workforce."

In Texas, certain child labor laws apply to different age groups and different job types. For example, children aged 11 or older may deliver newspapers to customers on established routes.

Children aged 14 or 15 may perform office and clerical work, some kitchen work, cashiering, bagging and carrying out customer orders, among other tasks, as long as it takes place during certain hours.

## Texan gets life term in 1982 slaying of girlfriend

HOUSTON (AP) — A Houston-area man has been sentenced to life in prison for the 1982 slaying of his girlfriend in a case reopened years after her death. A jury in Houston on Thursday sentenced 65-year-old Manuel Richard Pena after convicting him of murder. Prosecutors say Pena strangled 19-year-old Sherri Strong and made it look like she killed herself. Investigators say Strong was found dead on June 16,

1982, in Pena's garage. The Harris County Sheriff's Office says Pena told authorities that Strong hanged herself and he put her body on the floor before calling for help. Cold case investigators reopened the case after reviewing Pena's violent criminal history since 1982. He was arrested in 2011 and convicted Wednesday. The defense said Strong was depressed after believing Pena's ex-wife wanted a reconciliation.

# Oklahoma City church opens 100-year time capsule

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — As the patent leather shoes were removed from their box at the First Lutheran Church of Oklahoma City, members of the assembled crowd let out a collective gasp. The ladies' shoes were part of the contents of the Century Chest, which for 100 years had been encased in a concrete tomb in the church's basement. In 1913, the church sold space in the chest to raise money for a pipe organ still in use today. The shoes still had a glossy shine, as did the metallic 1913 telephone. A blue women's hat with a red ribbon looked as though it had just been purchased. "This is more than we could have hoped for," Oklahoma History Center research director Chad Williams said. "I was expecting some things to be damaged, but everything looks in excellent condition." Getting the chest out of the basement was no picnic. Pinion Design and Contracting cut out the chest from under a 12-inch slab of concrete, removing two chunks that weighed 600 pounds apiece. An engine hoist was used to get the chest out of its tomb. The job took 11 hours. "Just to see the way

everything is preserved is fantastic," said Peter Plank, who assisted in the chest's removal. "We volunteered to do this a year ago, and to see all the items laid out here is amazing. "The only thing we have to do now is fill the hole." Gov. Mary Fallin and Mayor Mick Cornett read remarks from their predecessors, Gov. Lee Cruce and Mayor Whit Grant, that were given in 1913 when the chest was buried. Cornett noted the references to women's suffrage in Grant's letter and how he would likely be amazed the state is governed by a woman 100 years later. First Lutheran's stewardship ended with its opening, and the chest and its contents were turned over to the Oklahoma History Center. Church members had taken pledges over the last century to make sure the chest was opened on April 22, 2013. The duty had been passed down from generations of members in some cases. "It's been a great success," First Lutheran pastor Jerry Peterson told The Oklahoman. "I can say we did it. We're not a large church, but we fulfilled that 100-year pledge today. They did it right 100 years ago."

Peterson was especially awe-struck by some of the items he didn't expect to see. "There were some things I knew were in there but some that were surprises," he said. "I was intrigued by the pen used by President McKinley that had been placed in the chest. "The spoon made out of buffalo horn was fascinating. Today is just the tip of the iceberg of what will be unfolding this year." Chet Brooks currently serves as the assistant chief of the Delaware Tribe of Indians. He drove from Bartlesville on Monday to see the opening of the chest. "One of the chiefs of the Delaware Tribe in 1913 had a letter to tribe members of 2013, and I wanted to see that," Brooks said. "The clothing and phone were really neat. It's a fun way to see what our state was like back then." Also included in the chest was a quilt with embroidered names of community leaders, numerous photos, recordings of voices from 1913 that will eventually be digitized, a

camera and a phonograph. The Ladies Aid Society of 1913 placed a can of coffee for 2013 Ladies Aid Society members. The items highlighting technology of the time were crowd favorites. "The phone was interesting in so many ways," Williams said. "They wondered what we would think of something that was relatively new to them. "They thought we would scoff at it, but we're not doing that. We're amazed by it. We're amazed they had the foresight to put this in the chest and share it with the people of 2013." While the chest has been opened and items unpacked, work remains to be done on the items. The wax cylinders that hold the voice recordings will need to be digitized. Dozens of messages will be read and cataloged. The History Center expects to open a Century Chest exhibit in the fall. "All of these items that have been rolled up will need to be flattened out by using moisture," Williams said.

