

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

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## Train wreck ahead

Most Americans even those who are legislators — know very little about the details of President Obama's Affordable Care Act, socalled Obamacare. Next year, when it goes into

will learn the hard way. Many people lazily assume that

what it promises: give insurance to the uninsured and lower the cost of health care by limiting spending on dubious procedures.

Don't count on it. Consider just the complexity: The act itself is more than 906 pages long, and again and again in those 906 pages are the words, "the Secretary shall promulgate regulations ..."

"Secretary" refers to Secretary of Health and Human Services Kathleen Sebelius. Her minions have been busy. They've already added 20,000 pages of rules. They form a stack 7 feet high, and more are to come.

Our old health care system was already a bureaucratic and regulatory nightmare.

It had 16,000 different codes for different ailments. Under our new, "improved" system, there will be more than a 100,000.

Government likes to think regulations can account for every possibility. Injured at a chicken coop? The code for that will be Y9272. Fall at an art gallery? That means you are a Y92250

There are three dif-

ferent codes for walking into a lamppost depending on how often you've walked into lampposts. This is supposed to give government a more precise way to reimburse doctors for treating people and alert us to surges in injuries that might inspire further regulation.

On Government-Planned World, this makes sense. But it will be no more successful than Soviet central plan-

Compare all that to a tiny part of American medicine that is still free-market: Lasik eye surgery.

Its quality has improved, while costs dropped 25 percent. Lasik (and cosmetic surgery) are specialties that provide a better consumer experience because they are a market

. Patients pay directly, so doctors innovate constantly to please them. Lasik doctors even give patients their cellphone numbers.

President Obama didn't kill American free-market health care. It began dying during World War II, when government imposed wage and price controls. At first, companies said, "Great, stability!"

But then they realized that they could not attract better workers without raises. So companies got around the rules, as companies do. They gave "benefits," like health insurance.

Government then distorted the market further by giving employerbased health insurance better tax treatment than coverage you buy yourself.

But employer-based insurance is nuts. Many workers feel locked into their jobs. Company insurance largely destroyed the health care free market, since employees rarely shop for the best service at the lowest price.

Now Obamacare may kill what's left of that market

Maybe we will soon be like Canada, where some people wait years for treatment. A producer from my TV show went to a Canadian town where the town clerk pulls names out of a box and then phones people to say: "Congratulations! You get to see a doctor this month!"

But there is at least one area where Canada offers cutting-edge, life-saving technologies. Unfortunately, to get this care, you have to meow or bark. Veterinary care is still handled by the market. Providers innovate or go out of business.

# Microchip reunites dog with owner

Hello, Time just flies by whether you are having fun or not!

April has been good for the animals at the Pampa Animal Shelter. It is amazing how many babies, both puppies and kittens, have been born at the shelter. At the moment there are 16 baby Chihuahuas at the shelter, plus numerous other 8- to 12-week old puppies. There have been probably 30 kittens, with many brought in because the momma died. Many of them did not make it even though we had nursing moms take them. Still, there are probably 16 that are going to be available in the next week. You can not help watch these baby animals grow and develop without a smile on your face. They are precious. The worry is what will happen to them and can we find good homes with people who will take care of them.

A couple of weeks ago, we worked on last years figures for grant applications and PAWS has paid for the spay/neuter of almost 500 animals that fall under our low income/neighborhood guidelines. We also adopted out or moved to no kill rescues 833 animals through the Pampa shelter. All those animals are eventually "fixed," although some do slip through the cracks.

People will move, change phone numbers, or just will not take their animal in. Following up on these animals takes a lot of time and perseverance. The other wonderful number is 343 for animals reclaimed

from the shelter in 2012. That is a far interested in a darling dog that has cry from the figures before PAWS started helping at the shelter with an average of 100 a year adopted and 60 reclaimed.

It takes a tremendous amount of work and determination to get these animals out of the shelter. It is so easy to get overwhelmed by the amount of animals that come in. It is like right now. There are so many animals there that 11 small dogs were in one 2 and a half by 8 'run, and every day people donate more.

The other day I was so excited because we got a coon hound adopted to a great family. I go into the shelter today and there is a large male boxer, and a beautiful female chocolate lab to take his place. You think, will it ever slow down? Look at how many animals we get fixed. Where is the payoff? I keep telling myself and the other volunteers, we have to be thankful for each animal that has a good out come and focus on that good news before we move on to the next case!

We had an adoption day at United on April 13 and adopted out 12 dogs and two cats. It was a good day, with 30 volunteers working, except for the wind that got worse as the day went on. We did survive, plus we had great food and supply donations for the shelter. We did have one beautiful 3-month-old Aussie/ collie mix returned because he got sick. We paid for vet treatment, but family did not want dog that might die, even though we told them it was perfectly OK. So if anybody is

# Who are the war criminals in Syria?

Last week, several polls came out assessing U.S. public opinion on intervention in Syria.