## 38 die in mental hospital fire outside Moscow

MOSCOW (AP) — A fire swept quickly through a psychiatric hospital outside Moscow early Friday, killing 38 people, some of them sedated and in their beds, officials said. The one-story brick-and-wood hospital building housed patients with severe mental disorders, Health Ministry officials said. An Emergency Ministry official said the fire started in a wooden annex and then spread to the main brick building, which had wooden beams. Health Minister Veronika Skvortsova said that half of the patients took sedatives at night. She insisted that the patients were not tied to their beds and were not given any medication that would leave them unconscious and unable to escape. At least 29 people were burned alive, said Irina Gumennaya, a spokeswoman for the federal Investigative Committee. Investigators said the 38 dead included 36 patients and two doctors. They said a nurse managed to escape and save one patient, while another patient got out on his own.

state television that the fire alarm seems to have worked, but the fire spread too quickly. Skvortsova told the state television said that the hospital had all the necessary fire equipment, but conceded mental hospitals should be better equipped for emergencies than the current law requires. President Vladimir Putin called for a thorough investigation into the deadly fire and asked regional authorities to pay more attention to safety regulations. Russia has a poor fire safety record, with about 12,000 deaths reported in 2012. In January, a fire in an underground parking lot killed 10 migrant workers from Tajikistan who were working and living there. In a similar incident in September, 14 Vietnamese workers were killed by fire at a clothing factory near Moscow. In one of the most high-profile cases of negligence, more than 150 people died in a night club in the city of Perm after a pyrotechnic show ignited a wooden ceiling.

## Ex-military leader in Texas gets jail for abuse

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — An ex-trainer at a South Texas military installation has been sentenced to five months in jail and booted from the service for using bleach to abuse recruits. A military judge on Thursday sentenced Staff Sgt. Robert Hudson of Joint Base San Antonio-Lackland. Hudson pleaded guilty to misconduct charges for making trainees sick during latrine duty and having sex with a female recruit in 2011.

Authorities say Hudson complained that a latrine smelled like urine and he dumped bleach in the area. He forced several recruits into the bathroom to clean up. Some required medical attention or collapsed. Hudson pleaded guilty to six charges and 14 specifications in a plea agreement. A judge then decided on the bad-conduct discharge. Hudson is the 17 person convicted in the training instructor scandal.

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The Emergency Ministry also posted a list of the patients indicating they ranged in age from 20 to 76. Gumennaya told Russian news agencies that most of the people died in their beds. Moscow region Governor Andrei Vorobyev said some of the hospital windows were barred. Gumennaya cited the surviving nurse as saying that the doors inside the hospital were not locked. Investigators said they are looking at violations of fire regulations and a short circuit as possible causes for the blaze that engulfed the hospital in the Ramensky settlement, some 85 kilometers (53 miles) north of Moscow. Vadim Belovoshin of the Emergency Ministry said that it took firefighters an hour to get to the hospital because a ferry across a canal was closed and they had to make a detour. Vorobyev told Russian

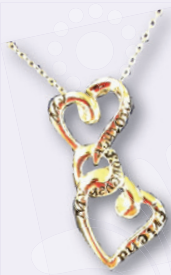
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# Obama consoles families, survivors of Texas blast

WACO, Texas (AP) — President Barack Obama consoled a rural Texas community rocked by a deadly fertilizer plant explosion, telling mourners Thursday they are not alone in their grief and they will have the nation's support to rebuild from the devastation.

"This small town's family is bigger now," Obama said during a memorial service at Baylor University for victims of last week's explosion in nearby West, Texas, that killed 14 and injured 200. Nearly 10,000 gathered to remember the first responders killed in the blast, a crowd more than triple the size of West's entire population of 2,700.

"To the families, the neighbors grappling with unbearable loss, we are here to say you are not alone. You are not forgotten," Obama said to applause. "We may not all live here in Texas, but we're neighbors too. We're Americans too, and we stand with you."

The April 17 explosion left a crater more than 90 feet wide and damaged dozens of buildings, displacing many residents from their homes. The Insurance Council of Texas estimates it caused more than \$100 million in damage, and crews were sifting the rubble to search for clues to what caused the explosion or whether foul play was involved.

The blast came about 20 minutes after a fire was reported at West Fertilizer. Ten of those killed were first responders who sped out to the nighttime blaze.

The memorial service honored those first responders and two civilians who tried to fight the fire and were posthumously named volunteer first responders.

Among the dead were brothers Douglas and Robert Snokhous, West High School graduates who volunteered together for the town's fire department for more than 13 years.

As Obama spoke, the gymnasium lit up with the flashes of cameras and cell-phones, glimmering like stars in the dimly lit room. The president spoke for 16 minutes, quoting scripture and lauding the men whose flag-draped coffins laid before him. "When you got to the scene, you forgot fear and you fought that blaze as hard as you could, knowing the danger," Obama said.

The service opened with a photo slideshow set to country music and projected onto a movie screen. It showed images of the men from their childhood, their weddings and other moments throughout lives filled with children and friends. Mourners were given programs with full-page profiles of each of the victims, describing their lives, their values and their faith.

Both the president and first lady Michelle Obama wiped away a tear as bagpipes sounded "Amazing Grace."

"How does one find such love to be willing to lay down your life so that others may live?" asked Texas Sen. John Cornyn, speaking on behalf of the state's congressional delegation. "This will forever be the legacy of those who ran toward the fire last week."

Texas Gov. Rick Perry eulogized the unpaid first responders, lamenting that each had a personal story and journey that drew to a close too soon.

"These are volunteers. Ordinary individuals blessed with extraordinary courage and a determination to do what they could to save lives," he said. "They're the ones who proudly said 'not on my watch' in the moments immediately following that explosion."

Perry's remarks were followed by video of the victims' grim-faced family members remembering their lives and expressing pride for their heroism. The brother-in-law of Cody Drago, another volunteer firefighter, remembered how Drago would leave notes for his wife, Patty, when he was traveling, and how he loved hunting and NASCAR.

Obama added his appearance at the memorial service onto a long-planned trip to Texas for Thursday's opening of George W. Bush's presidential library at Southern Methodist University. Bush sent his sympathies in a statement read at the service by Baylor President Ken Starr, the former special prosecutor who investigated President Bill Clinton.

Obama's solemn reflections at the memorial required an abrupt shift in tone by the president, whose morning in Dallas was filled with smiles, music and pageantry as he and the other four living presidents celebrated one of their own. Less than an hour later, Obama was airborne over West, circling the scene of the explosion. A still a harrowing site more than a week after tragedy first touched the small Texas town.

From his helicopter, Obama saw what looked like a massive construction site, with cranes and dozens of vehicles dotting a wide swath of brown earth. Piles of burnt rubble and scorched earth were clearly visible. Obama could also see the school field first responders used as a staging ground.

Obama has made such a trip countless times before, touring damage and consoling survivors of other disasters including Hurricane Irene, Hurricane Sandy and a string of mass shootings. It was just one week ago that Obama was in Boston, offering solace to the nation at a memorial for victims of the Boston Marathon bombing, another larger-than-life tragedy that compounded the nation's grief the same week as the explosion in West.

After the service, the president and first lady were plan-

ning to visit privately with relatives and friends of firefighters killed in the explosion, the White House said.

Fire trucks and other first responders' vehicles paraded through Waco en route to the ceremony at Baylor's sports arena. The vehicles entered beneath an archway formed by the ladders from two fire trucks with an American flag hung between them. Many of the mourners wore the uniforms of police, firefighters and paramedics and wiped tears from their eyes.