According to the Huff-

ington Post poll, Americans oppose U.S. air strikes on Syria by 3-to-1. They oppose sending arms to the rebels

by 4-to-1. They oppose putting U.S. ground troops into Syria by 14-to-1. Democrats, Republicans and independents are all against getting involved in that civil war that has produced 1.2 million refugees and 70,000

A CBS/New York Times poll found that by 62-to-24 Americans want to stay out of the Syrian war. A Reuters/Ipsos poll found that by 61-to-10 Americans oppose any U.S. interven-

But the numbers shift when the public is asked if it would make a difference if the Syrian regime used poison gas. In that case, opposition to U.S. intervention drops to 44-to-27 in Reuters/Ipsos.

Yet on the Sunday talk

shows and cable news, the hawks are over-represented. To have a senator call for arming the rebels and U.S. air strikes is a better ratings "get" than to have on a senator who wants to stay out of the war.

In that same CBS poll, however, the 10 percent of all Americans who say they follow the Syrian situation closely were evenly divided, 47-to-48, on whether to intervene.

The portrait of America that emerges is of a nation not overly interested in what is going on in Syria, but which overwhelmingly wants to stay out of the

But it is also a nation whose foreign policy elites are far more interventionist and far more supportive of sending weapons to the rebels and using U.S. air power. From these polls, it is hard not to escape the conclusion that the Beltway elites who shape U.S. foreign policy no longer represent the manifest will of Middle America.

America has not gone isolationist, but has become anti-interventionist. This country does not want its soldiers sent into any more misbegotten adventures like Iraq and Afghanistan and does not see

any vital national interest in who comes out on top in Syria.

for that great silent majority? Who in the U.S. Senate is on national TV standing up to the interventionists? Another story that came

But who is speaking up

out this weekend, smothered by news of Israeli air strikes on Syrian military installations and missile depots, might cool elite enthusiasm — and kill any public desire to intervene.

"Syrian Rebels May Have Used Sarin Gas," ran the headline in Monday's New York Times. Datelined Geneva, the story

"United Nations human rights investigators have gathered testimony from casualties of Syria's civil war and medical workers indicating that rebel forces have used the nerve agent sarin, one of the lead investigators said Sunday."

The U.N. commission has found no evidence that the Syrian army used chemical weapons. But Carla Del Ponte, a former Swiss attorney general and a commission member, stated:

"Our investigators have been in neighboring countries interviewing victims doctors and field

hospitals, and according to their report of last week, which I have seen, there are strong, concrete suspicions but not yet incontrovertible proof of the use of sarin gas, from the way the victims were treated.

In short, the war criminals may be the people on whose behalf we are supposed to intervene. And if it was the rebels who used sarin gas, and not the forces of President Bashar Assad, more than a few questions arise that need answering.

For just two weeks ago, the White House informed Congress:

"Our intelligence community does assess, with varying degrees of confidence, that the Syrian regime has used chemical weapons on a small scale in Syria, specifically, the chemical agent sarin."

A clamor then arose demanding Obama make good on his threat that the Syrian regime's use of poison gas would cross a "red line" and be a "game changer," calling forth "enormous consequences."

Where would that be? HEAVEN! His son was there because he had no sin. David spoke of going there because his sins were forgiven by God.

So are you ready for eternity? If you are old enough to read this article, then one thing is for sure: you have sinned. Romans 3:23 That being true, have you ever surrendered to Jesus Christ? She wanted him back and sent a crate and money order to have him flown to California.

Not as easy as one would think, because airlines will not make reservations for animals.

It is a first-come, first-serve situation, plus temperature is really problematic — not only where you start, but where you end up.

He had to fly on the 6 a.m. flight out of Amarillo, to Dallas and then on to Sacramento.

Another glitch was airline wanted only a credit card and it had to be paid at time of shipping — no over the phone payments!

First morning I pick up Bert at the shelter at 3:30 (He has to be checked in around 5).

He loads up and sits in the front seat like he has done this all his life.

We get to the airport, unload his crate, get all the paperwork done, pay his fare, and load Bert up in the crate.

Away he goes, and after a few minutes, so do I.

I am on the outskirts of Amarillo, when my phone rings. So the next morning I go to the

shelter at 3:30 and pick up Bert He acts like he is glad to see me. Away we go. I unload his crate and

take his papers in. They check him in and check the temperature because things are heating up in other parts of the country.

Thank God it is a go. Bert lands in Sacramento at 12:30 p.m. and his owner is waiting.

It all worked out and both are doing well. If Bert had not been microchipped, he would not have made it out of the shelter, let alone home. And at this point, I did not think I could make another 3:30 a.m. run to Amarillo!

Have a good week. Consider adopting and adding another pet to your family.

The shelter is overflowing with wonderful animals needing a second chance, including a deaf, Aussie/ heeler mix that is scared to death, but loves children.