Brian Crawford, fire chief in the Dallas suburb of Plano, attended with 11 others from his department even though they live 100 miles from West.

"With these unfortunate circumstances, it's time to show we are all a family," Crawford said. "These were our brothers and they paid the price."

As the service drew to a close, a bell was rung once for each victim, reverberating through the hall and setting off a long moment of silence.

Then, with hushed sobs breaking the quiet, a loudspeaker re-enacting a dispatcher's radio identified the victims one by one, calling each firefighter to duty for the last time:

"Until we meet again. Dispatch clear."

## Toll in Bangladesh collapse passes 300

SAVAR, Bangladesh (AP) — More than two days after their factory collapsed on them, at least some garment workers were still alive in the corpse-littered debris Friday, pinned beneath tons of mangled metal and concrete. Rescue crews struggled to save them, knowing they probably had just a few hours left to live, as desperate relatives clashed with police in their anger and grief.

Amid the chaos, the cries for help and the smell of decaying bodies at the eight-story building where more than 300 died, what happened to 18-year-old Musamat Anna passes as luck. Rescue workers cut off the garment worker's mangled right hand to pull her free from the debris Thursday night.

"First a machine fell over my hand and I was crushed under the debris. ... Then the roof collapsed over me," she told an Associated Press cameraman from a hospital bed Friday.

The death toll topped 300 on Friday and it remained unclear what the final grim number would be. Military spokesman Shahin Islam told reporters that 304 bodies had been recovered.

Brig. Gen. Mohammed Siddiqui Alam Shikder, who is overseeing rescue operations, said 2,200 people have been rescued.

The garment manufacturers' group said the factories in the building employed 3,122 workers, but it was not clear how many were inside

it when it collapsed Wednesday in Savar, a suburb of Bangladesh's capital, Dhaka.

An army rescue worker, Maj. Abdul Latif, said Friday that he found one survivor still trapped under concrete slabs, surrounded by several bodies. At another place in the building, four survivors were found pinned under the debris, a fire official said. An Associated Press cameraman who accompanied a rescue crew heard two men's anguished cries for help; it was unknown Friday whether they were still alive.

Rescue workers said they were proceeding very cautiously inside the crumbling building, using their hands, hammers and shovels, to avoid more injuries and collapses. But they said the trapped workers were so badly hurt and weakened that they would need to be extricated within a few hours if they are to survive. Facing high humidity and temperatures as high as 35 degrees Celsius (95 degrees Fahrenheit), and dropping to about 24 C (75 F) at night, many survivors could also be badly dehydrated.

A military official, Maj. Gen. Chowdhury Hasan Suhrawardy, told reporters that search and rescue operations would continue until at least Saturday.

"We know a human being can survive for up to 72 hours in this situation. So our efforts will continue non-stop," he said.

Hundreds of rescuers, some crawling through the maze of rubble, spent a third day working amid the cries of the trapped and the wails of workers' relatives gathered outside the building, which housed numerous garment factories and a handful of other companies.

Police cordoned off the building site, pushing back thousands of bystanders and relatives, after rescue workers said the crowds were hampering their work.

Clashes later erupted between relatives of those still trapped and police officers, who used batons to disperse the mobs. Police said 50 people were injured in the clashes.

"We want to go inside the building and find our people now. They will die if we don't find them soon," said Shahinur Rahman, whose mother was missing.

Elsewhere, many thousands of workers from the hundreds of garment factories across the Savar industrial zone and other nearby industrial areas took to the streets to protest the collapse and poor safety standards.

Local news reports said protesters smashed dozens of vehicles at one strike Friday. Most of the other protests were largely peaceful.

Dozens of people have been rescued from the wreckage well after Wednesday morning's collapse.

Forty people had been trapped on the fourth floor of the Rana Plaza building until rescuers reached them Thursday evening. Twelve were soon freed, and crews worked to get the others out safely, said Brig. Gen. Shikder. Crowds at the scene burst into applause as survivors were brought out.

Police say cracks in the building had led them to order an evacuation Tuesday, but the factories ignored the order and were operating when it collapsed Wednesday. Video shot before the collapse shows cracks in the walls, with apparent attempts at repair. It also shows columns missing chunks of concrete and police talking to building operators.

Officials said soon after the collapse that numerous construction regulations had been violated.

Abdul Halim, an official with Savar's engineering department, said the owner of Rana Plaza was originally allowed to construct a five-story building but added another three stories illegally.

Mahbubul Haque Shakil, a spokesman for Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina, said she had ordered police to arrest the owner of the building as well as the owners of the garment factories in "the shortest possible time."

Local police chief Mohammed Asaduzzaman said police and the government's Capital Development Authority have filed separate cases of negligence against the building owner.

Habibur Rahman, police superintendent of Dhaka district, identified the owner of the building as Mohammed Sohel Rana, a local leader of ruling Awami League's youth front.

Rahman said police were also looking for the owners of the garment factories.

Police on Friday detained two of Rana's relatives for questioning, police officer Mohammad Kawser said.

The disaster is the worst ever for Bangladesh's booming and powerful garment industry, surpassing a fire five months ago that killed 112 people and brought widespread pledges to improve the country's worker-safety standards.

Instead, very little has changed in Bangladesh, where wages, among the lowest in the world, have made it a magnet for numerous global brands.

Bangladesh's garment industry was the third-largest in the world in 2011, after China and Italy. It has grown rapidly in the past decade, a boom fueled by Bangladesh's exceptionally low labor costs. The country's minimum wage is now the equivalent of about \$38 a month.

Among the garment makers in the building were Phantom Apparels, Phantom Tac, Ether Tex, New Wave Style and New Wave Bottoms. Altogether, they produced several million shirts, pants and other garments a year.

The New Wave companies, according to their website, make clothing for several major North American and European retailers.

Britain's Primark acknowledged it was using a factory in Rana Plaza, but many other retailers distanced themselves from the disaster, saying they were not involved with the factories at the time of the collapse or had not recently ordered garments from them.

Wal-Mart said none of its clothing had been authorized to be made in the facility, but it is investigating whether there was any unauthorized production.

U.S. State Department spokesman Patrick Ventrell said the collapse underscored the "urgent need" for Bangladesh's government, as well as the factory owners, buyers and labor groups, to improve working conditions in the country.

Human Rights Watch says Bangladesh's Ministry of Labor has only 18 inspectors to monitor thousands of garment factories in the sprawling Dhaka district, where much of the nation's garment industry is located.

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# George Jones, country superstar, has died at 81

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — George Jones, the peerless, hard-living country singer who recorded dozens of hits about good times and regrets and peaked with the heartbreaking classic “He Stopped Loving Her Today,” has died. He was 81.

Jones died Friday at Vanderbilt University Medical Center in Nashville, according to his publicist Kirt Webster. He was hospitalized with fever and irregular blood pressure, forcing him to postpone two shows.

With one of the most golden voices of any genre, a clenched, precise, profoundly expressive baritone, Jones had No. 1 songs in five separate decades, 1950s to 1990s. He was idolized not just by fellow country artists, but by Frank Sinatra, Pete Townshend, Elvis Costello, James Taylor and countless others. “If we all could sound like we wanted to, we’d all sound like George Jones,” Waylon Jennings once sang.

In a career that lasted more than 50 years, “Possum” evolved from young honky-tonker to elder statesman as he recorded more than 150 albums and became the champion and symbol of traditional country music, a well-lined link to his hero, Hank Williams. Jones survived long battles with alcoholism and drug addiction, brawls, accidents and close encounters with death, including bypass surgery and a tour bus crash that he only avoided by deciding at the last moment to take a plane.

His failure to appear for concerts left him with the nickname “No Show Jones,” and he later recorded a song by that name and often opened his shows by singing it. His wild life was revealed in song and in his handsome, troubled face, with its dark, deep-set eyes and dimpled chin.

In song, he was rowdy and regretful, tender and tragic. His hits included the sentimental “Who’s Gonna Fill Their Shoes,” the foot-tapping “The Race is On,” the foot-stomping “I Don’t Need Your Rockin’ Chair,” the melancholy “She Thinks I Still Care,” the rockin’ “White Lightning,” and the barfly lament “Still Doing Time.” Jones also recorded several duets with Tammy Wynette, his wife for six years, including “Golden Ring,” “Near You,” “Southern California” and “We’re Gonna Hold On.” He also sang with such peers as Willie Nelson and Merle Haggard and with Costello and other rock performers.

But his signature song was “He Stopped Loving Her Today,” a weeper among weepers about a man who carries his love for a woman to his grave. The 1980 ballad, which Jones was sure would never be a hit, often appears on surveys as the most popular country song of all time.

Jones won Grammy

awards in 1981 for “He Stopped Loving Her Today” and in 1999 for “Choices.” He was elected to the Country Music Hall of Fame in 1992 and in 2008 was among the artists honored in Washington at the Kennedy Center.

Jones continued to make appearances and put out records, though his hit records declined.

“I don’t want to completely quit because I don’t know what to do with myself,” he said in 2005. “I’ll be out there as long as the people want me to be out there.”

Jones was a purist who lamented the transformation of country music from the family feeling of the 1950s to the hit factory of the early 21st century. He was so caught up in country, old country, that when a record company executive suggested he record with James Taylor, Jones insisted he had never heard of the million-selling singer-songwriter. He was equally unimpressed when told that Neil Young had come to visit backstage and declined to see him, saying he didn’t know who he was. He did listen to the Rolling Stones, only because of the guitar playing of Keith Richards, a country fan who would eventually record with Jones.

Asked about what he thought about Carrie Underwood, Taylor Swift and other young stars, Jones said they were good but they weren’t making traditional country music.

“What they need to do really, I think, is find their own title,” he said.

In 1991, country star Alan Jackson dedicated his hit song “Don’t Rock the Jukebox” to Jones, asking in the song that country music remain faithful to the Jones style instead of drifting toward rock ‘n’ roll.

Jones was born Sept. 12, 1931, in a log house near the east Texas town of Saratoga, the youngest of eight children. He sang in church and at age 11 began performing for tips on the streets of Beaumont, Texas. His first outing was such a success that listeners tossed him coins, placed a cup by his side and filled it with money. Jones estimated he made more than \$24 for his two-hour performance, enough to feed his family for a week, but he used up the cash at a local arcade.

“That was my first time to earn money for singing and my first time to blow it afterward,” he recalled in “I Lived to Tell it All,” a painfully self-critical memoir published in 1996. “It started what almost became a lifetime trend.”

The family lived in a government-subsidized housing project, and his father, a laborer, was an alcoholic who would rouse the children from bed in the middle of the night to sing for him. His father also noted that young George liked music

and bought him a Gene Autry guitar, with a horse and lariat on the front, that Jones practiced on obsessively.

He got his start on radio with husband and wife team Eddie & Pearl in the late 1940s. Hank Williams once dropped by the studio to promote a new record, and Jones was invited to back him on guitar. When it came time to play, he froze.

“Hank had ‘Wedding Bells’ out at the time,” Jones recalled in a 2003 Associated Press interview. “He started singing it, and I never hit the first note the whole song. I just stared.”

After the first of his four marriages failed, he enlisted in the Marine Corps in 1951 and served three years. He cut his first record when he got out, an original fittingly called “No Money in This Deal.”

He had his first hit with “Why Baby Why” in 1955, and by the early ‘60s Jones

was one of country music’s top stars.

“I sing top songs that fit the hardworking, everyday loving person. That’s what country music is about,” Jones said in a 1991 AP interview. “My fans and real true country music fans know I’m not a phony. I just sing it the way it is and put feeling in it if I can and try to live the song.”

Jones was married to Wynette, his third wife, from 1969 to 1975. (Wynette died in 1998.) Their relationship played out in Nashville like a country song, with hard drinking, fights and reconciliations. Jones’ weary knowledge of domestic warfare was immortalized in such classics as “The Battle,” set to the martial beat of “The Battle Hymn of the Republic.”

After one argument, Jones drove off on a riding mower in search of a drink because Wynette had taken his car

keys to keep him from carousing. Years earlier, married to his second wife, he had also sped off in a mower in search of a drink. Jones referred to his mowing days in the 1996 release, “Honky Tonk Song.”

His drug and alcohol abuse grew worse in the late ‘70s, and Jones had to file for bankruptcy in 1978. A manager had started him on cocaine, hoping to counteract his boozy, lethargic performances, and Jones was eventually arrested in Jackson, Miss., in 1983 on cocaine possession charges. He agreed to perform a benefit concert and was sentenced to six months probation.

“In the 1970s, I was drunk the majority of the time,” Jones wrote in his memoir. “If you saw me sober, chances are you saw me asleep.”

In 1980, a 3-minute song changed his life. His longtime producer, Billy Sherrill, recommended he record “He

Stopped Loving Her Today,” a ballad by Curly Putnam and Bobby Braddock. The song took more than a year to record, partly because Jones couldn’t master the melody, which he confused with Kris Kristofferson’s “Help Me Make It Through the Night,” and partly because he was too drunk to recite a brief, spoken interlude (“She came to see him one last time/And we all wondered if she would/And it kept running through my mind/This time he’s over her for good.”)

“Pretty simple, eh?” Jones wrote in his memoir. “I couldn’t get it. I had been able to sing while drunk all of my life. I’d fooled millions of people. But I could never speak without slurring when drunk. What we needed to complete that song was the narration, but Billy could never catch me sober enough to record four simple spoken lines.”

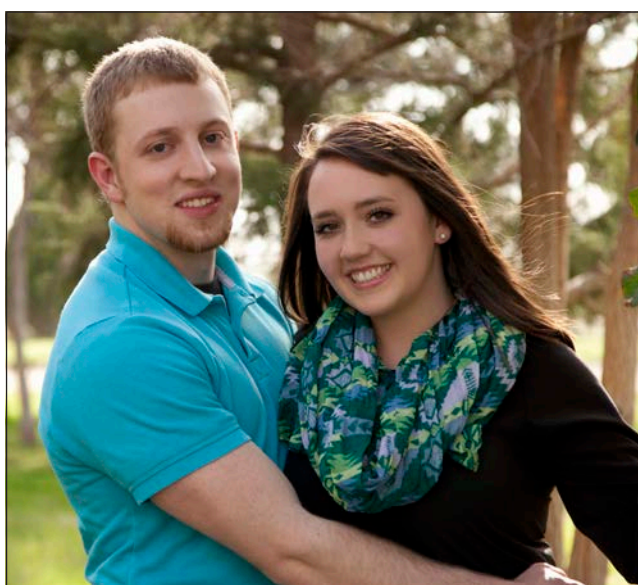
"TRS is a strong system that provides retirement

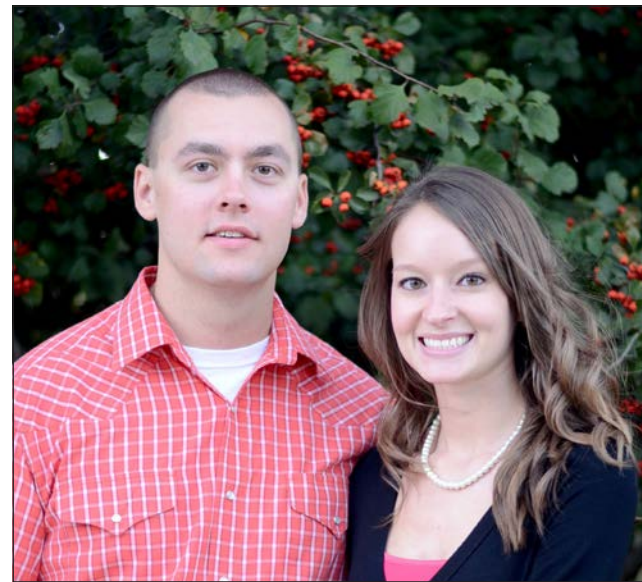
